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ASK PROOF OF PLOT BY NAGY FROM RUSSIAN

Fellow Member Of Control Commission Kept From Seeing Documents

Budapest, June 7.—The British have sent a second letter to the Russian commander in Budapest asking copies of documents allegedly implicating former Premier Ferenc Nagy in a plot to overthrow the Hungarian republic.

British Maj. Gen. O. P. Edgecumbe made the demand in replying to a letter from Soviet Lt. Gen. V. P. Sviridov, acting chairman of the Allied Control Commission, in which Sviridov said he was unable to comply with a request for the documents because he already had turned over the documents to the Hungarian Government and was "authorized" to give them to "the Hungarian Government only."

He added that these copies were the only ones in the possession of the Allied Control Commission, of which the Americans and British are also members. Edgecumbe replied that the British Government was "extremely interested" in the documents, that under ACC rules he was entitled to them, and that he saw no reason why Sviridov could not arrange to get copies from the Hungarian Government.

There has been no Russian answer to a similar request made June 4 by the commander of the American military mission, Brig. Gen. George H. Weems.

The documents in question are depositions which the Russians said they took from Bela Kovacs, former secretary general of the Smallholders Party, whom the Russians arrested Feb. 25 on a charge of espionage. The Russians say that the documents implicate former Prime Minister Nagy and former Speaker of the House Bela Varga, both members of the Smallholders Party, in an alleged plot against the Hungarian republic exposed by the Communists early in January.

Anti-Communist In Bulgaria Is Under Arrest

Sofia, Bulgaria, June 7.—(AP)—Opposition Leader Nikolai Dimitrov Petkov, accused of plotting against Bulgaria's Communist-led government, today saw his arrest as "nothing but a prolongation of what already has happened in Hungary."

Petkov, secretary of the opposition agrarian party, who was jailed yesterday, gave his interpretation to reporters on his way to his cell. He said he had been expecting to be arrested. Petkov, a National Assembly deputy, was taken into custody after the assembly voted to deprive him of parliamentary immunity.

Vladimir Topencharov, government press bureau head, also likened events here to those in Hungary. He said Petkov's acts had been "similar to those of the Hungarian conspirators" and spoke of "a political link between the Hungarian conspiracies and the Bulgarian ones," adding that this link was "not organizational."

Austria Reports Communist Move

Moscow Said To Refuse Signing Peace Pact With Present Gov't; Diplomats Regard Events As Stalin Reply To Truman Doctrine

A communist maneuver against the conservative-dominated government of Austria was reported in Vienna today, adding to the swift-moving sequence of events which many western diplomats regard as Stalin's answer to the Truman doctrine.

A high personality in the Austrian administration quoted a leading Austrian communist as saying that Moscow would refuse to sign a peace treaty with the present Austrian government. The communist, Ernst Fischer, was quoted as telling two Austrian cabinet members that he had definite information from Moscow that repercussions could be expected if western orientation in Austria remained unchanged.

This drew significance from the communist coup in Hungary, which forced Premier Ferenc Nagy out of office, and the arrest in Sofia of the chief of Bulgarian opposition to the Soviet-supported communist regime.

World interest centered on the U. S. State Department's plan to send a strongly worded note of protest to the Soviet Union against the Hungarian stroke, but in Moscow, the Soviet press made no mention either of the prospective note or of President Truman's comments on the events.

So long as no peace treaty is signed with Austria and the allied occupation continues, Russia can keep troops in Hungary to maintain communications with her occupation forces in Austria. Retention of such troops conforms with terms of the treaty signed by the allies with Hungary.

ASSURE PROBE "VOTE FRAUD"

Senate Investigation Promised On Kansas City Incident

Washington, June 7.—(AP)—Republican senators charging a Justice Department "whitewash" of alleged Kansas City vote fraud promised today they will press for a full Senate investigation with on-the-spot hearings.

Senator Ferguson (R-Mich.), chairman of a judiciary subcommittee, announced that he will recommend the Senate authorize a broad inquiry to include committee sessions in Kansas City.

Ferguson's subcommittee ended hearings yesterday on a resolution by Senator Kem (R-Mo.) calling on the Senate to determine whether Attorney General Tom Clark and his aides "properly performed their duties" in handling complaints about the Democratic primary last August.

Kem, after listening to the testimony, commented that "without question the investigation should proceed."

Both Ferguson and Kem contended the Justice Department solicited biased fact charges arising from the voting in which Rep. Roger Slaughter, Democrat, running for renomination, was defeated by Enoch Axtell, President Truman's choice.

A Republican, Albert L. Reeves Jr., now occupies Slaughter's seat in Congress. He defeated Axtell in the general election.

The fraud charges relating to the primary race between Axtell and Slaughter came to a light in a session of the Senate last week.

Lack Of Rain Causing Farmers Replant Fields

Kinchin W. Cobb, widely known tobacco grower and warehouseman who has been traveling over Pitt and several adjoining counties, said yesterday that lack of rain and cool nights have been damaging to young tobacco plants to such an extent that he believes the stand of tobacco in fields at this time is short 15 per cent or more.

In some sections Mr. Cobb visited and talked with farmers, they were plowing up poor stands of tobacco and transplanting were following the plows. Spotted sections have had rain and in these places tobacco stands are satisfactory, but on the whole, conditions are unsatisfactory now.

Rainfall here during the past two months was less than 3 inches, according to Mrs. C. E. Maiden, Airways observer here for the Department of Commerce, said. About two weeks ago a 3-inch rain fell, but other rains have been drizzles. Many nights have been nearly cold.

Mr. Cobb, who was sales supervisor of the Greenville tobacco market for many years when the market was being developed to extensive proportions, directed the spending of more than a million dollars advertising the Greenville market.

Los Angeles, June 7.—(AP)—Tall, dignified Andrew Jackson IV, descendant of America's seventh president, isn't miffed because he didn't get invited to the Democratic party's \$100-a-plate Jackson Day dinner celebration here.

"I'd like to have been there to represent old Andy—I lent them a portrait of him you know—but it doesn't really matter," said Jackson, 55, a motion picture industry employee.

"June 5 isn't Jackson Day, it's January 8. That's when the family has a gathering."

He said he didn't know why the date had been changed to June 5.

Last January he celebrated at his home with Patrick Henry V and a descendant of John C. Calhoun.

FRENCH RAIL LINES STRUCK

Gov't Ready To Use Trucks For Food, Passengers

Paris, June 7.—(AP)—The French Government was set today to authorize trucks to haul food and passengers throughout the country in the face of a paralyzing railroad strike which has cut France's rail link with five neighboring nations.

The decision to use trucks was taken at an emergency meeting of Premier Paul Ramadier with Army and Navy chiefs early today, after the walkout had sent a creeping paralysis over France's state-owned rail network.

After the meeting the government said it would take all necessary steps to keep food moving throughout the country, but that it would not requisition the railroads or the workers.

The "spontaneous" strike of an estimated 10,000 key workers of the network's total of 700,000 employees blocked passenger traffic to England, Belgium, Switzerland, Germany and Italy.

Early today the stoppage spread to the Gare d'Asprelitz, halting all traffic on southwest lines running to Bordeaux and the Spanish border.

Babson Discusses Building Stocks

Babson Park, Mass., June 7.—Before the start of 1947 we all looked forward to a building boom such as we had not seen since the 1823-27 period. We know now that this anticipated boom has not materialized. Nor do we expect any such boom this year. What happened to postpone the great potential demand?

Construction Costs
We have all read about the high cost of building materials. Those of us who have wanted to build or who have been forced to build have found this only too true. Lumber has been exorbitantly high and the green lumber now on the market is not building good houses. Materials have not only been poor, but they have been scarce. Both of these factors have delayed the expected boom.

Labor is the great detriment to the building trade. The cost of labor is high and the workmanship is far from expert. Many men who have previously had little real experience are obtaining the same wages as skilled craftsmen. Present labor union practices do not encourage apprentices to enter the building trades.

This quite naturally keeps the supply of skilled labor low and the rates high. When a man pays for building, be it residential or industrial, he wants to know that he is obtaining sound material and the best possible workmanship while still keeping his price within a reasonable figure.

Buyers Resistance
Industrial building, although up to this time hindered by government regulation, has had a postwar start. We have all seen evidences of this in the plans and construction begun by leading businesses and industries throughout the United States. Will this program follow through in the face of the much talked business recession? More likely, this also will slack off and await the time when materials and labor are both cheaper and better.

How many veterans and other people displaced by the war thought of building homes when "peace" at last came? How many more had decided to buy homes? If we could compare the above countless thousands with those that actually found \$32.00—for his broadcasts.

MIDWEST AREA IS HARD HIT BY RISING FLOOD

Thousands Homeless; Tornadoes Strike, Causing Further Damage

Thousands were left temporarily homeless in parts of four Midwest states today as surging waters of rivers and streams spilled over farm lands, washed out railroad tracks and flooded highways. Tornadoes struck in four other states last night, causing extensive property damage.

While the peril of serious floods threatened in southeast Nebraska, southwest Iowa, northwest Missouri and northeast Kansas, tornadoes hit communities in Illinois, Colorado, Oklahoma and Missouri last night, destroying several homes. There were no fatalities.

The twisters which struck at Champaign, Ill., and Julesburg, Colo., caused heavy damage. In the Illinois city, home of the University of Illinois, more than two score houses were destroyed or damaged, with a loss estimated at \$200,000.

At Julesburg, the Union Pacific Railroad yards were damaged and the station nearly demolished.

A tornado also hit a rural area near Chester, Okla., demolishing a farm home, while several houses were damaged in two summer resorts near Excelsior Springs, Mo., by a twister.

The rapidly rising Des Moines River forced several thousand residents in southeastern Iowa to evacuate their homes, including more than 4,000 in Ottumwa, which was without electric power and had only a meager reserve of water for its 30,000 residents.

More than 500 residents in other southern Iowa communities were driven from their homes and hundreds of head of livestock were feared lost, as flood waters spread over the lowlands.

Electric Plant Operating Under Difficulty Now

Martin Swartz, superintendent of Greenville Utilities, said today that the electric generating machinery at the plant is still operating on 50 per cent efficiency as the result of a break-down of a suction fan on one of the big boilers last week.

He said the 110-horsepower rotor which draws from the boiler furnace to the smokestack at the rate of 46,800 cubic feet of expended gases per minute at 363 degrees Fahrenheit, is evidence of the economy of operation at the plant. Incidentally, this indicates that they get all of the heat possible from the fuel.

Supt. Swartz said the Pratt Daniel Corporation, service engineers, Portchester, N. Y., have been on the job to see that the disabled equipment at the plant is doing the best job possible. He said a next rotor will be completed by Tuesday, the balance of the equipment following week, and the expected date of shipment is June 18. Everything is being done to get it here in a hurry. Incidentally, plant officials request the public to be sparing in their use of electric current until the rotor is replaced.

BABIES SLAIN AT HOSPITAL

Two Infants Battered To Death By Unknown Assailant

Massillon, O., June 7.—(AP)—Two girl babies were battered to death in the pediatric nursery of City Hospital last night by an unidentified assailant whose motive was unknown, police announced today.

Although the nursery sometimes contains as many as 30 children, the two victims were its sole occupants last night. They were:

Rosemary Morton, nine weeks daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry E. Morton.

Diane J. Brand, eight weeks daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lex Brand.

A nurse, Marian Sillick, found the babies' bodies by their cribs last night. The bed clothing on a third crib was pulled back.

The Stark County coroner, Dr. Edward Reno, said the infants died of injuries caused by blunt force. Police Chief Stanley W. Switzer, who headed an investigating detail, said the attacker might have picked them up and struck them against the floor. Dirt smudges were found on the head of the Brand baby.

The police believed the attack was made between 7:35 and 1:45 last night. Visiting to the nursery was restricted on Friday nights, and patrolmen made immediate efforts to contact any of the few visitors.

Stark County Prosecutor Deane MacLaughlin, who participated in the investigation, said that in his view, hospital authorities had not been lax in their responsibilities. "In no way did I find any neglect of proper duty or care," he added.

German Witness Takes Stand In Chandler Trial

Boston, June 7.—(AP)—The testimony of the first of 14 German witnesses called to aid the government's case against Douglas Chandler, charged with treason, was in the federal court record today.

Edward Stittler, testifying briefly before adjournment yesterday, said that Chandler, a former American newspaperman, prepared a radio talk for broadcast at his home in Germany. He identified a signature on a passport as that of the defendant.

The government charges that Chandler broadcast Nazi propaganda from Germany to the United States during the war as "Paul Revere" and that he operated under direction of Dr. Joseph Goebbels and others high in the Nazi government.

Oscar R. Ewing, special assistant to the attorney general, told the court that the 58-year-old defendant received 7,500 German Reichsmarks a month—approximately \$32.00—for his broadcasts.

Opposite Views On Size And Composition Of Proposed Force; Gromyko Says Large Army Unneeded Since Axis Defeated

Lake Success, June 7.—(AP)—A fight over the size and composition of the proposed United Nations global police force appeared to be developing today in the wake of a Russian declaration that the world situation does not warrant maintenance of inflated armies, navies and air forces.

army be kept relatively small, Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Gromyko cautioned the great powers yesterday against maintaining such inflated forces on the pretext they were needed for use by the peace agency.

He declared that since Germany and Japan had been defeated and that ex-enemy states were under allied control "there is no necessity in general that the United Nations maintain excessively numerous armed forces."

Bantam-Size Autos To Be Made In Japan

Tokyo, June 7.—(AP)—Japanese plants will soon be turning out bantam-size passenger automobiles again—but only 300 of them a year. Allied headquarters today authorized the annual manufacture of that number for use by Japanese doctors, police and government agencies and for business firms and taxicab companies to use on official government business.

Legislative Record

Congress Clamped Down On Issuing Information Of Member's Voting Record; Reasoning Behind Move; How Can Be Done; Bill Offered To Make It Easier

Washington, June 7.—(AP)—The voting record of your senator or representative isn't easy to get.

Congress isn't showing any signs of making it easier although Rep. Hale Boggs, Louisiana Democrat, has offered a bill to do just that.

The bill went to a committee then to a sub-committee, for consideration which hasn't started. And this session of Congress is almost over.

The bill, if it became law, would do this:

By writing to the Congressional Library, any newspaper editor or group of 10 or more citizens could get any congressman's voting record free.

(Boggs said he made it a group of 10 or more citizens just to prevent some individual "crackpot" from bothering the librarians.)

The Congressional Library now keeps a record of every congressman's voting and gives it to him at the end of the year—but just his own. You, as a citizen or editor

Republican Leaders Confident That Congress Will Override Presidential Veto If Necessary; Vote Was 54-17 In Support Of Taft-Hartley Measure

Washington, June 7.—(AP)—Congress wrapped up the Taft-Hartley labor bill for President Truman today and tagged it as approved by overwhelming majorities of both the Senate and House.

And Republican leaders predicted confidently that if the Chief Executive vetoes the big measure, curbing union activities, Congress will override his decision.

That takes a two to one majority. Here is the picture:

The Senate approved the bill late yesterday by a vote of 54 to 17, completing congressional action. That's a three to one margin—better than the GOP leadership expects to muster on a veto test, if one comes.

The House slapped its okay on the bill earlier this week, 320 to 79 or four to one. So proponents there are not worried.

Senator Taft (Ohio), chairman of the Senate's Republic Policy and Labor Committee, told a reporter he was "pleased" by the Senate vote and still is confident a veto can be overcome, if necessary.

But he forecast that the margin would be something closer to the 68 to 24 vote by which the Senate passed its original bill. The compromise measure it approved yesterday is a composite of separate bills passed by the House and Senate.

Here are some of the major provisions of the final draft:

1. The Attorney General is authorized to obtain 83-day court orders to halt or block national emergency strikes during mediation. This authority could be used if John L. Lewis calls a coal strike in July.

2. The closed shop is prohibited and the union shop permitted only where a majority of the workers vote for it. Under the closed shop only union members can be hired. Union shop agreements permit employers to hire anyone, but workers must join the union within a specified time.

3. Jurisdictional strikes and secondary boycotts are prohibited. The National Labor Relations Board is authorized to seek injunctions against them.

On the veto issue, Senators Ball (R-Minn.) and Ellender (D-La.), both members of the Senate Labor Committee, agreed with Taft that the Senate could override.

But Ellender said he does not expect Mr. Truman to disapprove the bill.

"I think he may write a stinging criticism of it, but accept it primarily on the ground that by July 1 he would have no other tool to fight John L. Lewis," Ellender said.

Japan's World Trade

Beginnings Of Economic Self-Sufficiency In Offing For Japan As Allies Appear Ready To Reopen Business On Global Basis; United States' Interests

The allies appear to be on the eve of a definite move to reopen war-torn Japan to world trade and the beginnings of economic self-sufficiency.

The long-discussed program to get Japanese industry and commerce moving again on a global basis is expected to be working within two months.

The prime objective is to give the Japanese people ever-growing help in their efforts to support themselves and to lighten the financial burden of occupation on the allies principally the United States.

"The War, State, Commerce and Treasury Departments and other branches of the government have completed return to private trade," says Lieut. Gen. George L. Eberle who headed an American group which has just returned from Japan. "But it's the big step in that direction."

The allies are expected to announce details of the plan within

a few days. Just what nations will be permitted to participate and to what extent are expected to be among the things determined.

It can be said that those nations which can contribute most to the objectives of the occupation may be expected to receive first consideration in the trade revival. Prime objectives are getting needed raw materials into Japan and exports to those who can use what the empire can produce and pay for them in money or materials that will further still more Japan's comeback.

United States firms interested in buying or selling in Japan long have been wanting to get their representatives back on Japanese soil. Obviously the U. S. will play a prominent part in the scheduled reopening of the empire. From what other nations the commercial men will come remains to be divulged, but the United States will have no monopoly.

TAFT PRESSES TAX ARGUMENT

Points Out Truman Okayed Corpora- tion Tax Slashes

Washington, June 7—(AP)—Sen-
ator Taft (R-Ohio) today deman-
ded to know how President Truman
can argue against a tax cut for in-
dividuals when he gave his blessing
to one for corporations in 1945.
Pouring new ammunition into his
growing fight with Mr. Truman over
economic issues, Taft told a re-
porter:

"It has been suggested by some
that the president should veto the
tax bill because it might lead to a
deficit if we have a serious recession.

"But only two years ago the presi-
dent recommended and approved a
reduction of \$6,000,000,000 for the
most part for corporations, when we
faced a deficit of \$20,000,000,000 in
the fiscal year 1946."

The tax bill now before the presi-
dent would have individuals about
\$4,000,000,000 by reducing levies
10.5, 20 and 30 per cent in various
brackets.

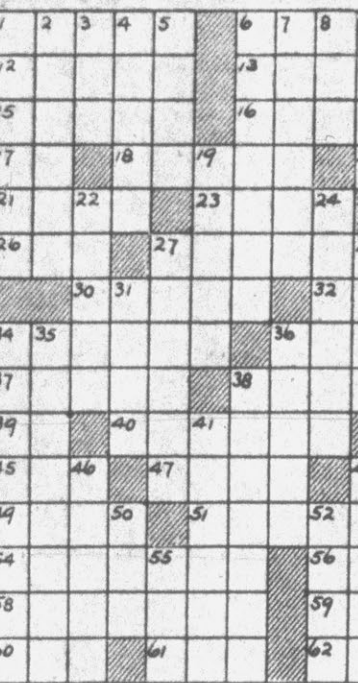

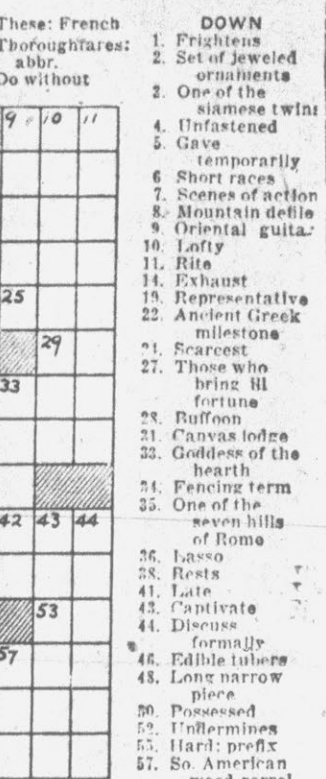
Crossword Puzzle

It is feasible to build or buy, we would find a wide gap between desire and realization. In addition to excessive costs and poor workmanship, building regulations have proved discouraging. Continued strikes have contributed to the general pessimism. Only those who have been forced into building or buying to keep a roof over their heads have succumbed. This has left a group, less pressed by need and better able to await more favorable opportunities. Thus, we have seen a gradual drop in prices of older houses since about September, 1946. Not all the newly built houses are being snapped up.

Demand Still Exists
There are today persistent requests for federal and state housing for veterans and others. We hear of many fires and resulting deaths brought about by over-crowded conditions and careless conversion of private homes into lodging houses. Builders of apartments and houses to rent will be encouraged only when costs of building products have evened out. They await also for a time when the cost of labor is more predictable and their work more profitable.

As for building stocks most of them are at or near their lows for the year. Their prospects are good because of the still unsatisfied demand. They have been kept down by the failure of the building boom to progress. There has already been an indication that some manufacturers and processors of building materials may cut their prices. Should this work out, manufacturers of other construction materials may follow suit. When some of the problems facing present construction are solved, then volume construction can start. When this happens we will see a rise in the earnings of building stocks. Thus, although the building boom has been delayed, I continue to feel that it will some day come.

How many traders from the designated nations will be acceptable to General MacArthur is another important detail to be determined. Up to now the supreme commander has said there simply were not places for foreign businessmen to stay in Japan. Every hotel throughout the empire had been filled with occupation forces. With the announcement of the trading program, a note or two in each of the empire's principal trading centers is expected to be set aside to commercial visitors for a limited time.

At the end of the prescribed period, the visitors will be told to move on to make room for similar traders from elsewhere.

This hoped-for Japanese trade revival should go far toward solving the allied problems concerning the empire. Coupled with a gradually increasing solution of the reparations problem, it marks the greatest allied progress with regard to Japan since Tokyo surrendered—excepting, of course, the occupation itself.

The trade program will be even better news to the Japanese than to the allies. The former will see the beginnings of the rock on which they hope to build new self-sufficiency and a standard of living above the present mere life-sustaining basis.

Right there the library quit giving even a congressman another congressman's voting record.

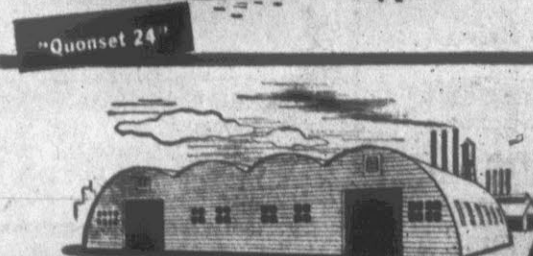
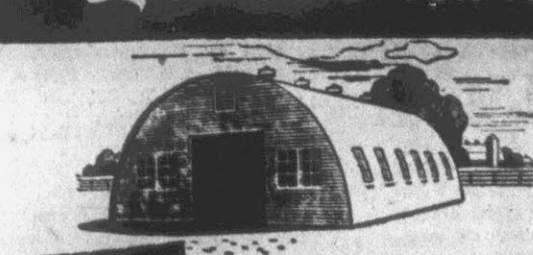

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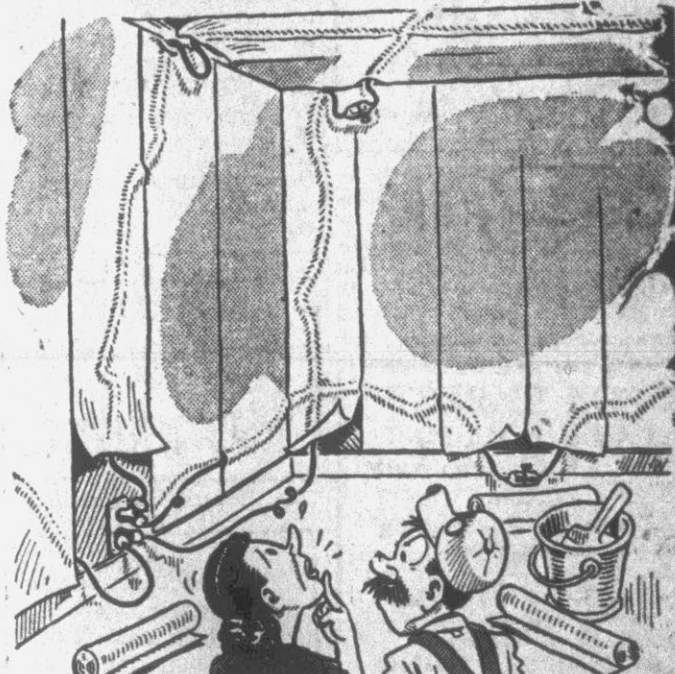
