## DEHYDRATING POTATOES AT LOCAL PLANT

### Agriculture Department Making Tests At Glenn Scott's Factory; Experiment

Regular market channels accepted all U.S. 1 potatoes dug in Eastern Carolina yesterday, State Director G. Tom Scott of the Production and Marketing Administration reported last night, at the same time announcing that dehydration tests will begin in the State today.

"We purchased a few carloads of U. S. 2's and B's," Scott said, "but there was no dumping anywhere in the State. We refused to permit it."

He said that only 12 cars of the smaller sized potatoes were offered PMA, and outlets were available for all purchased.

One carload was consigned to Greenville, where tests will begin today at Glenn Scott's Farms Dehydrating Company plant near the airport to determine whether they can be dehydrated successfully.

A four-man crew, three from State College's horticultural department and one from the State Department of Agriculture, is to leave this morning for Greenville to make the tests.

Scott said a small dehydrating plant near the Greenville airport would be utilized in the project. The plant has been used before for dehydrating sweet potatoes.

"We are assigning them one carload to start," Scott said. "If the test is successful, we probably will send them some more."

Potatoes from North Carolina are being shipped daily to dehydrating plant in Baltimore. (Continued on Page Four)

## Willie Earle Case Continues To Be Studied

Washington, June 18 (AP)—Justice Department officials have revealed that the agency is considering federal prosecution of the persons connected with mob violence in the lynching of Willie Earle, Greenville, S. C. Negro.

Earle lost his life in Greenville County Feb. 17th after a mob took him from a jail where he was being held in the fatal stabbing of a white cab driver.

None of the officials making the disclosure would permit use of his name but one told a reporter that the department has made a continued investigation of Earle's death "steadily" since a jury acquitted the 26 men indicted in the case.

Justice officials said they are studying the case on the basis of the 14th, or "due process of law," amendment.

## Map Plans For Postal Inquiry

Washington, June 18 (AP)—Chairman Langer (R-ND) today called a special meeting of a Senate Civil Service Subcommittee to chart plans for a Senate-approved investigation of postmaster appointments.

The investigation was authorized by the Senate late yesterday when 43 Republicans present and one Democrat—Senator Chavez (NM)—voted for a resolution by Langer. Thirty-five Democrats lined up against it.

As set forth in the resolution the purpose of the inquiry is to find out to what extent, if any, political considerations enter into the selection of postmaster nominees under the Civil Service system.

## Outlook For India

Read To Freedom Closely Follows Path Of Difficulties Foreseen By Observers; Something About The Princely States; Status Today And Their Future Prospects

India's turbulent progress toward independence—sadly divided as she is religiously, racially, politically and socially—is producing exactly the problem that close observers anticipated in connection with the disposition of the more than 560 princely states which are governed by autocrats of great wealth who broadly speaking have the power of life and death over their subjects.

These potentates, by and large, are anachronisms who have ridden down to us from out of medieval times on their regally caparisoned elephants, to continue their Arabian Nights lives in the midst of a primitive splendor which has to be seen to be believed. There are, of course, great and good princes who have caught up with the times and have served their people well. However, there are many more who not only do not view life through the eyes of ancestors who lived on the sweat of their unhappy subjects,

These relics of by-gone days now stand, bewildered and unloved, at the cross-roads of their existence. They are on their way out, but the manner of their exit will be determined as India progresses in self-government. Many of the minor rulers of tiny states can be disposed of summarily, but there are powerful sovereigns of great states who can't be dismissed so lightly.

The so-called native states ruled by the princes comprise two-fifths of the territory of India and have a population of some 90,000,000—over one-fifth of the total population. The rest of the country is made up of the provinces of British India.

These vast areas present entirely different problems. In British India we have the Hindu-Muslim feud which has resulted in that part of the country being partitioned into two independent states—Hindustan (Hindu) and Pakistan (Moslem). (Continued on Page Four)

## House Can Upset Labor Bill Veto

### Leaders Of Both Parties Agree Passage Over Presidential Veto Is "In The Bag"; Outcome Reported Less Certain In Senate

Washington, June 18 (AP)—Top Democratic and Republican leaders agreed today that House passage of the labor bill over a presidential veto is "in the bag."

The Senate may tag along, but the outcome there is less certain. House leaders definitely expect a veto even though President Truman told reporters at Princeton, N.J., yesterday "I haven't made up my mind yet."

He said he will send a message to Congress Friday.

A veto would make labor union control the next big issue between the White House and Congress with more potential fights in sight.

But the "cooperation" about which the Chief Executive and congressional Republicans talked when the session began last January apparently has just about exploded anyway.

GOP Leader Halleck of Indiana gave the tip-off on that after the House upheld by a two-vote margin yesterday Mr. Truman's veto of the tax cut bill. Halleck told newsmen the veto was "the exact opposite of cooperation."

If the Chief Executive does veto the bill, he will have to court on his former colleagues in the Senate to back him up.

Senator Hatch (D-NM), a close friend of the President, told a reporter he has had no hints from the White House but it is his personal view that there will be a veto and "that it will be overridden."

Many other senators of both political parties share that view. But Senator Ives (R-NY) said:

"I don't see how it's at all certain we could override, especially after what happened in the House on the tax bill."

### "Confidential"

Washington, June 18 (AP)—Chairman J. Parnell Thomas (R-NJ) said today the House Un-American Activities Committee will keep confidential its agents' report on the meeting Henry A. Wallace addressed Monday.

Thomas told reporters there is "little in the report any observer could not have noted and that the data will be used only for the committee's information and files."

## FATHER SLAYS TWO CHILDREN

Miami, Fla., June 18 (AP)—A sobbing 59-year-old father described today how he clubbed his two children to death with a baseball bat, then kissed and caressed their bodies and lay down to sleep until morning, then shot two of his neighbors who believed him unfit as a father.

Chris Russell, a stocky gray-haired Greek restaurant operator, described in detail for Detective Sergeant John L. Deas how his children told him that they would rather die than be taken from him.

Sobbing, and still in the blood-spattered clothing he wore to take the lives of Johnny Crisco, 6, and Peggy, 11, Russell told Deas that his neighbors had signed a petition demanding that his two children be taken to a home. He told how his wife whom he described as "no good" left him nearly four years ago to care for the children.

"These people have made a criminal out of me," he sobbed. "I was a good man yesterday, but a criminal today."

"I don't want to live any more. I want to be buried with my children. When my children are gone, there is nothing for me to live for. I want to die."

## Political Police Arrest Employee Of U.S. Club

Budapest, June 18 (AP)—American informants said today that political police had arrested the Hungarian manager of the Allied Officers Park Club here, which has a membership composed chiefly of Americans and Britons, on charges of being a "pro-Nazi."

The manager, Imre Fold, also was accused of being involved in a recent plot to overthrow the Hungarian republic—charges similar to those which the Communists recently used to force the resignation of Premier Ferenc Nagy.

The arrest was the first open seizure of a person employed by the Americans or British, although such action was threatened last August when a Hungarian employee of the American Officers Club was questioned by Gabor Peter, Communist chief of the Hungarian political police.

## SEAMEN STILL TIE-UP SHIPS

### Negotiators Announce Considerable Progress In Talks

New York, June 18 (AP)—Progress in efforts to settle the American shipping tieup was reported today on both west and east coasts as the union embargo on sailings entered its third day.

Assistant Secretary of Labor J. W. Gibson, after a round robin of conferences here that lasted into the early morning hours, announced that considerable progress had been made.

A short time earlier, Nathan Feinsinger, a trouble shooter for the Labor Department, announced in San Francisco that the National Union of Marine Cooks and Stewards (CIO) tentatively had agreed "on a major issue" with west coast shipowners.

Gibson talked in separate conference rooms instead of jointly as planned, with Joseph Curran, president of the National Maritime Union (CIO), Frank J. Taylor, spokesman for 39 east and west coast shippers, and for a brief time, Samuel J. Hogan, president of the Marine Engineers' Beneficial Association (CIO).

Gibson said "several approaches to a solution of the dispute have been considered and considerable progress has been made. He added that "we are recessing until later today to give them an opportunity for further discussion of them."

## Greeks Promise Great Effort In Restoration

Washington, June 18 (AP)—Greece promised the United States today that it will undertake a "great and continuous effort" to restore order and economic well-being in its country.

The pledge was made in a note expressing thanks for the United States interest in Greek welfare as evidenced by the \$400,000,000 Turkish-Greek aid program.

The State Department made public the exchange of communications between Washington and Athens.

The Greek government outlined its own recovery plans and accepted responsibility for carrying them through, but asked American expert assistance such as has already

been arranged to aid the work.

The notes covered formal notice to the Greek government on May 26, that the \$300,000,000 American program had been authorized by Congress, a note from the Greek government on June 15 expressing thanks for the "benevolent interest of a great and friendly nation in the welfare of Greece," and a note of June 18 from the United States accepting the Greek assurances.

The latter note stated that Ambassador Lincoln McVeigh has been authorized to negotiate a formal assistance agreement with the Greek government.

That agreement is supposed to be signed in Athens today or tomorrow.

## Britain And France Agree To New European Economic Board

Paris, June 18 (AP)—France and Britain agreed today to convoke a European economic commission "within the framework" of the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe to implement Secretary of State Marshall's offer of U. S. aid.

A cabinet spokesman said France and Britain would jointly invite Russia today to participate in the new commission's work. Foreign Minister Georges Bidault and British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin reached the agreement to convoke the new commission in conversations here and the French cabinet immediately approved.

The cabinet spokesman said the creation of the European commission had been determined on the

basis of French proposals to place reconstruction plans in the hands of several technical committees dealing with such problems as transportation, food, power, steel and machinery.

It was further stated that the European economic commission would work "within the framework" of the U.N. Economic Commission for Europe, established earlier at Geneva. He explained that the U.N. commission is largely a planning board and that the new commission would be an operational and functional organization.

Russia already is a member of the U.N. Economic Commission for Europe, but the new body was considered important enough to warrant a separate status. France asked Russia last week if she would

exchange views on Marshall's proposals for the overall reconstruction and recovery of Europe, but Moscow has not replied.

The National Assembly's Foreign Affairs Committee, headed by Communist Leader Marcel Cachin, demanded from Bidault a report on his current diplomatic negotiations. The committee also directed that a report be prepared on the foreign ministry's budget credits.

The presence of a leading Communist at the head of the Assembly's Foreign Affairs Committee had necessitated some caution by Bidault, for domestic reasons, in his talks with Bevin. It was for this reason that France suggested an exchange of views with Russia before entering full scale negotiations on the Marshall plan.

## World-Girdling Pan-Am Plane Lands In London

London, June 18 (AP)—A globe-circling Pan American Constellation plane, carrying a party of American editors and publishers, landed at London Airport today with only three of its four engines functioning after an hour and 20 minutes flight from Shannon, Eire.

The plane, inaugurating Pan American's round-the-world commercial service, arrived here at 11:20 GMT for a 12-hour stop, during which the editors were scheduled to meet Prime Minister Attlee, other government officials and Lord Beaverbrook, Canadian-born publisher of the London Daily Express and Evening Standard.

## Truman Writing Labor Message For Congress

Washington, June 18 (AP)—President Truman decided today to forego his weekly news conference to work on a message to Congress on the labor union control bill.

Mr. Truman will send a message to Congress Friday, regardless of whether he signs or vetoes the bill.

Eben Ayers, assistant press secretary, said a heavy volume of mail continued to pour into the White House concerning the legislation with "a heavy majority favoring a veto." Ayers said the volume of communications about the measure is by far the greatest ever received by Mr. Truman on any single legislative issue or other controversy.

Ayers estimated that 187,000 to 158,000 letters, more than 500,000 cards and 35,000 telegrams had been received through Monday.

He said too that Secretary of State Marshall's aid-for-Europe plan should be broadened to include Asia.

Analyst Assumes New Measure Will Become Law; Who It Will Affect And Why; How The New Law Will Be Enforced; Eviction Regulations; Rent Can Be Raised

Taking for granted it will become law, this story explains it. It takes and changes rent controls in a number of ways.

The present law dies June 30. The new one starts July 1. It ends Feb. 29, 1948, unless Congress extends it further.

The first to feel the effect of the new law will be the permanent residents of hotels.

There are ceilings now on permanent guest rates. The new law wipes them out.

In this country now about 550 areas are under rent controls set by the government. In each area the boss is the rent director, a government man.

Under the new law in each of these areas the state governor sets up a five-man board of local citizens.

In each area the board will really be rent boss. The area director must follow the board's recommendations. These boards can, by recommendations, wipe out all rent controls in their areas, or keep them, or permit rent increases.

(About the only thing the director can do on his own is permit individual landlords to raise rents when they're suffering hardship.)

Under the new law:

Landlords no longer can be prosecuted criminally or sent to jail; area directors can't subpoena their books or records or investigate them; area directors no longer can sue them for triple damages.

A tenant still can sue a landlord for triple damages for over ceiling rates and the area director still can get court injunctions to stop landlords from violating the law.

A landlord who wants to evict a tenant, for permitted reasons, can go straight to court and get an order.

## AVOID BALLOT ON UN POLICE

Lake Success, June 18 (AP)—Delegates to the United Nations Security Council were reported agreed today that it would be useless to press for a vote now on major issues involved in the establishment of a world police force.

Any effort to try to resolve the disputed points by a showdown ballot at this time, it was generally conceded, would almost certainly result in a series of Soviet vetoes which would jeopardize the entire plan.

As the delegates prepared to resume debate on the Military Staff Committee's report it appeared likely that the council would confine its action at this stage to discussion of the report on a point by point basis.

## Need Volunteers To Help Fight Rising Waters

Oakville, Iowa, June 18 (AP)—Appeals were made for additional troops and volunteer workers to fight the flood waters of the Iowa river which approached a record height of 16.5 feet today, forcing evacuation of many of the community's 400 residents.

Children and the aged in this southeast Iowa town were removed from their homes last night on orders of Mayor O. R. Johnson and Sheriff Robert Lewis as the Red Cross and state guardsmen asked for trucks, boats and added manpower. Guardsmen were sent to the flooded areas from Des Moines and Newton.

Flood waters moved close to the edge of Oakville when a levee collapsed one fourth of a mile north of town early today. The break inundated hundreds of acres of farm land.

## BOARD PASSES ORDINANCE TO ZONE THE CITY

### Aldermen Plan For Future Growth Of Greenville; To Regulate Cemetery

The Board of Aldermen in session at the City Hall last night passed the zoning ordinance. It went into effect at the time of passage.

City officials and citizens and George C. Franklin of Raleigh, a zoning specialist from the N. C. League of Municipalities, for a long time had been working out plans for zoning the city into residential, industrial and commercial districts.

A map of the city as zoned under the ordinance is on display at the City Hall. Copies are to be printed for distribution, Mayor Jack Boyd, who presided last night, said.

The board passed an ordinance regulating Greenwood cemetery. It will prohibit the erection of unsightly or otherwise objectionable or unsanitary structures in the cemetery. Owners of cemetery lots will be required to submit their plans to the Cemetery Committee for approval.

The aldermen passed as a public health measure an ordinance making it unlawful for a person or firm to dump trash or debris anywhere in the city. Such materials must be taken to the city dump in East Greenville.

To facilitate traffic, the board passed an ordinance prohibiting parking of vehicles on the south side of Second street from Washington to Cotanche street, and prohibiting parking on the east side of Cotanche street from Second to Third street.

A group of citizens and some service station operators presented to the Board of Aldermen a petition requesting that all service stations be required to close on Sundays. The matter was tabled for consideration. (Continued on Page Four)

# NEW OFFICERS INSTALLED BY LEGION POST

**Commander Jenkins  
Outlines Major Pro-  
jects Of New Ad-  
ministration**

At its regular June dinner meet- ing, the following new officers were installed to serve for one year for Post 39 of the American Legion: James S. Jenkins, commander; J. Howard Moyer, first vice commander; Frank Taylor, second vice commander; Harry M. Brown, third vice commander; W. C. Eagles, adjutant; Larry Averette, finance officer; Richard Forrest, sergeant-at-arms; Amos Hudson, mess officer. In the absence of Past Commander Tom Wilson, Arthur Corey served as installing officer. Committee appointments will be announced by the new commander within a few days.

In his opening remarks to the legions, Commander Jenkins gave as the two major projects which the new administration hoped to accomplish the following: (1) Securing membership and active participation in Legion affairs on the part of large numbers of World War II veterans and to this end secure and maintain close coordination and cooperation with the V. F. W.'s in all action affecting the general welfare and interests of veterans of all organizations and those who belong to no organization; (2) The early sale of the fair grounds on Falkland highway and the transfer

of all Post 39 fair and other out-of-door attractions to the post's fourteen acre hut and fair site recently purchased, and located on the Airport road adjoining the Airport.

In connection with desirability of working in close harmony with the V. F. W.'s and the young veterans of World War II, the new commander pointed out the important interests of all veterans being essentially the same, coordination and co-operation is the big need to secure that concert of action necessary to make the veterans' strength effective in civic affairs local, state, and national.

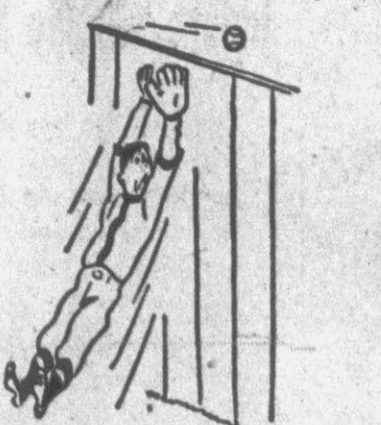

## Strength FOR THE DAY

**WE DREAM IN VAIN**  
In 1899 on Walt Whitman's 70th birthday, Mark Twain wrote the poet a letter in behalf of a committee of American writers. Among other things he said: "You have lived the seventy years which are greatest in the world's history and richest in benefit and advancement to its people. . . . But wait thirty years, and then look out over the earth! You will see marvels upon marvels added to those whose nativity you have witnessed; and conspicuous above them you will see their formidable Result—man at almost his full stature at last! Wait till you see that great figure appear; then you may depart satisfied, after known you have seen him for whom the earth was made."

Thirty years after Mark Twain wrote these words, the world was cleaning up the mess caused by the first World War. Fifty to sixty years after these words were written, human society was at the lowest ebb it had been in centuries. If Walt Whitman now surveys from the next world this transformed society about which his friend Mark Twain wrote, he sees the remains of concentration camps, multitudes of people hungry, and the vast city of Hiroshima made desert by an atomic bomb.

The moral is that we make a mistake when we posit the automatic improvement of the human race. Man improves under the power of faith and divine grace, and through no other means.

## Rent Control . . .

Under the old law landlords generally had to give 180 days' notice before going to court to oust a tenant who still would not move out.

But under the new law a landlord can't oust a tenant who pays his rent unless:

The tenant is immoral or a nuisance, or the landlord wants the property for his own use, or wants to remodel it, or demolish it, or sell it to someone who wants to "move in."

Under the new law a landlord can't evict a tenant just because he wants to rent to someone else. But the above paragraph shows loopholes through which a landlord can move to get a tenant out.

Under the law, new construction finished after February 1, 1947, is exempt from rent ceilings.

Under the old law a landlord had to ask OPA how much rent he could charge in a new building.

Under the new law a landlord can boost his rent as much as 15 per cent if:

1. He and his tenant agree to that in a lease.

2. If the lease, signed after July 1, is to extend beyond December 31, 1948.

Some tenants probably will gladly agree to such an increase—in exchange for the lease that would extend into 1949—because:

If the new law dies Feb. 29, 1948, their landlord, tied by the lease, cannot raise them further although other landlords everywhere will be free to charge any amount.

But complicated as is the position in British India, it is ten-fold more so in the native states.

The British Government has said that it will give every encouragement to the hundreds of princes to affiliate either with Hindustan or Pakistan. England aims at achieving as united an India as possible, but will not deny the native states the right to establish an independent status if they so desire.

However, the All-India Congress Party, which is dominant in Hindustan, has announced that it is against any native state declaring its independence of the two new dominions of Pakistan and Hindustan. On the other hand, Mahomed Ali Jinnah, president of the Moslem League and prospective head of the state of Pakistan, says the princely states will be free to adopt any course they like.

There we have the makings of more strife, and it may be bloody. The great native states of Travancore and Hyderabad already have signified their intention of declar-

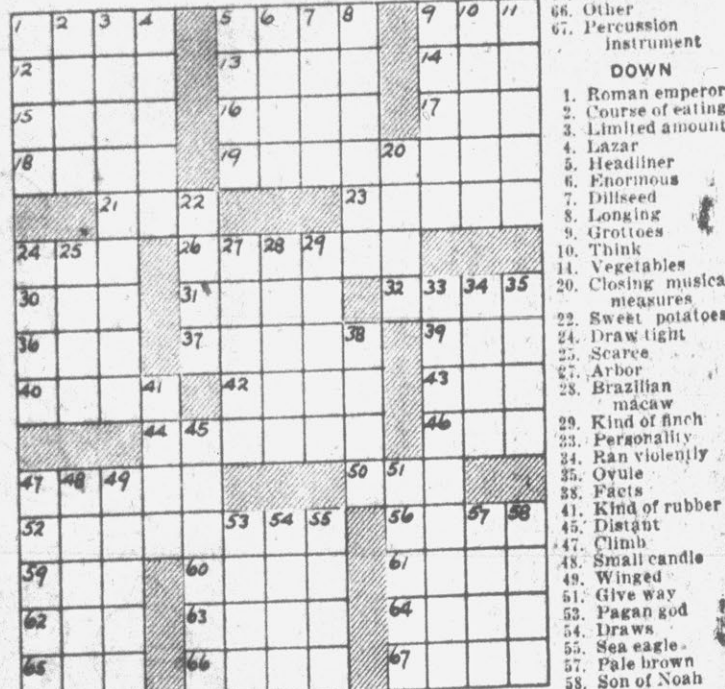

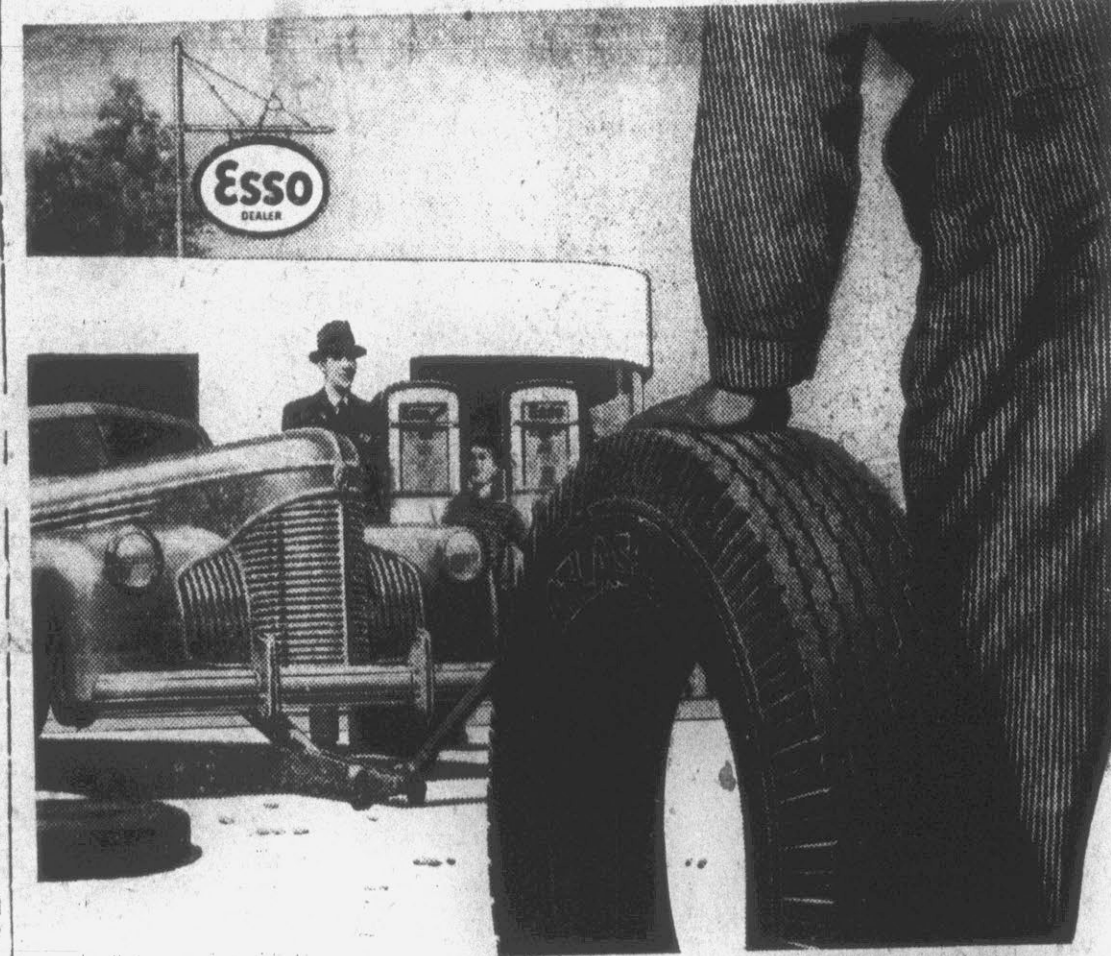

ing their independence, and they have standing armies with which to back up their intentions. At least 49 states maintain troops under treaty agreement with Britain, and other states have feudal forces.

Several important native states already have indicated their intention of joining Hindustan, and the likelihood is that many others will affiliate themselves with either Hindustan or Moslems. But it will be surprising if some of the major states don't follow Hyderabad and Travancore in a stand for absolute independence.

How far any native state, no matter how powerful, will get in an effort to establish sovereignty is problematical. It will have opposition from Hindustan and perhaps from its own people. Take Hyderabad, for example. This is the premier Indian state and its ruler, the Nizam, is reputed to be the richest man in the world. His jewels alone are estimated to be worth \$1,500,000,000. He has 16,000,000 subjects and his resources are huge.

But the Nizam is a Moslem, and three quarters of his people are

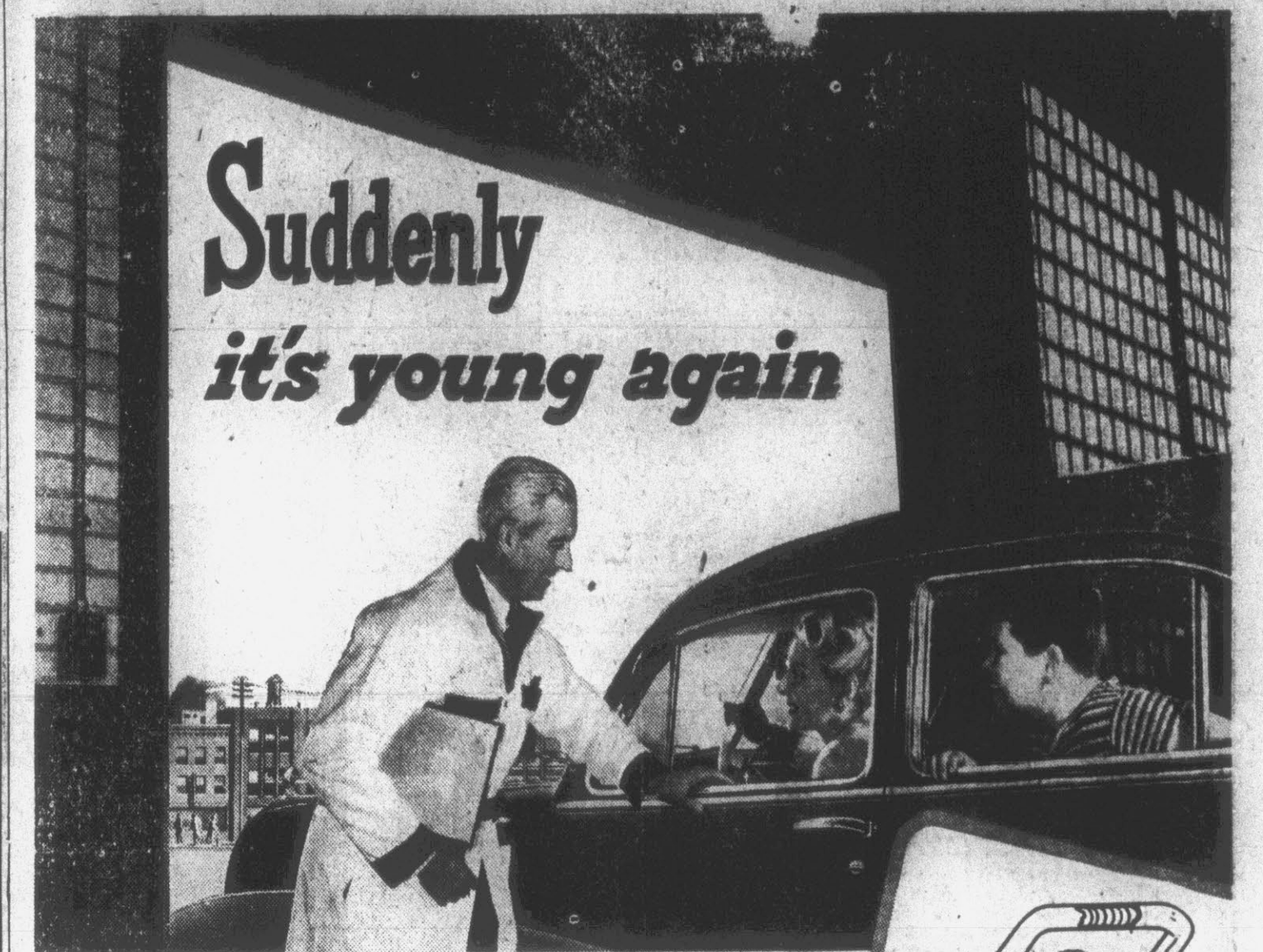

The council was expected to send the controversial points back to the Military Staff Committee for further study. Soviet Delegate Andrei A. Gromyko suggested this procedure Monday and coupled his suggestion with a veiled threat to use the veto if the council attempted to vote.

The Security Council will begin debate Friday morning on Britain's request to place the deadlocked Trieste question on the council agenda, and Monday on the Balkan investigating commission's report on its on-the-spot inquiry along Greece's northern frontier.

## Colored News

Because of the recent dry weather, some gardens will have to be replanted and many plants will have to be reset. There is still ample time to make a garden. Sow collard seed, plant tomato plants, snap beans, sow cabbage seed for fall cabbage, and plant corn for late corn in the fall.

Hogs don't like hot weather. It takes their appetite. Give them more shade and a place to wallow.

Growing turkeys is important too. Where turkeys are grown for commercial use a range shelter should be made. Make a roof tight to shed all water. Prevent losses from pests. Keep points from becoming frightened especially at night. They are very liable to fly from their roost and pile up in a corner and smother. Watch the blackhead, a disease that follows turkeys. Never allow turkeys to drink stagnant water.

Many farmers in Pitt county have already realized higher corn production on less acreage through the use of hybrid seed corn.

It will be well for farmers in the Beaver Dam community to keep an eye on Fred Midgett and William Spell's demonstrations of hybrid corn. This makes the third year they have grown hybrid corn and they see where it pays.

Insects destroy hundreds of dollars worth of tobacco each year. It is especially important that these pests be controlled when they first make their appearance.

All farmers are asked to keep a look out for any sign of disease in their tobacco and report it to the county agent's office.

Youth deserves a big share of the credit in helping to grow food and feed. A recent check on 4-H club boys shows that they still make the production program click.

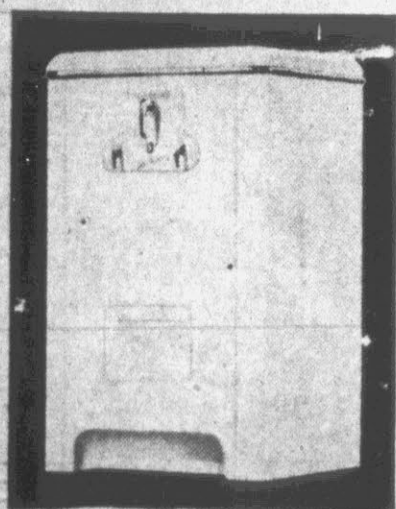
