SILENT OVER NEW ZEALAND SUPER WEAPON

Secrecy Shrouds Reported Rival To A-Bomb; Project Began In 1944

London, June 13.—(AP)—British Government ministers declined comment today on New Zealand reports concerning the development of a super-secret super-weapon approaching the atomic bomb in importance.

The Defense Ministry, the Air Ministry, the War Office, the Admiralty and the Ministry of Supply all refused to discuss stories out of Auckland which quoted "most reliable" sources as saying research on such an offensive weapon was started in 1944 and still was being pursued in the strictest secrecy by scientists in New Zealand, Great Britain and the United States.

"Had the project been completed in time it might have played a role as effective as the atom bomb in the subjugation of Japan," the New Zealand Herald, of Auckland, reported.

"Without discounting the effectiveness of the project as an offensive weapon," the paper continues, "it does not offer such a threat to world peace as the atom bomb. This may not be amplified further than saying that things pertaining to it are under control."

First reports that such research was under way followed the award of the rank of commander of the British Empire to Prof. David James Leech in the latest royal birthday honors list. Reports in Auckland said Leech had taken a leading part in the coordination and development of research on the project.

There was no hint from any source as to the nature of the project and so far as was known only New Zealand, Britain and the U.S. had the information. A Wellington man was said to have presented the

Communist Campaign Has Two Methods, One For East Europe And One For West, Says Analyst; Follows Pattern In Bulgaria Of Crushing Anti-Communists

The Communist program in Europe appears to be developing along two principal lines. East of the ideological front, that splits the continent into two camps, is a complete destruction of what little opposition has been permitted to survive. West of the line there is a drive to splinter the parties adjacent to the Communists in the political spectrum and to draw from them segments of sufficient size to give the Reds the dominance they now approach but have not yet achieved.

Bulgaria furnishes the latest example of the eastern campaign. The Communist-dominated National Assembly has expelled 23 Agrarian members, followers of Nikola Petkov, now in jail charged with 23 formed the hard core of the united opposition. TOBACCO MEN HIT TAX RATE

Ask Congress To Ease Excise Taxes On Leaf Products

Washington, June 13.—(AP)—Tobacco industry representatives ask Congress today to ease the excise taxes on tobacco products.

The Associated Tobacco Manufacturers, representing 25 smaller tobacco manufacturers, proposed in a statement to the House Ways and Means Committee a graduated excise levy on cigarettes.

Cigar makers said a new schedule of taxation for cigars would distribute the tax load equitably among retail price groupings.

Europe Relief Plan Is Discussed By Britons

Washington, June 13.—(AP)—The British embassy has opened talks with the State Department to learn how to put Secretary Marshall's call for a joint European revival program into action.

Diplomatic authorities who reported this today said the embassy officials are seeking clarification of a number of Marshall's suggestions before deciding whether to urge London to take the initiative in getting the European countries together.

These authorities said the U. S. is looking to Britain to start the program rolling but has no intention of dictating what the next steps should be.

Gov't Labor Experts Favor Measure's Veto

Will Advise President That Taft-Hartley Legislation Is "Un- workable" And Will Not Stop Anticipat- ed Coal Strike

Washington, June 13.—(AP)—Government labor experts who have been analyzing the Taft-Hartley bill will advise President Truman that the measure is unworkable and will not stop a coal strike.

This was learned today from officials who have seen the analysis but who asked that their names not be used.

There have been equally reliable reports, however, that some other presidential advisers are urging Mr. Truman to sign the measure.

This group is said to contend (a) that the bill does give the government some means of dealing with the threat of a new coal strike next month and (b) that Congress is virtually certain to enact it into law in any event.

Here are some of the specific reasons cited as arguments for a veto:

1. The provision exempting work stoppages resulting from abnormal and dangerous conditions would make it possible, in their opinion, for John L. Lewis to bring about a nationwide or partial soft coal strike in mines which have become

Detroit, June 13.—(AP)—The auto industry's labor scene took on a brighter aspect today with settlement of strikes that had idled 16,000 workers and announcement of a new wage agreement.

Three developments in quick succession yesterday brought auto manufacturers close to general labor peace.

The Hudson Motor Car Co. set up production lines again after a two-day halt, announcing it had reached a "basis of settlement" with the CIO United Auto Workers on demands of 600 clerical employees

Miami Beach, Fla., June 13.—(AP)—Delegates to the first annual convention of the Communications Workers of America headed home today having blocked all moves toward joining any other labor group.

Men from both AFL and CIO unions who observed the four-day convention—from the outside—told reporters the new telephone union "won't last," that it is "constructed poorly and lacks experience."

On the other side of the argument, yesterday's session rang with confident-sounding predictions by CWA leaders that their union is destined to continue, grow stronger and organize the bulk of all telephone workers.

Tibet Disturbance Adds To China's Difficulty On Mongolian Frontier

Nanking, June 13.—(AP)—Trouble in Tibet cropped up today as Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek ordered his garrison in northwestern China—scene of an Outer Mongolian invasion—to defend China's border "to the last man."

Chinese dispatches from Chungking disclosed that Tibet, China's southwesternmost province, was seriously disturbed by local clashes between monks and non-monastic residents.

The trouble started, Chinese correspondents related, when Chinese military authorities arrested the leader of the Buddhist monks and reportedly put him to death. Monks of three important monasteries which practically rule the major portion of Tibet then staged

Domestic Problems Awaiting President On Leaving Canada

Possibly Five Major Measures To Be Acted Upon In Next Three Weeks; May Break With GOP-Controlled Congress

Aboard President Truman's Special Train, Enroute to Washington, June 13.—(AP)—President Truman sped toward Washington today to tackle such domestic problems as the tax and labor bills, after bidding farewell to Canada with a declaration that U. S. foreign policy has but one objective—peace in the world and friendship with every nation.

The president refused to give any hint as to how he intended to act on the income tax reduction measure, but joking with reporters just before the train pulled out last night he laughingly said he would take "30 minutes before the time runs out."

Deadline for action on the tax measure is midnight Monday and for the labor bill midnight Friday.

Within the next three weeks or less, he must make similar decisions on rent control and wool price support bills, with the possibility that a controversial measure on railroad rate fixing also will be laid before him.

If he decides to veto most or all

of these five measures—as many Democrats have predicted he will do—Mr. Truman will have made a clean break on domestic issues with the GOP-controlled Congress.

His bipartisan program on foreign policy remains generally intact, despite some cracks in its structure. But that also may face a test if the president is persuaded after that a European rehabilitation program requires the attention of a special session before Congress meets regularly again in January.

First on the list of pressing presidential decisions apparently will be the \$4,000,000,000 tax reduction bill. Democratic leaders generally expect a veto message on it Monday although some of them say there is a possibility the president may let it become a law.

TRIM BUDGETS FOR AGENCIES

Appropriations For 33 Agencies Pared By House Body

Washington, June 13.—(AP)—The House Appropriations Committee trimmed \$130,884,220 from Veterans Administration funds today in approving an \$8,498,409,759 bill to finance 33 independent government agencies next year.

The total cut amounted to \$330,540,732, or 3.9 percent below the amount President Truman asked. This brought to approximately \$3,580,000,000 the claimed savings of House Republicans in their drive to chop \$6,000,000,000 from Mr. Truman's 1948 budget of \$37,500,000,000.

The Veterans Administration, however, was pared only 1.8 percent in getting \$6,944,457,080 for its work during the 12 months beginning July 1.

Among major recipients covered by the bill are the office of the President, not cut at all; the Atomic Energy Commission, reduced 30 percent; the Civil Service Commission, cut less than one percent; the Federal Communications Commission, trimmed 17 percent; the Federal Power Commission, cut 12 percent; the Federal Trade Commission, reduced almost one third; the Federal Works Agency, cut 12 percent; and the Interstate Commerce Commission, trimmed 10 percent.

Even the President's own Budget Bureau was cut, receiving \$93,392 less than the \$3,470,000 it had asked. The Maritime Commission drew a stern rebuke from the committee for its accounting and general administrative practices.

Russians Claim Militarists In Jap Gov't

Lake Success, June 13.—(AP)—Russia charged today that the American-controlled Japanese Government was "closing its eyes to fascist activities" and that the "old Japanese military clique" was in power.

The charge was made by Soviet Delegate Vladimir Koretsky at a session of the drafting committee of the U.N. commission on human rights.

Koretsky said the Soviet press was particularly interested in Japan because the Japanese constitution as now drafted was along the lines of the American constitution.

He said the "old Japanese military clique" was arresting political leaders and demonstrators.

This military group, he declared, were "wolves in sheep's clothing."

ATOM PLANTS ARE OBSOLETE

Commission Has Ap- propriation Okayed By House Body

Washington, June 13.—(AP)—The atomic energy commission says half its plants and equipment are obsolete because of "startling improvements" in processes but that commercial use of atomic power still is probably 10 to 15 years away.

The information was made public by the House Appropriations Committee today in a report recommending that the commission be given only \$175,000,000 of the \$250,000,000 it asked for the fiscal year starting July 1.

The Appropriations committee allowed the commission the full \$250,000,000 it asked in authority to make contracts to be financed by future appropriations.

Marshall's Plan Hailed By Bevin As Unselfish

London, June 13.—(AP)—Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin described Secretary Marshall's aid-for-Europe plan today as "a bridge to link the East and West" and said it would be "disastrous for ideological or other reasons to frustrate that great endeavor."

"We are glad to know that misunderstanding has been removed by including Russia in the American proposals," the foreign secretary told a luncheon of the Foreign Press Association.

Bevin, describing Marshall's Harvard address as one that "may well rank as one of the greatest speeches in world history," declared:

"As was the case when the U.S. proposed a four-power treaty for Europe, it seems to me that the great, new and wonderful country has acted in the most unselfish manner in its endeavor to use its

great capacity to save Europe from another ruin and to rehabilitate it as urgently as possible."

Government sources said today that Britain, responding to Marshall's proposal that the United States finance a joint program for Europe's economic recovery, soon would call for a conference of European nations to formulate an integrated program.

Details of the Marshall proposal were conveyed to the British Government through Washington talks between the State Department and Ambassador Lord Inverchapel's staff. Both American and British diplomatic sources here said they interpreted Marshall's statements to mean any such program would be carried out in the United Nations framework.

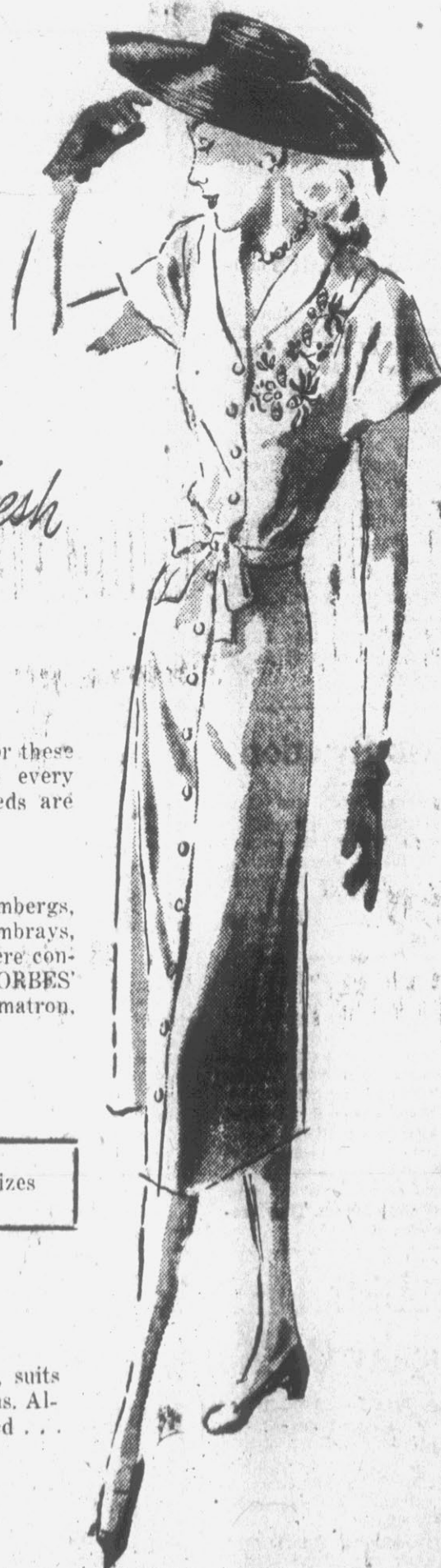

Tennyson in one of his poems
speaks of our being

"Dowered with the hate of
hate, the scorn of scorn,
The love of love."

Hatred is a very natural passion;
and we are supposed to have plenty
of it. The mistake we make is that
we direct this hatred against per-
sons, and this we are forbidden by
all the revealed laws of God ever
to do. We are to reserve our hatred
for things, tendencies, sins. Above
everything else we are to hate the
passion of hatred which leads us
to be bitter and malicious against
our fellows. We are to be dowered
with hate—but above all, "the hate
of hate."

We love at times to pour our
scorn upon people who disagree
with us. Nothing is harder to con-
trol than a sarcastic and bitter
tongue if one happens to possess
such a weapon. Yet sarcasm never
made a pupil in school learn any-
thing, or a child in the home love
virtue, or a friend turn from any
evil. Tennyson pictures the ideal
man when he presents a figure fill-
ed with scorn—not scorn of his fel-

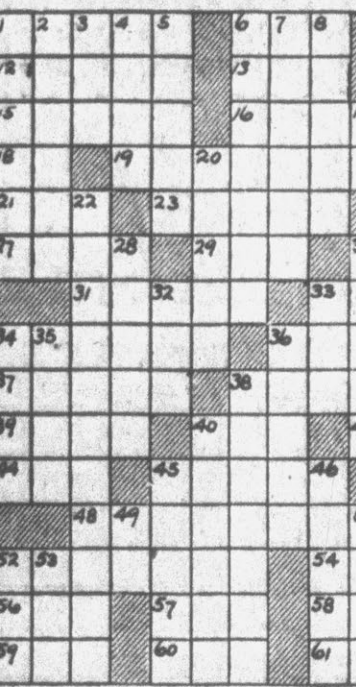

KAISER-FRAZER

Auto Output In May

Nears Peak Among Independents

WILLOW RUN, Mich.—Ending its first year of car production in the black, Kaiser-Frazer Corp. reported this week that output of the Kaiser and Frazer cars in May totaled 16,368 units, a figure which put the Willow Run firm near the top among the nation's seven independent automobile manufacturers.

Edgar F. Kaiser, vice president and general manager, announced that a new daily production high of 583 units was set on May 28 in establishing the month's record. Shipments of Kaisers and Franzers to K-F's 4,000 dealers were 11,232, he said.

Kaiser-Frazer is now "definitely operating in the black and will report a profit for the month of May," Mr. Kaiser disclosed.

The K-F vice president said the Willow Run company is building its 50,000th automobile this week, which marks the firm's first production anniversary. The company started production in June, 1946, with an output of seven cars. June schedules call for 12,000 units, he said.

May's banner production record represents an even 32 per cent increase over the previous high set in April when 7,846 cars rolled off the twin K-F assembly lines. Mr. Kaiser said that a stepped up production tempo at K-F's Detroit engine division and improved engine deliveries from the Continental Motors plant in Muskegon, Mich., contributed greatly to the sharp upturn in Willow Run output.

As of May 31, Kaiser-Frazer had produced a grand total of 48,754 cars, 37,165 of them since January, 1947.

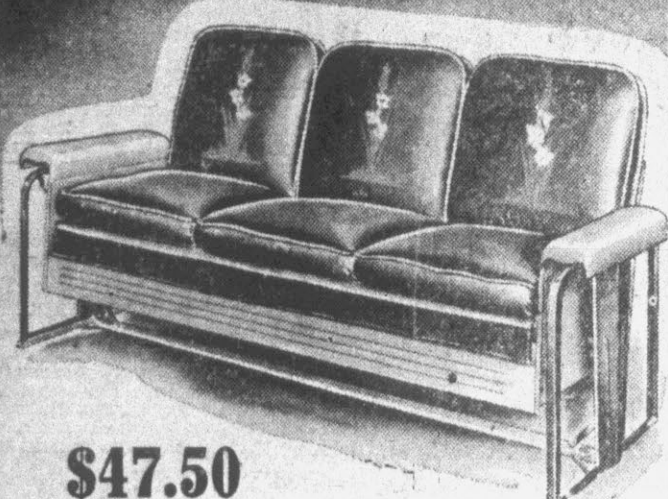

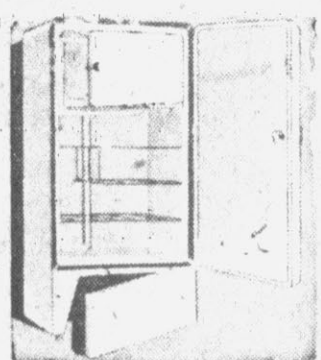

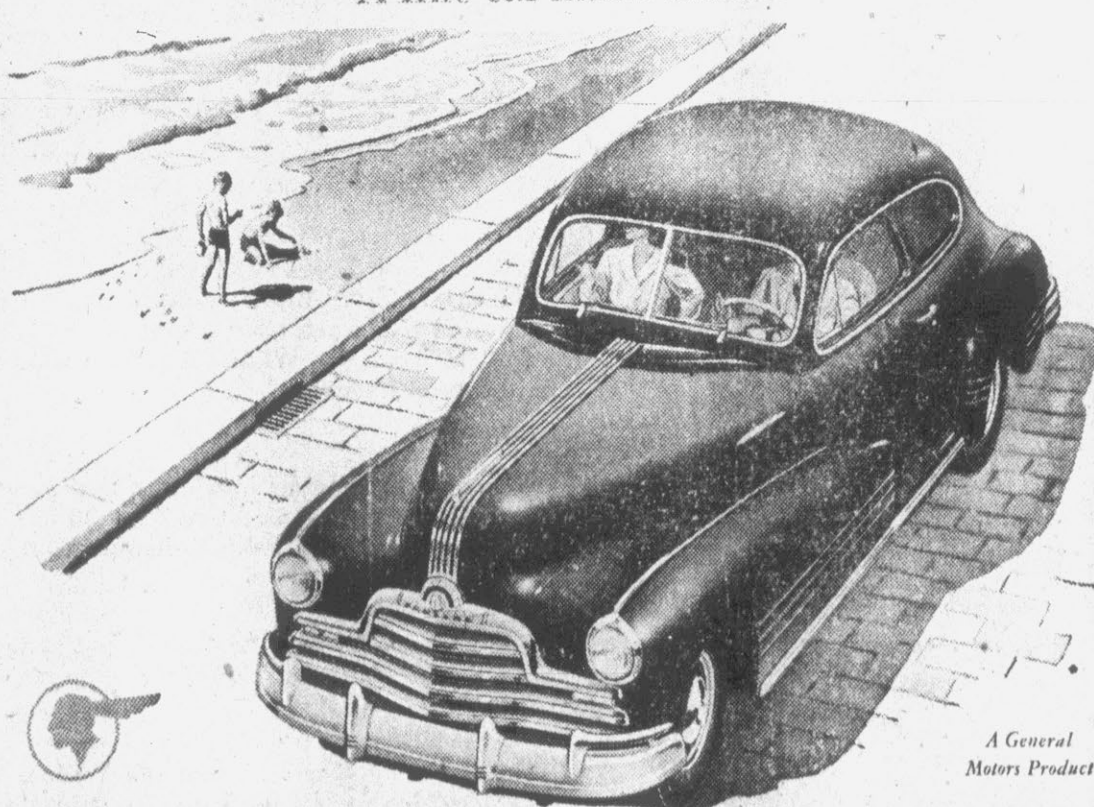
