Women in the Church

Working to a large extent through organizations of women in the churches of all denominations in the Committee on "Displaced Persons," Earl Harrison, of New York City, chairman, is bringing pressure to bear upon congressional leaders for the passage of a temporary emergency act by Congress which would permit the United States to admit its fair share of Europe's displaced persons. "Armfuls" of telegrams, letters and postcards have been reaching the House sub-committee measure.

Cardinal Francis J. Spellman, of New York Roman Catholic Archdiocese, under whose guidance the New York Foundation is expanding its facilities to serve larger numbers of homeless children, recently urged his people to adopt dependent and neglected children. Chiding those persons who go "walking with one or two or three animals," the Cardinal said, "I would call on these people who have more than one animal to see if they could give more time to the care of children. I realize that I'm making a difficult plea because there are many people who don't want their own children, but nevertheless I appeal to them to see if they cannot in some possible way care for a child in their home."

The Rev. Mrs. Tamaki Uemura, of Tokyo, an ordained minister of the United Church in Japan, was recently touring American Presbyterian churches as a "missionary of reconciliation" from her country to the United States. Now this best-known Japanese woman preacher is back in her homeland, and it is reported that "auditoriums in Tokyo and Yokohama have been filled with crowds to hear the message from her lips; in a few days she leaves to tour the western part of the land and tell the people that the world can become one, but only in Jesus Christ. She is busy with the task of interpreting the heart of America to Japan." One of Mrs. Uemura's first acts upon her return was to present to the Empress of Japan a beautiful Bible sent her by the women of America. "She talked for over two hours with their majesties whose eyes, she says, were filled with tears as she told them of the healing of wounds and the promise of the restoration of

the long friendship which had been interrupted by the war."

Mr. Pringle was a printer. He served more than two years in the U. S. Navy during World War I. After his discharge from the army he came to Greenville. He had been in the employ of the Daily Reflector, with several interruptions, the past 25 years.

State's Closed Shop Law Heads For Early Test

Asheville, N. C., July 14—(AP)—The CIO has announced that arrangements have been completed for a test case on North Carolina's closed shop law and action will be started "in the next few days."

William Smith, North Carolina CIO organization director, made the announcement at yesterday's closing session of a statewide conference of CIO leaders who gathered to discuss the Taft-Hartley labor bill and determine CIO policies in regard to it.

Smith also told the 500 delegates that the CIO's next big organizational objective is the American Enka Corporation plant here, which employs 4,500 persons. He disclosed that six organizers have been assigned to a West Asheville office for this specific purpose.

While the CIO session was in progress at the courthouse, a group of AFL pickets marched outside

with signs reading: "This building is being painted by prison labor." Jail prisoners were painting the top floors.

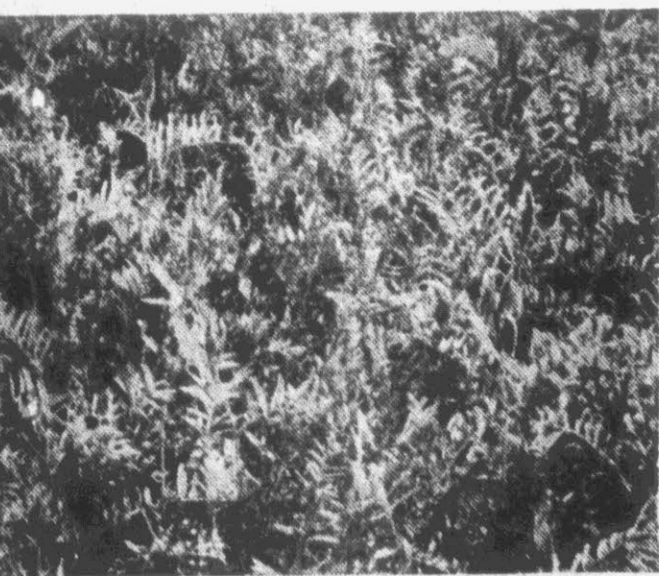

Former POW Writes Letter To Warehouse

B. T. Cannon, of the Dixie Ware-
house in Greenville, has recently
received a letter from a former
German prisoner-of-war who was
employed here in 1944.

The letter is postmarked Villin-
gen, Germany (in the French zone),
is typewritten, and addressed to
"Dixie Warehouse, Greenville-N.C.,
U.S.A."

The contents are as follow:
Villingen, den 6 Juni 1947

To
Dixie Warehouse
Greenville-N.C.

In the year 1944 I was a Prisoner
of War in the Camp New Bern and
I did work in the Warehouses in
Greenville. In the month march
1946 I have gone to England and
was 5 month there. The time in
England was match better for me
then in England. At the Octobre
1946 I have gone at home to my
family in Germany french zone.
The time in Germany is very bad
and I think every days to you in
America. It was a nice time in the
Warehouses. I am home sick to
America. We have nothing to eat
and no clothes. Many women, men
and children are very sick.

Now, I work in a office. I get match
money but we have nothing to eat.
We have no flour, no sugar, no fat,
no coffee, no cocoa, no meat and
also no clothes and shoes. We have
no soap no shave soap and no
blades. Wat is the metre with the
old man? we says him Opa he
works in a factory. You gave me
match Cigarettes and Coca Cola I
thank you for that very match. In
the next letter I will send you a
picture from my family. I will close
now. I think you write me a letter
and I hope you are good by health

Good Month For Army Recruiters

"The United States Army Re-
cruiting Service in North and South
Carolina enjoyed its most successful
month of the year in June, when
836 young men joined the Regular
Army from the two states," said
M-Sgt. Virgil B. Lindsey, command-
ing officer of the Greenville sub-
station in an announcement today.
784 of these young men enlisted
through the recruiting stations and
sub-stations, and the remaining 72

men enlisted at camps, posts and
stations. The local sub-station ac-
counted for 7 enlistments during
the month.

Credit for the rise in number of
men joining the Army is given to
the fact that most high schools
graduated their senior classes dur-
ing June, and many of the seniors
immediately joined the Army to
take advantage of the excellent
education to be obtained in Army
schools and under the G.I. Bill of
Rights.

Sgt. Lindsey said it is expected
that many more of this year's high
school graduates will enter the Ar-
my after taking a vacation.

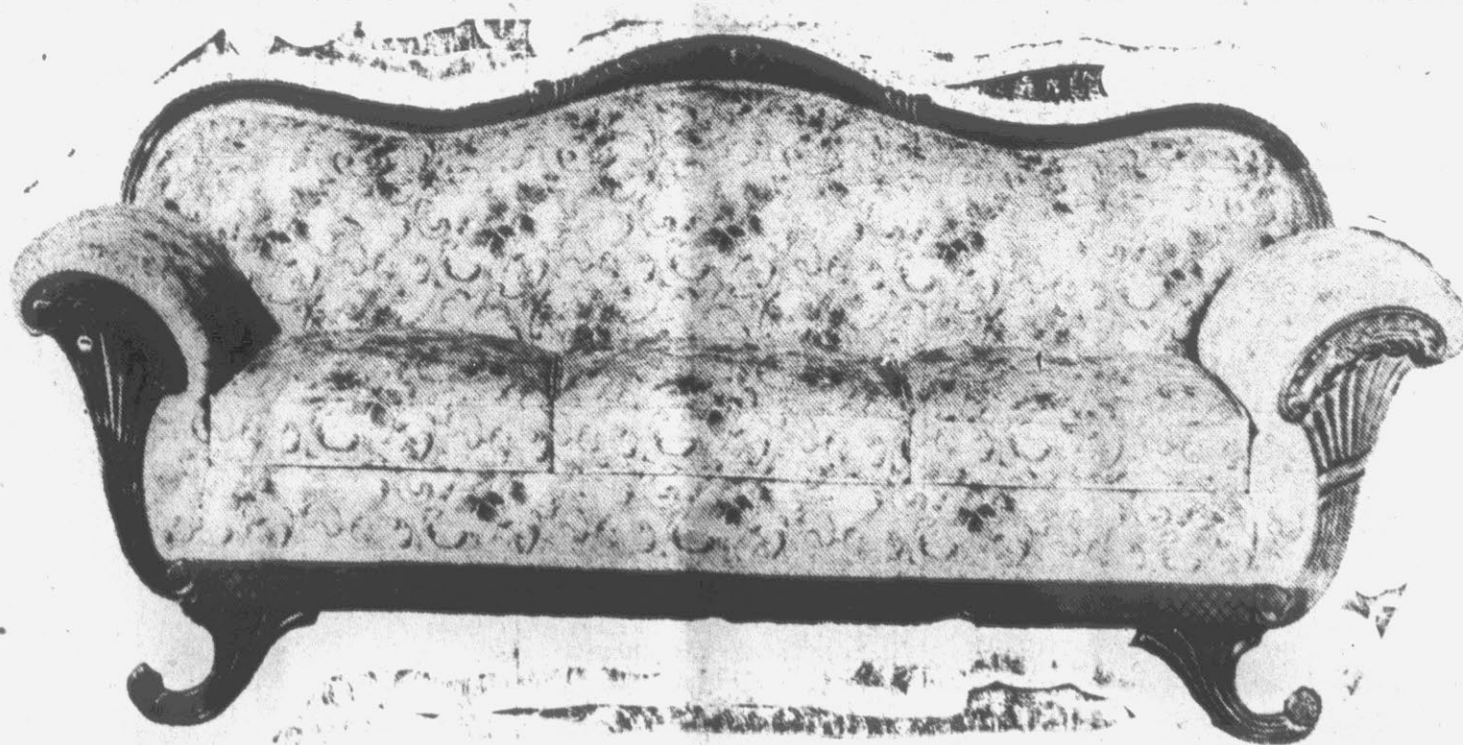

Strength FOR THE DAY

AN ANCIENT PROTEST
Often we read a book, an article, or a play without realizing that it is a tract for the times. Several books of the Old Testament—in addition to the prophecies—were of this nature, notably, Job, and the Book of Jonah. A number of the most successful novels in the nineteenth century were written to arouse public opinion against some evil.

One would hardly expect to find the Greek dramatists writing tracts for the times in which they lived, yet Euripides about 450 B.C. wrote "Trojan Women" in protest against the militarists of Athens. These war mongers had recently declared war on an inoffensive city, sacked it, killed the men, and sold the women into slavery. In this play "Trojan Women" Euripides pictured the agonies women suffer as the result of the criminal ambitions of men which precipitate war.

Some of the tenderest passages in all literature are found in this play. The wall of Andromache over the death of her child, and of Hecuba over the destruction of her city and the death of her grandchild are passages which make one realize that human emotions were as deep centuries ago as they are today. Still the ravage of war continues, still men sharpen the sword and women weep.

WASHINGTON LETTER

Washington—In a neat little eight page pamphlet in the U.S. Women's Bureau is trying to help a young lady make up her mind about her job future after college.

The experts start out by telling the girl not to choose between marriage or career but to get ready for both home and job.

They advise against drifting along because "life's so uncertain." They warn that "the less you're sure of the more you need to plan."

"Don't expect to find THE job for you," the Women's Bureau says.

"Start with what you have and what you lack find out where these fit in the world of work; plot your course, keep on the beam, stay alert, shift direction as necessary with changing winds."

It adds that in planning, one should also work out a balance among work, home leisure and community and civic responsibilities.

The Women's Bureau says it's wise to investigate how many women are employed in an occupation in which you might be interested.

"Large numbers mean more jobs open each year as workers leave, and more likelihood of employment almost anywhere."

It says more than 250,000 women are in each of these groups: stenographers, typists, secretaries, teachers, saleswomen, office clerks, bookkeepers, accountants, cashiers and professional nurses.

At least 25,000 or more are musicians, music teachers, social workers, college professors and instructors, librarians, physicians and dentists' assistants, religious workers, laboratory assistants and technicians, buyers, department heads, and owners of retail stores.

But fewer than 5,000 women are employed as airplane stewardesses, actresses, astronomers, radio commentators, photographers, geologists, lawyers and psychologists.

Women represent 75 percent of all librarians, professional nurses, home economists, medical hygienists, technicians, teachers, dental hygienists, physical and occupational therapists, stenographers, typists, doctors' and dentists' assistants, executive housekeepers, millers, and demonstrators.

But they represent less than five percent of all dentists, clergymen, physicians, engineers, pharmacists, chemists, veterinarians, architects, lawyers, draftsmen, airplane pilots and certified public accountants.

"Use summer jobs, part-time work, extra-curricular activities as try-out experiences," says the bureau.

And when the time comes for voting in Congress, provided Europe comes up with a plan, there'll be plenty of fighting in Congress.

So there's no telling now when Europe will get the help Marshall promised. But the promise has aroused tremendous hope in Europe. That hope already has had a startling effect. It's split Europe into two blocs: those lining up with the U.S. those lining up with Russia.

The nations meeting in Paris to take part in the plan are Britain, France, Austria, Belgium, the Netherlands, Luxembourg, Ireland, Iceland, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Switzerland, Italy, Portugal, Greece and Turkey.

The nations refusing to take part because they're tied in with Russia, which led the way in refusing, are Poland, Yugoslavia, Hungary, Romania, Bulgaria, Albania, Finland, Czechoslovakia.

The success or failure of the plan may mean a turning point in world history. European nations are in bad shape now.

With their own help and that of the United States, they may be able to get back on their own feet and stay there.

If the U.S. falls short on its so-far vague promises, those countries may be plunged into poverty and despair, and disillusioned about the U. S. turn to the leadership of Russia and communism.

Thus the last thing the U. S. wants to see happen, Russia has warned Europe that the U. S. thru the Marshall Plan, wants to dominate that continent.

U.S. officials insist our only in-

tervention is to help Europe get on its feet.

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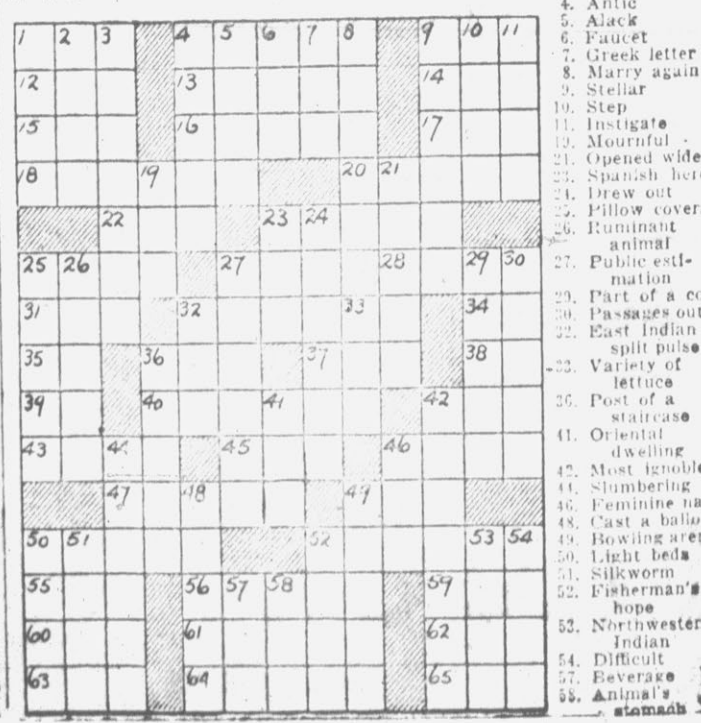
