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THREE PLANES CRASH DURING SUDDEN STORM

Two Airliners And
Small Plane Wrecked
In Eastern Snow-
storm

Five persons were killed and
injured in three plane crashes last
night during a sudden blinding
snowstorm that engulfed large areas
of the East coast.

The worst accident was at Carmel, N. J., where a Nationwide Air Transport Service, Inc. passenger plane crashed in a wooded area, killing the co-pilot and two passengers and injuring 19 other persons.

A small private plane bound from Mt. Pleasant, Mich., to Florida, crashed in Scott County, Va., killing its two occupants.

At Jones Beach, bathing resort near New York, 16 persons escaped serious injury as an American Airlines DC-3 two-engine plane made a crash landing on the beach a few feet from the water. Only the pilot and co-pilot were injured and the stewardess and 13 passengers were unhurt.

The freak snowstorm, accompanied by rain and sleet, covered an area estimated by the Weather Bureau in New York to extend as far as 250 miles from that city.

Only one person on the plane that crashed at Carmel escaped injury as the ship skidded over a farm house and plunged through 50 yards of woodland, leaving sheared trees in its wake. Among the injured was Willie Papp, world featherweight boxing champ.

Passengers extinguished a small fire and the fuselage remained intact although the left wing was torn off and the nose crumpled in the crash.

Forces In Europe
Under Gen. Clay

Washington, Jan. 6.—(AP)—The War Department announced today that Lieut. Gen. Lucius D. Clay has been named commanding general of the United States forces in Europe, succeeding Gen. Joseph T. McNarney.

General McNarney has been assigned to the military staff committee of the United Nations as senior representative. He succeeds Gen. George C. Kenney.

In other high staff changes, Gen. Mark W. Clark has been assigned to command of the sixth army with headquarters at San Francisco, Calif., succeeding the late Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell. Gen. Clark is now commander-in-chief of U. S. forces in Austria.

Lt. Gen. Geoffrey Keyes, now commanding general of the third army in Germany, will become deputy to General Clark in Austria about January 10.

He will succeed General Clark upon the latter's departure for the United States at a date not yet fixed, but probably after completion of the forthcoming discussions on the Austrian treaty where General Clark will act as deputy for Secretary of State Byrnes.

Weather Forces
Searchers Back

Aboard USS Mt. Olympus, Jan. 6.—(AP)—A seaplane took off Sunday from the Navy's Antarctic expedition on the first search for nine missing fliers but was forced back by bad weather after a two-hour, 25 minute flight.

The missing fliers were aboard a two-engine Marine seaplane which was last heard from a week ago while making a reconnaissance flight over the Franklin D. Roosevelt Sea and Ellsworth Land.

The search plane was unable to reach the coast of the Polar continent before being turned back by adverse weather. Fog had prevented search operations until Sunday.

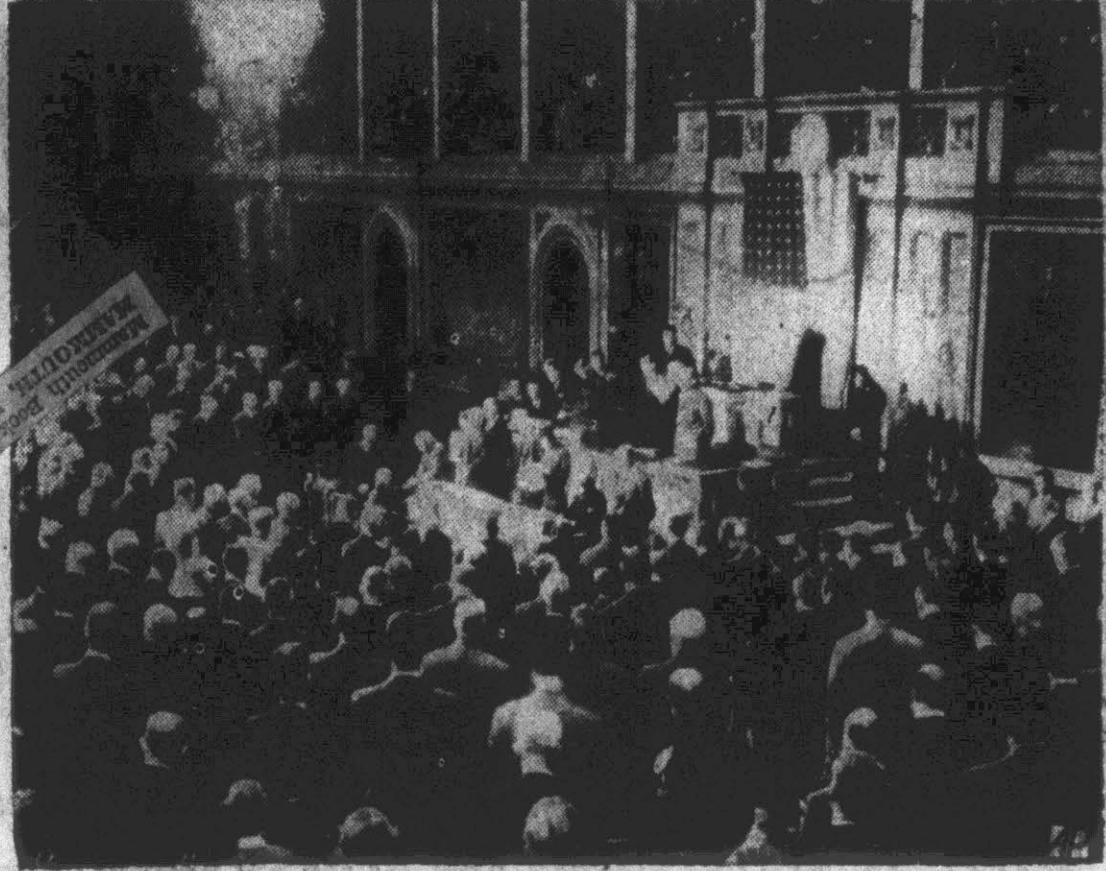

End To Soviet Control Of Dairen Asked In U. S. Note

State Department
Asks Russia And
China To Arrange
Early End To Soviet
Military Control Of
Port City Under
Terms Of Chinese-
Soviet Pact In 1945

Washington, Jan. 6.—(AP)—The United States has asked Russia and China to arrange without further delay to end Soviet military control of Dairen and open the Manchurian port to world traffic under Chinese administration.

The State Department said a note was delivered to the Soviet foreign office at Moscow and the Chinese foreign office at Nanking by American diplomats on January 3. It said:

"The American government considers it desirable that the current unsatisfactory situation with regard to the status and control of the port of Dairen be promptly considered by the Chinese and Soviet governments with a view to the implementation of the pertinent provisions of the Soviet-Chinese agreement of August 14, 1945, in regard to Dairen.

"This government perceives no reason why there should be further delay in reopening the port under Chinese administration, to international commerce as contemplated in the aforementioned agreement.

"The government of the U. S. while fully appreciating that this is a matter for direct negotiation between the Chinese and Soviet governments, feels that it has a responsibility to American interest in general to raise the question of the two directly interested governments. It hopes that the abnormal conditions now prevailing at Dairen may be terminated at an early date and that normal conditions may be reestablished which will permit American citizens to visit and reside at Dairen in pursuit of their legitimate activities.

"In the foregoing connection, this government also wishes to express the hope that agreement can be reached soon for the resumption of traffic on the Chinese Changchun railway.

"It is believed that prompt implementation of the agreements with regard to Dairen and the railroad would constitute a major contribution to the reestablishment of normal conditions in the far east and the revival of generally beneficial relations between the two countries."

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Foreign Policy Keenly Interests Congressmen

Proposed Resolutions
Show Determination
To Keep In Constant
Touch With Present
And Future Policies

Washington, Jan. 6.—(AP)—The new Congress is showing signs of a determination to keep a constant finger on this country's foreign policy pulse.

A survey of legislation thus far proposed in the House produces evidence that Secretary of State Byrnes will have to watch developments on Capitol Hill closely in coming months to prevent a conflict between diplomatic and legislative policies.

Some sentiment already has developed in the House Foreign Committee behind a move to call Byrnes before a joint congressional session—either public or private—for a comprehensive review of such issues as tariffs, trade, cartels, disarmament, and universal training.

Rep. Mundt (R-SD), a member of the House Foreign Committee said there is ample precedent for such a session.

Illustrating the interest of Congress members in foreign affairs, resolutions already have been introduced calling for:

1. Establishment of appropriate international machinery for control and reduction of armaments and weapons of war.

2. Congressional instructions to international conferences to advocate and urge freedom of religion, the press and speech.

3. An expression of formal disapproval of Yugoslavia's action in imprisoning Archbishop Stepinac and in other persecutions of Roman Catholics.

4. Authority for the House interstate committee to investigate the effect of cartels on commerce with foreign nations.

Prospects of a fight over immigration—an issue in which the Department of State has a direct and deep interest—became virtually certain.

Second 'Liberal'
Group Organized

Washington, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Charging that "reaction is riding high" in Congress, America's second new "progressive" movement today began drafting a program its leaders predicted would attract "millions" of persons dissatisfied with current political trends.

Wilson Wyatt, former housing expert, and Leon Henderson, the first OPA administrator, were named co-chairmen last night of a nationwide organizing committee for the anti-Communist, pro-New Deal Americans for Democratic Action (ADA).

The creation of ADA made it virtually certain that at least two groups will compete for support of the country's self-styled liberal voting element.

A week ago at a New York session attended by Henry A. Wallace, ten organizations including the National Citizens Political Action Committee merged to form the Progressive Citizens of America (PCA). The latter invited into its folds all persons regardless of "political affiliation."

JOYNER ASKS VOTE CHANGES

End To Absentee
Ballot Wanted By
Elections Board

Raleigh, Jan. 6.—Abolition of the civilian absentee ballot in the state—"the single cause of most election troubles"—will be asked of the Legislature.

A report released by Col. William T. Joyner, chairman of the State Board of elections, recommended such action.

The report also proposed that the state attorney general prosecute alleged violations of election laws in the county in which the violation occurred or in an adjoining county, at his discretion. However, prosecution would come only on request of the state election board and approval by the governor.

Evil of the civilian absentee ballot in general elections—it was abolished in the primaries in 1939—greatly outweighs the good, the report noted.

"Civilian absentee voting is the weapon which a disgruntled losing candidate first seizes upon to belabor all election officials, his own county and his state," the report declared.

The report also recommended to the Legislature division of all precincts having more than 1,500 registered voters and minor technical changes in election laws. The board said technical corrections, now being completed, will be released in the near future.

Iran Tense Over
Coming Elections

Tehran, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Pre-election tension was heightened here today by fighting which broke out yesterday outside the royal palace during a political demonstration in which, officials said, 11 policemen and four or five civilians were injured.

Minister of propaganda and labor Aramesh said the demonstration was staged by striking university students, but declared the fighting was started by "low class idlers seeking to advance their own nefarious schemes."

The government, meanwhile, was heckled by a secret radio station calling itself "the voice of the Azerbaijan Democratic Party" which accused Premier Ahmed Qavam's regime of "torture and brutal murders" and urged Tehran residents to stay away from the polls Saturday.

Four-Point Labor Program Given Congress By Truman

'Billions For Veterans' Is Goal Of Congressmen

Lawmakers Tossing In Bills To Shell Out
Huge Sums For Ex-GIs; 18 Of First 147
Bills In House Would Affect Vets

Washington, Jan. 6.—(AP)—The rush is on in Congress to shell out more billions to veterans.

Lawmakers are tossing in bills and getting campaigns under way for such things as:

1. A soldier's bonus;
2. Immediate cashing of terminal leave bonds; and
3. A boost in government payments to veterans going to school or learning new jobs by working at them.

Eighteen of the first 147 bills received by the House would do something for those who served in the armed forces. These 18 cover programs that might total \$20,000,000,000 or \$30,000,000,000 in new outlays to ex-GIs.

And Rep. Edith Rogers (R-Mass.), the new chairman, is concentrating on plans to keep the House Veterans Committee busy.

"One of the first things," she told a reporter, "will be to lift the \$20 ceiling on allowances for on-the-job training. It is manifestly unfair."

Mrs. Rogers introduced a bill on that. So did several other legislators.

Furthermore, Mrs. Rogers has ideas about:

Increasing the number of amputees eligible for free cars (Congress

provided \$30,000,000 for this purpose last year; expanding out-patient treatment to help more veterans and relieve the shortage of hospital beds; extending educational provisions of the GI Bill.

Rights, and improving arrangements for supplying artificial limbs.

Judging by the number of new bills, a heavy demand is building up for immediate redemption some \$2,700,000,000 worth of terminal leave bonds. These were given to enlisted men by the last Congress to make up for the fact that officers got long leaves with pay before they were discharged. But enlisted men have to hang on to their bond for at least five years, even though the bonds draw two and a half percent interest.

Rep. Patman (D-Tex.) author of one bond cashing bill, said it "would not cost the government a cent because the government can borrow money to redeem the bonds at less than the interest it pays on them."

Rep. Pace (D-Ga.) has come forward with a World War II bonus bill. It would ante up \$4 a day for service at home and \$5 for service overseas.

Rep. Landis (R-Ind.) figured on reintroducing a bonus bill for \$1 a

Americans On Atoll Safe; Spurn Rescue

BIG OFFENSIVE IN HOLY LAND

British Troops Prepare For Large Scale
Operations

London, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Government sources said today British military authorities were preparing the biggest offensive in modern Palestine's history to crush what they called "the open rebellion against law and order" by Jewish extremists.

All branches of Britain's army in the Holy Land, estimated to total about 100,000 men, will take part, these sources said. Troops from Egypt are reaching the Holy Land by road and rail as reinforcements.

The trigger for the operation is expected to be British cabinet ratification of proposals formulated in conferences among Palestine's High Commissioner, Gen. Sir Alan Cunningham, Field Marshal Lord Montgomery, Prime Minister Attlee, Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin and Colonial Secretary Arthur Creech Jones.

The informants said the British government took the view that whatever settlement finally emerged for Palestine, the repositioning of law and order was Britain's first obligation.

Asked whether the U. S. State Department would be informed if large scale operations were put into effect, a foreign office spokesman said:

"There would be no advantage in informing the American authorities of whatever day-to-day measures we may be contemplating for the Holy Land."

A final decision on Palestine's fate also may come from Britain this week. The possibilities include:

1. A partition plan for the Holy Land, which would create independent Arab and Jewish states there.
2. Considered a last resort solution, British surrender of the League of Nations mandate to the United Nations organization.

Whatever solution is finally adopted, with or without Arab and Jewish consent, government sources said the United Nations would have to ratify the new arrangement.

Foreign Ministers
Given Saar Problem

Berlin, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Lt. Gen. Lucius D. Clay, Deputy American Military Governor in Germany, said today that the Foreign Ministers' Council, and not the Allied Control Authority for Germany, would handle the Saar controversy.

Clay announced to a news conference that the United States State Department had told him that the matter would be taken up on a government level by the foreign ministers at their meeting in Moscow next March.

Will Try To Restore
"Balance" To Court

Washington, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Asserting that the federal bench is "grossly lopsided on the side of Democratic leftists," Senator Wiley (R-Wis.) declared today he will try to "restore a balance" after 14 years of Democratic power over confirmations.

Wiley, new chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, asked Attorney General Clark for a census of the Federal Judiciary and the political complexion of appointments since 1932.

"State Of The Union" Message To Joint Session Of House And Senate Deals Exhaustively With Labor Problems; Warns Of Punitive Legislation; Would Continue War Excise Tax Rates; Asks Early Approval Of Treaties With Allies Of Germany

Washington, Jan. 6.—(AP)—President Truman today called on the Republican-controlled Congress to enact a four-point labor program designed to prevent strikes which stifle the nation's economy.

Appearing in person before a joint session of the Senate and House, Mr. Truman proposed:

1. Enactment of legislation outlawing the jurisdictional strike as "indecipherable."
2. Enactment of further legislation prohibiting secondary boycotts which involve "unjustifiable objectives."

He said boycotts which are intended to protect wage rates and working conditions should be distinguished from those furthering jurisdictional disputes.

3. Legislation providing machinery whereby unsettled disputes over existing collective bargaining agreements may be referred by either party to final and binding arbitration and extension of facilities within the Labor Department for assisting collective bargaining.

4. Provision by Congress for the appointment of a temporary joint commission to inquire into the enforcement of labor-management relations and to make legislative recommendations not later than March 15.

Mr. Truman cautioned Congress against adoption of "punitive legislation" and added:

"We must not, in order to punish a few labor leaders, pass vindictive laws which restrict the proper rights of the rank and file laborer."

"We must not under the stress of emotion, endanger our American freedom by taking ill-considered action which leads to results not anticipated or desired."

The President said the prospect of disagreement between his Democratic Administration and the Republican Congress on some domestic issues "is not to be feared" since it is "inherent in our form of government."

"The Congress and the President, during the next two years, must work together," Mr. Truman said. Men who differ, the President said, can still work together sincerely "for the common good."

In today's message, the President said he wanted a balanced budget and a start on reducing the public debt. To that end, he recommended that Congress continue for 12 months the special wartime taxes—such as those on telephone bills, furs, luggage, liquor, etc.—now due to expire July 1.

Other major points in his message:

1. Veterans. Except for minor adjustments, the "program of benefits for veterans is now complete."

2. Foreign affairs. The United States will continue to stick to a policy of upholding principles of international justice. It will not "retreat to isolationism" nor sacrifice vital principles to gain peace treaty settlements.

3. Military affairs. The United States proposes to remain strong until a "system of collective security under the United Nations" has been established. Then it will be willing to lead in collective disarmament.

The President withheld specific recommendations on continuing the draft or establishing universal training until studies on these topics have been finished.

4. Agriculture. The next two years, must be used to maintain and develop markets for farm production so that the country will not fail to meet problems of surpluses such as followed the first world war.

5. Housing. An "aggressive" program to encourage home construction is essential. Congress should enact "comprehensive" housing legislation which would permit improved housing in rural areas and the building, over a 4-year period, of 500,000 units of public low-rental housing.

Health. Mr. Truman asked a broad national health program that will assure adequate medical care to all who need it, "financed by its beneficiaries."

6. Prices. It is up to industry to hold the line on existing prices and even make cuts when profits justify that. It is up to labor not to press for "unjustified wage increases" that will force the price level up. It is up to government to encourage high production which leads to good wages, low prices and reasonable profits.

7. Natural resources. The program of developing America's great river systems should be "pushed with full vigor."

8. Monopoly. Anti-trust laws will be enforced vigorously. This must be supplemented by positive measures of aid to new enterprises. Decentralization of industry needs special attention.

9. Atomic energy. Mr. Truman called again for effective international control, voicing a fervent

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"Undercover" Bosses

Steering Committees Only Occasionally Heard From. But They Run Show In Congress; Chiefs Direct Party Lines On Important Objectives; The Head Men

Washington, Jan. 6.—(AP)—You only hear of the four steering committees in Congress from time to time.

But they just about run the show. The Republicans have a steering committee in the Senate, another in the House. The Democrats have one each in House and Senate, too.

Steering committees are political, made up strictly along party line. In each house each party puts about 15 of its too men on its own steering committee.

In each house these committees do the so-called quarterbacking for their parties on the big problems coming up.

They decide whether their party members in House or Senate should be for or against something when the issue is important.

When the 15-man committee makes a decision, word is passed on to the other party members who are not on the committee.

And they usually follow the committee's say-so. For example:

Last week there was the question of Senator Bilbo, Mississippi Democrat. Should he be allowed to take his seat?

The Senate Republican steering committee decided "No," that the Republican senators should fight to keep him out. They did.

Look for the same thing to happen on any of the major bills which may come up.

The reason you don't hear of the steering committees very often is this: They meet only on major problems.

These men will head the four steering committees:

Republicans: In the Senate, Sen. Robert A. Taft, Ohio; in the House, Rep. Charles McNary, Ohio.

NOTED WOMAN SPEAKS HERE

Mrs. Charles Doak Of Raleigh Addresses Woman's Club

Mrs. Charles Doak of Raleigh, executive secretary of the North Carolina Federation of Women's Clubs, spoke to a large group of interested members and friends at the Woman's Club meeting on Friday afternoon.

Mrs. Doak, who was introduced by Mrs. J. H. B. Moore, chose as her subject, "The Legislative program of the North Carolina Legislative Council."

In recalling the organization of the council she said that it was started in order to make legislators respect the intelligence of women. By 1936 it had done such constructive work that some men's organizations asked to be represented and permission was given them to join. At the present time there are on the council representatives of 15 organizations with a total membership of 60,000.

The six-point program which the council expects to fight for during the current session of the legislature is as follows:

1. To secure adequate money to enforce the compulsory school attendance law. It is estimated that at the present time there are in North Carolina about 90,000 children of school age who do not attend school.
2. To modernize our jails, making them at least fire proof and sanitary.
3. To expand our facilities for caring for feeble minded children, both white and colored.
4. To support the medical care program.
5. To provide a standard minimum wage and maximum hour law.
6. To provide increased pay for schoolteachers.

A FORTUNE UNCLAIMED

Some years ago a man died with-
out a will and left a large fortune.
His attorneys began searching for
a legal heir. At last it was discov-
ered that a man who lived in a city
less than a hundred miles away
was entitled to this large estate. He
was informed of his good fortune
but refused to believe it. The law-
yers called him by phone, and since
the man was away from home at
the time, they talked with his wife.
Her reply given in obviously irri-
tated tones was, "If anybody has
any money for us, let him send it
to us. We don't intend to let any-
body fool us."

That people should refuse to be-
lieve a piece of good news like this
seems utterly fantastic. One would
think that at least they would risk
a postage stamp or the cost of a
telephone call to inquire about it.
But the man and his wife seemed
to be sure that no good fortune
could befall them that they dis-
missed as extravagant any an-
nouncement that they were the re-
cipients of large funds.

We read in the New Testament a
great deal about good news, for
that is the meaning of the term
"gospel." God has assured man that
He has a great gift for him, name-
ly, His gift of salvation and joy.
But the whole thing seems so im-
probable to unregenerate man that
he concludes that the offer is a
hoax and that he will only make a
fool of himself if he shows any en-
thusiasm for the project. He is heir
to a fortune and refuses to believe
it.

WASHINGTON LETTER

SMALL TOWN GALS BEAT BIG TOWNERS IN VOTE CONTEST

Washington.—The Claremont,
Calif., League of Women Voters has
won a sweet bet from a sister or-
ganization in a town of the same
name in New Hampshire.

Last spring the New England
town began kidding the California
town about its smaller size and
lack of historical background.

The banter was confined to the
newspapers of the towns until Sep-
tember, when the league of Clare-
mont, Calif., challenged the league
of Claremont, N. H., to show its
superiority by getting out the lar-
gest percentage of registered voters
for the November election.

The challenge was accepted. The
wager was a crate of golden Califor-
nia oranges against a gallon of
genuine New England maple syrup.
Both leagues worked like mad.
Voting booths were set up, door-
to-door campaigns were staged to
arouse the voters. Interest was
fanned by local newspapers.

The day after election, Clare-
mont, N. H., wired its California
sister that 56.5 percent of its eligi-
ble voters had gone to the polls.
Elated Claremont, Calif., replied:
"We win; 72.7 percent of our vot-
ers really voted."

New Hampshire conceded and
offered to send a case of syrup
instead of one gallon.
Population of Claremont, N. H.,
is 12,144. Population of Claremont,
Calif., 3,067.

The National Housing Agency re-
ports that emergency housing pro-
jects for homeless veterans erected
in many parts of the country are
"living memorials" to men who died
in battle.

The projects are temporary
dwellings provided as part of the
Veterans Emergency Housing pro-
gram by colleges and cities in co-
operation with the Federal Public
Housing Authority. They are de-
voted to the needs of veterans.
Most of them are named for ser-
vicemen killed in action.

Typical of the projects named
for war dead is the Robert B. Todd
homes in New Orleans, La., named
for a local soldier whose bomber
was shot down over Germany.

In the capital, George Washing-
ton University named one of its
emergency dormitories, Draper Hall,

alumnus who died aboard a Japa-
nese transport on his way to a
prisoner of war camp.

Central Washington College of
Education at Ellensburg, Wash.,
named five temporary buildings
housing veterans for former stu-
dents.

Gladys Murphy Graham, of the
American Association of University
Women's national committee on in-
ternational relations, warns against
careless selection of public speakers
on important subjects.

"Take care to whom you listen,"
she advises in a brochure written
as a guide for AAUW leaders. Gen-
eral, eminent, she says, does not
make a speaker an authority on
any and all subjects in the inter-
national relations field.

In deploring the "current indis-
criminate reliance on the physical
sciences" as speakers on interna-
tional affairs, she points out that
from uranium 235 to the United
Nations vs. World Government, or
vice versa, is a long jump and not
nearly made it.

"Mrs. Graham also warns against
the uncritical acceptance of the
eye-witness story."

It is good, she says, to hear the
personal experience, but it should
not be confused with expert ap-
praisal.

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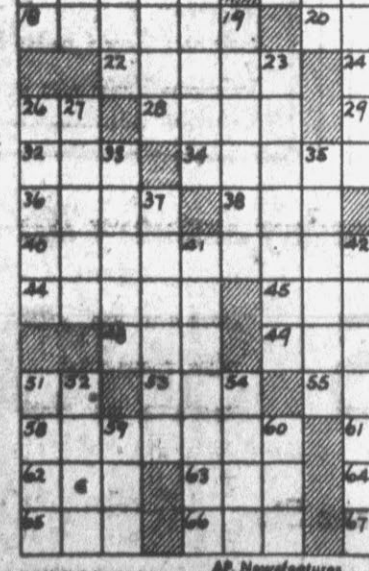

LEON CANNON HELD IN JAIL

Ayden Man Charged With Shotgun Murder Of His Wife

By CHESTER WALSH
Leon Earl Cannon, 44, of Ayden, remained in the Pitt County Jail here today without privilege of bond following an inquest Saturday night into the shotgun slaying of his wife, Mrs. Thelma Little Cannon, 46.

Coroner Griffin H. Rouse stated that the city hall at Ayden—scene of the inquest—was packed with spectators. Cannon was jailed Tuesday on charges of murder after the slaying of his wife at their home in Ayden. Officers quoted Cannon as saying that he went to his home about 1:30 p. m. and found Mrs. Cannon washing dishes. After obtaining a gun across the hall, he entered the kitchen, and said, "You asked for it and I'm going to let you have it."

Mrs. Cannon died instantly. The blast penetrated her left arm and entered her chest. A representative of Britt's Funeral Home, Ayden, testified at the inquest that "Cannon called and said that he'd killed his wife and asked us to come and get her. I summoned police."

Neighbors stated that Cannon had been drinking on the day of the shooting. County Jailor W. G. Leggett stated that "Cannon was not drunk when jailed, but appeared to be under the influence of something."

Carl Cannon, 14, is Cannon's only child. Another son, Leon, 22, was killed overseas in 1945.

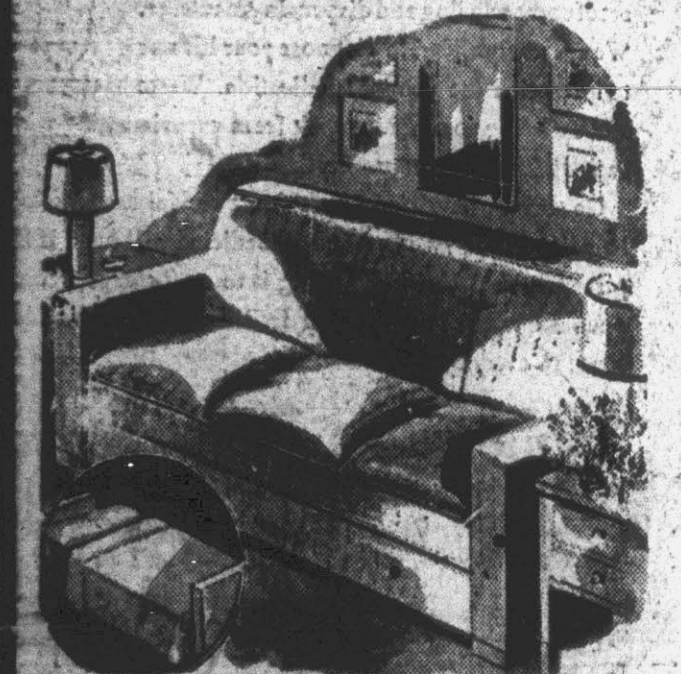

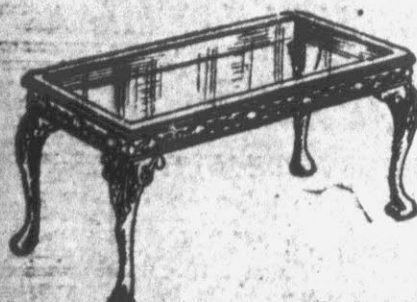

New York, Jan. 6—(AP)—Babe Ruth, baseball's 51-year-old retired sultan of swat, is in "serious" condition at French Hospital in the midtown area where he will undergo a "serious neck operation" this morning.

Word of the bumbino's decline was released in a terse bulletin from the hospital late last night. The bulletin read:

"Babe Ruth has been under treatment at French Hospital for the last six weeks. After a series of consultations in which six specialists participated, it was determined that a serious operation will be performed tomorrow (Monday) morning in the neck for the relief of intractable pain.

"The outlook is considered serious."

Although it had been known that Ruth had been confined to the hospital since Nov. 26 for "observation," there had been no intimation that his condition was serious.

Despite numerous trips to hospitals since he severed his last baseball connection as a coach for the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1938, the spindly-legged athlete has been active in golf and bowling circles.

can observers, and it is stated that Chile will launch an expedition of its own at the end of this month. Australia is said to be planning to dispatch an expedition to further her claim to some 2,500,000 square miles of territory. These four nations, however, are by no means the only ones interested. Besides them are Norway, Japan, Britain, Russia, France, Belgium and Germany.

Washington officials yesterday disclosed that the United States plans to claim a big share of the Antarctic continent, and the strategy for claiming it will be considered under Admiral Byrd's return. Edward E. Bonar, of the AP Washington Bureau, in recording this development said the American right is expected to be based largely on the claims in the northwest sector of the continent advanced by Lincoln W. Ellsworth and Admiral Byrd. They said the United States could justly claim at least 1,000,000 square miles and perhaps 800,000 square miles more, extending to the South Pole.

A suggestion that the whole issue of conflicting claims be turned over to the International Court or be placed under the jurisdiction of the United Nations has been advanced in several quarters, but has been considered only in a general way. Washington officials say the proposals will be taken up in conferences during the coming spring.

Aprons of this, Dean Acheson, U. S. Undersecretary of State, announced on December 27 that the United States was reserving all rights she might have in the Antarctic, although she had made no formal claim. It is noteworthy that Uncle Sam's present expedition to Antarctica comprises 4,000 men.

Austin To Bear Atomic Burdens

Washington, Jan. 6—(AP)—Warren R. Austin, American member of the United Nations Security Council, headed here today for top-level conferences on the atomic disarmament problems shovled at him by Bernard M. Baruch's surprise resignation.

Baruch stepped down as this government's atomic energy spokesman at UN headquarters with the two fold explanation to President Truman that: (1) Since the UN's special atomic commission had adopted the United States plan for world wide nuclear controls and (2) Since the whole issue now moves into the security council as part of the disarmament task, Austin should take over.

The weekend change touched off immediate speculation here about a possible softening of American tactics in negotiating with Russia on the whole atomic energy question.

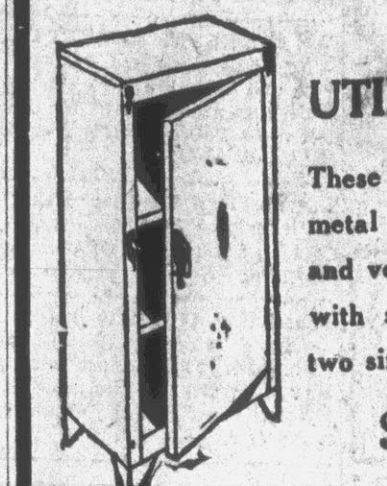

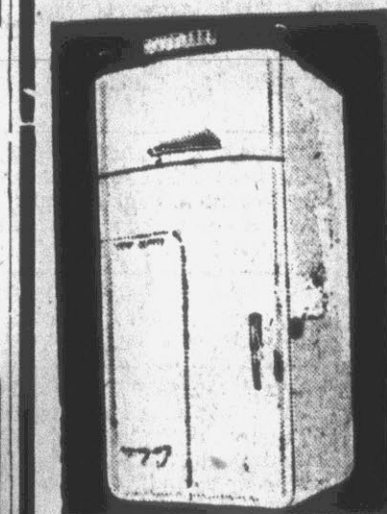
