GERMAN REDS EMBARKING ON MAJOR DRIVE

Russian Occupation Authorities Aid Communists In Summer Offensive

Berlin, June 14.—(AP)—Germany's Communists—supported by Russian occupation authorities and inspired by aggressive Communist tactics in Hungary and elsewhere in Europe—were embarked today on what an American official called a "summer offensive" of their own.

This offensive is being waged by the Soviet-sponsored, Communist-dominated Socialist party (SED) with campaign headquarters in Berlin, where the representatives of Russian communism and Western democracy are in constant contact as they attempt to give four-power administration to this city and to Germany.

The Communists' principal objectives, as interpreted by responsible American officials, are:

1. To regain full control of Berlin's city government—lost in a resounding election defeat last October—possibly by forcing an early new election.

2. To spread Communist influence into the Western zones of Germany, occupied by the U. S. and Britain, through an intensified propaganda attack on British-American policies.

3. To quicken enactment of their policies in the Russian zone of Germany, overriding such political resistance as still exists in Berlin. American sources predicted, the Communists might soon launch a campaign for a new election before the end of 1947.

Berlin's temporary constitution provides that the next election be held in the fall of 1948.

Lundy Young Is Sentenced For Assault In Wake

Raleigh, N.C., June 14.—(AP)—A Wake County Superior Court jury, deadlocked for over seven hours caused the state to accept a guilty plea of assault on a female in the case of Lundy Young, 24, charged with the capital crime of rape.

Judge Leo Carr of Burlington, presiding, sentenced Young to the maximum sentence for the charge. Jury Foreman J. G. Vaughan said the jury was by a seven-to-five vote favoring conviction of charges of assault with intent to commit rape.

Young, World War II veteran of the Army military police, was charged with the rape of a 21-year-old Johnston County divorcee.

Legionnaires Go To Beach Resort

Carolina Beach, N.C., June 14.—(AP)—This beach resort was the mecca for legions of 25,000 North Carolina Legionnaires today as the State Department opened its annual convention.

Roads leading here were heavily spotted with automobiles as first delegates began arriving this morning for registration.

The Forty and Eight took the first place on the program, staging a "wreck" for approximately 100 candidates.

Speakers for the four-day convention include Senator William B. Umstead, Commander William M. York, Governor R. Gregg Cherry, General Jacob L. Devers and Undersecretary of War Kenneth Royall.

On Atomic Controls

Gromyko Indicates It Might Be Possible To Reach Agreement On Basis Of United States And Russian Plans; A Different Approach; Reason For Hope

After months of saying "no," the Russians finally have a new and positive approach to the atomic problem.

It would not pay to become optimistic about it now. The deadlock on fundamental issues still exists. But at least there is a turn in the Russian thinking which has big possibilities. It is simply this: The Soviet Union admits it might be possible to reach agreement on atomic controls on the basis of the United States and Russian plans. Those are the only two big proposals that have been put before the United Nations Atomic Energy Commission since it first met a year ago today.

Andrei A. Gromyko, Soviet deputy foreign minister, gave the first official hint that the Soviet Union saw any possibilities in the United States plan.

In a way, this might eventually be more important than the elaborate scheme for international control which Gromyko laid before the

TAX CUT VETO ANTICIPATED

GOP Congressmen Plan Tuesday Vote To Override

Washington, June 14.—(AP)—President Truman, back from his good will trip to Canada, kept mum today on whether he will slap the widely predicted veto on a bill to cut income taxes \$4,000,000,000 a year.

He gave no inkling either of his intentions towards the less immediate problem of the Taft-Hartley labor bill, on which he has received conflicting advice from his counselors.

Republican leaders in the House were so confident Mr. Truman will reject the tax measure—he has until Monday midnight to act—that they went ahead with plans for a vote Tuesday on a motion to override.

Grand Jury Will Hear Shooting Case On Monday

Lumberton, June 14.—(AP)—A Robeson county grand jury Monday will consider a bill charging that Mrs. Mary Ellen Currin Miller, 24, hired Fred Wiggins, 24, a Negro hand on her father's farm, to shoot her husband as he lay sleeping and make it look like suicide.

David Miller, 27, was shot at his home in nearby Rowland Sunday morning, May 11. He has been discharged from a hospital here.

His wife has been released in \$15,000 bond furnished by her father, and is now reported in an Asheville sanatorium. Wiggins, unable to raise the same amount, has been in Robeson county jail here.

If a true bill is found, the trial is scheduled to start Wednesday before Judge Walter J. Bone of Nashville and a superior court grand jury.

Atomic Energy And Arms Reduction Schedules Stalled; Commissions Investigating Trouble Spots In Balkans And Palestine Hit Snags

Lake Success, June 14.—(AP)—

The United Nations was stalled today on two major international problems—control of atomic energy and reduction of world armaments—and two U.N. commissions investigating trouble spots—Palestine and the Balkans—also hit snags.

The Arab Higher Committee for Palestine formally notified Secretary-General Trygve Lie that it intended to boycott the Holy Land inquiry which is scheduled to get under way Monday. In Cairo, Emil Sandstrom of Sweden, chairman of the Palestine investigation commission, said he regretted the decision.

"The Palestine Arabs' viewpoint would have been very useful to us and would also have been to their advantage," he said.

Yugoslav Ambassador Sava N. Kosanovic charged in another letter to Lie that the conduct of Mark F. Etheridge, American member of the Balkan investigation commission, had "impaired" the work of that group and "the authority of the United Nations."

He based his charges on statements Etheridge made in an interview last Monday in which he asserted that Bulgaria, Albania, and Yugoslavia were "arming, training, supplying and giving hospitalization and refuge to guerrilla forces operating in northern Greece."

Etheridge's comment on the charge was: "Nuts." He pointed out, however, that the commission in its report said approximately the same.

Warning!

Notice to users of electricity: Beginning at midnight tonight—Saturday—work will be started on some permanent repairs at the electric generating plant which, it is hoped, will be completed by 7 o'clock Monday morning.

During this time consumers are warned not to use electricity for lights, fans or ventilating equipment and use current as sparingly as possible. What little current can be generated will be assigned to refrigeration and certain other similar and absolutely necessary purposes. Do not use electricity for cooking.

If everybody cooperates during this emergency it will not be necessary to completely disconnect current in any part of the city. Notice will be given through the press and radio just as soon as full electric service can be restored.

The electric current is distributed in the city in sections. If consumers use current for cooking or other unnecessary purposes during the stated time and overload the plant, all current in that section will be cut off.

Remember: From midnight tonight until 7 o'clock Monday morning use current for refrigeration and some absolutely necessary purposes but do not use it for cooking, lighting, fans or ventilating while repairs are being made.

CONGRESS TO PROBE CRASH

Structural Failure In DC-4's Indicated Says Senator

Washington, June 14.—(AP)—Senator Brewster (R-Me.) said today the occurrence of three disastrous DC-4 plane crashes within a few weeks "strongly suggests a structural failure."

Brewster, chairman of the Senate Commerce sub-committee on aviation, told a reporter his group's investigators will look into the latest of the three crashes, that near Leesburg, Va., in which 50 persons are believed to have been killed.

He said he does not believe that engine failure can be blamed for any of the three accidents at LaGuardia Field, Port Deposit, Md., or in Virginia.

Evidence gathered thus far, Brewster said, indicates that "careful scrutiny" of the DC-4, a four-engine plane in wide commercial use, is called for.

He said he was not prepared to recommend that all DC-4's be grounded, but that he assumes the civil aeronautics agencies will consider the advisability of such action.

Super Sounds, Light Waves, Rainfall Control Cited As Possible Weapons

Cambridge, Mass., June 14.—(AP)—Weapons as terrifying as the atom bomb—super sounds that would upset the nervous systems of whole populations, light waves, and rainfall—were raised as possibilities today in any war of the future by an American Air Force commander.

General George C. Kenney, head of the Strategic Air Force, cited the dog whistle as an example of the effectiveness of sound waves in a prepared address before Massachusetts Institute of Technology graduates.

"An airplane equipped with a sort of super dog whistle," he said, "conceivably could fly around a city for awhile and upset the nervous systems of the whole population."

"I believe we need to do some research along this line. It may be just a fantastic dream. It may not."

Babson Discusses Banks

NAGY DOUBTS UN CAN HELP HIS COUNTRY

Exiled Premier Believes Coup Direct Result Of U.S. Intervention

Shannon, Ire., June 14.—(AP)—Ferenc Nagy, the exiled former premier of Hungary, expressed doubt today that his country's troubles were a matter for the United Nations; but said he hoped that "all the great democratic powers" would come to Hungary's aid.

He told reporters, that he believed the recent Communist coup in Hungary, which resulted in his resignation, was a "direct result of American intervention in Greece and Turkey" and that the same political crisis "has been reproduced in all the southeastern European countries."

Speaking to reporters through an interpreter shortly before taking off for the United States in a Pan-American Airways plane, Nagy said he wanted to present to the American people the "truth of Hungary's case."

He arrived here by plane from Switzerland, where he was vacationing when Communist pressure forced his resignation. His plane is expected to reach New York at about 6:30 p.m. (EST) today.

Nagy said he doubted that Hungary's troubles were a matter for the United Nations.

"As you know," he said, "there is little they can do."

"But I have my own project—wide publicity in the United States—and I know that an old European country like Hungary will be given a hearing, for I have the truth of Hungary's case."

"I hope, in fact, that all the great democratic powers will open their ears and lend assistance."

"I have not been invited to the United States," Nagy continued. "I chose to go there of my own free will."

The former premier said Hungary's developments and similar crises in other Balkan countries were Communist countermeasures against American aid for Greece and Turkey.

Two Accused Of Taking Airplane

Wilmington, N.C., June 14.—(AP)—Eddie Johnson of Greensboro and Marvin Kern of Raleigh have been charged with theft of a Piper Cub airplane found wrecked at the Carolina Beach flying field, the New Hanover county sheriff's office said.

Bill Wyatt of Raleigh told the sheriff Thursday he had returned to the field to find the small plane wrecked 150 yards from where he had parked it after flying from Raleigh to spend a day at the beach.

Kern has been released on bond signed by his father, the sheriff said.

Asks Joint Study In Planning World Aid

Senator Vandenberg Calls For Bi-Partisan Study Of Long-Range Job Of Setting World's Economy To Rights

Washington, June 14.—(AP)—Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) served friendly notice on the Administration today that the time has come for Republican and Democratic leaders to size up together the long-range job of setting the world's economy to rights.

The United States, he said, cannot go on trying to meet "unanticipated crises" one by one.

The chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee said there should be an advisory council of top men from both parties to take a balance sheet of the world's needs and the ability of this country's taxpayers to meet them.

In a statement beamed for consumption abroad as well as at home, Vandenberg last night cautioned "our loyal friends" not to "depend upon us as a substitute for depending upon themselves."

He demanded "a sound overall inventory of our own resources to determine the latitude within which we may consider these foreign needs."

"If America ever sags," he said, "the world's hopes sag with her."

His proposal won prompt support from both leading Democrats and Republicans in Congress, although Chairman Taft (Ohio) of the Senate Republican Policy Committee was, perhaps, significantly silent.

Declining comment on the Vandenberg statement, Taft told reporters that the Senate-House Economic Committee which he heads plans to make its own full-scale inquiry into the effect of possible foreign aid programs on the domestic economy.

URGED FATHER TO KILL MAN

Woman Confesses Plan To Have Parent "Put Away"

Cincinnati, June 14.—(AP)—A 23-year-old chubby, red-haired woman wanted her father "put away for good," so she persuaded him to murder her 61-year-old admirer nearly two years ago, she told police.

Detective Chief Clem Merz said Miss Virginia Gibbs was charged with murder shortly after she had walked into police headquarters yesterday and asked to be arrested in connection with the slaying, September 3, 1945, of Henry F. Smith, machine tool broker.

"She said her conscience had been bothering her," Merz declared. In a signed statement, the young woman said it was at her urging that her father, Charles Gibbs, 57, invaded Smith's downtown hotel room and pumped five pistol shots into the man's body.

Yadkin River Rising Fast Following Rains

Raleigh, June 14.—(AP)—Major Charles D. Farmer of the State highway patrol reported today that the Yadkin river at North Wilkesboro has risen to 16 feet above normal and is continuing to rise at the rate of one foot every 31 minutes.

The stream, swollen by heavy rains last night, has flooded lowlands in the North Wilkesboro area, but there have been no fatalities and no evacuation of homes as yet, Capt. Farmer added.

The patrol officer said that several secondary roads in the North Wilkesboro area have been closed as a result of the high water.

N. C. highway 288 from Elkin to North Wilkesboro was under water at mid-morning near Roaring River. The Atlantic Greyhound bus which left Winston-Salem at 6:45 a.m. was one of the last vehicles allowed to go through before the road was closed.

Mecklenburg Goes To Polls

Charlotte, N.C., June 14.—(AP)—Populous Mecklenburg County hurried to the polls today to decide the hotly contested fight between vets and drays over the establishment of ABC stores.

As the polls opened early today, indications were strong that between 20,000 and 30,000 voters would cast ballots. Approximately 71,000 names are on the registration books.

The county, legally dry for nearly 40 years, last considered the legalized whisky question in 1937 when the ABC store proposal was rejected by a majority of more than 700. Charlotte voted wet by about 1,500 but this majority was overcome by the vote in smaller towns and rural communities.

U. S. COTTON FOR GERMANY

British And Americans Seek Imports For Two Zones

Berlin, June 14.—(AP)—The United States and British military governments today approved in principle an agreement for importation of American cotton—believed to be the initiation of private financing to provide raw material imports for postwar Germany.

A joint British-American announcement said the agreement—result of several weeks' negotiations between military government officials and U. S. financial and textile experts—still was subject to an AMG legal opinion and signatures of agencies involved.

Washington, June 14.—(AP)—President Truman today signed the instrument of ratification of the Italian peace treaty and said it marks "the beginning of a new era for Italy to which the Italian people can look with hope and confidence."

Paris, June 14.—(AP)—A government spokesman said today France has asked the Soviet Union whether Moscow is willing to begin discussions on U. S. Secretary of State Marshall's proposal for American-backed European economic recovery.

Frankfurt, Germany, June 14.—(AP)—Hjalmar Schacht, former German finance minister, has been removed temporarily from a German interment center to "undergo a special interrogation," United States Army headquarters said today.

Tokyo, June 14.—(AP)—Japan's new minister of communications, Takeo Miki, is overlooking no possible source of revenue.

Kyodo News Agency reported today that Miki is considering the sale of advertising on telephone poles and postage stamps.

The controls work against those people who haven't been able to save enough money to make a fair-size down payment. For example: Now a man who wants a \$1,500 auto must pay one-third down, \$500 and the rest in 15 months.

But a man who hasn't saved \$500 still could buy a car if the down payment were smaller and the time for the balance was longer than 15 months.

In 1940, before the controls, total consumer credit was \$6,183,000,000. In 1946, with the controls in effect it was \$2,958,000,000.

President Roosevelt, under his wartime powers, imposed the controls in 1941 to control prices a bit. President Truman has continued them.

But should such controls, with the war over two years, be continued? This week he asked Congress to continue them by passing a law.

He says if Congress doesn't continue them by law, he'll drop the controls.

Law Limits Credit

Installment Buying Increase Opposed By President; His Argument For Keeping Present Regulations; Viewpoint Of His Opposition; Controls May Be Dropped

Washington, June 14.—(AP)—You want to buy something on time? Now the government lays down the rules on how you do it. For example: On things like autos and refrigerators you must pay one-third of the value down and the balance in 15 months.

There's a chance the controls may be removed altogether. Should they be? President Truman says no. He argued this way: Goods still are not plentiful enough to meet full demand. Even so, installment buying is increasing.

The more that kind of buying increases, with goods still not plentiful, the more the tendency for the prices to rise. He wants prices kept down.

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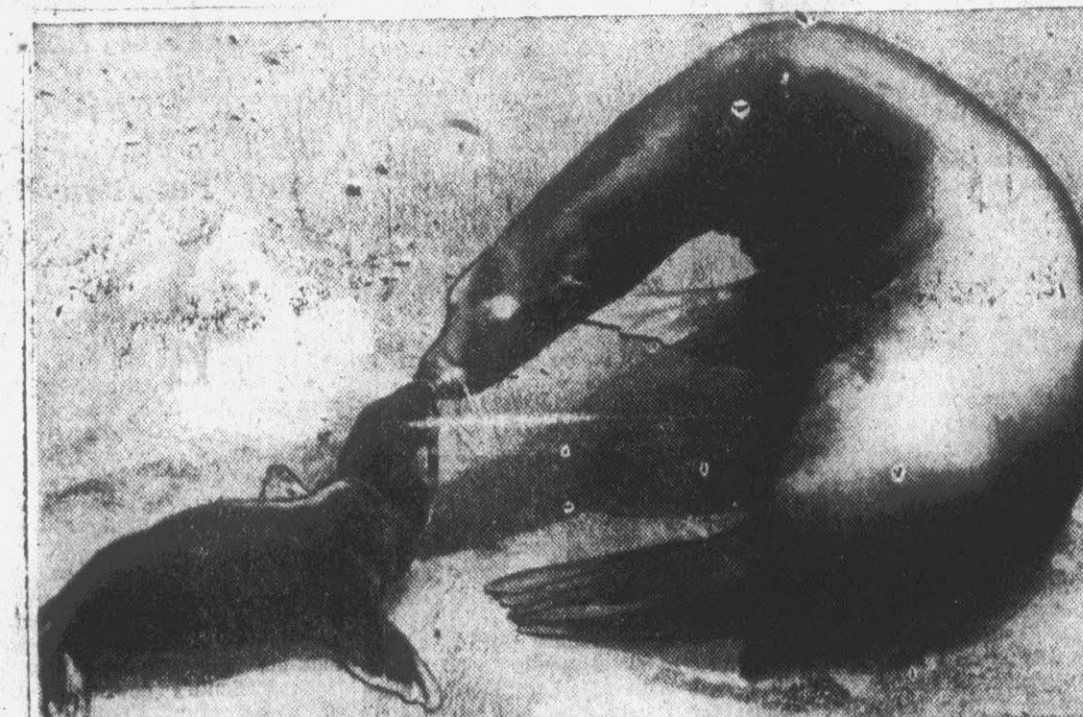
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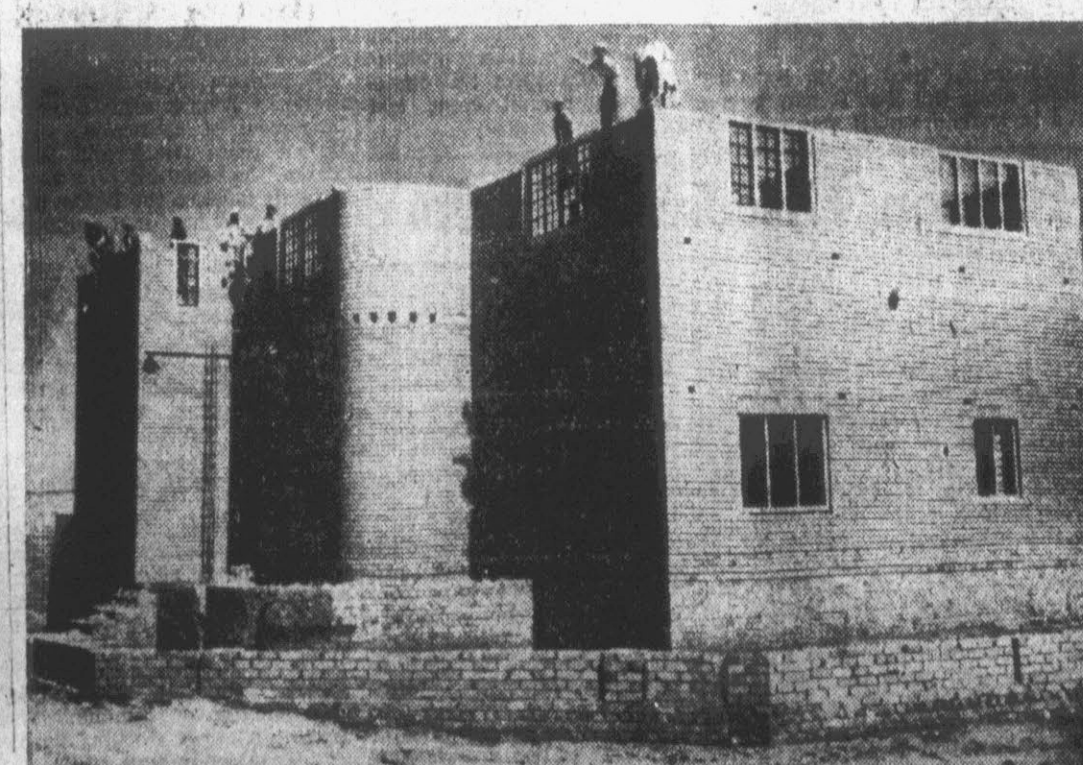
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AFFECTIONATE MOTHER—A mother sea lion gives her newborn pup a kiss in the Philadelphia zoo, where three sea lions were born in a single day.

ist.

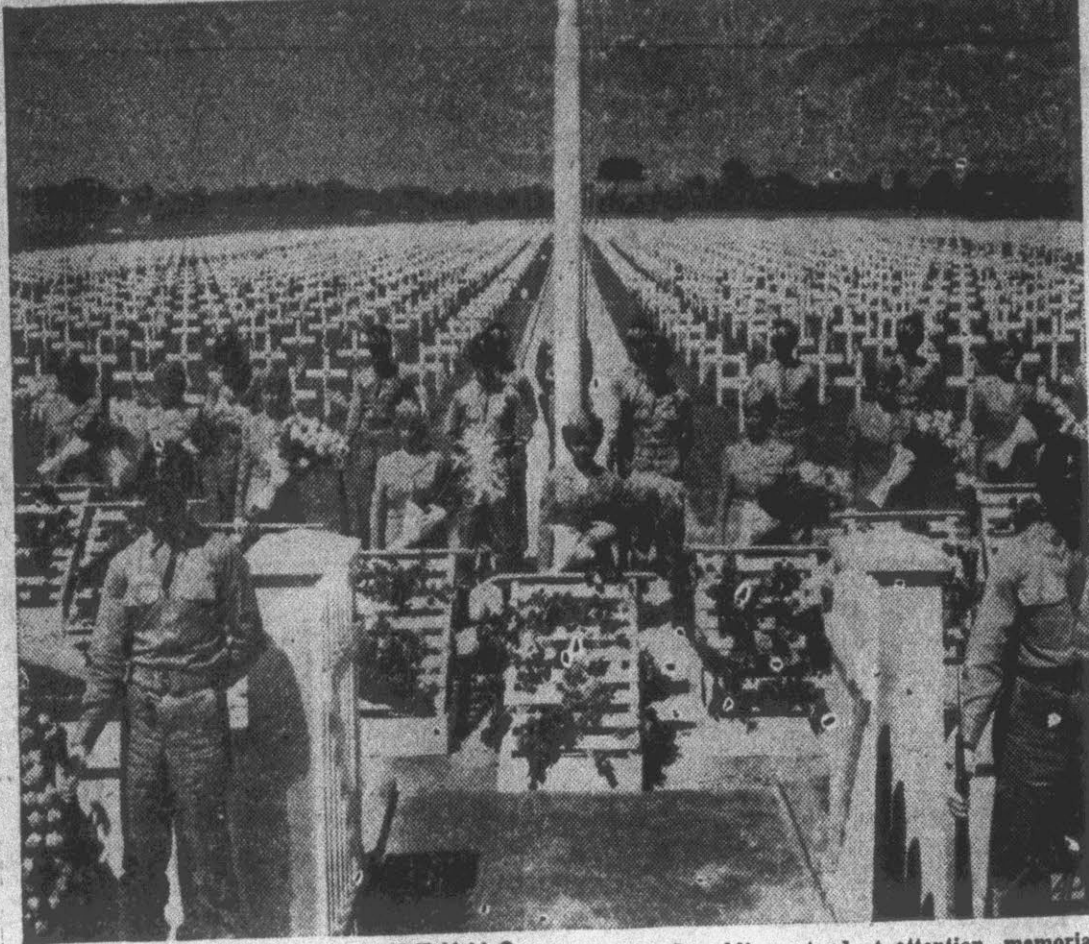

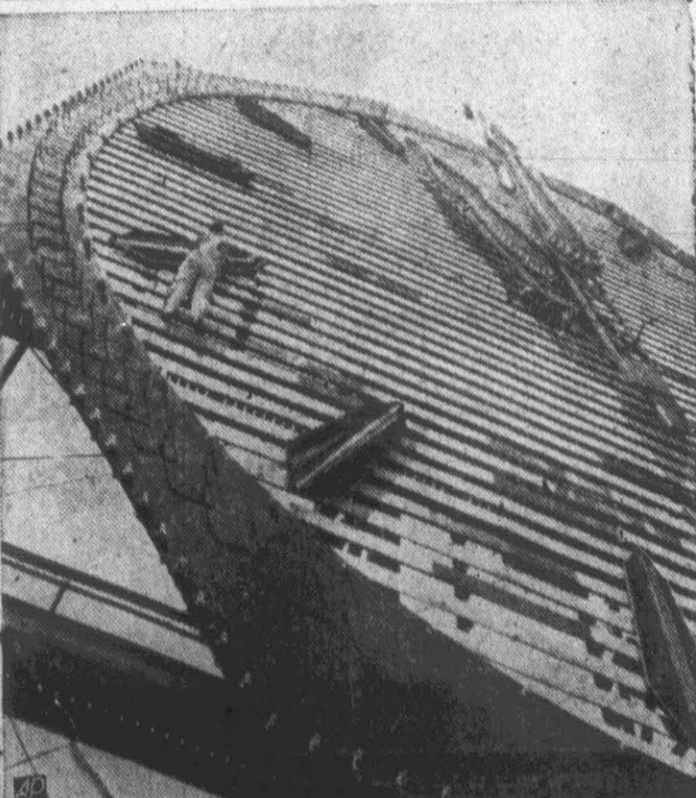

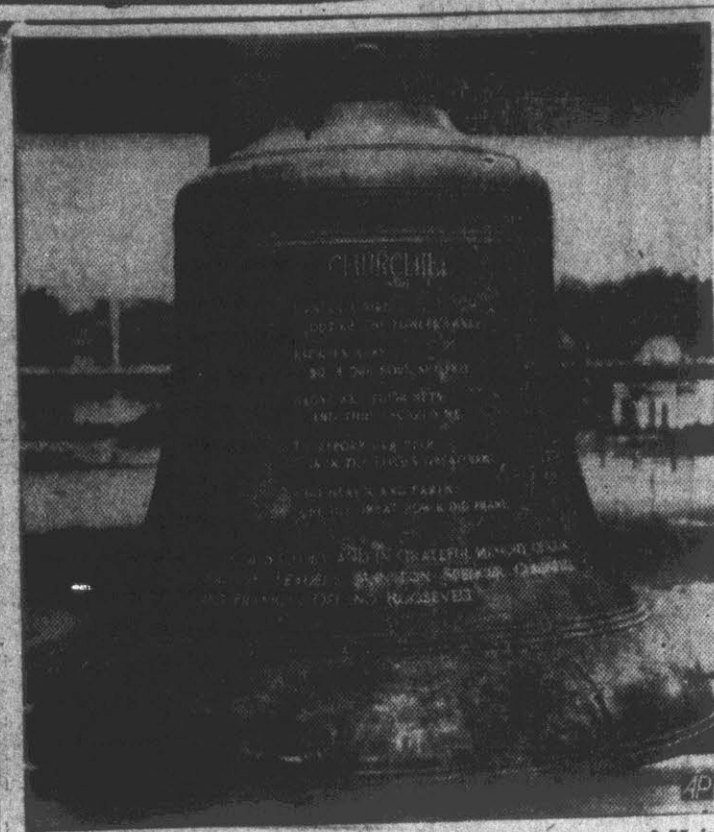

As alternatives, Commissioner Ray C. Wakefield suggested a Western Union merger with the American Telephone and Telegraph company, parent of the Bell System, or limiting its operations to service between big cities.

Wakefield gave his views before a House Appropriations subcommittee in support of an unsuccessful commission request for \$375,000 for a special telegraph investigation.

His testimony was made public today along with a subcommittee report to the house saying the FCC already has "substantially complete information on the situation" and does not need any more "in order to reach a conclusion in the matter."

Ottumwa, Ia., June 14 (AP)—This sandbagged southeastern Iowa city, sections of it still desolate from the last high waters of the Des Moines river, waited tensely today for its second flood in a week.

With the river expected to rise rapidly today, cresting at 19.5 feet tomorrow, preparations were nearly complete for protecting the 32,000 residents, many of them still homeless after the river reached a record 20.24 feet last Saturday.

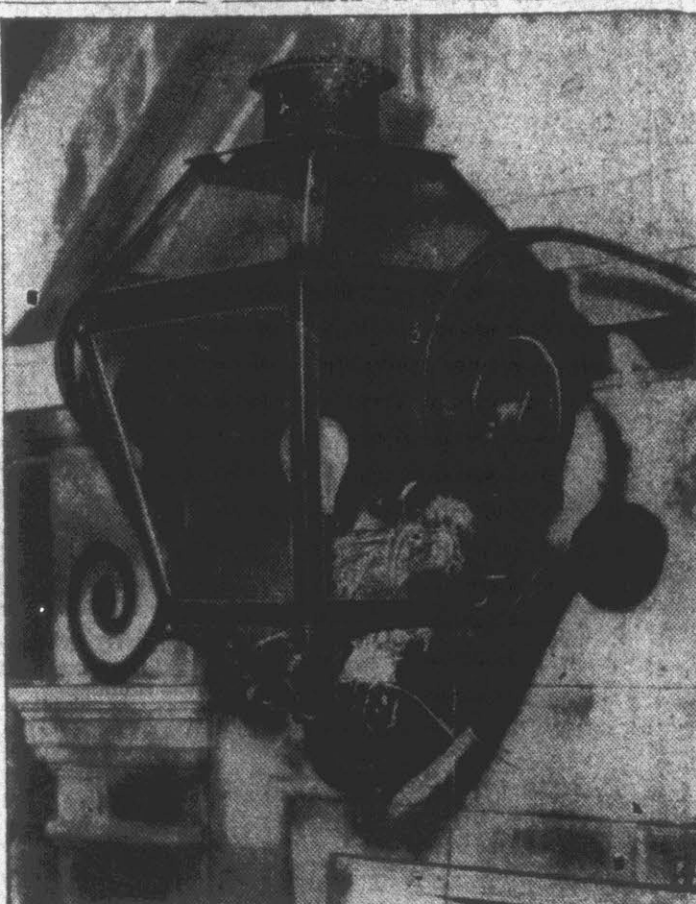
Evacuation centers have been established in the high school and grade schools, which are stocked with food. Some residents in the low areas moved in yesterday.

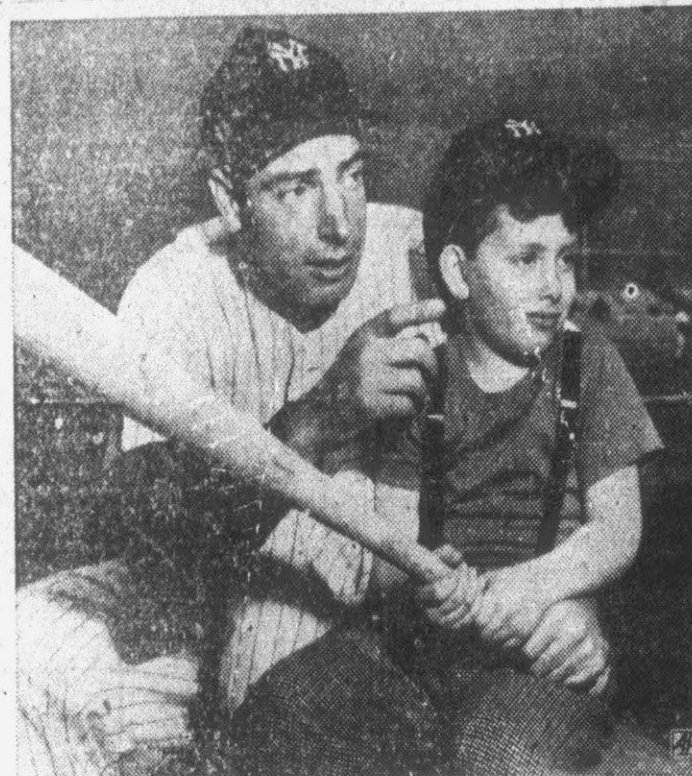

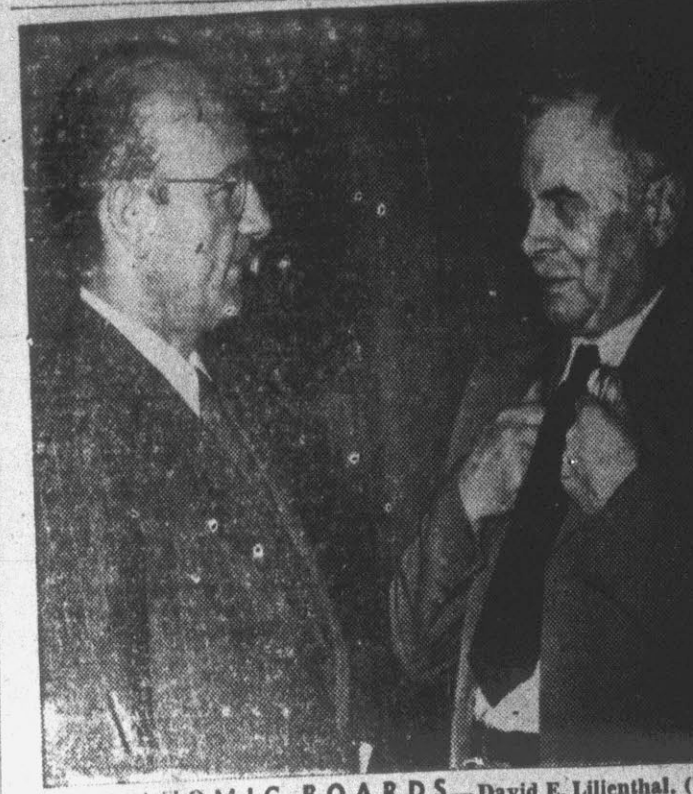

Conservatives In Hungary Plan Anti-Red Rally

Budapest, June 14.—(AP)—The freedom party leader, Dezso Suljok, flung a defiant challenge at Hungary's communist dominated government today, announcing that he would hold a public political rally and repeat the accusations with which he caused an uproar in parliament two days ago.

He invited British and American correspondents to attend the rally as Szeged near the Yugoslav border next Monday. Hungarian politicians said they doubted any attempt would be made to break up the rally.

Suljok, leader of 18 conservative members of parliament, charged in his speech Thursday that previous rallies had been broken up and that members of his party who resisted were arrested and accused of being enemies of democracy.

Secret Weapon May Be Similar To Rocket Bomb

Sydney, Australia, June 14.—(AP)—Prof. W. A. Miller of the Sydney University civil engineering department said today a new secret weapon mentioned in Auckland, N. Z., reports "might be in the nature of an airborne missile such as the German rocket."

Miller emphasized to reporters, however, that he himself had received no indication of the nature of the project and that he made the comment only because he knew Prof. David J. Leech of Auckland to have an expert knowledge of and enthusiasm for aerodynamics.

In Auckland today, Prof. Leech said he was surprised to hear that a London newspaper headline had stated that the atomic bomb had been rendered obsolete, but made no further comment.

Jackson, June 14.—(AP)—District Solicitor Ernest R. Tyler said today that he expected to place Godwin (Buddy) Bush, 24-year-old Negro, and the seven men charged with kidnapping him from the county jail on trial in Northampton superior court during the week of August 4.

Bush is charged with attempting to rape a young married woman at nearby Rich Square on the evening of May 22, and the seven white men are charged with kidnapping him from the jail early on the morning of May 23.

This caused the Americans some surprise. They had grown accustomed to Gromyko's hands-off attitude toward their plan, which had been written into the commission's first report by a majority of ten of the twelve members. They are waiting now to see which way the wind will blow next.

This is a day for stock-taking on arms and atomics.

One year ago today Bernard M. Baruch, now sitting on the sidelines and keeping officially mum, presented the American plan, which calls for no veto or punishing atomic criminals and for an international atomic development authority with full powers over the atom everywhere.

The anniversary finds Russia still insisting on a convention prohibiting the atomic bomb immediately and a separate convention, to be agreed upon later, setting up the controls. The Russians want the final authority of the Security Council, where they have a veto.

Six months ago today the U.N. General Assembly approved unanimously a resolution calling for worldwide arms limitation and reduction and a cut in armed forces. Little progress has been made toward that goal.

Four months ago yesterday the Security Council established the commission for conventional armaments, which is to draw up recommendations for whacking armaments and armed forces. So far, that commission has not even agreed on how to go about the job.

Everyone figures the job will be long. That is the one thing on which they are unanimous.
