U.S. TO SIGN TURKISH PACE IN FEW DAYS

Negotiations Move
Slowly; Turks Want
Assurance Of Com-
plete Liberty

Washington, June 27—(AP)—The United States is expected to sign an agreement with Turkey in the next few days providing for a \$100,000,000 modernization of the Turkish Army.

The agreement, similar to the one signed with Greece June 20, is being negotiated at Ankara by American Ambassador Edwin G. Wilson.

The negotiations have moved forward slowly, according to diplomatic informants here, because Turkish officials wanted to reassure themselves and their country that the United States is not resorting to any kind of "American imperialism" in connection with the aid program.

The "imperialism" issue is one which the Russians have been plugging hard in connection with the Turkish, as well as the Greek, aspects of American opposition to Communist expansion in the Middle East.

At the same time the Soviets have been applying steady propaganda pressure on Turkey for both a military share in control of the Dardanelles and for the cession of the Turkish provinces of Kars and Ardahan to the Soviet Union.

The fact, however, that Russian pressure is not acute now—when the American position is strong and clear—is regarded here as highly significant.

Davenport And Shore Start Prison Terms

Raleigh, N.C., June 27—(AP)—Their legal ammunition exhausted, two men whose trials made big newspaper headlines in the state have been placed in Central Prison here to start their terms.

One of them, Roderick Davenport of New Bern, was operator of the "Big Apple" loan business which flourished in Eastern North Carolina in 1944. He was sentenced to five to 13 years for conspiracy to defraud and false pretense following a lengthy trial in Pitt-Sumner court last year.

The other was W. T. Shore, disbarred Charlotte attorney, who was convicted of subornation of perjury and sentenced to three to seven years in connection with the operation of an alleged "divorce mill" at Charlotte.

Two Escaped Convicts Are Re-Captured

Two escaped convicts, one with a record of 12 escapes in the last four years, were re-captured by county prison authorities yesterday near Saint John's church after a three hour chase in a pouring rain.

Yesterday's escape followed a similar break day before yesterday by two prisoners who are still at large. These are the first two escapes from the county prison farm since January 3, Superintendent Paul Crawford reported.

Eugene Alexander, 26, was convicted in Mecklenburg County in 1942 and sentenced to 14 years. Since being committed to prison he has managed 12 escapes. His partner in the escape was Fulton Steward, 30, who received 15 to 20 years in Pamlico County for manslaughter.

The two prisoners who escaped Wednesday and are still at large are Marion Gardner, 28, serving a 7 to 10 year sentence on charges of breaking and entering and receiving stolen property; and Harold Kelley of Wake County who was sentenced to two and one-half to five years and two to five years on counts for larceny of an automobile.

Big Unions Meet Over Labor Law

AFL And CIO To
Draft Program Of
Contest Or Compli-
ance; President Tru-
man Cautions All
Labor And Manage-
ment To Observe
Taft-Hartley Act

Washington, June 27—(AP)—Leaders of 6,000,000 CIO members, cautioned by President Truman along with all labor and management to live up to the new Taft-Hartley bill, gathered today to draft a program of contest or compliance.

CIO President Philip Murray convened his 51-member executive board to hear an up-to-the-minute size-up of the new statute as compiled by the labor organization's entire legal staff. Attorneys for each of the 49 CIO unions met here yesterday with General Counsel Lee Pressman.

Both the AFL and the CIO have rejected the idea of general protest strikes, although AFL President William Green told reporters yesterday that unions throughout the nation were urging him to call out to last "until the act is repealed."

Instead, Green called a meeting here July 9 of the heads of the AFL's 105 unions, to go over the law and determine a program of policy—the same type of session fixed for today by Murray and the CIO. (Continued on Page Six)

Jury Convicts Minister Of Burning Church

Milwaukee, June 27—(AP)—Dr. John Lewis, scholarly pastor-leave of the Calvary Presbyterian Church, was convicted today by a jury of ten men and two women of having set a fire Jan. 25 that did \$150,000 damage to his church.

The jury gave its verdict at 10:42 a. m. (CST) after actual deliberation of about eight hours.

The state had charged that the 73-year-old clergyman fired the church in order to obtain a "bigger and better" edifice. The trial lasted 10 days.

The gaunt clergyman paled and his shoulders sagged as the verdict was read.

Conviction of an arson charge in Wisconsin carried a maximum penalty of one to 10 years in prison.

Defense Attorney Harry V. Meissner announced that the verdict would be appealed.

DR. MEADOWS LEAVES STATE PRISON TODAY

Completes Three-
Year Sentence; Re-
iterates Claim Of
Innocence

Raleigh, N.C., June 27—Dr. Leon R. Meadows, former president of East Carolina Teachers College at Greenville, was released from Central Prison this afternoon after completing a three-year sentence imposed for embezzlement and false pretense in connection with his handling of special funds at the college.

Meadows, who spent his imprisonment in the prison hospital where he was an aide, was credited with extra work such as night and Sunday duty. He entered prison on September 25, 1943.

He left here in company with his wife and a daughter.

In a written statement to the Associated Press, Meadows reiterated his continued insistence that he is innocent of the charges and said that "I have never used for my personal gain or benefit a single penny of the funds entrusted to the president of the college."

"I have served my sentence," he wrote, "the reward of 34 years of service to the State of North Carolina. In spite of the fact that I was innocent of the charges against me, I have served my full time without complaint. I have even taken a keen interest in the work assigned to me."

"My record while in prison has not had a mark against it. My record before coming to prison is written in the history of East Carolina Teachers College and the hearts and lives of thousands who went out from there to teach the children of our state."

He said that he was treated "with the utmost respect, courtesy and consideration by all" while in prison.

He thanked his friends "who have so loyally stood by me," and added that "it is difficult for these friends to understand why the judge's recommendation for a pardon for me was not granted."

Bevin, Molotov And Bidault Open Talks

Foreign Ministers
Meet To Consider
"Marshall Plan";
No Official Indica-
tion Of Russian At-
titude Evident

Paris, June 27—(AP)—Foreign ministers of Russia, Great Britain and France started consideration today of an European economic recovery program linked with American aid. There was no official indication of the Russian attitude toward the "Marshall plan" but the British and French have welcomed the proposal of U. S. Secretary of State Marshall.

Authoritative U. S. and British sources in London said the United States and Britain had reached the broad conclusion that the aid program should be operated outside the United Nations framework. A French cabinet spokesman said last week, however, that the projected European economic commission would work within the framework of the United Nations commission for Europe established earlier at Geneva, with the U. N. commission planning board and the new commission an operational and functional organization.

The conferees were Molotov of Russia, Bevin of Britain and Bidault of France. They met privately.

Bevin arrived just before Molotov. Bevin was accompanied by Alfred Duff Cooper, British ambassador to Paris; Edmund Hall-Patch, (Continued on Page Six)

EISLER GIVEN PRISON, FINE

Draws Maximum
Penalty; Makes
Loud Protest To
Court

Washington, June 27—(AP)—Gerhart Eisler, communist, today drew the maximum federal court penalty of a year in prison and \$1,000 fine for contempt of Congress.

Federal District Judge Alexander Holtzoff passed the sentence after denying a motion for a new trial and a dramatic personal plea for mercy from Eisler, who has been described in Congress as the "No. 1 Soviet spy."

Eisler was convicted June 10 of contempt in refusing to take an oath for testimony before the House committee on un-American activities last February 6.

In his plea for leniency, Eisler said he was a European anti-fascist political refugee. He loudly protested that he was "a victim of a witch-hunting hysteria in this country, instigated and encouraged by the un-American activities committee."

Justice Holtzoff said he was imposing the maximum sentence because Eisler during the trial showed an attitude of defiance and no (Continued on Page Six)

Yugoslavia, Bulgaria And Albania Accused By Austin

Charge Three Na-
tions With Using
Force Against
Greece; Advocates
Use Of UN Counter-
Force If Necessary;
Recommends Close
Watch On Balkans

Las Vegas, June 27—(AP)—The United States today charged Yugoslavia, Albania and Bulgaria with using force against Greece and advocated employment of United Nations counter force if necessary.

The American position was stated before the Security Council by Warren R. Austin, chief U.S. delegate, as debate began on the voluminous report of the U.N. Balkan Investigating Commission.

Austin told the council that it may have to resort to counter-measures of the strongest possible kind if Yugoslavia, Albania and Bulgaria continued "using force against the territorial integrity and political independence of Greece."

Under the U.N. Charter the Council may call upon members of the world peace organization to make available whatever forces are needed to preserve peace, pending creation of the permanent U.N. global police force, which now is under consideration.

Austin at the same time proposed formally that the Council approve the commission's recommendations for U.N. machinery to keep a careful watch over the troubled zone where the four Balkan neighbors have common frontiers.

His proposal called for either a neutral commission or commissioner to be sent to the area for a minimum of two years, with instructions to report to the Security Council at least once every three months.

Austin cited evidence implicating each of the three Slav countries in aiding Greek guerrillas, and said: "It is apparent that in committing such acts Yugoslavia, Albania and Bulgaria have violated some of the fundamental principles of this charter."

Yugoslavia is the only one of the three accused states which is a member of the United Nations, but Albania has applied for membership.

Ford And UAW Reach Agreement

Detroit, June 27—(AP)—The Ford Motor Co. and the CIO United Automobile Workers' Union reached an agreement today providing for a wage increase of seven cents an hour and a pension plan instead of paid holidays for some 110,000 production workers. Richard T. Leonard, head of the UAW-CIO Ford division, said it is first old age retirement plan to be implemented in the automotive industry.

Leonard said the direct wage increase plus the benefits of the pension plan will make the increase over 15 cents an hour to the workers.

Dr. S. C. Wang, chief of the Chinese supply mission in the United States, has declined comment, but military experts say that ammunition is the most urgent current need of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's forces.

At a time when Nanking officials have been charging without confirmation that Russia has supplied the Communists with ample arms, the ammunition supplies of Nationalist troops have been severely rationed.

Small arms and some artillery ammunition is obtainable on short notice from American commercial arms plants, as are aircraft of many types. But officials said quick delivery on such weapons as machine guns, rifles and artillery could be had only from wartime Army and Navy stocks which might be declared surplus.

Well-placed officials said that coincidentally with the Communists' drive in Manchuria and North China, Nanking representatives have been making urgent overtures for weapons, ammunition and other military equipment from both American Army and Navy surplus stocks and from commercial manufacturers.

If the pleas are heeded diplomatic authorities expect the answer to be made known in an early China aid policy decision by President Truman and Secretary of State Marshall.

Gov't Ready
To Make Exit
Will Quit Soft Coal
Business At Mid-
night Tonight

Pittsburgh, June 27—(AP)—With nearly two-thirds of the nation's miners on strike and a fuel shortage pinching steel mills and railroads, the government prepared for an exit from the soft coal business at midnight tonight.

Actually the U.S. flag, at the mines, symbols of government operation, will not be lowered until Monday noon, but tonight the miners begin a 10-day vacation with pay granted in their contract with the Naval Coal Mines Administration.

The government took over the mines during another strike—on May 21, 1946, after little or no coal had been dug for 59 days.

The present walkout dated only from last Monday when Congress overrode President Truman's veto of the Taft-Hartley Labor Bill. Within a few hours several thousand miners had left the pits; today the number idle, mainly in protest against the new law, had grown to more than a quarter of a million scattered over 11 states.

The return of the nation's 2,500 mines in 22 states will leave still unresolved the problem of what will happen next July 8 when the miners' vacation ends. No wage contract between the mine owners and the AFL-United Mine Workers has been signed; the miners have always maintained "no contract, no work."

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FORMER HIGH COURT JURIST ENDORSES UMT

Owen J. Roberts Says
Weakness Leading
To War; Replies To
Critics

Washington, June 27—(AP)—Former Supreme Court Justice Owen J. Roberts declared today that military weakness is leading the United States "down the old familiar road of appeasement" toward "an all-out shooting World War III."

Urging Congress to pass the universal military training bill before scheduled adjournments next month, reports said "the affairs of the world are approaching a crisis. The military weakness of the United States is accelerating the approach of this crisis."

He said Congress should "postpone the congressional vacation, if necessary, rather than to postpone consideration and passage of this vital and urgently needed legislation."

Military power today, the retired justice said, is in "dangerous unbalance, heavily weighted in favor of one powerful military dictatorship."

"It is evident," he said, "that the United Nations, now in the formative stages of its development, will be impotent to maintain world peace in the foreseeable future."

Replying point by point to those who oppose universal military training, Roberts told the committee their main arguments and his answers are:

1. UMT leads to war. "Perhaps the most conclusive lesson from the history of the last thirty years is that the military unpreparedness of the United States was a major factor in making the last two wars possible."

2. UMT is undemocratic. "No more democratic influence can be conceived than bringing all young men together at about the same age for a stated period on an absolutely equal footing."

3. UMT leads to militarism. "This country has just had the experience of having 15,000,000 men in its armed services. Has even a biased observer detected any resulting trend toward militarism? Veterans are the severest critics of military life."

4. The cost would be prohibitive. "Time will spell victory or defeat in another war. Time in the future can be bought now and stored ready for use. The capacity for rapid manpower mobilization through universal military training is a cheap price to pay for this priceless commodity."

5. The atom bomb and germ warfare make "mass" armies unnecessary. "UMT will give quite the opposite of a 'mass' army. It will give us a citizen's army. And a citizen's army, a trained citizenry diffused through the population, is the essential and only organization that can provide us with defensive strength in the atom age."

6. UMT is inconsistent with our membership in the United Nations. "As long as any nation, by the way (Continued on Page Four)

Three Executed
Today In State's
Gas Chamber

Raleigh, N.C., June 27—(AP)—Three Negroes, two convicted of murder and one of raping a white woman, died today in the gas chamber in the second triple execution of Governor Cherry's Administration.

Those who died: Moses Artis, 42, convicted in Duplin County last September of slaying his landlord, George Houston. Roy Kirksey, 25, convicted in Columbus County last December of slaying his wife, Eloise Kirksey. W. Odrow Brown, 26, convicted in Wake last November of raping 50-year-old Miss Stella Edwards, who lived alone in Wake County.

Governor Cherry, after detailed study of each case, announced yesterday he would not intervene in any one of them.

WORLD TODAY

When I was in China four and a half years ago this column recorded that impartial observers generally believed the terrible civil war between the Communists and Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist Government must run its bloody course—until one side or the other was knocked out.

It seemed clear that the divergence between communism and any other—ism—politics, economic or religious—was too great to be bridged by negotiation. It was the old story that oil and water don't mix.

That was during the World War. The United States then was giving the Chinese Government material help in the struggle against Japan.

Later General George Marshall, aided by other American officials, spent long months trying ineffectually to compose the internal differences which rapidly were wreck-

ing the world's most populous nation—one of the Big Five.

Since then things have raced madly from bad to worse. And now, having explored every visible avenue in an effort to aid our friend, Washington today is facing a dilemma. Trying to move either side in the civil war with advice or argument is like holing down an empty rain-barrel. Loans of money are snow on a hot stove.

What more can America do to save a nation which not only is her friend but whose welfare is vital to world peace and prosperity? Bestowal of further credits and loans apparently would be the only feasible offering which could be made. But would additional money achieve the desired ends at this juncture?

The position in China is truly catastrophic. Fierce fighting continues between great Communist

A NEW SET OF IDEAS NEEDED.
The Bible — especially the New Testament — speaks a great deal about repentance. Most people think repentance means sorrow for sin. Sometimes it does, but not always.

The Greek word for repentance, usually encountered in the New Testament, means to change one's mind. People can be sorry for their sins one minute and be right back in them the next minute; but when they change their minds about their sins, things begin to happen. A changed mind means a changed philosophy, and a new philosophy eventually results in new ways of living.

Christianity is psychologically sound. It is radical in the sense that it gets down to the roots of things. In that statement of Christianity known as the gospel, repentance is indicated as a first step in the changing of one's behavior. And the great Teacher who laid down the rules of life which we consider definitive described repentance not only as a change of behavior or a change of heart, but as a change of mind. When conviction changes, the will soon becomes amenable to this new way of thinking.

Let us not pay too much attention to our feelings in things religious. The will is more important. The quickest way to change our ways of acting is to change our ideas which lie behind our behavior.

WASHINGTON LETTER

Washington—The War Department reports that 9,500 women are still serving in the Women's Army Corps, five years old this month.

Approximately 2,000 of these are in Germany and Austria, another 250 in Italy and about 600 in Japan. About 300 more are in Panama and there are five WAC officers in Korea.

The Army is asking Congress for legislation for a small permanent WAC group in the Regular Army and for admission of PAC to the Organized Reserves.

The National Civilian Advisory Committee for the WAC, composed of 23 women representing various sections of the United States and varied fields of activity, feels the request is justified.

Genevieve Forbes Herrick, former Washington correspondent and a member of the committee, recently returned from observing the WACs overseas. She says the WAC is not only accomplishing a military mission creditably but in Germany at least is greatly assisting the Army in its program of democratizing former enemies.

"The WACs are teaching the women of Germany, not only English, but Democracy, as practiced and possessed by the American woman," reports Mrs. Herrick.

"They are doing this with both good sense and good taste; sometimes in formal projects, often in informal, incidental ways."

Mrs. Herrick adds that the most important official project is the German Youth Activities program of the American Army. The Office of Military Government in Berlin authorized the placement of a qualified WAC officer in every Laender headquarters to supervise the girls' activities. They were to devote their entire time to the program.

Mrs. Herrick observes that the WACs in Europe today are older than the GI, 85 per cent of whom are under 25. The WAC's average age is approximately 30 years.

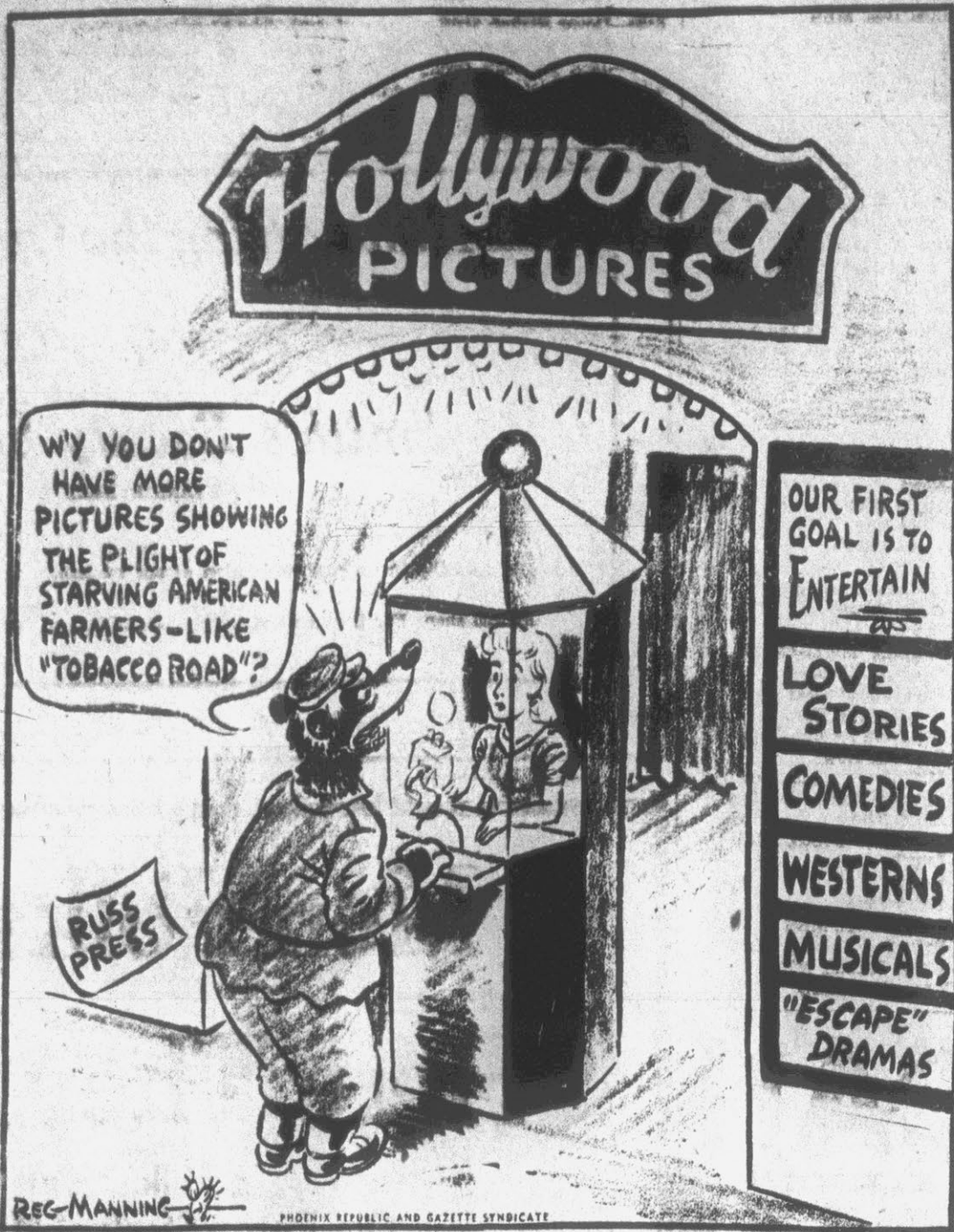
"For instance, in the WAC detachment of 60 at Bamberg, headquarters of the U. S. Constabulary, the average age is 30. Eighteen are 40 or over 32 are between 20 and 25. The average education is four years of high school."

In Vienna, the average age is even higher. Mrs. Herrick says it is estimated at 35 years.

The first contingent of enlisted women to serve overseas were those who arrived in Africa in January 1943 to serve with the Allied Force headquarters under General Eisenhower.

WACs have served in all overseas theaters and such far away spots as

New Caledonia, Cairo, Alaska, Hawaii, Australia, Chungking, New Guinea and the Philippines.

Currently, in addition to those serving abroad there are 1,187 in Army General hospitals and 2,589 are assigned to Army Air Forces.

and Nationalist armies in Manchuria and the government forces are hanging on by their teeth to this richest section of the empire. The conflict is flaring again over northern China proper as well.

Far south in Hong Kong Marshal Li Chi-shen, one time Chief of Staff for Chiang Kai-shek, says he favors a "democratic" secession of South China, and he asserts that this movement already is in progress. Marshal Li had a falling out with the Nationalist Government and then made his peace with the Communists.

But that's only part of the story. Famine has been taking a toll of millions in various parts of the country. The black marketeers are perched like carrion, crows on the back of the stricken nation, and a crazy inflation has carried the national currency to the staggering figure of 33,000 Chinese dollars (yuans) to the American dollar, whereas the yuan normally is about fifty cents in U.S. money.

What Washington now has to decide is would it do any good to dump millions of dollars or other aid into such a morass which instantly swallows everything that touches it. That's a tough question to answer.

The Export-Import Bank in Washington has a loan of \$500,000,000 conditionally earmarked for China, but the time limit on that will expire June 30 unless the United States Government implements the loan. Secretary of State Marshall expressed the view Wednesday that the end of the month probably would be allowed to pass without action.

If the bill works well next year, the Republicans will be in position to take full credit for its success, since Mr. Truman already has said it's no good.

So far, all that's been said here involves just the Democratic and Republican politicians.

But what of management and organized labor in 1948? They'll probably choose up sides, judging from the way management is for the new law now and unions are against it.

And—what of the rest of the country, that part of the people who are neither employers nor members of unions? What will they do?

They'll have to spend a lot of time trying to figure out who's right, if they haven't already chosen up sides on this issue.

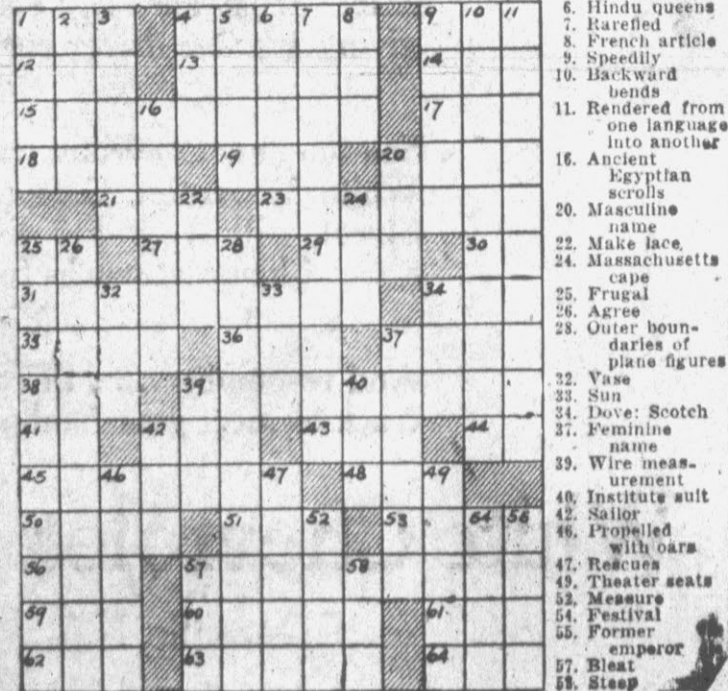

Jogjakarta, Java, June 27 (AP)—Confronted by a solid front of opposition to his moderate policies, Premier Sutan Sjahrir quit as head of the Indonesian Republic's cabinet today and Indonesian sources said "only a miracle" could prevent renewed armed conflict with the Dutch.
A Dutch spokesman in Batavia, however, said the Netherlands East Indies Government expected President Soekarno, in his first move as head of an emergency presidential cabinet, to request arbitration of the current crisis by the third power or by the United Nations.

Federal Housing Authority Probe "Shocks" Taber

Washington, June 26 (AP)—Chairman Taber (R-NY) said today that a House Appropriations Committee investigation of the Federal Housing Authority "has revealed shocking waste and inefficiency in the nation's subsidized housing program."
In a statement elaborating on previous reports, Taber said "instances of fraud and payroll padding" were found. He added:
"The CIO seems to be permitted to run hog-wild among the employees particularly in the San Francisco regional office where Communists are on the payroll."
"The Housing Authority has made little or no progress in the disposal of permanent war housing and instead of making them available to veterans, is seeking to perpetuate them as mutual low cost projects to the present tenants in a manner that will keep them under government supervision for 65 years."

Admit Defeat On Wool Price Bill

Washington, June 27 (AP)—Chairman Hope (R-Kas) of the House agriculture committee conceded defeat today in the congressional effort to write foreign import curbs into a domestic wool support price bill.
Thus President Truman was assured a two-to-one victory on his major victory on his major vetoes of the past two weeks.
Hope said the House will string along with the Senate and pass a measure minus the controversial tariff quota features which brought the chief executive's disapproval, but providing for revival of the government's wartime support prices.
Just when this would be done remained uncertain.
