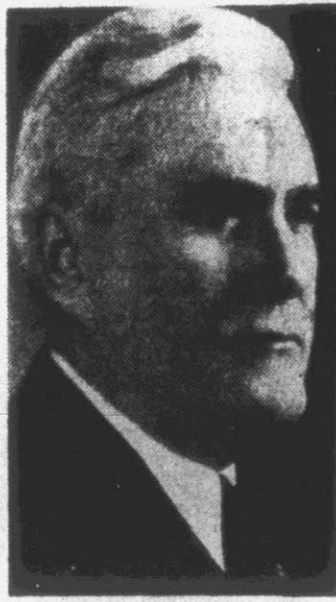

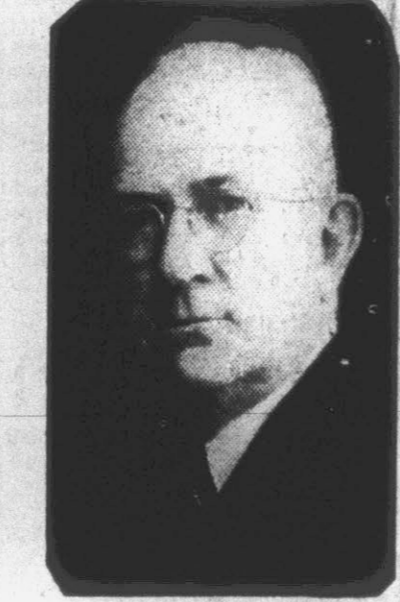

Must Have Metal Garbage Cans

City authorities have warned all householders and businessmen about a city ordinance requiring that garbage be placed in standard metal garbage cans with close fitting tops. This ordinance will be strictly enforced, the Board of Aldermen agreed at a recent meeting. Beginning next Monday, June 1, the street department will not be allowed to collect garbage not contained in standard cans.

The city ordinance is in conformity with a state health law. Metal garbage cans with tops deprive rats, stray dogs and cats of feeding places and flies and mosquitoes of some of their breeding places, health authorities say. The street department says the 50-gallon oil drums are too large to be handled.

POPPIES SOLD ON SATURDAY

Thousands of Blood-Red Blooms To Be Sold In Greenville

Once again on Saturday, May 31, thousands of poppies will bloom on thousands of coats and dresses in Greenville and its surrounding communities.

The American Legion Auxiliary

and its hundreds of volunteer workers in the schools and other organizations has the great privilege of offering for sale these little red flowers which symbolize our remembrance of the sacrifices of the World War dead.

The disabled veterans who make the poppies derive double benefit from the work. First, it gives them employment—their only chance to help them support themselves and their families. Second, the work is of real value in aiding their recovery, occupying hands and minds breaking the tedium of long idleness and restoring spirits crushed by hopelessness.

The need for relief work which the poppy funds make possible has grown greater and greater each year. With the funds from the pop-

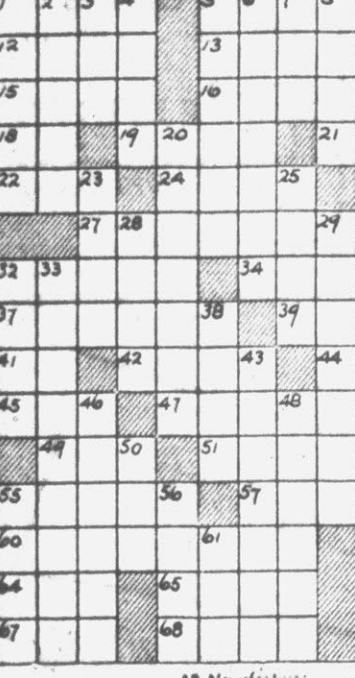

Soldiers Still Lost In Jungles Of Nicaragua

Guatemala, Guatemala, May 30—(AP)—Authorities announced today that the last of the 15 U.S. soldiers who parachuted from a burning Flying Fortress still were held by the fastnesses of a Nicaraguan jungle.

Supplies have been dropped and large contingents were hacking their way toward the men. Seven of their companions previously had been found and taken to Managua, Nicaragua.

The bomber, which caught fire at 14,000 feet, has not been located, so dense is the jungle growth. The men dropped in a 5-square-mile area through tropical darkness, many of them landing 10 miles from the nearest companion.

Loritz, who announced the arrest yesterday of 53-year-old Emmy Goering, widow of Hermann, on charges that the former actress was a member of the Nazi party, said orders also had gone out for the arrest of Mrs. Fritz Sauckel, widow of the Nazi labor boss; Mrs. Hans Frank, widow of the Nazi governor general of Poland; and Mrs. Wilhelm Frick, widow of the "Protect-
