HOUSE BUDGET BODY SUBMITS OWN VERSION

Advocate 23 Percent Cut In Funds For Three Gov't De- partments

Washington, May 5—(AP)—A 23 percent cut in the combined 1948 budget of three government departments and the federal courts was recommended today by the House Appropriations Committee.

The committee sent the \$535,028,000 omnibus supply bill to the House floor with a sharp report warning all federal agencies against a "spending psychology" and making these recommendations for funds:

State Department: \$219,128,058, a reduction of \$60,409,565 or 22 percent below the President's budget estimates but \$37,592,352 more than it had for the current year.

Commerce Department: \$191,057,000, a 33 percent cut below the budget figure of \$286,989,000 and \$8,660,420 less than for 1947.

Justice Department: \$108,396,500, a cut of about 2.7 percent from budget estimates of \$111,470,000 and 1,293,450 less than the 1947 total.

Federal judiciary (the courts): \$16,446,450, a 20 percent slash from budget estimates of \$20,724,900 and \$1,390,152 below 1947.

The bill's total is \$163,593,515 below budget estimates but \$26,248,330 more than the combined agencies received this year.

The bill finances activities of the agencies for the fiscal year starting next July 1. It is scheduled for House consideration late this week.

In a lengthy report explaining its actions, the committee suggested that the State Department get out of "the news business" and criticized the Commerce Department for "nursing business rather than aiding it."

It recommended:

1. Abolition of the State Department's war-born foreign cultural relations program, which Secretary of State Marshall had defended as "an integral and essential part of."

Highway Death Toll In March Decreases

Raleigh, N.C., May 5—(AP)—A decrease of 20 per cent in highway fatalities in March as compared with March of last year has been reported by Commissioner of Motor Vehicles T. Boddie Ward.

Ward reported a total of 65 highway deaths in March as compared with 82 in March of 1946. The toll of injured was 517, compared with 521 in March last year.

Is It All Doubletalk

Stalin Tells Stassen Russia And America Can Live In Harmony If There Is A Will To Cooperate; Both Sides Express Desire, But Look At The Propaganda

The interview which Generalissimo Stalin accorded former Minnesota Governor Harold E. Stassen is (on the face of it) an invitation to America and the other Western Democracies to hope that the serious differences between Russia and ourselves may be solved amicably. Stalin declared that the conflicting economic systems of Russia and America can exist in harmony together if there is a will to cooperate. The question of the will to cooperate strikes me as being the key-note of the whole situation. The Soviet leader put it like this: "It is necessary to make a distinction between the possibility of cooperation and the wish to cooperate. The possibility of cooperating always exists, but there is not always present the wish to cooperate. If one party does not wish to cooperate, then the result will be conflict, war, x x x I want to bear testimony to the fact that Russia wants to cooperate."

Well, the Western Allies for their part have stated time and again that they desire to cooperate. Thus both sides want to cooperate—so they say. Still, the conflict of words and deeds between the Russian bloc and the Western bloc continues to grow.

Jewish Agency Will Appear At Hearings

U.S. And Russia Reportedly In Agreement; Reach Compromise Wherein Jews Will Be Heard By U.N. Committee

New York, May 5—(AP)—The United States and Russia were reported agreed today on a joint Slav-Latin-American plan to end the stalemate over Jewish representation in the United Nations Palestine debate.

The compromise plan provided that the official Jewish Agency for Palestine would be given a hearing before the General Assembly's 55-nation political committee but not before plenary meetings as the Russians had previously insisted.

The only question remaining to be settled was the final wording of a resolution which would be acceptable to all factions.

A spokesman for the American delegation said the principle of the compromise was acceptable to the United States but that no decision had been made as to which one of five draft proposals was preferable.

The proposals were put forward at the opening of today's session by Yugoslavia, White Russia, Argentina, Chile and Uruguay.

As the delegates assembled to resume debate on this controversial problem in plenary session, informed quarters said the United States would accept the compromise proposal only on condition that it restricted the Jews to the status of witnesses on call before the Assembly's 55-nation political committee.

The United States was said to feel that the official Jewish Agency for Palestine and other organizations should not be permitted to participate fully in the debate, even before the political committee, and should not be allowed to appear at all before plenary meetings.

A member of the Soviet delegation said Russia still felt the Jews should be given a hearing on the floor of the Assembly but was willing to have them heard by the political committee if the majority of the delegates felt that was better.

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SENATOR TAFT ASKS DECISION ON ACTIVITIES

Calls On Legislators To Determine Ex- tent Of Expanding Federal Works

Washington, May 5—(AP)—Senator Taft of Ohio called on Senate and House Republicans today to decide how far they want to go this year in expanding government activities in such fields as social security, housing, health and education.

Taft, who heads the Senate Republican Policy Committee, told a reporter he will name a subcommittee soon to confer with a similar House group on general GOP policy toward measures which call for increased federal expenditures at a time when the party is trying desperately to cut President Truman's budget.

He made it plain that despite his sponsorship of bills to provide housing, health and education assistance, he is willing to abide by the composite Republican decision on these and similar matters.

Secretary of State Marshall took unusual measures to combat one economy cut when he invited congressional leaders to meet with him and radio industry executives today (2:30 p.m. EST) to consider impending House Appropriations Committee action in whacking off funds for the State Department's cultural relations division and its overseas broadcasts.

With Congress beginning its fifth month, the Republicans soon must decide whether they intend to limit their program to the passage of such major legislation as that affecting labor regulation, tax reduction and foreign relief and assistance so they can shut up shop about August 1 and go home.

Democrats generally believe the Republicans will put off until 1948, a Presidential election year, consideration of social security, veterans, housing, education and such measures.

RAIDERS DROPS COMMUNISTS FROM COALITION GOV'T

Paris, May 5—(AP)—Premier Paul Ramadier faced an uncertain future today as he embarked upon the experiment of government without the powerful, labor-controlling Communist Party.

The socialist premier dropped the five Communist ministers from his coalition Cabinet last night after winning a 360 to 186 vote of confidence in his wage-freezing policies with the Communist members dissenting.

Ousted from the Cabinet were Vice-Premier Maurice Thorez, Francois Billoux, national defense; Charles Tillon, reconstruction; and Ambrose Croizat, labor.

Georges Marrane health minister, was due to resign today. He was not present during yesterday's vote.

No new ministers were added. Incumbents among the Socialists, MRP and Radical Socialist Parties simply took over the Communists' jobs.

It was not apparent, however, that the Cabinet shake-up had brought any solution to the situation which prompted it.

But Ramadier's action—involving the startling removal of his Socialist Party's right wing over its left—had put to a crucial test the post-war French political axiom:

"It is impossible to govern with the Communists and equally impossible to govern without them."

Fort Leavenworth, Kas., May 5—(AP)—The Army continued its investigation today into the Fort Leavenworth disciplinary barracks race riot in which one person was killed and 11 injured, but made no comment on its preliminary findings.

Normal routine was resumed at the barracks.

The customary mess hall seating arrangement, out of which the rioting stemmed, was in effect with Negroes and white being served in the same room but at separate tables.

Long smoldering resentment of the whites over eating in the same mess hall with the Negroes flared into the open Friday. The rebellion was brought under control Saturday night.

Dewey Osborne, 30, a white prisoner of Mountain City, Tenn., was beaten to death in the fighting among the prisoners. Six other inmates—four Negroes and two white—and five guards were injured.

After hundreds of tear gas bombs had been lobbed into the cell blocks containing the rioting men, an "unconditional surrender" ultimatum was issued.

Two hundred and thirteen Negro prisoners heeded the order first and six hour later the remaining 514 men involved also surrendered.

Jerusalem, May 5—(AP)—British troops and police fanned out over northern Palestine today in a great manhunt for 227 Jew and Arab prisoners still at liberty after a mass delivery from Acre Prison engineered yesterday by the Jewish underground.

Sixteen persons—including 11 members of the underground band who blasted a two-yard hole in the wall of the ancient citadel—were killed in the break, described as one of the biggest in modern times.

A total of 251 of the 555 inmates of the old gray-walled prison north of Haifa participated in the dash for freedom, but five—four Jews and an Arab—were killed before they could make good their escape.

Nineteen—eight of them wounded—were captured within a few hours. Twenty-three others were wounded in the exchange of gunfire and

'Settlement By Nightfall' Predicted In Phone Strike

Over 600 Workers Return To Work Over State; Employees In Some Localities Hold Out Awaiting Results Of Confer- ences That May Lead To National Settlement

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STASSEN SEES LOAN DANGERS

Endorses Greek Aid Program But Warns Of Civil War

Washington, May 5—(AP)—Harold E. Stassen, although saying he favors the \$400,000,000 Greek-Turkish aid program, declared today it would be a "tragic" mistake for the United States to arm an all-out offensive against guerrilla opponents of the present Greek Government.

At a news conference where he discussed the program, the former Minnesota governor also termed the general doctrine back of President Truman's policy a negative one.

He said he endorses the aid program in the form approved by the Senate but hopes that military expenditures will not be such as to bring about a full scale civil war in Greece.

Instead, Stassen said, the United States should concentrate on attempting to build a stable and prosperous regime in the valleys of Greece which by its very prosperity would weaken the appeal of communism to the mountain guerrillas.

New York, May 5—(AP)—Herby Mayer, counsel for some of the unions of the National Federation of Telephone Workers (Ind) said today there might be a settlement of the nationwide telephone strike by tonight.

Simultaneously the NFW regional strike committee said that a meeting of the national policy committee and the intensive drive by government officials this afternoon both point to an imminent nationwide settlement.

Mayer, declaring "there might be a settlement by tonight," said he based his opinion on a statement by officials of the long lines department of the American Telephone and Telegraph Co., who reported they would review immediately a federal proposal of a \$6.14 weekly wage increase.

Washington, May 5—(AP)—The possibility of a two-way development in wage negotiations spurred hopes of federal conciliators today for settlement of the telephone strike.

As the country-wide walkout entered its fifth week, government mediators centered their attention on prospects that:

1. Officials of the AT&T's long lines division might bring along a counter wage proposal when they resume talks (3 p. m. EST) with representatives of the division's 29,000 long distance workers.

2. Stalemated negotiations between the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company and the important Southwestern Telephone workers might enter the wage discussion stage for the first time.

Will Be New Registrar At College; Begins Duties Sept. 1

Dr. J. K. Long, a native of Seaboard, N.C., and for the past eight years assistant superintendent in charge of secondary education of the schools in Louisville, Ky., has been appointed registrar and director of admissions of East Carolina Teachers College and will enter into his new duties on September 1. He will replace Dr. Howard J. McGinnis, who will head the new bureau of field services to be established at the college at the beginning of the fall quarter of this year.

Dr. Long has a long record of service in the schools of the state and elsewhere. He was graduated from the high school in Seaboard and attended the University of North Carolina for three years. ECTC Registrar Will Organize New Bureau

A new bureau of field services will be established at East Carolina Teachers College and will be opened at the beginning of the fall quarter in September with Dr. Howard J. McGinnis, now registrar of the college, as director, according to an announcement from the office of Dr. Dennis H. Cooke, college president.

Dr. McGinnis, registrar of the college and director of admissions since 1927 and acting president for two years from 1944 to 1946, will retire from his present position on August 31, and will take over the work of organizing the bureau and directing its activities for one year. Since Dr. McGinnis is well acquainted with public schools in North Carolina and has been an administrative officer of the college for many years, he was chosen to head the new bureau, which will enable the college to offer a new type of service to schools in this section of the state.

Connected with the new bureau will be Dr. Allan S. Hurlburt of Phelps, N.Y., who will join the faculty in September as chairman of the department of school administration and supervision and will devote half of his time to field service. Dr. J. L. Oppelt, director of student teaching and placement at the college, will also be a member of the staff.

The bureau of field services has been organized, according to President Cooke, to meet demands and requests of public schools for aid and counsel in meeting their problems and to keep the college close to the schools of the eastern section of the state.

To determine what types of services are needed and can be rendered, the bureau will make a canvass of public schools in eastern North Carolina. One of the chief duties of the staff will be to follow up recent graduates of East Carolina who teach and to help them make their work successful. Extension courses will be organized and

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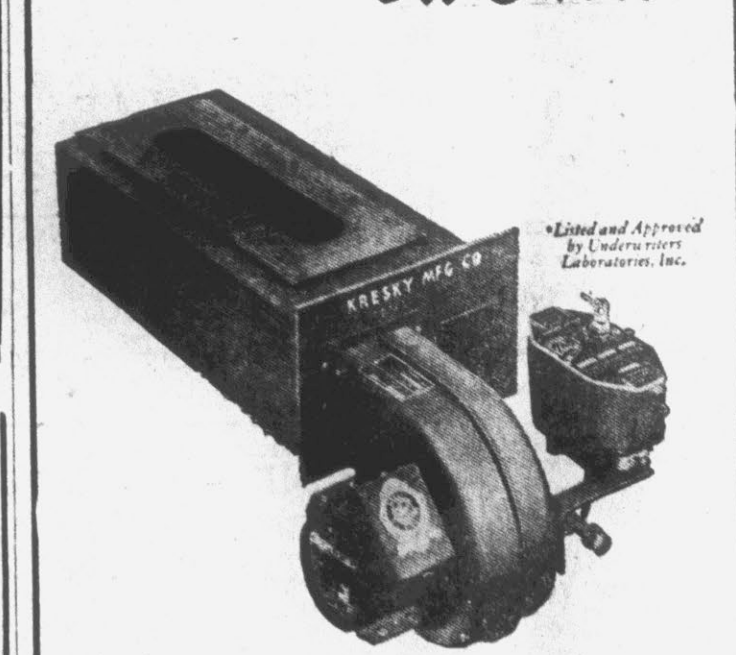

AN INFAMOUS IMMORTALITY
Some men have the misfortune of gaining for themselves an infamous immortality. In our own country, Benedict Arnold and Aaron Burr were of this variety. In Bible times we find Judas Iscariot and Jereboam, the latter of whom is always referred to in these words: "Jereboam, the son of Nebat, who made Israel to sin."
This Jereboam was an energetic, crafty usurper who weaned the ten northern tribes away from their allegiance to Solomon's son and set himself up as ruler. No one denied his ability, but everything he did indicated a lack of conscience and character destined to make him hated in the eyes of subsequent generations. He regarded religious faith with amiable amusement, and unhesitatingly led his people into idolatry. He put his own ambition first and the religious welfare of his people last. Someone has said of him: "He set no value on God's favor, and God set no value on him."
Jereboam reappears continuously in the stream of modern life. We often see his imperious figure walking at the head of some gigantic movement, leading his followers by his charm or driving them by his energy.
No matter in what century Jereboam reappears, he is always unscrupulous. You can pick him out today in political life, in industry, in business—sometimes in the church.

WOMEN'S BUREAU MAY BE DROPPED FROM LABOR DEPARTMENT
By JANE EADS
Washington — Congressional reorganization of the Labor Department may result in elimination of the U. S. Women's Bureau.
The report is that the House Appropriations Committee is considering wiping out both the Division of Fair Labor Standards and the Women's Bureau—both under Labor—by refusing to give them money after July 1 to continue operating.
The Women's Bureau, set up almost 30 years ago to study the problems and progress of the working woman in this country, is asking an appropriation of \$350,000 for the 12 months beginning July 1.
The bureau was set up as a temporary World War I agency in July 1918. The act creating it as a permanent agency in June 1920 declared its duties should include:
1. To formulate standards and policies which shall promote the welfare of wageearning women.
2. To improve their working conditions.
3. To increase their efficiency.
4. To advance their opportunity for profitable employment.
Congress authorized the bureau to investigate and report to the Department of Labor upon all matters pertaining to the welfare of women workers.
Mary Anderson, who had been assistant director of the temporary agency under Mary van Kleeck, became director of the permanent bureau and remained its chief until her retirement from government service in June 1944. Freda Miller became her successor.
From a small staff, the bureau under its greatest pressure during World War II, was forced to increase its personnel from 25 to 60 and then to 75.
Bureau officials say there is a continuing need to educate the public that some women need to work for wages and that some jobs need women workers.
They say their work has tended to improve wages of women workers throughout the country but that inequalities and injustices still exist.
There is still the tendency on the part of some employers to pay women workers less simply because they are women and the work they



do is "women's work."
Those interested in the woman worker are concerned that she get equal pay in jobs where her work is the same or comparable to the work done by men.
There are only seven states where an equal pay law exists, although a good many other states are trying to do something about improving this situation.

Many are turning to the Women's Bureau for advice, for copies of a model legislative bill on equal pay for all manner of publications dealing with working women's problems.
The bureau has issued more than 250 printed reports dealing with such subjects as employment trends, guides to good working conditions, labor legislation and the legal status of women. Thousands of copies of each have been sold or distributed free. That the working woman is an important factor is shown in the fact that the number has increased from 13,000,000 in the pre-war years to 16,000,000 today.

Auto Workers Ratify GM Pact

Detroit, May 5.—(AP)—Ratification of the General Motors Corp. wage agreement was announced by the CIO United Auto Workers today as their negotiators met with the Ford Motor Co.
President Walter P. Reuther said 89 of 75 locals in General Motors plants voted to accept an 11 1/2 cent hourly wage increase plus six paid annual holidays.
The union opened its Ford negotiations with its original demand for a 3 1/2 cent hourly wage boost despite the pattern set in the General Motors and Chrysler settlements. An estimated 100,000 employees are affected.

is unusual. The NFWA has a policy committee of 49 members. But the unions are not compelled to submit their actions to this policy committee. They can if they want to but they don't have to. Each union has the authority to sign a contract.
The A.T. and many of its companies offered to let the wage issue be settled by arbitration, though not on a national, blanket basis for all companies.

But in general, the companies have held back any wage offers until they had assurance that the union involved possessed the authority to make a settlement.
The A.T. long lines department made its first wage offer Friday after getting this written assurance from the American Union of Telephone Workers, the long lines group.
The union did not promise to submit a settlement to the policy committee.
Yet it is true that the NFWA committee has gradually receded from the limelight as the strike is lengthened.
Wage offers now have popped out in various places. But so far at least, they have not shaped on a uniform nationwide pattern demanded by the NFWA.
The NFWA appears to be losing this phase of its drive. What effect this will have on the NFWA dream of one strong union remains to be measured.

The statement by the War Department Tuesday said pilferage of army supplies "has been and continues to be a difficult problem" but said published figures of the amount of losses were misleading.

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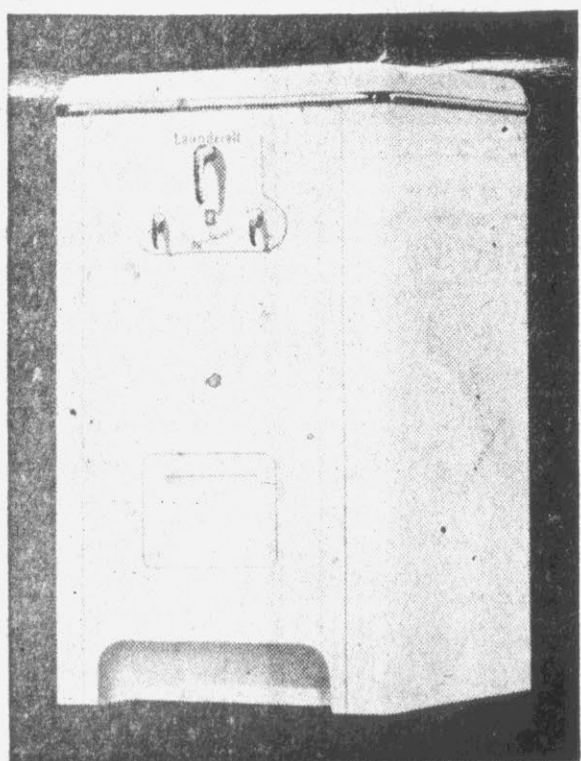
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
