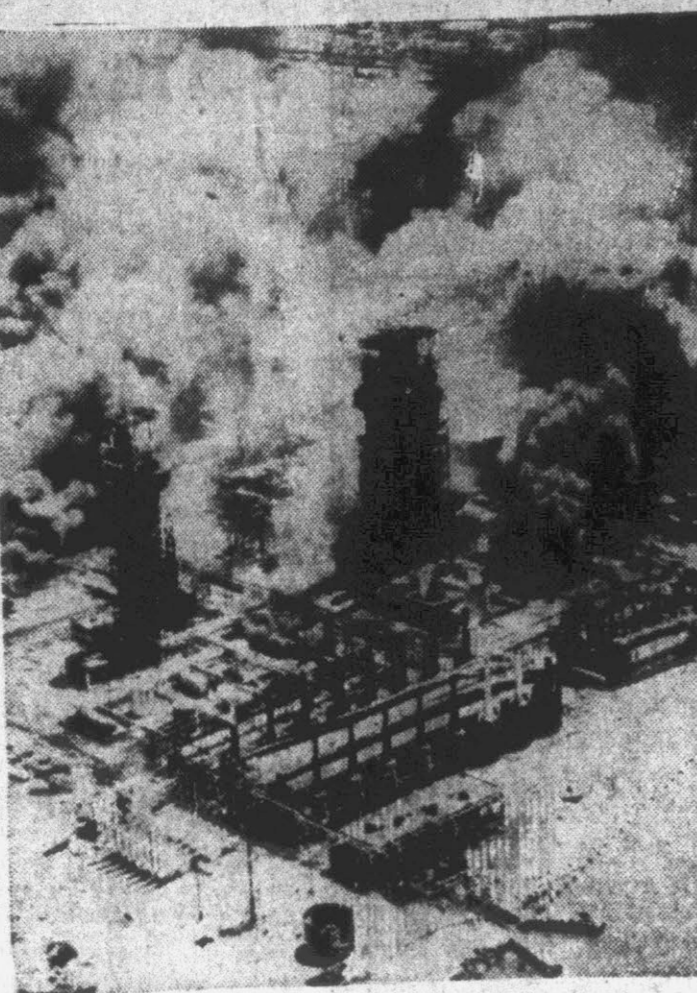

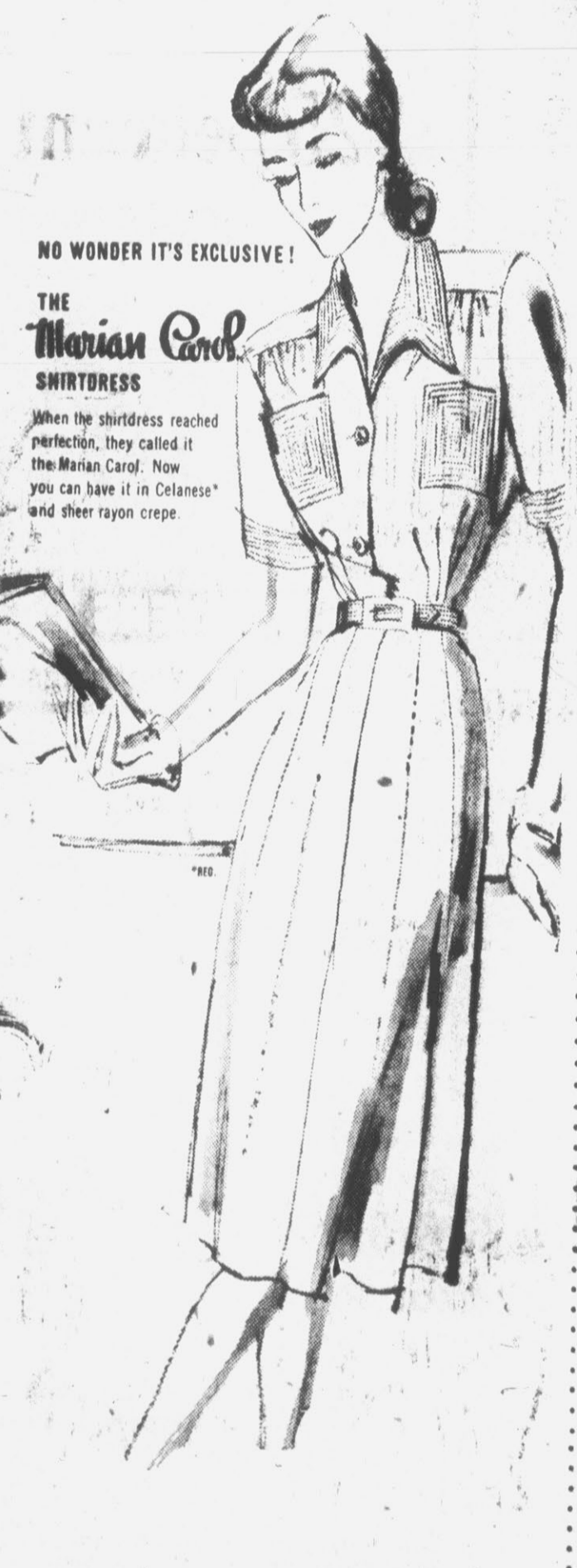

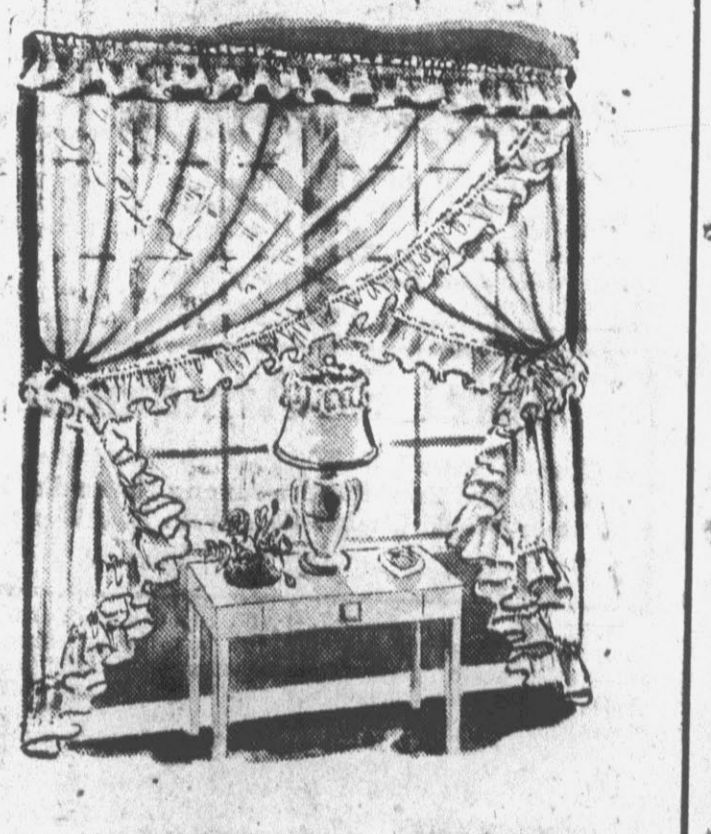

program that has proved so unpopular in Congress that both Senate and House appropriations committees have refused to give it clearance.

Russia agreed earlier this month to start talking a lend-lease settlement. When and if the talks are closed on that issue, the matter of the pending shipments apparently still will be before Congress.

That clearance is needed because of this sequence of events. Congress ordered all lend-lease shipments stopped Dec. 1, 1946.

Several countries, including Russia, had materials on order to their own specifications, but not completed, when the President ordered lend-lease halted after V-J Day.

The State Department sought to dispose of these to the countries involved, either for cash or for credit, as in the case of Russia, but couldn't ship anything after December 31 even if it had been paid for in advance.

Comptroller General Lindsay Warren said he wouldn't approve expenses for shipping the goods unless the appropriations committees would assure him such action would be legalized.

WE HAVE MET THE ISSUE!

Truman Asks Price Curb To Halt Inflation Spiral

Washington, March 26.—(AP)—President Truman appealed today for lower prices, saying he hoped business men would see the handwriting on the wall—the inflationary dangers of rising prices.

He suggested that those manufacturers who have reduced prices—the named Ford and International Harvester as examples—have set a course which others might well follow to the benefit of all.

All committees are expected to report on plans for the Shrine's Spring Ceremonial, to be held on the hot sands of Atlantic Beach May 21-22.

The occasion for the President's remarks was the 100th news conference he has held since becoming President two years ago next month. He covered foreign matters as well, but devoted much of the session to close-at-home items.

One of the reporters who crowded his office asked what he thought about current negotiations on organized labor demands for increased wages.

Mr. Truman said these negotiations seem to be coming along in good shape. He spoke approvingly of last week's settlement in the rubber industry as one which provided wage

increases without price increases. He said he does not think this contract will cause any inflation.

In this same connection, Secretary of the Treasury Snyder told a news conference that "labor must not make over-demands, or they will force prices up."

Price Cuts Indicated Snyder also reported "a number of indications" that big industries plan on cutting prices soon. While "not too optimistic," he added, he is "encouraged that they're thinking about it."

Cuts in prices that "are out of line at this time" will be reflected to consumers down the line, Snyder said.

While the Treasury head did not explain the "indications" of price cuts, he may have referred to discussions among a number of big businessmen who make up the Commerce Department's business advisory committee.

Prices are known to have been discussed "in general" at a recent session of the committee with Secretary of Commerce Harriman.

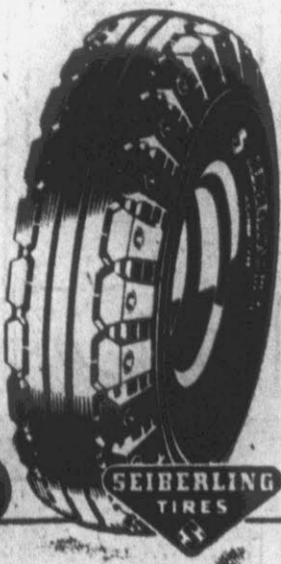

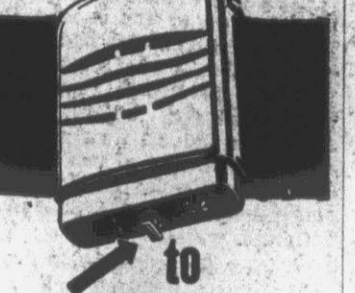

The League will play a total of 140 games during the season, playing seven days a week. The season this year includes six more games

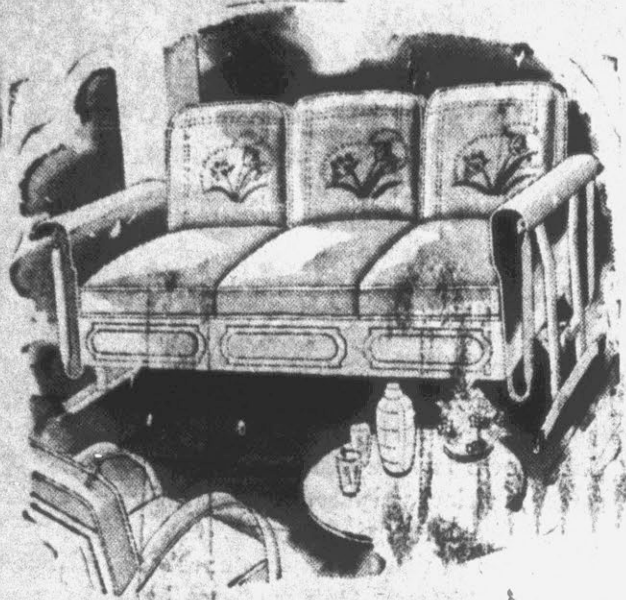
than last season and play will end on September 7th, after which the Shaughnessy playoffs will be used to determine the winner.

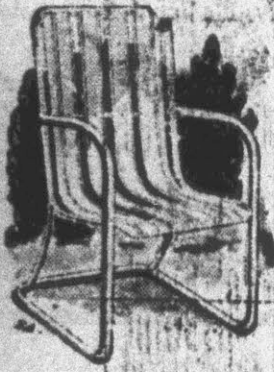

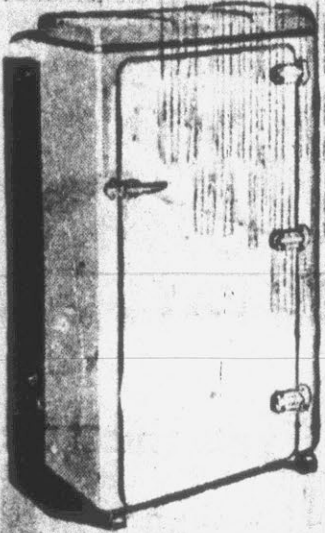
