S. C. PR. RULES BROKEN BY TEST CASE

Judge Holds Negroes Can Vote In White Democratic Primary Election

Charleston, S. C., July 12.—(AP)—U. S. District Judge J. Waties Waring ruled today that "Negroes are entitled to be enrolled to vote" in the South Carolina Democratic primaries. The ruling was in the case of George Elmore, Solumbia Negro, against members of the Richland County (Columbia) Democratic Executive Committee and primary election managers in one Columbia Democratic club. State Democratic party rules have limited participation in primaries to "white Democrats." All state laws governing and affecting primary elections were repealed in 1944.

In deciding for the plaintiff against the Richland Democratic Executive Committee, Judge Waring said: "I am of the opinion that the present Democratic party in South Carolina is acting for and on behalf of the people of South Carolina; and that the primary held by it is the only practical place where one can express a choice in selecting federal and other officials. Racial distinctions cannot exist in the machinery that selects the officers and lawmakers of the United States; and all citizens of the state and country are entitled to cast a free and untrammeled ballot in our elections; and if the only material and realistic elections are clothed with the name primary, they are equally entitled to vote there."

Agree On German Industrial Pact

Berlin, July 12.—(AP)—Britain and the United States agreed today on a new level of industry for their economically merged occupation zones in Germany, Gen. Lucius D. Clay announced. The American military command said level authorities would draw up the agreement for signature Wednesday, and that terms of the pact would not be announced until that time. Authoritative sources predicted the industrial level would be based on steel production of about 12,000,000 tons yearly.

Second College Summer Session Begins July 14

The second summer session at East Carolina Teachers College will open on July 14. In addition to the regular faculty, there will be four new staff members, employed for the second summer session only, according to an announcement made by Dean R. J. Slav. I. W. Hansen, who has been doing graduate work at Duke University, will teach in the educational and psychology department. He is a graduate of Oberlin College and has the master's degree from Duke. Marjorie Crisp of the faculty of Lousburg College will teach in the health and physical education department. Mildred Johnston of the Wilmington City schools, an M. A. graduate of ECTC, will teach in the department of social studies. Mrs. Dan E. Vornholt, who has been doing work on her doctorate at the University of Wisconsin, will teach in the English department.

A Poorly-Made Bloc

Russian Satellites Cemented Together By Coercion; Not The Most Satisfactory Means Of Achieving Military And Economic Security For Soviet Government

Now that the Russian "bloc" of satellite nations in Eastern Europe has been disintegrated clearly we shall find it illuminating if we pause to devote a bit of thought to the meaning of the term "bloc." A bloc of nations, in its generally accepted sense, is a group which has willingly combined to achieve some objective of common interest. Membership in the bloc is voluntary. Now in examining the Russian bloc we find an interesting deviation from the ordinary definition. The element of willingness is lacking in much, if not all, of this association, that is, willingness on the part of the people as a whole in the various nations. For example, Hungary, Rumania and Poland were among countries communized over protests by the United States and Britain; that strong-arm methods were being employed so the will of the general public was being smothered. AWOKE BEFORE MURDER DONE

Assailant Tried To Kill Her In Flaming House; Woman Escapes

Harrisville, W. Va., July 12.—(AP)—She awoke in bed at 5 a.m. yesterday to feel hands at her throat, to hear the crack of flames through her farmhouse. Mrs. John Stackhouse, 30, told police she fought free, then a man hurled kerosene over her nightgown and shoved her into the flames. Her gown ablaze, she fled screaming, only to be caught and thrown back into the fire, she said. Somehow, she got outside while eight-year-old Deloris ran for help. Mrs. Stackhouse was near death and her three daughters hospitalized with less serious burns. Their home burned to the ground. Sheriff John Lowther said he was interrogating Howard Clayton, 38, identified as a farmhand who lived at the Stackhouse home. The sheriff said Clayton was found sitting in the road, partially disrobed, in front of the smoldering ruins. Mrs. Stackhouse's husband was away working on another farm at the time.

Congress To Get Special Message

Washington, July 12.—(AP)—President Truman will send to Congress next week a special message recommending a comprehensive flood control plan for the entire middle west, the White House announced today. The message is expected to go to both houses about the middle of the week. Press Secretary Charles G. Ross said the flood control proposal will embrace not only the Mississippi Valley where recent floods have done extensive damage but the whole area from the Rockies to the Appalachians.

Two British Soldiers Taken By Jewish Band

Jerusalem, July 12.—(AP)—Officials reported today that two British Army sergeants had been kidnapped from a cafe at Natanya shortly after midnight. The report said the two sergeants were sitting in the cafe with a Jewish friend when a group of armed Jews entered, assaulted the civilian and took all three into a waiting taxicab. The civilian was found two hours later in an orange grove a few miles away. The brigadier in charge of troops in the area summoned Major Ben Ami to headquarters later in the morning. Police said they believed the kidnappers might have been a Jewish underground act to obtain hostages for the lives of three Ingun Zavi Leumi gunmen awaiting the gallows for the May 4 Acre Prison raid.

Demand Vote On Income Tax Cut

GOP Leadership Threatens To Keep Today's Senate Session Going Into Night If Necessary To Obtain Bill's Passage

Washington, July 12.—(AP)—The GOP leadership threatened today to keep today's Senate session going on into the night if necessary to obtain passage of the tax cut bill. With approval of the measure conceded, main interest centered on the size of the majority as a yardstick to show whether President Truman's forthcoming second veto can be overridden. The no-quarter maneuvering by both sides to line up their forces for that test went on grimly behind the scenes. Determined to send the bill to the White House quickly, Assistant Majority Leader Wherry (R-Neb.) said he planned a rare Saturday night session unless the Senate accepted during the day the bill already re-passed by the House to slash income taxes 30 to 10.5 percent beginning January 1. Senator Barkley (Ky.), the Democratic leader, asked Wherry during the debate last night whether he proposed a Sunday session. "We'll cross that river when we come to it," the Nebraskan snapped.

MEDICAL CARE PLAN PRAISED

Surgeon General Says State Among First To Get Funds

Greensboro, N. C., July 12.—(AP)—The North Carolina Medical Care Commission's hospital construction plan has the official blessing of Dr. Thomas Perran, Surgeon General of the U. S. Public Health Service, and the state may well be among the first to use federal funds made available through the Hill-Burton Hospital Construction Act. Dr. Perran expressed his approval of the Tar Heel State's plan in an address here yesterday before a statewide meeting of the North Carolina Good Health Association. Most of these corporation officials have enough money and do not need to work. As these men are an important factor in the development of business, this discouraged attitude has a serious backfire. Let me tell you why. Statistics show that 2 percent of the population of the U. S. is responsible for 90 percent of the new building, new businesses, new inventions, and enterprise in general. It is hard to make people believe this fact and labor leaders scorn it, but it nevertheless is true. Kill off even 1 percent of the population—if this 1 percent were the business

France And Britain Will Spare No Effort To Make Conference A Success Says Bidault; Bevin Stresses Goal Is To Aid Recovery Of Europe

Paris, July 12.—(AP)—Delegates of 16 nations began a conference today on European economic recovery with United States aid and were told that Britain and France would give the Marshall plan firm backing. British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin was elected president of the conference and immediately pledged in support of the plan the resources of the whole British Commonwealth of nations—"insofar as we can influence it." Earlier, French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault in opening the meeting in the Foreign Ministry's Grand Dining Hall said Britain and France would spare no effort to make the conference a success. Russia and eight other eastern nations were not represented. Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov had declined to join Bevin and Bidault in sponsoring the meeting, and the other countries, following Russia's lead, had turned down invitations to the affair. The conference started at 11:05 a.m. (5:05 a.m. Eastern Standard Time). France was seated at the head of the conference table. "I am authorized to state for the British Government," Bevin said, "that not only the resources of Britain but, insofar as we can influence it, the resources of the entire British Commonwealth of Nations will be thrown into the support of this effort." He stressed that the conference was economic and not political. "I emphasize again," he declared, "that this is a voluntary arrangement. We are attempting to organize the economic resources of the continent for the benefit of all Europe. x x x" Bidault said the primary objective of the meeting would be to form an organization to determine Europe's resources and needs as a preliminary to requesting United States financial assistance. Secretary of State George C. Marshall in a Harvard University speech June 5 offered U. S. support of a common European reconstruction program. "The sessions be open to the press, and many newspapermen crowded into the meeting place."

CHINA POLICY FACES REVIEW

Newest Mission Coincides With Mounting Kai-shek Crisis

Washington, July 12.—(AP)—A sweeping review of American policy in a still-hidden China was assured today by announcement that Lieut. Gen. A. B. C. Wedemeyer will direct a fact-finding survey there and in Korea for President Truman. Wedemeyer, war-time China theater commander and chief of staff for Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek, will head a group of experts leaving the first of next week by plane for a six-week appraisal of the overall situation. The White House announcement of the mission coincided with a mounting military and economic crisis for Chiang's nationalist regime. The groups findings promise to help decide whether and to what extent the U. S. should help out against his communist foes, at the risk of prompting counter action by Soviet Russia. Nanking has appealed for both loans and arms, which have been mostly denied since Secretary of State Marshall acknowledged in January failure of his efforts to close the breach between nationalists and communists. The recent sale of 130,000 surplus rifle cartridges to Chiang, Marshall stressed, was not a precedent.

Russian Press And Radio Hammers European Economic Conference While Some Eastern Nations Pine For U. S. Dollars

London, July 12.—(AP)—Russian press and radio spokesmen hammered today on the theme that the European economic conference may fail, while some eastern nations pined for the dollar aid they may have lost following Russia's lead in starting away from the conference. Moscow radio commentator Viktorov, speaking in Russian, called the conference a repetition of the post World War I Dawes Plan, which was designed to help Germany and said it was doomed to failure. "The Anglo-French plans are riddled with new international difficulties which in the final analysis will turn against their initiators," he declared. Throughout the night the Russian agencies repeated the theory that the non-participating nations stayed away because joint British-French preparation of the conference agenda would have infringed their national sovereignty if they had accepted. One example after another of this national sovereignty angle was hammered out with the absence of any reference to Czechoslovakia, which accepted its bid and then tore it up three days later after Czech Premier Gottwald called on Soviet Prime Minister Stalin. But Finland's rejection, as quoted by the Moscow radio, contained the recognition that Finland needs "foreign help" for economic reconstruction and "is ready to give material information concerning the country's economy." A few hours earlier a Polish foreign secretary spokesman in Warsaw made it plain that Poland too was eager for foreign help in rebuilding and would be sorry if the rejection of the invitation angered the United States.

Two Shots Fired At Sen. Bricker

Washington, July 12.—(AP)—Two shots were fired harmlessly at Senator Bricker (R-Ohio) in the Senate office building today by a man described by Bricker as a grunted patronage seeker. Bricker was not injured. He told office assistants he believed that the shots were blank cartridges. 'Fascism In Action'

A Brief Outline Of Points Brought Out In A Booklet Published By The Government; A Study In Dictatorship Well Worth Reading; What It's About

Washington, July 12.—(AP)—Very shortly the government will publish, for sale to the public, a booklet called "Fascism In Action." This study in dictatorship—how it works and how it gets that way—was prepared by a special staff of the Library of Congress. Rep. Wright Patman, Texas Democrat, who asked that it be done, before it could be printed for the public the House had to approve. This it finally did after much delay and fiercer debate because some congressmen said it was a waste of money. The government printer will announce the price of it, which won't be much, when it's printed. This writer has gone through original copies. It is worth the time of anyone who wants to understand Fascism in action. Patman wanted it made public as a companion piece to "Communism In Action," another booklet which the House ordered printed last year.

This, too, was prepared by the special congressional library staff. So far more than 400,000 copies of it have been sold. Neither booklet deals with any evidences of communism or fascism which have appeared in this country. One sticks to communism in Russia. The other concentrates on fascism in Germany, Japan, Italy and Spain. The conclusion of the book study on fascism is, "Fascism, that fascism means these things: 1. A dictator runs a fascist government. He's supported by a single political party and a special class. The state, for its own so-called good, keeps everyone under its thumb. 2. Freedom, in the democratic sense, understood in this country, does not exist. An individual's life means little. It's full of duties and obligations to the state. 3. Religion is attacked if it disagrees. (Continued on Page Two)

Czechs Announce Russian Treaty

Prague, July 12.—(AP)—Czechoslovakia's communist premier, Klement Gottwald, announced today that a new five-year economic treaty has been signed with the Soviet Union. "Among its provisions," the premier said in a radio address, "Czechoslovakia is to receive from Russia 200,000 tons of wheat and 30,000 tons of fodder, presumably in the next 12 months. This will be in return for exports and manufactured products of Czechoslovak heavy and light industries."

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Strength FOR THE DAY

PAY ATTENTION TO THE ROOTS
When the winds lash the trees, we worry not so much about the branches as about the roots. Will they hold during the storm? Branches may be torn off and the trees survive, but if the roots are broken the trees will die.

Today human life is being lashed by one of the great storms of history. Not in centuries has there been so much hunger, suffering, persecution, blood-letting, and disorder as during the past twenty-five years. What does it mean? Some believe it means the collapse of the world as we know it. Many confidently believe that within a few years atomic warfare will begin and civilization will come to an end.

In thinking of the future, let us ask ourselves whether the roots of society have been fundamentally distributed. If they have, then we are in serious straits indeed. That the branches have been lopped off no one can deny. But what of the roots? These roots are religious faith and the will of man to live and succeed. Nothing else but these factors will hold humanity in the hour of storm.

Legislators and diplomats think in terms of new laws and new treaties. These things are like the branches of a tree, important, but not nearly so important as the roots. The roots lie in the hearts of men. Are they still sound in spite of the fury of the gale?

Washington—Dr. George Calver, physician to Congress, is keeping his fingers crossed. He hopes Congress will finish its business by July 15. Dr. Calver is worried about the health of the new crop of senators. He thinks they're working themselves to a frazzle. They're younger than previous crops of senators under his wing and they've a better claim to health simply because they are younger. But Dr. Calver is worried just the same.

"They never get any exercise and they don't take care of themselves," he says.

"They spend hours in committee meetings, more hours in Senate sessions, and then still more in keeping office engagements with constituents. Then they finish the day with more long hours fulfilling social engagements."

The doctor frowned: "I don't know what gets into these men when they get down here in Washington."

"They allow themselves to get tied to the job and forget all about health considerations until they begin to be debilitated and full of pains and aches. Then they begin to think of physical examinations."

Dr. Calver says there's not much he can do with the boys. He says though that if they follow his 10 commandments for health they ought to keep out of trouble as far as circumstance and fate will let them.

Here are the commandments:
1. Eat wisely.
2. Drink plentifully (of water).
3. Eliminate thoroughly.
4. Bathe cleanly.
5. Exercise rationally.
6. Accept inevitables (don't worry).
7. Play enthusiastically.
8. Relax completely.
9. Sleep sufficiently.
10. Check up occasionally.

Free Enterprise
Capitalism, so-called, has many faults. It seems unfair that one boy should be born with a million dollars, while another boy equally worthy should inherit only debts. Monopolies of any kind are wrong; business leaders have abused their power in many ways. The fact that labor organizations have copied the same wrong methods is no excuse for the sins of capital. "Two blacks do not make a white"—nor do two wrongs make a right.

President Truman should however, honestly explain and recognize that there is a difference in people and that the few natural leaders should be encouraged and not persecuted as at present. The idea that everyone is equal in ability, as first emphasized by the leaders of the French Revolution and as now preached by the New Dealers, Socialists and Communists, is fundamentally unsound and every reader knows it. It may require a great depression to get people once more to think honestly and correctly; unless before then the importance of the Two Per-cent is frankly recognized.

What About Vacation?
It is in view of the above that the stock market has reached a stalemate. It goes up a few points and then down a few points, with small volume of transactions. These transactions are mostly by professional speculators sitting in the offices of brokers. The real worth-while industrialists, merchants, bankers and professional men are tired and discouraged. Perhaps a good vacation this summer may do them. Let us hope that they will take it and come back renewed in spirit and, once again, willing to buy stocks.

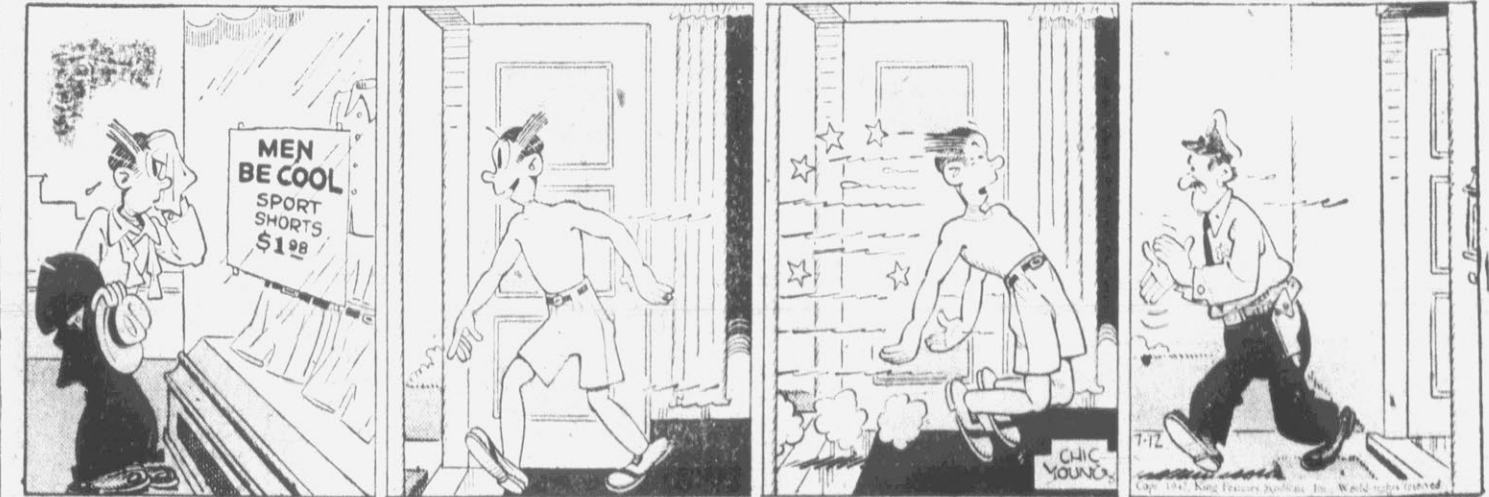

either afraid to protest or are unable to register a useful opposition.

Moscow had several reasons for creating this bloc. One was to spread communism. Another was to increase the political and economic prestige of the Soviet Union. A third, and very important one, was to extend its sphere of influence westward for military security.

On paper the bloc is a formidable one that at first glance would seem to fulfill all the purposes for which it was built. However, when we consider that it is made up of unwilling units we see that it provides a highly unstable barrier between Russia and the Western Democracies which she distrusts so much.

It is unstable because it cuts across a section of Europe which includes countries that long have been famous for their love of liberty and for their fierce defense of freedom. Among them are sturdy fighting folk like the Bohemians, the Serbs, the Poles, the Czechs, the Slovaks and the Finns.

Can any doubt that Russia will have to sit on the lid of this melting-pot? She herself, better than anyone else, must realize this because many of the populations in her bloc belong to her own Slavic race of fighters who so often have revolted against oppression.

Coercion isn't the right cement to hold a bloc together indefinitely.

Rep. Mansfield, Aged Legislator, Dies In Hospital

Washington, July 12—(AP)—Rep. Joseph J. Mansfield (D-Tex.), the oldest member of Congress, died today at the Bethesda, Md., Naval Hospital. He was 86.

Complications brought on by age and various ailments caused him to be taken to the hospital April 9. Until a few days before he went to the hospital, he had shown up regularly at the capitol.

Affectionately hailed by his many friends as "Judge," he served in public office for 60 years—as a mayor, city and county attorney, judge and congressman. He entered Congress 30 years ago.

From 1931 to 1947 when the Democrats lost control of Congress to the Republicans, he was chairman of the House Rivers and Harbors Committee.

Mansfield was born Feb. 9, 1861, in Wayne, then Virginia but now in West Virginia. His grandfather fought in the Revolutionary War. His father, born in 1807—was one of the Confederate soldiers who died fighting in the Civil War.

Greek Guerrilla Chief Calls For Separate State

Athens, July 12—(AP)—Greece's fugitive Communist leader called today for the "creation in free democratic areas of Greece of a free democratic government."

Government troops continued a heavy drive against guerrillas in the northwest, where the war ministry said insurgents sought to set up a communist state.

Greek War Minister George Stratos said yesterday the insurgent objective in that sector was ultimately to set up a separate state.

Nicholas Zachariades, Communist chieftain facing sentences of from one to five years or criminal label, said in a signed article in the Athens Communist newspaper Rizospastis that the Communists had come to an open break with non-sympathetic political parties.
