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## MOUNTING IRE OVER SLIGHTS IN DIPLOMACY

### Congressional Impatience With USSR Displayed In Senator's Talk

Washington—(AP)—A blunt assertion by Senator Vandenberg that it would be a "dangerous misconception" for Russia to underestimate this country's rank among world powers gave a clear sign today of mounting congressional impatience with Soviet diplomacy.

The Michigan Republican, chairman of the powerful Foreign Relations Committee and president pro tem of the Senate, declared in unvarnished language that Russia does not seem to share "our anxiety to establish mutual fair play and good will."

He said the Soviet Union (1) "completely ignored" four American requests in the past year to discuss settlement of lend-lease accounts and (2) paid no attention to a State Department not suggesting negotiations for final disposition of 125 lend-leased U. S. merchant ships.

Termining these "just a couple of symbolic incidents" in U. S.-Russian relations, Vandenberg last night told guests at a dinner for the Michigan congressional delegation: "I respectfully suggest that such experiences are not calculated to fertilize mutual good will and understanding."

He said it would be neither unfriendly nor undignified for this country to "insist upon somewhat prompt official mail from Moscow."

"After all," Vandenberg went on, "Washington is not an inconsequential way station on an unimportant road. If we allow others to think it is, they may get the habit; and that could be a dangerous misconception for them as well as us."

There was no indication whether the Michigan senator's address had been known beforehand to the State Department.

However, Vandenberg and Senator Connally of Texas, the ranking Democrat on the Foreign Relations Committee, symbolize the Administration's bi-partisan foreign policy as congressional counselors to the Secretary of State.

They performed this function for James P. Byrnes and were asked by his successor, George C. Marshall, to continue the role with him.

Pleading the pressure of Senate business, Vandenberg and Connally declined an invitation by Marshall to attend the opening session of the Moscow big four Foreign Ministers Conference March 10.

## Season For Change

Congressmen Proposing Many Changes In The U. S. Constitution; Past Month Especially Active; Procedure; Some Of The Proposals; Bit Of History

Washington—(AP)—This is a red hot season in Congress for changing the constitution. But changing it is no cinch.

At least 35 members of the House and about six senators have proposed changes of one kind or another in the past month. Only one has been acted upon, and it probably will be the only one this year, judging from past performances.

Since 1789 there have been only 11 amendments to the constitution although 26 were proposed to the states by Congress.

Of all the proposals made this year, only one has been acted upon: To limit the president to two terms.

The House approved. But before it can become part of the constitution, two thirds of the Senate and 36 of the 48 states must also approve.

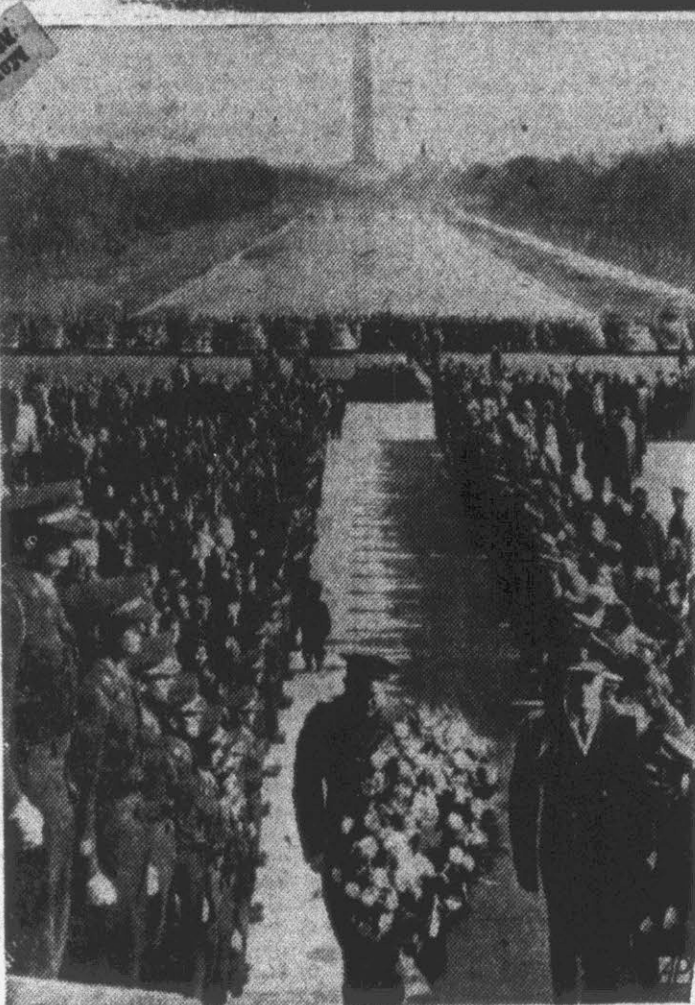
Some of the other proposals were for:

Equal rights for women, a 25 percent limit on all income taxes, four-year term for members of the House and abolishing the poll tax.

Here's some history to show why it's hard to change the constitution:

After the revolutionary war the republic was in danger of falling apart because the states were so loosely held together.

## NAM Plan Given In Labor Hearing

### Industrial Peace Program Outlined For Congress; Would Prohibit "Unjustified" Strikes, Closed Shops, Industry-Wide Bargaining And Secondary Boycotts

Washington—(AP)—The national association of manufacturers today said that Congress can help assure an era of unprecedented industrial peace if it:

1. Prohibits industry-wide bargaining, closed shops, secondary boycotts, unjustified strikes, and removes what the NAM called other external interferences to good labor relations.
2. Gives collective bargaining by individual plants or companies an opportunity to prove that it can function effectively.

The program was outlined to the Senate labor committee by Ira Mosher, chairman of the NAM's executive committee. He said:

"The real danger which the nation faces in its first serious efforts to establish a sound and equitable national labor policy will be a reluctance on the part of Congress to grapple with the vital issues involved, or in yielding to those who urge further study and investigation of the whole problem, or who are in the current developments on the nation's labor front (the waning number of strikes) a reason for doing nothing at all."

## SEN. UMSTEAD WAS SPEAKER

### Legion "Ladies Night" Banquet Brilliant Affair

The American Legion's annual "ladies night" banquet and dance at the armory last night was a brilliant affair. June H. Rose, a past state commander, was master of ceremonies.

United States Senator W. B. Umstead of Durham, a legionnaire of World War I, was guest speaker. Sgt. Amos Hudson, wearer of the Purple Heart in World War II, introduced him.

Senator Umstead recalled that he came to Greenville with a girls basketball team 30 years ago and that he acted as referee. He said he was glad to come back in the First Congressional District and paid tribute to Lindsay C. Warren and Congressman Herbert C. Bonner.

The senator said that "during World War II the majority of the people of North Carolina developed a cohesion of effort of combined cooperative patriotism never excelled on the face of the earth to back up the service men and women in their objective to emancipate mankind."

He said peacetime problems are as hard to solve as are battles to be won.

Senator Umstead saw hope in the fact that 50-odd nations gathered in San Francisco nearly two years ago and agreed on a basic charter for world peace. He said America should lead the way in the quest for lasting peace, and declared that there is no substitute for religious faith, spiritual values and rugged honesty or honest toil. The common good of the people of all nations is paramount in planning for peace, he asserted. The junior senator paid tribute to the American Legion for its great part in helping to solve peacetime problems.

The speaker wished for the American Legion post every possible success in carrying on the program of the great organization following World War II comparable with its marvelous achievements following the first World War.

Congressman Bonner spoke briefly and paid tribute to Senator Umstead and the people of Pitt County. Chairman Rose recognized numerous guests, including Lt. Col. John T. L. D. Gabert, representing General Cushman of the Cherry Point Marine Base; Mrs. Herbert C. Bonner; Mrs. James R. ## JUNGLE ISLAND STILL HIDEOUT FOR JAPANESE

### AAF Searching For Garrison Of Stragglers In Philippine Outpost

Palawan, P. M.—(AP)—A war crimes investigator and a group of observers aboard a 13th Air Force Mitchell search plane today cruised over desolate jungles of the west coast of Palawan in search of a reputed garrison of 200 Japanese stragglers hiding out in this forsaken outpost of the Philippines.

We were on a needle in the haystack mission and realized it felt well after covering an area of 30 miles north, 50 miles south and 30 miles east of Iridescent Mayday Bay.

Dipping down barely to Coconut treeline level, we sighted some few clearings and a few village huts. Several appeared well-kept, but there was no one visible.

"That's an indication they are Japs," exclaimed "Prentice" Pete, Miles of West Frankfort, Ill., owner of a lumber mill near Mayday Bay.

It was Pete who first spotted a Japanese barracks believed to contain the remnants of the garrison which slaughtered 150 American prisoners of war at Puerto Princesa on Dec. 14, 1944, in one of the worst atrocities of the war.

Flaming gasoline was thrown on the Americans as they huddled in three afraid shelter trenches. As screaming men ran from the shelters, they were mowed down by machine guns and rifles. Others ran to Japanese and begged to be shot. There were other reports last week of Filipino fishermen stepping (Continued on Page Two)

### COURT RULING FOR TALMADGE

### "Governor" Wins Second Test In Georgia Superior Court

McDonough, Ga.—(AP)—Herman Talmadge won a second court decision today, holding him to be Georgia's legal governor.

Superior Judge Bond Almon concurring in a decision earlier this week by a colleague, Judge Walter Hendrix, ruled Talmadge was properly elected by the Georgia Legislature Jan. 15.

The decision gave Talmadge access to approximately \$95,000 in public funds, left in the executive department bank account by retiring Gov. Ellis Arnall.

Hendrix had ruled last Wednesday that Talmadge was the legal claimant to the office, and dismissed a suit by Lieut. Gov. M. E. Thompson who sought to oust Talmadge.

Today's ruling was on suit of the Fulton National Bank of Atlanta, which had enjoined both claimants from drawing on the executive funds until it was instructed which was legal governor.

The Hendrix decision was appealed today to the Georgia Supreme Court by Attorney General Eugene Cook, who represents Thompson.

The appeal was filed with the clerk of the Henry County Superior Court, who said it would reach the high court by Monday.

Talmadge's chief counsel, B. D. Murphy, said he hoped to argue the appeal at the earliest possible moment, and indicated both sides would ask the court to advance the hearing date.

## Air Base Buildings Sought By Kinston

Kinston, Feb. 15—(AP)—City authorities are trying to obtain some 45 of the 65 buildings at the Kinston airport which were used by the marine air forces during the war. They would be used for airport and national guard business.

Maintenance cost of the airport, which is expected to be turned over to civilian authorities by the navy in the next few months, will far exceed income for the first two or three years, the officials said.

### Six Billion Dollar Slash Of Presidential Estimate Will Never Pass In Senate

### Knutson Hails Action As Clearing Way For Lowering Of Taxes

Washington—(AP)—Chairman Gurney (R-SD) of the Senate Services Committee, announced today he will wage a last ditch battle on the Senate floor against a \$6,000,000,000 budget slash which he declared would "hamstring the Army and Navy."

A 50-10-22 vote in favor of the cut by the House-Senate Budgetary Committee threatened President Truman with his first major defeat in the new Republican-controlled Congress.

If upheld by the House and Senate the committee decision will trim the President's \$37,500,000,000 budget to \$31,500,000,000.

Senator Brewster (R-Me.) predicted in a radio interview last night the Senate will never agree to the reduction recommended by the committee.

"I voted for it because it was that or no reduction at all," he said "but I will oppose it on the Senate floor, and I predict the final figure will be \$4,500,000,000."

However, the committee action was hailed by Chairman Knutson (R-Minn.), of the House Ways and Means Committee, as clearing the way for a 20 percent reduction of personal income taxes this year.

The Budget Committee action yesterday, taken in a meeting from which the press and public were excluded, is subject to ratification by both Houses. The vote will come next Wednesday.

Gurney said the \$6,000,000,000 cut in Army and Navy funds and told newsmen "I refuse to vote for anything that will hamstring our armed forces while the peace of the world is unsettled."

Senate Republican Leader Taft of Ohio, joined Gurney in an effort to hold the committee's budget cutting at a lower figure, but the group flatly rejected all compromises.

It voted down, 52 to 23, a motion by Gurney to limit the cut to \$4,150,000,000, and defeated, 46 to 29 a proposal by Chairman Millikin (R-Colo.) to make it \$4,500,000,000.

The committee rejected all efforts to stipulate that any specific amount of the budget savings be used to begin payments on the nation's debt. Knutson argued that this would delay the Republican tax cutting program.

Rep. Dingell (D-Mich.), asserted the committee action "just about amounts to the Republicans risking the national security in an effort to meet their promises to cut taxes."

## Tarheel Soldier Smuggler's Jinx

Hersfeld, Germany—(AP)—S-Sgt. William S. Lamm of Selma, N. C., is a smuggler's jinx.

A constabulary trooper stationed on the Frankfurt-Berlin highway he halted a German and five self-styled displaced persons driving in from the Russian zone.

### PIPELINE FIRM PLANS FUTURE

### WAA Chief Predicts Additional Conduits May Be Built

Washington—(AP)—War Assets Administrator Robert M. Littlejohn predicted today that additional conduits may be built alongside the Big Inch and Little Inch pipelines sold yesterday for the movement of natural gas to the Eastern Seaboard.

Among eleven bidders, the newly formed Texas Eastern Transmission Corp., of Houston, Tex., for \$143,127,000 in cash or about 98 percent of the original wartime cost to the government.

The high prices offered were the result of long range vision," Littlejohn told a reporter. "I think that more pipelines either for gas or oil may be laid along that right of way."

The big ribbon of real estate, which also goes to Texas Eastern, is 75 feet wide where the lines run jointly and 50 wide where the 1300-mile tubes follow separate courses.

Of 17 original starters, only eight completed the trip. One man was given up as lost after being washed overboard; another crewman was washed overboard but managed to cling to a rope and save himself.

## Uncertain Future

Secretary Of State Marshall's Statement On "Critical Condition" Of The World No Surprise; A Review Of The Manifest Problems Of Peace

When Secretary Marshall reported to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that the world "is in a very critical condition" he wasn't breaking what you would call a startling bit of news.

But although the secretary is a military man and therefore might be expected to think along military lines, there is no reason to believe he was talking about imminent war.

There is sufficient trouble without that, although it lurks constantly in the background for the future. There are cases when a patient's condition becomes critical merely because a cure for his ills is not found or because he fails to respond to treatment. That is the world's state today. Progress toward solution of its major problems has been small since the shooting stopped.

Marshall possibly had China much on his mind, having just come from there. China is on the brink of economic and political collapse. The General could well have been thinking what would happen if Russia "took over" the Chinese Communists and tried to step into the vast void which would be left by disruption of the Nanking government. Even if China is subjected only to political collapse and a civil war it would provide a crisis for a world so unsettled as this one.

"The situation of Great Britain internally torn politically, suffering grievous outward wounds and struggling economically, would be in itself sufficient grounds for the secretary's statement.

Prospects for continued unrest in India, even a searing civil war which might tie up with a holy war in the Middle East, the inability to get Europe started again; a certain tendency toward totalitarianism in Latin America; the uncertainty of the atomic future—all these and more probably were in Marshall's mind.

And there is, of course, the one continuing crisis which is superimposed on everything else—the difficulty of obtaining the cooperation of Soviet Russia for peace. General Marshall is well aware that when he goes to Moscow next month he will be stepping into one of the most complicated situations with which a man was ever asked to deal.

## BRITONS NEAR VICTORY OVER FUEL FAMINE

### Have "Turned The Corner" Say Officials; No Date Set For Easing Ban

London—(AP)—Britain appeared today to be slowly winning her critical peacetime "battle of the power stations."

A government spokesman said cautiously: "There are signs that we have turned the corner," as trains and ships loaded with coal broke an icy blockade to ease the fuel famine that has shut down thousands of factories and reduced the consumption of electricity in millions of homes since Monday.

Officials emphasized, however, that no date yet was in sight for lifting the government ban on domestic use of electricity for five hours daily in all England, Scotland and Wales and the total embargo on industrial use in 38 English and Welsh counties.

While shivering Britons hoped for a break in the freezing weather that has prevailed for most of the last five weeks, these were the principal developments in the all-out struggle to get coal to the nation's power plants:

(1) More than a quarter of a million miners and railwaymen volunteered to work Sunday to dig and transport coal. Even during the war the majority of miners didn't work Sundays.

(2) The special "coal cabinet" headed by Prime Minister Attlee reported that shipment of coal by sea was nearly back to last fall's level. Rail shipments were up, too; 212 coal trains reached London in the 48-hour period ended at 6 a.m. yesterday. Early in the week few trains got through the snowdrifts.

(3) The restriction on the use of household electricity was reduced to four and a half hours for tomorrow to allow more time for Sunday cooking. The five-hour ban will be in effect again Monday, however.

(4) The "coal cabinet" deferred until Monday action on its warning that gas may have to be stopped for all non-essential industries in Britain.

(5) The authoritative Financial Times said its survey of industries disclosed that production losses of between \$83,000,000 and \$100,000,000 would result from the first week's embargo on factory electricity and that such losses would grow each week the stoppage continued.

## Kai-shek Forces Capture Capital

Nanking—(AP)—Chinese dispatches said today the vanguard of Government assault troops entered Lini, Communist regional capital in Shantung Province, last night after six hours of "savage battling" on the outskirts.

A spokesman for the Ministry of National Defense told the Associated Press this morning that the reports were "possibly accurate" but that official confirmation was lacking.

A report from Suchow, Government base in northern Kiangsu Province, said the Chinese Reds suffered 9,000 casualties in fighting on the outskirts of Lini before withdrawing the bulk of their armies into surrounding hill country.

The reports indicated Government forces had failed to achieve their primary objective of crushing Communist strength.

white plume.

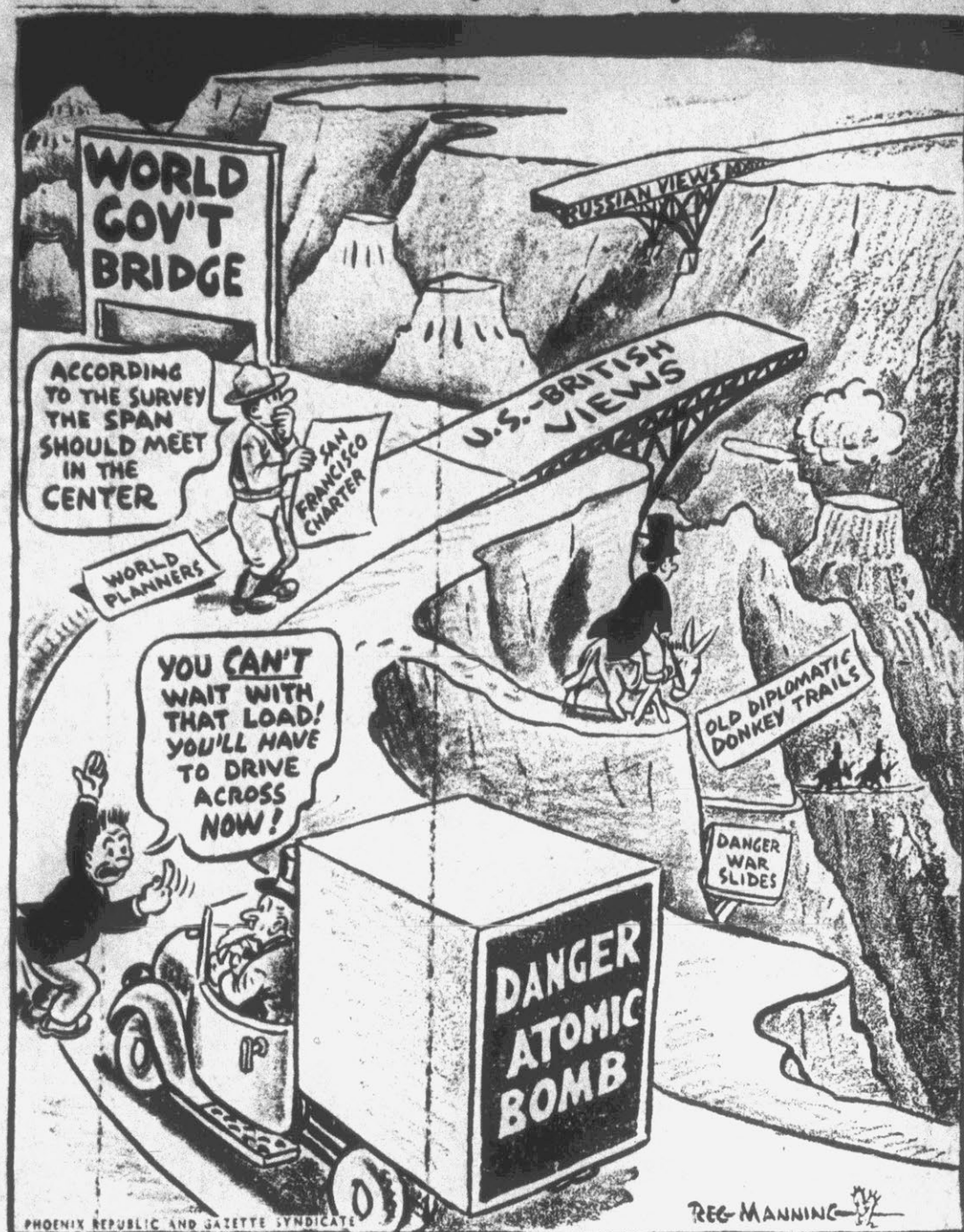
Danish Minister De Kauffmann

power might then be ended.

**Why Worry?**

Other plans and inventions,  
which may be even more revolu-  
tionary, are on drawing boards.  
Some scientists have great hopes  
of using atomic energy industrially  
and displacing boilers and perhaps  
engines and dynamos. I am not  
suggesting any atomic miracles—  
even its use to change the brains,  
shape or strength of our descend-  
ants through pre-birth treatments.  
My subject is to urge readers not  
to worry about Labor or Capital—  
Communists or Fascists. Rather,  
pin your faith to the preachers and  
scientists. The world's living stand-  
ards will not be raised by politi-  
cians in legislative halls, nor by  
laborites in organized strikes; but  
by preachers in pulpits and invent-  
ors in laboratories.

Both labor and management are  
needlessly concerned over their  
troubles today. As I have often said  
—strikes will be fought futile, but  
necessary. Labor troubles will al-  
ways be with us; but they will  
become less important as religion  
and science develop hand-in-hand  
during the years ahead. Therefore,  
let us not now be too greatly con-  
cerned over the industrial and eco-  
nomic conditions which will prevail  
when our grandchildren grow up.

**Remember Diversification**

From an investment standpoint,  
all the above emphasizes the great  
importance of diversification. Avoid  
investing too much in any one  
industry or any one company. Far  
greater inventions lie ahead of us

2. Or by delegates elected by the  
voters to special state constitu-  
tional conventions in three fourths of  
the states.

(Congress decides whether the  
approving shall be done by legisla-  
tures or state conventions.)

Of the 21 amendments to the  
constitution, the first 20 were ap-  
proved by state legislatures.

The 21st amendment—which re-  
pealed the 18th (prohibition) am-  
endment—was okayed by state con-  
ventions.

Congress can, but doesn't have  
to, set a time limit for the states  
to approve an amendment.  
Last week's proposal—if it passes  
the Senate—must be approved  
within seven years.

In 1924 Congress proposed a child  
labor amendment but so far, 23  
years later, only 27 of the neces-  
sary 36 states have approved.

This amendment, which had no  
time limit, would enable Congress  
to regulate child labor.

Fatmir Bearing Co. of New Britain

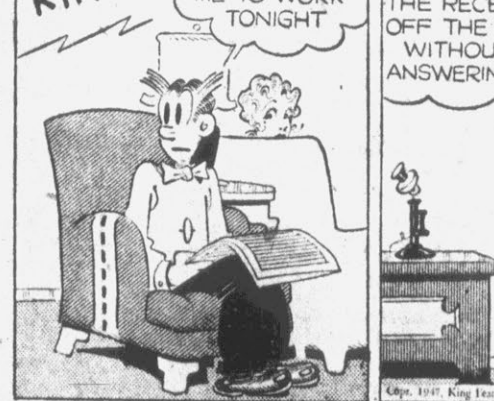
