

PLANE CRASH WORST KNOWN BY AIRLINES

Seven Americans Included In Death Toll Of Fifty-Three Persons

Bogota, Colombia—(AP)—Search parties labored in mountain country to the northwest today to bring in bodies of 53 persons killed in the worst commercial airplane crash on record. They recovered three of the bodies before darkness stopped their work last night.

The victims—49 passengers and a crew of four, including at least seven persons from the United States—were on a four-engine Douglas, DC-4 of the Colombian Avianca Airlines that plowed into cloudy El Vallejo cliff, 30 miles northwest of here, Saturday on a flight to Bogota from Barranquilla, about 500 miles north.

The plane struck about 2 p. m. near the top of a 1,000-foot precipice, plunging to a level of about 4,000 feet above sea level. The wreckage blew up, scattering bodies and debris of the plane over the cliff face and a steep ravine below. A Canadian, a Britisher, a Frenchman and at least two prominent Colombians also died in the wreck. The cliff is 10 miles from the nearest settlement—Subachoque. Villagers, first to report the crash Saturday night when the plane was already eight hours overdue here and police made up rescue parties sent from Subachoque, Supata and San Francisco.

By last night, rescuers with long ropes had succeeded in hoisting the first three bodies from the ravine to La Sabana plateau topping the cliff and said they could get no more out that way.

Meanwhile other parties, the first led by the mayor of Supata, reached the ravine below the cliff and found the corpses there badly mangled and buried and buried with pieces of the plane, some in crevices that could be reached only by ladder.

Carlos Henao Blanco, among the first to reach the wreckage, reported "a strong smell of charred flesh." He said he spotted some burned clothing, women's and children's shoes, an engine and a tire of the plane and part of the fuselage.

The death toll in the crash topped the fatalities of the two worst previous recorded commercial plane wrecks—42 killed in a Chinese Na-

Wanted To Die, Confessed Crime

Fresno, Calif.—(AP)—Otha C. Stockdale's attorneys declared today that their client's desire to die had caused him to "confess" he had killed a man for whose death Pvt. A. B. Ritchie of Hickory, N. C. is serving a life term in Leavenworth Federal Prison.

Now, lawyers J. F. Nagel and Gerald W. Stussman said, Stockdale, a 35-year-old railroad fireman and former soldier, has repudiated his statement.

He took the blame for the killing of Corp. Peter de Fusco of Uniontown, Pa., at an Army camp near Salina, Kas., the attorneys said, because he hoped it would bring his death and free him from a life clouded with alcoholism and mental confusion.

Ritchie was convicted of murder by court martial for the slaying and condemned to death. His sentence later was commuted to life imprisonment. An application for pardon is pending now.

Armed Band Raid Jail, Lynch Negro

Victim Was Held In Stabbing And Robbing Of Cab Driver; Jailer Unable Identify Members Of Unmasked Group

Pickens, S. C.—(AP)—A band of armed men early today removed a Negro prisoner, Willie Earle, 28, of Greenville, S. C., from the Pickens County Jail, and an hour and a half later his body was found on a road in Greenville county.

"Just before 5 o'clock this morning," said 62-year-old jailer J. Ed Gilstrap, "about 25 men knocked at the front door. Then they came to the back door. One of them said they wanted the Negro and would not harm anybody else. Several of them carried shotguns, and most of them wore caps. They made me go in and unlock the cell. They took the Negro and drove away in several cars. It was then a little after 6 o'clock."

About 6:45 o'clock the body of the Negro, who had been arrested for investigation in the stabbing of a taxicab driver, was found in adjacent Greenville county. Coroner J. O. Turner, the first officer to reach the body, said the body bore stab wounds and that the head had been cut through with a shotgun charge.

Earle had been arrested yesterday morning, several hours after T. W. Brown, 50-year-old Greenville taxi driver, had been found badly stabbed, in a roadside ditch. He told officers he had picked up a Negro passenger in Greenville Saturday night, and had been stabbed and robbed by the Negro "about two miles north of the town of Liberty. Hospital attendants reported his

Truman's First Money Request Gets Meataxe

House Appropriations Committee Chops In to Bill; Veterans Administration Hard Hit, Needs Will Be Reviewed

Washington—(AP)—The Republican controlled House appropriations committee swung a legislative meataxe today at President Truman's first money request for 1947—chopping it more than in two: From \$318,546,000 to \$139,360,000.

Of the entire 56 per cent reduction of \$179,186,000 recommended by the committee in the first supply bill sent to the House floor since the Republicans won control of Congress, \$175,683,500 was applied to the Veterans Administration. The committee promised, however, to review that agency's detailed needs later.

The action was not related directly to the proposed \$6,000,000,000 slash in the president's \$37,500,000,000 budget or the coming fiscal year ending June 30.

Coupled with the measure were recommendations for the cancellation of \$106,148,579 in appropriations already made and for liquidation of the civilian production administration by June 30 instead of December 31.

In the case of another war-born agency, however—the Office of Defense Transportation—the committee recommended a two-month extension of life—from the end of April to the end of June—because of the crisis resulting from the shortage of freight cars. The committee recommended a reduction of \$13,000 from the President's suggestion.

The committee agreed on \$135,200,000 as a stop-gap fund for the Veterans Administration, which said its original allotment of \$553,905,915 will be exhausted by the end of this month. The agency has asked for \$307,258,000.

"Existing conditions in the Veterans Administration," the committee said in explanation of its action, "require very careful hearings and exhaustive study before the appropriation of the amount proposed."

The committee said it "is not at all satisfied that the Veterans Administration is taking proper precautions to conserve the government's funds in the cost of administration and desires to secure full information on this point."

The amount recommended, the committee said, should carry VA until the end of March.

MYSTERY IN DEATH WOMAN

Helen Smith, 20, Negro, Found Dead In Automobile Sunday

William Wilson, 30, Negro of Chocoma Township, is being held in the Pitt County Jail in connection with the death of Helen Smith, 20, Negro, who was found dead in Wilson's parked automobile in woods near the New Bern highway about a mile from Greenville Sunday morning.

Sheriff Ruel W. Tyson quoted Wilson as saying that he pulled off the highway and parked in woods Friday night. "I turned off the switch—went to sleep—and didn't wake up until Saturday night."

Officers quoted Wilson as saying that when he could not start his car, parked in a lonely spot since Friday night, he noticed a passing motorist with two passengers in his car. Wilson saw them drive some distance and the engine failed to start. They left the car on the road and Wilson had not mentioned that the woman was in it.

The motorist took him back to the service station. From there Wilson walked a mile to Greenville then rode home and went to bed he told officers.

Sunday morning he asked his brother, Alex Wilson, and his brother-in-law, Jim Smith, to take him to where the car was stalled and help get it started. He still had not mentioned the woman being in the car. When Jim Smith looked in the car he found his sister, dead on the back seat.

A filling station attendant said that Wilson came to the station Saturday night to buy an ice cream cone, but appeared to be groggy and nervous. When asked what was wrong, Wilson replied, "I parked Friday night and just woke up."

Wilson never mentioned the woman. Coroner Griffin H. Rouse ordered an autopsy by Dr. J. L. Winstead. The dead woman's stomach today was taken to Duke Hospital in Durham by Sheriff Ruel W. Tyson for investigation. An inquest will be held when a report is received.

Authorities are puzzled by the woman's death. There was no indication of monoxide poisoning. When William Wilson was arrested Sunday he still was groggy and spoke incoherently.

One-Way Friendship Tops Policy Review

Marshall Given Advance Notice Of Criticism Over Russian-American Relations In Meeting Scheduled Tomorrow

Washington—(AP)—Secretary of State Marshall drew advance notice today that Russian-American relations will be up for critical review when he pays his second visit in a week to Capitol Hill tomorrow.

Rep. Mundt (R-S.D.) told reporters he will ask for assurances that Marshall will demand a policy of realism and reciprocity with the Soviet Union when the Big Four foreign ministers get together in Moscow next month.

"It's time this friendship stopped working just one way," said Mundt, a member of the House foreign relations committee which summoned the cabinet officer to a closed door session.

Marshall last Friday appeared before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and reported to newsmen later he had advised the lawmakers that the world is in a very critical condition politically.

A high congressional official who keeps in close touch with the administration said Marshall will caution the House members tomorrow against dithering the edge of American diplomacy by chipping

Divides Wealth On His Birthday

Weehawken, N. J., Feb. 17—(AP)—Saying he didn't want to wait until his death to distribute his money, Israel Rogosin, president of the Beaumont Mills, Inc., New York City, celebrated his 60th birthday yesterday with the announcement that he would divide 20,000 shares of stock in his firm, valued at \$500,000, among 4,000 low-salaried employees in his numerous plants throughout the country.

The stock will go to employees who have been with the company one year or more and who are earning \$3,000 a year or less, Rogosin said.

He also announced that he was placing an additional 40,000 shares of stock in the Rogosin foundation, which he started last year with a gift of 43,000 shares for distribution to recognized charities and universities.

Rogosin added that another \$1,000,000 in stock, distributed at the rate of \$100,000 yearly, will be put aside for some 30 relatives.

Lifeblood Of Peace

Foreign Trade And Its Importance; Tariffs; Arguments In Congress; The Reciprocal Trade Agreement; International Trade Meeting Soon In Geneva

Washington—(AP)—Foreign trade doesn't sparkle when mentioned on paper but it pumps blood into nations, including our own.

The Democrats and Republicans in Congress have been arguing for weeks over the way we handle our foreign trade.

Good foreign trade, with this country taking the lead, is a cornerstone in the State Department's plans for a prosperous world.

There's a big foreign market in nations which need American goods, and a lot of Americans can be employed in making those goods.

If we sell to them, we must buy from them. This would help their employment and give them dollars to buy more of our goods.

Right here tariffs come in. The Republicans have been doing most of their arguing on tariffs.

Tariffs are the duty or tax placed on goods brought into this country, or any country, from abroad.

Tariffs here and elsewhere are intended to protect the home-made goods from being undersold by imported goods.

High tariffs to protect American producers have been a traditional policy of the Republicans.

But there is always the problem: What kind of tariffs and how high?

To understand this present argument, here is the background:

In 1930, when the Republicans controlled Congress, they passed the Smoot-Hawley law, boosting tariffs to the highest point in our history.

Other countries, finding it tough to sell their goods here, took action of their own.

They either hiked their tariffs against us or set a limit on the amount of goods we could sell them.

That period, when the Smoot-Hawley law was operating, also saw the beginning of the world-wide depression.

The foreign trade of this country, badly unplaced in the depression, was shot to pieces.

Our foreign trade, according to the State Department, dropped two-thirds between 1929 and 1933. The Democrats came to power in 1933. To pump up foreign trade, the Democratic-controlled Congress, in

Deference To Custom In High Court's Ruling

Washington—(AP)—Justice Jackson asserted in a Supreme Court opinion today that the court should "pay at least some deference to the customs and contracts of an industry" when ruling on wage-hour cases.

Jackson said the court certainly should not apply the law "to put industry and labor in a legal strait-jacket of our own design."

His comments came in a concurring opinion when the high tribunal unanimously upheld contentions by two railroads that men who take training for certain jobs are not employees within the meaning of the wage hour law.

Justice Black delivered the court's ruling. In addition to the concurring opinion by Jackson, Justice Frankfurter wrote an opinion agreeing with Black's views.

Jackson's words could be interpreted to apply to the portal-to-portal pay suit, involving the M. L. Clemens (Mich.) Pottery Company. He made no direct reference, however, to the portal-to-portal case. The decision affected certain learners on the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis Railway and the Portland (Me.) Terminal Company. 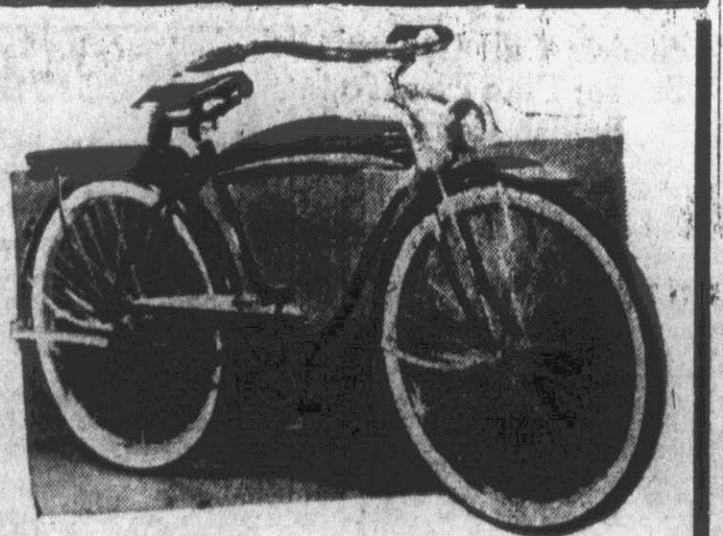

Cooke In Address At Hyde Banquet

Dr. Dennis H. Cooke, president of East Carolina Teachers College, was principal speaker at a public relations banquet at Mattamuskeet Lodge in Hyde County on last Friday evening. Teachers and citizens of the county were guests. The meeting was held to discuss school progress and educational needs in the area. Superintendent N. W. Shelton was in charge of the program.

In his address Dr. Cooke stressed the necessity of informing students in the schools of democratic ideals and of indoctrinating them in the American way of life. Education toward better citizenship and stronger character is essential, he said.

Discussing dividends on the huge public investment in education, Dr. Cooke placed on the credit side of the educational ledger the Americanization of millions of immigrants, the practical elimination of illiteracy, valuable work in vocational training, and the increased earning power of the educated over the uneducated.

Undue optimism about the accomplishments of the schools is checked, he declared, by the debit side of the ledger. This shows, he said, too little training for specific employment and consequent unemployment, and lack of proper attention to physical fitness.

Radyard Kipling, by a narrow margin, missed being poet laureate of England. Kipling was requested to write a poem for Queen Victoria's Jubilee. He did so and called it "Recessional." In it he summoned his nation not to forget the spiritual values. The court was said to have been offended by the fact that he made no reference in his poem to the queen. At any rate, when the poet laureate was to be appointed, Kipling was passed by and a second-rate poet was chosen instead.

The Recessional is a great poem because it sounds a note and proclaims a message suitable to every age and applicable to every nation. If the teachings of history mean anything, they demonstrate beyond the shadow of a doubt that nations and civilizations go to pieces when the character of its people is corrupted.

Centuries ago the Israelites thrust from them the prophets who pointed out the inevitable consequences of evil living. Some centuries later, Jesus was crucified for attempting to teach the same lesson. Across the pages of history is written the dismal story of how almost every generation has crucified, hanged, beheaded, burned, or in some way persecuted its deliverers.

"Lest we forget!" This is a great and mighty warning written plainly on the wall as nations mock their destiny and sin away their day of grace.

1934 passed the reciprocal trade agreements act. It worked like this: If a country would take some of our goods, lowering their tariffs, we'd take some of their goods, lowering our tariffs.

This didn't apply to all their exports. We'd lower tariffs only for certain agreed-upon items.

The law now permits our tariffs on certain items to be cut as much as 75 per cent below what they were in 1934.

The trade agreements law wasn't everlasting. It came up in Congress in 1937, 1940, 1943, 1945 to be renewed or killed. It was always renewed.

But there was argument: From some Republicans and from some businessmen who complained of injury from the competition of foreign imports.

Now the arguments of Republicans have more force than ever before because they control Congress for the first time since the reciprocal trade law was passed in 1934.

In renewing the law in 1945, the Democratic Congress said it should continue till 1948. How then can the Republicans do anything now?

Here's how:
In April we are to send delegates to a meeting of 19 nations in Geneva, Switzerland.

There we are supposed to draw up one big trade agreement, involving tariff cuts, with the other 18 nations.

In addition, we and they are to work out a charter for an international trade organization.

Thinking of that Geneva meeting and the tariff cuts which may be worked out there, the Republicans, although they've never been very happy about the program, at least in details, they're divided on what they want done now.

Some want the whole program suspended until they can investigate. Some want changes in the program now, even though they

figure they'll have to wait till 1948 when the act is up for renewal, to make deep changes.

"Why," Mundt added, "we even pay part of the cost of this propaganda by allowing it to go through the

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GROUP VOTES LIMIT TENURE

Senate Committee Passes On Two-Term Limit Amendment

Washington (AP)—The Senate Judiciary Committee voted 9 to 1 today for a proposed constitutional amendment to limit presidential tenure to two full terms of four years each.

Chairman Wiley (R-Wis.) told reporters the committee made two changes in a similar amending resolution already passed by the House.

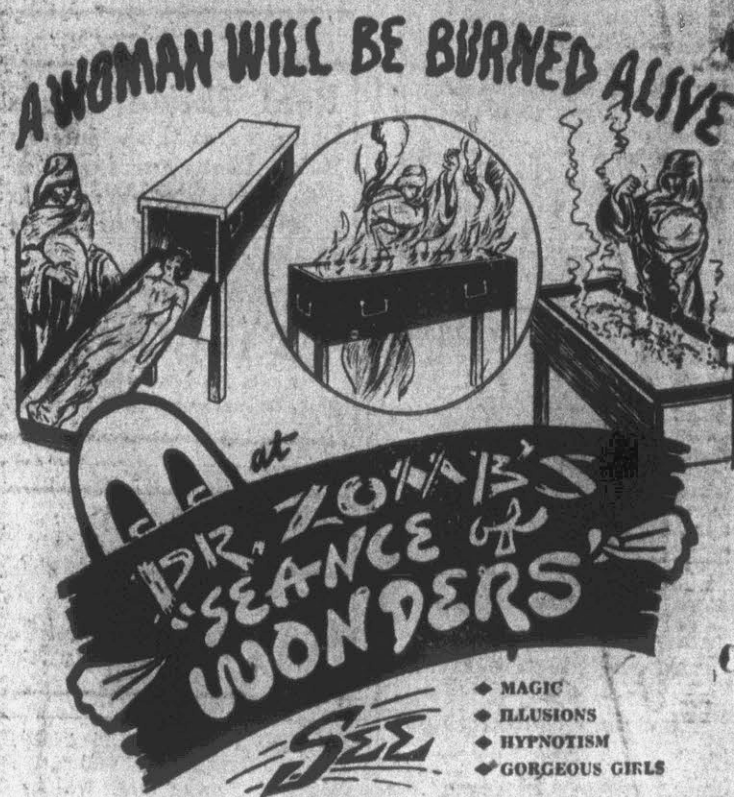

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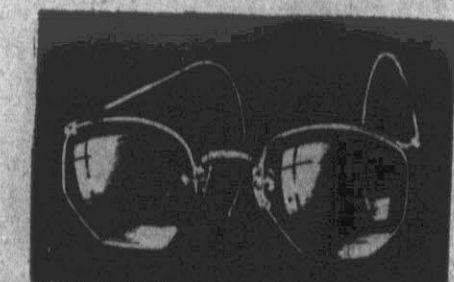
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
