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## Congress Begins Eightieth Term

**House Elects Martin As Speaker; Senate Organization Stalled In Debate; President To Deliver Message Monday If Both Houses Are Organized By Then**

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Triumphant Republicans quickly elected Joseph W. Martin of Massachusetts speaker of the new House today but Senate organization for the 80th Congress stalled in debate over seating Missouri's G. Bilbo of Mississippi.

Martin, first Republican to take the House gavel in 15 years, was elected 244 to 182. In a keynote speech he called upon Democrats to cooperate with his party in handling such postwar problems as labor laws, taxation and government economy.

The House then was ready for business with two major bills—a tax reduction measure and a comprehensive labor bill which would outlaw the closed shop and force arbitration of disputes in essential industries—already in the legislative hopper.

But at the other end of the Capitol, an exceptional and wordy argument over permitting Bilbo to serve a third term delayed organization of the Senate after only one new member—Baldwin of Connecticut—had taken the oath.

In the White House President Truman heard and saw the opening House proceedings by means of television.

The White House announced that President Truman would deliver his state of the union message at a joint session in the House chamber Monday at 1 p. m. It was understood that the message would be organized then.

The No. 1 measure offered in the House was the Republican plan to cut individual income taxes. Instead of the proposed 20 per cent reduction across the board, it provides for a 20 per cent tax cut on the first \$300,000 of income and (Continued on Page Six)

## Legislator Changes Slash-Tax Measure

**Rep. Knutson's General 20 Per Cent Income Tax Revised To Favor Wage Earner; Upper Brackets Harder Hit**

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Rep. Knutson (R-Minn.) today completed work on his bill to reduce individual income taxes, with the biggest cuts going to those in lower income brackets.

The widely-heralded Republican tax cutting measure was revised at the last minute before its scheduled introduction at the noon convening of Congress.

Knutson, who becomes chairman of the tax-framing House Ways and Means Committee, originally had announced plans for a 20 per cent cut "across the board" for everyone.

In a statement today he said: "The reduction of the tax attributable to that part of the income of taxpayers which is in excess of \$300,000 is reduced by 10.5 per cent."

In general, he added, "incomes above \$300,000 are unearned."

In its final form, the Republican bill also would grant an added advantage to taxpayers over 65 years old, giving each person in that age group an additional exemption of \$500, making a total exemption of \$1,000.

Knutson's statement said: "The group which receives the full 20 per cent reduction includes the worker, the earner, and those who utilize their incomes in production, expansion, and employment."

Knutson said the Ways and Means Committee will take up the tax cutting bill "as soon as the legislative budget with its ceiling on appropriations is approved later this month."

At the same time there were reports that President Truman is considering a request to Congress to head off some of the luxury tax cuts due to go into effect July 1. A fight over the scheduled \$9 to \$6 a gallon drop in liquor taxes already is in prospect.

Word that Mr. Truman is disturbed over the effect the excise tax cuts will have on the federal budget, came from Administration officials fully acquainted with tax matters.

They noted that the lower levies on such things as whisky, beer, furs, jewelry, cosmetics and night club bills will take effect automatically at mid-year under terms of the President's hostilities-ensu proclamation unless Congress acts in the meantime.

## LIBERALS MAP PROGRAM FOR FUTURE WORK

**Possibility Of Third Party; Disclaim Right Or Left Tendencies**

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Approximately 150 self-styled "Progressives," including two members of the Franklin D. Roosevelt family, gathered today for a conference hinting at a two-way scramble for scattered pieces of the New Deal political group.

Officials of the Union for Democratic Union, the meeting's sponsor, said the conference is "distinctly separate" from other liberal movements.

"The purpose of the meeting," said a formal announcement, "is to discuss ways and means of implementing a program of genuine American progressivism, explicitly free from totalitarian influences, both right and left."

"It is not necessarily a third party move," John F. P. Tucker, UDA legislative representative, told a reporter.

The possibility of a third party was raised last Monday in the wake of speeches by Henry A. Wallace and others at a New Work meeting which resulted in the merger of ten groups under the name of "Progressive Citizens of America."

This meeting adopted a declaration saying it could not "rule out the possibility of a new political party whose fidelity to our goals can be relied upon."

Principal organizations entering were the National Citizens Political Action Committee and the Independent Citizens Committee of the Arts, Sciences and Professions. Both (Continued on Page Four)

## BIGGEST JAIL BREAK IN N. Y. POLICE BOOKS

**Nine Felons Object Of Manhunt; Daylight Escape Uninterrupted**

New York, Jan. 3.—(AP)—The city's 17,000 police were ordered today to be ready to "shoot to kill" in the manhunt for nine felons, one a confessed killer and another a former Alcatraz inmate, who staged a daylight escape from ancient Raymond Street jail in Brooklyn.

By the number of men delivered, the break was the largest in the city's history. But it was astonishingly quiet and involved no violence.

"Everything points to accomplices on the outside," declared Albert O. Williams, newly appointed Commissioner of Correction.

Warden Thomas McDonnell attributed the escape to an inadequate number of guards and to the prisoners' deterioration.

"The jail," he said, "is over 100 years old. Its bars are rotten, its windows are rotten."

Williams and Brooklyn District Attorney Miles F. McDonald gave this version of the break:

The nine prisoners, unescorted, were returning from a prison medical examination yesterday sometime between 1:15 and 1:45 p. m. They departed from the customary route back to their cells and passed an open door leading into a cell facing Fort Greene Park.

One of the men climbed up to the cell window, and, using a hacksaw cut through the bar and squeezed through an opening.

Fifteen feet to the rear of the jail is a 20-foot retaining wall at the foot of the park. The wall has been cracking in recent years, and planks, a foot wide and three or four inches thick, had been jammed against the wall to shore it up.

A plank was just outside the open cell window and the prisoners apparently scrambled up it to the top of the 15-foot prison wall, from which they dropped into the snow-covered park.

The men disappeared without being observed, although they passed within 20 feet of a police booth overlooking the prison yard. (Continued on Page Six)

## Prices Break On Tobacco Markets

**Raleigh, N. C., Jan. 3.—(AP)—**Prices broke sharply on the flue-cured tobacco markets of the old belt as sales were resumed yesterday after a 35-day holiday.

Drops of from \$1 to \$5 were reported by the Federal and State Departments of Agriculture. Smoking leaf was off as much as 4. Most cutters were off from \$1 to \$3.

Some gains of from \$2 to \$3 were reported on lugs but most were lower.

Large quantities of lower grade tobacco were turned over to the stabilization corporation by dissatisfied growers, the agricultural agencies reported.

On the middle belt in North Carolina increases of from \$1 to \$3 were reported on most cutters and lugs while leaf grades showed more losses than gains with changes varying from 50 cents to \$2.50. The best thin nondescript was up \$1 while heavy and crude varieties lost from 50 cents to \$1.50.

## Strong Opposition For Strike-Preventive Bills

**Organized Labor And Some Industrialists Fight Proposals In Making By Members Of Both Major Political Parties**

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Members of Congress from both major parties opened a drive today to prevent strikes which affect the public health or safety—including coal strikes.

The drive faces strong opposition. Five House Republicans were ready with another bill—a repeat measure—which also would require compulsory arbitration as a last resort in order to prevent strikes affecting the public health or safety.

These five are Reps. Auchincloss (N.J.), Clifford Case (N.J.), Herter (Mass.), Hale (Me.), and Heston (Mass.).

Herter told a reporter: "Since first filing this bill last June, we have reviewed it very carefully and are more than ever convinced that it is essential. We see no other way of protecting the public interest."

While skirting the legislative field, the council proposed: 1. A comprehensive study of labor-industry problems by a joint congressional committee.

## UNDERGROUND ARMY ATTACKS

**One Of Biggest Operations Staged By Jewish Terrorists**

Jerusalem, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Stern British counter-measures were predicted today in the wake of widespread attacks by the Jewish underground last night on British military installations, in which at least one British officer was slain and a score or more persons wounded.

It was one of the biggest simultaneous operations ever launched in the Holy Land by the underground, which used mines, grenades, automatic weapons and home-made flame throwers in at least 12 separate attacks in Jerusalem, Tel Aviv, Tiberias, Hedera and Kiryat Haim, thus ending a month-long period of relative peace in Palestine.

Political observers predicted the attacks—which some sources said presumably were launched cooperatively by Itzhak Zvi Leumi and the so-called Stern Gang—would draw strong reaction from the British in the form of comb-outs, curfews and other measures in an effort to restore order.

## NEW TARHEEL CONGRESSMEN FILL STAFFS

**C. B. Deane, H. C. Jones And Monroe Redden Ready For Action**

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—North Carolina's three new congressmen started the 80th session of Congress having found places to live in Washington and a full office staffs on Capitol Hill.

Hamilton C. Jones of Charlotte from the tenth district, was "specially pleased" to have John K. Slear as his secretary. Slear was secretary to Cameron Morrison, also of Charlotte, when he was in the House.

Other members of Jones' staff are May Davidson of Mecklenburg County, and Madeline Pitts, of Newton.

He will be joined in Washington by Mrs. Jones in three weeks. Jones indicated his first preference on committees of the House is veterans or on committees dealing with judiciary, farming or appropriations, in that order.

C. B. Deane, of Rockingham, from the eighth district, succeeding North Carolina's first congressman, James Pratt, has chosen John Lang, Jr., of Carthage, as secretary, and Virginia Webb, of Rockingham, as stenographer.

Deane is no novice in Congress, having edited the Congressional Directory from 1933 to 1937 and having been here in 1939 as an attorney drafting the wage-hour law. He does not want to be on the (Continued on Page Six)

## NCEA Group Talks Supplement To Pay PARTIES GIVE FUND REPORTS

**Demo Bank Account Lower; GOP Cash Shows Increase**

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Both the Republican and Democratic National Committees came through the 1946 election campaigns with cash in the bank.

But their financial reports to Congress showed today that: The Democrats began the new year with \$589,806 less than they started the old one.

The Republicans not only won the election but boosted the size of their bank account.

Regular reports of contributions and expenses must be filed with the House clerk by political organizations.

George Killian, treasurer, said the Democrats began 1946 with a bank balance of \$731,294, took in \$1,147,871, paid out \$1,737,677 and wound up on Dec. 31 with \$141,488.

Ray R. Dobson, assistant treasurer of the Republican committee, listed contributions of \$1,097,404 and expenses of \$817,728 for last year, leaving the GOP \$279,676 to the good.

Just how much the Republicans now have in the till was not disclosed, as Dobson did not report what the committee had in the bank at the start of 1946.

## Republican Congress GOP Has Control For First Time Since 1931; Many Major Problems Face New Majority Party; Desperately Want Successful Session In View Of 1948

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Congress—the first Republican Congress since 1931—opened today.

Before going into that, here are the biggest problems which the new Congress face now:

Shall it pass laws to curb labor unions, cut taxes, end rent controls, merge the army and navy? Whatever they do, the Republicans will keep very carefully in mind the 1948 elections.

They want to win them very badly, with a Republican Congress again and a Republican president too.

President Truman, the Democrat in the White House, says he wants to get along with this Republican Congress.

## Mississippi Got As Far As Senate Rostrum Before Opponents Made Move; Taft Proposed Vote Which May Mean Death-Blow; Newly-Elected Republicans May Now Be Sworn In Giving Party Control Of Upper House

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—The Senate voted today to delay the seating of Senator Bilbo (D-Miss.). This left the way open for newly-elected Republicans to take the oath, giving their party control of the Senate.

The vote was 38 to 20. The vote came on a motion by Senator Taft (R-Ohio) to withhold action indefinitely on two proposals—one by Senator Taylor (D-Idaho) to deny Bilbo a seat while the rules committee looks into his qualifications and the other by Senator Overton (D-La.) to seat Bilbo while charges against him are heard.

Secretary Leslie L. Biffle, presiding over a Senate still technically under Democratic control, ruled that the effect of Taft's motion was to clear the Senate's docket for other business.

The oath-taking was blocked by Senator Taylor (D-Idaho) who opened a fight to oust Bilbo.

Threatened with a filibuster by Southern Democrats, the Senate became involved in a parliamentary tangle immediately after the convening of the new Republican-controlled Congress.

Bilbo got as far as the Senate rostrum in his effort to take office again despite charges by the Senate War Investigating Committee that he had used his position for his own personal gain.

With Senator Overton (D-La.), a supporter standing beside him, Bilbo listened without a word as Secretary Leslie L. Biffle, presiding, ruled that Taylor's motion to keep the Mississippi from taking his seat had the right of way over any move to administer the oath.

Previously, Republicans, who had been fighting to keep Bilbo from officially taking his seat, blocked the usual swearing in of senators by quarts in the alphabetical order of their names.

Senator Ferguson (R-Mich.) had offered a resolution to bar Bilbo now and take up his case in the Senate January 6. The effect of preventing the Mississippi from taking the oath was to prevent him from speaking in the Senate while his case is pending.

Ferguson's motion was lost in the shuffle when Taylor's dramatic (Continued on Page Two)

## Shooting Victim Reported Better

New York, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Mrs. Olga Rocco, 28, victim of a bizarre New Year's eve shotgun shooting by a young woman who thought she was using a camouflaged X-ray camera to take a picture, was reported improving today at Roosevelt hospital.

Hospital authorities said her name had been removed from the critical list after amputation of her left leg yesterday, and that her condition was satisfactory.

Meantime, Miss Pearl Lusk, 18-year-old blonde who did the shooting, was held in \$10,000 bail as a material witness in the case.

## WAA Plans End To Big Business

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Administrator Robert M. Littlejohn expressed confidence today the War Assets Administration will be ready to go out of business at the end of 1948 despite a lag in current sales.

Last October Littlejohn laid down a "master plan" for disposing of 75 per cent of consumer and capital goods property by February 1.

WAA's October inventory then showed goods costing originally \$4,500,000,000.

Littlejohn told reporters he now estimates sales in the period will total only 50 to 60 per cent of the inventory.

The original plan also called for 100 per cent of the material to be offered for sale by February 1, but the administrator estimated that only about 90 per cent will actually be put on the market by that time.

Littlejohn disclosed that a progressive reduction in the WAA payroll is underway which tentatively calls for cutting the agency's force of 58,000 to 32,000 by next July and to 12,000 by the end of 1948.

## Plane Overdue In Antarctic Trip

Washington, Jan. 3.—A PBM Mariner seaplane with eight persons aboard is overdue on an exploratory flight from the Navy's antarctic expedition, the navy reported today.

The plane took off from the seaplane tender U. S. S. Pine Island 5:45 a. m. (EST) Dec. 20.

It was scheduled to return at 3:45 p. m. the same day, but had sufficient fuel for 11 additional hours of flight.

The last report from the plane was received at 7:25 a. m. (EST) on Dec. 30 at which time it was about 250 miles south of the Pine Island.

Previous reconnaissance flights had reported open water in that area and the navy expressed hope the plane had made a safe landing. Search and rescue operations have been hampered by bad weather.

## ALDERMEN IN BUSY SESSION

### Reject Theater Petition; Elect New Alderman In Hurry

The Board of Aldermen at a regular meeting at the City Hall last night rejected Theater Manager T. Y. Walker's petition to permit motion picture theaters to remain open on Sundays from 6 to 9 p. m. State Senator Arthur B. Corey was counsel for the theater interests. Many of the Protestant ministers and a number of church women were present and spoke against the theaters being open during church service hours. The theater interests had a petition with about 200 names on it asking that the theaters remain open for the benefit of the public.

The city ordinance provides that the theaters shall be closed between 6 and 9 p. m. on Sundays, but it was temporarily amended during the war when hundreds of servicemen spent the weekends in Greenville. Recently, the original ordinance was ordered to be enforced.

There was considerable action at the meeting last night when Alderman Dr. M. B. Massey tendered his resignation as a member from the Fourth Ward, stating that he was moving into the Second Ward. The board elected Robert S. Moyer, Dickinson Avenue, to succeed Massey.

Mayor Jack Boyd sent for Judge J. W. H. Roberts and Moyer and His Honor swore in the new alderman and Moyer took a seat with the other members and participated in the remainder of the proceedings.

The board approved petitions from citizens requesting that that section west of the city known as Hillsdale, and that section east of the city limits to Greenwood Cem-

etry be incorporated in the city limits. Public hearings will be held to consider the proposals later. LeRoy Cherry of the Airport Inn told the board that he had a petition from people of the Fleming's Cross Roads section, across the river, to be taken into the city limits, but that he did not have it with him. Judge Albion Dunn stated that if the petition is presented that he has a counter petition from Fleming's Cross Roads citizens who are opposed to incorporating the area in the city limits.

Incidentally, a new ordinance provides a maximum fine of \$50 for crashing a red light. Dick King was appointed tax lister for Greenville in 1947. The fire department was authorized to install radio in its emergency rescue truck in connection with the police radio system.

Reports of department heads were read and approved and routine business was transacted.

"Pieces O' Eight," East Carolina Teachers College magazine, is now being distributed to students at the college. This issue, dated December 1946, is the first of three numbers which will appear during the 1946-1947 term at the college. Kay Mann of Middletown is the editor of the 22-page booklet and Margaret Jones of Fairfield is business manager. Emma L. Hooper of the faculty is advisor.

Contents include varied contributions by student authors, such as short stories, essays, sketches, and poems. Photographs of scenes and personalities on the campus, and an attractive series of pen drawings and decorations are included. The cover is printed in purple and gold, college colors, and presents a view of the Wright building on the campus.

"Pieces O' Eight" was established by students at the college in 1939. During the war it was discontinued because of the difficulty of having it printed. Last spring the magazine was revived, and one number was issued under the editorship of Esther Mae Leitner of Roanoke Rapids.

### ECTC Tightens Admission Rules

Faculty members of East Carolina Teachers College at a meeting last night adopted a series of recommendations tightening up on regulations regarding readmittance to the college of students who have failed courses. The action came as a result of a lengthy statistical study on scholarship submitted to the faculty by a committee made up of Dr. Howard J. McGinnis, chairman, Dr. Lucille Turner, and Dr. Paul A. Toil.

Recommendations submitted in the study were adopted unanimously by the faculty and will be included in the 1947-1948 catalog, which will be issued in the spring.

Among other provisions, recommendations include the establishment of a special testing program for students who wish to reenter college after failing a part of their work and for new students whose high school grades or grades from another college are less than a "C."

Committee members who prepared the report were given a vote of thanks by the faculty on the basis of their having made a valuable contribution toward raising scholastic standards at the college.

Columbia, S. C., Jan. 3—(AP)—A powerful Negro who once sought officers to shoot him to death to escape the electric chair nearly won freedom in a death cell break before he was electrocuted today.

Cleve Covington, 195-pound, six foot two inch strong man, bent a one-inch death cell prison bar with his bare hands after sawing it and smashed down a death house inner door in an 11th hour escape attempt.

Only the solid steel outer door of the death house blocked his road

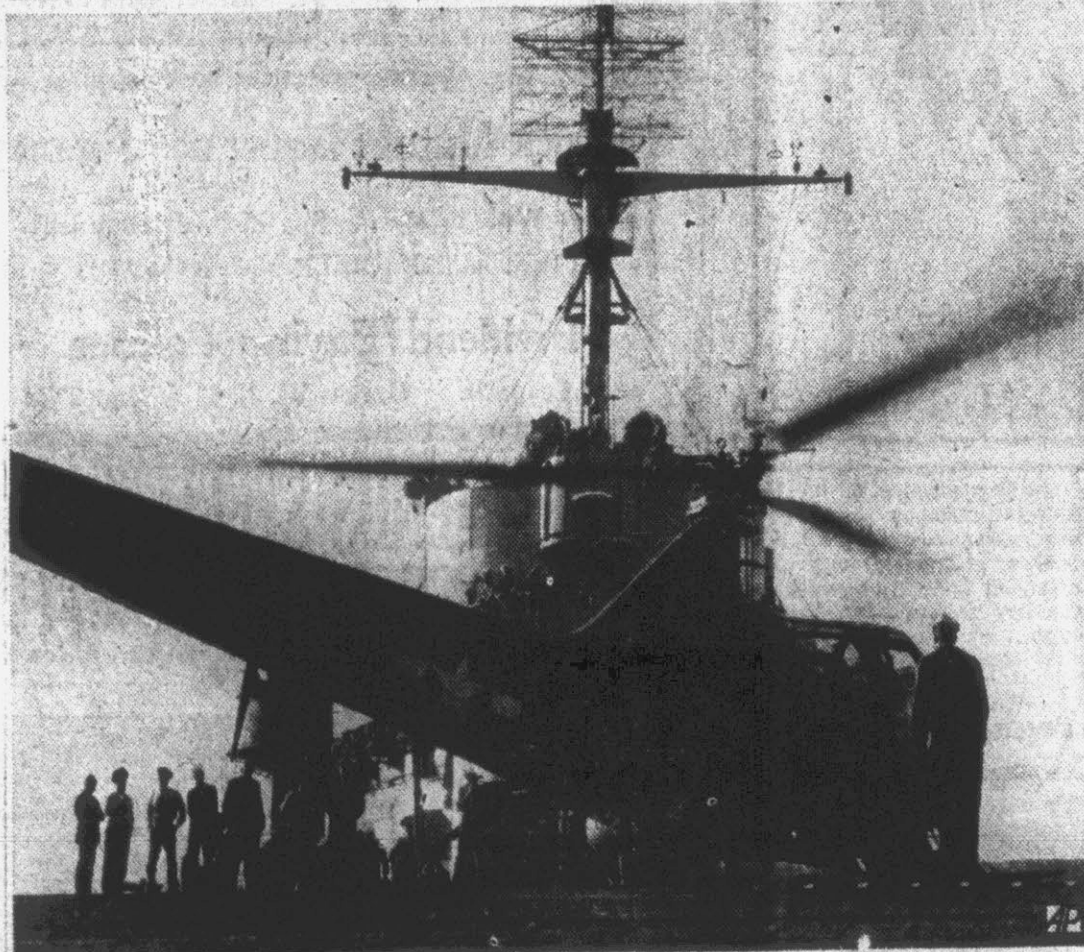

"Kill me! Kill me! I don't want to die in the chair!" he shouted then at officers whom he fought furiously in an attempt to get them to shoot him to death, before he was overpowered with tear gas.

## New Bishop Will Raise Big Funds

New York, Jan. 2—(AP)—The Rt. Rev. Henry H. Sherrill today assumed his position as presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church in the United States and announced his immediate objective was the raising of \$1,000,000 for world relief for Episcopal churches, as voted by the general convention last September.

Bishop Sherrill, who succeeded the Rt. Rev. Henry St. George Tucker, said at a press conference that the fund will be sought in a campaign from February 15 to April 15 because "the money is desperately needed at the present time and we cannot wait until fall."

An additional \$2,000,000 will be raised within the next three years. Robert D. Jordan, director of promotion for the national council of the Episcopal church, who sat with the bishop, said the fund was to be used for food and clothing for destitute persons in Europe and Asia, temporary churches, books for theological seminaries and even to aug-

ment the salaries of clergymen in some countries where inflation has made serious inroads on the value of money.

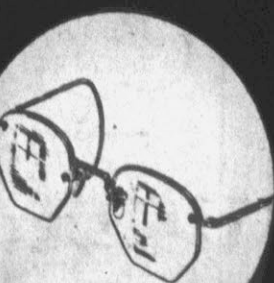

## WASHINGTON LETTER

### WHY CONGRESSIONAL GAVELS PROVE TO BE SHORT LIVED

By JANE EADS

Washington — Almost as much in demand as the pens which the President uses to sign important documents are the gavels for order on important occasions in the House of Representatives.

Standard gavels are turned out on lathes in the main workshop under the architect's office in the Capitol building. New ones are continually being made to replace those given away or broken.

Numerous folks request gavels that are used on such occasions as when war is declared, for the opening and closing of a session or when a special guest visits the floor. Gavels are often broken. On one occasion, during a specially tumultuous session, Speaker Sam Rayburn had to rap so vigorously for order that the head flew off his gavel out onto the floor of the House.

Some speakers have had large collections of gavels which have been presented to them by the country. Speaker Rayburn had such a collection.

It included a gavel made from wood from a part of the home of Francis Scott Key, presented to him by a veterans' organization. It also included one made of ivory wrapped in spun glass.

When John Nance Garner was speaker he amassed hundreds of gavels. Among these was one from Texas made of mesquite wood and weighing 500 pounds. It was three feet high and three feet around and had a handle about seven feet long.

Other gift gavels have been made from all kinds of rare woods and other materials. Some have been carved from the wood used in famous ships.

These gavels are never used in the regular process of presiding. Sometimes people present the speaker with a gavel and ask him to use it and return it to them. Former Rep. John O'Connor (D-N.Y.) once asked the late Speaker John Bankhead to use an Irish shillelagh which he himself had once wielded on the occasion of making a St. Patrick's day speech.

The presiding officer of the Senate doesn't use a regular gavel. A piece of ivory, shaped somewhat like an hour-glass, about three inches long and one and a fourth inches wide at the ends, has been used by every Vice President since John Adams.

This small block of ivory re-

Foreign correspondents have been permitted to travel about Poland and send uncensored accounts abroad and Polish authorities have offered to facilitate the entry of correspondents to cover the election.

What happens January 19 and the preceding fortnight should be in full view to the outside world.

The Potsdam accord was announced Aug. 2, 1945. The elections which were to come "as soon as possible" have been deferred more than 17 months. And opponents of the government bloc say the voting will be anything but "free and unfettered."

Leadership of the opposition is Stanislaw Mikolajczyk, head of the Polish Peasants Party and, strangely, vice premier in the leftist government. The explanation is that at Yalta British and Americans made inclusion of Mikolajczyk, one-time premier of the Polish exile regime in London, in a new "Polish provisional government of national unity" a condition of their recognition. Mikolajczyk was taken in but even though he is vice premier actually he is the outstanding opponent of the regime, his inclusion has proven nothing more than a device to meet the Yalta conditions.

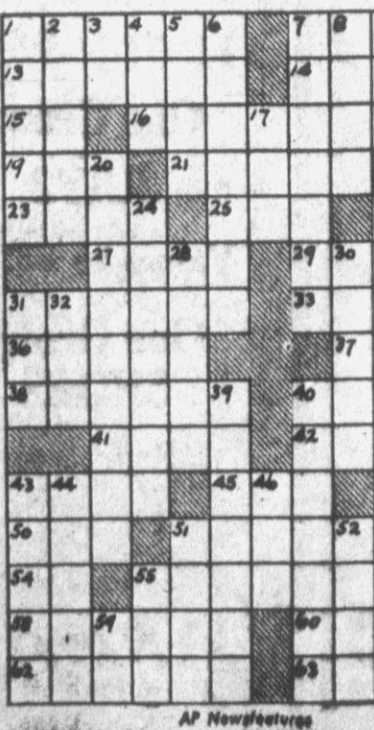

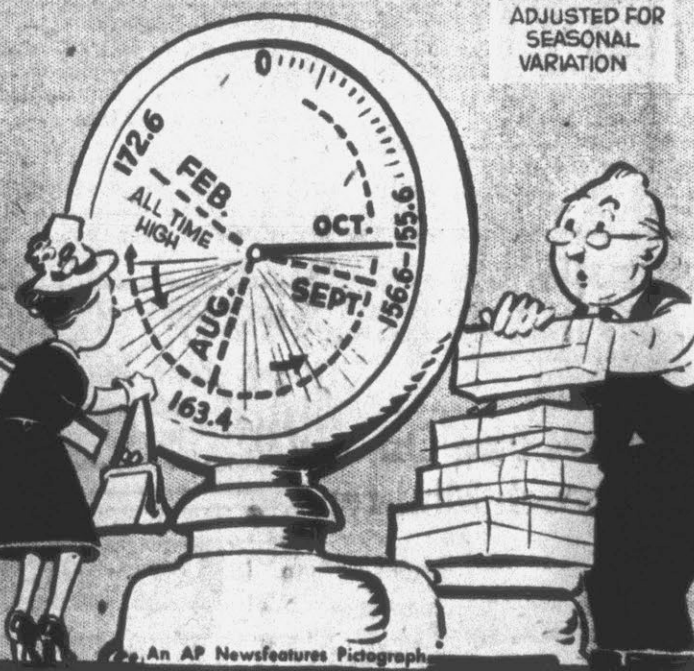
## Death Of Detectives 'Murder and Suicide'

## Non-Support Case Settled In Court

In Police Court today Judge J. W. H. Roberts found Robert Williams guilty of non-support of his wife, Mrs. Gladys Williams, and their three children, Barbara Anne, 4; Mary Louise, 2, and Betty Lou, four months old.

In pronouncing sentence, Judge Roberts sentenced Williams to a year on the roads, suspended sentence and placed him on probation for five years.

The road sentence was suspended provided Williams pay into the court \$30 a week for the support of his family.

The court allowed Williams two months in which to pay court costs. Judge Roberts ordered that the defendant begin making payments on January 11. Police Chief Jim Tanner said the police would find the man a job right away.

The court took cognizance of the fact that Williams can earn \$35 a week if he works, and the judge reminded the couple: "It is up to you" as to whether or not you shall live together. The young wife and mother stated on the stand that she did not want to live with Williams.

Solicitor Bloom urged Judge Roberts to send Williams to the roads and said the people of Greenville would help to provide for the family's needs while Williams "learned how to work regularly" on the roads.

The judge, in his Solomon-like wisdom, said he wanted the mother and children provided for first.

The Williams case attracted unusual attention after it was reported that the family was in dire want. The public response was generous.

However, the court warned Williams that if he violates any law or molests his wife during the probation period he will "be his own arresting officer, judge and jury" and "have to serve a year on the roads."

State Senator Arthur B. Corey was counsel for Williams.

Chief Jim Tanner informed Solicitor Eli Bloom that Mrs. Williams did not swear out the warrant against her husband. Detectives George Crawford and M. E. Corbett issued the warrant after they found the mother and children hungry and in direst poverty, while the husband and father was away.

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## Crossroads Reached On College Athletics Codes

Los Angeles, Jan. 3—(AP)—The time has come, in the avowed belief of Commissioner Kenneth L. (Doc) Wilson of the Western Conference, for the nation's colleges to take stock and adopt a standard code of ethics in dealing with athletes.

Termining the forthcoming meeting in New York of the National Collegiate Athletic Association "the most important in the history of the NCAA," Wilson declared:

"We have reached the crossroads. The colleges can either level off and operate as they should, or they may get into trouble. We must set up a policy whereby a kid will choose a school for its educational value, rather than the school choosing a kid for his athletic ability."

Colleges, he said, have prospered under the true amateur operation and must continue to follow that pattern. "If we don't we invade the professional field, where we don't belong," he declared.

His predecessor, the late Maj. John Griffith, once sent out a form letter to most of the college presidents in the country, outlining his views on threatened professionalism and asking for opinions on what should be done to correct abuses. The presidents displayed little interest, Wilson recalled.

"He received only 28 replies."

Wilson continued, "Recently I sent out the same type of letter. I received nearly 200 replies. This shows that college presidents now are aware of the problem and are determined to take action where needed."

Wilson said some 28 conferences will be represented in New York Jan. 6-8, and independent schools, including West Point and Annapolis have indicated they will cooperate with the NCAA. Notre Dame has been invited but Wilson said he had not been advised whether it will participate in the meeting.

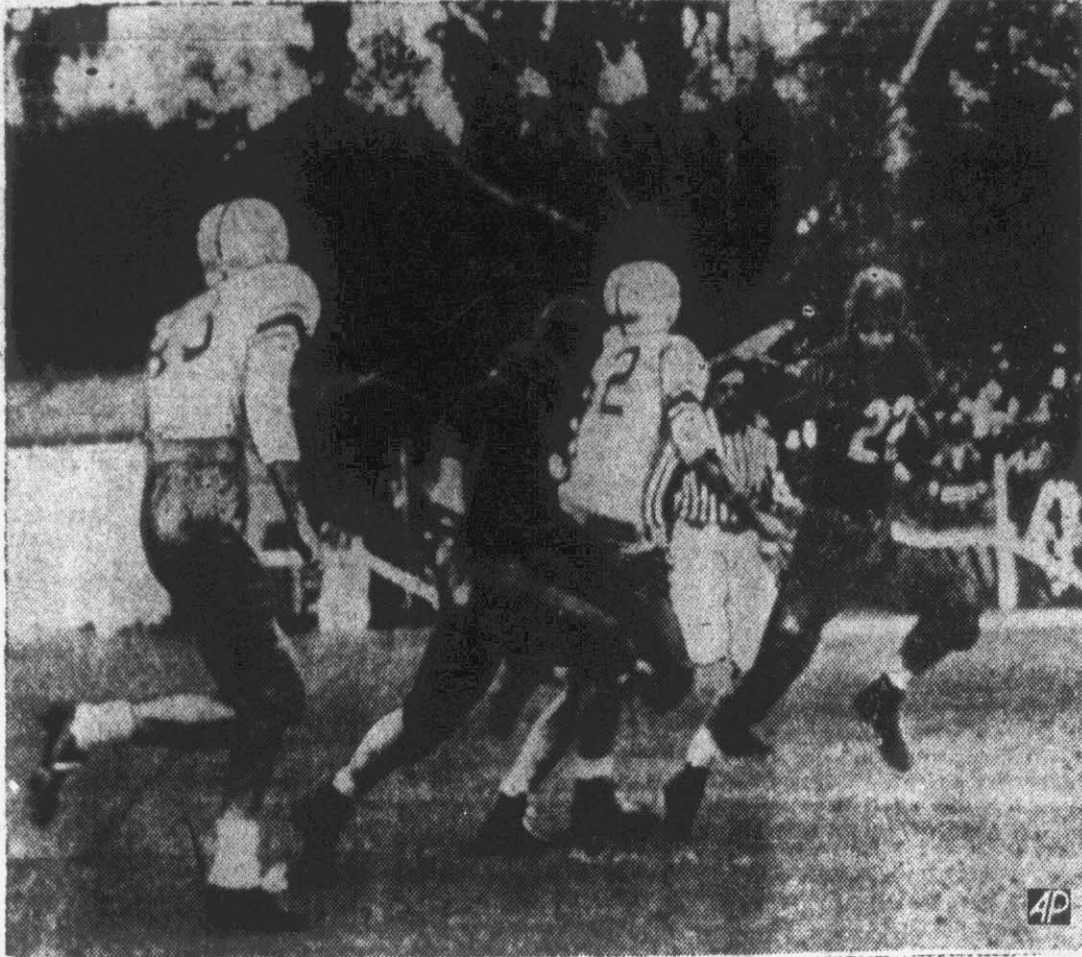
New Orleans, Jan. 3—(AP)—Georgia's famed Charley Trippi indicated here last night he plans to enter professional football.

Observers, some of them viewing the contemplated action on the part of the legislative committee as a yielding to pressure by insurgent teachers backing the so-called South Piedmont Plan, said NCEA officials will suggest that funds to carry out the supplement program come from the state's general fund surplus, which is now nearly \$50,000,000.

Meanwhile, backers of the South Piedmont Plan are actively continuing their campaign to gain support for their proposed salary jump which they say would boost salaries 40 per cent but which NCEA and Board of Education officials claim would be a 68.09 per cent increase.
