DUTCH ARMOR ENTERS CITY OF CHERIBON

Tank Forces Capture Port; Drive On Capital Claimed Driven Back

Batavia, Java, July 24.—(AP)—Cheribon, important northwest Java port, has fallen to a Dutch tank attack, but Indonesian republicans declared today they had turned back a strong Dutch drive on their capital of Jogjakarta and now were closing in on the north Java port of Semarang.

A Dutch army communique announced the capture of Cheribon. The Indonesian radio said the Dutch used a striking force of 50 tanks in an assault yesterday afternoon against the port, birthplace of the Indonesian independence movement. These forces, the broadcast said, by passed Soemalang and Kacipaten.

An Indonesian army communique said Republican forces in the East-Central sector had seized Modjokerto, on the outer rim of the Dutch perimeter around the once-powerful naval base of Soerabaja. This was one of the areas held by the Dutch before the outbreak of hostilities Sunday.

The Dutch denied the drive on Jogjakarta was halted.

Dutch marines, the communique said, have shelled off a 2,400-mile segment of East Java, overrunning the Bendoroso area, richest rice supply area on the island.

Antara news agency said Indonesian forces had whipped behind a Dutch spearhead at Salatiga, north of Jogjakarta, and forced the north-supported Dutch to abandon the burning town and retire 10 miles north of Toentang.

Marriage At South Mills Is Declared Valid

Camden, N.C., July 24.—(AP)—One of the 2,698 marriages performed at South Mills by S. M. Etheridge in the little more than two years ending last April 1 that he was judging the peace has been declared valid.

The first test case of the validity of the marriages, resulting from Etheridge's appointment as justice of the peace to fill the unexpired term of his father, was decided here yesterday.

District Solicitor John S. Graham of Edenton said he had under study other marriages performed by Etheridge at South Mills, but "interpretation of yesterday's ruling will determine how other marriages there will be affected."

Japanese Peace Pact

Another "Showdown" In Offing As Russia Refuses To Accept U. S. Invitation To Talk On Treaty; What Is Involved; Japan Needs Economic Revival

Another critical showdown between Russia and the Western Allies is presaged by Moscow's refusal of the American invitation to join an 11-nation conference on August 19 to discuss a Japanese peace treaty.

Russia charges that the United States acted in a unilateral manner, and says that preliminary work on the Japanese treaty should be done by the Council of Foreign Ministers. That is to say, the Soviet Union wants to follow the same procedure as that which resulted in the disastrous failure of the Big Four to frame a German treaty because of disagreements between Russia on the one side and America, Britain and France on the other.

What Washington proposed regarding the Japanese treaty was that the work be done by a veto-free parley of eleven interested nations, to be held in Washington or San Francisco. Decisions would be made by a two-thirds vote, with or without agreement by the great powers—a procedure which would be a far-reach from the European Big Four meetings where a veto

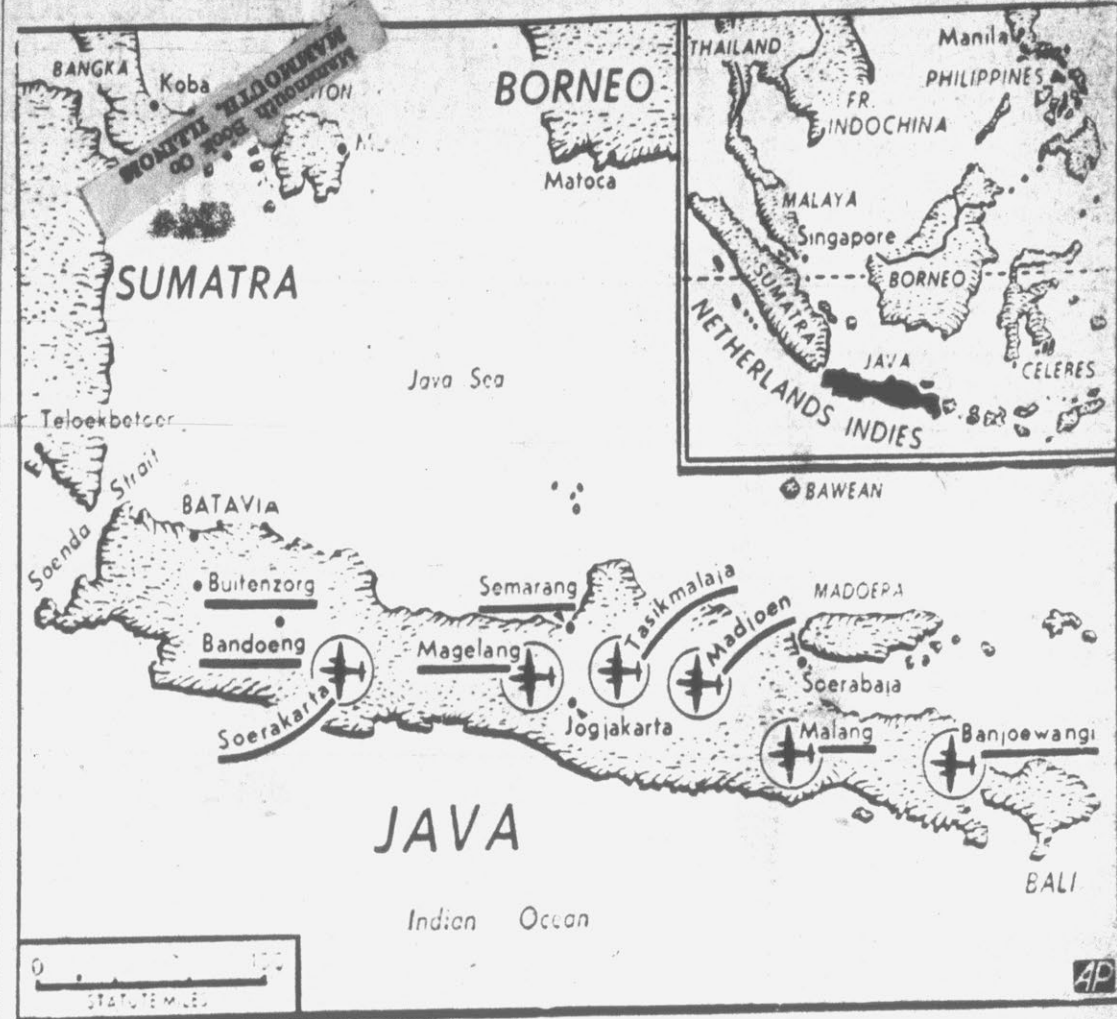
by one power scuttled the ship. Finally there would be a general peace conference of all forty-eight nations which were at war with Japan.

The eleven nations which America proposed should draft the treaty all have a special interest in it. They are the United States, Britain, China, Russia, France, Canada, The Netherlands, India, Australia, New Zealand and the Philippines.

Moscow's rejection in position of having to decide whether to try to go ahead with a 10-nation conference which would frame a treaty without participation of one of the countries chiefly interested—Soviet Russia. We must assume that this contingency was foreseen, but it nevertheless creates a serious situation.

Should it be decided to go ahead without the Muscovites, there would be another complication to iron out—not a serious difficulty but one which has been causing some heartburning. A British Commonwealth meeting had been fixed for August (Continued on Page Six)

Leaf Sale Returns Below Anticipated

Georgia-Florida Markets Open With Prices Generally Below Government Support Level; Average Prices In First Hour's Sales 45-47 Cents

Bright leaf tobacco auctions opened in 21 Georgia and Florida markets with prices generally below the government support level and many growers turned their leaf into Commodity Credit Corporation loans.

The loans made through the flue-cured tobacco growers stabilization corporation are at 90 per cent of parity. They range from four cents a pound for the best grade untied unwrapped.

The Department of Agriculture estimated the average prices of tobacco sold in the first hour at 45 to 47 cents a pound. The bulk of sales were from 45 to 53 cents with a high of 56 for good lemon cutters. Common green leaf was low at 14 cents. The principal offerings were cutters and good and fine lungs.

Warehouses in 21 markets—three in Florida and 18 in Georgia—were crammed with millions of pounds of fine cigarette type leaf, and tobacco (Continued on Page Four)

ROYALL TAKES CABINET POST

Carolinian Sworn In By Retiring Secretary Of War

Washington, July 24.—(AP)—Kenneth G. Royall, of Goldsboro, N.C., became Secretary of War today by taking the oath of office from his predecessor, Robert P. Patterson.

Royall's wife and mother were among more than 150 persons who crowded into the new secretary's office for the ceremony.

Patterson read the oath to Royall as the latter, with hand upraised, promised to support the constitution and fulfill the duties of his office.

Official spectators at the ceremony included Secretary of State Marshall, Secretary of the Navy Forrestal, Attorney General Clark, John R. Steelman, assistant to the President; Assistant Secretaries of War Symington and Petersen and Generals Dwight D. Eisenhower, Omar Bradley and Carl Spaatz.

In Agreement

London, July 24.—(AP)—A high American source said today that U.S. and British differences over a conference on Germany had been settled and that Britain had tentatively accepted a U.S. invitation to meet in Washington to discuss methods of increasing coal production in the Ruhr.

The informant, who may not be identified by name, said the British had agreed with the American position that other questions such as financing and feeding of the economically merged American and British zones of Germany should not be subjects of the discussions.

He said the British also agreed to hold the talks in Washington rather than Berlin as suggested earlier.

The informant said an announcement of the agreement was expected soon.

PEACE TREATY IS NEW WEDGE

Big Powers Further Split By U.S. Proposal On Japan

Washington, July 24.—(AP)—A new split between the United States and Russia—this time over drafting a Japanese peace treaty—threatens today to destroy what little unity remains between the great powers.

Another prospect is that it may delay indefinitely work on a peace settlement for Japan.

Up to this week there had been considerable hope here that Washington and Moscow would be able to devise some means for fashioning the Japanese treaty which would eliminate many of the frictions that have beset peace making in Europe.

Russia's rejection yesterday of American proposals along this line greatly dimmed, if it did not kill off, these hopes.

Some officials said the major question now facing the American and other governments interested in early progress on the far east peace settlement is whether the treaty should go ahead with a "separate peace"—that is, a treaty without Russia.

But there is a question whether this could be done legally. Some authorities recalled that as early as the United Nations declaration of January, 1942, the United States, Britain, Russia and other nations at war with the axis pledged themselves not to make a separate armistice or peace with the enemies.

France Ready To Discuss Future German Industry

Paris, July 24.—(AP)—A French spokesman said today France would accept the United States proposal for a British-French-American conference on the future level of industry in Germany.

The spokesman said France was awaiting more precise details of the American proposal before making an official reply.

He said the projected discussions also would cover control of the Ruhr industrial basin, and management and ownership of Ruhr coal, but would not deal with administrative measures to increase Ruhr coal production.

Such administrative steps, he said, concerned only British and American authorities as zona administrators. Thus, he said, France would not participate in the British-American talks expected to be held in Washington.

Pres. Truman Not Ready To Appoint New Secretary Of National Defense

Washington, July 24.—(AP)—President Truman said today he is not ready to say who will be named secretary of national defense to head the unified armed forces.

Legislation completing the unification procedure is before Congress. It will set up the army, navy and air forces as separate branches of service. Each branch will have a secretary but over-all supervision will be under the secretary of national defense, who will have cabinet rank.

Mr. Truman was asked at a news conference whether secretary of the navy Forrestal is in line to become defense secretary.

He replied that he hadn't heard anything about that, but he would let the reporters know when he had made his choice.

LABOR LAW TO BE TESTED BY RED PROBERS

Testimony Of Infiltration Into N. C. Union May Bring Action By NLRB

Washington, July 24.—(AP)—Rep. J. Parnell Thomas (R-N.J.) said today that testimony of Communist infiltration in a North Carolina CIO tobacco workers local will supply the "first test" of the new Taft-Hartley labor law's ban against Communists controlling unions.

The House Committee on Un-American Activities, which Thomas heads, heard a witness contend yesterday that 16 officials of the Winston-Salem, N.C. local were Communists. Three officials of the same union declined to tell the committee whether or not they are Communists.

Thomas told newsmen afterward: "This undoubtedly is the first test case under the Taft-Hartley Act section which says that if a union is controlled by Communists it can't enjoy the rights and privileges accorded unions under the law by the National Labor Relations Board."

Thomas said he will submit a report to Congress "as soon as it can be prepared" on the investigation of alleged communism in Winston-Salem's Local 22 of the CIO Food, Tobacco, Agricultural and Allied Workers Union (F.T.A.).

"After we make the report it is a matter of both the Congress and the NLRB," Thomas added.

Robert Stripling, the committee's chief investigator, remarked: "Here is a case for action by the enforcement agencies."

Asked whether the committee will expand its investigation to take in the international of the F.T.A., Thomas said the committee "already is investigating the international union" since Edwin K. McCrea, international representative assigned to Local 22, was questioned yesterday.

PLAN ADJOURN ON SATURDAY

GOP Leaders In Congress Set July 26 As Deadline

Washington, July 24.—(AP)—Republican congressional leaders decided today to adjourn the first session of the 80th Congress on Saturday, July 26, subject to possible recall by Republican leaders.

The decision was made at a meeting of Senate and House leaders in the office of House Speaker Martin.

Under the proposal agreed on, Congress can be recalled during the fall adjournment period by the Speaker and the Republican leader of the House and the president pro tempore and majority leader of the Senate.

Without that proviso in the adjournment resolution, only President Truman could recall Congress into special session once it adjourns.

Announcement of the decision was made by Senator Taft of Ohio, chairman of the Senate Republican Policy Committee.

Plans for the remaining days of the session provide for consideration primarily of stalemated appropriation bills, the Army-Navy unification measure and some relatively unimportant legislation.

Few Clues To Killer Of Child

Spartanburg, S. C., July 24.—(AP)—Spartanburg County Sheriff's officers were on 24-hour duty today as they sought the slayer of an 11-year-old girl whose ravished and badly beaten body was found here yesterday.

Sheriff B. B. Brockman, who yesterday ordered bloodhounds in pursuit of the girl's attacker, frankly admitted that officers had few leads to follow.

Certain Members Of World Organization Look For Crisis When Vote On Border Watch Comes Up; Action Outside UN May Be Taken

Lake Success, July 24.—(AP)—Certain United Nations delegates expressed belief today that the future of the world organization might hinge on the outcome of the showdown fight between the United States and Russia over the Balkans.

Authoritative sources said that if Russia vetoes a U.S. proposal to set up an international watch over the Balkan borders Britain, the United States and other countries might feel forced to take action outside the United Nations.

Although British and American officials here were reluctant to discuss such drastic action, it was learned that the idea of establishing a border watch commission outside the United Nations was being considered as a last resort should Russia balk Security Council action on the Balkans.

The Security Council scheduled two meetings today on the Balkan problem, but it appeared that a vote on the U.S. plan would not be reached before next week.

There was a general feeling that the crisis would come when the vote is taken, for only then will the council members know definitely the Russian position.

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko at times has indicated that he would veto the plan. At other times he has indicated that he might abstain from voting and thus permit establishment of the Balkan commission.

The seriousness of the situation, with its ultimate effect on the future of the world organization, was reflected in yesterday's council session.

The United States suddenly removed diplomatic wraps and bluntly told the council that Yugoslavia, Albania and Bulgaria were a menace to international peace.

In some of the bluntest language ever used in a council session, Herschel V. Johnson, U.S. deputy delegate, demanded that the council warn the three Soviet satellites "to keep order in their own houses and leave other peoples' affairs alone."

"If there is an explosion in the Balkans the whole world will suffer, not just the countries in the Balkans," Johnson declared.

NEW ATTACKS IN HOLY CITY

Sirens Call British Troops To Stations; Fight Follows

Jerusalem, July 24.—(AP)—Alarm sirens called British troops to action stations here today and the rattle of machinegun fire followed. All traffic was halted.

The gunfire was believed to be part of an underground attack on a military installation in the area of the Goldsmith officer's club, at a dividing line between one of the Holy City's four security zones and the Jewish quarters, which were placed under a dusk to dawn curfew (Continued on Page Six)

Joint Army-Navy Agency To Develop Atomic Weapons; Further Experiments To Be Conducted "Somewhere In The Pacific"

Washington, July 24.—(AP)—A world unable to agree on international control of atomic bombs was put on notice by the United States today that:

1. It intends to conduct more tests of atomic weapons in the Pacific.
2. Top military officers in the field of nuclear fission now head a joint army-navy agency devoted to "development of atomic weapons of all types."
3. "We mean to maintain and increase the pre-eminence of the United States in atomic weapons" (Continued on Page Six)

State Statistics Show Traffic Fatalities Drop

Raleigh, N.C., July 24.—(AP)—Motor Vehicles Commissioner Landon C. Rosser reported today that 41 persons were killed and 542 were injured in 1916 traffic accidents in North Carolina during June.

The figures compared with 77 fatalities and 426 injured in 738 traffic accidents during June, 1946.

Rosser said the 41 fatalities during June showed a decrease of 47 per cent from the 77 who died the previous June.

Six of the fatalities and 162 injured occurred in 380 accidents in cities and towns. On rural highways there were 336 accidents, accounting for 35 fatalities and 379 injured.

A 71 per cent decrease was noted in pedestrian fatalities over June, 1946.

Columbus and Davidson led all counties in fatalities with three persons killed each. Six counties had two fatalities each: Alamance, Bladen, Haywood, Surry, Craven and Halifax. Twenty-three counties reported one fatality each.

Commenting on the report, Rosser said that "the entire motor vehicles department is gratified at the striking decrease noted in traffic fatalities during June, 1946."

He attributed the decrease to two factors: education and enforcement, and added that "I believe the people of North Carolina are becoming more safety-conscious and are driving more carefully with more thought and consideration for fellow motorists."

Rosser said he believed the decrease in number of reported accidents was due to the fact that more persons were carrying liability insurance than ever before, and that even "very minor" accidents were being reported.

He added that North Carolina's fatality rate "looks good" when compared with the national rate. Figures released by the National Safety Council show that in May 2,710 lives were lost in highway accidents, a six per cent increase over May, 1946, while North Carolina has shown a decrease.

Atomic Energy Work

An Outline Of What This Country Is Doing With Its Newest Science; Bigger A-Bombs, Source Of Power, Medical Uses—All Subjects For More Research

Washington, July 24.—(AP)—Here's an outline of what this country is doing at this time in American history with atomic energy.

You, an ordinary citizen, can't imagine it all. Few people can, unless they're high in the government or are scientists.

The work is too huge, too scattered, too complicated, too scientific. And much of it is being done behind closed doors.

The outline given here is pretty sketchy because there still is so much secrecy surrounding the development of atomic energy.

It is pieced together from the report which the government's atomic energy commission made to Congress last night.

This commission, which makes such a report twice a year, is the boss of atomic energy and everything connected with it in this country.

And the commission isn't telling everything, by a long sight.

But first of all: New and bigger (and better or worse) atomic bombs are being made.

The government will continue to

do this until it reaches—if it ever reaches—agreement with other nations on controlling atomic bomb-making.

Somewhere in the Pacific it is setting up "proving grounds" for testing atomic weapons and experimenting with them.

This country is out in front now with the atomic bomb, and it's trying to stay there. The commission says:

"To rely" on existing knowledge alone could be disastrous."

So the government is pouring huge sums into trying to learn more about atomic energy and how to use it, for war and peace.

For the fiscal year starting July 1 and ending next June 30, the government will spend probably more than \$500,000,000 on atomic work.

Here's one quick example of something the government is trying to find out now: Can atomic energy make planes fly or drive warships.

Scattered around the United States, the government has 41,500 people working on atomic projects. (Continued on Page Six)

experts declared quality and production exceeded any previous season. Acres of floor space were stacked with row upon row of baskets as auctioneers turned up for their annual sing-song selling. Although the U. S. Department of Agriculture estimates total tobacco production to be off by about 74,000,000 pounds this year, the Georgia-Florida belt has exceeded expectations. As of July 1, the U. S. crop reporting service estimated a crop of 142,203,000 pounds, which is 13,000,000 pounds greater than the record production of 1946.

Reports from individual markets follow:
Valdosta: The first row of leaf sold at prices ranging from 47 to 50 cents. Last year the first row averaged 46 cents. Then prices dropped and by the second hour much tobacco was going into government loans.

Moultrie: The first few rows sold at prices averaging from five to 60 cents with an average of 40 to 52 cents. Nondescript and sunburned lugs were going at 5 to 8 cents, the government support level. Generally leaf tobacco prices were nearer the loan level than the common grades.

Statesboro: Two million pounds of tobacco was on warehouse floors, and the first row averaged 43 cents compared with 46 cents last season. Sales were brisk.

Vidalia: The first 10 baskets sold averaged 43.5 cents compared with 52 cents last year. The quality of offerings generally was reported good.

Nashville: Opening prices averaging 42 cents, a fraction of a cent below last year, were near the government level. Sales were brisk, but warehousemen said the quality of the leaf offered was not up to last year. Many growers still were holding their tobacco off the market.

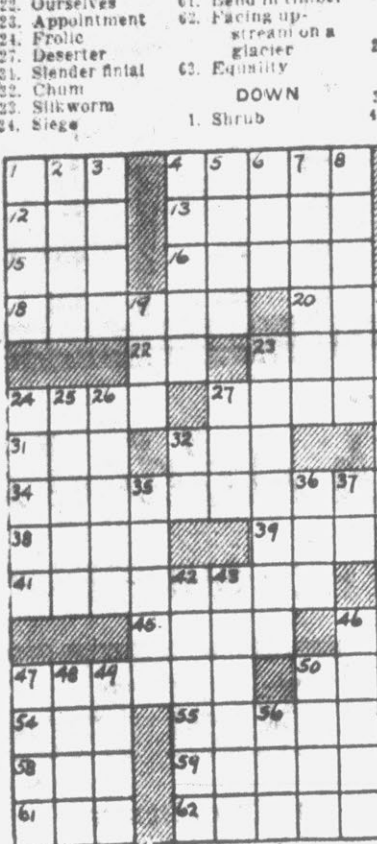
Adel: Opening prices ranging from 58 to 61 for the better grades were higher than last year.

Quitman: The first 50,000 pounds sold averaged 45 cents a pound. Blackhear: The first two rows averaged 42.5 cents. Last year the first day's sales averaged 44 cents. Despite fairly brisk bidding, much of the leaf was going into govern-

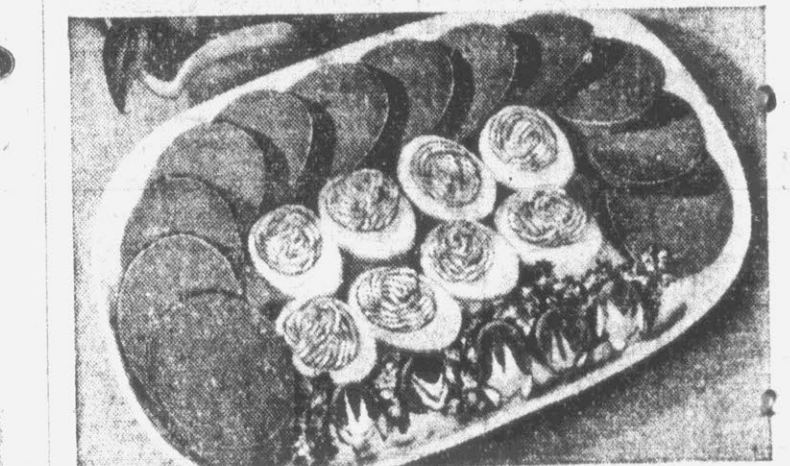

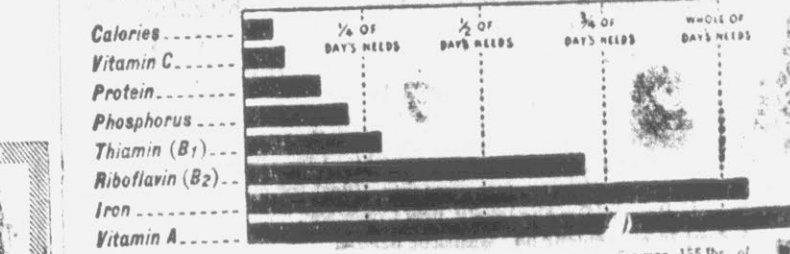

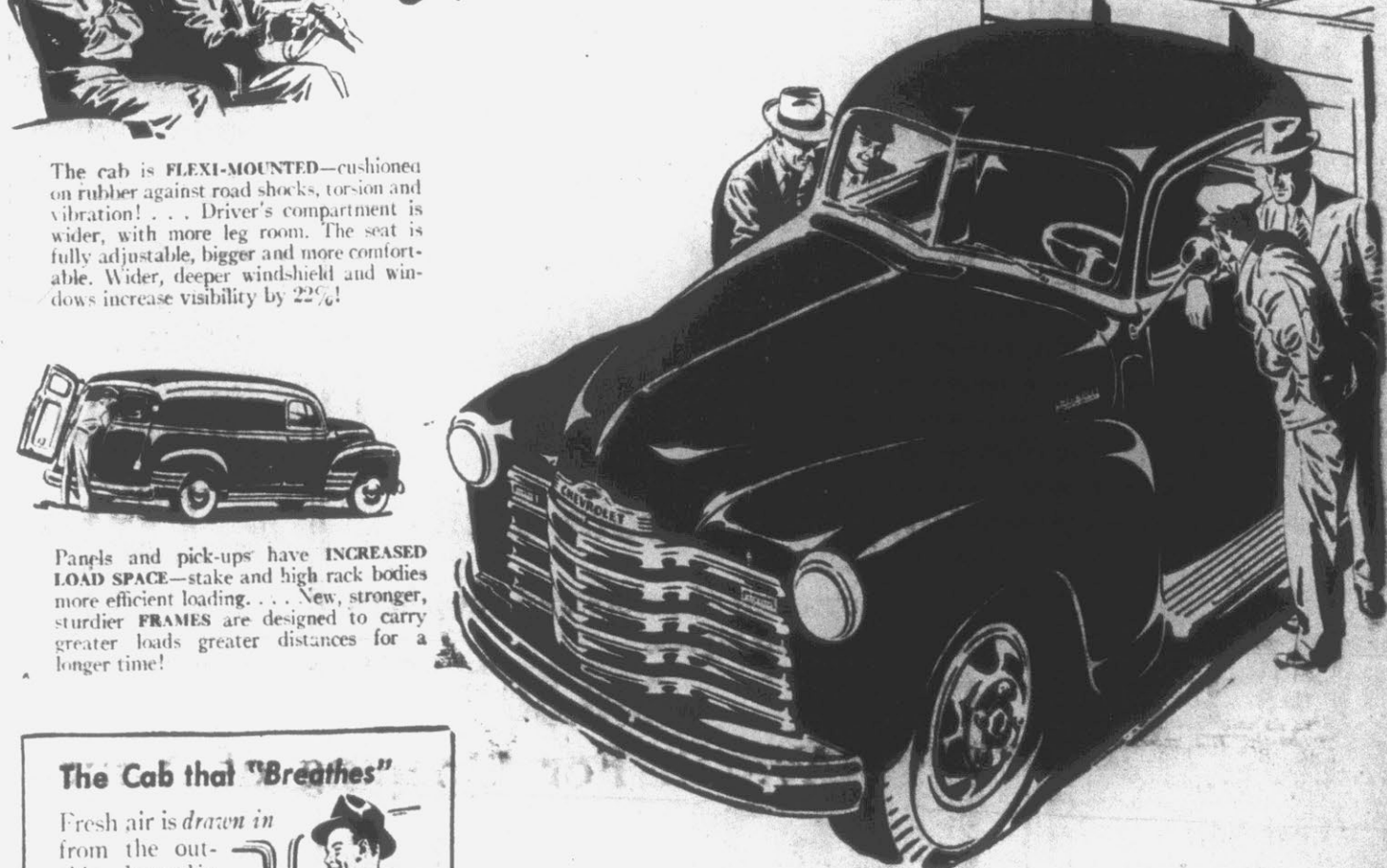

of one kind or another.

It is trying to get scientists, administrators and engineers of first rate ability but the commission says they are relatively few in number.

Repeatedly the commission means about the lack of the right kind of trained men. It says:

"The nation's supply of trained nuclear scientists and engineers is now woefully short."

Besides the job of keeping ahead with knowledge of making atomic weapons, the government is tackling this double job:

1. Trying to find a way of helping industry and communities with atomic power. This is a long-range job. It won't be done overnight.

2. Seeking discoveries for medical use, such as in cancer treatment.

26 in Canberra, Australia, to consider the Commonwealth position regarding a Japanese treaty. The British have asked that the suggested peace conference be postponed.

When the American proposal was announced General Douglas MacArthur was described as highly pleased, and Japan generally was jubilant. As far back as March, MacArthur called for an early treaty with Japan and he has said that it should set the pattern for future peace throughout the world.

Urgent need for an economic revival in Japan was reported last week by a special American statistical mission headed by Dr. Stuart

A. Rice, assistant director of the budget bureau. And not long ago General MacArthur expressed the opinion that occupation of Japan shouldn't be continued beyond five years, although she should be supervised for a generation.

Experts have figured that the framing of a Japanese treaty might take a year, and they note that the complicated territorial and political questions which have harassed Europe will be absent. Among other things the treaty must provide for future control of Japan, for reparations and their distribution, Japan's future economic position (a matter of special interest to Russia, the United States, the British Commonwealth and China), and territorial questions.

until x x x acceptable international agreements" are reached and control machinery established.

A report of the Atomic Energy Commission to Congress contained the terse announcement of further experiments and the implied acceptance of any challenge to a world atomic armament race.

(Russia and the United States made plain again yesterday at a New York session of the United Nations Atomic Energy Commission their diametrically opposed views on the subject of big powers veto rights over international atomic control questions).

The armed forces disclosed, in answering a reporter's questions, something of the activities of their atomic weapons at work on the armed forces special weapons project.

"The commission's announcement of more tests was made in this single sentence:

"The Atomic Energy Commission is establishing proving grounds in the Pacific for routine experiments and tests of atomic weapons."

Where is the proving ground to be located? The commission was tight-lipped on this, although it is presumed Congress has been given some private inkling because of the probable necessity for legislation and appropriations.

"Bikini, because it was the locale for the only previous offshore tests, held immediate attention in speculation."
