

NEW UNION IS ORGANIZED BY JOS. BEIRNE

Former President Of NFWA Heads N. Phone Union; Struggle Ahead

Miami Beach, Fla., June 9—(AP)—A new labor union, the Communications Workers of America, was born today with the opening of its first convention—stepped at once into a world on battle.

The CWA, led by 36-year-old Joseph A. Beirne, faced these two major fights:

1. Trying to enlist the nation's 570,000 rank and file telephone workers—it already claims to have 212,000—and then to lure telegraph workers and radio technicians away from the AFL and CIO unions to which they now belong.

2. Trying to decide whether to affiliate with the CIO or AFL or to stay independent of both. As the convention opened, the last alternative appeared to have the best chance, partly because many CWA delegates are sore at the CIO for setting up the TWOC—Telephone Workers Organization Committee—ten days ago in opposition to the CWA.

The CWA is the successor to the National Federation of Telephone Workers, a loose network of telephone unions which was dissolved yesterday.

The plan to establish a closely-knit union was made last November at the Denver convention of the federation.

There has been considerable dissatisfaction among telephone unions with the nationwide strike that began April 7 and dragged on in some Bell Telephone Companies for six weeks.

Officers of two strong unions, the American Union of Telephone Workers and the Western Electric Employees Association, and of some small unions have turned to the CIO and are urging their members to vote affiliation with the TWOC.

But Beirne, who was president of the old federation and is temporary president of the new CWA, said the strike only demonstrated that a single union like CWA is needed to fight the Bell System.

Students Using Scholarships In Library Course

Six students of library science are studying at East Carolina Teachers College this summer on scholarships granted by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools to teachers pledged to work as librarians in the public schools. Funds for the scholarships were provided by the General Education Board with the purpose of training school personnel for library work and of supplying enough skilled workers to meet the demand in public schools.

More European Aid

A Review Of Marshall's Speech Made Last Week On Aspects Of Further Relief; Not Necessarily A "Stop Communism" Crusade; Price Of Political Stability

It is upon this chaos that communism feeds, and it is probably unfortunate that the "stop communism" part of the Truman Doctrine was the one which apparently had to be played up first in order to interest the American public and Congress in the larger question of helping to stop communism's chief condition for growth, which is chaos.

Workers Return To Reynolds Co.

Three Principal Issues, Union Security, Seniority And Pay Rates Settled; Company Announces Conditions Of Agreement

Winston-Salem, N. C., June 9—(AP)—Some 6,000 workers began returning to their jobs at the R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company today after settlement of the 38-day strike of local 22 of the CIO Food, Tobacco and Agricultural Workers.

The union says the new pact will call for an overall average wage increase of 12 cents an hour. It had sought 15 cents hourly. The contract also calls for union security, and a voluntary dues checkoff system, the union said.

In a news release issued by the R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company today, it was announced that "a collective bargaining agreement between R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Co. and a CIO union, effective June 9, 1947, and continuing in effect until May 1, 1948, has been signed."

"The three principal issues that were not settled on the night of April 30 last, the date of expiration of the old contract, namely union security, seniority and rates of pay with hours of work, were settled as follows: The agreement contains a provision whereby any employee may voluntarily, in writing, request the company to check off of his wages the amount of his union dues and initiation fees with the right to revoke such request at any time if the employee desires to do so. This provision complies with the recently enacted North Carolina law known as H. B. 229, Session of 1947. The contract does not provide for a closed shop, union shop, or maintenance of membership.

"The provisions relating to seniority incorporated in the contract were as proposed by the company. The 7 per cent wage rate increase and two additional paid holidays and the hours of work offered by the company on April 30 last were accepted by the union. The contract provides for automatic wage rate progressions, certain minor changes in the schedule being provided in the new contract.

"The new wage rates become effective as of May 5, 1947. The company will pay as rapidly as possible to its employees who have been at work since May 5 the increased pay to which they are entitled for the period since that date."

Cannibalistic Japs On Trial

Manila, June 9—(AP)—Thirty-one Japanese soldiers charged with butchering and eating Filipinos, and occasionally their own men, during long months of hiding in Mindanao jungles, will be tried before the Philippines Army War Crimes Tribunal next month.

The Japanese surrendered in February when a Japanese interpreter convinced them that the war was over. They are held at Del Monte, northern Mindanao, charged with more than 20 counts of murder, involving cannibalism.

S. Melville Hussey, Bayonne, N. J., a member of the U. S. Army's legal section in Manila, obtained confessions from the man-eating Japanese.

Communists Eye U.S. Oil Firm Now In Hungary

Budapest, June 9—(AP)—The Communists have offered to buy out the Hungarian-American oil company, Maort, an American informant said today, and have threatened to banish from Hungary the concern's American executives.

The informant said the Communists were considering nationalization of the country's oil fields but were faced with the fact that Russia gets half the Hungarian royalties of Maort.

The informant and leading Hungarian political observers, advised of developments, agreed it would be only a matter of time before the new Communist-dominated Hungarian regime—rushed into office with the resignation of Prime Minister Perene Nagy—would take some action on Maort. The company was developed and is principally owned by Standard Oil Co. of New Jersey.

Unofficial Walkout Is Idling Soft Coal Pits

Nearly 10,000 Soft Coal Miners Join Work Stoppage In Pennsylvania Fields; Said Protest To Labor Legislation

Uniontown, Pa., June 9—(AP)—Another 3,600 miners joined a work stoppage in the southwestern Pennsylvania bituminous fields today, raising to nearly 10,000 the number idle in what some described as a protest against the union-curbing bill adopted by Congress.

Fourteen mines were idle, most of them captive pits operated by large steel companies—U. S. Steel Corp., Weirton Steel, Jones and Laughlin and Republic Steel—which have been producing record-breaking tonnage to meet big market demands for steel.

However, the 300 members of one AFL United Mine Workers local returned to work when their president, Andrew S. Hagner, announced against any violation of the federal anti-strike injunction which was sustained by the Supreme Court. The government gives the jurisdiction over the mines July 1, when they return to their private owners.

Over the weekend, nearly a dozen mines employing 6,600 were the scenes of work stoppages, or votes to quit digging coal.

"There is no strike situation—they're just not going to work," declared Lee Euckey, president of the Maxwell, Pa., local in Fayette county. He said his miners voted last night to stay out today. "They said they would take a couple of days holiday," he added, "they didn't give any reason."

But John Ozanich, president of the Robena mine local, also in Fayette county, said the work stoppages were the result of feeling against labor legislation before the Congress. He declared the men held a meeting and "decided" to join a general strike against the Ellender-Taft bill.

(In Washington, it was assumed Ozanich's reference to the Ellender-Taft bill was directed toward the Hartley-Taft bill which is expected to reach President Truman's desk within hours. The reference to Ellender was thought to have resulted from a statement by Senator Ellender (D-La.) that the bill was not a bad measure. He said he thought the president would sign it.)

AUTO WORKERS STAGE STRIKE

Briggs Co. Says Walkout Starts Two Days Before Time

Detroit, June 9—(AP)—The Briggs Manufacturing Company today reported that members of the CIO Automobile Workers walked out of the Connor plant which produces bodies for Packard Motor Cars.

The action, affecting more than 2,000 workers, was confirmed by the union which said pickets already were patrolling the plant entrances while a meeting of union officials was under way. There was no explanation from the union.

A Briggs spokesman said two departments were shut down, two days ahead of the Wednesday strike deadline which had been set by union leaders. UAW regional director, when contract negotiations had broken up Saturday.

1. The UAW-CIO signed a new two-year contract with Kaiser-Frazer Corp. in line with the prevailing wage pattern increase of 11-12 cents hourly and six paid holidays.

2. The 20-day strike of 3,700 members of the Independent Foreman's Association of America continued at the Ford Motor Co.

3. UAW officials announced 10,500 of 75,000 Ford production workers in Detroit had voted to conduct a strike ballot.

The tenant farmer died in a field Friday evening while cultivating corn near here.

Children Questioned In Death Of Two Infants

Massillon, O., June 9—(AP)—Six small children who were patients in Massillon City Hospital Friday night when two baby girls were found dying of skull fractures at the foot of their cribs were questioned today by Police Chief Stanley W. Switzer, who said he was working on the theory that the deaths were accidental.

Funeral services were scheduled today for the baby girls, 10-week-old Diana J. Brand and nine-week-old Rosemary Horton, sole occupants of hospital Room 407 where they were found by a nurse who left them sleeping 10 minutes earlier.

Lay Plans To Call Special Session

Nisei Held

Washington, June 9—(AP)—With a wary eye on tense international developments, Republican leaders are considering a plan whereby they, as well as the president, could summon Congress back into session later this year.

It has become apparent the lawmakers have no intention of acting this session on any major additions to foreign economic aid such as that embodied in the Greek-Turkish project just getting underway.

While the Republicans seem generally to think Congress has done enough for the time being in the foreign field, some of their leaders—and these include Vandenberg—are said to be reluctant to adjourn Congress beyond the Republican's power to reconvene it if some international or domestic crisis develops.

One viewpoint is that Congress adjourns in their regular way to meet the reorganization law's July 31 deadline, the GOP majority may have no effective check on President Truman's Democratic administration for five months until the legislators return for regular session in January. Mr. Truman could call them back, however, any time he chose.

Hence to keep their hands on both the domestic and foreign fields, the Republicans may propose a recess under which leaders of both houses could summon the members back. There is precedent for such action in the wartime agreements by which Congress quit subject to recall of (A) the Senate president and House speaker, or (B) joint action of either the majority leaders of both houses.

In any event, it probably would have to be a major crisis to get the legislators back to Washington before January. This summer and fall offer the best time for the lawmakers to campaign for reelection in 1948. With all of the House and one-third of the Senate seats at stake, some will have primaries falling within the session beginning in January.

The Republican determination to quit by July 31 is likely to leave high and dry some of the administration's foreign projects such as the proposal to synchronize the arms of Latin American countries with those of the U. S., as well as such domestic proposals as an increase in the minimum wage level.

MISSISSIPPI LEVEES BREAK

Villages And Farmlands Inundated By Rising Waters

Hannibal, Mo., June 9—(AP)—The flood swollen Mississippi River today was pouring its muddy waters over thousands of acres of farm lands and into small towns along its banks in Missouri and Illinois. Levee breaks sent right to ten feet of water coursing into the village of Alexandria, Mo., yesterday and inundated an estimated 20,000 acres of land between Keokuk, Iowa, and St. Louis.

Hundreds of persons were driven from their homes but no loss of life was reported. Six hundred and thirty residents of Alexandria evacuated their homes Saturday night in anticipation of the break.

The rise of the Mississippi was given impetus as flood water into the Des Moines river emptied into the Mississippi at Keokuk. The flood water caused heavy damage at several Iowa points, principally Ottumwa, where at least five persons were known to be dead and thousands driven from their homes.

At Quincy, Ill., the Mississippi reached a record high of 23.6 feet before the levee breaks caused a slight drop. The city is situated on a bluff and is in no danger of being flooded.

What Next For U.S.?

Huge Relief Program Since End Of War Was Only Stop-Gap Action; Most Countries Still Floundering Despite Aid; Marshall's "Organized" Relief Theory

Washington, June 9—(AP)—Where do we go from here? Since World War II this country has shoveled out more than \$15,000,000,000 in civilian relief.

Most of it—like loans, food, clothing—has gone to European countries. It's been sent piece-meal, to plug a hole here, fill a need there.

And the countries of Europe still are in bad shape. The more organized they become, the more apt they are to turn to communism. In a sudden effort to stop the spread of communism, this government rushed help to the present governments of Greece and Turkey.

This move, called the Truman Doctrine, received plenty of criticism here and abroad. The critics called it American interference.

It didn't scare or stop the communists. Blocked, although maybe only temporarily, in Greece, they took over Hungary last week.

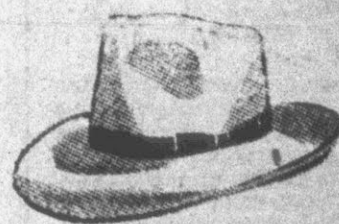

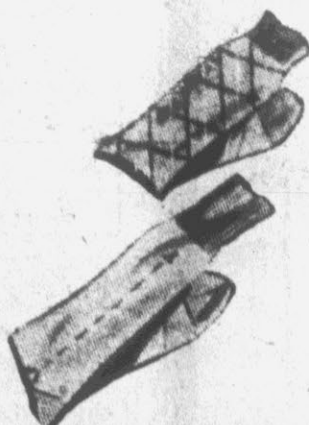

WATCH OUT FOR SUBTLETY

Most people are unaware of the New Testament teaching that there are two kinds of sins—sins of the lower nature and sins of the higher nature. Sins of the lower nature are such things as dishonesty, unclean temper, violence, impurity, blasphemy. Sins of the higher nature are pride, avarice, complacency, and a cold heart.

Our Lord left no doubt in people's minds as to how he rated these sins. He recognized, as every sensible person does, the devastating nature of gross and lurid sin. He said that if a person had a tendency to such sins, he must deal with the same summarily, even though it involved the cutting off of the hand or the foot, or the plucking out of the eye. But he also made it plain that the most dangerous type of sin is not gross sin but subtle sin. He believed that the love of money ruined more people than did the gross passions of the flesh. He taught that pride could destroy the soul just as vice destroys the body. Judas Iscariot was a man with a cold and unloving heart. Our Lord shook his head in dismay over this poor creature, and called him the son of perdition.

Let us not boast if we have escaped the sins of the lower nature. That is good, but it is not good enough. What about the sins of the higher nature? These do not consume life as do the fires of passion, but they rot out the soul or turn it into stone.

encies, farm boardings and star-
ving cities, which of course all set
the stage for communism—or any
form of totalitarianism which seems
to offer the victim a way out of his
personal little hell of hunger, worry
and frustration.

To break this vicious circle, Mar-
shall proposed a remedy—"restoring
the confidence of the European peo-
ple in the economic future of their
own countries and of Europe as a
whole."

"It is logical," Marshall went on,
that the United States should do
whatever it is able to assist in the
return of normal economic health
in the world, without which there
can be no political stability and no
assured peace."

"Europe . . . must have substan-
tial additional help, or face eco-
nomic, social and political deterio-
ration of a very grave character."

This help, he then said, would
have to continue three or four years
and it must come "principally from
America."

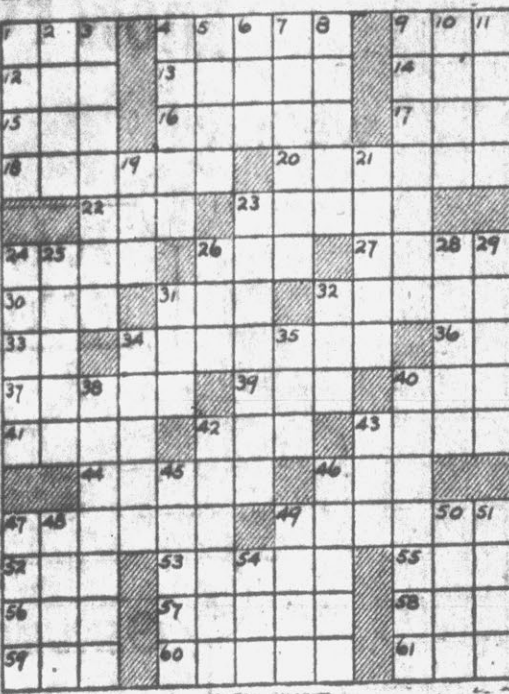

COREY URGES VETS TO KEEP GI INSURANCE

Expresses Alarm Over Large Number In Pitt Who Let Insurance Lapse

Local veterans who have failed to keep their National Service Life Insurance in force were urged today to take advantage of their present opportunity to reinstate it in a statement issued by Arthur B. Corey, Pitt County Veterans Service Officer.

"I am alarmed at the extremely large number of veterans who have neglected to preserve this valuable protection," Mr. Corey declared. "I strongly urge local veterans to get the facts about their GI Insurance from my office, the nearest Veterans Administration office, or from any life insurance agent. Among the veterans in Pitt County three-fourths of them have allowed their insurance to lapse.

"This protection may mean the difference between financial independence or want for the veterans' wives and children. It will have a marked effect on the economic se-

curity of our community.

"If the veterans who have lost this protection knew the facts, they would lose no time in getting it back. Regardless of how long their insurance has been lapsed, they can reinstate it, in most cases, without a physical examination if they apply on or before August 1st.
