Truman Message Raises Reaction

**Suggested Probe Of
Real Estate Lobby-
ists Generates Storm
Of Clashing Opin-
ions; Taft And Bricker
Split Over Idea
Of Inquiry**

Washington, July 1—(AP)—President Truman's plea that Congress investigate what he called the "brazen operations of real estate lobbyists today generated a broadside of clashing reaction with political overtones.

The chief executive made his appeal in assailing the rent control extension bill which he signed reluctantly because of provisions permitting 15 per cent rent increases and making nearly all construction controls.

Senator Bricker (R-Ohio) denounced Mr. Truman's lobby inquiry proposal as "the cheapest kind of political demagoguery."

But Senator Taft, Bricker's Ohio colleague and like Bricker widely mentioned as an aspirant for the Republican presidential nomination, told reporters in commenting on the president's call for a full investigation:

"I wouldn't mind doing that myself."

Taft is one of the authors of pending legislation to set up a long range housing program which Mr. Truman commended and which Bricker condemns.

Arthur W. Blinn, head of the National Home and Property Owners Foundation, said his group would welcome an investigation.

"Nothing would please us more," Blinn asserted, "than to have the truth spread upon the record and the American people realize the damage that has been done to them by destructive legislation and administration and false economies."

However, Herbert U. Nelson, executive vice president of the National Association of Real Estate Boards, declared in another statement that "it is nonsense to talk about investigating us" because Congress has "the complete records of our activities as required by law."

"We are just as legitimate a group as farm groups and labor groups and just as representative of our profession," Nelson said.

FLOODS BY HEAVY RAINS; WORKERS TOIL

**Two Inches Of Rain
Add To Pressure
Against Levees;
Much Damage**

St. Louis, July 1—(AP)—The Mississippi River, already swollen to its highest level in more than 100 years here, absorbed an additional two inches of rainfall as workers toiled desperately today to save threatened levees.

As a result of additional pressure on levees downstream, about 4,000 persons were being moved out of Dupon, East Carondelet and surrounding territories on the recommendation of Col. R. E. Smyser, Jr., of the Army Engineering Corps.

As a result of the new rise in the river, Colonel Smyser also decided to give up the battle to save the huge Begonia-Fountain Bluff.

As the flood devastation began to hit this entire area hard, the Mississippi, fed by the latest rains, rose to 38.6 feet last night. Earlier in the day it had hit 38.3 for the highest level in 103 years, then receded briefly following the failure of the Chouteau Island levee on the Illinois side, north of St. Louis.

The Chouteau Island levee's collapse caused flooding of over 2,000 acres.

Last night's downpour flooded many St. Louis streets and electric service to 2,000 St. Louis County homes was disrupted.

The Weather Bureau reported a rainfall of 2.1 inches was recorded in slightly over three hours. Traffic was stalled in many places and basements were flooded. The downpour followed by less than 24 hours one of the most severe earthquakes ever recorded here. The quake, however, did little damage.

Flood damage to metropolitan St. Louis was largely confined to the warehouse and industrial districts along the waterfront. The retail district is on high ground, out of reach of flood waters.

Black Maquis Boast Of Armed Strength

**Self-Described Mem-
ber Says 25,000
Armed Men Ready
To Lead March On
Paris To Establish
Anti-Red Govern-
ment**

Paris, July 1—(AP)—A self-described leader of the "Black Maquis" said today in a clandestine interview that 25,000 armed men were ready to lead a march on Paris at the appropriate moment to establish an "anti-Communist" government.

Existence of the "Black Maquis" was disclosed yesterday by the Interior Ministry, which announced that it had arrested leaders of the movement for plotting to overthrow the republic and establish a "military dictatorship."

In today's interview the self-described "Black Maquis" boasted:

"For every one of us they arrest there are two to take his place."

The anonymous source talked with a reporter for five minutes on a busy corner of the Champs Elysees before disappearing down a side street.

He claimed that arrests were continuing and that "the son of an important government official" had (Continued on Page Four)

EXILES TREK TO SHANGHAI

**Refugees Took Nine
Months To Reach
City From Soviet
Border**

Shanghai, July 1—(AP)—Penniless, weary and ragged, 300 white Russians from the Kaula district of northwest China Sinking Province have reached Shanghai after a 3,000 mile journey by truck, train, and foot, which took them nine months.

The refugees were part of a group which had been living near the Soviet frontier. They said Soviet agents had attempted to coerce them into registering as Soviet citizens, but they had refused.

They are descendants of white (Caucasian) Russian families which fled from Russia between 1917 and 1923. Some of the original settlers among the group were Cossacks who had fought against the Bolsheviks and had sought sanctuary in Sinking. They said other groups of refugees (Continued on Page Six)

WORLD TODAY

French Minister of the Interior, Maurice Debreux's announcement of a Black Maquis plot to overthrow the republic and establish a military dictatorship is couched in such guarded terms that it leaves much to the imagination, though the statement is in all conscience grave enough on the face of it.

The political situation in France is highly complicated, and in order to find the real significance of this ugly revolutionary scheme we must consider it in its relation to the entire picture rather than separately.

When we do that we shall find, I believe, that the most important aspect of the plot is that it is another of those phenomena which indicate France is swinging back toward the right after a steep leftist nose-dive.

M. Debreux tells us that the Black Maquis comprises right wing resistance leaders, monarchists and Vichy collaborationists. Why should they want to establish a dictatorship? Well, it strikes me we don't have

to look far for their main answer. They have been dissatisfied with the country's leftist swing which for a time permitted the Communists to gain such power that the outside world wondered whether France was about to become a part of the Russian sphere of influence. In addition the political disabilities, the nation has been struggling in an economic morass. Some extreme rightists have felt that a dictatorship would eliminate political confusion and also permit more efficient handling of the economic problems.

So much for the Maquis. We can leave them to the French Government which, M. Debreux informs us, intends to push its investigation to its final conclusion, no matter how important a personage is found to be involved.

As a matter of fact another phenomenon has developed during the past few weeks which has bid fair to take care of the Communist threat without need of recourse to strong arm methods of revolution. (Continued on Page Four)

LYNCH MOB IS HELD AT BAY

**George Police Thwart
Mob; Prisoner Tak-
en To Atlanta**

Carrollton, Ga., July 1—(AP)—A police cordon thrown around Carroll county jail prevented lynching last night of a Negro held for murder of a white man.

Chief Deputy Otto Kline and Carrollton police and George State Troopers joined sheriff's deputies in thwarting the mob, estimated at between 100 and 300. He said some had blackened faces and some were masked.

The mob dispersed at about 1:30 a.m. and the Negro was shipped from the jail and sped to Atlanta by state trooper.

Deputy Sheriff Russell Lambert and Sheriff of Police Rader Threading, stationed at the jail door, suffered minor scratches and bruises.

Ship Aground In Tokyo Bay

Tokyo, July 1—(AP)—The Army transport Admiral Sims, sailing from Manila to Yokohama with 1,444 soldiers, nurses and dependents, ran aground in Tokyo Bay near Yokosuka today, Navy headquarters reported.

Brig. Gen. Frank McConnell, commanding the Eighth Army's second major port, said the 16,000-ton ship was in no danger and that all passengers were safe. Yokosuka is 33 miles south of Tokyo.

Munition Ship Has Explosion

Rome, July 1—(AP)—The Italian news agency Ansa reported that 60 persons were believed killed today when ammunition exploded while being unloaded from a transport ship at Porto Santo Stefano, north-west of Rome.

The port is near Civita Vecchia. Ansa said the transport was the Italian ship Panigaglia and that it had brought the ammunition from an Italian island south of the western extremity of Sicily, which had been fortified heavily during the war.

Saves Life On Scaffold Four Stories High

Baltimore, July 1—(AP)—Two Baltimore construction workers were recuperating today after a struggle on a scaffold four stories above ground before hundreds of onlookers.

The participants were Edward Jones, 41, who suddenly fell ill while chipping bricks on a downtown building yesterday, and Warren Catherman, 64, who swung himself up to the rescue on a boatwain's chair.

When Catherman attempted to steady the dazed man on the wooden perch, Jones started frantically to struggle. Catherman said he finally tried to knock Jones out to quiet him, and needed the help of Jesse Walker, 38, to hold him while three men raised a ladder to take them all to the ground.

Jones received hospital treatment for face contusions. Catherman broke a knuckle in the skirmish.

First Barn

Jasper L. Harrington, farmer of the Ayden community, last Tuesday put in the first barn of tobacco reported in the county this season.

Although the tobacco crop this year is reported anywhere from two weeks to a full month later than last year's crop, Harrington is as early if not ahead of the harvesting time last year.

DEADLINE FOR UMW CONTRACT

**Coal Operators Look
To Gov't; Holiday
Ends July 8**

Washington, July 1—(AP)—Soft coal operators, in full possession of their mines for the first time in more than a year, looked to the government today to revive contact talks with John L. Lewis in time to avert a new strike July 8.

The miners' 10-day vacation ends next Tuesday, and only a wage pact with the operators—or a court injunction under the new Taft-Hartley labor law—appears likely to head off another walkout of the 400,000 bituminous coal diggers.

The pits were restored to private ownership yesterday, when the wartime owners under which they were seized expired. The government took the mines in May, 1946, to end a 36-day strike.

As the operators gathered for what they hoped would be a week of head-to-head talks with Lewis' United Mine Workers, they declined to confirm reports that the big northern group had offered to meet the miners' full wage demands.

Lewis is asking a pay boost of 35 cents an hour, plus the federal mine safety code which he has worked under for the past year of government control, and a ten-cent royalty on each ton produced, for the union welfare and retirement fund.

Board Meeting

According to a telegram received by Dr. Dennis H. Cooke, president of East Carolina Teachers College, from Clyde Erwin, chairman of the ECTC board of trustees, the board will meet here this afternoon at four o'clock.

Whether the board will consider nominations for a new president for the institution could not be learned.

State Begins New Fiscal Year And New Biennium; New Laws In Effect

Richmond, July 1—(AP)—As the state of North Carolina began a new fiscal year and a new biennium today, a far-reaching law intended to promote "safety on the highways" went into effect.

The state also began operating under a new budget that calls for total spending during the next biennium of \$312,374,741 and calling for pay boosts of approximately 30 per cent for all teachers and 20 per cent for other state employees.

A new law under which taxes on beer and unfortified wines will be doubled and counties and cities will be given a chance to vote on banning beer and wine sales also became effective, as did legislation prohibiting the manufacture, transportation, sale or use of fireworks.

CIO SHIPYARD WORKERS OUT; NEW WALKOUT

**Threatens Shutdown
Of Nearly All Major
Shipbuilding And
Repairs**

New York, July 1—(AP)—A strike of CIO shipyard workers—previously confined to 10 yards in four states—spread to additional east, and Gulf coast plants today as a walkout of 40,000 more unionists got underway—threatening a shutdown of virtually all major shipbuilding and repair work on the Atlantic coast.

The new walkout—began at 12:01 A.M. and announced in Camden, N.J., by an official of Local 1 of the Industrial Union of Marine and Shipbuilding Workers—brought to approximately 120,000 the number of men involved in the strike—some 42,000 having struck last Thursday in 10 plants in Maryland, Massachusetts, New Jersey and New York.

"The strike is on," the union official, who declined to be identified by name, said shortly after midnight. "The strike will affect at least 22 of the 30 shipyards on the east and Gulf coasts."

Full effects of the new walkout, however, will not be felt until later today when the day shifts are scheduled to report to work.

Pickets began patrolling at the main gate of the huge Federal Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company yards at Kearny, N.J., shortly after midnight but an office worker at the yard said less than 400 men, all maintenance workers, were the only employees due in at midnight and that they would be permitted to enter anyway.

Last minute negotiations were conducted yesterday by the union with the two companies but they collapsed.

The union seeks a 13-cent hourly wage increase, six paid holidays a year. Skilled workers receive \$1.39 an hour and laborers 94 cents under present contracts.

SIGN UP WITH REFUGEE BODY

**Pres. Truman Signs
Legislation Linking
U.S. With IRO**

Washington, July 1—(AP)—President Truman today signed legislation making the United States a member of the International Refugee Organization, saying the IRO will give the world "new reason to believe that no problem is too difficult" for solution by cooperating nations.

Mr. Truman said he was "happy to accept membership" on behalf of this country as he signed the measure at a White House ceremony. The agency will operate through the United Nations.

Besides providing for United States participation in the IRO, the legislation authorizes a \$75,000,000 contribution toward the care of Europe's 900,000 displaced persons in the next 12 months.

Mr. Truman also signed the necessary membership papers for deposit with Trygve Lie, Secretary General of the United Nations, by (Continued on Page Six)

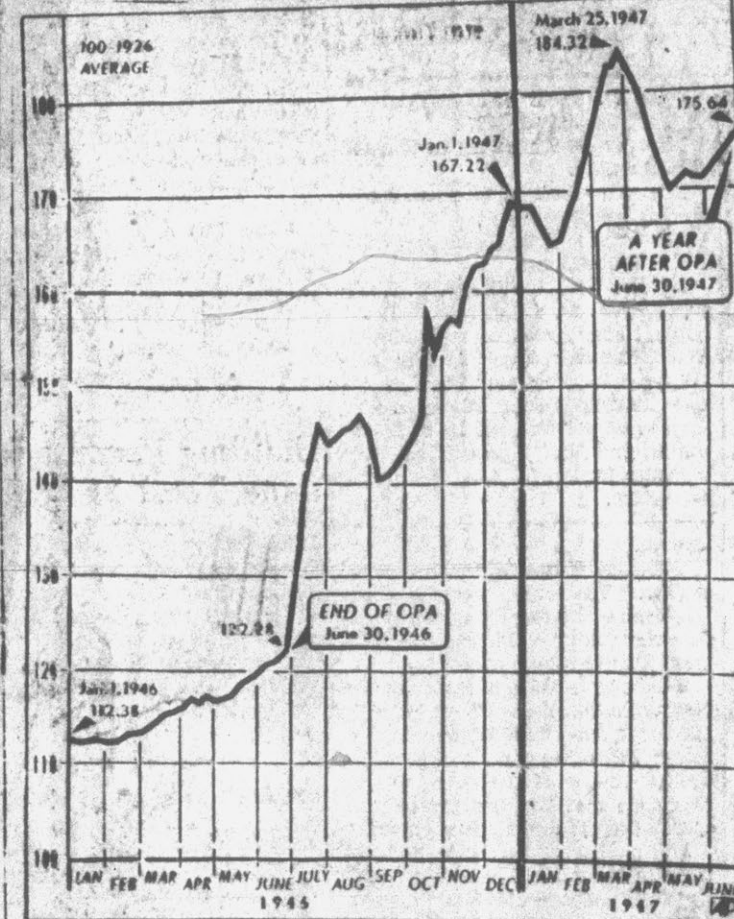
British Reject Clemency Plea

Washington, July 1—(AP)—Secretary of State Marshall today denounced as "mischievous charges" the charges "which have emanated from Russian sources—that the U. S. has 'imperialistic aims' in offering assistance to foreign nations."

Marshall told the women's National Press Club in a luncheon address that "historical records clearly show that no people have ever acted more generously and more unselfishly than the American people in tendering assistance to alleviate distress and suffering."

Action Is Effective Today; Improve- ment Programs Scheduled; Water Mains To Be Install- ed As Soon As Poss- ible

The city of Greenville increased in population by approximately 2,500 people and in property value by about \$2,000,000 today when the extension of the city limits became effective. The increase in population brings the city's inhabitants to some 18,000, city officials estimate.

The new areas taken in by the extension of the city limits include the old N.Y.A. property and the Hardee property east of Greenville on Tenth street extended, parts of Second and Third Streets out to and including the Greenwood cemetery, the ball park and the cotton mill section on the west end of town, across the river to Flemings Cross Roads on the north and the Hillsdale and Samma sections south of the former city limits.

Grading and improving streets have been going on for some time in the sections added to the city, as well as surveys for laying out new streets, new water and sewage lines and "after mains for fire protection. Garbage service has been carried on in the areas for the last few weeks.

Mayor Boyd said clean-up and improvement programs will be encouraged and carried out in all the new sections which have been brought into the city by the recent ordinance. Fire Chief Gardner stated the equipment of the fire department is adequate to protect the additional area, but improvements will be necessary as building in the area increases. Water mains will be laid in the new additions to the city as fast as the materials can be acquired, a city official said.

Washington, July 1—(AP)—If you're an employer, this tells some of the main things the new labor law does to, and for, you.

First, remember this: The National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) is the government agency which administers the law.

Unless NLRB okay a union as bargaining agent, you don't have to bargain with that union.

NLRB won't give the okay unless a majority of your employees, in an election conducted by NLRB, vote for the union to represent them.

You can, of course, bargain with a union without such an election and without NLRB approval, but in that case—

You forfeit some of the benefits and protections which the new law gives you. If NLRB has approved a union, Example:

If you want to make charges of unfair labor practices against a union, you must make them to NLRB which has legal means of stopping unfairness.

Ministers To Hold Another Meeting Tomorrow; Bidault And Bevin Ready To Proceed Without Russia In Event Of Deadlock; Molotov Proposal Unaccept- able

Paris, July 1—(AP)—The foreign ministers of Russia, Britain and France discussed Secretary of State Marshall's proposed for American aid to Europe for an hour and a half today, and French sources said there would be another meeting tomorrow afternoon.

Earlier there was speculation that today's session—their fourth—might be the last, since Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov virtually has vetoed Marshall's suggestion.

British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin and French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault were reported ready to proceed in continental economic planning without the Soviet Union if the conference does end in a deadlock.

Bidault, in an attempt to save the conference, will offer a compromise proposal, the French press agency said earlier. Terms of the proposal were not disclosed.

Both British and French circles said "only a miracle" could save the conference from failure.

The ministers were to consider a plan Molotov had proposed in answer to Secretary of State George C. Marshall's June 5 offer of United States help in a European reconstruction program to be drawn up primarily by European nations.

Informed sources said that both Bevin and Bidault last night termed the Molotov proposal unacceptable but, at the Russian minister's request, agreed to seek further advice from their governments.

Bevin already had declared that Britain would carry on without Russia, if necessary.

Informed sources said Molotov proposed a committee setup to find out how much each European nation would need and how much the United States would supply.

They reported that Bevin and Bidault, on the other hand, declared that Europe should draw up a balance sheet of her resources, as well

Dining Halls At ECTC Remodeled During Summer; Plan Improvements

The two dining halls operated on the campus at East Carolina Teachers College will be remodeled during the summer and will be improved by the addition of new equipment, college treasurer F. D. Duncan has announced. Work will begin on the south dining room at the beginning of the second half of the summer session on July 12. It is hoped that both dining halls will be ready for use by late September, when the fall quarter will begin.

are on their way to Shanghai. These first arrivals said Soviet agents, posing as Mongols, were active in Sinkiang; and that troops in Russian uniform were encamped in the disputed boundary zone between Sinkiang and Outer Mongolia.

Outer Mongolia now is supposed to be an independent republic, and very friendly to Russia.

China accused it of invading Sinkiang last month; Outer Mongolia said China had invaded its territory.

The refugees said a wave of immigrants came into Sinkiang from Russia in 1936, after proclamation of a new Russian constitution, and that the total number of refugees there at that time was about 20,000.

Brazil Joins Refugee Relief

Lake Success, July 1—(AP)—Brazil became the 20th member of the United Nations International Refugee Organization at a brief ceremony today.

Brazilian Ambassador Joao Carlos Muniz signed for his country, which would contribute 1.50 per cent of IRO's first-year operational budget of \$151,000,000. His signature is subject to ratification.

Lay Off Workers On Railroads

Washington, July 1—(AP)—The Southern Railway system reported today it has laid off "between 3,000 and 3,500" workers because of the bituminous coal miners' vacation. A Southern official told a reporter additional work may be laid off "if the coal supply continues to drop" before the miners' holiday ends July 8.

Under the bill the United States will carry 45.75 percent—\$69,160,000—of IRO's operating budget, and bear 39.89 percent—or \$57,500,000—of its administrative costs.
