REFUGEE SHIP CAPTURED BY BRITISH NAVY

Tear Gas, Steam Jets And Other Weapons Used By Immigrants In Fight

Jerusalem, July 18—(AP)—Some 4,500 angry Jewish immigrants aboard a refugee ship used tear gas, smoke bombs, steam jets and other weapons today in a vain battle against a 50-man British boarding party off the Palestine coast, British authorities announced.

Five British destroyers escorted the vessel toward Haifa, where the refugees will be transhipped to troopships for transfer to detention camps in Cyprus.

The announcement said no fatalities were suffered by either side, but that three members of the boarding party were injured.

A broadcast, purportedly emanating from the ship, had reported earlier that one Jew was killed and 25 were wounded seriously. The broadcast, which ended at about the time the boarding party took over, said five of the wounded were dying.

The British announcement said "small arms fire was used by one of His Majesty's ships against one man who was threatening to decapitate one of the boarding party with an axe, and against another man who was about to use a rifle."

"It is believed the fire missed in both cases, but it was effective. The two men took fright and dropped their weapons," the announcement said.

The refugee ship was identified as a former American vessel, the President Warfield, renamed by the immigrants Exodus, 1947.

The President Warfield, an 1814-ton steamer, was identified in Baltimore as a former excursion boat which saw service in the Normandy invasion in 1944 and later as a troopship.

Hagan, Jewish underground defense organization, was reported to have appealed to the United Nations special commission on Palestine to intervene in behalf of the immigrants.

More Survivors Found From Capsized Vessel

Bombay, India, July 18—(AP)—About 70 survivors were reported today to have been found out of 721 persons who were aboard the 400-ton coastal steamer Ramdas when she sank yesterday in the stormy Arabian Sea, 12 miles out of Bombay.

Manager L. Sheth of the Indian Cooperative Steam Navigation and Trading Company, Ltd., which owned the ship, gave this estimate on the basis of reports from villages and other places around Bombay Harbor.

Commander H. J. Mills, principal sea transport officer of the government of India, came here today and began an official inquiry into the disaster. He questioned some survivors this morning and expected to hear from the Captain and other ship's officers this afternoon.

The Bombay Port Trust, the Royal Indian Navy and many fishermen cooperated in the search for the survivors in a sea still running high from the week-old monsoon.

The 11-year-old Ramdas capsized under the impact of two tremendous waves and sank within five minutes near Gool Island.

The vessel at the time was near the end of her regular passenger run from this city to the fishing village of Revas, across Bombay harbor, with 673 passengers and three of the passengers were reported to be Europeans—including a woman and a child.

Dr. Oscar Lange of Portland, the council president, said the United States proposal for creation of a semi-permanent border watch on Greece's northern frontier would be voted on first.

House Committee Recommends Slash In Foreign Aid Spending

Appropriations Body Submits 12.6 Per Cent Cut; Sum Falls \$312 Millions Below Administration's Budget

Washington, July 18—(AP)—A 12.6 per cent cut in the Administration's \$1,548,361,000 foreign-aid spending program for this fiscal year was recommended today by the House Appropriations Committee.

Part of the reduction apparently was intended to express congressional annoyance at Russian ability to persuade Poland and Hungary to boycott the Paris European recovery program.

In recommending a total outlay of \$1,353,024,900, or \$195,336,500 less than President Truman asked, the committee said there "is a limit to the resources of this country, and the governments of other countries must not expect that relief from the United States is limitless."

The committee's action came after several high-ranking Republican members had publicly predicted and later privately disavowed drastic cuts in the program. Secretary of State Marshall made a personal appeal for the funds at a secret meeting with GOP leaders last week.

On the four major items in the immediate foreign-aid program the committee recommended this action in an overall \$1,603,199,094 supplemental appropriation bill:

1. Aid to Greece and Turkey: the full \$400,000,000 previously authorized by Congress.
2. Relief to war-devastated countries (Poland, Austria, China, Italy, Greece, Trieste and Hungary): \$332,000,000 of the \$350,000,000 requested. The \$18,000,000 cut, the committee

said, "represented the sum intended to go to certain countries which have not shown a disposition to comply with the requirements of the act authorizing the appropriation."

The committee did not name the countries, but members had threatened to curb aid to Hungary and Poland, Russian satellites that have boycotted the European economic conference.

3. International Refugee Organization: \$71,024,900 of the \$73,361,400 sought for U.S. participation in this organization set up to aid displaced persons.

CLOSE DEBATE OVER BALKANS

Involved Nations Assure Cooperation And Good Will

Lake Success, July 18—(AP)—The United Nations security council ended its general Balkan debate today and plunged immediately into the final phase of the case—a detailed discussion of the conflicting American and Russian plans of action.

As the general discussions came to a close, French delegate Parodi called on the representatives of Greece, Albania, Bulgaria and Yugoslavia to give assurances of their cooperation and good will.

Each of the four in turn expressed a desire to see the problem settled peacefully, and Parodi voiced his satisfaction that the debate had ended on a peaceful note rather than a note of mutual accusation.

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CONGRESSMEN VIEW LOGJAM

Legislation Piling Up; Adjournment Date Is Threatened

Washington, July 18—(AP)—Top-ranking Republican senators called a special strategy huddle today to lay out a plan for clearing the legislative logjam threatening their plans to adjourn Congress July 26.

Chairman Taft (Ohio) summoned his nine-man GOP Policy Committee to talk things over at a closed-door session.

Before they met most Republicans conceded privately that the adjournment outlook is getting no better fast.

The biggest threats are angry Senate-House arguments about how much Congress will allow regular government agencies to spend during the fiscal year that began 18 days ago.

Normally these detailed money bills are cleared before July 1. But today only four of the dozen regular departmental appropriations have cleared Congress.

Still another stumbling block is the demand of Senator Kem (Mo.) and other Republicans for a full-scale Senate probe of Kem's contention that Attorney General Clark sought to "whitewash" charges of vote frauds in the Kansas City Democratic Primary election last year.

Washington, July 18—(AP)—The White House announced today that Gen. Omar N. Bradley, Veterans Administration, will leave next month on a six weeks' tour to inspect army troops and installations in Europe and the Mediterranean area.

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Hedy Lamarr And Loder Divorced

Los Angeles, July 18—(AP)—Hedy Lamarr was free today of Actor John Loder's "indifference."

The 32-year-old actress was granted a superior court divorce decree yesterday when she testified that Loder, 49, her third husband, was "very casual in his attitude toward me and the children."

GREEK REBELS FLEE; PLANES KILLING MANY

Strafing From Air Said Inflicting Heavy Losses; Towns Said Ravaged

Athens, July 18—(AP)—A Greek communiqué said today Nationalist planes were inflicting severe losses guerrillas who were fleeing northeast of Ioannina before pursuing ground forces and ravaging villages on the way.

War Minister George Stratos said another and larger guerrilla offensive was expected along the north-west frontier. The Greek government said the first guerrilla band "invaded" Greece from Albania with the aim of setting up a separate communist government.

"Bandits passing through villages, have committed crimes of unimaginable brutality," the communiqué from the Greek 8th Division said. "Villages have been pillaged and many inhabitants killed."

Dislodged from the 7,000 foot heights of Mt. Gamilia, 18 miles north of Ioannina, the bulk of the 2,000-man guerrilla force started a march on lightly defended Ioannina five days ago. Loyalists asserted the irregulars had been cut into small units which were scattered in an arc over a wide rugged area 16 miles northeast of Ioannina near the villages of Frangadhes, Elatohori and Dholianin in the foothills of Mt. Timfi.

Farther north, Spitfire fighter planes caught more battalions in ravines along the southern foothills of Mt. Smolikas and were said to have inflicted crushing losses.

An unconfirmed report said 245 bodies were found in the ravine and that Army units captured 300 more of the estimated 850 rebels under fire.

An earlier official report said 60 were killed and 90 captured in the first phase of the attack.

DENHAM SEES LABOR GAINS

New NLRB Examiner Predicts Great Benefits In Labor Law

Washington, July 18—(AP)—Robert N. Denham, newly appointed key man behind the Taft-Hartley labor law, predicted today that under proper administration the new act will do a great deal to benefit both labor and industry.

As president Truman's choice for the powerful post of general counsel to the expanded national labor relations board, the 62-year-old Republican told a reporter:

"I believe the labor situation will clear itself up much more rapidly than some people believed."

He said he has no intention to use his powers under the new act to "dictate" labor relations.

"I don't think labor needs a czar," he declared. "Neither does industry."

Along with Denham, now an NLRB trial examiner, the president announced yesterday his two choices for the additional board memberships created by the act—Abe Murdock, former Democratic House member and senator from Utah, and Republican J. Copeland Gray, labor relations expert of Buffalo, N. Y.

All three jobs pay \$12,000 annually and the appointees are subject to Senate confirmation.

Murdock and Gray will serve with members of the existing board, including Chairman Paul Herzog, J. M. Houston and James J. Reynolds, Jr., whom Mr. Truman formally reappointed yesterday.

His Ashes Rest On Ocean Floor

Charleston, S.C., July 18—(AP)—The ashes of Henry L. Beck rested today on the bottom of the Atlantic Ocean—at the spot where he wished them to be.

Beck, superintendent of light-houses for the sixth lighthouse district for nearly a quarter-century, died in Atlanta June 23. After cremation, the ashes were brought here yesterday in a small metal container which was dropped during a military ceremony into the sea.

The burial spot was at the point where for many years the Charleston lightship guided mariners into the harbor.

Now On List

Washington, July 18—(AP)—Senate leaders today added legislation to permit immediate cashing of veterans' terminal leave bonds to their predeceasing list but clung to July 26 as their hoped-for quitting date.

The terminal leave pay plan, already approved unanimously by the House, calls for immediate cash payment of some \$1,800,000,000 in bonds issued to World War II veterans as compensation for earned leave which they were unable to take.

House Votes To Override Truman Veto Of Tax Bill

Tax-Cutting Bill Again Gets Presidential Veto

"Wrong Kind Of Tax Reduction" At The "Wrong Time" Declares Pres. Truman In His Message To The Lower House

Washington, July 18—(AP)—President Truman today sent Congress a second veto of the Republican-backed \$4,000,000,000 tax-cutting bill with the assertion it is still the "wrong kind of tax reduction" at the "wrong time."

Mr. Truman's veto message went to the House which originated the income tax slashing measure to become effective January 1. The first bill he vetoed was identical, except that it would have taken effect last July 1.

Since that veto, the president said, "there has been no lessening of the need to make substantial payments on the public debt."

Mr. Truman said that when the time comes to lessen the war time tax burden it should be reduced on a basis that is fair to low income groups as well as to high income groups.

Without specifying when he felt the time would be ripe for cutting taxes, the president asserted: "I am unequivocally committed to the right kind of tax reduction at the right time."

The Republican bill trims taxes from 30 per cent in the lowest taxable incomes to 10.5 per cent on incomes over \$302,000.

But Mr. Truman termed this measure "a premature and faulty tax reduction bill" which would inject into the tax system "inequities which would greatly increase the difficulty of making desirable revisions."

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NO CEREMONY ON SIGNATURE

Truman Signs Succession Bill As Part Of Daily Routine

Washington, July 18—(AP)—President Truman today signed a presidential succession bill placing Speaker Joseph Martin (R-Mass.) in line to replace him in the event Mr. Truman is unable to complete his term.

The legislation, which Mr. Truman requested immediately after he entered the White House and vacated the vice-presidency, was signed as part of the presidential routine.

There was none of the ceremony that sometimes accompanies the signing of important measures.

Press Secretary Charles C. Ross, who told reporters of the signing, said he knows of no plans to assign a Secret Service agent to protect Martin.

Until Mr. Truman signed the legislation, Secretary of State Marshall had been next in line to the presidency.

The new bill outlining order of presidential succession places the Speaker immediately behind the vice-president.

The president pro tempore of the Senate—now Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.)—is next in line of succession after the Speaker of the House.

Behind Flood Control

Other Important Benefits Involved Other Than Merely Stopping Floods; Topsoil Is Saved; Power Is Provided; Irrigation And Recreation Are Included

Washington, July 18—(AP)—If done right, flood control does a number of things besides stopping floods.

It saves the nation's topsoil from washing away. And it dams up water for electric power, irrigation and recreation.

Flood control is planned by the U. S. Engineers, but Congress must okay the plans and vote the money for the work.

The work itself is done by private contractors, who bid for the jobs, under the guidance of the engineers.

Floods are stopped in a number of ways, for example, take the lower Mississippi river.

Surpass Necessary Two-Thirds Majority; Senate Expected To Sustain President And Kill Measure; GOP Leaders Say Failure Will Mean Big Campaign Issue

Washington, July 18—(AP)—The House voted today to override President Truman's second veto of the Republican-backed \$4,000,000,000 tax cut. But indications are that the Senate may sustain the President and thus kill the bill.

The House vote to override was 229 to 108, 28 more than the necessary two-thirds majority.

A total of 63 Democrats joined 236 Republicans in the vote to override the President.

Chairman Taft (R-Ohio) told reporters the Senate Republican Policy Committee will press for a vote later today on the veto.

A powerful Republican-Democrat coalition rolled up in the House the more than two-thirds majority necessary to overthrow the veto.

The House roll call showed a substantial shift of Democrats in support of the measure, which provides for tax reduction effective Jan. 1, 1948. The chamber previously had voted 268 to 137—two short of the required two-thirds—to sustain Mr. Truman's veto of the first bill which would have made the cuts effective last July 1.

If the Senate should upset predictions and vote to override, the bill will provide cuts ranging from 30 percent in the lowest taxable incomes to 10.5 percent on incomes over \$302,000.

Republicans virtually conceded the Senate will pitch the new measure in the scrap heap. The chamber voted 60 to 32 to pass the bill—two votes short of two-thirds majority that will be required to make the bill law over the veto.

GOP leaders say failure of the Senate to override will erase 20 prospects of relief for 49,000,000 income taxpayers next year. They promised to throw the tax issue into the 1948 presidential campaign.

Republican National Chairman Carroll Reece said "it will be quite satisfactory from the Republican standpoint to have Mr. Truman campaign next year for a fifth term or the New Deal with the slogan, 'Relief for everyone but the American taxpayer.'"

Washington, July 18—(AP)—Seven members of the North Carolina House delegation voted with 56 other Democrats and 236 Republicans to override President Truman's veto of the income tax bill.

They were Reps. Herbert Bonner Bulwinkle, Doughton, Durham, Jones, Kerr and Redden.

The five other members, Barden, Clark, Cooley, Deans and Folger, voted with 100 other Democrats and two Republicans to sustain the veto.

Would Return 13 Italian Ships

Washington, July 18—(AP)—The House Commerce Committee today approved legislation to give Italy 13 merchant ships as compensation for an equal number of vessels lost or seized in the war.

The bill, already approved by the Senate, also provides for return of \$60,000,000 in war time seized Italian property after deductions of sums necessary to meet claims of U. S. citizens who suffered losses in Italy during the war.

Backed by the administration as a part of a program to stabilize Italy against communist pressure, the legislation restores 13 Italian ships now in American hands.

Slavery Trial In Final Stages

San Diego, Calif., July 18—(AP)—Final arguments in the slavery trial of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Wesley Invals, whose ancestors are linked with the Revolutionary and Civil War battles for freedom, began in Federal Court today.

The jury, which will decide whether the 64-year-old Massachusetts lawyer and legislator and his wife 62, are guilty or innocent, is expected to get the case tomorrow.

Judge J. Weinburger at the conclusion of testimony late yesterday denied a defense motion to declare the couple innocent of the charge they enslaved negro maid Dora Jones, now 58, through years of drudgery and threats.

Conciliatory Talk By Premier Of Indonesia

Batavia, Java, July 18—(AP)—Indonesian Premier, Amir Sjarifoeddin said in a radio speech today the republic was prepared to halt all hostilities and unfriendly action provided the "Dutch show an eagerness to reach a peaceful solution."

The speech, broadcast over all Indonesian stations, offered also to lift the food blockade against cities occupied by the Dutch.

It came at a moment when the Dutch-Indonesian negotiations appeared to have broken down over a proposed cease-fire order and police powers in a projected interim government. The Dutch had predicted armed hostilities would begin this weekend because Sjarifoeddin had rejected all Dutch demands. Reported clashes along the front lines emphasized the tension.

American-Born Women Charged Held In Siberia

Worcester, Mass., July 18—(AP)—Two American-born wives of former Lithuanian diplomats relatives here charged today, were being held "prisoners" by the Soviet Union in Siberia.

They were identified as: Mrs. Valdemaras Carnieks, 55, the former Eleanor Schultz of Worcester, whose husband was premier of Lithuania when that country was overrun by Russia.

Mrs. Stanley Kairukstis, the former Anna Migauskas of Worcester, whose husband was Lithuanian minister of education.

Status of the two women could not be immediately clarified in official quarters, but relatives here claimed both had retained their American citizenship after marriage.

Mrs. Mae Aldrich, a sister of Mrs. Carnieks, said the latter had registered her five children as American citizens in Washington in 1938. The children, she said, are being held "prisoners" with their mother.

Six Assistantships Provided At College
Six assistants, to be given to graduate students enrolling at East Carolina Teachers College in the fall of 1947, have been provided for in the budget of the college, according to an announcement made by President Dr. Dennis H. Cooke.

These assistantships are to be given in the departments of business education, science, physical education, English, social studies, mathematics. Each graduate student receiving an award will be required to teach one three-hour

western Germany's industrial recovery. Why western Germany? Because eastern Germany is under control of the Russians who have refused to cooperate with their allies in economic rehabilitation.

A striking example of the Soviet attitude was furnished yesterday during a meeting of the allied conference in Berlin. The Russians asked that German steel plants capable of producing 13,000,000 tons annually be allocated immediately for reparations. The U.S. and British representatives refused to discuss the matter, since they held that the demand could be met only by stripping the great industrial area of the Ruhr. The Russians claim that the steel capacity in question is "excess."

A German view of the American program comes from Dr. Hans Ehard, minister-president of Bavaria, who says:

"If the Germans are given more liberty if they can dispose of their own raw materials and if the dismantling of our factories is stopped, I am convinced that better food and economic conditions for Germany can be attained before winter."

to work out flood control for the whole nation.

They came up with a plan to prevent floods in any river or place where they might occur. This plan includes:

Not only the upper Mississippi, Ohio and the great Missouri, Arkansas and Red rivers, but rivers as far away as the Sacramento in California and the Connecticut in New England.

Except for the war years, the engineers have been working on that plan since 1938. At the rate they are going, they won't finish it for 40 years.

The rate depends upon the money Congress gives them. That's why President Truman asked Congress yesterday to vote money to do the job in 10 years.

This is the job the engineers have been doing:

1. Dams or reservoirs. Water from main rivers can be turned into them to prevent flooding.

2. Levees, where necessary.

3. Floodwalls. Concrete walls built around city shorelines.

4. Reforestation. Rainwater, not absorbed by trees or other plant life, runs off into streams which in turn flow into rivers, swelling them.

To absorb this rainwater, the agriculture department has started a tree planting program.

5. Flooding. This means plowing in such a way that topsoil won't wash away from farmland that slopes toward the rivers.

Example: Contour plowing, in which the furrows run parallel to a river, instead of straight furrows that run directly toward a river.

Those are the main methods of flood control. But some of them can be turned to other uses. For example, take the water in dams or reservoirs:

1. In dry country it can be channeled off to irrigate the soil instead of flowing back into a river.

2. In some places the dammed up water can be used for electric power.

3. Or the dammed up water can be used for recreation, such as fishing, sailing, swimming.

Judge Lenient To Embezzler; Bank Blamed

DETROIT, July 18—(AP)—A Commonwealth Bank employee who worked 15 years as a department head at \$250 a month today had a suspended sentence on an embezzlement charge and the bank had a reprimand from Federal Judge Frank A. Picard. Judge Picard accused bank officials of underpaying Arthur Alfred Craig, 42, and "dangling large sums of money" before the employee.

To Craig, who admitted taking \$2,500 during a two-year period by juggling records of service charges, Judge Picard said: "I'm not condoning your stealing. It is never justified." But the judge added as he placed the defendant on two years probation: "The bank informs me you were one of its best men. You worked late hours and appeared to have the bank's best interests at heart. A man with your position at the bank has to maintain a certain standing in the community. If they expect you to wear a white shirt at work they should pay you a white shirt salary."

Seeking Negroes For Enlistment

The enlistment of Negroes in the Regular Army has been reopened. M-Sgt. Virgil B. Lindsey, commanding officer of the local sub-station, said today.

The reopening of Negro enlistments occurred when the percentage of Negro personnel fell below that authorized.

The sergeant states that Negro applicants will have their choice of enlisting in the Army Air Forces unassigned or in the Regular Army unassigned. Those who successfully meet the same mental standards as white applicants, can enlist for periods of two, three, four or five

years.

The equivalent of a grammar school education is considered necessary to pass the mental tests. Those Negroes, who possess such education and are interested in enlisting in the Regular Army, should contact an army recruiting sergeant, or apply at the local Army Recruiting Sub-Station located at new City Hall building.

Ford Foremen Call Meeting
Detroit, July 18—(AP)—The Foreman's Association of America claiming the Ford Motor Co. broke "its promise to us" in firing 32 supervisors in connection with the recent strike at Ford, moved today for counter-action.

Union heads called a Sunday meeting of Ford foremen to consider a new walkout, and announced they would file with the National Labor Relations Board an unfair labor practices charge against the company.

Heroic Action Saves Life Of Injured Workman
Detroit, July 17—(AP)—The quick, heroic action of an iron workman laboring high above the ground on a downtown building was credited today with saving the life of a fellow worker whose leg was smashed by a moving steel girder.

While horrified passersby in the city's financial district watched yesterday afternoon, the swinging beam struck and mangled the leg of 32-year-old Frank Ryan, father of two children.

But as the injured man nearly toppled from the tiny three-foot square platform where he was working with Alfred Pluck, his companion pulled him to safety and held him on the platform for an agonizing half hour until help arrived.

Physicians at the hospital, where Ryan was taken, were forced to amputate the crushed leg.

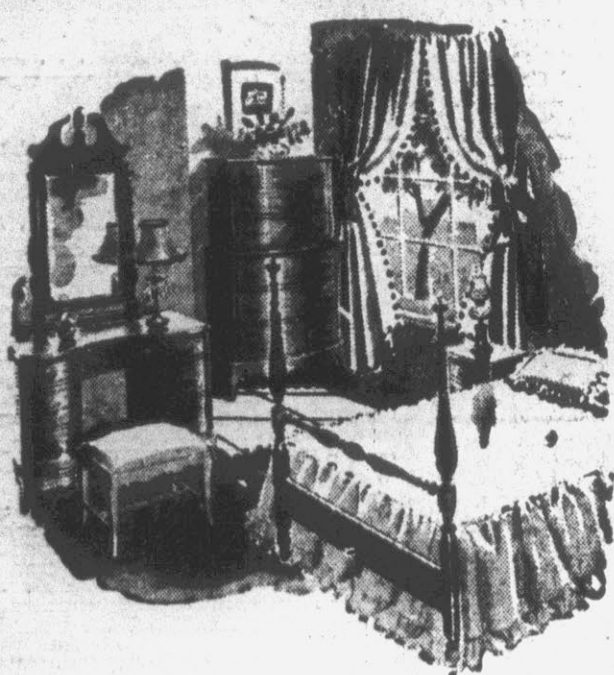
