Lewis Retracts Termination Note

UMW President Complicates With Supreme Court Mandate... Lewis today withdrew his contract termination notice to the government effective March 31 in compliance with a Supreme Court mandate.

Lewis sent a 20-word letter to Secretary of Interior Krug announcing that the notice which he had given Krug last Nov. 15 "is hereby unconditionally withdrawn."

It was this notice of contract termination that touched off a 17-day strike last fall.

Lewis called off that strike until March 31. His action today thus apparently erases the possibility of renewal of the work stoppage at the end of this month.

Without a contract, the miners historically do not work.

Thus, Lewis' action continues to force the contract he signed with Krug late last spring after the government had set the mines to end a 59-day stoppage.

It was this contract that Lewis sought to end last fall. The government obtained an order from Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough directing Lewis and his miners to call off a strike that followed in November.

When Lewis refused, he and the miners were held guilty of contempt. Lewis was fined \$10,000 and the United Mine Workers were fined \$3,000,000. The Supreme Court upheld the contempt convictions and Lewis' fine.

The court, however, directed that the union fine be reduced to \$700,000, provided Lewis withdraw his notice ending the contract with the government within five days after issuance of the Supreme Court mandate.

Subsequently, on petition of the government, the Supreme Court speeded effectiveness of its order. Its mandate is to be filed with the federal district court tomorrow.

Thus, by obeying the court order today, Lewis saves the mine union a possible additional fine of \$2,800,000.

Turks Jubilant Over Visit Of U.S. Warships

Istanbul—(AP)—Restrained jubilation crept through typical Oriental calm today as Turks learned officially that an American naval force will steam through the Dardanelles next month, the third such visit in Turkish waters within a year.

"America is backing up words with action," said one typical middle class Turk. "I am a Turk and I love it."

U. S. Ambassador Edwin G. Wilson spent nearly two hours with Premier Recep Peker last night on the eve of his departure for Washington to give President Truman an announcement of Turkish reaction to the President's proposal last week to give financial help to Turkey and Greece.

There was no official information as to the subject of the conversation, but authoritative sources said Wilson undoubtedly was interested in what effect financial aid would have on Turkey's internal politics which have been none too calm since last summer.

EXPORTS NEED CONTROL SAYS TRUMAN

President Asks Congress To Continue Barriers On Shipping Goods

Washington—(AP)—President Truman today asked Congress to extend the government's controls over exports for a year beyond their present expiration date, June 30.

He said in a message requesting speedy action that an uncontrolled outflow of foodstuffs and goods would heighten domestic shortages and increase the "already substantial burden of living costs borne by the American people."

About 500 items—mostly foods—remain under exports control compared with some 3,000 at the wartime peak, he said, adding: "I look forward to the day when the United States and other countries can remove these interferences to the free flow of commodities in world trade."

"But the danger of immediate and complete decontrol in the face of continuing domestic and world scarcities is too great for this nation to undertake at this time."

The message was sent to Capitol Hill by the White House in Mr. Truman's absence on a vacation in Florida.

"Our international responsibilities can not be fulfilled without this machinery," the President declared, explaining that the United States is the center of demand for world scarcities.

Without export regulation, he said, foreign purchasers would go for commodities whose supply is the shortest. He added: "Not only would our domestic supply and price structure be seriously affected, but the commodities would go to destinations where the need is comparatively less pressing."

Spaak Heads New Belgian Cabinet

Brussels—(AP)—A new Belgian cabinet, headed by Socialist Paul-Henri Spaak and composed entirely of Socialists and Catholic party members, was formed today after the Liberals and Communists had refused to participate in a coalition government.

The left-wing coalition cabinet headed by Socialist Camille Huysmans, which had been in office since Aug. 2, resigned last week in a dispute over its decision to boost coal prices. Huysmans' government had been composed of six Socialists, six Liberals, four Communists and three technicians without party affiliation.

Molotov Voices Fresh Faith In Final Concord

Washington—(AP)—Soviet foreign Minister Molotov today said that after hearing the differing views of the U. S., Britain and France he still believed agreement possible in Moscow among the four powers on the critical German economic program.

Molotov said he did not follow the disputes which thus far have broken out here that the four powers would be unable to agree on a common point of view on such issues as the level of German production, balanced import-export program and freedom of movement in Germany, as well as on similar matters.

Molotov spoke after foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin of Britain, in a studied commentary on the Soviet program for Germany, rejected Russian reparations demands and said it was Britain's policy not to agree to any dollar valuations on reparations. Molotov has put forward a Soviet claim for \$10,000,000,000 in reparations from postwar Germany.

Bevin revealed—for the first time—that Prime Minister Stalin himself had urged and requested the western allies to agree that reparations should come from capital materials and particularly factories in the western zones.

The British minister said that when he and the others agreed to this, he thought that the question of reparations was finished and there would be no demands for reparations from current production such as have now been put forward by Molotov, who has asked that part of the payment to Russia be from current production.

Top American officials predicted today that unless the council of foreign ministers finds and agrees upon some overall solution for Germany's current problems there will be no solution at all.

Unless Russia, in particular, is willing to go along with some sort of sweeping program to wipe out all zonal boundaries and organize German life on a national basis they continued, the Moscow conference, in this respect at least.

CHINESE ARMY ENTERS YENAN AFTER DRIVE

Communist Capital Is Ghost City; Reds Evacuate; Make No Defense

Nanking—(AP)—Fast moving Chinese Nationalist troops took over the Chinese Communist capital of Yen'an today at the end of a 200-mile forced march from Shan.

The first of the Government forces at 10 a. m. today entered the Red capital—virtually a ghost city since its evacuation by Communists and the removal of practically everything that could be carried away.

Dispatches announcing the capture mentioned no fighting and it was presumed that Communist Gen. Ho Ling's defense troops had faded into the Shensi Provincial mountains. Party Chairman Mao Tse-tung and other Communist leaders, earlier were reported to have left the city.

The occupation, following swiftly behind an announcement by Minister of Information Peng Hsueh-pei that the Government column was within sight of Yen'an, indicated that the Communists had made good their planned evacuation and carried out their decision not to defend the city.

The announcement from Peng had placed the troops of Gen. Hu Chung-man "within sight of the city's outer defense towers, about 13 miles from the heart of Yen'an."

At that time Peng declared that with Hu's column striking at the heart of the city and other Nationalist squadrons working along the Haining ridges, the position of the Communists was "untenable."

He said that "after the fall of Yen'an the military situation in China will hinge on Communist policy, which up to the present has been to place implicit faith in armed forces."

REJECTS U. S. PROTEST NOTE

Kovacs Has Confessed Says Russian Commander In Budapest

Budapest—(AP)—The Soviet command in Budapest rejected today U. S. protests against Russian interference in Hungarian political affairs and refused for the second time an American request for a three-power investigation of the situation.

In a note delivered this morning to Brig. Gen. George H. Weems at the American Military Mission, Russian Lt. Gen. V. P. Sviridov declared:

"I do not find it possible to change my attitude toward your offer for investigation of the existing conditions in Hungary."

Sviridov is acting chairman of the allied control commission for Hungary.

The United States had contended that the Russians interfered in Hungarian affairs to aid the cause of Hungarian Communists.

Today's Russian reply brushed aside an American assertion of March 17 that Soviet forces arrested Bela Kovacs, anti-communist member of Parliament, on charges of espionage only after a Communist had been unsuccessful in having

Adrift Eleven Days, Pair Rescued Shortly Before Search Was To End

Tampa, Fla.—(AP)—Two sun-baked Virginians were recovering from exposure and near-starvation today after being adrift 11 days in a small power boat in the Gulf of Mexico.

The two men, W. Horace Blanchard, 32, of Newport News and Charles King, 18, of Hampton, were able to talk of their dramatic rescue yesterday by an Army amphibian only a few hours before a search which covered 50,000 square miles of Gulf waters was scheduled to end.

Talmadge Ousted By Supreme Court

Georgia's Highest Tribunal Rules M. E. Thompson Is State's Governor; Talmadge Announces He Will Vacate Office And Mansion, Hints Further Fight

Atlanta—(AP)—The State Supreme Court in a 5 to 2 decision today held that M. E. Thompson is Georgia's governor and that Herman Talmadge's election by the Legislature was illegal.

Talmadge, who assumed office with the backing of national guard officers and state troopers, announced that he would vacate both the executive office and the mansion as soon "as we can get the files out and our personal effects packed. Thompson will serve until January, 1949."

Talmadge said in a statement to newsmen that he considered the people the court of last resort in political questions, and said the question "will be carried to the court of last resort." He did not elaborate further on that statement.

Talmadge said he would not ask the Supreme Court to reconsider its decision.

The court decision was written by presiding Justice Henry Duckworth, Chief Justice W. F. Jenkinson and Justice Tom S. Gandler filed a dissenting opinion.

The majority opinion held that the death of Herman's father, Eugene Talmadge, after his election and before publication of the returns by the Legislature did not alter the duty of the Legislature to declare his election, nor did it authorize the Legislature to declare that because of his death no person had a majority of the votes and to then proceed with election of an alternate.

"Accordingly," the majority held, "where in such circumstances the General Assembly undertook to elect another person as governor, namely, the honorable Herman Talmadge, such attempted election was a void act, which did not confer upon any right or title to the office of governor."

It follows that upon the resignation of Governor Arnall on July 13, 1947, M. E. Thompson, the duly qualified lieutenant governor, assumed the office with full executive powers of this state.

The Supreme Court thus moved to end nine weeks of political turmoil in which rival governors of

Pembroke Bank Bandits Receive Prison Sentence

Payetteville, N. C.—(AP)—Bill Locklear, 22-year-old Robeson County Indian, and his brother-in-law, Waldon Locklear, 16, were sentenced to eight years and six years, respectively, in federal district court here today following their pleas of nolo contendere to charges of robbing the Scottish bank in Pembroke last Friday.

Judge Don Gilliam pronounced the sentence after hearing testimony that Bill Locklear entered the bank, flourished a gun and made off with approximately \$9,500 after imprisoning three bank employes in a closet.

The elder Locklear made his getaway, according to evidence presented to the court, in a car driven by his brother-in-law.

Bill Locklear was arrested slightly over an hour after the robbery and his younger brother was arrested that night.

All but approximately \$125 of the stolen money was recovered.

Great Commonwealth

Is Britain Finished As A World Power? Few Believe So; Imperialist Era Finished; Titanic Commonwealth Of Nations Made Up Of Former English Colonies

England's colorful ambassador in Washington, Lord Inverchapel, declares he rejects any suggestion that Britain "is finished as a world power," thereby challenging those prophets who view John Bull's future darkly.

Addressing the English-speaking union and the Richmond (Va.) Forum, Inverchapel asserted with characteristic forthrightness that he failed "to follow the arguments of people who say that our guts have withered and shriveled within us and that we have lost our power and will to work." He added that Britons still have the guts which "will carry us out of the present crisis as they have carried us out of far graver crises in the past."

I question whether Lord Inverchapel would find many among well-informed Americans who would be him that he is wrong in this declaration. The determination of the followers of Winston Churchill through the valley of "blood, toil, tears and sweat" is still too fresh in our minds to permit of doubts about England's stability.

Mrs. Douville Speaks to A. A. D. W.
It tries to give help to put blind people on their feet, according to Mrs. Mary Douville, who spoke Monday evening to the American Association of University Women at the regular meeting at the Shepard Memorial auditorium.
The students of the Pre-Conditioning Center for the Blind in Greenville, of which Mrs. Douville is superintendent, range from illiterates to college graduates, from poor to those of moderate circumstances. Some were blind at birth, others have lost their sight. The training centers for the blind, patterned after those in England, provide proper training techniques to enable the blind to do things for themselves and to be as nearly as possible like other people. Some of the vocations for which they may be prepared are laundry work, operating concession stands, clerical work, agriculture, and poultry raising. The centers provide recreation for the

students, guided at first by the staff.
The staff of the Pre-Conditioning Center in Greenville, other than the superintendent, consists of a psychologist, five social workers, and the teachers.

Women IN THE CHURCH

One hundred forty Chinese and Americans recently joined in a National Child Welfare planning conference in Shanghai, Miss Mabel

Nowlin, Methodist mission leader, reports. "It was significant that practically all of the Chinese women present, and most of the men, were graduates of Christian schools," she says. Miss Nowlin reports also that Miss Yu-chen Liu has accepted the post of Chinese secretary for the "Christianizing the Home Department" of the National Christian Council. She has been a mission worker for 15 years in Changli, North China, and in Kienyang, West China; is an M. A. from the University of Oregon; and has a

national reputation in organizing Mothercraft schools in China. Major Gunvor Wilberg, a missionary of the Salvation Army to the Philippine Islands, is now en route to Manila from San Francisco as a crew member of a Norwegian cargo vessel. A native of Oslo, Norway, and a Norwegian citizen, she was not interned with most other whites when the Japanese took over the Philippine Islands at the beginning of the war. But during this period she was able to visit the Americans, British, and Filipinos who were in the Santo Tomas prison, and to help minister to their needs. For this service she has received Norway's highest civilian decoration—the Haakon Seventh Cross of Liberty. She hopes to reestablish the work of the Salvation Army in Manila.

Seventeen young Christian women of China, most of them graduates of Chinese colleges and universities, are now in the United States taking post-graduate and specialized studies to fit themselves better for leadership in their native land. They are in America on scholarships provided by the Methodist Church from "Crusade for Christ" funds raised in the churches for this purpose. Among the seventeen young women is one who was a Young Men's Christian Association secretary in Szechuan during the war; two who are principals and two who are teachers of important Christian schools in China; an M. D. who is now specializing in cancer prevention; a teacher of kindergarten teachers; an ordained woman minister of a rural area; the editor of a Christian paper in Chinese; and a professor of biology who has done remarkable work in research in Tibet.

CONCERNING COMFORTABLE CIVILIZATIONS

City dwellers who love to take their vacations out in the open spaces or up in the mountains often remark that one never sees the stars in the city. It is only when one gets out into the country that one sees the stars shining forth in glory.

There are two reasons why we cannot see the stars clearly in the city. The first is that there is a bit of smoky haze over most cities. The second is that the illumination of street lights and dwellings take the edge off our vision so that we do not see the stars as clearly as in the inky blackness of plain or mountain.

City civilizations are always comfortable civilizations. Out of these city civilizations many admirable things arise—literature, art, scientific inquiry, invention. But it is also true that in the midst of all these things we can easily lose our idealism. The stars do not shine as brightly or appear to our searching eyes as clearly under the circumstances of comfort, ease, and luxury as under the grimmer circumstances of discipline and denial.

Comfortable civilizations have through the ages always slipped down first into decadence and then into catastrophe. Nations die of spiritual diseases. When the souls of men become surfeited with things, the institutions under which they live begin to crumble.

Many people in this and every generation scoff at ideals, but their very scoffing is prophetic of decline.

The Maryland senator said the United States should take the lead in calling a disarmament conference because, he said, he does not consider the United Nations equipped to carry it out. That organization still is in its infancy, he declared, and up to now has proved itself to be only "a hollow shell—a glorified debating society."

Jap Premier Wants Americans To Stay
Tokyo.—(AP)—If the U. S. is going to insure world peace, Americans must remain indefinitely in Japan after the Japanese peace treaty is signed, Premier Shigeru Yoshida said today.
In an interview with the Associated Press, the premier voiced his strong approval of General MacArthur's recent proposal for treaty negotiations and end of the occupation, but made it plain that he preferred American protection to that of the United Nations upon the signing of the peace.

Approve Operation To "Cure" Criminal
Pittsburgh.—(AP)—Hopeful of turning 38-year-old Millard Wright into a "useful citizen" a common pleas court jurist approved a brain operation that is supposed to cure the prisoner's criminal tendencies.
Judge A. Marshall Thompson authorized a surgeon to separate the front lobe from the rest of Wright's brain after the latter's plea the operation would help him "go straight."

commonwealth.
Had there been any doubt about the significance of this metamorphosis it would be dispelled by the nature of the present politico-economic crisis. This is not, I believe, any temporary affliction. It was, of course, brought about by the exigencies of the late war, but

it was on its way long before the war as part of the transformation of the empire.
Indeed, one seems to see an admission of this in England's request that America take over her interests as dominant power in Greece and Turkey. Equally striking was the decision of the British general staff last year that in the event of another world war England wouldn't be able to defend her imperial life-line through the Mediterranean—a sea which she had controlled for generations. The defenses are to be shifted to East Africa.

As previously indicated, this strikes me as representing a great metamorphosis rather than a disintegration. True, the empire as such may be on its way out, but there is taking the place of it a commonwealth which has titanic potentialities. To the powerful membership which already exists may be added the independent nations of India and Burma.
Just take pencil and paper and check the prospects of the British Commonwealth a hundred years from now and you will see what I mean. What will be the populations and strength of all these nations?

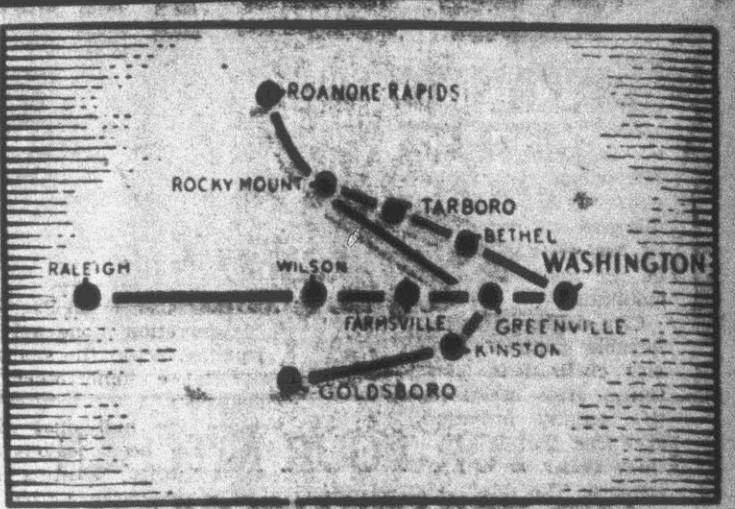

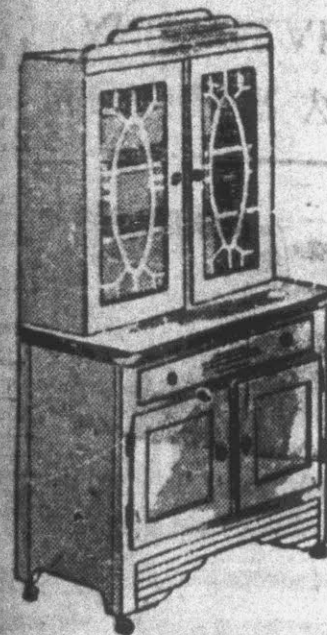
