Free-Palestine Move Is Beaten

Russian-Sponsored Measure Defeated; Inquiry Commission Gets Free Hand; Arab States Threaten Walkout In Protest Against Majority Stand

Lake Success, N. Y., May 13.—Despite a threatened Arab walkout, the political committee of the United Nations Assembly today defeated a Soviet move to have a U. N. Palestine inquiry commission draft proposals for immediate independence of the Holy Land.

The vote was 26 against the Russian measure, 15 in favor, with 12 abstentions and two absences.

This meant that the inquiry commission would be given a free hand to consider all possible solutions of the Palestine problem without any special reference to the independence question.

The vote came after Paris El Khoury, Syrian delegate, said outside the chamber that the Arab delegations were considering the possibility of walking out of the assembly in protest against a majority stand on the Palestine question.

El Khoury, a leading spokesman for the five Arab states in the U. N., told newsmen that if the present trend in the deliberation of the assembly's political committee continued, the Arabs would adopt a policy of non-cooperation with the work of the proposed U. N. Palestine inquiry commission. He said the Arab delegates might even leave the assembly.

El Khoury specified that this eventuality was in the process of development. (Continued on Page Four)

SELECT JURY IN MOB TRIAL

State Begins Case In Trial Of S.C. Lynch Slaying

Greenville, S. C., May 13.—(AP)—Three men were chosen today to complete an all-white jury and the state of South Carolina began its case in the mass trial of 31 white men charged with murder in the lynch slaying of Negro Willie Earle. Spectators crowded the courtroom, with the special balcony seats for Negroes well filled, as the state began the biggest lynching trial in its history and perhaps in the country.

All jurors swore they had no objections to capital punishment and that they had not contributed to a public defense fund.

Judge J. Robert Martin, Jr., designated Hugh Anderson as foreman of the jury. An alternate juror was selected. No Negroes were selected. (Continued on Page Five)

Advocates Full Foreign Relief Fund Be Passed

Washington, May 13.—(AP)—Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) said today a proposed \$350,000,000 foreign relief fund should be provided in full because "the Greek-Turkish aid program cannot succeed if we let the people of Europe go hungry."

Vandenberg, who is chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, opens debate on the relief bill after the Senate votes early in the afternoon on the labor disputes legislation which is today's first order of business.

Declaring the Senate should restore \$150,000,000 which the House voted to slash from the relief bill, Vandenberg told a reporter:

"It is a question of whether we are going to have hunger or state-mandated slavery."

MAY DIVORCE POST OFFICE FROM PARTIES

Speaker Martin Says House Probe May Take Office Out Of Politics

Washington, May 13.—(AP)—Speaker Martin (R-Mass.) said today a pending House investigation may lead to a divorce between the Postmaster General and the Democratic National Committee.

"There ought to be one," Martin told a reporter.

The House schedule this week calls for action on a resolution directing the Post Office and Civil Service Committee to investigate matters in its field.

"I wouldn't be surprised," Martin said, "if the committee recommended that the Postmaster General be forbidden to hold a high political party office."

"Running a billion-dollar business ought to be a full-time job. And the government ought not to finance political trips around the country under the guise of office Post Office Department business."

The speaker said his statement stands, whether the Postmaster General is a Democrat or Republican.

In the last few years, the Democrats have made something of a practice of installing their national chairman as Postmaster General—such men as James A. Farley, Frank Walker and now Robert E. Hannegan. Former National Chairman Edward J. Flynn was an exception.

The proposed investigation isn't aimed only at that situation.

"We want to see if we can't get more economy and efficiency in a department that has been running nearly \$300,000,000 a year in the red," Martin said.

GERMANS FIND SCHACHT NAZI

Wizard Of Finance Convicted By Denazification Court

Stuttgart, May 13.—(AP)—Hjalmar Schacht, German financial wizard who was cleared of war crimes charges by the international military tribunal at Nuremberg seven months ago, was convicted as a major Nazi offender by a German denazification court today and sentenced to eight years imprisonment.

The verdict was announced by Court President Fritz Lenz in a packed courtroom in the Community Singing Hall where the former Nazi finance minister and Reichsbank president has been on trial for six weeks. The 70-year-old Schacht heard the verdict in stunned silence, his face drawn and white.

The court ordered the confiscation of all of Schacht's remaining personal fortune—officially estimated at 1,190,000 marks (\$119,000)—except for 10,000 Reichsmarks.

It also forbade him to hold any public office during the remainder of his life and deprived him of most of his civil rights, banning him from voting in any election, practicing as an attorney, participating in political life.

Hoey Approves Senate Passage Of Labor Bill

Washington, May 13.—(AP)—Senator Hoey (D-N.C.) said the labor bill passed by the Senate today will increase production and bring peace to our industrial front.

He contended the Murray-Pepper substitute, defeated by a decisive vote, was a "milk and candy affair" and would have been wholly inadequate.

In a statement, Hoey added the Senate approved bill, if it becomes law, "will aid materially in stabilizing labor relations and in doing justice to both employees and employers, and will give a large measure of protection to the public."

"It is not tough legislation. It is not a drastic bill. It does deal adequately with the labor situation and establishes and guarantees mutual rights to labor and management."

School Children Hurt In Wreck

Shelby, N. C., May 13.—(AP)—Fourteen youngsters were injured today when a bus carrying 30 children to the Fallston High School near here broke a tire on the left front wheel and plunged down a ten-foot embankment on Highway 18 two miles north of Shelby.

Ten children have been released from the Shelby hospital and four are under treatment. All the injured children were residents of Shelby County.

PATTERSON IS TRIAL WITNESS

Says A.J. May Sought His Aid For Garsons Combine

Washington, May 13.—Secretary of War Patterson testified today that former Rep. Andrew J. May (D-Ky.) sought his help on several occasions in behalf of the \$78,000,000 Garson munitions combine.

Patterson told the jury that on March 24, 1945, May asked him to give an "E" award, for outstanding war production, to a Garson firm, the Batavia (Ill.) Metal Products Company.

He said May also contacted him about a cutback of a Batavia Company contract in 1943 and, in September, 1945, called him to the capitol to protest the army's action in withholding \$800,000 from the Erie Basin Metal Products Co., another Garson firm. The money was held up pending renegotiation of a contract.

Kenneth C. Royall, Patterson's principal assistant as undersecretary in the war department, testified yesterday that May called him on the phone three times in September, 1945, to protest the army's withholding of \$800,000 from the Erie Basin Metal Products Company.

Marines Escape Blast In Departing Peiping

Peiping, May 13.—(AP)—Several sections of the Peiping-Linyu (Shanhaiwan) railline were blasted and uprooted today a few hours after two trains carrying 500 American Marines and their commander passed safely through Communist-held territory.

Col. Julian N. Frisbie, commander of the fifth regiment of the First Division, traveling in a deluxe coach, and 500 Marines in a special train reached the port of Chinwangtao without incident. They began boarding two transports for Guam and the United States in the withdrawal of Leathernecks from China.

About 350 Marines of the fifth who drove a 75-vehicle convoy from Peiping to Tientsin yesterday were left waiting at the station by the rail explosion. They had been scheduled to board trains from Tientsin today to join the remainder of the fifth at Chinwangtao.

The vehicles, which made the highway run without difficulty were being shipped by water to Chinwangtao.

Washington, May 13.—(AP)—The State Department said today that the American charge d'affaires at Belgrade was stripped of his camera and embassy identification cards during a visit to the Yugoslav town of Pec on May 2.

Camera and cards were returned to John M. Cabot, the American official, after a formal protest to Marshall Tito's government.

A spokesman said the State Department has instructed the embassy to ask appropriate disciplinary action against local officials responsible for the incident.

Former Instructor At College Sues Trustees

ROTARY HEARS SCHOOL ISSUE

Prominent Local Citizens Stress Need For More Funds

The challenge of an opportunity to do something for the boys and girls of Greenville was presented to the Rotarians at their meeting last night in connection with the special election to be held May 27 to add a 15-cent tax levy to increase money available for teachers in the city schools.

City Supt. June H. Rose, vice-chairman of the Greenville Board of Education, Joseph Taft and J. Knott Proctor, members of the Board of Education and Rev. Robert W. Bradshaw spoke in favor of the special school levy.

Mr. Rose told how the supply of school teachers had been kept up with limited funds. By begging young married teachers living in the city to teach, a precarious balance has been maintained. This type of teacher has kept up the quality but is not a dependable arrangement.

Mr. Taft cited the rising cost of living as an evidence teachers must have more money. Another figure he presented was the 90 teachers in the local school system to take care of 3,197 students. He said he continued on Page Four

Dr. E. L. Henderson of Greenville, a member of the East Carolina Teachers College faculty many years, and who was dropped from the staff several years ago by the Board of Trustees upon request of Dr. Leon R. Meadows, then president of the institution, has instituted suit against the trustees for back pay amounting to \$14,004. Papers were served on Dr. Clyde R. Erwin, state superintendent of public instruction and chairman of the Board of Trustees in Raleigh. Attorney General Harry L. McMullan will represent the trustees when the case comes up in court and will draw up the answer to be filed before June 5.

Dr. Henderson was one of three teachers fired several months after the trustees exonerated Dr. Meadows in the spring of 1944 of charges that he "had not satisfactorily accounted for" more than \$18,000 of the college funds.

Dr. Meadows, while exonerated by the trustees, was subsequently convicted of embezzlement of a false pretense in connection with handling of funds and now is serving a three-year prison term which he is scheduled to complete on July 28.

In his complaint, Dr. Henderson charges that Dr. Meadows efforts to get him dismissed were for "the sole purpose and intention of protecting his (Meadows) own misdeeds and wrong-doing, all of which was known to the board, or should have been known to the board, by the exercise of due diligence in the discharge of their duties."

Six teachers were dismissed by the board at a meeting on June 6, 1944, but three of them were reinstated less than a month later. Dr. Henderson, Dr. Herbert R. Barker and Dr. M. L. Wright were not rehired. Dr. Wright died since then.

Italian Premier Quits; Coalition Gov't Collapses

Rome, May 13.—(AP)—Premier Alcide De Gasperi handed his resignation today to provisional President Enrico De Nicola as Socialists and Christian Democrats charged each other with responsibility for the collapse of his coalition government.

A communique from the Christian Democrats' premier's press office said De Gasperi was resigning because of Socialist attacks on him yesterday. The three-party coalition has been torn with dissension. (Continued on Page Four)

Opposes Hike In Postal Rates

Washington, May 13.—(AP)—Senator Fulbright (D-Ark.) said today that boosts in second class postal rates would increase the death rate of small newspapers.

Fulbright told the Senate civil service committee it is his opinion that postal rate increases would tend to accelerate the monopolistic control of newspapers by big interests.

He said the present shortage of newsprint has injured small papers more than the large ones and added:

"Many of the small papers are given just enough newsprint to keep them alive, and this, coupled with an increase in postal rates, would kill them off."

Freight Rate Ruling

In Which An Analyst Warns Against Exaggerating The Importance Of Yesterday's Supreme Court Decision; It Will Take Years For Results To Be Evident

Washington, May 13.—(AP)—Don't exaggerate the importance of freight rates, at least in the near future.

It's a victory all right for the South and West over the North but here's the story, starting from scratch:

Since thousands upon thousands of items are shipped by rail, the cost, or freight-rate, set-up is vastly complex.

In fact, it's a hodge-podge, with the rates varying by the size, weight and destination of an item, and so on.

Regulating freight-rates is one of the jobs of the Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC). It steps in to regulate, or is called in.

The ICC, created in 1887 by Congress, has been trying for years to put some uniformity into freight rates.

But for years the North, through lower rates on certain kinds of goods, has had an advantage over the South and West.

Far-Reaching Measure Approved 68-24, Or By More Than Two-Thirds Majority Needed To Override Predicted Presidential Veto; Demo Substitute Bill Snowed Under

Washington, May 13.—(AP)—The Senate today passed its controversial labor bill by a vote of 68 to 24—more than the two-thirds majority needed to override the presidential veto which some opponents have predicted.

The far-reaching measure, denounced by organized labor but generally endorsed by many industrialists, now goes to conference for compromise with a tougher bill approved by the House.

Then the compromise version will go to the White House, probably late this month.

Shortly before the final vote the Senate rejected 73-19 a substitute bill drafted by a group of Democrats who regarded it as the kind of legislation Mr. Truman would sign. Critics called it a "milk and water" bill.

Senator Taft (Ohio), chairman of the Senate's Republican policy and labor committee, led the fight for the bill adopted.

Supporters of the alternative proposal conceded defeat hours in advance of the vote. One of them, Senator Thomas (D-Utah), said bluntly: "We're licked."

Their only purpose was to get on record with the kind of bill they think the Senate should pass.

The main Senate bill went into the home stretch with nearly four months of work in committee—and on the Senate floor behind it. Labor committee hearings began January 23. This is the 13th day of floor debate.

The measure has been roundly assailed by organized labor, but practically all of its restrictions on unions and strikes have been endorsed by many industrial leaders.

With friends and foes agreed that passage was certain the only big question was:

Could the Republican leadership roll up the two-thirds majority required to override a possible presidential veto?

Senator Wherry (Neb.), the Republican whip or party liner-upper, claimed more than the necessary margin. And the Nebraska told reporters he expects the line-up to (Continued on Page Five)

Wallace Would Nationalize Coal Industry

Minneapolis, May 13.—(AP)—Henry A. Wallace says "the time has come to nationalize the coal industry under some type of coal authority," and added that "coal now means so much to the life blood of the world that neither labor nor owners can tolerate the inconsequence which come so frequently in this key industry."

Speaking last night before a paid audience estimated at 5,000, Wallace said that "in the five countries I visited in western Europe in April, I found coal next after wheat to be the key problem."

The former vice president and cabinet member, now editor of the New Republic, said, in continuing his attack on President Truman's proposed \$400,000,000 Greece-Turkey loan, "an extra 60,000,000 tons of coal produced in the United States during the next year would do more to solve the problems of western Europe than ten Greek loans."

A Trimming Of Sales

British Conservative Party Follows Socialists In Setting Forth Policy For Next General Election; At Last Fall In Line With Established National Trend

Britain's conservative party, under leadership of former Prime Minister Winston Churchill, has made a surprising move which looks very much like swing to the left—a small swing, to be sure, but still a swing—in competition with the Socialist Government's program.

The conservatives have issued a booklet pledging themselves to work for restoration of "a wide measure of freedom" to some industries which have been nationalized. However, they say they have no intention of restoring the Bank of England or the coal industry to private enterprise, and add this provocative forecast:

"We wish to substitute for the present paralysis, in which we are experiencing the worst of all worlds, a system of free enterprise, which is on terms with authority, and which reconciles the need for central direction with the encouragement of individual effort."

Whatever else one may think of this declaration, it is of course a bid for return to power in the next general election which normally will be three years hence.

The idea of "need for central direction" naturally catches the eye and the conservative London Daily Express says the conservatives are making an elementary blunder in trying to fight under a Socialist banner. The Daily Telegraph, also conservative, thinks the conservatives aim at doing what the Socialists are trying to do, only doing it better.

While this move is surprising, it isn't at all illogical. The conservatives are trimming their sails to a wind whose direction was clearly evident in the last general election when many of their party voted the Socialist ticket.

England has been moving cautiously but steadily toward moderate Socialism for many years. We got striking evidence of this as far back as 1924 when the late Ramsay MacDonald headed the first Labor Government, which employed (Continued on Page Four)

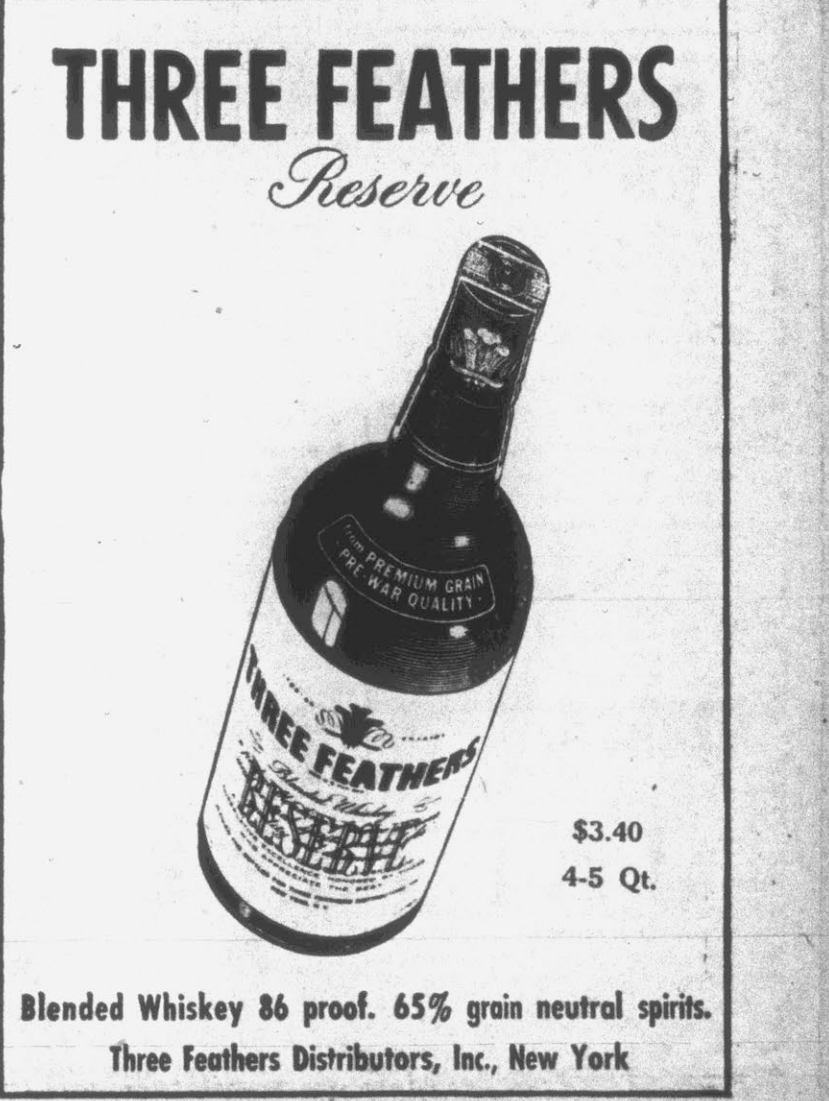

FABULOUS PUNJAB PROVIDES BEARDED SIKH FOR CAPITAL

Washington — Towering, black-bearded Sikh Sewak Singh Gill, from the Indian province of Punjab, "the land of the five rivers," dawned on the capital's social horizon like a turbaned character out of the Arabian Nights.

He came to town one noon, established himself in his hotel suite called up a few friends and entertained 18 at dinner that same night. He appeared the next afternoon at a reception, an imposing figure in a long, fitted gray tunic and midnight blue turban which added another foot to his height.

He wore rings on his fingers. On his feet he wore embroidered slippers of gold.

The young visitors of the Army's Special Mission Unit here know "the spots" all over the world.

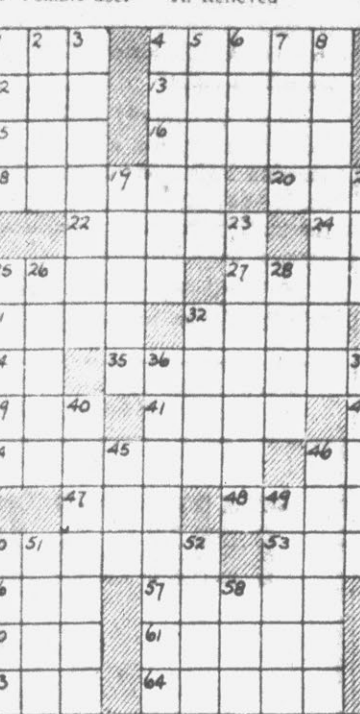
They say they prefer Shepherd's Hotel in Cairo and the Cathay in Shanghai.

But the Northerners do have an advantage over Southern and Western competitors on goods shipped under class rates. They're lower for him.

Example:
It's cheaper for a Northern manufacturer to ship, say, a case of shoes from one Northern point to another Northern point or from a Northern point to a Southern point than—

For a Southern manufacturer to ship his shoes from one Southern point to another Southern point, or from a Southern point to a Northern point. (The Western shipper is under the same disadvantage.)

This discrimination in freight rates on class rate goods, has made Southerners sore for a long time. They argue that this, among other things, has kept new manufacturers and industries from opening in the South since they get better rates by staying in the North.

The ICC began an investigation of this class rate discrimination in 1939. In 1945, after many hearings it issued a ruling.

This ruling, to wipe out the class rate differences between the sections, said class rates should be cut 10 percent in the South and West and boosted 10 percent in the North.

Railroads and Northern shippers fought this ruling up to the Supreme Court. Yesterday the court upheld the ICC.

The ICC ruling will help Southern and Western shippers of "class rate" goods, but only that kind of goods. The ICC didn't touch the commodity rates under which most goods move.

Because only four percent of the nation's freight is affected—the class rate stuff—one ICC official said the importance of the ruling should not be over-emphasized.

He doesn't expect to see any sudden flood of new industry into the south as a result of the decision.

ed the terms "labor" and "Socialist" as synonymous, just as is done today.

That the Socialist victory which overwhelmed the great Churchill two years ago was no flash in the pan has been demonstrated in the numerous elections since then to replace individual members of Parliament. The Socialists haven't lost a single seat—a circumstance which is taken by the political experts in Britain as indicating that the general public still is determined to give the new government a chance to show its paces.

All this being so, it's clear that whatever party wins in the next general election will do so on a broad and progressive platform. The race as things now stand, again will be between the two major parties—the Socialists and the Conservatives. There is no great strength on the extreme left or on the extreme right. Hence the conservative party's move closer to the middle of the road.

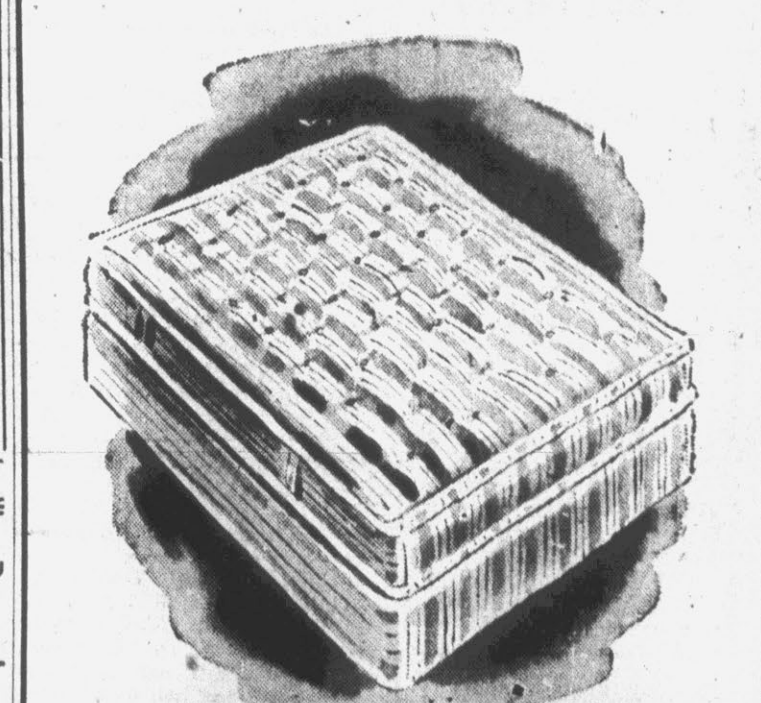
