

LEON CANNON IS GIVEN LONG PRISON TERM

Judge Burney Sentences Ayden Merchant For Murder Of His Wife

In Superior Court today, Judge John J. Burney of Wilmington, sentenced Leon Earl Cannon, retail merchant of Ayden, to serve from 25 to 30 years in State Prison for the shotgun slaying of his wife, Mrs. Thelma Cannon, last January 20.

Judge Albion Dunn, counsel for Cannon, had tendered on Wednesday a plea of guilty of second degree murder, and Solicitor Dave M. Clark had accepted it. This eliminated the need for a jury.

Yesterday afternoon an array of witnesses testified before Judge Burney about Cannon's habits and mental eccentricities. In pronouncing sentence today, the New Hanover County jurist said no one had convinced him that Cannon was not in his right mind at the time he shot his wife. It had been testified at the coroner's inquest that after shooting his wife, while she was preparing a meal at their home in Ayden, that Cannon had called a physician and notified an undertaker of what had occurred. In pronouncing sentence, the judge said he was sorry for the man, and added, "I have a duty to perform."

Cannon heard the sentence without visible show of emotion. James P. Briggs, electrical worker, who is charged with disorderly conduct, assault on a female, assault with a deadly weapon and resisting arrest, failed to answer to him when his name was called in court. His \$300 bond, fixed by Judge Jimmy Roberts in Police Court, was ordered forfeited.

Testimony in the lower court was that Briggs beat his wife, Mrs. Viola Briggs, a waitress at the Dixie Lunch Room, near Five Points, threatened other persons in the cafe, and then threatened Policeman Tommy Gladson with a butcher knife. Briggs was finally disarmed and was arrested.

Patrolman Gladson was given high praise at the time by his superiors and spectators for not using his gun when Briggs attacked him with the knife.

Testimony in the lower court was that Briggs struck his wife in the face with his fist in the cafe; that while she was unconscious on the floor, Briggs dared anyone to touch her; then picked her up and took her into the kitchen. When he saw the officer coming he picked up a meat cleaver, Gladson testified and threatened him with it.

General Motors Offers CIO-UAW New Wage Terms

Detroit.—(AP)—General Motors Corp. today offered the CIO United Auto Workers an 11-1-2 cent per hour wage boost plus pay for six annual holidays. The company described the offer as the equivalent of an increase of 15 cents an hour. Covering 220,000 production workers, it is a duplicate of the offer accepted earlier this week by the CIO United Electrical Workers for their 30,000 employees in GM plants. The UAW-CIO has demanded 15 cents hourly wage increase. General Motors last week offered a 10 cent boost. The average wage in approximately 90 General Motors plants is \$13.11 hourly for production workers.

Red Union Officials

New Labor Bill Passed By House Makes No Provision For Communists And Fellow-Travelers In Unions; Why It Is Important; Problems In A "Red-Hunt"

Washington.—(AP)—The House's new labor bill takes a great swipe at Communists and their sympathizers in unions but—

How? That became an unsolved question within one hour after the House passed the bill late yesterday. The bill doesn't answer it.

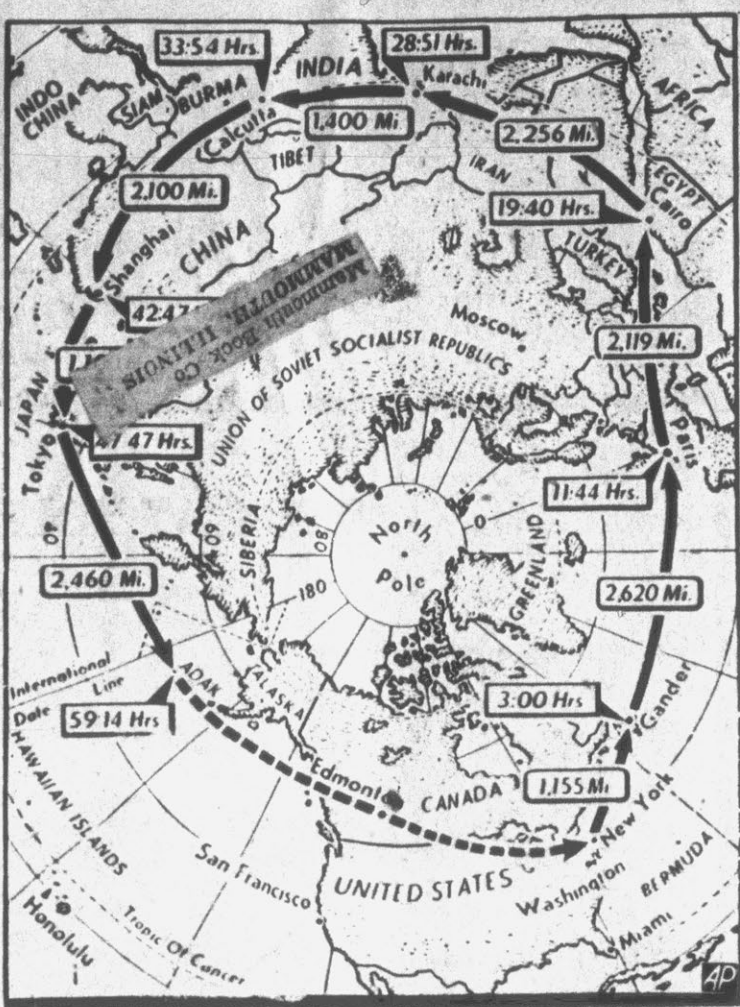
Yet, the answer is of profound importance to all unions if this bill ever becomes law. Many unions nowadays would be terribly weakened, unless employers were compelled by law to deal with them.

But this bill says an employer doesn't have to deal with a union in which any official is a Communist or Communist-sympathizer.

So, in effect, the bill bars any Communist or Communist-sympathizer from holding union office. It doesn't say a Communist can't be a member of a union. It just bars him from holding office.

But who decides—and how—what union official is a Communist or a sympathizer? That's where the bill is silent.

Russian Proposal Doomed In Council

Bid To Place U.S. Aid To Greece Under UN Supervision Loses Support; Delegates May Vote To Keep UN Investigators In Balkans

Lake Success, N. Y.—(AP)—Russia's effort to place American aid to Greece under United Nations supervision was doomed today by majority opposition in the Security Council.

A United States proposal that the council's Balkan investigating commission leave representatives in Greece temporarily to watch over the troubled frontier situation appeared assured of majority approval but might be vetoed by Russia. Both Britain and France have announced they opposed the Soviet move for a special security council commission to supervise the Greek part of President Truman's \$400,000,000 Greek-Turkish aid program.

The negative vote of either was enough to kill the Russian resolution. They were backed, however, by majority support to block the proposal without invoking the veto. British Delegate Sir Alexander Sadoski said he saw no reason why American aid to Greece should be placed under U. N. supervision while Soviet aid to Poland, Yugoslavia and others should be treated in another way.

French delegate Alexandre Parodi said France could not support the Soviet proposal for a special security council commission to watch over use of American funds in Greece unless the government agreed to it.

Parodi was followed by Brazilian delegate Dr. Oswaldo Aranha, who said he fully supported the American position.

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DISCLOSE NEW WAGE DEMAND

CIO Steel Union Discloses First Definite Pay Terms

Pittsburgh.—(AP)—The first definite wage increase demand coming from CIO United Steelworkers' contract negotiations was disclosed today—a 23-cent hourly boost asked of the Jones and Laughlin Steel Corporation.

A spokesman for the firm described the 23-cent figure as an "over-all" one, as besides a flat pay increase it includes "a lot of other things." Holiday pay provisions, presumably were among them.

The pay demand conceivably could set an industry-wide pattern. A report of a wage increase offered the CIO United Steelworkers by the giant U. S. Steel Corp.—and union leaders' denial of any knowledge of the move—circulated today as the steelworkers prepared for momentous weekend meetings that may bring a crisis to contract negotiations.

The pay boost offer was reported by the Iron Age, journal of the metal working industries, which said in a published statement that "a substantial wage increase" offer has been made.

Asked about such action, Philip Murray, president of both the CIO and the steelworkers, declared: "I know nothing about it."

Big Steel sources withheld comment "at this time."

Hoover Warns Of New Food Crisis For Coming Year

Washington.—(AP)—Former President Herbert Hoover today told an informal news conference that he feared the world faces a worse food crisis next year, largely because the war's victors have been destroying Europe's fertilizer-manufacturing plants.

Hoover, who made a personal survey of Europe's food production prospects at President Truman's request, came out of a closed meeting of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and told reporters that he had endorsed House legislation to supply \$350,000,000 in relief to European countries.

He said he urged that administration of this program be surrounded by "modest safeguards."

The most important thing, however, Hoover said, is to get the productive capacity of Europe built up again immediately. He said "all Europe is gasping for fertilizer."

HENRY FORD'S WILL IS FILED FOR PROBATE

Bulk Of Estate Goes To Ford Foundation; Edsel Heirs Control Empire

Detroit.—(AP)—The will of Henry Ford, noted automobile industry pioneer, was filed for probate today but gave no inkling of its extent.

It left the bulk of the estate, represented in non-voting stock in the Ford Motor Co. to the Ford Foundation, and all of Mr. Ford's holdings of voting shares to his grandchildren in equal shares.

Unofficial estimates of the estate's value have ranged upward of \$500,000,000.

Clifford B. Longley, attorney for the Ford family, said that when the will is finally cleared through probate, control of the vast Ford industrial empire will rest with the heirs of Edsel B. Ford, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Ford.

The will, dated February 3, 1946, left only the Ford home, "Fairlane," in nearby Dearborn, where Mr. Ford died April 7, to his widow along with some personal effects.

Other than the bequests to the Foundation, the grandchildren and the widow, there were no specific bequests.

The Ford Foundation, organized in 1936, contributes to the maintenance of Ford's Greenfield Village the Edison Institute in nearby Dearborn, to the Henry Ford Hospital and to other institutions. In

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Wallace Begins Speaking Tour In Scandinavia

Stockholm.—(AP)—Henry Wallace, describing himself as "an American capitalist or a progressive," said today that the United Nations and UNESCO charters gave him the right to speak his mind outside the United States.

Wallace spoke extemporaneously at a luncheon attended by 300 Stockholm professors, scientists, businessmen and journalists.

Referring to congressional criticism of his tour, Wallace said Americans who are suggesting that his passport be withdrawn have "the same type of intellect as those who suggest that the Russians are responsible for blowing up a French ship at Texa City."

"When I return to the U. S., I intend to pay my respects to that type of intellect, the former vice-president declared vehemently.

Head Of Nazi Puppet State Dies In Noose

Bratislava, Czechoslovakia.—(AP)—Dr. Joseph Tiso, the Czech puppet who became president of the wartime Nazi puppet state of Slovakia died on the gallows at dawn today for crimes against the Czechoslovak state.

His appeal for commutation from the sentence imposed Tuesday by a national court was rejected by the Czech government.

Churchill Says Wallace A "Crypto-Communist"

London.—(AP)—Winston Churchill today assailed Henry A. Wallace as a "crypto-communist" lacking the courage to explain his destination and accused the Laborite government of squandering the American loan of \$3,750,000,000.

Churchill told a Conservative party rally of 10,000 in Albert Hall that Wallace had sought "to separate Great Britain from the U. S. and to weave her into a vast system of communist intrigue."

"Our policy toward Russia must be one of honorable friendship through strength," Churchill said. "It must not be cowardly appeasement through weakness."

"It must be absolutely clear we shall allow no wedge to be driven between Great Britain and the U. S."

Phone Strike In Twelfth Day; Union Hope For Breakdown Of Equipment

Washington.—(AP)—The telephone strike went into its 12th day today with no sign of a new move by the union, the American Telephone and Telegraph Company or the government.

Some of the 20-odd companies in the Bell system, of which AT&T is the parent firm, said workers are returning to their jobs.

Leaders of the striking National Federation of Telephone Workers indicated they are relying on time to bring about a breakdown of the equipment.

AID PLAN MAY BE PROLONGED

Conditions In Greece Bad Says New Mexico Senator

Washington.—(AP)—Senator Hatch (D-NM) said today he believes that \$100,000,000 in American assistance will put Turkey firmly enough on its feet so it can stand unaided against the threats of communism.

But the New Mexico senator, a member of the Foreign Relations Committee, told a reporter he is afraid Greece will continue to need United States help "for a long, long time."

"Conditions in Greece are deplorable," Hatch said in summarizing a quick inspection trip to the two countries by members of both Houses. "I am afraid we are going to have to help them there for a long, long time, but I believe that we ought to be able to get 'out of Turkey by July 1, 1948, if all goes well there."

Hatch thus furnished a democratic reply to a recurring question in Senate debate on President Truman's proposal to make \$400,000,000 in financial and limited military help available to the two countries.

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Marshall Makes Accusation In Exchange With Molotov; Austrian Treaty Hopes Fade But U. S. Secretary Offers Compromise

Moscow.—(AP)—Secretary of State Marshall tonight accused Soviet Minister Molotov of trying to create "a puppet state of Austria," after Molotov had rejected an American compromise plan for the definition of German assets there.

Bitter exchanges between Marshall and Britain's Ernest Bevin, on the one side, and Molotov on the other, appeared to doom the slim hope that an Austrian peace treaty would emerge from the conference here. Georges Bidault of France observed:

"It is clear that no agreement has been reached on this article (German assets in Austria) and the result of this discussion has not helped our work."

Marshall told the conference the time had come "to make a determined effort right here and now" to compromise the issue.

Marshall offered a settlement formula retaining the American insistence that property which the Germans acquired in Austria under force or duress should not be considered as assets subject to seizure by the allies.

On this key point, however, Marshall made it clear he was not insisting on the exact words "force or duress" although there should be no disagreement among us as to the propriety of excluding from sizeable German assets forced transfers by coercion."

Earlier, Foreign Minister Gruber of Austria appealed to the council to finish the Austrian treaty quickly.

Sentence GIs In Murder Of Japs

Tokyo.—(AP)—An army court martial today sentenced one American soldier to death by hanging and four others to life imprisonment after convicting all five of the murder of five Japanese.

All five also were convicted on five counts of assault and on two out of three counts of destruction of property.

The five Americans were charged with clubbing to death five Japanese on roads west of Tokyo on the night of Jan. 31. Defense attorneys pleaded the soldiers were too drunk to know what they were doing.

Reach Contract In Westinghouse

Pittsburgh.—(AP)—The Westinghouse Electric Corp. and the CIO United Electrical Workers today announced a one-year contract agreement providing 15-cent hourly wage increases to more than 75,000 workers.

The agreement, the joint announcement said, settles "all economic issues" in the negotiations until April 1, 1948. Raises are retroactive to April 1.

The agreement is subject to ratification by the union conference board of Westinghouse locals on or before April 28.

HARTLEY BILL FACING UNION COURT FIGHT

CIO Official Promises Opposition "At Every Step Of The Way"

Washington.—(AP)—The CIO said today the labor bill approved by the House is "probably unconstitutional," and unions will attack it in the courts if it becomes law.

Nathan Cowan, CIO legislative director, said in a statement:

"The Hartley bill is an ill conceived, badly constructed and probably unconstitutional measure. We will oppose it at every step of the legislative process and in the courts."

The Senate expects to start debate next Wednesday on its own bill which lacks many of the union "ures the House voted. Chairman Taft (R-Ohio) of the Senate Labor Committee hopes to add some on the floor.

But the changes he has in mind would leave the Senate bill still far less stringent than the House measure. This indicates a big job in ironing out differences when the bills go to a conference committee perhaps late this month.

The House passed its bill late yesterday by a lop-sided roll call vote of 308 to 107. A powerful coalition of Republicans and Southern Democrats pushed it through, after rejecting all amendments to tone it down.

While this was happening, the Senate committee voted 11 to 2 approval of its legislation. Senators Pepper (D-Fla) and Murray (D-Mont) dissented after playing a major role in a rewrite job which stripped the bill of several proposed curbs on union activities.

In some respects the House bill and the Senate committee measure are alike. For example, both would:

• Ban the closed shop.

• Permit the more common union shop where a majority of workers vote for it, and—in the case of the House bill—where employers want it.

• Authorize court injunctions to break or block national paralysis strikes, such as a coal or telephone strike, stay in effect during compulsory mediation.

• Set up a new federal mediation agency, independent of the labor department.

• Make unions liable for unfair labor practices. Employers already are.

British Tax Cut Bolsters Stand By Republicans

Washington.—(AP)—The two top ranking Republicans on the Senate finance committee said today the British income tax cut bolsters the conviction that taxes can be reduced here too.

Chairman Millikin (R-Colo) and Senator Taft (R-Ohio) expressed that opinion in separate interviews but Senator Johnson (D-Colo) likewise a member of the committee that handles taxes for the Senate, said he is convinced that any Treasury surplus now in prospect will be "gobbled up by our foreign policy."

Hugh Dalton, chancellor of the exchequer, announced Tuesday that Britain's budget for the next fiscal year is more than balanced. As a result he said that income taxpayers will get some relief although stiffer excise rates will go into effect on such items as tobacco.

Coals To Newcastle

Henry Wallace And His Trip Abroad; Benefits Recognized By One Socialist Editor; John Bull And Uncle Sam Actually Partners In Wallace's Alleged Crime

Former Vice President Henry Wallace would seem to have carried a sizeable load of coals to Newcastle when he started on his European speech-making tour by telling England that Washington's Greek-Turkish program embarks the United States on "ruthless imperialism" and points the country toward war with Russia.

If our Uncle Sam has embarked on a career of sin (that old scamp, then Cousin John Bull is in the mess up to his neck. For it was John who first signalled that he no longer had the wherewithal to hold the fort in the Balkans and would Sam, for gosh sake, please rush to the rescue by supplying Greece and Turkey with the means of defending themselves against aggressive communism.

In short, John and Sam are partners in the crime which Mr. Wallace alleges. Small wonder then that a high British official on Wednesday let it be known that his government accepted no responsibility for anything Wallace had said in Britain or might say in the future. This was after U. S. Attorney Gen-

eral Tom Clark had declared in a speech that "one who tells the people of Europe that the United States is committed to ruthless imperialism—and war with the Soviet Union—tells a lie."

On top of this the London Daily Herald, which is the organ of the Labor (Socialist) Party, printed a pointed editorial which was signed by the editor who used the first person singular instead of the usual editorial "we," presumably so as not to commit the government. The editor said he thought Wallace while condemning the so-called "imperialism" of the United States, had dismissed much too lightly the many glaring faults of the Soviet policy. Apart from this, the editor said, Wallace's speeches had done good in Britain because they had caused a great many people to think harder and talk more frankly about the present drift in the relations between the great powers.

Thus it would seem that Mr. Wallace's efforts in Britain haven't done much, if any, damage to London-Washington relations. How-

Washington—The Swiss legation seems to keep its way of life, just as the country it represents always does.

Although they've lived for seven years in the social hubbub of Washington, Swiss Minister Charles Brugmann and his wife, Mary, the sister of former Secretary of Commerce Henry Wallace, entertain whom and when they please.

As the local society writer put it, they've never been known to give one of the "dreadful free-for-all parties which somehow have crept up on most diplomats."

Of course—it has been pointed out—it is easier to be the envoy of a nation that has "no axes to grind with any other nation." This always makes it simpler to invite just the folks you want, regardless of any political attachments.

The Minister and Mme. Brugmann like to entertain, but they never throw "bings." Their guests always know each other and never try to out-bow each other around the buffet table.

Though the Swiss legation is less pretentious than most of the residences occupied by foreign emissaries here, it is noted for its charm and taste of decoration, its warm and quiet hospitality.

The legation is the former home of the late Sen. Lawrence Cowles Phipps (R-Colo.). The Bruggmanns have painted the walls gray-green and draped them with a deeper tone of satin fabric to make a fitting background for the rare wood carvings and fine paintings which the minister has collected since early youth.

The paintings are mostly old Flemish and Dutch masterpieces.

Joyce, who is known for her starring role in "Tomorrow the World," said she was so frightened at meeting the President she hadn't been able to eat any breakfast.

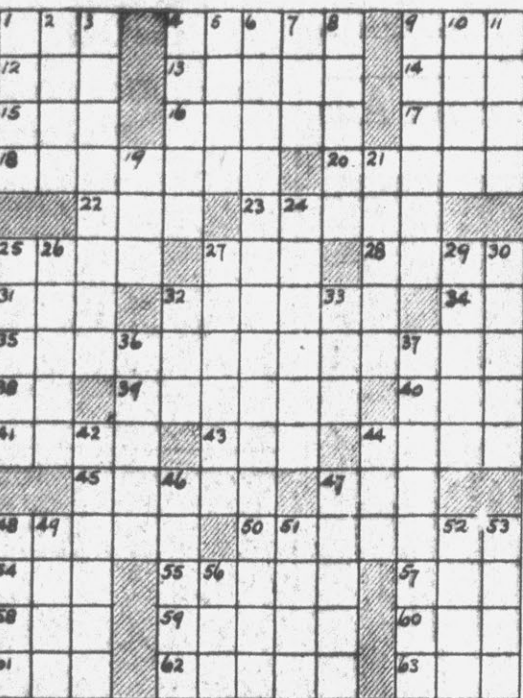
Richard, currently featured on Broadway in "Christopher Blake," said he had been frightened too but that once he met the President he lost his nervousness.

cratic members of the committee voted against the bill. They wrote a 31-page report denouncing it.

Some union officials now are openly Communist. Example: Ben Gold, president of the CIO Fur and Leather Workers.

Some union officials may be Communists but are concealing it. So they would be harder to discover. And deciding who is a Communist-sympathizer, actively helping the Communists, would be still harder.

On the question—who'd do the deciding and how?—Landis suggested this as a method which might be followed:

The House bill provides for an administrator, a government official, to handle relations between employers and unions.

He could decide after calling upon, and getting information from, the FBI and the Attorney General's office.

The Attorney General is gathering a list of groups he considers Communist-front organizations.

These are groups he thinks help Communist policies although their members are not necessarily Communist party members themselves.

So the administrator might decide membership in a Communist-front organization would bar a man from holding union office.

But right here more questions arise: How would the administrator start checking on a union official?

Would an employer complain to him? An unscrupulous employer could do that to stall, or ignore, or even wreck a union.

Would a union member complain? A disgruntled one could do that to try to wreck his own union or ruin an official of the union.

Would it mean, in the end, that any man seeking office in a union would have to present a certificate of approval from the FBI?

ing high before it drifted back over Texas City.

A stiff ground breeze from the south might send heat from burning humble tanks against others in the Sid-Richardson plant, and set them off.

However, oil fires have no flying sparks and officials said residential and business structures farther to the north probably would not be endangered.

Deaths among the injured overnight brought the disaster toll to 271 counted bodies, of which 194 have been identified. But scores—possibly hundreds—are missing and the fatality total is certain to rise.

The injured from the series of racking explosions and raging fires that have beset Texas City for the last three days are numbered in the thousands, with all hospitals in the Houston-Galveston area filled.

ever, an assault on an American foreign policy, delivered abroad by a one-time vice president, could do vast damage in other quarters.

One of them, for instance, is the Big Four Moscow conference which is in the midst of a grave crisis because of bitter differences between Russia and the Western Allies. The Wallace speeches might be the one thing which would stiffen Russian opposition to the disputed proposals of the Western democracies, in the belief that there was a large and growing section of the American public opposed to the new foreign policy of President Truman. By the same token Wallace's views might increase Washington's difficulties with such Russian influenced regimes as those in Yugoslavia and Poland, with which both America and Britain have exchanged sharp words.

Perhaps it's possible to assign too much importance to the effect of Wallace's speech-making on foreign relations. Time alone will tell how much significance the peoples of other nations will attach to his utterances.

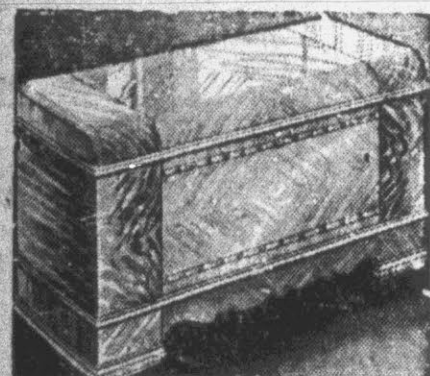

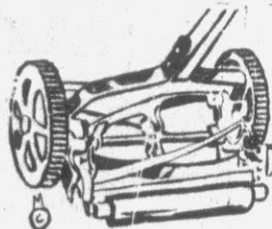

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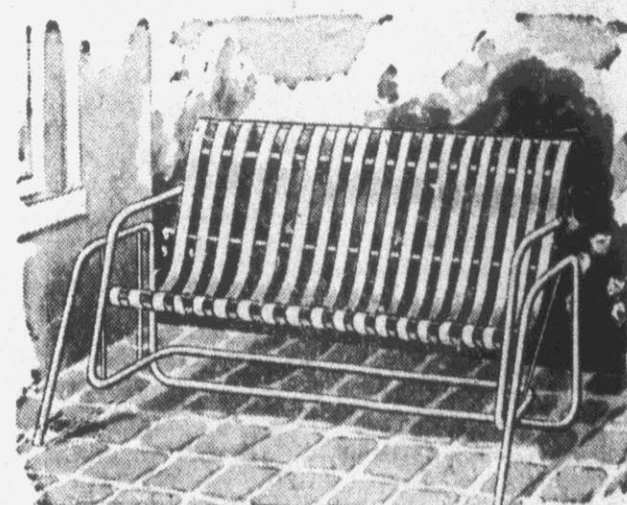
