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Assembly Given Proposal For Statewide Liquor Referendum

Raleigh, Feb. 12.—Senator Penn of Guilford introduced a bill today calling for a statewide referendum on the sale of wine and liquor.

The bill has the backing of the Allied Church League for the Abolition of beverage alcohol.

Contrary to some previous sessions which similar measures were introduced, only to be killed in the committee, the measure caused little excitement. It generally had been expected.

Only two weeks ago, Rep. Mull of Cleveland, a long time temperance leader and former speaker, said that a referendum bill would have little chance to pass this Legislature. He called on church workers to continue their fight against liquor, however. He made the statement at a meeting of the league's trustees assembled here to plan for a referendum bill.

Penny is from Greensboro, where are located the home offices of the wine industry in North Carolina.

referendum would be November 4.

Light wines made domestically would be exempt.

Beer is not mentioned in the bill. Heretofore, liquor referendum bills usually have been introduced in the House. The two-thirds, or gag, rule has been effectively applied there. The rule requires a two-thirds vote of the House to remove a bill from the unfavorable calendar. Those bills died in committee.

Penny's bill was sent to the finance committee, headed by Senator Gray of Forsyth.

He said after the bill's introduction it would limit wine to three per cent alcoholic content.

After more debate, the Senate passed on third reading and sent to the House a measure to set up a board of examiners for funeral directors of the state. The vote was 32 to 12.

Once again Senator Weathers of

Cleveland led the fight against the measure. He tried unsuccessfully to have the public represented on the board, saying the public has closer dealings with funeral directors than some of the other 21 boards in existence.

The board would be composed of five members recommended by the directors association and appointed by the governor.

The Mecklenburg delegation sent up bills to allow the return to the lawful owner of a stolen weapon that is confiscated because of concealment, and to remove the present limit of five children in any one family who are given free tuition at state supported institutions because their father is a disabled war veteran.

The General Assembly yesterday was given what promises to be another controversial issue in a minimum wage-maximum hour bill which was sponsored by Sens. Allsbrook of Halifax, D. L. War of Craven, Frank Parker of Buncombe, L. H. Wallace of Johnston and Lorimer Midgett of Patuxent.

This bill would provide minimum wages of 40 cents an hour and a 40-hour work week within six days. Overtime work would bring time and one-half wages.

Meanwhile, the municipalities of the state were given a sharp setback in the House following a lengthy debate which resulted in voting down by 57-47, a proposal which would have refunded the state's gasoline tax on fuel purchased and used by the municipalities.

Freight Rate Hearing In City Are Concluded

Final Two-Hour Session Today Ends Arguments Over Protests Growing Out Of Cancellation Of Freight Rates

Examiner Charles B. Gray of the Interstate Commerce Commission yesterday heard arguments at a hearing here into the protests that grew out of the proposed cancellation by the ICC of the freight rates, published in 1931, which would affect shippers of Eastern North Carolina.

The hearing opened in the municipal building yesterday morning at 9:30 and lasted until 3:30 yesterday afternoon. A two-hour session today would end the proceedings.

O. W. South, Jr., assistant general freight agent of the Norfolk Southern Railway Company of Norfolk, Va., stated that the cancellation of the original docket would only affect that section of Eastern Carolina from the Virginia line near Norfolk through Elizabeth City, Washington, New Bern, Morehead City and Beaufort.

South also told Examiner Gray that the original action of 1931 was established to meet unregulated water and truck competition, and that the cancellation would have little effect on towns included in the area.

The railroad official was supported in his contentions by T. B. Alfriend, State traffic manager of the Baltimore Steam Packet Company.

Witnesses for the Carolinas Shippers, Inc., and supporting communities, offered testimony that the distributing business in this section of the state was built up primarily on the base of rates that became effective in 1931, giving this area favorable rates to compete with distributors of other sections who had been serving the territory.

It was explained by the group protesting the cancellation that the loss of the 1931 rates would result in action by other carriers, which would be distributors to the whole territory.

ARMY REVEALS M-DAY PLANS

Propose Reduction In Regular Army; Big Trained Reserve

Washington, Feb. 12.—(AP)—War Department plans for a reduction of almost 200,000 in the size of the Regular Army and establishment of an "M-Day" force of 1,750,000 trained troops were disclosed today by members of the House Armed Services Committee.

The plan depends on a universal training program to build up the National Guard and the organized reserves, committee members said, so that within one year from "M-Day" the force could be expanded to 5,500,000 men.

Just how quickly the reduction in the Regular Army will be effected, they said, depends largely on international developments. But they pointed out that President Truman's budget message to Congress contemplates maintaining a standing army of 1,070,000 during the year beginning July 1.

The entire Mobilization-Day set-up, committee members said, is based on a three-point legislative program including universal training, merger of the armed forces, and coordinated scientific research and development.

Details were divulged following a meeting at the Pentagon yesterday attended by most members of the committee, Secretary of War Patterson, General Dwight D. Eisenhower, and other top Army officials.

Church And State

Their Separation A Cornerstone Of Our Constitution; Significance Of Recent Supreme Court Decision; Possible Results; A Little Background

Washington, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Separation of the government from the church, any church, was involved in an important Supreme Court decision this week.

That separation is one of the cornerstones of the republic and it means simply this:

The government can't interfere in any way with a man's religious belief or lack of it. And it can't support, with public funds, any man's church or the schools of his religious faith.

That principle is written into the constitution. But New Jersey has a law which says public funds can be used to pay the bus fare of children going to parochial schools.

Is that contrary to the constitution? The Supreme Court said "No." Justice Black, who wrote the opinion, said paying the bus fare to get the children to school is in the public welfare.

Some people may see in this opinion in eventual danger to the whole principle of separation of government and church. This is not necessarily so.

The court opinion was on a New Jersey law only. If some time it considers a similar law from another

Georgia Court Says Talmadge Governor

Superior Judge Says Legislature Within Constitutional Rights; Thompson To File Appeal With Georgia High Court

McDonough, Ga., Feb. 12.—(AP)—Superior Judge Walter Hendrix ruled today that Herman Talmadge is the legal governor of Georgia.

In a 2,000 word decision Judge Hendrix said the legislature was within its constitutional rights when it elected Talmadge Jan. 15 to the four-year term of the late Eugene Talmadge, his father.

The court sustained denunciations of Herman Talmadge and dismissed a suit of Lieut. Gov. M. E. Thompson which had asked a declaratory judgment ousting Talmadge from the governorship.

The judge said "it is clear that the General Assembly has the right to decide when there was no election by the people. It did decide that on account of the death of the governor-elect there had been no election by the people. In my opinion the constitution then put the duty and responsibility on it to elect and install a governor. This duty and responsibility it decided as it saw fit. When it (the legislature) acts within its authority, courts cannot interfere.

Judge Hendrix's decision, rendered before about 200 spectators in Henry County's rural courtroom, was in direct opposition to the finding of another superior (circuit) judge last Friday at Rome, Ga. There, Judge Claude Porter took a conflicting view that the legislature had unquestionably exceeded its authority, and ruled Talmadge's election was invalid.

Counsel for Thompson said Judge Hendrix's decision would be appealed "at once" to the Georgia Supreme Court.

Bequests To Educational And Charitable Institutions

Shelby, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Specific bequests of \$587,000 to North Carolina educational and charitable institutions and to personal friends and relatives were made in the will of O. Max Gardner filed today for probate in Cleveland county.

The remainder of the estate goes to the widow and three children of the ambassador to Great Britain and former North Carolina governor who died in New York last Thursday a few hours before he was to sail for London.

The Wachovia Bank and Trust Company of Charlotte was named executor with broad discretionary powers including power to convert property to cash. An executor's statement by Everett A. Houser, Jr., did not estimate the full value of the estate, but it is thought to run into seven figures.

The sum of \$25,000 was given to the Consolidated University of North Carolina as a perpetual trust with the annual income to go to that member of the faculty "who has made the greatest contribution to the welfare of humanity during the year preceding." All teachers, whatever their rank, are made eligible.

State College, the University and the Woman's College were consolidated into the Greater University in 1931 while Gardner was governor.

The will said "I am convinced that if I have rendered any public service worthy to be remembered it was in causing enactment of the statute consolidating the Greater University of North Carolina.

Judge Goodman, from the bench declared it was the most unusual embezzlement case in his experience.

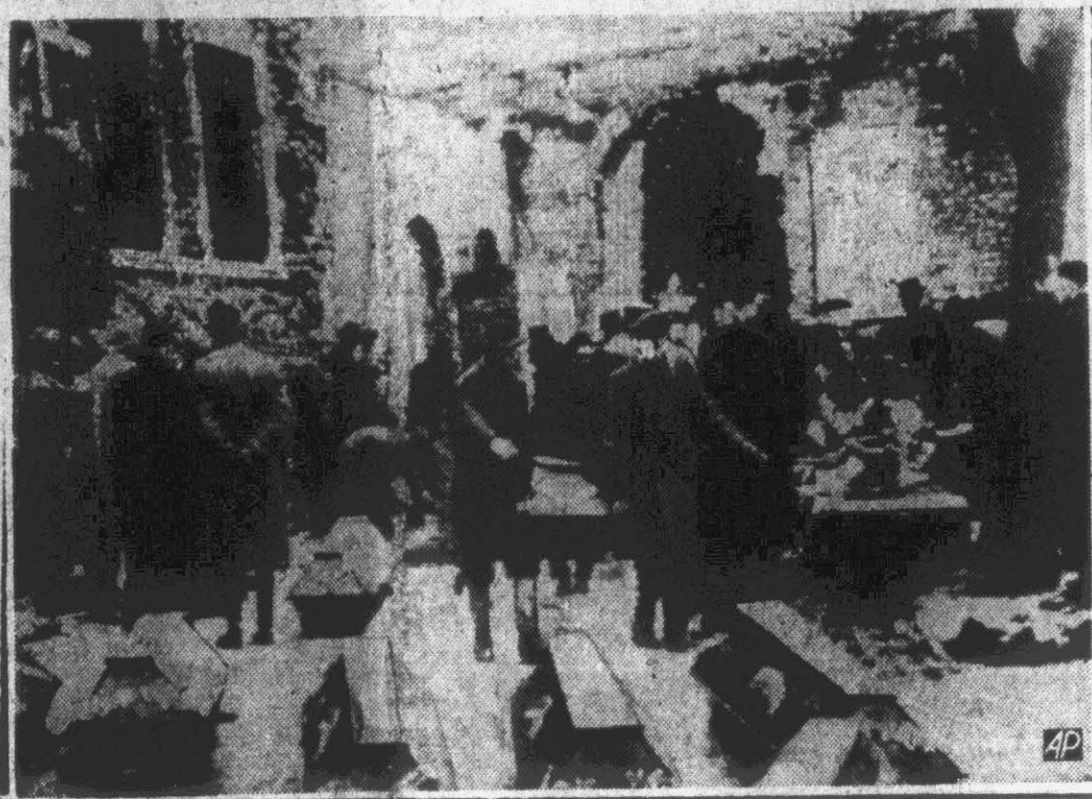
He said Mrs. Volkens confessed before her perjuries were discovered but that she was so trusted it took her a week to convince Bank of California officials she was telling the truth.

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"Charlie Chan" Dies After Long Illness

Hollywood, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Sidney Toler, veteran stage and screen actor best known in recent years for his characterization of "Charlie Chan, the Chinese detective, died today at his home. He had been bedridden by intestinal cancer for seven months.

His widow said he was 59. He gave his age as 53, however, when they were married three years ago, and a theatrical biography puts his birth date as 1874, which would make him 72.

House Committees On Agriculture Education And Public Welfare Busy

Raleigh, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Without comment, the House education committee voted unanimously unfavorable today on a bill by Rep. Dellinger of Gaston which would have declared the truth and authenticity of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence.

The measure would have legally fixed the declaration on May 20, 1775, and required the teaching of textbooks supporting the argument that the declaration actually was signed in Mecklenburg on that day. Teachers in their class rooms could not doubt its authenticity.

On motion of Rep. Umstead of Orange, a subcommittee was given bills specifying that no person under 21 years of age could drive a school bus and pay for those drivers would be \$60 a month.

The joint agriculture committee unanimously accepted a subcommittee report asking that appropriations of the State Agriculture Department be increased \$501,000 over the advisory budget commission's recommendations for the next biennium. Included would be funds for a tobacco research program at the state's test farms and costing \$52,650 for the next biennium.

The agriculture group voted favorably on a measure by Rep. Edwards of Greene to revise the weights and measure law.

A subcommittee composed of Reps. Bost of Cabarrus, Allen of Wake, Fields of Avery, Hancock of Granville and Umstead of Orange was given bills to provide free tuition to State College and the University to students who agree to teach in public schools. The measures are designed to help relieve the teacher shortage.

The House public welfare committee voted favorable on four Senate bills—to allow per diem pay for members of county boards of public welfare; to increase the maximum old age assistance from \$40 to \$45; to amend the sterilization laws to allow guardians to give permission for the operation; and providing for the appointment of probation officers under county welfare departments.

Last Recourse

London, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin announced today Britain probably would take the Palestine problem to the United Nations if Arabs and Jews failed to agree among themselves or accept Britain's latest plan for the troubled Holy Land.

Bevin made the announcement at a resumed session of the Anglo-Arab Palestine conference.

The foreign secretary urged the Arabs to meet with the Jews and commented that he did not believe it was "beyond the wit of man" to find a solution to the Palestine problem.

WANT ANSWER ON ARMAMENTS

Russian Asked Point-Blank For Soviet Atom Control Plan

Lake Success, N. Y., Feb. 12.—(AP)—Sir Alexander Cadogan, British delegate, asked Andrei A. Gromyko point-blank today whether Russia believed the question of atomic control should come within the scope of a proposed commission on arms limitation.

Cadogan, siding with the U.S. contention that a resolution framing the arms commission must clearly state that it would not encroach on the existing atomic commission, asked Gromyko for an answer.

Great Britain, France and Colombia lined up this morning with the United States in favor of a clear definition of the scope of the arms commission. Russia has remonstrated in its position that it is not necessary to make a specific statement in the resolution creating the arms body.

Warren R. Austin, U.S. representative on the U.N. Security Council, intimated yesterday that he believed Russian opposition to an American proposal to prohibit invasion of the atomic energy field by an arms commission was motivated at least in part by such an intent.

In a reply to the U.S. delegate, Andrei A. Gromyko, the Russian representative, failed to give a definite answer to Austin's challenge.

After a four-hour session yesterday the United States and Russia still were deadlocked on the U. N. program for worldwide arms limitation.

Neither offered to budge from their previous stands.

Dad Sadly Signs Warrant For Son

Detroit, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Horace Kendrick, 24, held by police on an armed robbery warrant signed by his father, today awaited trial with the older man's parting words still ringing in his ears.

"I'm sorry, son," 53-year-old Ira Kendrick had said just before officially accusing his son of participating in a \$480 theft from the family home. "I've done everything I could for you all your life, and now it's too late."

The complaint charges that the younger Kendrick led two gunmen into the family living room Dec. 18 and waited while they collected the father's life savings. Police said the son had a record of six arrests since 1939.

Brought together in the police station, both men wept as Horace begged his father not to sign the complaint and promised to "make it up to you."

But the elder Kendrick only set down his signature and walked slowly from the room.

How Hess Gems Got Into Country

Washington, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Mrs. Martha Evans told a military court in the Hesse gem theft case today that the baubles she carried from London to the United States for Col. Jack W. Durant looked to her like "nothing but cheap, ordinary junky jewelry."

The 22-year-old brunette is a former secretary to Durant, an Air Force officer who is charged with complicity in the theft of \$1,500,000 in jewelry and other Hesse family heirlooms from a German castle.

She testified yesterday that Durant gave her some jewelry in London and asked her to take it to the United States for him. At that time, she was a State Department stenographer, working for United Nations delegates, and she said she brought the jewelry into this country under diplomatic immunity from customs search.

Steel Co. Attacks Nat'l Labor Board

SENATOR SEES VICTORY OVER ATOM NOMINEE

One-Man Drive Against Lillenthal Gets Allies; Predicts His Defeat

Washington, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Senator K. D. McKellar (D-Tenn.) claimed victory today in his fight to block David E. Lillenthal's confirmation as chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission.

"I feel that the Senate will never confirm him," the 78-year-old lawmaker told reporters.

"I don't see how anybody can read the record of these hearings and vote for this man for this most important post."

McKellar, who fought Lillenthal throughout his long career as chairman of the Tennessee Valley Authority, started what first appeared to be a futile one-man drive against Lillenthal's nomination to the atomic post. But the Tennessee Democrat picked up formidable allies from the Republican side of the Senate in the past two days.

These include Chairman Bridges (NH), of the Appropriations Committee, Senator Wherry (Nebr.), the Republican whip, and—according to his associates—Senator Taft (Ohio), chairman of the Republican Policy Committee. Taft has

Charge Laid Before Senate Labor Committee; Mine Owners Claim New Coal Strike Is Inevitable; "Hostile Attitude" Of Labor Board Cited

Washington, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Earl F. Reed, attorney for the Wierston Steel Company, today accused the National Labor Relations Board of trying "in every way to wipe out" an independent union at the firm's West Virginia plant.

Reed laid this charge before the Senate Labor Committee as Forney Johnston, counsel for the National Coal Association, waited to testify on his contention that a new mine strike is inevitable July 1, unless one of two things happens.

Either John L. Lewis must give up his five cents a ton royalty for a union health and welfare fund, Johnston said, or Congress must enact a law forbidding strikes over such issues.

July 1 is the date the government must return the seized pits to private ownership.

In contending the NLRB is out to break the Wierston independent union, Reed declared that the board installed its own representatives "in the CIO union headquarters to coach organizers as to the methods they should use to get on the (Wierston) payroll."

He further asserted: "Board representatives attended secret conferences at which CIO leaders paid bribes to officers of the independent union to induce them to betray it by going over to the CIO."

Declaring that "from its very inception" the NLRB has taken "a hostile attitude" toward independent unions, Reed said the board has refused to hold an election at Wierston. He added that a vote would show the union represents about 90 per cent of the workers under contracts "which are generally better than any existing in the steel industry."

Reed urged a revision of the Wagner Labor Relations Act to assure NLRB recognition of independent unions and to "rehabilitate the faith of the working man in our system of law and justice."

He also recommended that the act be changed so employers could fire workers who strike for more than 90 days as a test of economic strength in a demand for higher wages or shorter hours or better working conditions.

This is less drastic than a provision of a bill introduced by Senator Ball (R-Minn.) That a measure would authorize employers to fire strikers immediately if they turned down "back to work" offer.

Coal Supplies Dwindling; Government Decreed Power Ban May Be Extended; Fuel Tied Up By Heavy Snow Fall

London, Feb. 12.—(AP)—The Ministry of Fuel and Power announced today that domestic electricity restrictions would be extended throughout the country tomorrow.

London, Feb. 12.—(AP)—New blizzards and freezing gales thickened an icy grip on Britain's dwindling coal supplies today, threatening to force extension of a government-decreed power ban over all of England and Wales and most of Scotland.

While Prime Minister Attlee summoned his cabinet to consider official reports that the drastic power shutdown affecting more than half of England's factories had failed thus far to help in building up coal stockpiles at electric generating plants, these were the principal developments in the desperate industrial crisis:

1. The fuel ministry officially ordered power firms outside the 38-county "blackout" area last night that power restrictions may have to be extended to the whole country, except the north of Scotland.

Krug To Confer With MacArthur

Washington, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Secretary of the Interior J. A. Krug announced today he will fly to Tokyo to confer with Gen. Douglas MacArthur on United States responsibilities in Pacific Islands.

Krug will visit Samoa, Guam and Okinawa on the way to Japan. He will leave next Tuesday in Army Transport Command plane.

Krug will be accompanied by Army and Navy officers and by several Interior Department executives, including H. Rex Lee, assistant director of the Division of Territories and Island Possessions, Assistant Secretary C. Girard Davidson, and Carlton Skinner, director of information.

No Bargains Offered

U.S. Delegate To Security Council Makes It Plain We Will Not Give Up Atomic Secrets Without Safety Measures; May Mean No Disarmament

Warren Austin, United States representative on the Security Council, has made it plain that this country has no intention of bargaining away its atomic secrets without the ultimate in safety agreements, disarmament or no disarmament.

His latest statement to the council, coupled with earlier factors pointing in the same direction makes it appear that disarmament is a dead issue for the time being, regardless of how much more talk may be expended in an effort to keep it alive.

The Russians have demanded establishment of a disarmament commission with full powers to investigate all armed forces and armaments.

The United States is adamant will not permit this with regard to atomic weapons until air-tight controls have been established, including provisions for unrestricted international inspection and punishment of violators. The U.S. wants the Atomic Control Commission to operate entirely independently, and to be specifically exempted from interference by the disarmament commission.

This factor alone would seem to indicate that, barring an unforeseen concession by the Russians, disarmament must wait until the Baruch plan has been adopted, something which seems no nearer of accomplishment now than when it was first broached months ago.

In addition, there is what amounts to a general understanding at Lake Success that nothing concrete will come of disarmament discussions until the United Nations is able to guarantee protection of any or all members with its own police force.

Organization of the police force seems to depend, completely aside from the solution of numerous problems which will prove extremely difficult, on what sort of peace with Germany, Austria and Japan is finally suitably for enforcement. The military staff committee will have to know, also, whether the force is to be used to halt the spread of flames from such events as the Spanish civil war. This involves a decision on the amount of interference in internal affairs which the U.S. may attempt, if any. The Russians are demanding that no such interference shall be a cardinal principle.

What we love most about America is the opportunity it gives us to be our best. The career of Abraham Lincoln is the classical demonstration of what can happen, the combination of intelligence, diligence, character, and circumstances being favorable.

The American is often accused of entertaining superficial ideals of success. Abraham Lincoln represents the highest ideal of American success.

WASHINGTON LETTER

RECORD CAMPAIGN PLANNED TO CUT TRAFFIC DEATHS

By JANE EADS

Washington—The biggest highway safety drive in the nation's history is being planned for this year.

Authorities are mapping a far-reaching program, hoping to reduce still further the percentage of traffic fatalities. Last year fatalities reached a new low in view of the record 333,000,000 motor miles traveled.

The Automotive Safety Foundation reports that fatalities were reduced by more than 20 percent in 1946, though the "accident experience curve" normally closely follows the mileage curve.

Strategy for the campaign, which will enlist public support for attacking the problem on all levels, was worked out last May by the President's highway safety conference.

Follow-up conferences to "integrate and intensify" state safety programs, have been held by 22 states. Ten other states have similar meetings scheduled for early this year.

In addition, the safety foundation believes the regular sessions of 44 state legislatures in 1947 will develop a "considerable volume of legislation" designed to bring state traffic laws up to the standards set by the uniform vehicle code.

Three groups are responsible for the coordination—on a federal level—of America's new highway safety plan.

They are the Federal Committee for Highway Safety, the State Officials Committee and the National Committee for Traffic Safety. Members represent all phases of national life from youth groups up through federal agencies.

The three groups will convene in a few weeks with Maj. Gen. Philip B. Fleming, chairman of the President's conference, to set up policies and procedures for coordinated action.

and state were not separate. Many came to escape laws which compelled them to support and attend government-favored churches.

But the National Education Association notes:

"Strangely enough, in seeking religious freedom for themselves, the settlers in several colonies did not wish to extend it to those with differing religious beliefs.

"There developed within these colonies a union of church and state that made for intolerance and provincialism. Church and state were united or inter-related to some degree in most of the American colonies.

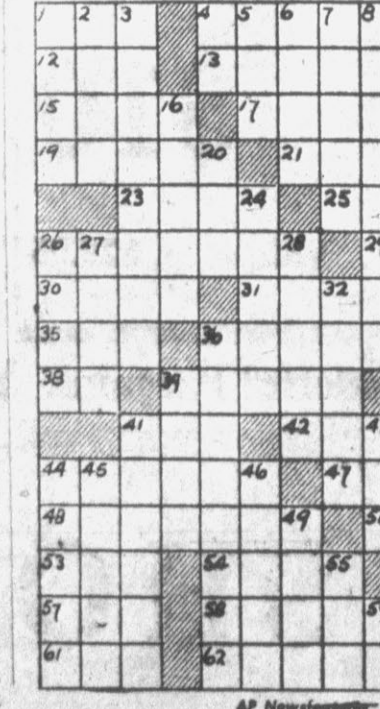
"Officially established churches were recognized in many of the original thirteen states, and practically all provided some religious test as a qualification for holding public office."

As the years passed, thinking men in this country realized the need for separating the government from the church, any church, so that:

All men could have religious freedom and no church could benefit by the help of the government.

Homicide Capt. Jack Donahoe said that such clues as have been discovered do not point to French as the slayer. Footprints in the earth where the body was discovered and on the woman's flesh do not correspond to the shoes French was wearing, or with those found in his quarters, Donahoe declared.

And French's landlady reported that he did not leave his room after midnight Sunday. As late as 10:30 p. m. Sunday Mrs. French, unaccompanied, was reported seen by Earl Holmes, bartender in a local tavern. Det. Lieut. Gene Bechtel said French told him that Mrs. French came to his room Sunday night, abused him verbally, struck him in the face with her handbag and departed about 11:50 p. m.

Attorney John T. Money of Washington, D. C., is legal representative for the shippers.

The shippers alleged that cancellation of the 1931 rates would result in a \$20,000 monthly increase in freight rates. In addition to the shippers, supporting the protest are Elizabeth City, Edenton, Farmville, Greenville, Kinston, New Bern, Morehead City, Beaufort, Tarboro, Bethel and Ayden.

Attending the hearing were H. V. C. Wade, State Park Authority of Virginia; H. J. Wagner of the Norfolk Port Traffic Commission; L. G. Hogshire of Norfolk, Va., president of the Norfolk, Baltimore and Carolina Line, and H. M. Nicholson, Raleigh, director of traffic, North Carolina Utilities Commission.

On November 29, 1946, the Carolina Shippers Association, Inc., protested the publication of the new rates scheduled to become effective on December 12, 1946, and petitioned the Interstate Commerce Commission to suspend the new rates pending a protest by the ICC.

The action which headed for a decision today was docketed by the ICC as Investigation and Suspension Docket No. 5448. It was instituted by the Norfolk Southern Railway Company in the fall of 1946 to cancel the reduced rates, which became effective March 23, 1931.

New rates published to become effective on December 12, 1946 found the Norfolk Southern Railway Company supported in the application by the Norfolk, Baltimore and Carolina Line, of which L. G. Hogshire of Norfolk, Va., is president. The line has been operating water transportation service from Virginia and Maryland water points through inland waterways into Eastern North Carolina.

Original reduction of rates was instituted in an action on December 19, 1930, by the Norfolk Southern Railroad Company and the Pennsylvania and Norfolk Steamship Company before the Interstate Commerce Commission. The action asked the reduction of water and rail rates on several hundred commodities in carload lots, and less than carload lots, from Eastern North Carolina to northern points.

gales immobilized millions of tons of coal loaded on 75,000 railroad cars and 125 ships. Snow drifts isolated dozens of villages in the Midlands and Northern England and the Royal Air Force planned to drop 10 tons of food today in the Staffordshire area.

The government ordered out troops to clear snow-blocked highways and railroads. The Navy was reported considering the use of radar-equipped patrol boats to escort coal ships down the foggy coast and ordering submarines into the Thames to pipe electricity from their powerful generators into London's power lines.

Public cooperation in observing a five-hour ban each day on the use of electricity in homes was reported "not so good as on Monday." The fuel ministry said Tuesday's consumption of electricity was nearly 500,000 watts higher than Monday.

The cabinet, deliberating the possibility of extending the power cut which already has brought unemployment to an estimated 4,000,000 Britons, was faced with an Air Ministry forecast that no relief from icy weather and snow is in sight "for several days."

his position, but his friends say he has told them he will be against Lillenthal.

Taft's reported stand may prove a determining factor with many Republicans who take their cues from him on questions of domestic policy.

On the other hand, Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.), who is chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee as well as a member of the Atomic Committee weighing Lillenthal's nomination, has given no indication that he will oppose the nominee. To the contrary, most of Vandenberg's questioning during the extended hearings could be regarded as sympathetic to Lillenthal.

Wherry insisted to reporters that the Lillenthal confirmation is not a party issue, and a Democratic strategist said privately he did not see how the Republicans could afford to let it become one.

The Senate committee also heard Rep. Francis Case (R-SD), who is the author of a revised and expanded version of the Case bill President Truman vetoed last year. The new measure, which Case explained, would authorize the government to block serious strikes by court injunction, overhaul the Wagner act

and impose a number of restrictions on labor unions.

Case declared that the emphasis is any new labor legislation must be on the peaceful settlement of disputes by the parties themselves.

COLLEGE MAN WAS SPEAKER

Dr. A. D. Frank Delivers Address At Pitt Bar Meeting

Dr. A. D. Frank, head of the department of history at East Carolina Teachers' College, was guest speaker last night at the Pitt County Bar Association's monthly supper meeting at the Airport Inn. Marvin K. Blount, the president, presided.

Dr. Frank discussed limiting the president of the United States to two terms and said he favors a six-year term. He pointed out that the number of terms a president may serve has always been a controversial subject—that Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln, Woodrow Wilson and other presidents had expressed pronounced opinions on the subject. The speaker enumerated some of the dangers of a third

term in the White House. Dr. Frank outlined some of the defects of the present calendar system and reminded that there is a bill to improve the calendar before Congress. The new plan would divide the year into four quarters, each quarter ending on a Saturday. The speaker drew a ripple of comments and smiles when he said that when the calendar was changed many years ago, George Washington's birthday was changed from February 11 to February 22. In concluding his informative after-dinner speech, Dr. Frank said he believes the United Nations will be a success if generally supported.

Routine business transacted at the meeting last night included a suggestion to amend the adoption laws and a recommendation that North Carolina adopt the international log rule over the old methanol log rule. A bill concerning this has been introduced in the General Assembly, it is understood.

W. W. (Bill) Speight, formerly in Attorney General Harry McMillan's office in Raleigh, now associated with J. B. James in the practice of law in Greenville, was elected a member of the association.

It was reported previously that the ship was in Marseilles harbor, where port authorities were said to have refused her permission to sail on the grounds that she was not equipped with adequate safety devices. The reports said she was later authorized to sail and made her way to Algiers where she was said to have weighed anchor Sunday.

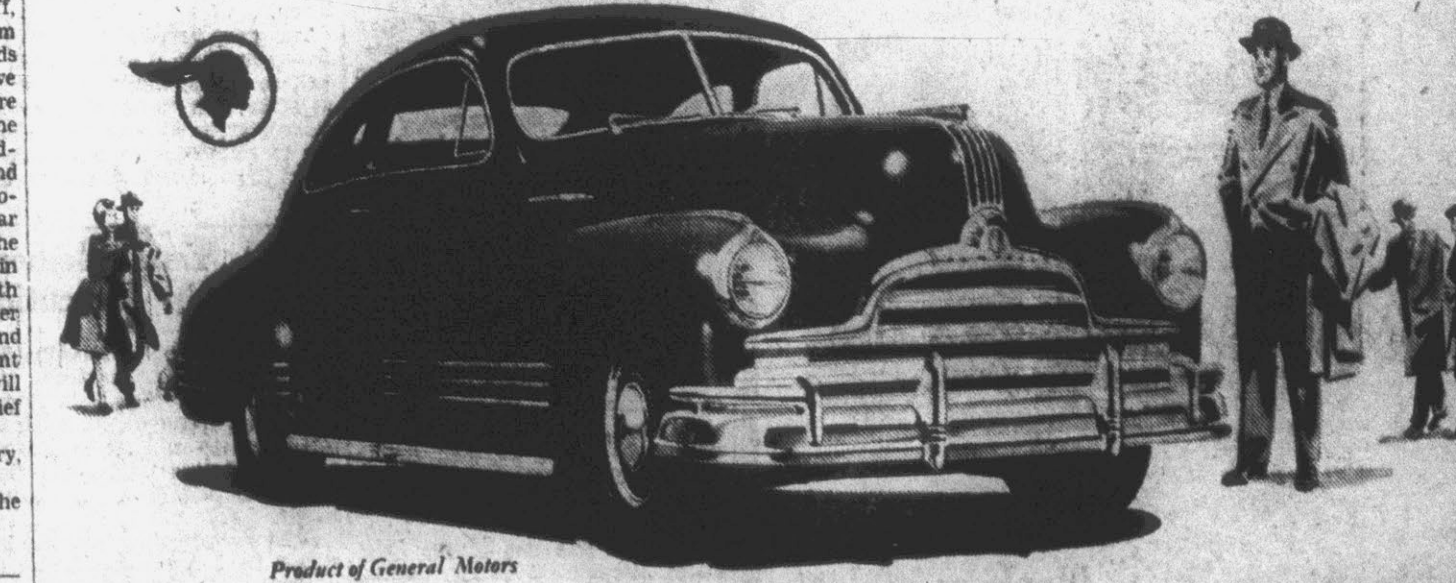

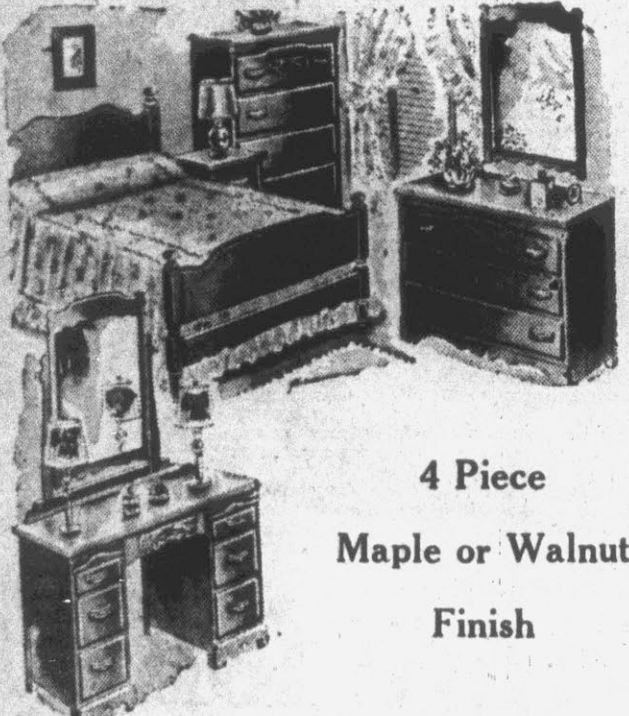

In a report requested by Chairman Gurney (R-Sd) of the senate armed services committee, the navy department said it would have to take "drastic steps" to cut back its fleet if any large reduction is made in President Truman's budget.

Urge Fight Against N.C. Labor Measure

Charlotte, Feb. 12—(AP)—The National Executive Board of the American Federation of Hosiery Workers, CIO, has urged union members to work actively for the defeat of pending anti-labor legislation.

The group issued a statement yesterday in which it declared that the welfare of the American worker is at stake with "a blind vengeance-seeking group in congress attempting to stampede the legislature to adopt laws shackling the working man."

Legal Entanglement Holds Up Execution

Jerusalem, Feb. 12—(AP)—The government announced today that the execution of Dov Bela Bruner, condemned terrorist, was being delayed because of legal complexities which authorities said might "take months or possibly a year" to untangle.

Gruner's impending execution had stirred the underground Jewish organization of which he was a member, Irgun Zvai Leumi, to vow reprisals, and had hung threateningly for weeks over the troubled Holy Land while he lived on the basis of a day-to-day reprieve.

Same Birthday, But No Real Connection

Scranton, Pa., Feb. 12—(AP)—Pennsylvania's anthracite mines are idle today in honor of Abraham Lincoln's birthday.

Today, too, is the 67th birthday of President John L. Lewis of the AFL-United Mine Workers union.

But, Lewis says, the men are staying away from the pits because it's Lincoln's anniversary—not his.
