COCKTAIL CIRCUIT FAILS TO SNARE BY STATE 'TROT'

Washington — The capital's "cocktail circuit" has its cap set for a young bachelor, John J. Kennedy, but it's in for somewhat of a disappointment.

The handsome, 29-year-old, six-foot son of wealthy former Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy is all-engrossed in his job as representative from Massachusetts' 11th district. It's going to be all politics and little play, he says.

Kennedy, who calls himself a "liberal democrat," is a freshman in the 80th Congress and reluctant to talk. Uppermost in his mind, however, are worries about the danger of another depression and another war.

To ward off the first danger he says government has got to play a measurable part.

"Private enterprise," he says, "cannot be completely private."

As a P-T boat commander in the Pacific during the war, young John, better known as "Jack," was decorated for heroism in directing the rescue of his crew after the craft was sunk by the Japanese.

Now, he says, "We can only pray that man's political skill can keep abreast of his scientific skill. If not, we may yet live to see World War III."

Even before the United States entered the war, Jack saw it in England as a member of his father's embassy staff.

At 23, he wrote a book — "Why England Slept" — a study of the failure of the British rearmament policy.

He inherited his political aptitudes from a long line of family Democrats.

Jack Kennedy believes the Democratic party is working out a positive program and he is not disturbed over Republican victories in the November elections.

"If you have free elections, you're bound to get defeated now and then," he says, adding that such upsets are a good thing, putting new spirit into a party.

The young congressman was born in Boston, May 29, 1917. He attended London School of Economics in 1935 and 1936 and was graduated from Harvard College with a B.S. in Law in 1940. He served in the Navy from 1941 to 1945. He decided to go into politics while in a navy hospital.

One of nine children—the eldest, Joe, died during the war—Jack is

the first to follow the footsteps of his forebears.

Jack, who looks even younger than he is, stands unassumingly tell. He has kind of a dusty tan, an effect probably caused by freckles. His blonde hair always seems to need cutting.

He was selected by the Junior Chamber of Commerce as one of the nation's 10 outstanding young men of 1946. Massachusetts democrats already are talking about him as a possible party leader in the Day State.

Cottinier from Page One: tainly, we are between two fires. If we don't do it, Europe will go communist; while if we loan too much, unemployment will develop in the U. S. and strengthen communism here at home.

Self Reliance—An Ideal
It would be unhealthy for any nation to acquire the feeling that it can always turn to us for material aid. A nation strengthens itself as it works out its own difficulties. The ravages of war have made it necessary for the United States to send food to many nations. Germany, Austria, India and China are among the most hungry today, having more than 20 per cent cut in their normal diet. They are worse off than France, Italy or even Greece.

Among the defeated nations it is important to create domestic self-sufficiency lest they become a permanent drain on the resources of others. MacArthur is wisely asking Washington to allow the Japanese funds for enough shipbuilding to permit a revival of their fishing industry. He also believes that limitations on Japanese industry should be lifted, to help Japan work toward domestic self-sufficiency at least.

How to Raise Needed Funds
The real question is not whether we send these hundreds of millions abroad as President Hoover recommends. We simply must do so or some day the entire world will gang up against us. We, in the U. S., cannot long continue living the "life of Riley" while the rest of the world is on the verge of starvation. The

Here's what the figures show:
By June, 1946, living costs had risen only 33.3 per cent over 1935-39. By December, 1946—with OPA at but dead—they had soared to 53.3 percent over 1935-39.

By Feb. 1947—as noted—they had dropped from the 53.3 per cent peak of last December to 53 per cent. The bureau said last night food prices for the 30 days ending Feb. 15 had dropped about 3-4 of 1 per cent from the previous month.

zore was concerned, and Gen. Mark W. Clark, U.S. deputy, for the Austrian treaty, agreed this was proper under the Potsdam agreement.

The Russian then blocked a French proposal to draft an Austrian treaty clause requiring Austria to recognize the validity of the Potsdam agreement and facilitate "legal transfer of title to German assets. On this point Goussay said that unless the Western powers recognize that German assets already acquired by the Soviet Union had been transferred legally, no progress was possible on the whole issue.

Negro Home Demonstration News

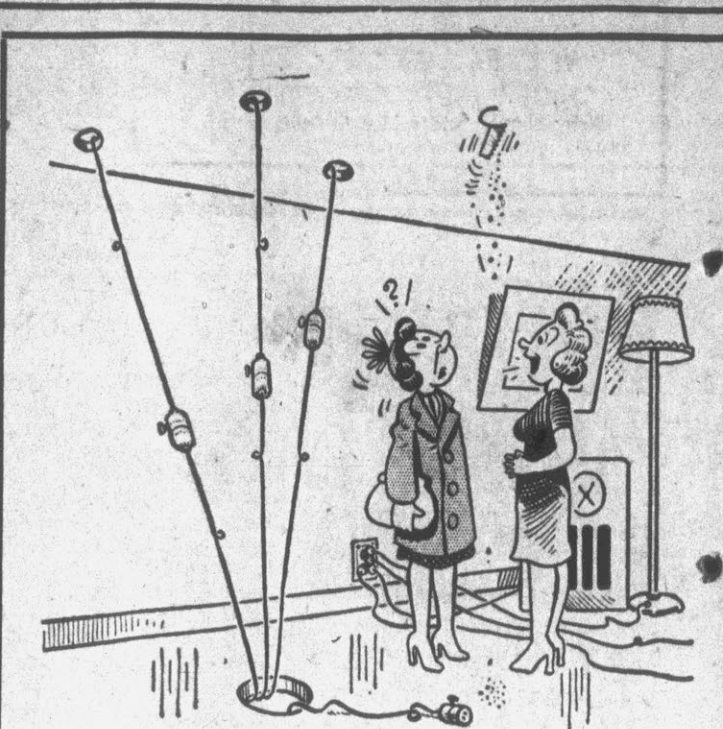
After the usual business session, Miss Clay presented a demonstration on Finishes For The Dress.

Those who had articles on display in the clothing exhibit were: Joanna Streatar, Rosa Lee Andrews and Doris Slade.



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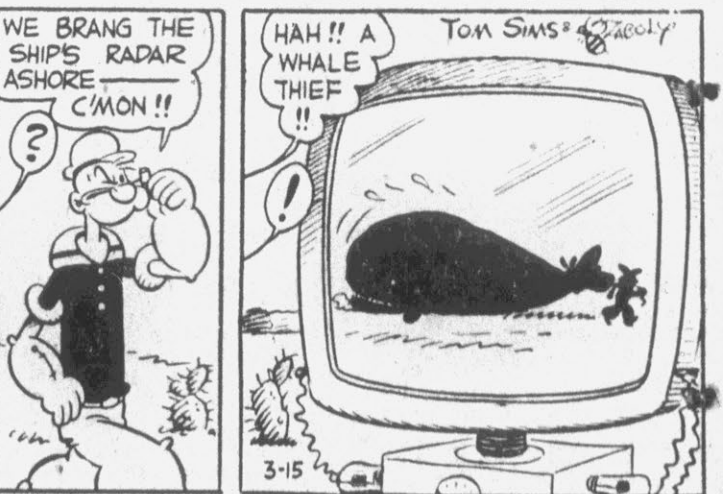
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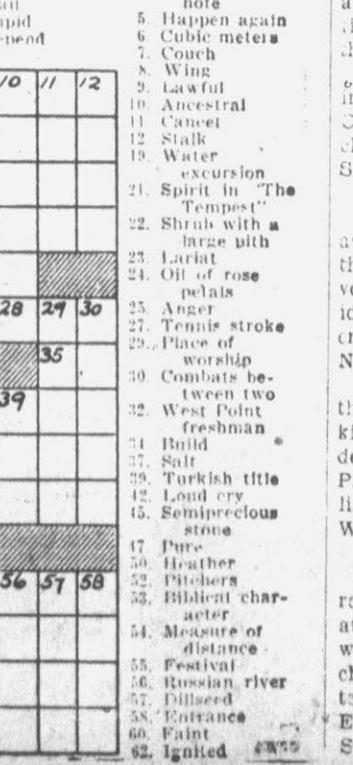


Crossword Puzzle

French Feuding With Bulgaria, Expel Newsmen
Paris—(AP)—France broke off commercial negotiations with Bulgaria today and expelled two Bulgarian newspapermen from the country on 48 hours notice in retaliation for incidents at Sofia which resulted in the expulsion of a woman reporter for the French press agency.
The Foreign Office also said special privileges accorded all foreign journalists in France had been withdrawn from eight other Bulgarian newspaper men. They will be permitted to continue filing dispatches to their newspapers, however.
The Foreign Office also reported that Giorgi Marinov, Bulgarian minister to Paris, had left two days ago for Sofia, presumably for consultation after the Greek government had asked the War Crimes Commission in London to list Marinov as a war criminal. The incidents, however, were not connected.

Learn Identity Of Auto Victim
Statesville, N. C.—(AP)—A young woman who was found dying on the Hickory highway near here early Wednesday has been identified as Pansy Webb Sisk, 22, of the Hillfield section of McDowell county. Identification was made by the woman's brother, Roy Sisk, who said his sister had left home on March 7.
A coroner's jury investigating her death yesterday recommended that J. E. Johnson, 53-year-old taxicab driver, be held on manslaughter charges. The jury's recommendation came after testimony by W. W. Wilkinson and Highway Patrolman J. A. Reeves.
Reeves told the jury that the front fender and bumper of Johnson's automobile were bent and that a piece of cloth, identified as part of the coat worn by the girl, was found on the underside of the car.

A-Bombed Warship Towed From Bikini
Honolulu—(AP)—Two tugs brought the old battleship New York, still radioactive eight months after the Bikini atomic bomb tests, into Pearl Harbor today at the end of a tow line.
It took the tugs 20 days to bring the New York from Kwajalein in the biggest and longest towing job of its kind ever undertaken. The 30,000-ton battleship was listing to port from the effects of the second underwater atomic bomb test.

Rebel Paraguayans Join In Open Battle
Asuncion, Paraguay—(AP)—Insurgents based in Concepcion were reported without confirmation today to have joined battle with loyal government troops and to have enlarged their forces and range of operations through an indicated area 100 miles wide.
The government said last night that loyalist planes had "bombed rebel military objectives" outside Concepcion. Paraguay river city some 150 miles north of this capital.

Clearer Weather Is Promised Louisiana
New Orleans—(AP)—The United States Weather Bureau promised a spell of clear weather for Louisiana today, after a storm which left at least two dead, flooded a number of communities in the southern part of the state, and caused many thousands of dollars of damage to crops.

Chinese Refuse To Enter Moscow Talks
Nanking—(AP)—The Chinese foreign office said in a press release today that "the Chinese Government has refused. It is authoritatively learned, to accept" a proposal made at Moscow that the Big Three consider China's problems, with China participating.
A proposal to exchange reports on China in line with the Big Three's Moscow agreement of Dec. 19, 1945, was said to be unacceptable because China was not a party to the agreement and because it involved China's internal problems.
