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CLARK SPEAKS KIWANIS CLUB

Highway Commissioner Outlines Plan For 140-Bed Hospital

 District Highway Commissioner J. G. Clark, chairman of the Pitt County Hospital Committee, guest speaker at the Greenville Kiwanis Club last night, told the representative group of men that there is \$548,000 available to the county from the state and federal governments to build a 140-bed modern hospital. Clark explained that the County Commissioners had authorized a bond election on September 6 to permit the people of the county to express their will in the matter. The proposed bond issue is for \$352,500.

The speaker said Pitt County, with a population of more than 61,000 has available only 58 hospital beds. Plans provide for a site of about 10 acres in a central location. A suitable tract would be donated for the hospital site. Estimated cost of the hospital is \$900,000. Public sentiment here and elsewhere in Pitt County pronouncedly favors the hospital project. Commissioner Clark substituted as speaker for Stuart Carr, who is confined to a hospital with a lame foot.

Vice-President Nathan C. Brooks presided over the Kiwanis meeting for President Eli Bloom, who is out of the city.

Wyatt Highsmith inducted two new members—Vann C. Fleming, president of the Junior Chamber of Commerce and a member of the firm of Globe Hardware Company, and Ray King, of the Johns-Manville Company.

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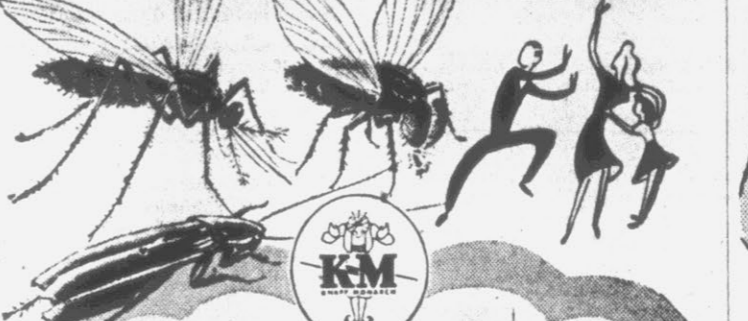
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
