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CIO Chief Joins Green In Warning

Murray Opposes "Repeal" Laws In Testimony; Calls All To Join In Fighting Bills; Warns AFL Merger

Washington.—(AP)—President Truman today asked Congress to make possible "an early ending" of the state of national emergency under which the country has lived since 1939.

Mr. Truman asked outright repeal of 24 laws, proposed that 36 other emergency statutes be allowed to lapse upon a declaration of the end of the emergency, and recommended that most of 20 defense appropriation measures be wiped out.

Mr. Truman proposed that only 12 of "more than 100" emergency laws be continued.

GOP SPLIT ON BUDGET PLANS

Six Billion Dollar Cut Looms In Congressional Favor

Washington, Feb. 19.—(AP)—The stand by a majority of Republican senators against a \$6,000,000,000 budget slash stirred sharp debate in both senate and house today with Rep. Owen (R-Ill.) shouting that the senators acted "cowardly."

The G. O. P. split apparently made it a foregone conclusion that the senate would favor a \$4,500,000,000 cut, proposed by Senator Millikin (R-Colo.) as a substitute for the \$6,000,000,000 recommended by the joint senate-house budget committee.

Most Democratic senators were backing Millikin's figure.

The chief argument of those opposing the bigger figure is that it would require too heavy cuts in military spending.

The budget committee's recommendations were formally only in the senate. While the house will not consider them until tomorrow, Owen's criticism of the senators touched off an advance debate there.

Rep. Whitman (D-Miss.) argued that a \$6,000,000,000 slash not only would take money from the war and navy departments but would cripple agriculture.

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Carnival Over, New Orleans Cleaning Up

New Orleans.—(AP)—New Orleans put away its clown suit today and went back to work.

The day — Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent — opened with the thousands who yesterday celebrated the biggest Mardi Gras in the city's history of fun-making.

Along the routes traversed by the parades of the carnival season, city workers began removing the decorations and knocking down the wooden grandstands.

And in a few days, artisans will start building the floats for next year's Mardi Gras parades.

No Wishful Thinking

Secretary Marshall and Trygve Lie, Two of the World's Leading Experts on International Affairs, Optimistic For Peace; But Both Recognize Dangers

Secretary of State Marshall is said by members of the House Foreign Affairs Committee to be "optimistic on the whole" over maintaining peace, and Secretary-General Trygve Lie of the United Nations declares that "for the time being the possibility of actual armed conflict involving the powers can be discarded as a madman's dream."

That's encouraging testimony by two of the world's leading experts on international affairs. Indeed there's plenty of evidence to support the thesis of peace among the major powers for a considerable period of years. However, General Marshall was discussing the world's "sore spots" with the committee, and Mr. Lie, in addressing the Minneapolis Round Table of the National Council of Christians and Jews, cautioned that the world must not continue to itself to the future. So it's clear that neither of these gentlemen is doing wishful thinking but that both recognize the dangers which must be avoided if peace is to continue.

The greatest deterrent to another world conflict in the near future is the fact that none of the powers, barring the United States—is phy-

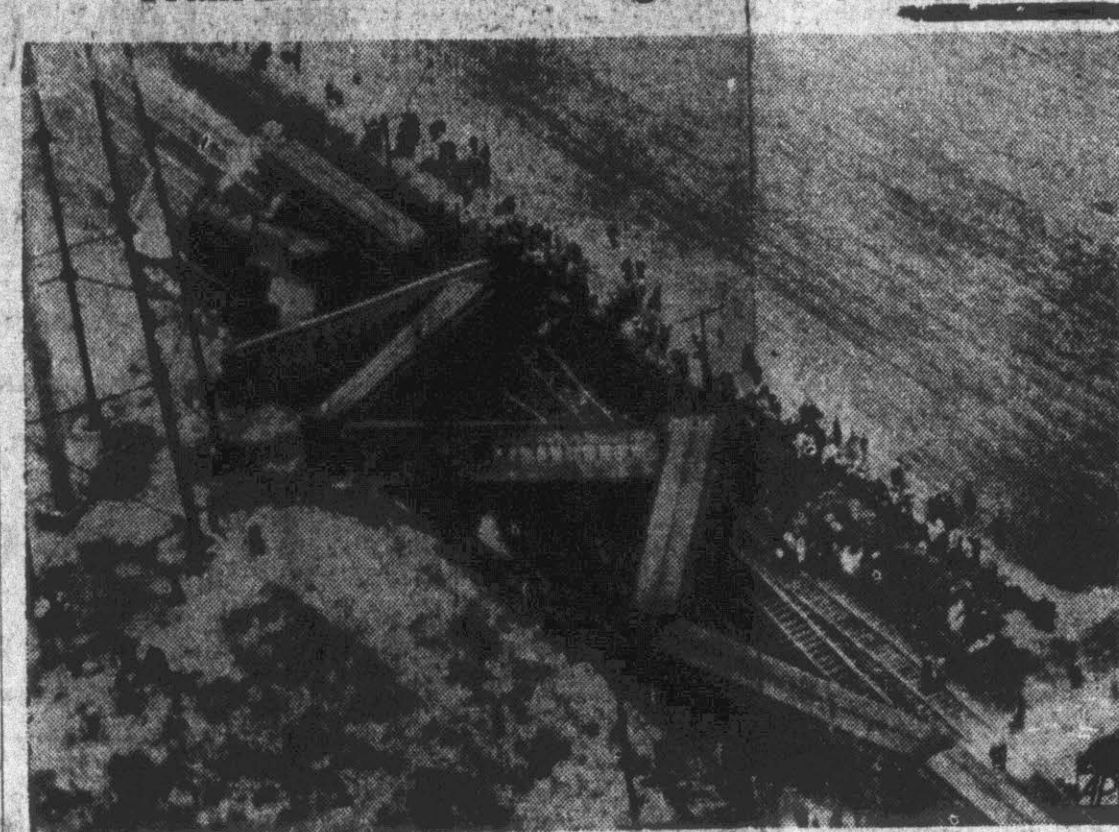
sically capable of waging another major war. They're all in, and it's going to take many years for them to recover. And of course the peoples who have experienced this horror are, on the whole, thoroughly fed up.

However, your columnist isn't one of those who believe that the militaristic spirit has been uprooted from all hearts. To mention a specific case, I have no doubt that if the Prussians were capable of making war, they might be at it again. My tour of Germany a few months ago convinced me that while the militaristic-minded German had been thoroughly whipped physically he was far from beaten mentally. The will to fight was still there.

But unfortunately that's not the whole story. There are other folk besides the Prussians who must certainly be toying with militaristic ideas. Perhaps they don't exactly wish for war, but they've persuaded themselves that they will have to fight sooner or later to achieve their aspirations.

Quite apart from the question of whether anybody wants war, there are numerous international issues, barring the United States—is phy-

BRITISH CALL WAVE HOME

Viceroy Of India Summoned; Attlee Statement Tomorrow

London.—(AP)—Authoritative sources said today that Lord Wavell will be called home soon from his post as Viceroy of India and that Prime Minister Attlee will make an historic statement on Indian freedom in the House of Commons tomorrow.

The disclosures stimulated speculation that the British Government might be preparing to withdraw from India and to announce a plan for the sub-continent's complete independence, perhaps within a year.

One informant said British evacuation "within a stated period" was not out of the question.

The British cabinet's decision to bring Wavell home, these informants said, came as a result of the new constitutional crisis in India. They declined to say whether he would be returning to India.

A government source said a special news conference for United States correspondents was being arranged to take place immediately after Attlee made his statement.

India Secretary Lord Pethick-Lawrence, President Sir Stafford Cripps of the Board of Trade and Defense Minister A. V. Alexander who formed the British cabinet mission to India last year, are being asked to answer U.S. newsmen's question, he added.

Pay Tribute To Fallen Marines

Two Jima.—(AP)—A thousand American soldiers stood at attention before a sandy graveyard here today to pay homage to the 4,000 Marines who died two years ago to secure this strategic island for their country.

The troops now garrison the island and maintain the army airforce base, but the ceremony was in honor of the Marines who took the island from the Japanese.

The cemetery lies at the foot of Mt. Suribachi, its rows of white crosses and stars of David in orderly rows across the volcanic sands where thousands fell before the fire of the Japanese gunners.

Poison Pie Deaths In Hands Of FBI Today

Wilmington.—(AP)—Investigation of the potato pie poisoning death of three persons here today was in the hands of the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Wilmington, where contents of the victims' stomachs were sent for analysis.

An inquest into the deaths, which occurred Sunday following a meal at a local rooming house, will be held after results of the FBI tests are known. The deaths were attributed to certain contents of a potato pie served at the meal.

Winston-Salem Blue Laws Get Revision

Winston-Salem.—(AP)—Movies and athletic contests now are permitted in Winston-Salem on Sundays, during non-church hours.

The Board of Aldermen, acting on a recent favorable straw vote yesterday amended the blue law ordinance. Exhibitions were made lawful between 12:30 p. m. and 5:45 p. m. and between 9 p. m. and midnight.

Will Consider

Washington, Feb. 19.—(AP)—The American Federation of Labor, said today its unity committee will go over later this week the reply by CIO President Philip Murray to its invitation for a talk about merger of the two big labor groups.

While the only official word at AFL headquarters was that Murray's reply would get later study, some AFL men said privately that they felt the CIO in effect had rejected the AFL's proposal for organic unity.

If the AFL committee takes that official view, then the merger proposal likely will come to a swift end.

BRITISH FUEL STOCKS RISE

Some Industries May Re-Open Monday Says Attlee

London.—(AP)—Prime Minister Attlee said today that factory production in the Midlands, industrial heart of England, probably could be resumed Monday after a two-week shutdown caused by the unprecedented coal shortage.

Attlee announced, however, that the island-wide restrictions on the use of electricity by domestic and other non-industrial consumers would have to be continued for an unstated period. Five hour switch-offs of electricity are currently enforced under wartime regulations providing for fines and prison sentences.

The prime minister's nine man "coal cabinet" reported encouraging gains last night in coal supplies at power generating stations. Government sources said that Attlee probably would announce a lifting of the power ban for at least some sections of industry on Monday, but warned that the present daily five-hour "blackouts" for all the island's

Slum Clearance Law Offered In Assembly

Raleigh, N. C.—(AP)—A slum clearance law for the state's municipalities was proposed in a bill offered in the House today by the Wake County delegation.

To be known as the "Redevelopment Law," the measure would give wide power to housing authorities to obtain slum areas under the right of eminent domain. All such plans, however, first must be approved by the city government.

Russians Tell Of "Difficulties" In Carrying Out Big 3 Agreement

Washington.—(AP)—State Department officials disclosed today that Russia has acknowledged "difficulties" in carrying out a Big Three agreement to destroy her share of damaged German warships.

Responding to American and British inquiries, Moscow voiced assurances, however, that steps were being taken to carry out her part of the bargain reached at the 1945 Potsdam conference.

The Department officials said the United States and Britain have carried out their commitments to sink or otherwise destroy the damaged Nazi vessels allotted to them for the purpose.

Topping the list of the captured vessels the Russians were to destroy was Germany's single aircraft carrier, the Graf Zeppelin. Whether this flatboat was among the craft whose destruction has met with

MINERS CLAIM CORE HELD UP

Uranium Output Stymied By Fight Over Lillenthal

Washington.—(AP)—Western mine owners said today the Senate battle over David Lillenthal's nomination to head the atomic energy commission is stymieing output of uranium—prime source of all man-made nuclear energy.

As the confirmation hearings moved into a fresh day after two new outbursts of temper, a group of Colorado and Utah uranium producers said 300 mines in those states are idle for lack of answers to two questions:

When will the government start buying uranium from the mines and will it price it at 10¢ per lb.?

Charles J. Moynihan of Montrose, Colo., attorney for the group, told reporters the mine owners came to Washington seeking the answers from members of the atomic energy commission.

"Our conversations were very satisfactory," Moynihan said, "but they kept pointing out that they could give us no assurances because they may not stay in their positions—their appointments may not be confirmed by the Senate."

H. W. Balsie of Moab, Utah, one of the mine owners, noted that the atomic act forbids the sale of fissionable materials to any agency outside the government, hence the mines have no way of recovering on their production.

Acheson Backed Up By Marshall

Washington, Feb. 18.—(AP)—Secretary of State Marshall told Soviet Russia today that Undersecretary Dean Acheson spoke "in line of duty" in describing Russia's foreign policy as "aggressive and expanding."

This government's reply to a protest by Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov said:

"Under our standards a restrained comment on the matter of public policy is not a slander. Therefore I know that on second thought you will not attribute hostility to frankness."

Marshall's reply to the protest made by Molotov last week against testimony given the senate atomic energy committee by Undersecretary Acheson was delivered to Molotov today by Ambassador Bedell Smith.

House Budget Decision May Bring OPA's End

Agency "Down To Its Last Million"; Sees Possibility Of Ending Controls For Rent, Sugar And Other Items

Washington, Feb. 19.—(AP)—OPA down to its last million dollars unless rescued by the senate, insisted today it may have to quit enforcing rent ceilings, sugar rationing and the few remaining price controls within 72 hours.

Price Administrator Max McCulloch declared that the house decision to slash \$9,000,000 from the agency's current appropriation will—upheld by the senate—put OPA out of business four months before its scheduled expiration date.

"It appeared doubtful, however, that the senate would act on the matter before Friday, thus putting the whole issue over for perhaps another week, or longer. The cut cannot be made effective until passed by both houses and signed by President Truman."

Recommended by the House Appropriations Committee, it went through as part of a \$139,360,000 deficiency appropriation bill late yesterday.

The committee's formal report said OPA still would have enough money left to "discharge its full responsibilities under the law, wind up its affairs and turn over all necessary records to the archivists" by June 30. Chairman Taber (R-N.Y.), estimated the cut would leave the agency \$18,000,000.

But McCulloch gave reporters a different picture at a news conference a little while later. He said: "OPA's 1947 fiscal year appropriations totaled \$101,600,000 and by February 15 it had spent or committed \$83,439,000, leaving a \$17,561,000 balance. The cut proposed by the house would reduce this to \$4,561,000 but \$7,555,974 of that amount already is earmarked to pay employees their final salaries and accumulated annual leave."

The remainder, \$1,055,026, is "enough to run the agency until the end of the week," McCulloch said. And that, he added, means until the close of business Friday.

CHURCHES TRY FOR SOLUTION

Would Judge Economic Effects Of Religion

Pittsburgh.—(AP)—About 350 Protestant church members, joining in a remarkable experiment, tried hard today to judge economic issues through purely Christian eyes—but they still disagreed on many things.

At the national conference on the church and economic life, labor leaders are talking about corporate profits and monopolies. A congressman and an economist denounced the closed shop. A pastor defended it. There were lively clashes over the proper role of government.

"But as the meeting moved into its second day, one thing was clear: Nearly everybody agreed that the churches should concern themselves in some way with economic life."

And leaders expressed hope that hard-working committees can boil down the confusing discussions into a general program that a majority of the delegates can approve at the final sessions tomorrow.

The conference is sponsored by the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America.

Tobacco Meeting Here On Friday

There will be a county-wide tobacco meeting held in Greenville Friday, February 21, 1947, at 7:30 p. m. Mr. R. R. Bennett, Extension Tobacco Specialist from State College, will discuss better methods of production of flue-cured tobacco. Mr. Bennett will also discuss some of the probable causes for tobacco borer burning, based on data obtained from a survey made in all the flue-cured tobacco counties of the state in 1946. Mr. Howard R. Garliss, Extension Plant Pathologist, will also be present at the meeting to discuss tobacco diseases and their control. The information that these specialists discuss at this meeting should be worthwhile to all the tobacco farmers in Pitt County in producing a better quality of tobacco in 1947.

Newsprint Stock In U.S. Hard Hit

Ottawa.—(AP)—American newsprint consumers were faced today with a curtailment of deliveries from Canada, source of more than 80 percent of their supply, for at least a month and perhaps longer because of an acute shortage of railway box cars.

Transport Controller B. S. Liberty last night issued a preference order to Canadian railways to supply sufficient cars to keep all newsprint mills in operation, but no assurance was given that normal shipments would continue to the United States.

The order will allot cars only to those mills which would otherwise be forced to shut down because of lack of storage facilities.

SPRING MUST BE NEAR

Chicago, Feb. 19.—(AP)—At the marriage license bureau yesterday Harry Paynter, deputy clerk, asked Cornelius J. Boldt, to give his birth date.

"June 14, 1873," answered the young girl with Boldt.

The Paynter asked the girl, Miss La Verne D. Anderson, to show a birth certificate because she did not appear 18 years old. She handed him a certificate giving the birth date as October 3, 1928.

The marriage of the 73-year-old widower and the 18-year-old girl is set for Saturday.

"Get Willie"

Washington, Feb. 19.—(AP)—CIO President Philip Murray today asked congress to "send for" William Green so he and the AFL chief "can work out an agreement" to prevent jurisdictional disputes between unions.

Murray told the senate labor committee:

"You get Willie Green down here so he and I can sit down with this committee and work out an agreement right here."

Murray made his suggestion after Senator Morse (R-Ore.) demanded that Murray say "what you are going to do about jurisdictional strikes."

HOLD MEN IN LYNCH PROBE

Eight Unidentified Men To Undergo More Questioning

Greenville, S. C.—(AP)—Sheriff R. H. Bearden announced today eight men were being held for further questioning in connection with the lynching of Willie Earle, 25-year-old Negro, near here Monday.

He declined to identify the men or to give any additional information.

His announcement came after federal state, city and county officers had spent practically all of last night in questioning possible witnesses in the case.

Meanwhile, a Pickens County coroner jury returned a verdict that T. W. Brown, Greenville taxi driver, had died as a result of stabbing by Earle near Liberty Saturday night.

Brown died several hours after the Negro's body, bearing knife and gunshot wounds, was found early Monday near a Greenville County road a short time after an armed band had taken him from the nearby Pickens County jail.

Our Trade Program

Past Stories By This Columnist Have Dealt With Foreign Trade and Tariffs; Here Are Arguments Given By Both Sides, Democratic and Republican

Washington.—(AP)—Has our foreign trade program done any good? The Democrats offer figures to back up their claim it has.

Top Republicans in Congress critical of the way the program is handled, want some changes made. Some other Republicans call it a failure.

But most are pretty careful not to talk of throwing the program out the window.

If they did that—and if our foreign trade were to slump badly—the results might show up in the 1948 elections.

The Democrats started the program in 1934 when, controlling Congress, they passed the Reciprocal Trade Act under which the program works.

In the past 13 years we have signed trade agreements with 29 nations. Briefly, the agreements mean:

We cut tariffs for certain—but not all—goods from a nation which agrees to cut its tariffs for some of our goods.

To show what the program did the Democrats compare 1934-35 when the program was starting,

COMMITTEE IN HOUSE PASSES WILDLIFE BILL

Vote Is 35-9 In Favor Of Separation; Three Amendments Included

Raleigh.—(AP)—The Committee on Conservation in the House voted 35 to 9 today in favor of a bill to separate the division of game and inland fisheries from the Department of Conservation and Development.

The vote came after the adoption of three amendments which would strike out the \$7500 annual salary limitation for the commissioner and leave the pay question to the governor and council of state; would give the Wildlife Resources Commission no authority over stream pollution; and eliminate the requirement that the commissioner have "formal" training.

A number of committeemen expressed the hope that John D. Finley, present game and inland fisheries commissioner, would be retained. The proposed new commission would have a commissioner or director, and nine members representing a district each.

Several members said that while they were voting for the bill, they meant no reflection on either Finley or Director R. Bruce Eldridge of the Department of Conservation and Development.

Among them were Reps. Umstead of Orange, Lew Wallace of Lenoir County, Uzzell of Rowan and Stoney of Burke.

While the Senate Conservation and Development Committee met with the House committee, it did not schedule an immediate vote.

The overwhelming committee vote forebodes speedy House action. (Continued on Page Four)

Soviet Atomic Plan Put Before Council

Proposals For Atom Control Diametrically Opposed To U.S. Program; Call For Forming New World Convention

Lake Success, N. Y., Feb. 18.—(AP)—Russia set out today to take the teeth out of the American plan for international control of atomic energy.

Before the members of the U. N. Security Council was a series of Soviet proposals which, if adopted, would establish a separate world convention to outlaw atomic weapons and permit the use of the veto on punishment of violators of control regulations.

For the first time, council members were confronted with Russian proposals on atomic energy control. These will be discussed in general debate by the council tomorrow.

In effect, the Soviet proposals, if adopted, would tear out of the report the heart of the atomic control plan advocated by the United States.

As a first step toward international control of atomic energy, Russia proposes the immediate abolition of atomic energy for warlike purposes.

As the next step, she suggests that an effective system of control be set up. (Continued on Page Four)

In making the award Miss Henderson said, "This Thanks Badge is the highest honor the Girl Scout organization can bestow. It is awarded for extraordinary service

and our national Board of Directors was unanimous in voting that your heroism at the time of the plane crash saved many lives, including mine, and should be honored in this way. I am proud that the Board has permitted me to act in their behalf and give you this medal as a mark of our gratitude."

Miss Henderson had been hospitalized with a fractured ankle and a back injury ever since the plane crash. She will return to active duty sometime this spring. Mr. King, who suffered serious hand burns, has now recovered and has taken up his studies at the University of Pennsylvania.

Charge Motorist With Boy's Death

At an inquest Monday night at the City Hall into the death of Leon Ray Walston, 10-year-old white boy, who was killed when a car hit him on a bicycle near Bruce last December 20, the coroner's jury ordered James Dupree, colored, driver of the car, held for manslaughter. Coroner Griffin H. Rouse set the bond at \$500.

At an inquest into the boy's death last December 22, a coroner's jury found that the boy came to his death as a result of an unavoidable accident. Recently eye-witnesses to the highway tragedy were found and Solicitor Dave Clark and Coroner Rouse ordered the case reopened. Testimony was that Dupree's car struck the boy on the bicycle causing injuries from which he died at a hospital that night.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Ella Edwards Roach; a daughter, Mrs. Carrie Hunter of Fayetteville; two sons, Sammy Roach of New Bern and LeDrew Roach of the home; seven grandchildren, and a sister Mrs. Fred Smith of Farmville.

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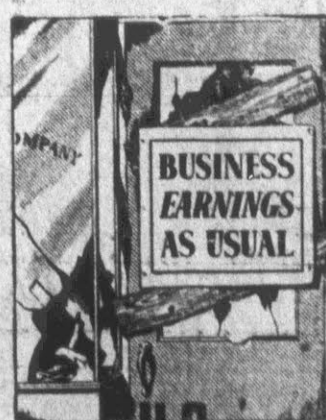
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Strength FOR THE DAY

Ten others would remain in force for six months after the actual proclamation ending the emergency, whenever it may come, or for some other stated period.

"The progress of reconversion now makes it possible to take an additional step toward freeing our economy of wartime controls," Mr. Truman said in his message to Congress.

High White House advisors have indicated to newsmen that if Congress acts with reasonable dispatch, the emergency may be terminated by July.

The proclamation would cover both the "limited" emergency proclaimed Sept. 8, 1939, and the "full" emergency declared May 27, 1941.

ing about, here is an explanation: The President, under the act has authority to carry out the program. The State Department runs it for him.

Committees and sub-committees work out the details of agreements. On these committees are representatives of the State, Commerce, Agriculture, Treasury, War and Navy Departments, and the Tariff Commission.

One of their main problems is: will a tariff cut on this or that hurt an American business?

So, before agreements are signed or tariffs out, American businessmen are called upon to say what it will mean to them, personally.

Senators Vandenberg and Millikin want an "escape" clause in the agreements. Which means: we can cancel them, after they're in effect, if they're hurting an American business.

This seems all right with the State Department which already has such an "escape" clause in an agreement with Mexico.

Senator Taft wants the Tariff Commission, which has a key spot on all the committees, given more authority.

Rep. Knutson, Minnesota Republican and chairman of the powerful House Ways and Means Committee plans to hold hearings on the program before the international trade conference opens in Geneva, Switzerland, in April.

Our representatives are going there in the hope of working out a huge trade agreement with 18 other nations.

The House and Senate Republicans probably will insist on some changes in the program before the Geneva meeting.

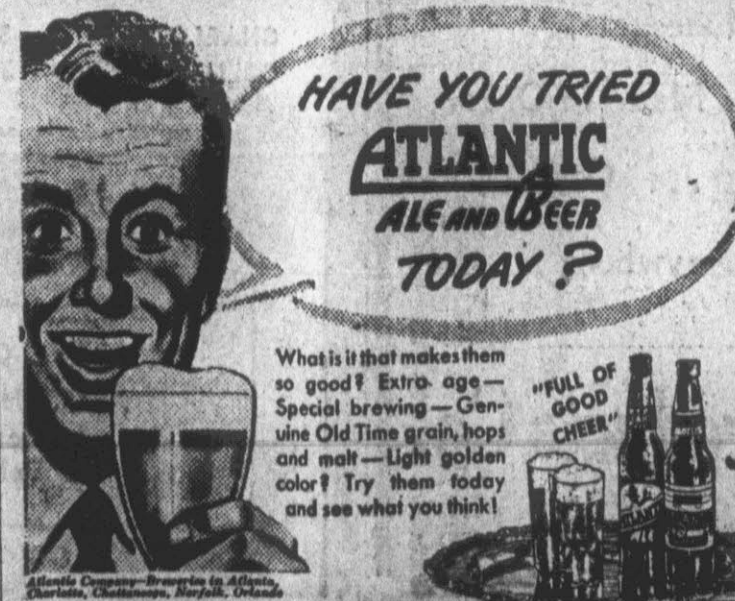
