

OPPOSITION TO
TRUMAN FLOOD
CONTROL PLANBackers Privately
Give Up Hope For
Action This Year;
See Struggle

Washington, July 17—(AP)—President Truman's request for \$200,000,000 now to launch a ten-year, \$6,000,000,000 flood control and river development program bumped into stern and powerful opposition today.

"It is a scatterfire and poorly conceived plan," Chairman Taber (R-NY) of the House Appropriations Committee which must pass on the request told reporters.

"There is no possibility of legislation this year," added Chairman Dondero (R-Mich.) of the House Public Works Committee, which has jurisdiction over river programs up to the point where the Appropriations Committee takes over.

With that opposition to start with and Congress in its waning days, even the most optimistic backers of the President's plan privately gave up hope for action this year.

"There's nothing we can do until next year, and it will be a fight even then," one of them said.

In a special message to Congress yesterday, Mr. Truman said the recent devastating floods in the Missouri and Mississippi valleys make it imperative that something be done quickly.

The President called flood control "the most pressing problem" in river development.

"It is a problem of desperate urgency," he said. "What we need to do is to take immediate advantage of the Mississippi basin authorizations—totaling almost six billion dollars—which the Congress has already voted for flood control and related purposes."

Saying more than half of the total authorized is directly or closely related to flood control, Mr. Truman added:

"Let us through the next ten years accelerate our program and put this money to work."

For a starter, the President said he wants \$227,000,000 for Army engineer projects, most of them flood control; \$100,000,000 for reclamation projects; and \$300,000,000 for soil conservation work.

Flood Control Plea

President Asks Congress For Money To Do Real Job;
Army Engineers Have Plans; Mississippi River Basin,
Big Problem; Huge Area Involved In Proposal

Washington, July 17—(AP)—President Truman has called upon Congress to do a real job with flood control, fast.

What he's asking Congress for is money. The U. S. Army engineers have the plans.

But this is an economy-minded Congress all for cutting expenses, and it's not likely to do much of what Mr. Truman asks.

It's time for doing is short. It quits for 1947 this month.

This is the second time in 1947 the President has asked Congress for big action. The first time was in January. The second was yesterday.

In short, this is what he said: "The engineers have the plans and they've been doing what flood control they could with the money Congress has allowed them."

But at the rate they're going—or, rather, at the rate Congress has been dishing out money—the plans will take 40 years to finish.

Mr. Truman is asking Congress to vote enough money to finish the job in 10 years.

The great problem of flood control is in the Mississippi River basin, or

BUDGET NEXT
FISCAL YEAR
IS APPROVEDCity's Expenses No
Greater Than Last
Year; Supplement-
ed School Funds

The Board of Aldermen at a recent meeting adopted the budget for the next fiscal year which anticipates an income of \$226,351.11 and expenditure of the same amount. The city's total tax levy is \$163,363.26; the balance is derived from other sources. The budget is printed as an advertisement in today's paper.

The city tax rate last year was \$1 on the \$100 property valuation.

Mayor Jack Boyd today explained that the city administration's expenditures this year will be about the same as last. He said the recent election authorizing special levy of 15 cents on the hundred for schools will make the rate \$1.15. He added that of the \$1.15 tax collected 70 cents of it goes for the city's expenses, and 40 cents for the schools. In most cities and towns the county handles the school funds, but in Greenville it has been a custom for many years for the city to handle them.

Incidentally, city tax elections last year were the best in years.

Of Bonds In Pitt

Mr. J. H. Waldrop, County Chairman of the U. S. Savings Bonds Division for Pitt County, announced today that, according to information received from Allison James, State Director of the U. S. Savings Bonds Office in Greensboro, the sales of U. S. Savings Bonds for the period June 1 through June 30, for Pitt County, totaled \$34,978.00. Broken down into two series the sales were: E Bonds \$31,378.00; G Bonds \$3,600.00.

Sales of Savings Bonds for the State of North Carolina for the same period were: E Bonds \$3,634,895.25; F Bonds \$289,950.50 and G Bonds \$2,059,200.00. Total State sales of the three series were \$5,984,045.75.

Standard Arms

Washington, July 17—(AP)—The House Foreign Affairs Committee today approved legislation calling for arms standardization and military cooperation between the countries of the Western Hemisphere.

The committee action limited the United States expenditure to \$500,000 for a five year program.

Chances of the bill's passage at this session of Congress appear slight in view of the drive for adjournment by the end of the next week. The measure thus will probably lie over the action early next year.

Before stamping its approval on the bill, the committee wrote in an amendment to provide that execution of the program must be consistent with the United States "good neighbor" program.

REVEAL PLANS
FOR TRAININGServices To Train
850,000 Annually If
UMT Bill OK'd

Washington, July 17—(AP)—Army and Navy plans to train 850,000 teen-age youths annually if Congress approved universal military training legislation were outlined today to a House Armed Services Subcommittee.

The leadoff witness for the armed forces, Lt. Gen. Lawton Collins, emphasized that the Army would approach the program from a "strictly military" standpoint.

He estimated that every year 1,200,000 youths attain the age of 18. The minimum for training under the proposed law which the committee is considering. Of these, he said statistics indicate that 200,000 would be unsuitable for military training and 150,000 would volunteer in the Army or the Navy.

Of the remaining 850,000, he said, the Army would train 618,000 and the Navy 182,000. Trainees would be given the option, within limits, of taking their six-months training course in the Army Ground or Air Forces, the Navy or the Marine Corps.

Present plans call for quarterly induction schedules.

The subcommittee expects to complete its hearings this week and report on the bill to the full committee next week.

Movie Too Much
For Britishers

London, July 17—(AP)—The facts of life were proving too strong for London moviegoers today.

Six times the revived American film, "The Birth of a Baby," was shown at a West End theater, and six times members of the audience needed reviving themselves. They fainted—four persons at one performance, eight at another, six at a third.

"It's been like this ever since the film opened," said a perspiring us'er. "Forty a day keel over sometimes. I don't know why—nothing in the film shocks me. I just have to keep carrying the swooners out."

Names Board To
Select Students

Washington, July 17—(AP)—President Truman today named a board of 10 educators and officials to select American students who will study abroad with expenses paid by sales of war surplus.

Congress approved the arrangement last year. The State Department said 22 countries—not including Soviet Russia—are presently eligible to take part.

Approximately 12,000 students have applied for scholarships; the first is expected to leave in a year.

MORE MEAT IN
PROSPECT FOR
COMING FALLInstitute Says Lower
Prices Ahead Unless
Wage Increases Are
Granted

Washington, July 17—(AP)—The American Meat Institute declared today—with reservations—that the nation faces the cheerful prospect of more meat at "moderately lower" prices this fall.

J. R. Eggert, the institute's associate director of marketing, said in a statement prepared for the joint congressional committee on the economic report that his organization expects a 15 percent increase in meat supplies by autumn.

"It follows," Eggert said "that moderately lower prices may be looked for at that time unless there are more wage increases and other developments which would further increase the public demand for meat."

He added that current meat prices, generally high, are "simply the result of more people having more money and wanting more meat than ever before, at a time when supplies are seasonally low."

Eggert's statement was submitted to the committee on the last day of a series of hearings to find out what can be done about stabilizing prices and the economy generally.

The institute official cited these principal reasons for the rise in meat prices since January:

1. A seasonal, 10 to 15 percent decline in supplies.

2. An increase in weekly wages in industry "to an all-time high."

3. A record peak of 60,000,000 persons employed, an increase of about four percent since the start of the year.

Contributing to the pressure on prices, Eggert added, is the fact that storage stocks of meat are smaller than the prewar average.

PLEA RESCUES
AID PROGRAMMarshall Halts Econ-
omy Knife In For-
eign Relief Funds

Washington, July 17—(AP)—An eleventh hour plea by Secretary of State Marshall was reported today to have rescued almost the entire \$1,475,000,000 foreign aid program from the economy knife poised over it by the House Appropriations Committee.

Committee members told a reporter that as the result of a personal appeal by Marshall to Speaker Martin (R-Mass.) and other GOP leaders tentatively to:

1. Approve the full \$400,000,000 asked by President Truman to carry out the Greek-Turkish aid program;

2. Grant "substantially all" of the \$350,000,000 requested for the relief in liberated nations;

3. Provide the Army with most of the \$725,000,000 it has sought for relief and administrative work in occupied countries. One committee member said the committee will recommend "in the neighborhood of \$500,000,000" with the understanding that the Army can return early next year for more if needed. The entire \$725,000,000 was for use until next June 30.

Congress already has approved the Greece-Turkey aid and the relief program for liberated nations but the funds to put them into full effect have yet to be appropriated.

Ask Commission
To Visit Camps

Jerusalem, July 17—(AP)—Moshe Shertok, head of the political department of the Jewish Agency, appealed anew to the United Nations Palestine Commission today to visit at least a few Jewish displaced persons camps in Europe before writing its report.

"Please visit these camps," Shertok pleaded in a personal appearance before the commission. "They form an integral part of your inquiry, for the life led by Jews there touches the substance of the whole issue."

Shertok said he had sought a peaceful solution but had been "frustrated by Dutch demands."

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Separate Peace With Japs Is
Alternative Facing Russians

Washington, July 17—(AP)—Despite the widening split between Russia and the western allies in Europe, American officials voiced hope today that Moscow will agree to Japanese peace treaty talks free of any big veto power.

If the Kremlin rejects the United States proposal which it now has under consideration, this government will be faced with deciding whether to go ahead with a separate treaty with Japan—that is, one without Soviet participation.

Unlike her position in Germany, Russia has no occupation forces in Japan and controls no Japanese territory. Hence officials here contend such a separate peace with a functioning Japanese government could be made to work.

The American proposal for a veto-free conference of 11 nations to begin work on the Japanese treaty was announced yesterday. It is a radical departure from European

peace-making procedures in two respects.

In the first place the conference would make decisions by a two-thirds vote, with or without concurring votes of the big powers.

In the second place the treaty drafting would be done not alone by the great powers but by seven other nations as well, each with a primary interest in the Japanese settlement.

The countries which the United States proposed for participation are the big four of the Far East—America, Britain, China, and Russia—plus the Philippines, India, Australia, New Zealand, France, the Netherlands and Canada.

In the case of Europe Russia flatly opposed any such wide participation and insisted that those treaties be written by the European big four—America, Britain, Russia and France.

Eventually, the American plan contemplates a full dress general peace conference to be attended by all of the 48 nations which were—and technically still are—at war with Japan.

Guerrillas Escape Trap
Set Up By Greek ArmySTRIKE LOOMS
IN INDONESIADutch Forecast War
After Negotiations
Reach New Discord

Batavia, Java, July 17—(AP)—War between the Netherlands and the Indonesian Republic was forecast by Dutch sources today following a new disagreement in negotiations for a joint national government for the United States of Indonesia.

One high-level Netherlands informant said the Dutch were expected to decide before nightfall whether to undertake military action against the republic. He indicated that such action was extremely likely.

This informant declared that a new crisis of "extraordinary gravity" had grown out of Republican Premier Amir Sjarifoeddin's refusal to issue a cease-fire order to Indonesian forces last midnight. He said this broke a pledge the premier made yesterday.

In a radio speech earlier from his capital of Jogjakarta, the premier told Indonesians the situation was critical. He said the Dutch attitude showed "they want to avoid the ways of peace."

"Let us be alert," he went on. "We must organize all forces and powers under our command. But never forget the ways of peace. However, we must be prepared should the Dutch choose another way."

Sjarifoeddin said he had sought a peaceful solution but had been "frustrated by Dutch demands."

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LAUNCH PROBE
OF ELECTION
SEN. KILGORECharges Of Vote
Fraud In West Vir-
ginia Go Under In-
quiry By Senate

Washington, July 17—(AP)—The Senate Rules Committee launched a full-scale investigation today into charges of fraud in last fall's election of Senator Kilgore, West Virginia Democrat.

Simultaneously, Senator Kern (R-Mo.) insisted that the Senate itself pass on his resolution for a complete inquiry into what he has termed the Justice Department's failure to conduct a full investigation of alleged irregularities in the August, 1946, Kansas City primary.

The rules committee voted unanimously last night for the West Virginia probe. It involves the reelection of Kilgore, whose official margin over Tom Sweeney, the Republican nominee, was 3,534 votes out of a total of more than a half million.

Kilgore's aides said he had no immediate comment.

The committee declared "it appears from x x x preliminary investigation that vote frauds, election irregularities, and the purchase of votes were prevalent" in the West Virginia election.

A subcommittee headed by Senator Jenner (R-Ind.) recommended the general inquiry after a spot check in two counties. It will be conducted in 12 counties cited by Sweeney in his complaint—Boone, Cabell, Fayette, Kanawha, Logan, Mercer, Mingo, Monroe, McDowell, Raleigh, Wayne and Wyoming.

Forty per cent of the votes in the state were cast in the 12 counties. The committee will push the work immediately. Eight staff members already are in West Virginia and Jenner said eight more will be sent there for "a general, detailed and specific" investigation. He said ballots already have been impounded.

Banks Of State Making More Loans Farmers

Reflecting the increased costs of producing crops and the availability of more equipment, the volume of bank credit used by North Carolina farmers is currently higher than it was a year ago, according to W. H. Woolard, president Guaranty Bank & Trust Co., who represents the North Carolina Bankers Association as Pitt county key banker.

However, North Carolina farm families are probably in the strongest financial position that they have ever been, W. H. Woolard said. "Continuing high farm incomes make it possible to finance operations out of income and when credit is used, it is retired when crops are sold."

Reporting on the results of a third national survey of bank lending made by the Agriculture Bankers Association of the American Bankers Association, Woolard said that North Carolina farmers used only a portion of the bank credit available to them during 1946. However, the 297 insured commercial banks which serve agriculture in this state made 187,686 loans to 75,706 farmers. These loans aggregated \$67,209,000, of which \$23,400,000 remained outstanding on January 1, 1947. Banks had at least \$199,815,000 available for additional loans to farmers if the demand existed.

During 1946, loans on farm real estate in North Carolina increased slightly. There were 6,731 farm mortgages made for a total amount of \$15,668,000; and \$15,046,000 of this volume remained outstanding on January 1, 1947. The farm mortgage debt is higher than it was a year ago, although it still remains only about one-half of the volume that existed in the comparable period following World War I.

Woolard said "we are encouraging North Carolina farmers to round out

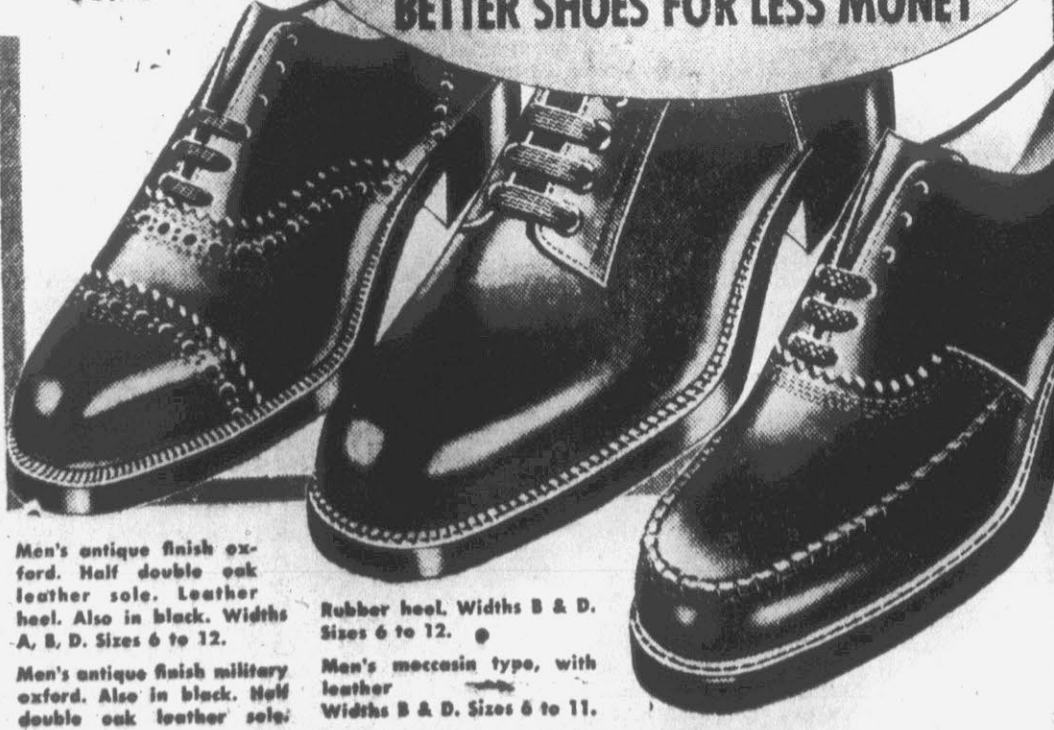

HEREDITY WORKS BOTH WAYS
Heredity is a mighty factor in life. We come into this world with nothing in our natures but those characteristics passed on to us by our forebears. But the combinations are of infinite variety, working sometimes to our detriment and at other times to our satisfaction.

Not twenty skilled workmen have appeared among this 1200, and most of these received their training in prison. Of the women descendants more than one-half have been conspicuous for their abandoned lives.

Everyone today is a descendant of a notable ancestor. We can easily start generations on trek to mountain tops or down a rough pathway to desolation and pain.

WASHINGTON LETTER

BY JANE EADS
Washington—The Commission of Fine Arts, created by congressional act in 1910, aims to "secure the progressive development of Washington as the well-ordered, unified, and grand capital of a great nation."

Composed of seven well qualified judges of the fine arts, appointed by the President for four-year terms, it meets in the capital once a month.

The commission has a big job. It advises upon:

Location of statues, fountains, and monuments in the public squares, streets and parks of the District of Columbia.

Selection of models for statues, fountains and monuments erected by the United States.

Selection of artists for their execution.

Same for coins, medals and insignia.

Plans and designs for public structures and parks in the District.

All questions involving matters of art in which the Federal government is concerned.

The commission recently held an all-day session in which it approved a proposal to start a library of the life-masks of notable Americans.

It also approved District plans for an underpass, twin bridges and architectural features for another underpass already begun, and preliminary plans for completion of the State Department's new building at 21st St. and Virginia Ave.

In addition, the commission ascended the Washington Monument to study a proposal for new airplane warning lights recommended by the Civil Aeronautics Administration.

The CAA suggested beacon-type flashing lights to replace the present fixed ones on this "the commission took no action."

The commission was the outcome of the Senate Park Commission of 1901, which formulated plans for development of the park system of the District of Columbia and the location of future government buildings and memorials.

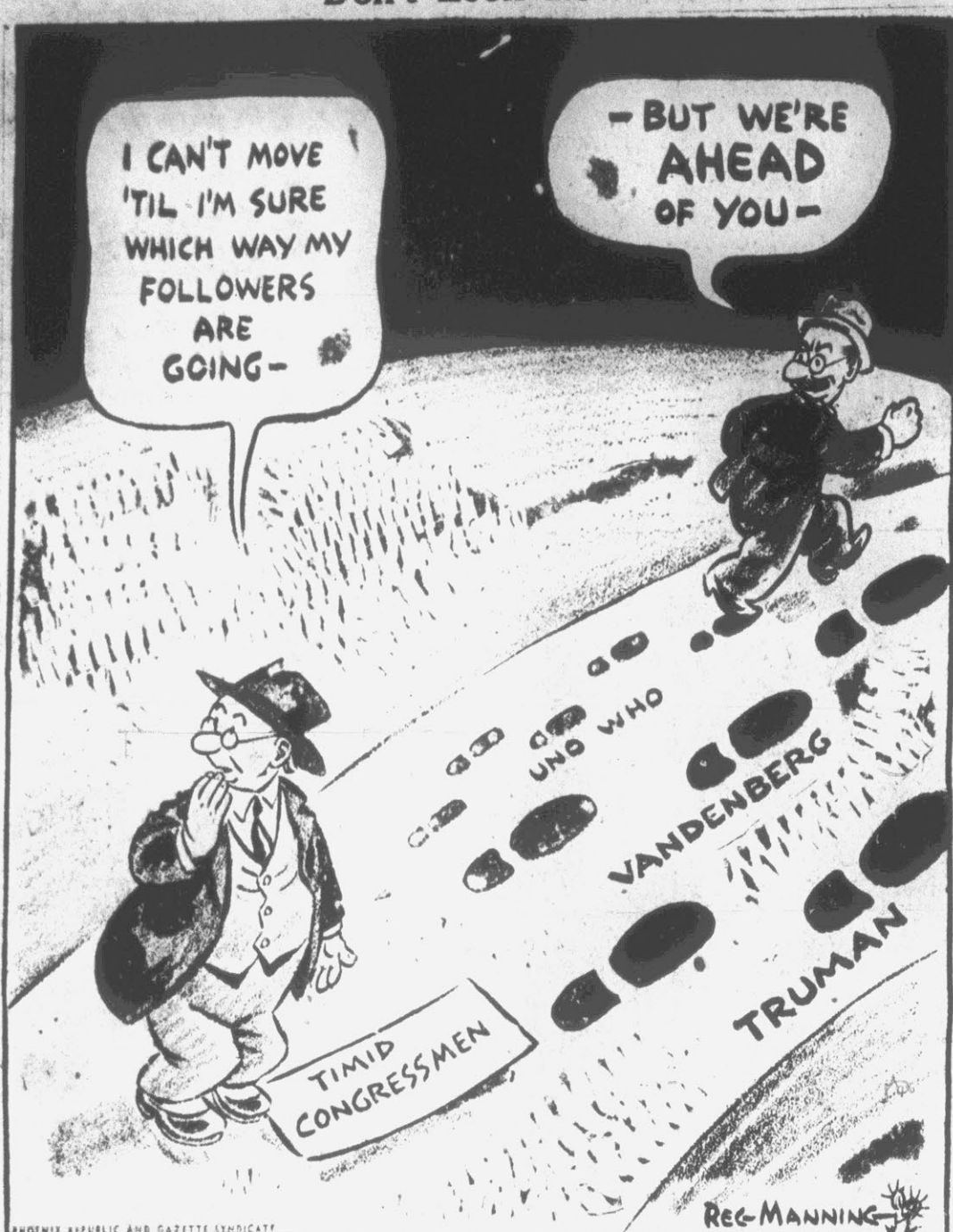
These plans of 1901 were based on the plan of the national capital prepared by Pierre Charles L'Enfant in 1792 under the direction of President Washington.

The commission's advice is often sought by the presidential family whenever new furnishings are needed, or old ones replaced in the state rooms on the lower floor of the White House.

drive for the expansion of communism under direction of the Comintern in Moscow.

Well, the war came. Russia and Germany signed their non-aggression pact and, with this in his pocket, Hitler lashed out. Then he attacked the Soviet Union—which was not according to Hoyle. However, although Russia suffered previously herself, with allied aid she emerged strong enough to undertake a wholesale expansion of her sphere of influence. This has resulted in the establishment of Communist controlled governments throughout Eastern Europe—and the expansion continues.

Naturally all Moscow's activities have been dominated by the central idea of spreading communism and thereby strengthening Russia's own position. You see that in the methods employed in establishing domination over the countries of Eastern Europe, and in the obstructions created in the United Nations and in the various European conferences. You see it in Moscow's refusal to cooperate in the economic rehabilitation of Europe.

So the greatest problem of the United States and the other democracies is to deal with this Red world revolution. One method is to put weak nations on their feet so that they can withstand the political attack, and that is the immediate objective in Europe.

However the revolution isn't confined to Europe, though that's where we notice it most. Its tentacles reach around the globe, as anyone can see with half an eye if he looks about him.

After the disastrous lower Mississippi River flood in 1927, Congress told the engineers to do a flood control job there.

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WELCOME TAX ISSUE IN '48

**Rayburn Says Demos
Willing To Accept
Challenge By GOP**

Washington, July 17—(AP)—House Democratic Leader Rayburn declared today the Democratic party welcomes a Republican challenge to make the \$4,000,000,000 GOP tax-cutting bill an issue in the 1948 presidential campaign.

"The Democratic party is for the proper kind of tax reduction at the proper time," the Texan told reporters. "But if the Republicans want to throw this kind of tax bill into the campaign, we'll welcome the issue."

"This bill gives a great many people too much and a great many more too little."

President Truman's second veto of the bill is due to reach the house tomorrow. The measure is identical with the one he vetoed June 16, except that the effective date of the tax reduction is changed from July 1, 1947 to January 1, 1948.

The bill trims taxes from 30 per cent on the lowest taxable incomes to 10.5 per cent on income over \$302,000.

Most Republicans concede they cannot muster a two-thirds majority in the Senate to override the second veto, although the House is expected to do so.

Rayburn's comment came after Chairman Knutson (R-Minn.) of the House Ways and Means Committee, author of the bill, declared: "The tax issue will be carried into the 1948 campaign. If submitted to the voters—there are 49,500,000 taxpayers—it would be a very, very lively campaign issue."

Australian Vets To Get War Gratuity

Canberra, Australia, July 16.—Citing natives of New Guinea and Papua for their war services, Prime Minister Joseph Chifley said that those serving with the Australian forces would be paid a war gratuity. The payment, he said, would be on a monthly basis for services at Pearl Harbor and would include men in the auxiliary services.

Shipwrecks Of War Make Good Fishing

Morehead City, N.C.—German submarines sank more than 40 ships off this part of the North Carolina coast during the war, and these wrecks now are providing superior fishing areas.

The sunken hulks have become surrounded with grasses and other marine vegetation. Small fish and crustacea have found them good feeding grounds. Big game fish, in turn, have been drawn by the abundance of these smaller fish on which they feed.

Fishermen now report finding giant amberjack, dolphin, cabio, bonita, halibut and many other species in greater numbers than ever before.

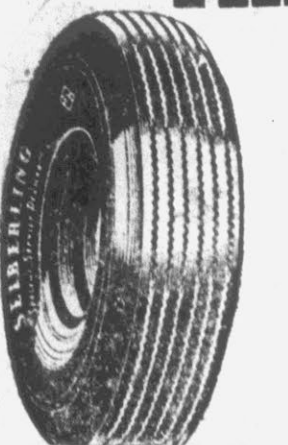

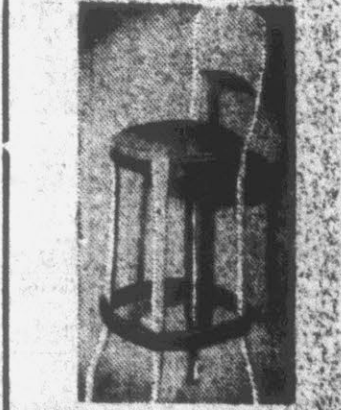

ENLIST MEN FOR BATTERY

Organize National Guard Outfit In Greenville; Seek Recruits

By CHESTER WALSH
The American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars and other local organizations have endorsed the new Greenville unit of the North Carolina National Guard and other agencies are planning to cooperate in recruiting the battery up to the standard quota. Other cities wanted the unit and tried to get it. It's now up to the people of Greenville and Pitt County to take an active part in organizing the battery, Mayor Jack Boyd said today.

Capt. James B. Tyndall is the commanding officer. 1st Lieut. Clay Burnette is executive officer and Sherman Parks is first sergeant. They are veterans of World War II. The Greenville armory, leased to the American Legion during the war, has been formally turned over to the National Guard by the Greenville Board of Aldermen and the Pitt County Commissioners.

The battery must have 20 members recruited to be officially recognized by the adjutant general. The unit's full quota will be 85 officers and enlisted men, it is understood. Sgt. Parks said last night the unit will be known as Battery C, 690th Field Artillery. Drills will be held weekly—12 drills during a quarter—and the pay scale is from \$2.50 to \$5.50 per drill.

The battery will attend National Guard summer encampments and the rate of pay will be the same as in the regular army.

Plans for the new Battery C include special facilities for recreation for the officers and men.

The commanding officer, executive officer and first sergeant will be at the armory each night from 7:30 to 10 o'clock, except Saturdays, to give information and take enlistments. They will be there Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

(c) That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the bonds as issued, when the same shall become due, shall be annually levied and collected by Pitt County on the taxable property situated within said county.

(d) A statement of the county debt of Pitt County has been filed with the clerk of the Board of Commissioners of Pitt County, Hon. J. D. Joyner, and the said statement is open to public inspection at his office in the courthouse in the City of Greenville, North Carolina.

(e) This order will become effective thirty (30) days after the date of an election called pursuant to the provisions of the County Finance Act for securing the approval of the voters of Pitt County and provided that in such election the issuance of these bonds shall be approved by the number of voters required to approve such bonds or the issuance of such bonds under the terms and provisions of the County Finance Act, the same being Article "9" of Chapter 153 of the General Statutes of North Carolina.

Graziano TKO's Zale After A Furious Fight

Chicago, July 17.—(AP)—Rocky Graziano, tough, tough-haired pugilist from the streets of New York, who looks just like he had stepped out of an alley, reigned today as middleweight boxing champion of the world.

The 35-year-old Graziano, fighting to regain himself from the stigma of suspension in New York state, battered the 33-year-old titleholder Tony Zale to pitiful helplessness in the Chicago Stadium last night.

Graziano, himself previously on a verge of a knockout, was declared the winner on a technical knockout 2 minutes 10 seconds after the start of the sixth round. The punch came at almost the exact time that Zale had come from behind to knock out Graziano in their first engagement in New York last Sept. 27.

The savagely fought battle, scheduled for 15 rounds, was witnessed by a swelling, howling crowd of 12,247 which established an all-time indoor gate by paying \$422,918. Zale, champion since 1940, came to the end of his trail with tragic suddenness. Up to the end of the fifth round, two judges and Referee Johnny Behr had voted him leading on points by a safe margin for carrying the attack to the challeng-

er. Zale had gashed a cut over Graziano's left eye. His right eye was rapidly closing and his nose was bleeding and out.

In the third round, Zale, who weighed 150 to 155 1/4 for the challenger, had all but finished Graziano. Bleeding Rocky was badly hurt and staggering under Zale's punishing blows to the head and body. A short right to the chin had floored Graziano but he was up before the count started.

In the fourth, Graziano drove a terrific right to Zale's body—a devastating punch that started Zale to his finish. Zale, however, courageously tried to carry the battle to his opponent, but the punishing power of his blows was fading.

Zale started to wilt in the fifth. His tempo slowed. He labored out with the pride of a falling champion, but failed to hurt Graziano and at the end of the round he was visibly tired. Then came the dramatic sixth and finish.

Zale still rushed to attack and pinned the challenger in Tony's own corner. As Zale moved in, Graziano countered with a blasting right to the jaw, thrown with all the power of the youth. Zale reeled backwards, his hands dropped to his side. Graziano knew that Zale was hurt and he opened up in a fury of blows. Connecting solidly with a left hook and a right to the chin, Zale's eyes glazed and he staggered back, groping blindly for support.

Once Zale stabbed with a left in a vain attempt to halt Graziano's charges. But Rocky swept in with another right to the jaw, and Zale, completely helpless, sagged under the top strand of the ropes. Referee Behr pulled Rocky away.

As the timekeeper shouted "three," Behr pushed Graziano to a neutral corner and ended the fight.

TWO CAROLINA PEAKS NAMED

Former Governor And Guide Honored In Yancey County

Washington, July 17.—The U. S. division of geography approved today the naming of two of North Carolina's tallest peaks, sometimes known as the Black Brothers, in honor of a former governor and a former guide.

Upon the recommendation of the N. C. Board of Conservation and Development, official U. S. maps of Yancey county which formerly listed the Black Brothers henceforth will show:

Mount Craig, 6,663 feet high, in Mount Mitchell State Park, almost a mile northeast of Mount Mitchell; named for Locke Craig, North Carolina governor from 1913 to 1917, who died in 1925. This mountain also had been known as Balsam Cone.

Big Tom, 6,593-foot peak, also known as Hairy Bear, a mile northeast of Mount Mitchell; named for Tom Wilson, noted bear hunter who in 1857 discovered the body of a prominent southern scientist, Eliza Mitchell, on the mountain that now bears the scientist's name.

The division based its choice upon opinions expressed by historians and officials of both states and upon local usage. Unless good evidence is received within the interim period, the decisions will become final 30 days hence.

Poland Blames Greeks For Current Strife

Lake Success, July 17.—(AP)—Poland joined Russia today in blaming Greece for the current Balkan disorders and demanded formation of a new coalition government in Greece, new elections and the immediate withdrawal of foreign military personnel.

Poland's views were stated by Dr. Oscar Lange, United Nations Security Council president, as the council met in extraordinary session in an atmosphere intensified by the fighting in northern Greece.

"It is necessary that Greece be extricated from the network of international power politics," Lange said in demanding the withdrawal of foreign troops.

Lange said the primary trouble in the Balkans must be attributed to the internal situation in Greece, aggravated by the presence of foreign troops.

"Good Deed"

Chicago, July 17.—(AP)—Miss Alma Anderson, who lost her dog when a young girl—who desired to be a Girl Scout and do a "good deed"—took it for a walk and didn't return, has found her pet.

The girl, about 12, took the 7-year-old dog—Spotty—to a fire station near Miss Anderson's South Side home, it was disclosed yesterday.

There she begged the firemen to buy the dog. Her mother, she sobbed to the firemen, wouldn't let her keep the dog. The firemen collected \$2 which they gave her. Then they fed her cake and ice cream to stop her crying at being separated from her pet.

But Fireman James Joyce, who took the dog to his home as a pet for his family, read of Spotty's disappearance and he returned it to Miss Anderson.

TAFT-HARTLEY BILL PRAISED

Textile Official Sees Measure As "Bill Of Rights"

Blue Ridge, N.C., July 17.—(AP)—Thomas O. Moore, vice president and general counsel of the Hanes Knitting Company of Winston-Salem, said here today the Taft-Hartley bill "is really as much a step towards a bill of rights for the laboring man as it is a step toward granting industry equal rights with labor unions."

He spoke at the second day's session of the 28th annual conference on human relations in industry, through Saturday, has brought to this mountain resort some 800 industrialists of the southeast.

Moore deplored the "tendency of certain governmental agencies to usurp powers and functions not originally intended to be assigned to them, and through this maladministration, further the cause of union labor leaders."

He distinguished between these "union labor leaders" and the laboring man himself, who he said would be helped by the bill.

"One of our greatest problems today has been caused by the fact that in the last number of years certain groups in this great country of ours have consistently preached to the people a philosophy that the government should take care of the people rather than that the people should support and contribute their share to their government," he said.

Strike Ends But Workers Find Jobs Are Taken

Gaffney, S.C., July 17.—(AP)—Members of the Textile Workers Union of America, CIO, who returned today to the Gaffney Manufacturing Company textile plant after ending a 22-month strike, were faced with a company announcement that their jobs won't be immediately available, if at all.

Management had informed Franz Daniel, South Carolina TWU director, yesterday: "Only persons presently employed are permitted inside the company fence. If and when jobs are available, an applicant will be selected on his or her qualifications, without regard to (labor) affiliation."

The union claimed 550 members of the force of more than 700 at the beginning of the strike Sept. 11, 1945, following breakdown in negotiations on a contract which included union demand for a dues checkoff system. The plant resumed operation in April, 1946.

Governors Vote Confidence In Marshall's Goal

Salt Lake City, July 17.—(AP)—Secretary of State Marshall had a vote of "faith and confidence" from the nation's governors today but he lacked any specific approval of his plan for the economic rebuilding of Europe.

Turning to a day's play after ending their business session, governors generally interpreted a foreign policy resolution which they had adopted as a reiteration of their faith in the workability of the bi-partisan international policy.

But despite a personal plea by Marshall in a Monday night address for his backing for "a course of action fully consistent with our own national interests and yet equally considerate of the incalculable role which this company has in the preservation of European civilization," the resolution avoided any reference to Europe.

N.C. Law Frowns On Duelling

Raleigh, July 17.—(AP)—North Carolina law frowns sternly on duelling. Attorney General McMullan has ruled.

The attorney general said he was not sure whether the request for the ruling came from a would-be dueller or an eager law student, but according to his law, it's illegal to engage in a duel, to carry a challenge or to give any help or advice to duellists.

Rocky Mount, N.C., July 17.—(AP)—Playing with a 12 gauge shotgun left by their father in the garden a five year old boy accidentally shot and killed his two year old brother near here, Nash County's Deputy Sheriff G. W. Bone reported today.

The officer said that the tragedy occurred about 10 o'clock this morning on the farm of G. O. Drake when Drake's son Kenneth playfully aimed the gun at his brother Charles and pulled the trigger. The

The high cost of living resolution was sponsored by Senator Baldwin (R-Conn.). It calls for a full and complete study and investigation of the present high prices of consumer goods, with recommendations for legislation to be furnished the joint committee on the economic report by next January 1.
