

Conciliators Voice Hope Of Success

Push Negotiations In Long Lines Phase Of Nation-Wide Phone Strike; Michigan Bell Rejects \$11 Pay Demand; New York Co. Says "No Further Offers"

Washington, May 2—(AP)—Government conciliators reported "some progress" today in intensified negotiations aimed at a settlement of the important Long Lines phase of the nation-wide telephone strike — now in its 26th day.

In Detroit, the Michigan Bell Telephone Company rejected as "obviously fantastic" a demand from its striking plant employes for a wage increase amounting to \$11 a week.

In New York City, the New York Telephone Company said it would make "no further wage offer" to four independent unions most of whose 37,000 members have remained away from work despite a strike settlement agreement their leaders made on Wednesday.

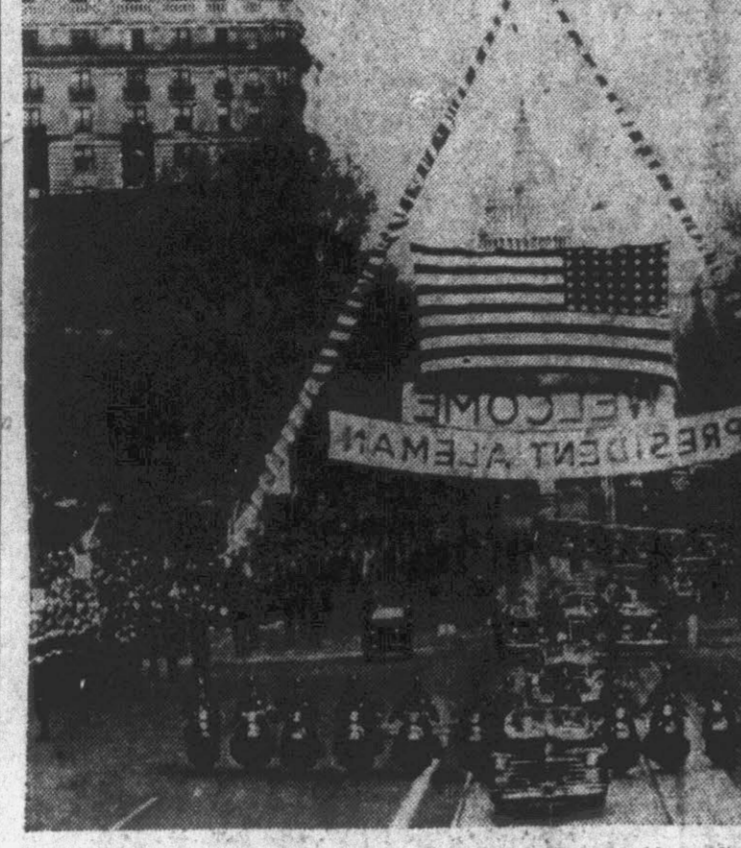

Unfortunately the church is often too much like the world to please the God it professes to serve. We need to watch lest in our folly we drop the Pilot.

 work out an agreement to keep Mexican money on an even keel.
 This means letting Mexico buy American dollars when she needs them and sell them back when she doesn't. This is how:
 Mexico, like any other country doing business with us, must have dollars to pay for what she buys here.
 In wartime, when she could sell us more than she could buy, Mexico was able to build up a supply of dollars.
 Now she's buying from us again and using up those dollars. Right now a dollar is worth about five pesos.
 If dollars get scarcer, because they're used for buying American goods, some Mexicans may start offering 6 or 7 or 8 pesos for a dollar. That would cheapen the value of the peso.
 If that starts, the Mexican Government may want to buy American dollars to keep the value of the peso sound: five for a dollar.


