Adjournment Date Set For Assembly

Word Is Out That Legislature Must Wind Up Session Midnight Of April 4; Big Money Committees Spur Work; Statewide Liquor Referendums Lose Favor

Raleigh.—(AP)—With gubernatorial approval and direction, legislative leaders sent word "down the line" today that final adjournment of the 1947 session must come by midnight on April 4, and that adjournment by April 1 would be preferred.

Until today, it had been considered that the session would not adjourn until mid-April and perhaps the first of May.

After a lagged start, with both branches proceeding slowly on what were considered secondary bills, the big money committees in the last few days have speeded up their work.

With a heavily balanced budget account, this assembly will appropriate almost \$355,000,000.

Senator Gray of Forsyth, head of the Senate finance committee, told the Senate that his committee had voted unfavorably on the Penny anti-liquor bill, but that the Chaffin measure, also providing a statewide referendum, had been withheld from formal report. The committee yesterday voted to report the Chaffin measure unfavorable, but Gray said today he did not want to make a formal report pending Mr. Chaffin's expressions before the committee.

The closed shop issue, however, still was very much before the lawmakers after a public hearing yesterday.

In addition to Josephus Daniels Dean M. T. Van Hecke of the University of North Carolina law school, and prominent labor leaders, those opposing the closed shop ban included Sam Hall of Winston-Salem, chairman of the Carolina district of the communist party.

The measure now pending is more enlightened considerably yesterday when the joint appropriations committee voted to add a total of \$6,155,000 to the biennial appropriations measure so as to make a total of \$25,758,724 available during the biennium for 30 per cent salary increases.

Other state employees, however, were not so happy. The committee decided to leave them with a 20 per cent pay boost as originally proposed by Governor Cherry and the Advisory Budget Commission.

British Troops Uncover Arms

Jerusalem.—(AP)—British troops arrested 21 more persons suspected of terrorism and uncovered at least two arms caches in searches of three small Jewish towns outside the martial law areas today.

Unofficial sources described some of the suspects as known members of the Jewish underground organizations, Irgun Zvai Leumi and the Stern Gang.

The arrests brought to 46 the total number of suspects detained since martial law was imposed Sunday upon a large section of the Jewish population. All were described by the British as "known terrorists," and all were believed to have been detained at the Latrun detention camp. Police denied reports that some had been flown to Kenya colony.

ISLAND BASES ISSUE BRINGS PEACE IN U. N.

"One - Big - Happy - Family" Atmosphere Replaces Former Bitter Debates

Lake Success, N.Y.—(AP)—All appeared to be sweetness and light today for a change in the United Nations Security Council, where the United States Pacific Island trusteeship plan was up for discussion.

The big-happy-family atmosphere representing a sharp contrast with the recent bitter debates on atomic control, was surprised acceptance of the terms of the American proposal to place the Japanese mandates under the U. N. with the United States as sole administrator.

Most of the 11 delegates had speeches ready for the meeting, but it was generally expected there would be no major conflict.

The apparent trend of this new-found unanimity was toward early approval of the American plan, or at worst merely a delay for legal reasons. As for any postponement, the United States has made it clear that it will stay on the islands regardless.

Any objections appeared centered around technicalities and the time question.

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Decision On Greece Is Up To President

Armed Marines, Sailors and Police Take Possession Of U. S. Liberty Ship After Captain Announces Sailing Plans

Washington.—(AP)—President Truman, back at his desk for a single day between trips, today faced the task of spelling out for a waiting Congress his ideas on America's role in other nations' affairs.

The Chief Executive flew back to Washington last night after a three-day goodwill mission to Mexico and a stop off at Baylor University to tell this country that "we have reached a turning point in history."

Tomorrow the Chief Executive leaves for a 15-day Caribbean cruise.

But immediately ahead lies the problem of Greece and the three choices of the plight of that country leaves for the United States:

(1) Direct intervention with money and materials to safeguard shaky European countries resisting communist pressure; (2) a half way course of supplying relief on the basis of non-interference in their internal affairs, or (3) withdrawal of a policy of strict non-interference.

Congress was clearly awaiting the Administration's statement which Secretary of State Marshall said only Mr. Truman could make because of the "transcendent" problem involved.

Self-Determination

Right Of Self-Government For Small Nations Recognized By U. S. In Protest To Moscow Over Interference With Hungary's Established Government

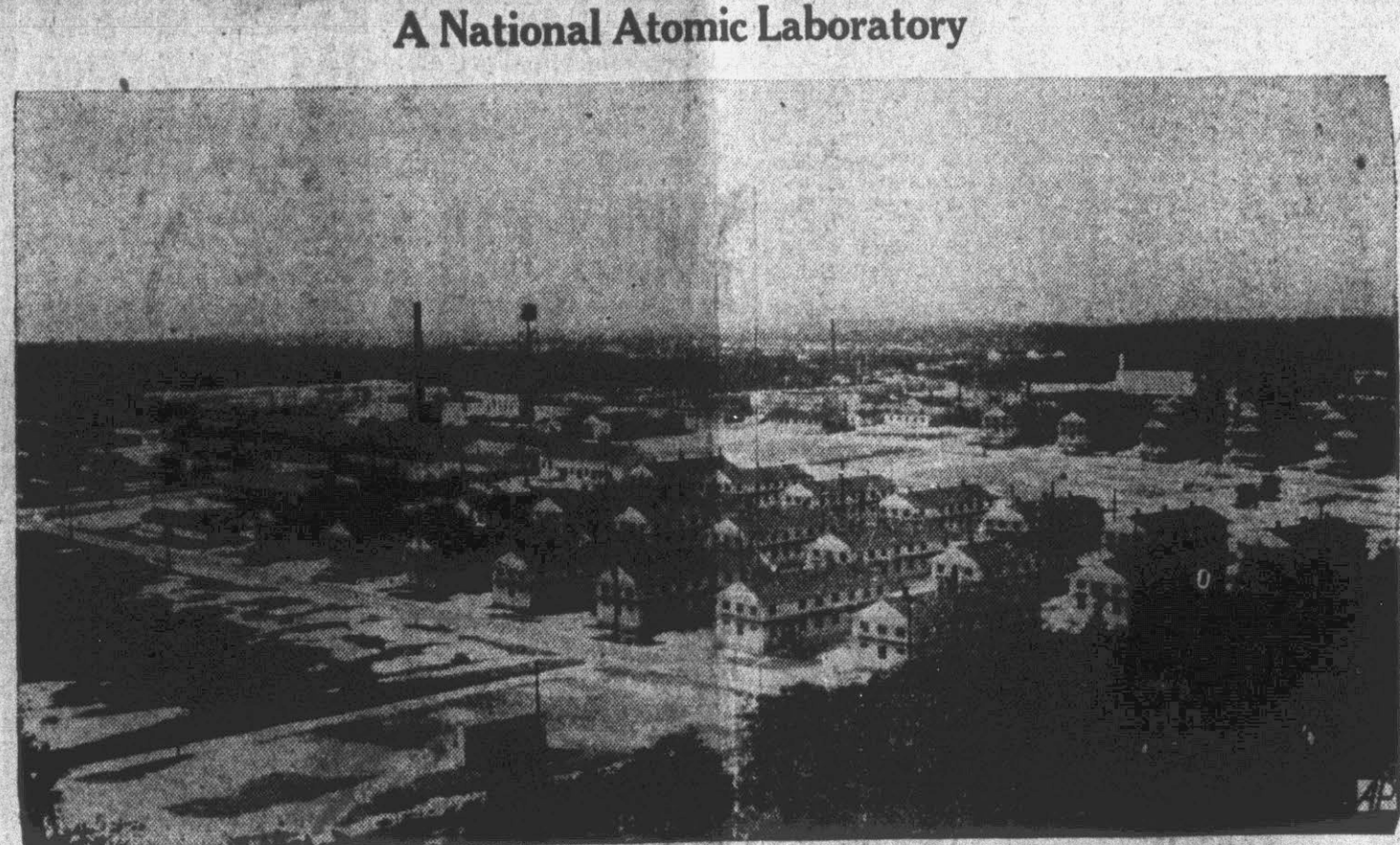
Among the latest hot international developments is the blunt charge by the American government that Russia has caused a political crisis in Hungary by "unjustified interference" in the internal affairs of the Danubian country. This accusation is contained in a sharp note which the U. S. State Department has delivered not only to the Soviet government and its military governor in Budapest, but to Britain and Hungary.

The note cites the arrest of Bela Kovacs, a deputy in the Hungarian Parliament, by Russian occupation forces. Until recently Kovacs was Secretary General of the Small-holders Party, the moderate majority group in Parliament, which the Communists and other parties have tried to oust. The Russians alleged that he "actively participated in the formation of subversive and anti-Soviet terror groups."

Washington deems the charge against Kovacs "unwarranted." The note says the effect of this interference in Hungarian affairs "will be to support the efforts of a small group in Hungary to substitute a minority dictatorship for a responsible administration representative of the will of the Hungarian people as expressed in free and untrammeled elections. The United States government is opposed to this attempt to nullify the electoral mandate given by the Hungarian people."

This means that the United States is determined to continue its efforts to protect weak-determination. Whether it will have better luck in this case than in the Polish elections of January remains to be seen. Poland was moved into the Soviet camp by baiting which both America and Britain repeatedly protested as conducted under coercion that precluded the rightful registration of the anti-Communist vote. The Communist dominated Polish government replied that the elections were Poland's private affair—and Moscow concurred in this. A measure of Uncle Sam's determination is seen in the fact that the Hungarian note is issued as Secretary of State Marshall is en route to Moscow to attend the Big Four Foreign Ministers' Conference. Apparently those broad shoulders of the famous soldier are well equipped to carry the burden.

Postponed

Washington.—(AP)—The Senate Atomic Energy Committee today postponed until Monday its vote on confirmation of David E. Lilienthal and other nominees to the Atomic Energy Commission.

Chairman Hickenlooper (R-Iowa) said the delay was agreed upon to permit "some members" whom he did not identify—to clarify some questions.

The committee will vote Monday at 10 a. m., he told reporters who had waited outside the committee room for almost two and a half hours on previous assurance that a vote was expected today.

NEW SENATORS DEMAND VOICE

GOP "Freshmen" Want More Share In Shaping Of Policies

Washington.—(AP)—Sixteen Republican freshmen senators today demanded a greater voice in shaping GOP legislative policies and promptly won a promise of more frequent party conferences.

Senator Millikin (R-Colo.), chairman of the Republican conference, said a reporter he was "tired of death to call party conferences more often to discuss pending issues, as the 16 first terms proposed in a letter to the Colorado senator.

Senator Dworshak (R-Idaho), one of the signers of the letter, told newsmen the freshmen feel a little bit dissatisfied that we don't know more about party policies.

In their letter to Millikin, the 16 said they believed more frequent conferences would help toward greater unity and understanding and consequently greater expedition in the enactment of our legislative program.

The letter, addressed to Millikin in the handwriting of Senator Baldwin (R-Conn.), was signed by Baldwin and 15 others. With it, Baldwin sent a note to Millikin saying that the freshmen were voicing any criticism of the conference chairman.

Indian Riotings Destroy Bazaars

New Delhi.—(AP)—The All-India radio broadcast today a report that our main bazaars, or Indian shopping districts, have been burned down in Amritsar, new center of internecine in the religious and political difficulties of Punjab province.

Earlier reports said at least 27 persons had been killed and more than 100 injured since Wednesday in communal rioting in Amritsar, 40 miles east of the provincial capital of Lahore.

Marshall In Berlin For Short Study On Reich

Secretary Of State Makes Further Preparation For Moscow Talks; French Views Discussed While In Paris

Berlin.—(AP)—Secretary of State Marshall arrived in Paris at 4:52 p. m. today (10:52 a. m. EST). Here he will get a first hand account from occupation authorities of conditions in his country—further preparation for his part in U. S. spokesman in drafting German and Austrian treaties at the Moscow four-power foreign ministers' meeting.

Foreign Minister Georges Bidault of Britain and others in the U. S. delegation also were Moscow bound. Bevin's special train left Warsaw and a U. S. plane bearing Republican foreign affairs expert John Foster Dulles reached Berlin yesterday about the time Marshall arrived at Orly Field in Paris.

The recently appointed U. S. Secretary of State talked with U. S. Ambassador Jefferson Caffery, and French Premier Paul Ramadier President Vincent Auriol and acting foreign minister Paul Henri Tetet.

He spent 40 minutes with Ramadier. Last night Auriol and key cabinet ministers gave a dinner for him at the presidential residence.

Marshall, a leader of the allied effort to defeat Hitler as U. S. war time chief of staff, was shown embassy documents and given other information bearing on the French viewpoint on what to do with Germany.

The French proposals included a four-power treaty against German aggression—such as suggested by James P. Byrnes when he was U. S. secretary of state; international economic control of the industrial Ruhr, and a French economic tieup with the coal-rich Saar.

Top assistants with Marshall are Charles E. Bohlen, Benjamin V. Cohen and Marshall Carter. The group, left Washington Wednesday and came to Europe by way of Bermuda and the Azores.

U.S. Diplomat Criticized By Warsaw Gov't

Warsaw.—(AP)—The Polish government today accused U. S. Ambassador Arthur Bliss Lane of launching an anti-Polish campaign in the United States "harmful to Polish-American relations," and criticized the envoy for statements made on his recent arrival in New York.

The spokesman said that, before leaving Warsaw, Lane agreed to the formation of a Polish-American commission to determine the nationality and rights of persons held in Polish jails claiming American citizenship, and he added that delay in beginning the work of such a commission could not be laid to the Poles.

Byrd Ships Put In At Wellington On Trip Home

Wellington, New Zealand.—(AP)—Three thousand men of the Navy's Antarctic Expedition, now homeward bound, had their first taste of civilization in three months today when three ships put in at Wellington.

The ships are the U. S. M. Olympus, expedition's flagship, and the icebreakers North Wind and Burton Island, which were with the central task group.

Admirals Richard E. Byrd and Richard Cruzen, leaders of the South Polar journey, received official visits of Wellington authorities and then called on Prime Minister Peter Frazier and American Minister A. M. Warren.

Admiral Byrd told a news conference that Antarctica is "the most valuable place in the world scientifically, especially for links in the evolutionary processes."

Prepare Offensive To Stamp Out Bands

Athens.—(AP)—Press reports quoting a military source said today that preparations for an all-out campaign to stamp out guerrillas in Greece are under way but there was no indication when the offensive would begin.

These reports said the operations would involve the use of fighter and bomber planes and warships as well as infantrymen.

Lewis On Stand Before Senators

LEWIS YET TO WIN CONTRACT WITH OWNERS

New Agreement Must Be Made By June 30; "Up To Lewis" Says Operator

Washington.—(AP)—John Lewis still has a tough battle ahead to win a contract with the soft coal operators.

The Supreme Court decision in his contempt case did, however, clear a major obstacle in the way of negotiations—union and operator preoccupation with the big legal battle.

Whitless off-shoot of that battle will continue—over Lewis' right to end his current wage pact with the government—the fact remains that under present law the mines will revert to their private owners June 30.

Hence both sides are aware that a new agreement will have to be hammered out before then if a new shutdown is to be averted.

There was no clear indication which side, if either, would take the initiative, although one operator spokesman here said he thinks it

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UMW Leader Is Witness In Senate Labor Hearing; Has "No Suggestion" On How To Prevent Future Coal Strikes; Says Gov't Interference "Blackjacking" Union

Washington.—(AP)—John L. Lewis told the Senate labor committee today that he has no suggestions at this time on how to prevent another nationwide coal strike.

The United Mine Workers leader made that statement in answer to a question by Chairman Taft (R-Ohio). Lewis suggested to the committee that the miners' differences with coal operators could be settled if the government would cease using a blackjack.

In answer to Taft's query whether he has any suggestions for preventing a miners' strike, Lewis said: "No, I don't. That's a matter of litigation before the court. I don't if the government would cease using this time."

The mine leader referred to an action pending in federal court, as to whether he has the right to terminate his union's contract with the government, which has been operating the mines.

Taft asked what would happen to the mines and production when the government relinquished control of

CENSURE MOVE BY CHURCHILL

Motion, If Approved, May Overthrow Labor Government

London.—(AP)—Britain's Labor Government, having surmounted a determined effort by Winston Churchill to block its plans for getting out of India in 15 months, faced a new conservative attack today over the nation's economic plight.

Voted down, 337 to 185, in his fight against a government decision to terminate British rule in India by June, 1948, Churchill promised, nevertheless, that he would offer his long-threatened motion of censure against Prime Minister Attlee's government next Wednesday, at the end of three days debate on the nation's serious economic situation.

Despite the fact that on a straight party vote the abortive lopsided majority would ensure a government victory, there appeared to be enough discontent among party followers to cause the government to send out a "three line whip," its most urgent summons, requiring Labor members to be on hand for the crucial vote.

Chief Executive Back At His Desk Before Caribbean Cruise; Three Choices Present In Fixing Greek Relief Policy

Aboard the U. S. Martin Behrman, Batavia.—(AP)—Sixty Dutch Marines, sailors and civil police took physical possession of the American Liberty ship Martin Behrman and her disputed cargo today shortly after Capt. Rudy Gray of Southport, N. C., had announced his intention to sail for the United States.

Gray, charging that control of the ship had been wrested from him "forcefully by armed men" who overpowered his mate when the latter attempted to stop them, immediately left the vessel. The Dutch—with the aid of tugs—moved her at once to another dock preparatory to removing the cargo, which was loaded in Republican Java in defiance of Dutch regulations.

The crew remained aboard under Gray's orders but refused to assist in moving the ship or discharging its cargo.

Today's developments, which followed by 48 hours a State Department protest to the Hague over the regulations under which the Behrman had been detained here, began when Gray asked the American consulate for clearance papers.

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The Tax Estimate

Who Files An Estimate Of Their 1947 Tax And Makes The First Of Four Payments On March 15? Farmers Have Special Ruling; Correcting Of Estimate

Editors note: This is the eleventh of 12 stories explaining who must do what about his income tax returns.

Washington.—(AP)—March 15 is the deadline for filing a final return on 1946 income and paying whatever tax is still due.

Most people, when they've done that, won't have anything further to do until March 15, 1948, when they settle up on 1947 taxes.

That's because most people make under \$5,000 and full 1947 tax will be withheld from wages and salaries under \$5,000 in 1947.

But several million people won't have the full tax—or any tax— withheld from them in 1947. That's because:

They'll make over \$5,000 or will have the kind of income from which tax isn't withheld.

So March 15 will be a deadline for them, too. By that date—

They must file an estimate of their 1947 tax and make the first of four payments on the difference between the tax withheld (if any) and the estimated full 1947 tax.

(The other three payments are due June 15, Sept. 15, and Jan. 15, 1948.)

Three kinds of people will have to do this. You're one of them—

1. If your income from wages or salary in 1947 will be more than \$5,000, plus \$500 for each exemption besides your own.

2. If you expect to make \$500 or more income from which no tax is withheld—such as a landlord with rents or a doctor with fees—you'll have to file an estimate of your total 1947 income and the tax on it and start paying the tax.

3. If you'll have income of more than \$100 from which no tax is withheld—in addition to income from which tax is withheld—and if the two incomes total \$500 or more—you'll have to file an estimate and make the first payment on the difference between the tax withheld and the full tax due.

If husband and wife both have incomes large enough to require an estimate, both must make it, separately or jointly.

At the end of 1947 they can decide whether they want to make their final return jointly or separately.

If you don't have to file an estimate, you can skip this story. (Continued on Page Four)

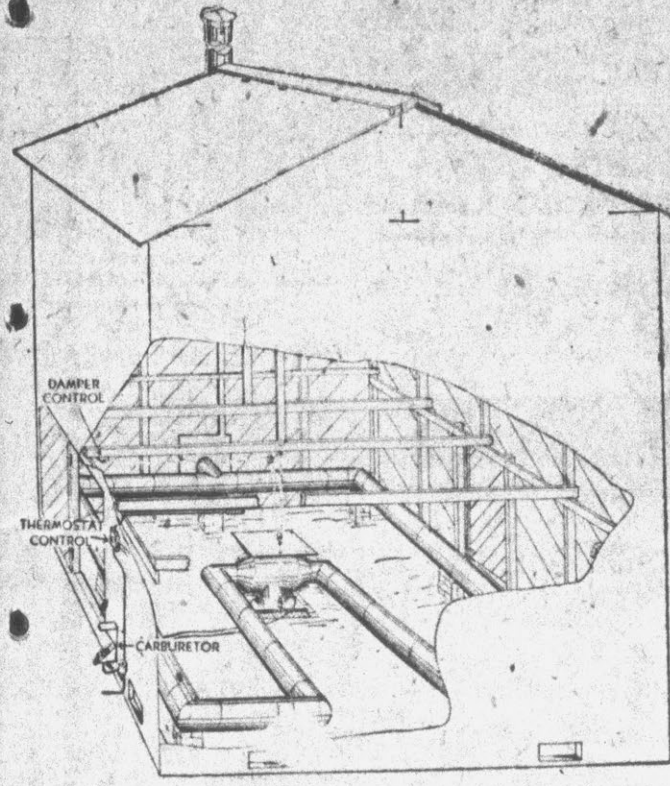

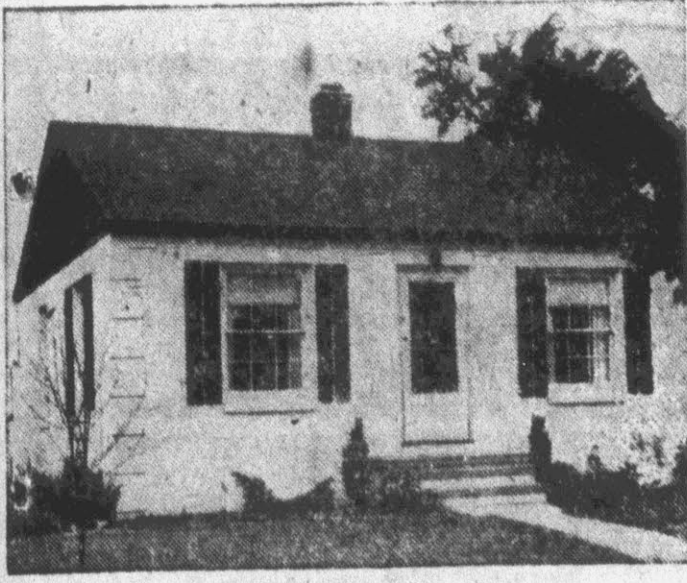

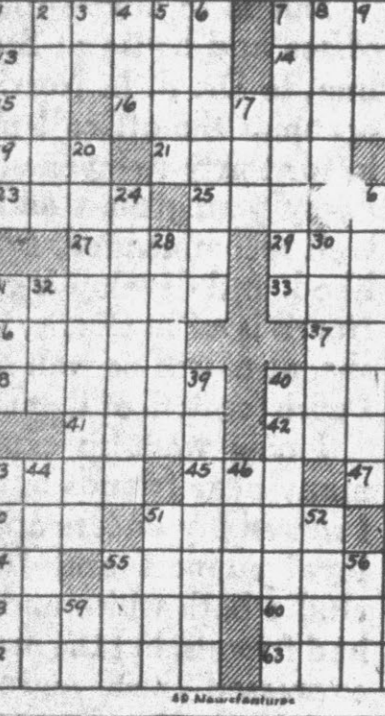

"The order was passed on by me," he told the British military court trying him for war crimes. "I accept the entire responsibility. I cannot understand why Gen. Von Mackensen has been sentenced to death in this matter, because if there is any guilt it is mine and mine alone."

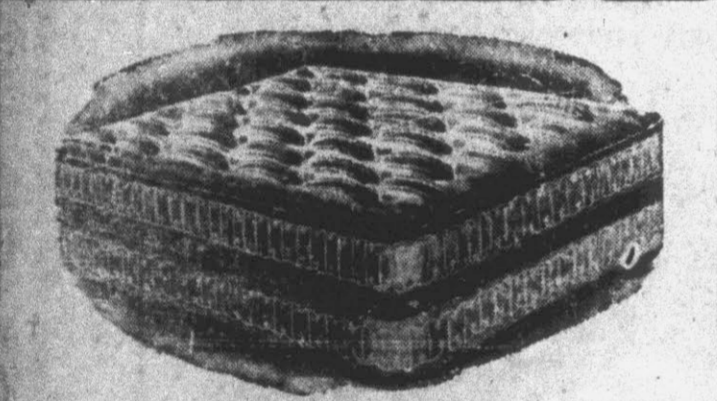

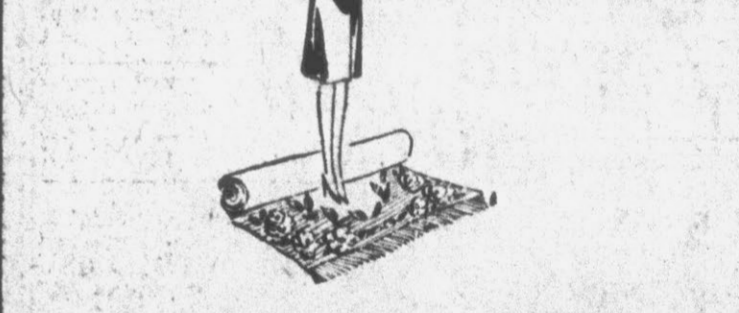
