CLOSING MINES LOWERS COAL OUTPUT

Production Cut 26% By Krug's Order; Some Coal Operators Protest

By The Associated Press Closing of 518 coal mines in 19 states for reasons of safety will leave an estimated one-fourth of the nation's 400,000 diggers idle next week when the bituminous pits are scheduled to reopen after a six-day mourning period.

The Solid Fuels Administration said the shutdowns ordered by Interior Secretary Krug will cut production by 616,000 tons a day, a drop of about 26 per cent from the normal output.

Field reports indicated some uncertainty as to what the federal directive would mean in terms of its effect on industrial and civic activities. At Chicago, city officials conferred with coal suppliers on ways of increasing stock piles at city water-pumping stations.

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King George To Have Funeral On Easter Morning

Athens—(AP)—King George II, who died of heart trouble Tuesday some six months after his return to the throne, lay in state today in Athens' Greek Orthodox Cathedral while Greece awaited the arrival of other European royalty for his Easter-morning funeral.

Clark told reporters at the White House, after a Cabinet meeting, that seizure authority exists under the Federal Communications Act.

Board Of Aldermen In Busy Session Thursday

Approve Plan To Supplement Teachers Salaries; Vote Against Sunday Movies; Map Of City Now Being Prepared

By CHESTER WALSH At the meeting of the Board of Aldermen at the City Hall last night members of the Greenville City School Board and Supt. June H. Rose presented a resolution petitioning the board to authorize a special election to vote on a levy not to exceed 15 per cent to supplement schools teachers' salaries.

The aldermen approved the proposal. The petition will go before the Pitt County Commissioners Monday.

Acting Chairman Joe M. Taft, Charles W. Howard, J. Knott Proctor, and Dr. S. M. Crisp of the School Board, and Supt. June H. Rose explained the difficulty of procuring teachers under present salary laws. They pointed out that the colleges of the country are overpaying with GI students and that they are offering teachers higher salaries than the schools can pay.

Following presentation of petitions and speeches for and against allowing motion picture theaters to remain open during church hours on Sundays, the Board of Aldermen voted eight to one not to allow them to be open at that time.

There are nine members of the board. Mayor Jack Boyd presided. Protestant ministers and delegations from churches opposed allowing theaters to remain open during church hours.

The board approved the petition of the Carolina Dairy to erect a brick building for a garage and storage purposes on West Third Street in what is known as Skinning Ravine.

The Greenville Baseball Club declined the aldermen's proposal that the club take over the project of procuring advertising for the ball park fence and to pay the city a back debt on the cost of erecting the metal fence.

A petition to pave East First Street, between Jarvis and Woodlawn Avenues, was approved if there are sufficient paving funds available.

The mayor and aldermen commended City Clerk J. O. Duval for collecting 95 1/2 per cent of the 1946 taxes up to April 1.

The mayor announced that City Engineer Henry L. Rivers is preparing a map of the city for the purpose of correctly numbering houses and business places. The police department volunteered to assist in this work.

Attention was called to the selling of "bottled" gas for heating and cooking and the installation of the equipment without authorized inspection. It was stated that no licenses are on the books for this industry. The matter was referred to the Utilities Commission.

Henry Tripp presented a map of the Hillcrest subdivision in the eastern part of the city. This matter was referred to the Street Committee with power to act.

The application of the Veterans of Foreign Wars for a traveling carnival to exhibit on the parking lot outside of Guy Smith Stadium did not come up last night.

Washington, April 4—(AP)—The army will begin distributing soon its meritorious service medals to World War II veterans and occupation medals to eligible soldiers and veterans.

It announced today that present supplies of the three medals are limited but that taken presentations will be made to qualified outstanding individuals during army week which begins next Monday.

The provisions under which the medals will be awarded indicate that the number of eligibles will run into the millions.

Britain Starts Machinery For Charge Against Albania

Lake Success, N. Y.—(AP)—The 15 men sitting in the \$1,500,000 peace palace in the Hague may have a case to work on shortly.

The International Court of Justice, legal arm of the United Nations, has been in operation a year without any cases. Now the Security Council appears ready to toss a job to the 18,000-a-year judges.

Britain set the machinery in motion to refer her mine-laying charges against Albania to the World Court with a resolution to the council. Several nations immediately supported the step and close observers of the council's work saw a possible Russian veto as the only barrier.

Andrei A. Gromyko, Soviet deputy foreign minister, exercised the veto to kill an earlier council verdict finding Albania "had knowledge" of the laying of the mines which wrecked two Royal Navy destroyers and killed 44 sailors last Oct. 22 in Corfu channel. However, there was doubt whether Gromyko could use the veto again to block a reference of the complaint to the court.

Poland, Russia's partner in council voting, indicated it would abstain and in some circles this was viewed as a tipoff on what Gromyko would do next Wednesday when the issue comes up for vote. The Soviet-sponsored Albanian government denied the British charges, and both Russia and Poland insisted the British had no case.

Seators Hope For Action By Wednesday At The Latest

Washington—(AP)—Senator George (D-Ga.) said today the United States must act to check Russian expansion now through financial and limited military aid to Greece and Turkey or see the Soviets "overrun Europe."

SPECTACULAR TRAIN WRECK

Speeding Streamliner Derailed By Tractor; One Killed

Chicago—(AP)—One passenger was killed and about 35 persons were injured when the Burlington Railroad's speeding Twin City Zephyr was derailed by a tractor and crashed into the railroad station at suburban Downers Grove last night.

The tractor had fallen off a west-bound freight train that had just passed on an adjoining track and into the path of the stainless-steel streamliner, eastbound from Minneapolis to Chicago.

The crash in a flare of flame and shower of falling bricks ripped up three sets of tracks nine miles west of Naperville, Ill., where 45 persons died last April 25 in a collision of two Burlington passenger trains.

Several eyewitnesses said they saw "a tremendous ball of fire" as the Zephyr left the rails.

The train, which the Burlington said was traveling at its usual 75 miles an hour clip through the suburb 21 miles west of Chicago (Continued on Page 5)

Congressmen Hear U. M.W. Demands; Truman Backs Krug

Washington—(AP)—John L. Lewis' demands for greater safety for men who mine coal in what he called underground "slaughterhouses" brought ready promises of help from Congress today.

Teacher Problem Now Alarming, Trustees Assert

In presenting to the Board of Aldermen last night the School Board's request for an election for a 15-cent tax levy, Acting Chairman Joseph M. Taft stated that the time has now come when the Greenville City Schools cannot go into the open market and secure the services of teachers.

Charles W. Howard, another member of the school board, stated that "most people agree that good school teachers are underpaid and have been underpaid too long, but regardless of whether one agrees with that statement or not, the simple truth is that there are only so many teachers available and we are going to have to pay more money to get any teachers at all."

Knott Proctor said that this additional levy is to be used to increase the salaries of the teachers of the local schools and that it is a payment long overdue.

Supt. Rose brought out the point that the colleges of America are being swamped with GIs and that the colleges are raising the high schools and attempting to lure away every teacher with an M.A. degree. The colleges have a much higher salary schedule than the public schools. They have this higher schedule because their income from the federal government under the G.I. bill is so large that the colleges can outbid the public schools for the services of teachers, Rose said.

SKIRMISH FOR JAP PAYMENTS

Dividing Of War Reparations Becoming Big Tug-Of-War

Washington—(AP)—The United States moved today toward a showdown with Russia over the division of Japanese reparations, with all signs pointing to a battle as bitter as the one going on at the Moscow conference regarding war damages from Germany.

At stake are about 1,000 Japanese industrial plants earmarked for shipment to various countries in payment for damage during the war. Over Russian objections, the United States intends to send about 300 of them immediately to China, the Philippines, and eastern possessions of the Netherlands and Great Britain.

This country fought and won the preliminary skirmish with the Russians last yesterday when it invoked a procedural maneuver to break a deadlock over its plan to give the four nations some reparations without delay for "relief purposes."

The United States on Feb. 13 proposed to the 11 nation Far Eastern commission an interim program of advance reparations for China, the Netherlands East Indies, British Far Eastern possessions and the Philippines.

Thirty per cent of total reparations from Japan would be divided among these countries in this way: China, 15 per cent, the Philippines 5, the Netherlands 5 and Britain 5 per cent.

Officials acquainted with the situation said that during preliminary discussion Russia objected on the grounds that an over-all settlement of Japanese reparations should be reached first.

At the rate of increase the office is making it will not be long before Greenville is raised to the class for free delivery.

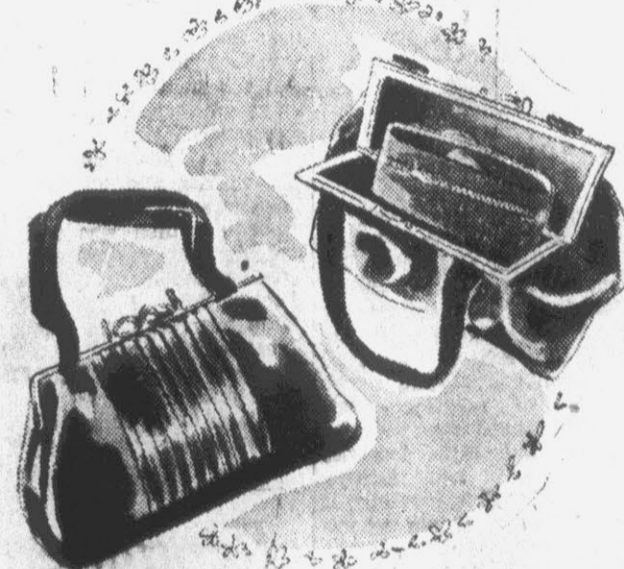

are standing out. The latter, who  
are outnumbered three to one by  
the Hindus, claim that they have  
no hope of fair treatment against  
such odds and insist on the estab-  
lishment of independent Moslem

Here enters the worst aspect of  
the position. There has been wide-  
spread fighting between Moslems  
and Hindus in many parts of the  
country and thousands of lives  
have been taken. There are reports  
—and they are not hard to believe  
—that some of these bloody clashes  
have been inspired by ill-advised  
political leaders.

As its own last resort, the union appealed directly to members of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company board of directors for help in negotiating a new contract.

The union bypassed the Bell System management, asking A.T.&T.'s board to order System officials to "seek a reasonable compromise."
