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READIES PLANS FOR UNITY OF PAN-AMERICA

Vandenberg Seeks Western Solidarity; Senators Seethe Over Wallace

Washington — (AP) — Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) was reported today to be preparing an appeal for intensified effort by the Pan-American Union to seal Western Hemisphere solidarity.

With the Senate on a week-end holiday from its debate over the Greek-Turkey assistance program Vandenberg drafted a major foreign policy speech for Monday's gathering of representatives of the 21 American republics.

Several other senators were still seething over the latest salvo by Henry A. Wallace against the Greek-Turkey plan—his assertion in London that Britain should refuse to take sides between the United States and Russia.

Senator Lucas (D-Ill.) told newsmen "it should be thoroughly understood in this country and throughout the world that he is speaking only for himself."

Senator Eastland (D-Miss.) accused the former vice president of trying to "induce the friends and allies of this country to desert her."

Colleagues predicted the Vandenberg speech Monday will be scanned closely by the world's foreign ministries for signs of the trend of bipartisan foreign policy abroad, as well as in the Americas.

But friends said they expected Vandenberg, who heads the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, to avoid any controversial subject that might be embarrassing to Secretary of State Marshall at the Foreign Ministers Conference in Moscow.

In a January 11 speech in Cleveland, the Michigan senator called on the Administration to propose the early convening of the long-delayed Pan-American conference of hemispheric defense to stem what he called a "communist upsurge."

Vishinsky Says Russia Will Not Revise Claims

Soviet To Continue Fight For Reparations Production On Large Scale; Admits Property Grabs

Moscow — (AP) — A. Y. Vishinsky, Soviet deputy foreign minister, has made it clear that in his opinion Russia never would accept a German settlement without reparations payments to the Soviet Union from current production, on a large scale.

Vishinsky, right hand man of Soviet foreign minister Molotov, said acceptance by the United States of the principle of current reparations was the thing "we have been fighting for" in the council of foreign ministers.

Vishinsky told a news conference—the first held by a Soviet official since the foreign ministers convened—that this lack of agreement on the approach to reparations was the foremost difficulty between the western powers and the Soviet union.

"A treaty without reparations," he said, "is a dead letter."

"Ifs" Before Reality

Word "If" Plays Prominent Part In Forecasting Deals
Wherein Blocs Must Make A Decision; "Hope" Rather Than "Expectation" In Big Four Talks

One of the highly important questions in connection with President Truman's policy of Greek-Turkish aid naturally is how long it may take to complete the program, and some Administration officials have expressed the hope that it can be done in fifteen months.

Senator Taft, head of the Senate Republican Policy Committee, also told a reporter yesterday that his approval of the bill to implement the new policy was given reluctantly, and added:

"Once the treaties are ratified Russia is committed to withdraw her troops from the Balkan countries within ninety days, except for those left to protect communication lines in Austria. If the Russians get out, as they have promised to do, I think the threat that Greece and Turkey will fall under Communist domination will end. In that case I can see no further reason for our continuing to give them assistance."

One notes the use of the word "hope" rather than "expectation" in both cases. And indeed there are a good many "ifs" to be accounted for before the hope becomes a reality.

Imperialistic Aims Charged By Wallace

Program Of "Ruthless Imperialism" Bitterly Assailed By Former Vice-President Truman Doctrine

Manchester, Eng. — (AP) — Henry A. Wallace charged today that the U. S. had embarked on a program of "ruthless imperialism" and declared that the program must fail because "Americans will never pay the cost and cannot pay the cost."

In an attack on President Truman's proposals for aid to Turkey and Greece, delivered at a public meeting in this midlands industrial center, Wallace said America's present program "if unchecked" would stretch the "American empire" from China to the near east and from pole to pole.

"This position of ruthless imperialism is the position which all groups blinded by hatred of Russia must ultimately defend," the former vice-president and Cabinet member declared, adding "It may cost little to divide the world, but to keep the world divided is beyond the resources of any nation."

Here on the first leg of a speaking tour that will take him to Stoke-on-Trent tonight and to Liverpool tomorrow, Wallace said the U. S. was controlled "by men who believe that in a world in which capitalism and communism live side by side there is little hope for peace."

"They believe," he said, "that the United Nations is doomed to insignificance. They believe that communism threatens the world and must be stopped by American material and arms."

But, Wallace said, "We cannot buy off world communism any more than we can suppress the idea of communism by force of arms. No free people will be bought—no free people will stay bought."

Wallace said the loans to Greece and Turkey—"the first down payments in a plan without shape or end"—were proposed "in the name of the struggle of freedom against totalitarianism."

Motorman Freed From Prison, Is Checking Wives

San Francisco — (AP) — Francis van Wie, the "Ding Dong Daddy" of the D Car Line, wasn't too sure how he stood today, maritally speaking.

San Francisco's 59-year-old car-barn Casanova, who admitted at his bigamy trial to having been married 13 times—without a divorce—left San Quentin prison yesterday. He had served two years of a 30-year sentence on three counts of bigamy.

Van Wie won his freedom early on a good behavior record and a plea for leniency by the judge who passed sentence. He had worked as a trustee in the prison library.

The round little streetcar motorman looked up his attorney, James Toner, to determine whether all his wives have obtained divorces or annulments. Toner thought Van Wie was starting with a clean slate, but checking would require some time.

TOWNS FINISH BURIAL PLANS

Tornado-Swept Communities Prepare For Funeral Rites

Woodward, Okla. — (AP) — Relatives today were completing arrangements for the burial of the 84 victims of Woodward's Wednesday night tornado which left 1,000 injured and caused property damage estimated in the millions.

The northwestern Oklahoma city was hardest hit of the Texas and Oklahoma communities in the path of the storm. More than 50 other persons were killed or died of injuries. Additional hundreds of injured taxed hospital facilities.

Donations of money, clothing and food poured into Higgins and Glasgow. A fund to rebuild the shattered towns reached \$40,000 in Am-erica.

Plans for mass funeral services in Woodward have been abandoned. Instead four of the leading churches have arranged separate rites, the first to be held today for 15 victims.

Rev. D. Allen Polen, Methodist pastor, said his church would begin funeral services tomorrow morning continuing them on an hourly schedule throughout the day. Yesterday relatives stood in line at the city clerk's office to procure burial lots in the city cemetery. Funeral directors said services and burials probably will continue on through next week.

TRUMAN FLIES TO HIS HOME

Begins Third Year In Office With Visit To Mother

Washington — (AP) — Feeling fine and looking fit, President Truman today began his third year in office with a flying trip to Grandview, Mo., to visit his 94-year-old mother who is bedridden with a fractured hip.

The president left Washington in his personal plane, the Sacred Cow. He told reporters during a 15-minute wait before taking off that he was feeling fine and noted that crises are just about as numerous today as they were two years ago when he succeeded the late President Roosevelt upon the latter's death.

After visiting his mother, he will motor to the Muehlbach Hotel in Kansas City to make a brief radio address (4:40 p. m. EST) as part of the memorial exercises commemorating the second anniversary of Franklin D. Roosevelt's death.

Mr. Truman will visit his mother again Sunday and leave for Washington in the afternoon.

The burdens of the presidency seem to rest lightly on the chief executive as he ends his second year in the White House nearing 63. His birthday is May 8.

His personal physician, Brig. Gen. Wallace Graham, says the president's health is the best it has ever been and that he has the energy of the average man 20 years younger.

Prison Camp Chief Is Oswiecim "Guest"

Warsaw — (AP) — Reddy Hays, convicted of killing 4,000,000 prisoners while he was German commandant at Oswiecim Concentration Camp, went back to Oswiecim today to be hanged.

Under heavy guard, he was turned over to the district prosecutor of the town. The time of the hanging was not announced.

Beirne Sees Long Telephone Tie-Up

Negotiations Collapse; Both Sides Look To Gov't For Next Move; Officials Talk Privately Of Industry's Seizure

Washington — (AP) — Collapse of several times privately with negotiators to end the important long lines portion of the cross-country telephone tieup left both sides looking to the government for the next move today.

While settling down for a long strike, said President Joseph A. Beirne of the National Federation of Telephone Workers.

Both Beirne and officials of the American Bell Telephone System left the door open for continued government efforts to end the shut-out over wages and other contract demands.

A administration officials talked privately of possible seizure of the industry by President Truman under provisions of the Federal Communications Act, but they showed little enthusiasm for this solution.

Secretary of Labor Schwechenne replied to a proposal by the NFW's policy committee that the government sponsor a face-to-face meeting between union leaders and top officials of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, with press and radio reporters invited.

So far there has been no meeting between Beirne and C. F. Craig, A. T. and T. vice president who helped bring off a settlement of last year's threatened telephone walkout 25 minutes before it was scheduled to begin. Craig has con-

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CIO LEADERS CONVERGE ON CAPITOL HILL

Organize For All-Out Fight Against Union Curbs In Legislation

Washington — (AP) — CIO leaders converged on the capital today to organize an all-out fight against legislation taking shape in Congress which would impose a long list of curbs on unions, including a flat ban on the closed shop.

The CIO war councils came only a few hours after both the Senate and House Labor Committees agreed to include the closed shop prohibition in their bills to stamp out some practices of organized labor by law.

The House Labor Committee headed by Rep. Hardley (R-N.J.) was called together for a final, binding vote of approval on a hard-fisted measure which also would prohibit industry-wide bargaining. The session was just a foretaste, since the group okayed the bill yesterday section by section.

The Senate Labor Committee, headed by Senator Taft (R-Ohio), went through about half of another huge bill yesterday, toning down many provisions over Taft's opposition. The committee, sharply divided on the issues, hopes to complete its work Monday.

Meanwhile the CIO, dead set against both bills, organized its opposition.

The CIO Political Action Committee was called into session this morning and CIO's nine vice-presidents scheduled a conference afterward to discuss the legislation. CIO President Philip Murray arranged to attend both meetings.

TWO DIVERGENT PHILOSOPHIES

We live in an age which lays great emphasis on the ability of man to take care of himself. Why? In a hundred years man has made a further advance in technique, has discovered more useful knowledge, and has achieved more triumphs over nature than through all the other centuries combined. A great deal of our modern philosophy, therefore, consists in shipping people on the back, assuring them that they are captains of their own souls, and urging them to keep on working and seeking, confident of success.

Our forefathers had not such a scientific age. But they had an overwhelming conviction that in the last analysis the end and issues of life are found to be in the hands of God anyway. The thing to do, therefore, they reasoned, is to learn how to work with that God who holds the world in the hollow of his hand. Men today believe in the philosophy of reason and oars. Pull hard enough, and you get there surely. Our forefathers believed that the thing to do was not so much to pull at the oars as to raise the sails and let the breath of God, which moves over the face of the waters of life, carry them on to appointed ends.

Modern philosophy is secular and man-centered. The counsel of the day is, stick to your oars; the counsel of eternity is, raise your sails.

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WASHINGTON LETTER

Washington — Sen. Wayne L. Morse (R-Ore.), foe of the filibuster, held the floor for five hours the other day when presenting a batch of labor bills drawn by himself.

preventing the employment of children during vacation. Moreover minimum wage laws should not apply to any under 21 years of age. Young people learn mostly through applying their knowledge, more work is what they need. Let's return to the apprentice system.

Adult Education
This brings me to the subject of adult education. The brain is much like the blood. As the blood can absorb only so much vitamin, so the brain can absorb only so much knowledge. Hence, education will be improved, not by spending more money on present high schools, but by encouraging more self-supporting adult courses and serving people when they finally want to learn something.

The greatest opportunity facing school committees lies with adult education, given to people who have awakened to the need of more education and are hungry for it. This is why the new College which I am backing at Eureka, Kansas, (the geographical center of the U. S.) is solely for adults. It will give short intensive five-week courses for adults, but only in the subjects for which they have found the need and are hungry.

Conclusion
To Teachers: Follow union labor and get all you can while the going is good. To Parents: Don't fool yourself by thinking that more money spent upon schools will make better boys and girls. Rather spend money and time to make your home more attractive. To Churches: Most of us know enough; our difficulty is that we lack self-control to apply what we know. Self-control comes after a rebirth due either to sad experiences or to spiritual conversions. Rehabilitate the churches Sunday schools and bring back an evangelism. Education and religion must go hand-in-hand or both fail.

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Vishinsky also disclosed that the Soviet Union was depending upon current production reparations in carrying out five year plans for rehabilitation of war-ravaged areas.

For the first time, a Soviet official acknowledged that the Russians were taking large scale current production reparations from the eastern zone of Germany. Blaming the western powers for a reparations breakdown on Germany-wide basis, Vishinsky said that "in the Soviet zone we have fulfilled our reparations quota rather well."

Vishinsky said the Russians began taking current reparations when the other powers did.

Charges that the U. S. and Britain have been taking current reparations have been denied in the foreign ministers council.
