

Tax Fight Starts Over Knutson Bill

House Democrats Assail GOP Tax Slashing Measure As "Discriminatory," Debate Formally Opens Tomorrow; Predict Veto By Truman; "Sugar Coating" Charged

Washington—(AP)—Nine Democratic members of the House Ways and Means Committee today assailed the Republican-backed income tax slashing bill as "a discriminatory patchwork of political expediency."

Dissenting from the committee's action last week in approving the measure, the nine declared in a report that the legislation is "neither equitable, timely nor sound."

The bill would cut taxes by a total of \$3,840,000,000. Individual cuts would range from 30 per cent for small taxpayers to 20 per cent for most others.

Republican committeemen simultaneously issued a majority report saying present high taxes endanger business prosperity. The majority defended the tax slash as can be made and between \$2,300,000,000 and \$3,800,000,000 paid on the \$280,000,000 national debt.

Debate on the bill begins in the House tomorrow, with a final vote set for Thursday. Republicans are confidently predicting victory for the legislation.

However, leading Democratic congressmen believe that President Truman will veto the bill if it reaches the White House in its present form.

The Democratic minority on the ways and means group protested that the legislation is a "windfall to the wealthiest taxpayers."

Only an "outraged public," they said, caused the Republicans to revise original plans and grant small taxpayers more than a flat 20 per cent reduction.

The original bill, by Ways and Means Chairman Knutson (R-Minn.) proposed a straight 20 per cent cut on all except the biggest taxpayers.

Call Telephone Walkout In April To Back Demands

Washington—(AP)—The National Federation of Telephone Workers offered today to negotiate its dispute with the American Telephone and Telegraph Company's Bell System, but backed up its contract demands with a call for a cross country strike April 7.

The federation's 49-member policy committee invited the A.T. & T. to start negotiating in Washington not later than April 1 and told the union president, Joseph A. Belme, to report at 2:30 p.m. (EST) today whether the bid is accepted.

Up to now demands for \$12 a week more pay and nine other contract points have been pressed by member unions with the separate companies in the Bell System.

The strike call, for 6 a.m., April 7 in each time zone, would affect only 39 of the NFWA's 49 unions since ten are bound by contracts not expiring at this time.

A walkout would not blanket the nation's telephone facilities, but it would affect the long lines division of A.T. & T., thus knocking out radio, teletype and other communications which depend on telephone lines.

Is It Discrimination?

An American Citizen Has Rights To Freedom Of Speech And Opinion Under The Constitution; Why Truman's Purge Of Reds In Gov't Posts Is Legal

Washington—(AP)—A man can be a member of the Communist party but, if he is, he can't work for the government. Why?

That question may have puzzled some people when President Truman on Saturday ordered the firing of any "disloyal" government employee.

Who is a "disloyal" government worker?

Anyone, under Mr. Truman's rules, who is a Communist or fellow-traveler, that is, who follows the Communist "line."

Why then is the Communist party permitted to exist in this country?

Because, under the constitution Americans have a right to freedom of speech and opinion.

So Communists are protected by the constitution, although there's talk now in Congress of outlawing the Communist party.

If Congress passes such a law the Communists are sure to ask the Supreme Court to declare the law unconstitutional.

So then comes this question: If a man has a constitutional right to be a Communist, wouldn't

Russians Planning For Attack Asserts Bullitt

Definite Intention To Conquer America Claims Former Ambassador; Bonner And Committee Shocked By Testimony

Washington—(AP)—Testimony by former Ambassador William C. Bullitt that "time is running short" because Russia definitely intends to "assault" and "conquer" the United States stirred the House Committee on Un-American activities today.

A call from Chairman Thomas (R-N.J.), for an immediate "showdown" to put American relations with the Soviet Union on a strict give-and-take basis.

Suggestions from Rep. Bonner (D-NC), for a "show of strength" to Russia and for "arousing America" to the Soviet menace.

A proposal by Rep. Rankin (D-Miss.), that the United States lay in an "ample" supply of atomic bombs and enough planes and pilots to handle them.

Bullitt appeared before the committee yesterday at hearings on bills to outlaw the communist party. He said the time is not ripe for that.

AFL Chief Offers Plan To Halt Isms

Pres. Green Opposes Outlawing Communist Party; Presents Seven Steps To Combat Spread Of Foreign Doctrines

Washington—(AP)—AFL President William Green said today that outlawing the communist party would help spread communism.

Green testified before the House Committee on Un-American activities, whose members have been stirred up by testimony from former Ambassador William C. Bullitt that Russia definitely intends to "assault" and "conquer" the United States.

The AFL president told the committee that proposed legislation to destroy the communist party would merely drive it underground and open the way to "witch hunts" victimizing innocent people.

Green also expressed fear that the legislation might lead to persecution of liberals and "a most dangerous thrust at academic freedom and freedom of the press."

He testified that he and his organization are against communism. The way to combat it, he said, is by:

Biennium Report Reflects Progress Of Pitt Welfare Dept.

Mr. K. T. Futrelle, supervisor of the Pitt County Welfare Department, gave a most interesting and informative talk to the Lions Club at their regular weekly meeting at the Woman's Club Monday night.

Interesting to the members of the club was the statement made by Mr. Futrelle that during the biennium 1942 to 1944 Pitt County stood tenth place in the State in aid to the blind. After the formation of the Pitt County Association for the Blind, sponsored by the Greenville Lions Club, during the biennium 1944 to 1946, Pitt County stood fourth place in North Carolina in aid to the blind. Mr. Futrelle also commented on the large number of glasses purchased by the Lions Club for indigent people in the county.

"The principle work of the Welfare Department," stated Mr. Futrelle, "is the public assistance given to eligible recipients in cash payments." This work consumes about fifty-five percent of the time of the department. On the basis of the present expenditures, federal state and county funds amounting to \$165,000 are expended annually in the county with the county paying approximately one sixth of that amount. This includes the assistance given to the blind, aged, and dependent children. The department also has a big job keeping up with persons on parole, which at this time averages 40. Records have to be kept on county finance program for the hospitalization of indigent people.

One of the most important of the jobs of the Welfare Department is the work with crippled children. This includes arrangements for hospitalization and medical care of those retained at home for crippled children. Currently about a hundred children are being looked after in this program, including those cared for regularly in the various clinics. Part of the funds supporting this program are derived from the sale of Easter Seals, and these seals go on sale very soon.

William Mitchell, Jr., 16-year-old Negro, is being held in jail without bond on a charge of shooting to death his brother, Herbert Mitchell, 28, on the old airport road to Belvoir last night about 8 o'clock.

Tyson quoted William Mitchell as saying that he and his brother had been drinking; that their car stalled and they could not start it, and during an argument he shot Herbert with a .22-caliber pistol when he was "coming on" him. The bullet entered the man's heart. He was dead when he arrived at Dr. J. A. Battle's office in Greenville.

Deputy Sheriff L. E. Manning and ABC Officer Claude Manning arrested Mitchell at Flanagan & Parker's funeral home shortly after the shooting.

Coroner Griffin H. Rouse will hold an inquest at the City Hall tonight at 7:30.

The Mitchell lives on the Zeb Brown farm on the Belvoir road.

SAYS RUSSIAN A-BOMB NEARS DEVELOPMENT

Scientist 'Escapes' Laboratory; Tells All-Out Effort Being Made

Neustadt, Germany—(AP)—A German atom scientist, who said he recently "escaped" from a Russian government laboratory in Moscow, asserted today that the Soviet Union is "very near" to developing an atom bomb.

Lifting the curtain on what he described as Russia's "all out" attempts to match—perhaps better—America's mighty secret, the nuclear physicist said in an interview:

"From what I have seen, I believe Russia will have a bomb similar to the United States within three to five years."

Russia's efforts to harness the atom are "relentless," the scientist declared.

"Her scientists are sweating blood day and night."

"The scientist said he had returned to Germany "at the risk of his life" and asserted he hoped to go to the United States soon.

Insisting that he must not be identified by name, the German professor said some of the "secrets" of Russian atomic research were:

(1) "At least 200 German scientists and technicians, including some of Germany's foremost nuclear physicists, are working for the Russian government in a virtual paradise on problems of nuclear fission."

(2) "More 'recruits' are being sought in all zones of Germany, including the American and particularly the Russian, 'by Russian officers and by Germans sent back to convince former colleagues a paradise is awaiting them.'"

(3) "The German scientists have everything they need for their research—and are treated equally, if not better than Russian physicists."

(4) "Rare German cyclotrons and other high-voltage equipment used in atomic and radiation experiments 'have been moved from the Russian zone of Germany to the Soviet Union.'"

(5) "Some 12,000 engineers and miners, Russian and German, are hunting pitchblende—the source of uranium—in utmost secrecy in Russian-occupied Germany."

PLANE CRASH VICTIMS ALIVE

All Aboard C-54 Survive Newfoundland Wreck; One Injured

Westerly Field, Mass.—(AP)—All nine persons aboard an Army C-54 transport which crashed Sunday on a Newfoundland plateau are alive and only one was injured, the army reported today.

The one injured man has been flown by helicopter to Harmon Field, near the crash zone, and the other survivors will be flown to Harmon Field in relays because of rough terrain which prevents full loading of the rescue plane.

Public Relations Officer Capt. Theodore Wood identified the injured crewman as Radioman S-Sgt William Brotzman, stationed at Warner Robins Field, Macon, Ga.

Capt. Wood said Brotzman was loaded aboard the helicopter in a litter but that Harmon Field Hospital reported he was not seriously injured.

He said the helicopter reached the downed crewmen at 7:15 a.m. (Newfoundland time).

As the plane circled for its rescue mission, ground crews labored to reach a 1,500 foot high plateau 25 miles south of Stephenville Newfoundland.

Expanding Program

Including Korea In The American List Of Countries To Be Defended From Communism No Surprise; A Matter Of Insurance For Peace; Money Not Lives

There's nothing surprising in Undersecretary of State Acheson's statement that the United States must invest funds into putting Southern Korea on a sound economic basis—thus adding a third country to Greece and Turkey as needing aid to resist the advance of aggressive communism.

The point is, of course, that Russia occupies the northern half of Korea and this area contains virtually all the industrial resources of the little country. The Reds have dropped an iron curtain along the dividing line, leaving the agricultural south without access to essentials in the north. The only reason the Soviet forces haven't occupied the southern half is because Uncle Sam's troops are there. Acheson told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee yesterday that the Russians have blocked any agreement for a unified government. Hence the need of help for the south.

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Doubts Legality Of Extra Expense-Pay

GENERAL TO BE SPEAKER AT DEDICATION

Raleigh, N.C.—(AP)—Attorney General Harry McMillan told the North Carolina Legislature today that in his opinion an act to grant members \$6 a day extra for subsistence and 6 cents a mile for travel would be of "doubtful constitutionality."

He suggested that the assembly obtain an advisory opinion from the State Supreme Court in order to pursue the matter.

The House was quick to respond and it passed a resolution to ask the Supreme Court for such a ruling, which is expected by Thursday.

The attorney general's opinion was addressed to Speaker Pearsall and to Rep. Allen of Wake, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee.

The House debated the expense-pay proposal more than an hour last night and deferred its vote until Thursday pending official opinions. Allen said the proposal was "poorly drawn," and at that time questioned its constitutionality.

In the last general election, the people voted against a constitution amendment to raise the pay of legislators, who now are paid \$10 a day for only 60 days.

The House faced with its longest public calendar of the session while the Senate had one of its shortest, and before it bills to prohibit the sale of wine in 17 counties, and to regulate the sale of beer in those and six other counties; and to appropriate more than \$48,000,000 for permanent improvements.

The House Rules Committee set for tomorrow its discussion of a measure by Rep. Tompkins of Jackson to eliminate the two-thirds or gag rule whereby a two-thirds vote of the House is necessary to override the majority of a committee. Since it was adopted in 1941, the rule has been the object of criticism by dry leaders who said it prevented statewide referendum bills from reaching the floor.

Greenville AAUW Will Be Host To State Division In October Meeting

The Greenville Branch of the American Association of University Women will be hostess next October to the annual workshop of the North Carolina State Division of the Association, according to the report of the local delegates recently returned from the state convention in Charlotte. The tentative date set for this important meeting is October 25. The presiding officer will be Mrs. Robert Lee Humber of Greenville, newly elected president of the North Carolina division of the association.

Of particular interest also at the recent convention were the resolutions passed, supporting a state-wide kindergarten program, urging higher recognition of teachers, favoring federal aid for schools and endorsing the good health plan for more hospitals and health centers throughout the state.

The theme of the convention was "We Look to the Future," and the program emphasized health and education. The speakers were George Kabat, of Washington, D. C. where, in the United States Office of Education, he has a leading position in international educational relations; Dr. George M. Cooper, assistant health officer in North Carolina, and Mrs. Charles W. Tillett, of the Democratic National Committee. Mr. Kabat explained

the fundamental objects of UNESCO, emphasizing the importance of the international plan for education, culture, and science to be advanced as forces toward world peace. Dr. Cooper reported on the encouraging progress of the maternal and infant care in the state, and urged help in combatting the evils of juvenile delinquency as problems of parentage and homes. Mrs. Tillett gave an inspiring report on AAUW personalities in Washington.

The social occasions of the convention included a banquet and a luncheon, at both of which Mrs. Humber and Mrs. D. S. Spain, Jr., were among the guests of honor; a tea given by the Charlotte branch and a coffee hour at Queen's College.

The banquet will be at 6:30 p. m. in the Masonic Hall dining room.

W. E. Marshall, New Director Of Student Affairs

W. E. Marshall, professor of political science at East Carolina Teachers college, became this week the first director of student affairs at the college, according to an announcement from the office of President Dennis H. Cooke. Marshall will continue to teach several classes and will also work with the college dean, R. J. Slay, in handling student affairs, particularly those having to do with the work of the Student Cooperative Government association.

A native of Texas, Marshall joined the East Carolina faculty in September 1945 as a member of the social science department. He received the master's degree at the University of Texas and taught there for a time. Later he went to Louisiana School of Technology, from which he came to East Carolina.

Among the schools visited are William and Mary, University of Richmond, University of North Carolina, State, Duke, the Woman's College in Greensboro, and Meredith.

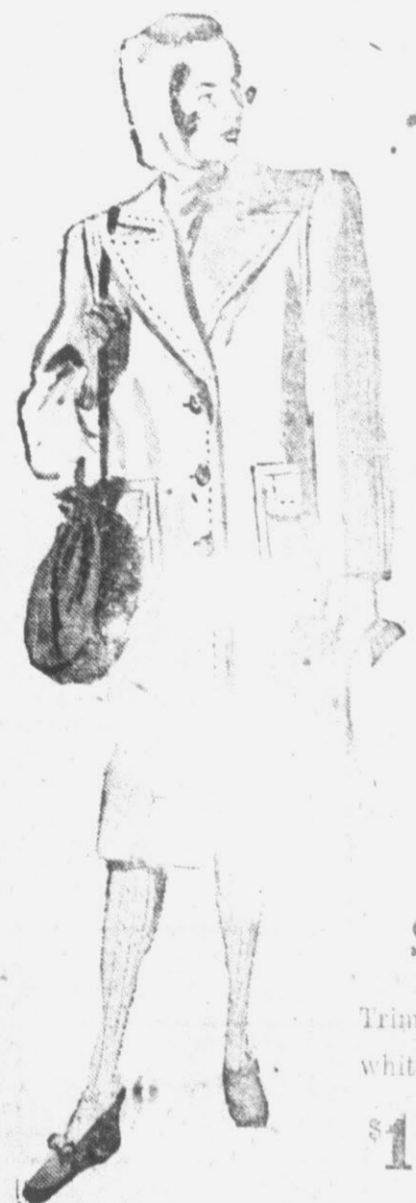

Terence, the Roman dramatist, was applauded by an audience of his compatriots when he uttered the famous words: "I am a human being, and nothing human is foreign to me." Centuries later, the venerable Philip Schaff, a leader of the church in this country, paraphrased the words of Terence by saying, "I am a Christian, and nothing Christian is foreign to me."

WHY NOT IN PITT?

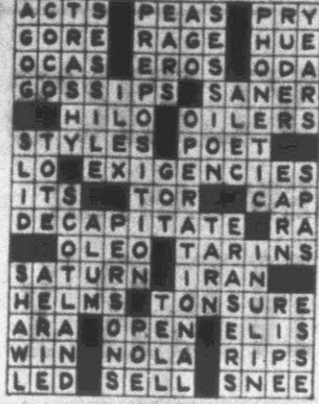

LET'S PLAY SAFE

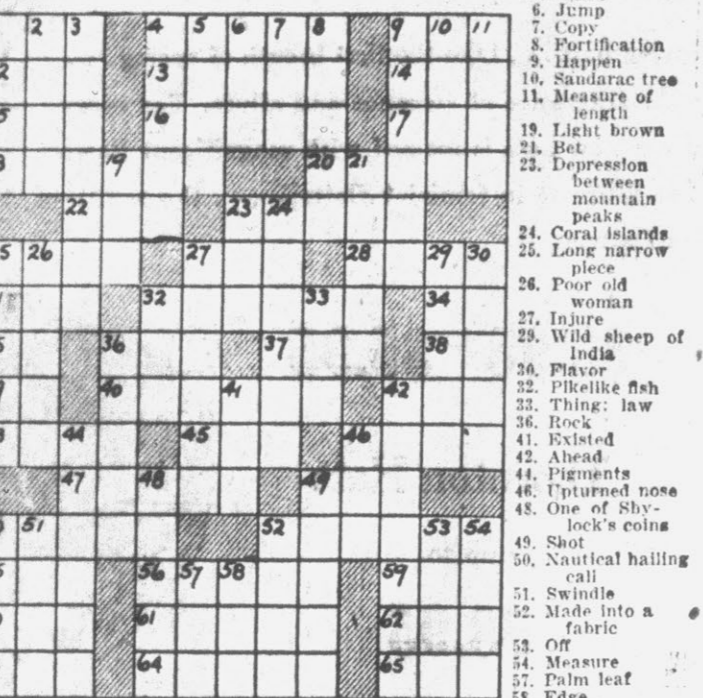

mission's decision in his case set aside by appealing to the U.S. District Court and then the Appeals Court.

Both courts turned him down and upheld the commission's right to fire him. The Appeals Court said: "The United States x x x has the right to prescribe the qualifications of its employees and to attach conditions to their employment."

Friedman then appealed to the Supreme Court which, by refusing to hear him, in effect upheld the two lower courts.

That Supreme Court action came on March 17. Five days later Mr. Truman ordered all Communists fired from the government.

(Mr. Truman had set up a special commission last November to outline ways for firing "disloyal" people from the government.)

(The commission finished its report some time ago and turned it over to Mr. Truman but he didn't act on it until Saturday.)

Friedman's lawyers argued there would be a government "witch-hunt" if employees could be fired for their political thinking.

This is denied by officials of the Justice Department and the Civil Service Commission.

They say less than five per cent of the government's 2,000,000 employees are likely to be affected by the President's order.

In Friedman's case the people who gave information against him were not made known to him or anyone else.

A top Civil Service Commission official said yesterday this practice of protecting informants has been followed in the past and will be followed.

But, he said, after such information is received an investigation is made to decide whether it's right.

A person found to be "disloyal" by his department heads can take various appeals, on up to the Civil Service Commission heads.

bulk of the Eastern Hemisphere. As democratic strongholds they would go a long way toward bringing a halt to the Bolshevik World Revolution which finally is in full swing.

Naturally we aren't likely to stop with aid for Greece, Turkey and Korea. The Chinese Nationalist Government is in grave economic straits and will need material aid for rehabilitation while it presses its campaign against the Chinese Communist armies. The Chinese Reds long maintained that they had no relation to Moscow but were a special breed of Communists. Signs have multiplied, however, that there is a pipe-line between them and the Soviet capital. A communized China would be a mighty addition to the Red Russian empire.

As to the cost of American aid to countries threatened by Communist aggression, proponents of the program maintain that it is insurance against possible final showdown between Democracy and a swollen Communist empire. In other words, they believe that action now may prevent another world war. The insurance costs only money. What form the cost of a decisive showdown might take is terrible to contemplate.

William C. Bullitt, American Ambassador to Moscow from 1933 to 1936, apparently had such a showdown in mind when he told the congressional committee on un-American activities that the Communist party is a Soviet agency designed to weaken America "for the ultimate assault the Soviet government intends to make on the United States." He added that he

considered the Communist party in this country to be "composed of potential traitors," and to be a "conspiracy to commit murder on a mass scale."

man problems confronting the Big Four.

Since French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault saw the Russian No. 1 man last week, Marshall is the only one of the visiting foreign

ministers who has not made a Kremlin call.

American quarters in Moscow noted with interest the fact that Bevin visit resulted after he had inquired about some conversations concerning revision of the British-Soviet alliance and that Bidault's visit also resulted from an initial move on his part.

Belief thus has grown that Marshall may not be invited until he indicates some interest in a meeting to himself. His feeling is reported to be that such a tete-a-tete would be most profitable after German issues before the council are clearly drawn.

The Bevin conference topped off an active day, despite the fact the council had been in recess since Saturday.

Among the most important late developments was a Marshall proposal for progressive reduction of occupation forces in Germany in order to help that beaten country get back on its economic feet; a Bidault suggestion for a Big Four conference in Paris before July 1 to organize emigration from Germany and thus reduce the population; and the disclosure that a coordinating committee is finding about 75 percent disagreement and only 25 percent agreement in the propositions put forward by the foreign ministers to date.

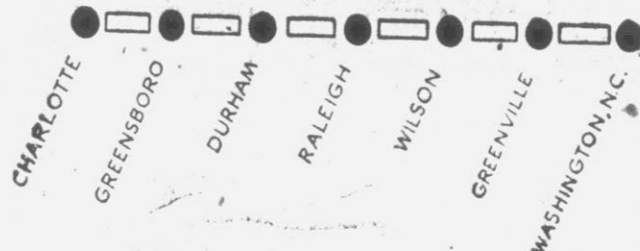

Utah Downs Kentucky; Oklahoma Plays Finals

New York—(AP)—Utah University's spunky cagers held the championship of the National Invitation Basketball Tournament today as Oklahoma and Holy Cross prepared to take the floor at Madison Square Garden tonight in the NCAA East-West finals—and the possibility of a playoff between the two titlists was still alive.

Coach Vadal Peterson's Utah Redskins, who came into the invi-

tation tournament without the prestige of a seeding, won the title last night by turning back the heavily-favored defending champions from Kentucky University, 49-45, before an approving crowd of 18,468.

Oklahoma, which won the Western Regional NCAA playoffs by beating Texas in the finals, and Holy Cross, conqueror of City College of New York in the Eastern Regional finals, meet in the second game of tonight's program. Texas and City College collide in the consolidation bout at 7:45 p. m. (EST).

The Oklahomans are determined to end their season tonight, win, lose or draw, but Coach Doggie Julian of Holy Cross is agreeable to a meeting with Utah for the mythical national championship if he is arranged for Thursday night, his team wins and the game can be an open date at Madison Square Garden.

A committee of metropolitan coaches named Vern Gardner of Utah the most valuable player in the tournament.

STATE TRIMS WEST VIRGINIA

Red Terrors Pull Up-set Over Second-Seeded Mountaineers

New York—(AP)—North Carolina State's Southern Conference basketball champions last night turned back West Virginia 64-52 to take third place in Madison Square Garden's National Invitation Tournament.

Led by forward Bob Negley who scored 22 points, Ev Case's Red Terrors rolled to a 36-20 margin at the end of the half and protected their advantage in the last 20 minutes although the Mountaineers once closed the gap to two points midway in the final period.

The lead changed hands four times early in the game before State pulled away to a 16-point margin at intermission. State poured in 13 points while holding the West Virginians scoreless in the last seven minutes of the first period.

Early in the second half the Mountaineers scored 16 points while State added only two on a hit from the corner by Katkavek, but that was the end of the losers' threat. The Terrors, slowing the game down to a walk, pulled steadily away with Negley and Katkavek setting the pace as West Virginia tried desperately to gain possession of the ball.

Neither team displayed the class of earlier rounds. West Virginia was seeded second in the tournament and State fourth.

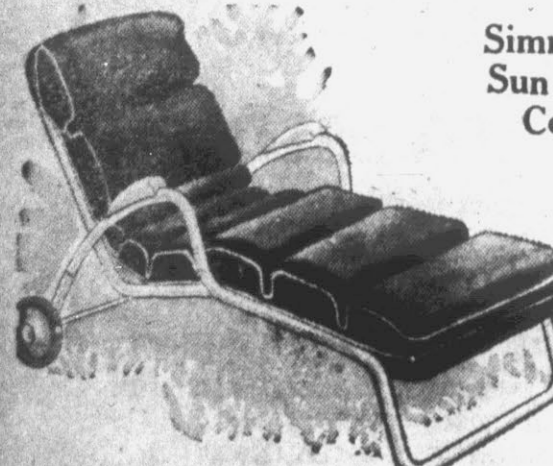

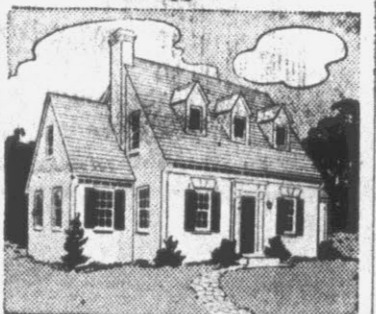
