MINIMUM PAY PLEA BACK BY SENATORS

Truman Recommendation Has Wide Support, But Action Is Unlikely

Washington, May 15—(AP)—President Truman's boost-the-minimum-wage recommendation won Republican as well as Democratic support in the Senate today.

But chances for action this year appear dim. Even among backers of the Chief Executive's proposal there is controversy whether a new pay "floor" should be fixed at 65 cents an hour as urged by Mr. Truman, or at 55 cents, 75 cents or some other figure.

Company Sued By Textile Union

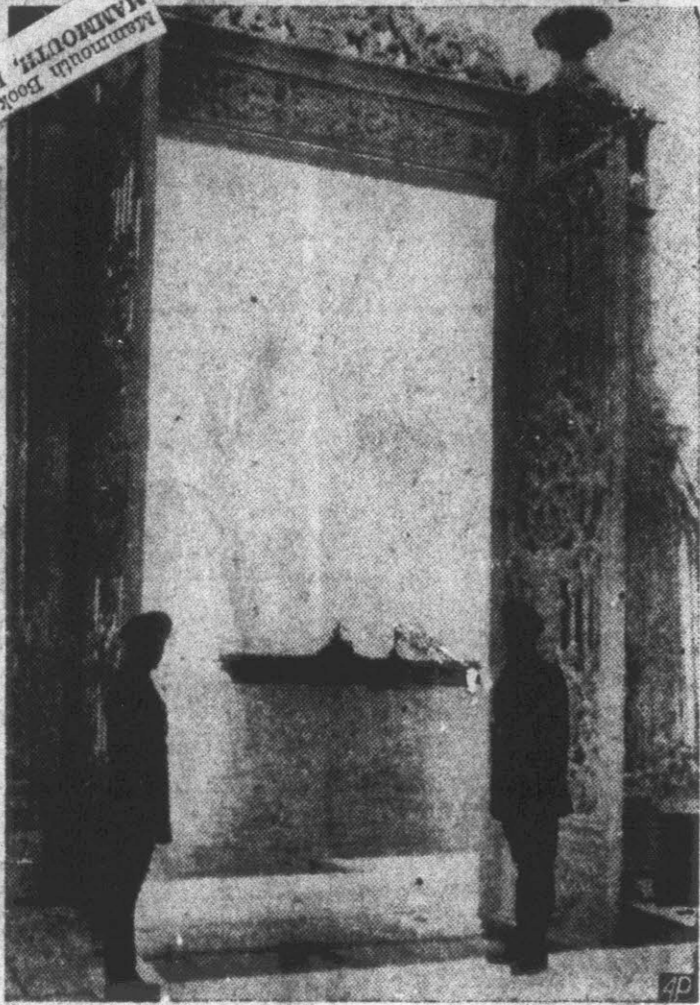

Greco-Turk Relief Bill Passes House

Washington May 15—(AP)—The House today agreed to minor changes in the administration's \$100,000,000 Greek-Turkish aid bill and sent it to the Senate for final congressional approval.

The action was taken without debate or record vote as the House accepted the report of a joint congressional conference committee which worked out a compromise on minor differences in the measure to provide economic and military aid to the two countries.

WILL EXPAND RAIL SERVICE

Norfolk, Va., May 15—(AP)—Major Joseph P. Kingsley of Washington, newly elected president of the Norfolk Southern Railroad which serves Virginia and the Carolinas, announced that the new board of directors will withdraw an earlier petition calling for limited passenger service and instead will go forward with plans for expanding the service.

Trucks Collide, Two Men Killed

Pilot Mountain, N. C., May 15—(AP)—Theodore Russell Southern, 29, of Mount Airy and Mallory Jackson Whitaker, 33, of Pilot Mountain, were killed last night when trucks they were driving collided head-on on a small bridge two miles north of here.

Walkout Is Over In Carolinas

Charlotte, N. C., May 15—(AP)—The telephone strike is over in North and South Carolina. E. H. Wasson, Carolinas manager for Southern Bell, said today all 4,700 workers in North Carolina and all 2,700 in South Carolina were back on the job.

REPUBLICANS FROWN ON BILL TO AID SCHOOLS

Washington, May 15—(AP)—The House Republican leadership was reported today to have issued orders to the labor committee to kill a bill which would give states \$300,000,000 a year in federal aid for schools.

Will Take Steps In Food Shortage

Food Experts Assemble Over Food Crisis In Germany

Frankfurt, Germany May 15—German food experts in both the American and British occupation zones assembled today for an emergency conference to sketch out plans for coping with a critical food shortage when labor leaders said some Germans getting less than half their allotted 1,350 calories each day.

Both United States and British authorities recognized the existence of the food crisis and then Lucius D. Clay, the American Military Governor, said he expected to continue "for the next three or four weeks," but that "this is a sight."

In Washington, Secretary of War Robert Patterson said more than 400,000 tons of food would be sent to Germany this month, a similar amount next month and "even more" in July.

Patterson said food shipments called for in former President Herbert Hoover's recommendations "have been met up to May 1, except for an amount equal to about one week's ration. Even this is only a delay, not a reduction."

German gloom and disgruntlement over what many of them referred to as their "starvation" diet was swiftly welling up, however into what American investigators called an "ugly mood of bitter resentment."

This mood was reflected in the angry meeting in Stuttgart yesterday at which factory labor leaders voted a general strike there on May 22 unless the food crisis is alleviated.

HUNTING REDS IN HOLLYWOOD

Actor Says He Was Forced To Appear In "Propaganda"

Los Angeles May 15—(AP)—Film Actor Robert Taylor's testimony before a House committee that he was forced by a government representative to appear against his will in a picture he considered Russian propaganda brought from him an announcement that "this is another indication that persons in the government have been aiding and abetting communism."

The chairman Rep J. Parnell Thomas (R-N.J.) told newsmen the government representative was Lowell Mellett, former adviser to the late President Roosevelt and Office of War Information official.

Thomas declared that Taylor testified his entrance into the Navy Air Corps was delayed until after his appearance in the film, "Song of Russia," which he said the actor described as favoring "Russian ideologies, institutions and ways of life over the same things in our country."

"This government official," continued Thomas, "came here specifically on orders of his superior to see that Mr. Taylor played that leading role."

Taylor was but one of a number of Hollywood celebrities called to tell the committee behind closed doors what they know about communistic activities in the film capital.

Boy Scouts' Camporee To Start Here Friday

The annual Spring Boy Scout Camporee gets underway tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock on the grounds of the West Greenville school. From 2 until 4 o'clock Boy Scouts from Pitt, Beaufort, Martin, Washington, Tyrrell and Hyde counties will check in at the Camporee grounds, be assigned their campsites, and start pitching their tents. At least 35 patrols are expected to participate in the camporee.

British Army To Crack Down On Food Black Market

London, May 15—(AP)—Government sources said today that British occupation troops in Germany soon would swing into action in an all-out effort to crush widespread black market held largely responsible for Germany's grave food crisis.

Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin this morning submitted a complete plan for this zonal swoop to the British Cabinet, which was expected to approve it unanimously.

Government sources said Bevin will announce some details of his action to the House of Commons this afternoon when he opens the debate on foreign affairs.

Main item on the agenda of the British Cabinet this morning was discussion of emergency measures to meet the food crisis in the British zone of Germany.

The British Army's newest assignment will take the troops into the farmlands where they will search for hidden stocks of all types of food which, instead of being marketed through normal channels are being kept back for disposal on the black market.

Bevin's advisers reportedly started the foreign secretary by telling estimates of how much food was being kept back by German farmers or was being diverted to the black markets.

They were said to have told him too few cattle were being delivered for slaughter and that a good deal of grain was being hoarded.

ROMNEY FOUND TO BE GUILTY

Washington, May 15—(AP)—A federal court jury today convicted Kenneth Romney, former House Representative, on charges of concealing for two decades a shortage of \$143,863 in his accounts.

The jury reached its verdict in one hour and 50 minutes but announcement of the decision was delayed for more than an hour by a court recess for lunch.

Sentence was not immediately imposed by federal Judge Alexander Holtzoff.

The maximum penalty upon conviction is 30 years' imprisonment and \$30,000 fine.

Romney was convicted on all three counts against him.

William H. Collins, Romney's attorney, told reporters he intended to file notice of intent to ask for a new trial and that this possibly would delay Romney's sentence until next week.

Romney stood calmly as the jury foreman, Walter Stark, announced the verdict.

N.C. Episcopal Convention Ends

Beaufort, N. C., May 15—(AP)—A final business session today concluded the 64th annual convention of the Episcopal diocese of North Carolina.

W. T. Rather was appointed by the Rt. Rev. T. H. Wright of Wilmington, bishop, as president of the laymen of the conference. Fitz Duncan of Greenville was named secretary and Frank Sagan of New Bern, treasurer.

The following were named district chairmen: Wayne Moore of Elizabeth City, northern district; Duncan, central district; and William Atkinson of Wilmington, southern district.

DENIES FIRING FATAL BLAST

Accused Executioner In Lynching Claims Had No Gun

Greenville, S. C., May 15—(AP)—Roosevelt Carlos Hurd, Sr., 45, accused executioner of a Negro lynching victim, denied in a statement that he participated in the killing but denied he fired the fatal shotgun blast which ripped open the victim's head.

The statement was offered in evidence by the prosecution, in the trial of 31 defendants accused of murder and conspiracy to murder in connection with the slaying of Negro Willie Earle last February 17. Twenty-eight are Greenville cat drivers.

Hurd, who acknowledged a second grade education, said he rode with the leaders who went to Phoenix, S. C., with tax cabs and took the Negro from Plakens jail.

Several men dragged the Negro from the car Hurd related and everybody started beating him. They knocked him down on the side of the road. Somebody fired a gun two or three times. I don't know who fired the gun. I did not have a gun and I don't know whether the shots hit the Negro or not. When I saw they were going to kill the Negro, I just turned around because I didn't want to see it happen.

Deputy Sheriff Frank Reid told the jury that after signing the document, Hurd exclaimed, "I feel better now. It's the first time I've ever been in anything like this in my life. I know what a mistake I've made."

President Asks Congress To Provide Relief

Washington, May 15—(AP)—President Truman urged Congress again today to provide \$350,000,000 for foreign relief, saying "the peace of the world can be realized only when people are free from the fear of hunger."

The new appeal, in a letter transmitting the tenth quarterly UNRRA report, came only a day after the Senate agreed to provide the full amount Mr. Truman asked.

The House, however, has voted to cut the fund for feeding the hungry in Austria, Greece, Hungary, Italy, Poland, Trieste and China to \$200,000,000. Hence the two versions will have to be compromised.

Mr. Truman also renewed his request that Congress authorize this country to join the International Refugee Organization.

Create "Neutral" 11-Nation Palestine Inquiry Commission; Override Last-Minute Arab Protests And Soviet-Slav Effort To Include Five Major Powers

New York, May 15—(AP)—The United Nations assembly formally created a neutral 11-nation Palestine inquiry commission today.

This completed the task of the 18-day extraordinary session. The deliberations wound up in a series of rapid developments.

These included last minute Arab protests against the assembly's action and refusal of the five Arab states to agree to an interim truce in the Holy Land while the inquiry commission studies the problems on the spot this summer.

A last Soviet-Slav effort to include the five big powers in the commission's membership failed to upset the decision of the assembly's 55-nation political committee to bar the major powers.

In its final form, the assembly's resolution gave the commission a free hand to consider independence of Palestine on the same basis as all other possible solutions. It left the way open, however, for recommendations on independence if the commission decided this was best.

The vote on the whole Palestine resolution was 46 to 7, with 11 abstentions and one absent. Voting against the measure were the Arab countries—Syria, Egypt, Lebanon, Iraq and Saudi Arabia—and Turkey and Afghanistan. Siam abstained.

The commission will be free to make an on-the-spot investigation in Palestine and go anywhere else it deems necessary. It will report back to the regular September session of the assembly with its recommendations.

The delegates had been in session since April 28. It was voted to appoint to this inquiry group members from Australia, Canada, Czechoslovakia, Guatemala, India, Iran, Italy, Japan, Mexico, Netherlands, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland, United States, United Kingdom, Uruguay, and Venezuela.

NEW ORLEANS, May 15—(AP)—Sixty-one men, including several AFL union officials, were indicted by the federal grand jury here today on charges of conspiracy to interfere with interstate commerce during the recent Louisiana milk strike.

Tokyo, May 15—(AP)—Kyodo news agency said today deformed pumpkins, twobulbed onions and two-headed eggplants had been discovered at atom-bombed Nagasaki.

Nashville, Ill., May 15—(AP)—The company operating a coal mine at Centralia, Ill., in which 11 miners lost their lives in an explosion last March 25, was charged with "willful neglect" in two indictments returned yesterday by a Washington County grand jury.

Jerusalem, May 15—(AP)—Mines planted by the Jewish underground wrecked two Palestine trains today, killed two British officers, injured five other persons, damaged three bridges and disrupted railway service in the Holy Land.

Will Negotiate With Part Of Coal Industry; Southern Operators May Get Separate Bargaining Talks At Later Date

Washington, May 15—(AP)—John L. Lewis agreed today to bargain on a new contract with three-fourths of the soft coal industry and negotiations were set to begin tomorrow (at 9 a. m. EST).

The mine union leader's agreement, reversing a previous stand raised the possibility of avoiding a crippling strike in coal industry when the government relinquishes control of the pits this summer. The United Mine Workers traditionally have refused to work without a contract.

The Southern Coal Producers' Association, representing about 25 per cent of the nation's bituminous production, balked at industry-wide bargaining and asked for separate negotiations.

Lewis replied that he wanted a chance to discuss the Southern's request with his policy committee. (Continued on Page Six)

Anti-Portal Pay Law

New Legislation May Go Up To Supreme Court To Determine Its Constitutionality; Background Leading To The Law; Principle Features That Are Involved

Washington, May 15—(AP)—The Supreme Court may have to decide whether the new anti-portal pay law is constitutional.

So, since you may hear more about the law and portal pay, here is an ABC on it.

Portal pay means, roughly, this: 1. Pay claimed by a worker for time spent inside a plant going to and from his job.

2. Or time spent inside a plant getting ready to work—like sharpening tools or warming up a machine—before he actually starts producing.

In the past year unions, almost all of them CIO, filed suits for back portal pay amounting to about \$6,000,000,000.

When many businessmen protested the suits would ruin them, Congress started to whip up a law to stop such claims.

Truman signed the act into law. It kills, or is intended to kill, almost all of the \$6,000,000,000 in pending suits. And it stiffly limits its future portal pay suits.

A CIO attorney was asked: What now? In brief, he said: Most of the pending suits undoubtedly will be dropped by the unions. But some may think they have cases that can be pushed.

If so, then one of them may reach the Supreme Court, perhaps in two years, for a decision on whether this law is constitutional. If the court held it unconstitutional, what then? Would some of the old, killed suits be revived? Would Congress pass a new law? You guess.

These are the main features of the new law: 1. It outlaws almost all pending suits. The exceptions: Where work was covered by contract or industry practice.

2. The same goes for future portal pay suits. They can't be filed unless the pay claimed is for time covered by a contract or industry practice.

3. Suits for back portal pay must be filed within two years after the work was done. 4. In future suits a union can't sue a boss for back portal pay for his workers. The suits must be filed by the workers themselves not the union.
