PAN-AMERICAN MILITARY AID PLAN SHELVED

Little Enthusiasm In Congress Over Pres- ident's Request For Action

Washington, May 27.—(AP)—Congress showed little disposition today to work up a lather over President Truman's plea for military cooperation with other American nations.

The idea in both Senate and House seemed to be that Mr. Truman's bid for a law to make possible standardized military organizations, training methods and equipment throughout this hemisphere can wait a while.

But leaders on both sides said it will be considered in due time.

Meanwhile, two other major foreign policy bills—to permit American membership in the International Refugee Organization and to continue the State Department's information program, waited in the House for the rules committee to grant priorities for floor debate.

The information service bill—pegged to selling American aims to the world by means of "Voice of America" radio broadcasts and other activities—is first in line. The rules committee will take another look at it tomorrow. It may come before the House next week.

The Foreign Affairs Committee approved only yesterday the measure to shift to a United Nations agency the problem of caring for refugees and displaced persons in Germany and Austria.

Secretary of State Marshall has called both bills "urgent."

Ex-President Is Said Behind Bloodless Coup

Panama, Panama, May 27.—(AP)—Sources close to the situation in Panama today said that yesterday's coup in Panama was engineered by former President Gen. Anastasio Somoza who had been out of office for only 26 days.

These informants said Dr. Leoncio Arguello was overthrown as Nicaragua's chief executive in a bloodless coup by Gen. Somoza after Arguello informed him in a midnight conference that he had only 24 hours to leave the country. Arguello was said to be a prisoner in the presidential palace and about 50 officers of the National Guard who remained loyal to him were reported under arrest.

Arguello was elected to the presidency in February in Nicaragua's first election in a decade, and was installed as Somoza's successor on May 1. Gen. Somoza supported Arguello's candidacy, after ruling as chief of state for 10 years.

Broadcast Plea To Chinese Reds

Nanking, May 27.—(AP)—All radio stations of China broadcast a request to Chinese Communist leaders today to send delegates to a Nanking meeting to discuss means of ending the civil war.

The People's Political Council, a Government advisory group, decided last night to invite Communist members to attend the council's present session. In addition to the radio message, a telegram was sent to Wu Yung-fu, Communist delegate to the Chinese National Relief and Rehabilitation Administration, only accredited high Red official in Nationalist China.

A Birthday Marred

Dowager Queen Mary Honored By Royal Family On Her Eightieth Birthday, But Her Eldest Son Was Absent; Duke And Duchess Of Windsor Ostracized

Dowager Queen Mary's eightieth birthday party yesterday in Buckingham Palace was marred by a circumstance which has its place in a tragic chapter of England's history. Her eldest and greatly beloved son Edward—now Duke of Windsor but once King-emperor—wasn't among the more than thirty members of the Royal Family who drank to her health, although he was in London. He had visited his mother prior to the anniversary luncheon and then had gone back to his duchess, the former Mrs. Wallis Simpson of Baltimore, who was with him in the British capital but who never has been received by the Royal Family since Edward abdicated over ten years ago so that he might marry "the woman I love."

The dowager queen never has forgiven Mrs. Simpson for being the magnet which drew Britain's then popular king from the throne of his fathers. Apparently the same is true of other members of the Royal Family, because one doesn't recall any occasion on which the Duchess has been invited to a royal

Truman Proposes New Housing Plan

Special Message To Congress Advocates Creation Of New Housing And Home Finance Agency To Handle Nearly All Gov't Work In That Field

Washington, May 27.—(AP)—President Truman today proposed to Congress the creation of a completely new housing and home finance agency to handle virtually all government activities in that field.

In a special message, Mr. Truman said such an agency will unquestionably make for greater efficiency and economy.

His plan would scrap the existing national housing agency (NHA) which coordinates present housing functions. It was created under the president's wartime powers and will go out of existence six months after the declared end of the war.

Mr. Truman said the proposed new agency should be a permanent part of the government.

"The provision of adequate housing will remain a major national objective throughout the next decade," the message said.

"The primary responsibility for meeting housing needs rests and must continue to rest with private industry, as I have stated on other occasions.

The federal government, however, has an important role to play in stimulating and facilitating

ARREST YOUTH FOR SLAYINGS

Admits Murder Of Four Children Out Of "Curiosity"

Imley City, Mich., May 27.—(AP)—A slender 16-year-old farm youth who said he had "always kinds" wondered what it would be like to kill somebody, admitted today, according to state police, that he shot to death four young playmates.

"I don't know. I just don't know why I did it," Oliver Terpening, Jr., was quoted by state Police Commissioner Don Leonard.

"I've always kinds" wondered what it would be like to kill somebody," Leonard said the boy continued. "I'll tell the truth. I did it."

The officer said Terpening, who was arrested earlier today, at Toledo, O., told of turning his 22 caliber rifle on his friend, Stanley Smith, 14, and then walking over to the latter's three sisters and shooting them down as they plucked wild flowers.

The bodies of Stanley, Barbara, 16; Gladys, 12; and Janet, 2, were found late Monday near a gravel pit. The girls' lifeless hands still clutched small bouquets.

Attlee Defends Bevin Policies In Seeking Peace

Margate, England, May 27.—(AP)—Prime Minister Clement Attlee, in an address to the annual conference of the ruling labor party today defended the policies of Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin and declared that Britain is "seeking honestly to build up world peace."

"We are seeking to build up harmony on a world basis," Attlee said. "And I deny the charge by some people whose subservience to one great power makes them charge us with subservience to another."

"We are subservient to none and we seek collaboration with all."

Attlee's remarks obviously were directed to extremist elements within the party who have criticized Bevin's foreign policy on the grounds that it has aligned Britain too closely with the United States at the expense of relations with the Soviet Union.

Garbage Cans

The Board of Aldermen at a recent meeting ordered the superintendent of the street department to strictly enforce the city ordinance requiring householders and business places to place their garbage in standard metal garbage cans with close-fitting tops. The cans may be procured at hardware stores and other places.

The city, in a legal advertisement in the newspaper and by handbills placed in every home and business place in the city, notified the public that beginning June 1, the street department will not be allowed to collect garbage unless it is in standard size garbage cans.

Fifty-gallon oil drums are not standard garbage cans and are too large to be handled by the garbage collectors.

FIRE CHIEFS WANT TRUCK RURAL AREAS

Heads Of Organized Companies Propose Special Equipment To Fight Rural Fires

At a recent meeting of the chiefs of all the organized fire departments in Pitt County rural fires were discussed at length and the chiefs voted to ask the County Commissioners to provide a fire-fighting truck especially equipped with a 1,000-gallon water tank and adequate firefighting chemicals. The cost of such equipment would be nominal, it was stated. The truck could be stationed at a central point and be ready for night and day calls. The equipment would be kept in good order at a centrally located fire station.

The idea of having a special rural firefighting truck originated with the Bethel fire department. It was pointed out that when a small town sends its fire apparatus to a rural fire the town is temporarily left without fire protection. Whenever a fire truck answers a rural call it is handicapped because it is equipped for hydrant water and the booster tanks are of limited capacity. After exhausting its water and chemicals, all the firemen can do is to organize a bucket brigade.

The fire chiefs proposed that if the County Commissioners provide a rural fire truck it would answer rural fire alarms, but not forest fires, and answering calls would be in the discretion of the fire chief. They said such rural firefighting equipment would be the means of saving much valuable property and possibly human lives.

The proposal appeared to meet with public favor where it was discussed today.

HOLD SUMMER SCHOOL HERE

Greenville High School Offering Short Term To Students

For the first time, Greenville High School has planned a summer school to meet the needs of students. Term of school will be from June 9 to July 18 with the cost per course set at \$25, it was announced.

Courses in English, mathematics and history will be offered from the eighth through the 12th grades. A student may take either one or two courses.

Principal O. E. Dowd, in announcing the decision to hold summer school here, said, "It is important that students who have failed work this year, who are retarded in any way, or who need to make up work ahead of schedule, attend this session of summer school."

"It is imperative that students who fall or are weak in any subjects make plans to attend this session of summer school in order to be regular members of the eighth to 12th grades next year."

Students may register any time now for summer school work. Required information may be obtained from the principal's office or by telephoning 2198.

Wallace Would Open Up Canals

Portland, Ore., May 27.—(AP)—Henry A. Wallace proposes internationalization of the Panama Canal and other strategic areas which he says are vital to world peace.

The former vice-president said last night country tends to break up peace and listed as examples, the Suez Canal, the Dardanelles and the Panama Canal.

"Dickie's" legs were severed a year ago by a train and he's mastered artificial limbs.

The top bounded—that's the word of hospital attaches—into young Brann's room yesterday.

PLAN COMBAT 'PROPAGANDA'

\$75 Million Expenditures By Gov't Offices Rapped

Washington, May 27.—(AP)—Rep. Harness (R-Ind.) announced today a general investigation of the federal government's \$75,000,000 annual expenditures for publicity and propaganda.

Harness, chairman of a House expenditures subcommittee which will make the inquiry, said in a statement:

"Government propaganda is a device of dictatorship. It is not for free America."

"Free people do not need government made opinions."

"The \$75,000,000 a year which the federal agencies are squandering in promotion, publicity and propaganda represents not only a flagrant extravagance of public funds, but an unwholesome and unAmerican development of our scheme of constitutional government."

Preliminary investigations indicate, he said, that in many cases these activities are shielded or disguised in the auditing vouchers by various subterfuges of accounting procedure.

Death Penalty Is Abolished Says Russian Radio

London, May 27.—(AP)—A Moscow broadcast announcing abolition of the death penalty in the Soviet Union was acclaimed today by Russian sources in London as evidence of an increased feeling of security within Russia and a sign these measures were no longer necessary to preserve the state.

The broadcast—recorded here last night by the Soviet monitor—said the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet had decided that the death penalty was "no longer necessary under peacetime conditions in the Soviet Union" and that 25-year-sentences in labor camps would be substituted.

The Presidium is an executive and directive body which acts between sessions of Russia's Parliament, the Supreme Council of the Union.

Today Seek To Broaden Republi- can-Backed Measure With Amend- ment To Spread Community Proper- ty To All States

Washington, May 27.—(AP)—Democrats, beaten in their drive to delay Senate action on tax cutting sought today to broaden the Republican-backed bill to whittle \$4,000,000,000 a year off individual income levies.

With GOP leaders pressing for passage this week of their measure trimming present tax rates by from 10.5 to 30 per cent, Senator McClellan (D-Ark.) called up his amendment to spread the so-called community property formula to all states.

Under this formula, a man and wife can divide their income even if the wife doesn't earn anything, and take advantage of lower rates.

Chairman Millikin (R-Colo.) of the Senate finance committee predicted this proposal will be beaten although he conceded it attractive to many members who have been hearing from their constituents about the tax advantages of living in the nine "community property" states.

A proposal by Senator Lucas (D-Ill.) which would delay the effectiveness of any tax reduction until January 1 also was in line for Senate consideration.

Millikin said he is confident the Republican lineup which defeated (Continued on Page Eight)

Builds Cabinet While Excluding Italian Reds

Rome, May 27.—(AP)—Premier-Designate Alcide De Gasperi started out today to form a new government excluding representation of Italy's powerful Communist party.

Emerging from a conference with provisional President Enrico De Nicola, the Christian Democratic leader said he would try to resolve the two-week-old Italian political crisis in one of two ways:

1. By forming a cabinet of Christian Democrats, with the addition of a few nominally independent technicians.

2. By forming a cabinet of Christian Democrats and representatives of minor leftist parties.

"Kickback" In Steel Sale Is Under Inquiry

Washington, May 27.—(AP)—Senators who heard testimony that a \$48,000,000 steel transaction fell through after demands were made for an \$18,000 "kickback," summoned three men today mentioned in connection with the deal.

The three were called before a small business subcommittee headed by Senator Martin (R-Pa.). It is inquiring into the difficulties small manufacturers are encountering in buying steel.

Committee aides said one of the witnesses would be Herbert M. Karp, previously described as a New York attorney whose name has been linked by witnesses to at least two big steel transactions.

Martin said Karp phoned the subcommittee from New York that he would appear voluntarily. A subpoena had been issued for him.

No Concessions

Washington, May 27.—(AP)—Congress members writing the final draft of what they hope will be a new labor law reached the showdown stage today.

And Senator Taft (R-Ohio) declared the Senate intends to make "no substantial concessions" to the House.

Senator Ellender (D-La.) echoed Taft in this, telling a reporter:

"We won't give in on any fundamental issue."

DEFENDS SALE OF NEWSPRINT

Dealer Denies Profiteering In House Inquiry

Washington, May 27.—(AP)—Samuel Galewitz, a New York newspaper dealer, told House members today of a newspaper deal that netted him more than \$800,000 but firmly maintained that it was not "profiteering."

Galewitz, vice president of the Clinton Paper Company, testified to the House committee investigating the paper supply situation that he bought 10,500 tons of newsprint at \$82.50 a ton and resold it for \$160 a ton.

He said the man he sold the newsprint to resold it to the Miami Herald for as high as \$180.

"There is such a thing in this country, I hope, as decent business," Rep. Clarence Brown (R-Ohio), chairman of the committee, commented.

"You and I know," he told Galewitz, "that \$160 a ton was an exorbitant price, far above the regular going price."

"We think it is time the American people know who is playing the

Hoover Backs Up Administration's Request For Civilian Relief Fund; Studies U.S. Capabilities For Helping World

Washington, May 27.—(AP)—Herbert Hoover said today the industry of former enemy countries must be unshackled and expressed belief that world economic recovery could come in two or three years if Russia and France will cooperate.

The former president talked to reporters after he appeared before a House appropriations subcommittee to back up the administration's request for a \$725,000,000 civilian relief fund for occupied countries.

He told newsmen that:

1. He is now engaged in a private study of how great a load this country can bear in world relief and recovery work, with the probability his finding will be ready in a couple of weeks.

2. He would not regard a separate peace with Germany and Japan a violation of an international agreement. "If the other party consistently fails to carry out or violates the terms, I don't think you are under any moral obligation."

3. More rigorous action is needed in foreign countries to collect (Continued on Page Six)

Two Health Bills

Democrats And Republicans Offer Own Versions Of National Health Measure; Late Start, No Immediate Action Seen; What Both Bills Mean To All Of Us

Washington, May 27.—(AP)—Two national health bills now in Congress are of vast importance to a great many people in this country. One was offered by Democrats and one by Republicans. The two are very different.

A Senate committee has started hearings on them. It's a late start. Don't expect Congress to vote either into law this year.

Action may come in 1948. That's a presidential election year and a national health program would make a great campaign issue.

The fight over a national health bill is an old one. This is the story to date.

The Democrats, led by Senators Wagner of New York and Murray of Montana, have been offering health bills in Congress since 1939. Except for committee hearings at which hundreds of people talked for and against the bills, nothing has happened. Congress hasn't voted.

President Truman, in 1945 and again only a week ago, urged Congress to lay down a long-range

health program.

Now, with national health becoming a bigger issue, the Democrats and Republicans have offered separate bills.

These Republican senators offered one bill: Taft, Ohio; Ball, Minnesota; Smith, New Jersey; Donnell, Missouri.

These Democratic senators offered the other bill: Wagner, Murray, Pepper, Florida; Chavez, New Mexico; Taylor, Idaho; McOrath, Rhode Island.

Roughly and briefly, this is what the bills would do:

The Democratic bill—This would provide pre-paid medical care for most Americans through a 1.2 percent tax each on employees employers, and self-employed.

They'd pay nothing for care beyond the money taken from them already by the tax. Doctors and hospitals would send their bills to the government.

The Democratic bill—the government would take in \$3,000,000,000 a (Continued on Page Six)

He is teacher, leader, example, Saviour, and Lord. He is the ineffable presence of which men of faith everywhere are conscious. He is the One who will eventually judge the world.

But too seldom do we think of him as one who bridges earth and heaven. He assured men that the kingdom of heaven is at hand. He established it on earth and bade men live therein. He announced that at the end of time he would come to bring this kingdom to its final and glorious consummation.

It will mean a great deal to the peace and stability of our souls if we can get into the habit of thinking of heaven as a glorious experience which begins on earth. Its fulfillment is reserved for a great and probably distant day of adjudication and testing. But heaven is here now because Christ established it on the earth, and he himself acts as a bridge between the little colonies of the heavenly life established on earth and the fullness and glory of the life beyond. Now we know in part, but through his grace this knowledge will grow until we shall behold the final glory of his kingdom to the rapture of our souls.

Famed Marine General Dies Of Heart Attack

Portland, Ore., May 27—(AP)—Brig. Gen. Evans F. Carlson, 51, famed leader of the Marine unit known as Carlson's Raiders in the Pacific war, died in a Portland hospital at 6:30 a.m. today.

The famed warrior had been in the hospital less than a day, suffering from a heart attack.

Born at Sidney, N.Y., Feb. 26, 1886, the son of a minister, he served as a captain of artillery in the First World War. In 1922 he enlisted as a private in the Marine Corps, where his service included assignments in Nicaragua in the 1930s and with Chinese forces in 1937.

He first came to widespread public notice in 1942 when his second battalion raiders wiped out Japanese installations on Makin Island. Subsequently he fought on Guadalcanal, Tarawa and Saipan. Wounds suffered on Saipan caused his retirement at the age of 50.

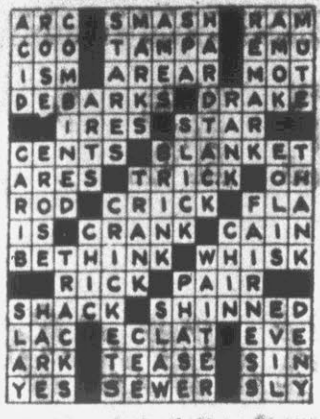

religious objection because of Mrs. Simpson's divorce. Moreover, it frequently has been said that, quite apart from his love affair, Edward had been worrying the government by going beyond his prerogatives as a constitutional ruler—and there certainly were indications that he did in fact intend to be a "real king."

However, Edward's great sin was his abdication. He was the first British monarch to abdicate voluntarily during ten centuries of history. Under the code of royalty there is no circumstance that warrants a ruler to abdicate unless he is forced to against his will.

In short, the Royal Family belongs to the people, and this is particularly true of the sovereign and of their heir to the throne. Edward was born to rule.

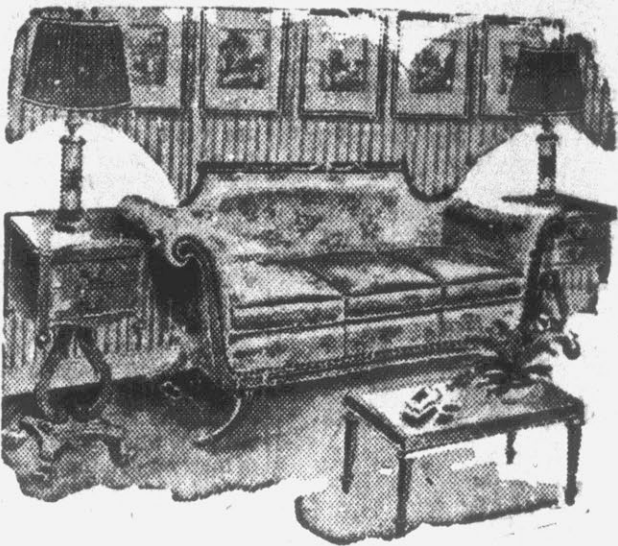

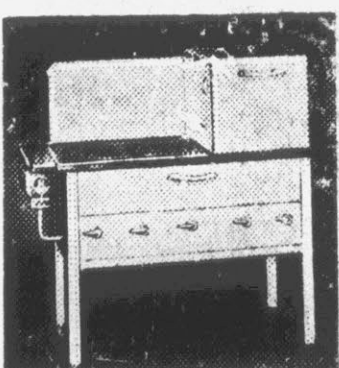

Plan Easy Meals for Company

Easy-to-prepare meats can be just as delicious as meats which take a lot of pot-watching. When entertaining, it's wise to serve a meat that requires little attention.



a Rector Recipe

Standing Rib Roast

Season a WILSON'S CERTIFIED BEEF RIB ROAST with salt and pepper, place fat side up in a shallow pan, and, for best results, insert a meat thermometer so the bulb is in the center of the largest muscle. Place in a very slow oven, 300°F., and roast, uncovered, until the thermometer indicates the degree of doneness your family prefers. . . 140°F. for rare beef; 160°F. for medium; 170°F. for well done beef. For Best Results

Using a meat thermometer is the only way to be sure a roast will be cooked to just the right degree of doneness. Tables, such as the one above, are only an approximate guide at best. You'll find a meat thermometer well worth the money spent for it.

Overcooking meat, which happens so often when you do not use a thermometer, causes more shrinkage; therefore, fewer servings . . . less juicy meat.

Easier Than Pie

Roasting is so easy when a low temperature is used. No watching is needed until near the end of the cooking time to check when it's done. There's no basting; no over-browning.

Menu Memo

Browned potatoes, glazed carrots, a relish tray of pickles, green onions, and radish fans, and banana pie are a superb combination with roast beef. Serve the potatoes with rich brown gravy, adding a little B-V to the gravy, if needed, to replace the flavor and color in the drippings absorbed by the potatoes.

Want to Run a "Collective" Farm?

Was reading the other day about the "collective" farms they have in certain countries. It seems the folks who run them have plenty of help . . . good hours . . . and the best equipment.

Sounds pretty nice—till you learn that the "farmer" doesn't own his land, or even farm it, in our sense. He takes orders from the state; produces what they want, at prices they set. Even his off-hours are spent according to state regulations.

That wouldn't go here. We're

proud of our farms . . . but prouder still of the right to make our own rules. That goes not just for farmers, but for every American industry. Like the brewers' program of Self-Regulation which sees to it that taverns selling beer are decent, law-abiding places.

From where I sit, we've gone a lot further in this country with self-regulation than other nations have with strict controls. Let's never change.
