Confessions

Greenville, S. C.—(AP)—With 29 men in jail and 26 confessions in the hands of officers, Sheriff R. Homer Bearden of Greenville County today said officers were "near the bottom of the barrel" in their roundup of alleged participants in the lynching of Willie Earle, 24-year-old Negro here Monday.

Sheriff Bearden said all but two of those held are taxi drivers, and that more arrests are expected today or during this week.

At 11:30 a. m., a detachment of officers went in search of a single barrel shotgun which is now believed to be the weapon with which Earle was shot to death about two hours after he was taken out of the Pickens county jail by a mob of armed men and stabbed in the chest and thigh. Bearden said today that the double barrel gun seized yesterday is not now believed to be the death weapon but it has been identified as a gun carried by one of the men who entered the Pickens jail and forced the jailer, J. E. Gilbreath, to turn Earle over to them.

Twenty-four of the men in custody spent last night in the county jail and some others who had been arrested up until midnight were quartered at the city jail, where they were questioned.

Those from the county jail were returned to the city jail this morning so that they would be readily available for questioning and were placed temporarily under guard in the city courtroom.

Bearden said that varying degrees of participation were admitted in the statements but that no one had confessed firing the shot which

Columbian Given
Prison Term By
Atlanta Jurist

Atlanta—(AP)—Columbian President Emory Burke was sentenced today to three years imprisonment for usurping police powers in direction of his Negro-hating, Jew-baiting organization.

Superior (Circuit) Court Judge Carl Crow imposed the sentence after a jury returned guilty verdicts last night on three counts of an indictment. The court ordered Burke to serve 12 months on each of the three counts, the sentences to run consecutively.

Counsel immediately entered a motion for a new trial.

The dapper, pale faced Burke, a 31-year-old railroad draftsman, stood motionless before the court as the sentence was pronounced.

Burke was the second Columbian within a week to draw conviction and sentencing on charges in connection with alleged terrorist activities against Negroes last fall.

Milk Legislation In
Prospect For State

Raleigh, N. C.—(AP)—Following closely the revelation that many dairy distributors are reconstituting milk, the State Board of Health plans to introduce a state-wide uniform minimum milk bill which is to reach the legislature next week. Dr. Carl Reynolds, state health officer, said today.

The bill not only will have the backing of the State Board of Health, but it also will be championed by the Agriculture Department and the N. C. Cooperative Milk Producers Association.

About The Budget

Lots Of Congressional Oratory On Budget; Story Behind Arguments; Explanation Of What's Been Happening; Obligations Assumed In Cutting Budget

Washington—(AP)—In the last few days you've heard a lot of oratory from Congress on the budget. You'll hear more.

Here's an explanation for anyone confused by what's been happening. Last month President Truman asked Congress to vote \$37,500,000,000 to run the government for another year.

(That's the fiscal year starting next July 1 and ending June 30, 1948. So Congress has until June 30 to finish voting the money.)

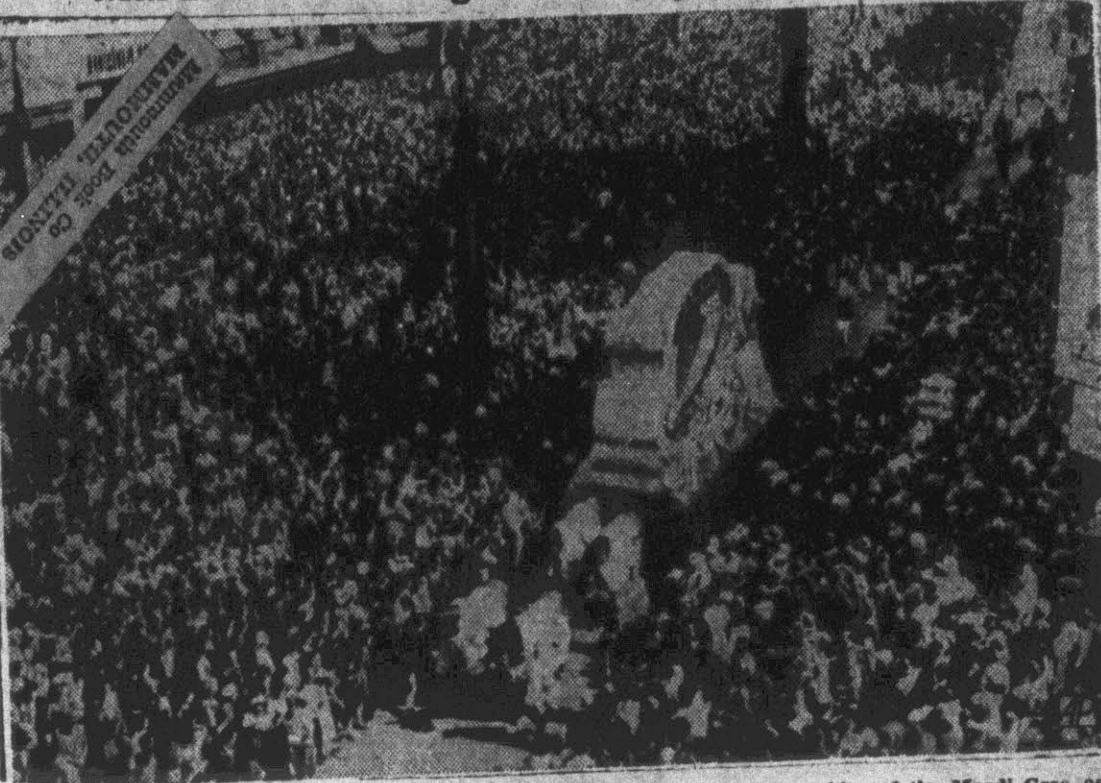
In this budget message Mr. Truman explained in great detail how much money was needed for each department of government.

So much for the Army, the Navy, the Agriculture and Commerce Departments, international affairs, and so on.

Last year Congress reorganized itself. In doing so, it decided this: When the President sent his message in January, Congress would look at it.

Then it would try to decide very quickly whether it thought the esti-

Relief Funds For
Abroad RequestedPresident Asks Con-
gress To Vote Sum
For Aid Of Liberat-
ed Peoples; Notes
Early End Of UN-
RRA; Wants Stop-
Gap Until Harvest
Time

Washington—(AP)—President Truman asked Congress today to vote \$350,000,000 for relief aid to people of liberated countries abroad.

In a message to the legislators the president noted that full scale supply operations by UNRRA are rapidly drawing to a close, and said: "On humanitarian grounds, and in the light of our own self-interest as well, we must not leave the task unfinished. We cannot abandon the peoples still in need."

UNRRA—the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration—is scheduled to wind up its operations March 31, although winding up activities under way will continue beyond that date.

Mr. Truman's recommendation was only for liberated countries. U. S. relief activities in occupied nations, such as Germany and Austria, are financed by the war department from its appropriations.

(White House aides said that former President Herbert Hoover has not yet reported to Mr. Truman on his investigation looking to long-term plans for rehabilitation of occupied areas.)

Mr. Truman said the money he asks is designed for the urgent relief needs for the balance of the year. He added:

"The most critical period will be in the spring and summer months, when UNRRA shipments will cease and their harvests are not yet available."

"Swift legislative action is necessary if our help is not to come too late."

While the aid was asked for liberated countries suffering from the ravages of war, Mr. Truman did not mention any specific nations.

The president said that in some liberated countries UNRRA will have achieved its objective fully when UNRRA's supply operations cease. He explained that means they will be again self supporting so far as the basic essentials of life are concerned."

For the past week the house has been arguing about this and yesterday decided it could be cut \$6,000,000,000—from \$37,500,000,000 to \$31,500,000,000.

"The Senate, still arguing, will vote pretty soon on how much it thinks the cut should be. It may decide on a cut of \$4,500,000,000."

Then House and Senate will get together, through a committee, and try to agree on a cut of—say—\$5,000,000,000.

Will that be law then? No. Won't that be the actual cut in the budget? No. That's just an estimated cut.

Neither House nor Senate yet has investigated to see how much it can cut each department. House and Senate are just guessing now.

Is this just oratory now? Pretty much. Except for this: by voting on an estimated cut now Congress is setting up a target to shoot at.

And for this reason: House and Senate committees, as

POLICE COUNT
L. A. VICTIMSFix Death Toll At
Fifteen; Others Ex-
pected To Die

Los Angeles—(AP)—After a night spent probing beneath glaring searchlights, police today fixed the death toll from the city's worst explosion in 37 years at 15. Of the 158 injured sufficiently to require hospitalization, several were feared dying.

The scene, as police and firemen shifted the blasted rubble of an electroplating plant, resembled somewhat a garishly lit night-time movie set. Except that there was nothing fictional about the carnage.

The one-story brick plant of the J. J. O'Connor Corp., a mile from the center of downtown Los Angeles, blew apart in a blinding flash of chemicals at 9:45 a. m. (PST) yesterday. But it was hours before a clear picture of the disaster could be pieced together.

Police and fire officials finally agreed that it was caused by the detonation of perchloric acid, an extremely unstable substance kept under pressure in refrigeration because at room temperature it is a seething, heavy liquid. But how the acid was set off remained a mystery.

Twelve fire companies battled the resultant blaze and a dozen spot fires started by flaming debris in the neighborhood.

A towering cloud of smoke, which many witnesses likened to that in newsreels of the Bikini atom bomb blast, mushroomed up, hung over the area for minutes.

Thousands of curious thronged into the area, hampering fire and rescue operations and doing some looting, but were cleared out by emergency police squads.

SOVIETS TALK
DEFENSE CUTSObservers Expect
New Low For Arm-
ed Forces Budget

Moscow—(AP)—Russia's Supreme Soviet (Parliament) scheduled debate today on a 1947 budget calling for the Soviet Union to devote only 18 per cent of her total budgeted expenditures to the armed forces, compared with 24 per cent last year.

Informed onlookers, judging by past performances, saw no reason why the budget should not pass both houses—the Council of Nationalities and the Council of the Union—as submitted by Finance Minister Arseni G. Zverev to a joint session last night.

Zverev recommended that the Soviet Union this year spend \$14,280,000,000. Of this, he proposed that \$2,571,428,571 be spent on defense. (The translation to U. S. currency is based on the official exchange rate of 5.3 rubles to the dollar.)

(President Truman has submitted a budget of \$37,500,000,000 for the United States in the fiscal year to start July 1. Of this, about \$11,200,000,000, or some 30 per cent, would be for defense. Congress now is in the process of trimming the President's budget.)

In 1946, before Germany invaded Russia, it was about 33 per cent; in 1943, some 60 per cent.

The bill would also let employers advance as a defense against the claims the contention that they acted in good faith. They could offer it in controversies involving the wage-hours act, the Walsh-Healey and the Cabot-Davis act establish working standards which must be observed on government contracts.

The burden of proof in claiming "good faith" would rest with the employer.

Chairman Michener (R-Mich.) said the committee approved the bill by a very large majority. Questioned further, he said that there was not a formal vote—not even a show of hands.

He said that, under present plans the measure is scheduled to reach the floor for action next Thursday.

The Senate judiciary committee met separately on its own version.

Mystery Man Is
Heavy Taxpayer

Chicago—(AP)—The Internal Revenue Office reports that business improved in 1946 for Mr. "ZYXW," a mysterious taxpayer.

Collector Nigel D. Campbell said that the department had received \$1,000 from a person who signed his name "ZYXW." Earlier he had written the collector that he was to make tax payments of \$1,700, and it would be sent in four separate envelopes.

"ZYXW" is not a newcomer at the tax office. He has been sending in payments for the last seven years, with only the initials on a blank income tax form as a mark of identification. His first contribution was \$300. Last year he sent in \$700.

Last year the Senate confirmed the promotion of Killian and 348 others to colonel but recalled the action when advised of the charges then pending against him in England.

Their aim was some sort of agreement among themselves on how to establish a world government, and just what kind of an organization it should be.

They frankly admitted they faced a huge job. Some said privately that concrete accomplishments in the field probably were a generation or more away.

Some 16 assorted World Government groups from all parts of the United States have delegates here. Although it is the first time that so many of the various U. S. movements have been brought together under one roof, they are already generally agreed upon one thing:

The government of the world should be federal in form.

That means it would have just as much power as the individual nations would give it. It could do nothing except certain specific things delegated to it by the nations.

One of those things which apparently the groups will be able to agree upon is the control of all weapons of mass destruction. Other suggestions due for discussion include the supervision of universal disarmament, control and direction of international trade, international labor and the like.

Just how many of the specific powers of the government should be named at this stage of the proceedings is not at all settled.

The groups are pretty well agreed that this Federal World Government should be set up with a popularly-elected legislative body to make law, a judiciary to interpret it and an executive branch to administer it.

Reuther Takes Stand Before
Senate Labor Group Hearing

Washington—(AP)—Walter Reuther, CIO United Auto Workers president, said today that enactment of proposed labor legislation now before Congress "inevitably will cause industrial conflict."

Reuther told the Senate Labor Committee that wages have depreciated to a point below that required to provide auto industry workers "with a decent living."

There is "nothing," he said, in pending legislation which would give workers a "sense of security or that will avert the industrial conflict that will inevitably grow out of this situation if it is not corrected."

Reuther described the measures being considered as "punitive and negative" and said the falling of all such legislation "is that it attacks symptoms rather than removes root causes."

Among specific bills before the committee, Reuther opposed those which would outlaw industry-wide collective bargaining and the closed shop; make unions suable in federal courts; overhaul the Wagner Labor Relations Act; prohibit collection of union dues by the check-off system; and require "cooling-off" periods before strikes.

The UAW chief said "human security is the only basis for economic stability and no legislation of the sort you are considering, no matter how carefully prepared or well intended, is a substitute for positive, constructive action that will remove the causes of insecurity."

Reuther contended that pending legislation is "negative" although committee members have said that labor itself has failed to cooperate with Congress and is taking a "defeatist" attitude.

Reuther said that several times

in the last nine months both he and President Philip Murray of the CIO have proposed a national labor management conference "to work out a joint program to overcome economic and production difficulties threatening the economy of the nation."

He said these proposals have gone unheeded by management.

"If these laws are passed," Reuther said, "industry will learn to its sorrow that the process you have

started will not stop with the mere regimentation of labor," it will "extend to all other sections of our society."

Reuther said the average auto worker, despite a "substantial increase in cash wages," today earns "six cents an hour less in terms of buying power than he did in 1940."

Mr. Barney pointed out that ten years of experience had demonstrated the feasibility of extension of coverage to the groups now without the protection under this insurance program.

A third major recommendation calls for changes in the method by which old-age and survivors insurance benefits are figured to increase the amount of the benefits, particularly for low-paid workers. The general level of benefits should be raised, the report states, largely because of increased living costs.

Other recommendations call for increasing from \$3,000 to \$3,600 a year the wages that may be credited to the account of any worker, thus expanding the basis for determination of benefits. An increase in the amount of earnings a beneficiary may receive in covered employment without having benefits suspended is also proposed.

The report recommends reduction of the qualifying age for all women beneficiaries from 65 to 60 years.

Mr. Barney said that the war years proved that the majority of Americans prefer jobs to insurance benefits or assistance. "Assurance of a basic minimum protection in adversity stimulates, rather than destroys, the interest of individuals in making what additional provision they can for themselves," he added.

Proof of this statement is found in the fact that 800,000 men and women 65 years old or over who are fully insured and eligible for old age insurance benefits, are still on the job.

PREMIER GASPERI KISSES 300 HANDS BEFORE GIVING UP

Washington—Premier Alcide de Gasperi of Italy bowed low and kissed the hands of some 300 ladies before he gave up. Earlier he had warmly embraced Fiorella La Guardia, former UNRRA director.

When the guests—3,000 in all—continued to file by, he finally decided that the old American custom of plain handshaking was good enough.

The premier, a rather wan but courtly gentleman stood in the receiving line with his hosts, the Italian Ambassador and Signora Tarchioni, for more than 2 1/2 hours at a reception in his honor at the Italian embassy.

Also in the receiving line were his shy, 22-year-old daughter, Maria Romana, and the Tarchioni twin daughters, Dora in red and Letizia in blue.

It was the first big party at the embassy since before the war and one of the most impressive of the capital's social season. A cross section of Washington's social and political big-names had been invited.

For some reason or other, guests were not required to show their invitations. It was everybody's guess that a lot of gate-crashing took place.

Signora Tarchioni, an aristocratic and handsome woman wearing a new Paris gown of heavy apple green satin, pearl and diamond earrings and pearl necklace, cheerfully admitted she didn't know how many had been invited.

The ambassador, as he left with the premier to go on to a stag dinner given by Secretary of State James Byrnes, had trouble finding his hat. Although the receiving line had long before broken up, a lot of guests still hung around. They wound up polishing off the fine Canadian liquor in the stately dining room.

It wasn't the food that kept them. Buffets had long before been cleared of the scant platters of paper thin sandwiches. A lot of Washingtonians who count on getting their evening meals at embassy receptions were bitterly disappointed.

minister and enforce it. Technical aspects of these branches are not likely to come up for discussion at this time.

There are two general ideas on how to put such a government into operation:
1. By working through the United Nations, as provided in its charter.
2. By working outside the United Nations through a world constitutional convention.

Those who want to work through the U.N. suggest it could be done in two ways: either by amendment, or by a conference to revise the charter which can be called at any time at the request of two-thirds of the member nations.

These advocates would do away with the veto power and substitute a representative legislative assembly for the present General UN Assembly.

Those who would work outside the UN suggest a world constitutional convention called by the governments, or a people's world convention to draft a world constitution which would then be submitted to the individual governments.

they've always done in the past, will go on and hold long hearings. They'll call a parade of government officials and department heads to explain why their department's need as much money as the President's budget said they do.

Through these hearings, or investigations, the committees will decide how much it's safe to cut each department.

Then the committees will recommend to the full House and Senate how much it thinks each department really needs.

The full Congress will then vote, one by one, on money for each

department.
It won't know, until it's voted the last bit of money, maybe sometime next June, how much money it's voted altogether to run the government.

Isn't it possible then that Congress will wind up finding it hasn't cut government expenses very much below Mr. Truman's estimate?

Possible, but not likely. This is why:

By agreeing at this time on an estimate of how much they think the cut should be, the full House and Senate are putting an obligation on all the committees to turn government expenses severely.

That's the target the full Congress is setting up for itself by voting on an estimate now, long before the committees finish their work.

Congress is taking a chance of putting itself on the spot by all this, but, in the end, winds up cutting only a little, the voters may feel Congress talked one thing but did another.

So, as some congressmen explain it, the estimated cuts agreed upon now are putting a moral obligation on Congress to make those estimates real.

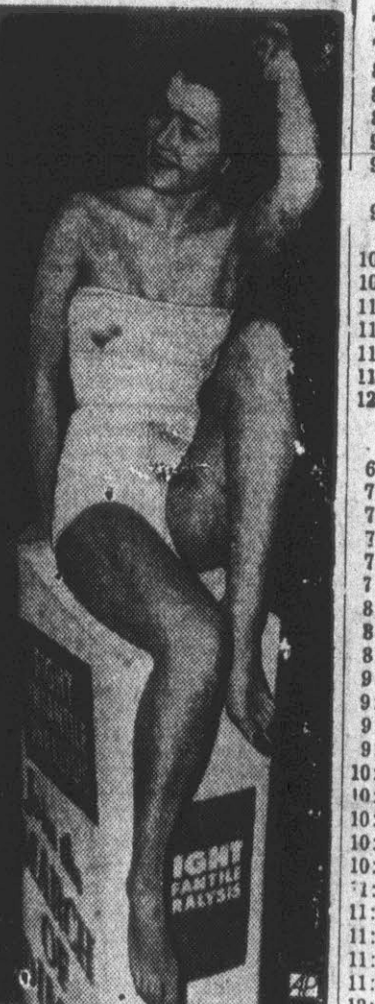
Beau Jack Aims For Welterweight Spot
