## GERMAN COAL MINERS STRIKE OVER RATIONS

### Protest Food Conditions; Demonstrations Orderly; Will Resume Work

Essen, Germany—(AP)—Four thousand Ruhr coal miners at Dortmund struck today in the latest German demonstration against short food rations.

It was the first such action since unrest over the food situation developed several days ago.

Hunger strikes and marches by an estimated 500,000 persons have taken place here in the last two days, and an angry demonstration occurred yesterday at Dueseldorf where crowds upset and stoned British military vehicles.

There are approximately 250,000 coal miners in the Ruhr Valley.

The north German control office here said four mines were affected by the Dortmund walkout.

The miners announced they would return to work Monday, but said that if no improvement in their food ration was seen by that time they would walk out again.

The strike occurred as other residents of Dortmund paraded the city's streets demanding more food.

The demonstrators, numbering about 2,000, sent deputations to both German and British municipal authorities, demanding that the food ration of 1,550 calories per person per day be fulfilled.

They claimed they had been receiving hardly two-thirds of the official ration. The officials made no specific promises but said they were hopeful more food would be available soon.

British officials said the demonstrators were orderly and that the deputations presented their demands without bitterness.

Workers in virtually every city in the Ruhr area now have gone on record with complaints against food and housing conditions. Thus far there have not been any repeat performances in any city.

## Big Four Agrees On Schedule For German Problem

Moscow—(AP)—The Council of Foreign Ministers agreed today to come to grips Monday with the heart of the German problem. They will try then to reach a compromise on reparations and economic unity.

In a one-hour session, the shortest of this conference thus far, the ministers agreed on a schedule for the German discussions and set up a special committee to attempt to draw up a directive on the lesser problems of the report of the Allied Control Council for Germany.

The agreed agenda for Monday summing up three weeks of proposals made thus far, was:

1. Germany as an economic unit including reparations; plus a review of the levels of industry, including industrial demilitarization

## On Moral Standards

### Post-War Wave Of Divorces In England Reverberates In Austere House Of Lords; Victorian Age Standards; Primate's Solution; What Is Being Done

England's discursive afternoon tea-tables have been served a warm morsel by the Bishop of London who declared in the House of Lords during a debate on the soaring divorce rate that adultery needn't constitute grounds for divorce. He recommended forgiveness and reconciliation.

The austere upper chamber of Parliament has little legislative power these days but it is a highly important sounding-board for considered opinion. So when a great dignitary like the bishop makes a pronouncement of such universal interest, it sets folks to thinking and tongues to wagging. And he was very blunt in his approach.

"It is extraordinary," he asserted, "that at a time when adultery is thought less of than it has been for centuries in this country, and when living in sin is considered as a music-hall joke, adultery is considered sufficient excuse for breaking up a marriage and a home."

The origin of this debate lies in the fact that the divorce rate has jumped from 6,332 in 1939 (the year the war began) to 50,000 cur-

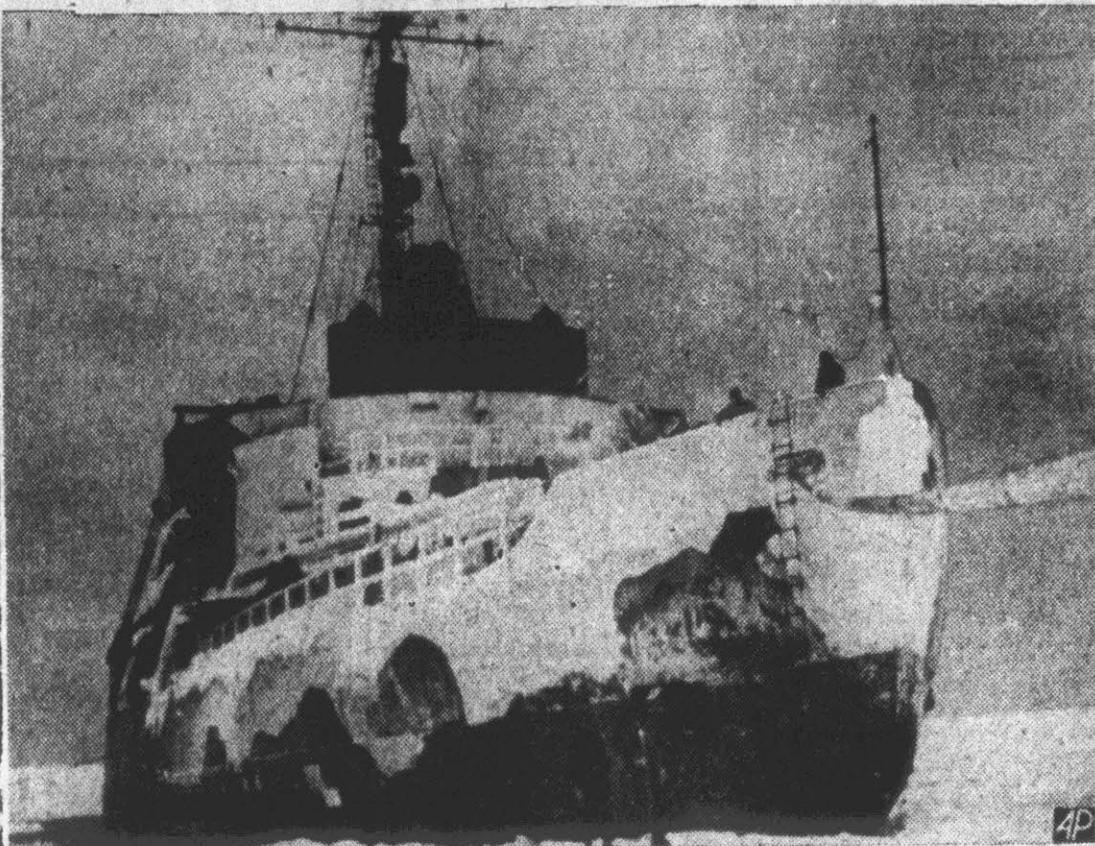
rently—a shocking state of affairs in the minds of a host of Britons who still maintain their Victorian reserve along with the cherished China dogs and aspidochelons.

One hastens to add that this increase in divorces doesn't mean that John Bull is racing headlong to the devil. It does mean that the separations due to war have resulted in a good deal of infidelity on both sides of the house. And the Victorian age was used to conceal.

So far as Tommy Atkins is concerned, he has precedent for forswearing a few wild oats. When I first went to Britain as a reporter in 1916 the law conceded an Englishman the right to have a mistress if he so chose. He could divorce his wife for infidelity, but she couldn't divorce him on that ground. She had to prove actual physical cruelty in addition to adultery. One of my first introductions to this code was when a big business man remarked to me:

"I have a prosperous business, a fine home, a charming wife to pre-

## Hundreds Of Planes To Be Here Sunday

### Airport Dedication Exercises To Be Gala Event; Activities Start Early; Air Show To Include Race And Stunt Flying

The Junior Chamber of Commerce, sponsoring the dedication of the Pitt-Greenville Airport and an air show by Navy and Marine and civilian pilots Sunday afternoon, has completed arrangements for the gala event, President Vann C. Fleming said today.

Maj. Gen. Field Harris, director of the Division of Aviation, U. S. Marine Corps, will fly here from Washington, D. C., to take part in the dedication at 3:15 p. m. He will arrive at noon and be luncheon guest of District Highway Commissioner John G. Clark and Mrs. Clark.

Justice President Vann C. Fleming, Jr., will preside. He will present Marine Air Corps Reserve First Lieut. Thomas Sellers, who will introduce General Harris. He will present a scroll indicating the dedication of the field to civilian flying to Chairman L. M. Buchanan of the Pitt-Greenville Airport Commission. Other commissioners on the platform will be N. C. Brooks, Jasper Smith of Bethel, G. H. Pittman of Falkland, and Executive Secretary Willard T. Kyzer.

The day's activities at the airport will begin with the Carolina Breakfast Club (composed of pilots) meeting at the Airport Inn. The pilots of 17 planes coming here from Suffolk, Va., will breakfast at Respos' barbecue place.

An air race for civilian pilots will be held at 10 a. m.

The Navy and Marine Air Reserves will stage an air show at 1 p. m. with Corsair, Hellcat and Avenger fighter planes and patrol bombers. When the planes come down they will be open to inspection by the public. Pilots and ground crew men will be available to answer questions and Navy and Marine Reserves recruiting officers will be there seeking recruits.

## Would Safeguard Oil Concessions In Arabia

Washington—(AP)—Senator Brewster "B-Me" declared today American aid to Greece and Turkey will safeguard oil company concessions in Arabia, and the government should get lower oil prices in return.

Brewster told reporters the Senate War Investigating Committee which he heads, has asked President Truman to make available files of a navy report on 1941 negotiations which Brewster contends might have given this government much lower prices than it now is paying for Arabian oil.

"Evidence taken by our committee indicates that the oil companies in question thought that the lower price was a good one in 1941, when they were in fear of losing their concessions in Arabia," he said.

"Four years later when the oil companies felt their concessions were safe and the navy wanted oil they charged the navy a far higher figure."

## WOULD INVOKE HEAVY CURBS

### Committee Against Outlawing Reds, But Actions In Offing

Washington—(AP)—A member of the House Committee on Un-American Activities said today the group may vote 5 to 4 against outlawing the Communist party, but is sure to recommend drastic new legal curbs on Communist maneuvering in this country.

The member, who withheld use of his name, said the nine-man committee may be unanimous in support of anti-Communist legislation short of making the whole party an illegal organization.

Chairman Thomas (R-NJ) told reporters the results of a week of hearings "will have to crystallize before the committee can adequately decide what it is going to do about outlawing the Communist party."

The committee made public last night a report which it said furnished historical proof running back to 1919 that the party in this country is "the agent" of Russia.

The report listed 92 documents which it called "typical directives from Moscow affecting the Communist movement in the United States." Thomas said these were proof that the party is "a fifth-column pawn of Moscow."

Included were excerpts from Russian broadcasts, Communist books and records of party conventions

## Special Session Over Holy Land

London—(AP)—A foreign office spokesman said today Britain will ask immediately for a special session of the United Nations Assembly to consider the problem of the Palestine mandate.

Sir Alexander Cadogan, permanent British representative to the United Nations, has been authorized to make the formal request, the spokesman said.

"It is within the latitude of his instructions to take the step at once," he added.

## Babson Discusses 'Mechanization'

Washington, D. C., March 28.—Wherever you look, you uncover a growing tendency to replace employees with machines. This widespread movement calls for the closest attention of wageworkers and businessmen alike. In its practical reactions upon you and your family, the rising pace of mechanization should overshadow, by far, the gossip of Hollywood and the debates at Washington. This trend has been gathering momentum so long that we are likely to forget it. It will not forget us. Scan the industrial news in detail and you feel the vast sweep of today's tide. It bears news of the future for both jobholders and stockholders.

**Both Inside and Outside Jobs**

Few groups in the nation will be able to stand complacently at the curb and watch this forward March Of The Iron Men. The robots are not confined within factory walls. Swift changes are appearing in the farm regions, where modern equipment is taking over an ever-growing share of all farm operations. In the trucking of heavy shipments there will be less of human struggle and the old leave-ho-

At the tailend of the truck, muscle power will be replaced by mechanical lift. In many of the service trades, the scene is changing through introduction of pre-packaging, self-serving, coin-vending, and other modernism.

Mechanical devices are invading the last strongholds of personal labor. For instance, the job of inspection heretofore has seemed to require human senses for which no

mechanism could be substituted. Yet electronic and other mechanical checks now perform with a speed and certainty which outclass humans. Heretofore, the assembling of parts into a complete article has been very difficult to mechanize; but I definitely forecast its accomplishment. The all-automatic production plant is more than a comic-strip phantasy.

**Will Reach Into Every Home**

A white collar is no badge of immunity. Working in cooperation with the Armed Services, technical institutions have contrived brain-work machines. These are now solving problems in mathematics entirely beyond the capacity of any accountant. No job or business can afford to ignore this universal drift. For better or for worse most of us are bound to collide, sooner or later, with the floodtide of mechanization. It will influence all human activities.

History reveals, with appalling certainty that the onrush of machinery cannot be opposed successfully. It will over-ride any opposition from labor groups, industrial competitors, legislators, or ideologists. From earliest days, mechanical revolutions have rolled ahead against the most savage opponents. This is because machinery increases production. Any agency which can do that is all-powerful. Mechanization can be put to the service of all groups.

## Held Up

Washington—(AP)—Congressional plans for an Easter holiday lengthened the odds today against final action on the Administration's \$400,000,000 Greek-Turkish aid measure before the middle of April.

The homeward trek by the lawmakers—many want to talk over the diplomatic issues with constituents—also stymied the separate measure to authorize \$350,000,000 of relief for Greece, Italy, Hungary, Austria, Poland and China.

There appeared some doubt a forum can be mustered in the House next week for action on a \$2,451,497,863 deficiency appropriations bill which includes another \$300,000,000 for relief in American occupation zones.

## FRITZ NAMED HEAD OF NCEA

### Unofficial Returns Indicate Election Upsets Precedent

Asheville, N. C.—(AP)—Advocates of the South Piedmont Salary Plan swept to victory over their more conservative fellow-teachers here today by electing a president and vice-president of the North Carolina Education Association.

Shattering a precedent as old as their organization, the teachers chose R. L. Fritz of Hudson as their new leader, flatly rejecting the bid of their retiring vice-president, Claude Grigg of Albemarle.

Not only did the group fail to elevate Grigg to the presidency—as has been the custom in past years—it went one step further and elected A. C. Dawson, Jr. of Southern Pines to the vice presidency, giving the South Piedmont faction an inside track for the office of president.

## Outsider Wins 'Grand National'

Aintree, England, March 29—(AP)—A 100 to 1 Irish outsider, eight-year-old Caughoo, dropped out of the clouds in the rain and mud of the clouds' fierce jumping course today to come from far back and win the 103rd running of the grand national steeplechase by 20 lengths.

Overhauling the faltering leaders and favorites only in the final half-dozen of the 30 jumps over this toughest race course in the world, the gelded son of within-the-law came surging up to the gold and glory of this century-old classic—but in the slowest time in half-a-century, 10:31 1-5.

## Lost Lifeboat Is Found; No Sign Of Missing Men

Honolulu—(AP)—The missing lifeboat from the broke tanker Fort Dearborn was found last night by the steamship China Victory but there was no sign of the 12 men who disappeared with it on the stormy night of March 12.

The China Victory, en route from the Philippines to San Francisco, picked up the Hawaiian Sea Frontier that Fort Dearborn motor lifeboat No. 3 was found drifting bottom-up 655 miles northeast of Midway Island.

"Badly damaged, Propeller gone from shaft. No sign of life," the China Victory radioed.

The 12 who launched the lifeboat minutes after the tanker cracked in half were the only crewmen unaccounted for. Thirty-two men were rescued from the buoy and stern sections by naval and merchant ships.

An extensive search of vast areas of the Central Pacific was made for the lifeboat by Navy planes, a cruiser and 15 destroyers.

## FRANCO MOVES FOR MONARCHY

### Cabinet Ready To Decree 'Traditional Monarchy' In Spain

Madrid—(AP)—An authoritative source said today the Spanish cabinet is expected to issue a decree Tuesday declaring Spain a "traditional monarchy," and in effect recognizing the regime of Generalissimo Francisco Franco as merely a temporary one.

This informant said that while the cabinet discussed the decree last night it probably would not make any announcement until April 1, Spain's "Victory Day," the eighth anniversary of Franco's victory in the Civil War and his assumption of full power.

He said such a decree, when announced and made effective would be the first public acknowledgment by the Franco regime of the "temporary nature of the present government."

The decree designating Spain a monarchy, this source said, would recognize Franco as "chief of state" and would provide that in the event of his death or inability to rule because of incapacity he would be succeeded by a regent.

"This regent, the informant added, would be a 23-member body headed by the President of the Cortes (Parliament), the Archbishop of Toledo (now Enrique Cardinal Daniel, Primate of the Realm), the Lieutenant General of the Army, Deputies of the Cortes and other representatives of the people would complete the regency."

Under the decree, the regency's first duty would be to examine the qualifications of claimants to the Spanish throne. Don Juan, son of Spain's last king and the present so-called "pretender," is the principal claimant. He is reported to be in Lisbon.

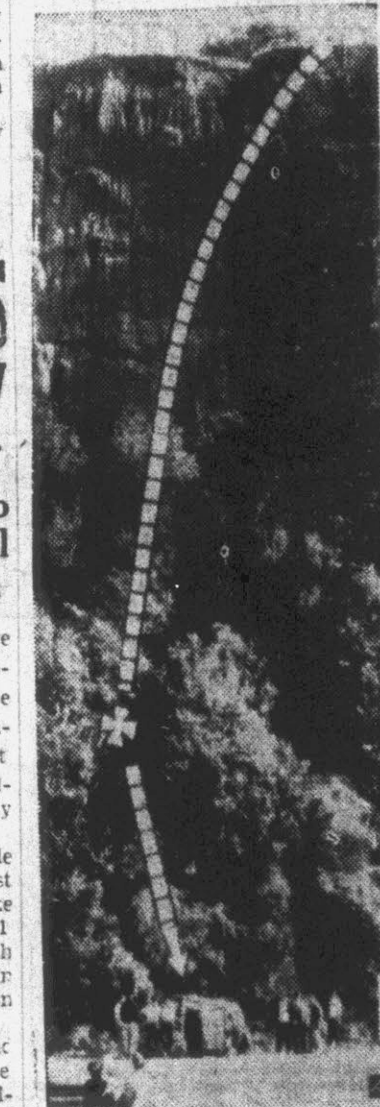

Detroit—(AP)—Top leaders of the CIO United Auto Workers took sharp issue today with Michigan Governor Kim Sigler's testimony that the Communist party has gained "absolute control of central unions."

Sigler's remarks yesterday before the House Committee of Un-American Activities were described by UAW President Walter P. Reuther as "part of the current all-out drive which organized reaction has launched against labor and liberal forces in this country."

Vice President R. J. Thomas and Secretary Treasurer George F. Addes, two of the three UAW officials who Sigler testified were "captives" of the Communist party in the United States, had quick denials to the charges.

## Bradley's Headache

### Running Veterans Administration A Tough Job; Some Of His Problems; How The General Looks On His Duties; How He Scorches 'Pennywise' Politics

Washington—(AP)—Running the Veterans Administration is a big job, and a tough one.

Because it's tough and getting bigger, President Truman more than a year ago borrowed General Omar Bradley from the Army to run VA.

How does he like the job? Apparently, not much. He wants to get back to the Army as soon as he can.

But before listening to what he says about it, here are some of the VA problems.

The VA operates the veterans' hospitals, educates and trains them, gives them loans to buy homes, and handles their insurance.

There are billions of details mixed up in that.

At this time there are 18,300,000 veterans of World War II and other wars eligible for veterans' benefits of one kind or another.

VA is paying for the schooling of 1,700,000 veterans now in 10,000 separate schools and colleges.

Another 720,000 are training in 358,000 job-training places.

## Pitt Commissioners Say 'No' To Petition By Communities For Division Of ABC Store Profits; Say Only Changes Can Come From Specia County-Wide Election

The Pitt County Board of Commissioners in special session last night rejected the petitions of Greenville, Farmville, Grimesland, Bethel, and Ayden to divide the ABC stores' liquor profits with them.

A resolution passed by the commissioners after hearing testimony from those for and against dividing the profits stated that any change in the present plan should only be had as a result of a county-wide election duly called for that purpose. It further provided that before any special legislation is proposed in the General Assembly that the people of Pitt County should be given an opportunity to be heard.

A representative group of citizens attended the meeting in the courthouse. Chairman W. Jasper Smith of Bethel presided. He asserted that the ABC system was inaugurated in this county for control, not for profit.

Speaking for a division of the profits were Mayor Jack Boyd of Greenville, Mayor J. W. Joyner of Farmville, Mayor J. L. Taylor of Arden, L. M. James, speaking for Mayor J. W. Rook of Bethel, Mayor Earl Trevaathan of Fountain, Mayor Ashley Elks of Grimesland, Marvin K. Blount for the city of Greenville, J. B. Kittrell, John B. Lewis, mayor of Farmville, and others.

D. J. Whichard, who advocated a division of the profits, pointed out that since it had been suggested that the people of the county be permitted to express their will in the matter, it would be appropriate at the same time to give the voters an opportunity to say whether they want to continue the present ABC system of handling liquor, or not. He declared the county would be better off without the liquor and the profits.

Opposing the proposal to divide the ABC profits were Mayor Ivan Bissett and T. J. Williams of Grifton, Ray Oglesby, R. H. McLawhorn and George Cox of Winterville, Dr. Paul Jones and Ben Lewis of Farmville, and John G. Clark of Greenville and others.

Dr. Jones reminded the assembly that there are 75 counties in the state without liquor stores and that it would be wise to handle this situation with care. Attorney Blount asserted that 18 of the 25 Blount counties divide the profits with towns counties with the ABC liquor system wherein the liquor is sold.

The resolution adopted by the board follows:

"Resolved that the Board of County Commissioners, believing that the ABC program was inaugurated by the people of Pitt County under the special condition that the program was one of control primarily and that the net profits, if any, would be paid into the General Fund of Pitt County, which would touch and affect every taxpayer in all sections of Pitt County fairly and equitably.

"Now be it resolved that the Board of Commissioners feels that any change from the present system should only be had as the result of a county-wide election duly called for that purpose.

"And be it further resolved that should any special legislation be proposed for adoption by the Gen-
