INDIANS WILL PRESENT CASE FOR INDONESIA

United Nations To Be Given Report; Support Of Other Nations Expected

New Delhi, July 28.—(AP)—Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, vice-president of the Indian interim government, announced today that India would press Indonesia's case before the United Nations, probably presenting it tomorrow morning, and expected the support of certain other powers. At the same time Nehru announced that India "almost immediately" would bar Dutch aircraft from landing on Indian airfields, and flying over India.

India's goal is to bring the fastest possible end to the fighting and assure that justice is done, Nehru said at a news conference. "We are not at war with the Dutch government," he said, "and we do not intend to be at war with the Dutch government or any other government."

India, Nehru said, will not send arms to Indonesia because such an act would be "tantamount to declaring war" upon the Dutch. However, he said, his country was contemplating closing ports to all Dutch shipping and certainly would bar aircraft of any country which might attempt to carry supplies to the Dutch.

Nehru said his country had not acted previously to bring the Indonesian hostilities before the United Nations because "we thought the best way was in conjunction with other powers."

He added that India turned first to Britain and the United States. In recent days has exchanged formal and informal communications with Australia and "we now propose in a few hours" to carry the case formally to U.N.

FILIBUSTER IS GOP "LESSON"

Three-Hour Midnight Talkathon Threatened Adjournment

Washington, July 28.—(AP)—Confined after a three-hour midnight filibuster that threatened to delay congressional adjournment, Philip B. Perlman, a Baltimore Democrat, is all set to move into the Justice Department's No. 2 post as Solicitor General.

The 58 to 21 early morning confirmation vote came seven months after President Truman sent his nomination to the senate. The renewed eleven-hour opposition came from Senator Brewster (R-Me) who declared he was giving the Democrats a dose of their own tactics in defeating the Republican-backed resolution to investigate Attorney General Clark's handling of Kansas City vote fraud charges.

Saying he was "fighting fire with fire," Brewster asked his colleagues: "How else are these little boys ever to be taught that they should not play with matches?"

His one-man filibuster ended shortly after 3 a.m. after Senators Taft (Ohio), chairman of the Republican Policy Committee, and Wherry (Nebr.), the GOP whip, conferred with him on the Senate floor. Brewster then announced he would end the discussion "in deference to my colleagues."

Plan Boosting German Coal Mine Production

U.S. Nears First Direct Effort To Help European Recovery Under Marshall Plan; Meet With British This Week

Washington, July 28.—(AP)—The United States is nearing its first direct effort to contribute to European recovery under the Marshall Plan.

The goal is to boost, with Britain's help, coal production from Germany's Ruhr mines. Officials said that negotiations undertaken in London to iron out pre-preference differences are expected to result in the opening of Anglo-American coal talks here before the week ends.

Secretary of State Marshall is known to consider these talks of prime importance on the ground that the extent of European recovery will be governed largely by the quantity of coal available from the Ruhr mines. They now are producing far below their pre-war normal.

Meanwhile, it was learned that the latest row between the State Department and Lt. Gen. Lucius D. Clay, American commander in Germany, has revived official talk of replacing American military control in Germany with a civilian administration.

The newest Clay-State Department split arose over an order from Marshall delaying a Berlin announcement by Clay and his British counterpart of a new increase in the German industrial level for their two zones.

Marshall acted after bitter French protests were received. His main objective was to prevent French Communists from disrupting the Marshall plan by capitalizing on charges of an American-sponsored revival of Germany.

If a civilian government were set up in the American zone in Germany it would leave the army only a police role.

The War Department on various occasions has asked the State Department to take over, but Marshall's diplomatic advisers have hesitated to jump into a disagreeable and extremely complicated task.

Condolences To Pres. Truman

Washington, July 28.—(AP)—Messages of condolences on the death of President Truman's mother poured into the White House today from all over the world.

They came from heads of states, foreign ministers, ambassadors, governors, other leaders, and from just plain people.

The following came from King George VI and the British Queen, Elizabeth:

"The Queen and I send you our deep sympathy in the sad loss that you have sustained through the death of your mother."

FORRESTAL IS PLANNING ON SHORT TENURE

Nat'l Defense Secretary Seeking Needed Personnel; Hint Brief Term

Washington, July 28.—(AP)—James Forrestal, who will be the United States' first Secretary of National Defense, declared today that the unification of Army and Navy under a single department is the "most decisive step" in military policy since the formation of the republic.

The Navy secretary told his first news conference since being named to head the overall U.S. military establishment that "we have a blueprint and a charter but the blueprint and the charter have to be manned by people."

Forrestal said that the new setup of a separate Army, Air Force and Navy under the overall control of the Secretary of Defense will save money in the long run and be beneficial in the sense of "getting the most out of our money."

Unification will cost more in the beginning he said, adding, "It is my hope the added expense will be nominal."

"The biggest job ahead of him today he told newsmen laconically is to 'get people'."

So far as possible he plans to keep existing services and groups undisturbed, he said.

Forrestal hinted that his tenure of office as secretary of defense may not exceed one year.

Stanley County Polio Outbreak

Albemarle, N. C., July 28.—(AP)—Stanley county children under 15 today were under quarantine as the sixth case of infantile paralysis broke out over the weekend.

Nine county schools were closed, and swimming pools, movies, parks, stores and general gatherings were barred to the youngsters. The order was issued by James P. Sifford, chairman of the board of health.

Claim Albanians Squelch Plot

Athens, July 28.—(AP)—Advices from Ioannina, in Northern Greece, reported today that the Albanian government had squelched a plot apparently aimed at Col. Gen. Enver Hoxha, Communist premier of Albania, and had arrested approximately 1,200 members of the armed forces.

The border advices, which were sketchy, said a member of the Albanian parliament named Radovicki, an underground resistance leader during the war, was a leader of the alleged plot.

Kittrell Says Plenty Sugar; Don't Stock Up

J. B. Kittrell, broker and one of the largest sugar distributors in North Carolina, this afternoon authorized the Reflector to quote him as saying that due to unprecedented demands on the sugar refineries, they are 68 weeks behind in their shipments. Kittrell said, and he spoke with authority, that there is more than enough sugar available than could be used by every man, woman and child in the United States by January 1. He pointed out, however, that the producers and refiners and others urge the buying public to lay off stocking up their pantries with sugar, because sugar will be readily available all the way ahead.

Kittrell, who did such an outstanding job as head of the War Price and Rationing Board here during the war, said that the discontinuance of sugar rationing will result in a marked increased demand from industrial sugar users. He urged householders and other sugar consumers to stop piling the sugar in their pantries. There's plenty of sugar for everybody. The simple fact is that the refineries are behind in their shipments and will soon catch up if individuals stop hoarding the sweetening.

Guaranty Bank To Open West End Branch Here

The West End Branch of the Guaranty Bank and Trust Company, at Dickinson Avenue and Watrous street, will be open for business on Friday, August 1. President W. H. Woolard said the branch was established for the convenience of the bank's customers and friends. It is the plan of the bank to follow the development of business in the city and to provide adequate banking facilities for the public, he added.

Opening of the West End Branch will give the Guaranty Bank and Trust Company three locations in Greenville and nine in the following towns and cities: Robersonville, Belhaven, Snow Hill, Bethel, Vanceboro, Elizabeth City, Washington, Hamilton and Williamston.

Internationally-Minded Lawmakers Plan Inquiries

Washington, July 28.—(AP)—Call the roll of congress in the months to come and "here" will re-echo from London, Berlin, Pafos, Palestine, Cairo, New Delhi, Shanghai, Pearl Harbor and Alaska.

Never before in the nation's peacetime history has there been such an internationally minded assembly of lawmakers, nor a group with the determination and the means to collect first-hand information on "what goes" abroad.

Just a year ago, the Republican party was campaigning with the slogan that congress would open each day's session "with a prayer and close with a probe."

In the busy days of the 80th congress' first session, it didn't work that way. Reorganization and routine helped check congressional curiosity.

But it's different now that congress has adjourned. More than a score of house and senate committees, and better than a majority of congress itself will be heading overseas, to inquire into foreign policy and military affairs or be bound for various sections of this country to study domestic problems at their source.

The inquiries will cost more than \$2,000,000.

House Democratic Leader Rayburn of Texas has called many of them "junkies" and told the Republicans their economy record in that direction "isn't so hot."

The GOP leadership on the other hand has claimed that the expenditures now will save millions of dollars in the years to come.

The top item under congressional scrutiny will be foreign policy as the legislators search out the global problems in anticipation of new requests next year for foreign aid funds.

Other inquiries will include:

A look-see by the Senate-House economic committee into the high cost of living.

An investigation by a special Senate committee into the State Department's "Voice of America" radio broadcasts and other aspects of its wartime cultural relations program.

A general housing study by a joint

Senate-House committee with \$50,000 to spend on the project.

A separate, 15-city investigation by a House labor subcommittee into "monopoly, racketeering and restrictive practices" in the building industry.

Independent studies by both the House and Senate Agricultural committees of a long range program to solve farm problems.

House and Senate small business committee efforts to formulate a program for aiding little business.

At least two surveys of newsprint shortages.

A continuing probe by the House Un-American Activities Committee into the spread of communism.

A tax study by the House Ways and Means Committee.

New investigations by the Finance expenditures committee into government disposition of surplus war property.

A House merchant marine inquiry into preservation of American shipping.

PHILLIPS HAS SECOND TRIAL

State Tries Again To Convict Defendant With "Suicide Note"

Lillington, N.C., July 28.—(AP)—The State today began its second attempt within a year to convince a jury that 226-year-old Charlie Phillips shot and killed his wife, Etta Mae, as they ate Sunday dinner last Aug. 18.

Phillips was convicted of first degree murder in a trial a month after the shooting. Then just before he was to be executed this spring, a note was found by the defendant's sister.

Action Ends Rationing To Industrial And Institutional Uses; Price Controls Still Being Kept

Washington, July 28.—(AP)—The Agriculture Department announced the end of sugar rationing at 11 a.m. (Eastern Standard Time) today because of a lack of funds to finance the program.

The action ends rationing to industrial and institutional users. Rationing to housewives was ended two months ago.

However, price controls are being kept. And controls on the amount of supplies which industrial users may have on hand were instituted.

In announcing this action, the department said Congress failed to appropriate funds necessary to continue work of the sugar rationing administration.

On Coal Production

Coal Plays Critical Part In A Nation's Economy; Its Lack In Germany And Britain Can Disrupt Recovery Plans; Two Methods Of Upping Production

The vital part which coal production is playing in the European economic crisis, and consequently in the turbulent political situation, was well emphasized by two developments during the weekend—one in England and the other in Germany.

British Foreign Minister Bevin in an impassioned appeal to his country's workers in general, and to the coal miners in particular, warned that they must produce more or risk the fall of the Socialist Government and a weakening of Britain's position in world affairs.

Increased production, he said, would enable the country to give foreign credits which would help Germany.

He was addressing thousands of miners whose production is the key to England's economic recovery.

"My God, working men and women," he cried, "this is the first Labor (Socialist) Government you have got. Don't let it fail, for the sake of generations to come. Your Labor Government is carrying on in foreign affairs without the tools to do the job and I must be helped out."

That's strong and most unusual language to come from a cabinet minister, but it doesn't exaggerate the dangers of the situation in which the government finds itself as it struggles with England's first all-out experiment in socialism. The

CONTRACTS TO HUGHES WILL BE DESCRIBED

Employee Agrees To Tell What He Knows Of Awarding Contracts To Hughes

Washington, July 28.—(AP)—Chairman Brewster (R-Me) of the Senate War Investigating Committee said today a globe-trotting employee of Howard Hughes, millionaire manufacturer, has agreed to tell what he knows about the award of \$40,000,000 worth of wartime government plane contracts to Hughes.

Brewster told a reporter that the Hughes employee, John Meyer, notified the committee staff this morning he will testify before a subcommittee whenever it wishes to call him.

He had been scheduled to appear next Wednesday before a public inquiry opening today into Hughes' and Henry J. Kaiser's plane contracts with the government.

Meyer had been reported out of the country, and the subcommittee previously had been making efforts to find him to issue a subpoena.

At a closed preliminary inquiry June 3, Meyer laid before the subcommittee various purported expense accounts of parties at which he said high government officials were entertained.

The subcommittee has been inquiring into negotiations which led to award of the plane contracts. Chairman Ferguson (R-Mich) of the subcommittee said as he opened the hearing today that neither of the planes Hughes developed had been accepted by the government.

A former War Production Board official testified at the hearing opened that Kaiser contended in 1941 that he could develop a completely new cargo plane in ten months, but that was regarded by the army and navy as "completely fantastic."

The witness, Merrill C. Meigs of Chicago, a Hearst newspaper executive and former chief of WPB's aircraft division, told the subcommittee that Kaiser, the auto manufacturer and Liberty Ship wizard, came to Washington in July, 1942, and gave to the newspapers statements that he could start production of a new cargo plane in 10 months.

That was completely fantastic, but inasmuch as Mr. Kaiser had a very fine background, we were designated to examine his plans as to how he was going to do this," Meigs said.

Refugees Aboard Vessels Needing Medical Care

Marseille, France, July 28.—(AP)—French authorities said today that nearly 1,000 of 4,500 Jews, cruising offshore in three British deportation ships after being turned back from Palestine, were ill or needed medical care.

The Jews had approached Palestine without immigration visas in the Exodus of 1947, formerly the S.S. President Warfield. Their landing from the deportation vessels was scheduled for tomorrow.

The refugees departed from a French port for Palestine and the British shipped them back.

Two British Convictes and the Destroyer Cardigan Bay shepherded the refugee ships.

Two Shiploads Refugees Caught

Haifa, July 28.—(AP)—British Naval Forces escorted into Haifa harbor today two wooden vessels jammed with approximately 1,100 uncertified Jewish immigrants and immediately transferred most of them to waiting British ships for deportation to Cyprus.

Both refugee ships were sponsored by Haganah, Jewish underground organization, in a new campaign to smash the British blockade barring Jewish immigration to the Holy Land.

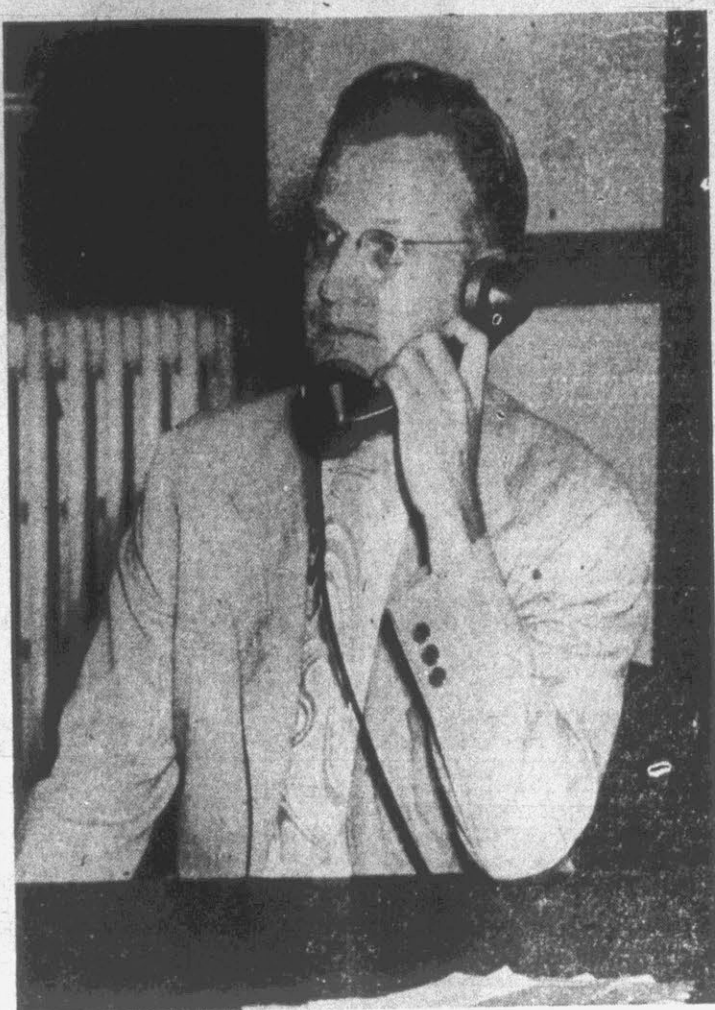

Dr. Cooke Leaves Record Of Progress

In a little over a month Dr. Dennis H. Cooke will leave East Carolina Teachers College after a year of hard work which has seen many changes and accomplishments. He will go to Woman's College of the University of North Carolina to assume his new post as head of the department of education.

Dr. Cooke came to ECTC in August 1946, during a critical period in its history. With the added confusion of a large enrollment of veterans, he rolled up his sleeves and energetically set out to complete a difficult job.

He gained the complete cooperation of the faculty and staff and put into effect a definite retirement system, a salary schedule, and a system of academic rank for them. He obtained a large number of new faculty members, many with Ph. D. degrees.

Three new departments were authorized, effective September 1, a Bureau of Field Services, kindergarten, and an eighth grade in the Training School. The music and physical education departments were reorganized and greatly strengthened. An office of Director of Student Affairs was created, which was responsible for the writing

ing of the new and much improved constitution.

During his stay student and faculty morale has improved significantly. Student conduct and discipline has also improved. The athletic program has greatly expanded. The college operates on the best financial structure in its history.

Born at Maiden, N.C. in Catawba county February 23, 1904, Dr. Cooke attended Duke University and graduated with a B.A. degree in 1925 and M.A. degree in 1928. He then went to Peabody College in Nashville, Tenn. and received his Ph.D. in 1930.

Going to Peabody in 1930 and planning to stay only nine months, Dr. Cooke stayed many years instead. Because of his outstanding work while there, the president offered him a position as associate professor of education, which he accepted. Speeding rapidly up the ranks, he first became professor of school administration and then head of the department of education.

Dr. Cooke became president of ECTC in the summer of 1946. He has written sixteen books on education, either as author or co-author, and over 100 magazine articles.

CHRISTIANITY AND COMMUNISM

A great deal of discussion on the problem of "Higher Christianity and communism are compatible has been aroused by a recent radio debate on the subject. A wordy battle is entirely unnecessary for we have the answer direct from the mouths of the three founders of communism: Marx, Engels, and Lenin. They assert repeatedly and unequivocally that communism and Christianity are deadly enemies.

It is well to remember that Marx and Engels became atheists before they became communists, and that communism is the material counterpart of their renunciation of Christianity as "that opiate." In his earlier moments he called it "the opium of the people."

The present communist leaders have qualified much of the original doctrine, yet it would be a mistake to believe they have changed their attitude on religion because of their toleration of the orthodox church. Perhaps they believe that onities for the Russian people have a certain usefulness, but more probably they have recognized because of the persistent attachment of the people to Christianity, that the Communist Party would have at its disposal one more of the instruments of political power which would reduce the church and control it as a part of the state.

The whole situation bears watching here in America.

Mrs. Martha Truman, that frail little old lady of Grandview, Missouri, who in her last days tugged at the heart-strings of all America has gone to join the long parade of good mothers in their special heaven.

Her fond pride in the son to whom fate brought the highest office in our land, was always evident. The quality of her motherhood has been reflected constantly by the devotion of her children; a devotion which at one time even temporarily disrupted the routine procedures of the presidency.

Mrs. Truman's life adds one more jewel to the invisible crown belonging to the mothers of this world.

LEAVE BONDS

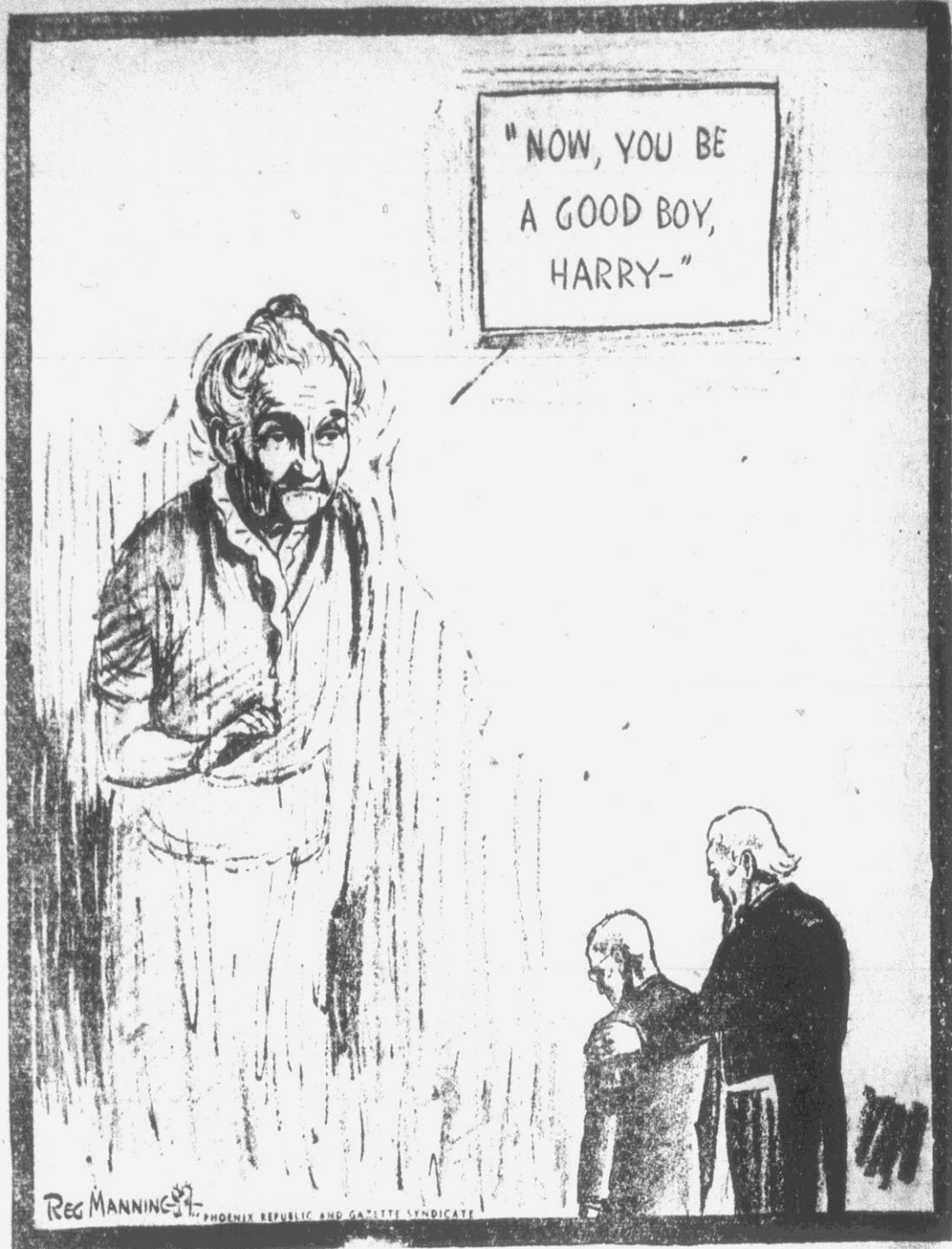
Probably the best advice that veterans can be given in the handling of their terminal leave bonds, which may now be cashed after September 1, is to hang on to them unless their cash value is needed right away.

The bonds draw two and one-half percent interest and are as excellent an investment as can be found. Financiers would count themselves extremely fortunate to obtain that assured rate of return for merely waiting until the bonds mature.

President Truman, on signing the bill that made it possible for these bonds to be cashed, strongly suggested that "it is to the veteran's best interest that they keep their bonds if they do not absolutely need to cash them now."

He said if a large amount of the outstanding bonds (estimated at 2 billion dollars) are redeemed soon, general inflation pressures "would receive a substantial boost."

"covered" under the law and therefore can't receive the benefits.

These include railroad workers (there's a separate system for them); employees of federal, state and local governments; agricultural workers; domestic servants; self-employed people; and people working for non-profit organizations.

There's been much talk for years of bringing them, or some of them, under social security. It hasn't happened.

The government's social security fund has taken in, through the tax, about \$9,860,000,000 since 1937. After paying out benefits, it still has about \$8,799,000,000.

Congress knew back in 1935, when it passed the law, that the number of people who started receiving benefits in 1940 would be comparatively small.

But it knew this number would grow year by year as the number of people "covered" by the law reached 65 and retired.

To build up the fund to take care of the future heavy drain on it, Congress voted this:

To raise the tax gradually from one per cent, starting in 1943, until it reached three per cent, starting in 1949.

But each time Congress blocked the scheduled increase and finally decided to let it stay at one per cent until Jan. 1, 1948, when it would become 2-1/2 per cent.

So the increase would have come next Jan. 1 if Congress last week once more had not stepped in and said "no."

This time it decided to postpone any increase from one per cent until Jan. 1, 1950, when it is to become 1-1/2 per cent.

Congress, of course, between now and then may change its mind again.

Briefly, the arguments for and against increasing the tax go like this:

For—To take care of the huge drain on the fund in the future, the tax should be hiked now.

Against—There's no immediate need for an increase because the fund has far more money than it

has to pay out in benefits. Meantime, the tax remains at one per cent.

cated that Mrs. Phillips had committed suicide. Phillips said it was in his wife's handwriting. A stay of execution was granted and finally a new trial when a State handwriting expert, James Powell, testified that the writing was that of Mrs. Phillips.

Selection of a jury was expected to take most of today with indications that a special panel would have to be called. Court Clerk Howard Goewin said that more than 30 witnesses already had been summoned, twice as many as appeared at the first trial.

The tall black-haired tenant farmer offered no defense at that first trial and did not testify. His attorney, Neill McK. Salmon, has said that Phillips will take the stand this time.

The note, which Salmon has indicated will be the backbone of his defense, was dated on the day of Mrs. Phillips' death. It indicated that she had tried twice before to kill herself "but I am going through with it today."

mated unofficially by firemen at \$50,000 to the powerhouse and nearby buildings.

Deputy Chief John P. Horan said the tanks were scared by the heat and were in immediate danger of exploding before sufficient water could be played on them to keep them safely cool.

The arsenal, built during the war and sprawling over 25,000 acres, was the chief source of incendiary bombs used in the fire raids on Japan in 1945. Present army stores there include mustard gas and heavy chemical mortar shells.

Employees are being dismissed today.

The department said all letters suspending sugar rationing for alleged violators of rationing rules are revoked. Likewise, all suspension order proceedings now pending were ordered ended.

Briefly, the new inventory controls, restricting the amount of sugar industrial users may have on hand, provide:

(1) A general limitation of sugar inventories for any person (other than household users) to a maximum of 2,000 pounds.

(2) A limitation for any industrial or institutional user of 140 percent of the quantity used during the corresponding and next succeeding month ending June 30, 1947.

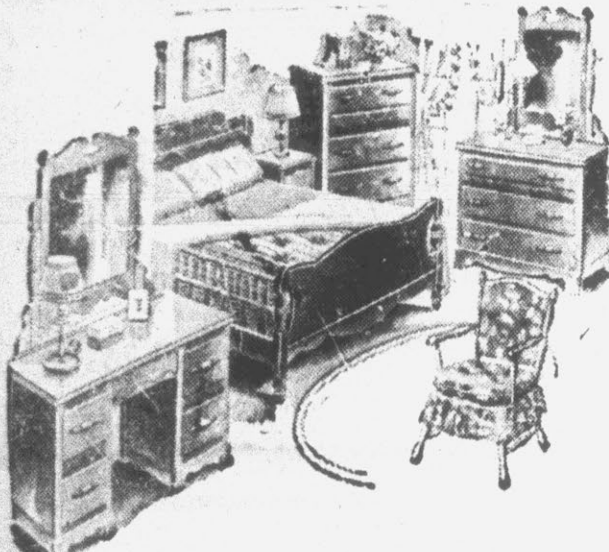

will receive a "ten-in-one" ration package from U.S. Army stocks—the equivalent of 40,000 calories. In addition, the men in the mine showing the highest production will get an additional 40,000 calories. Germany and Britain—in the order named—are by far the most important coal producing countries of Europe. Both England and the continent of course are in dire need of an increase in many kinds of industrial production, but virtually all manufacturing depends on the power produced by coal which must be hewn from the black caverns of the earth by human hands. Because the human element enters in so heavily one would think that perhaps the incentive bonus being offered in Germany would have its attractions. After all, men go down into the dark and often dangerous mines for a reward. May be Mr. Bevin will get a further idea from the project in the Ruhr. Most synthetic gems contain gaseous bubbles.

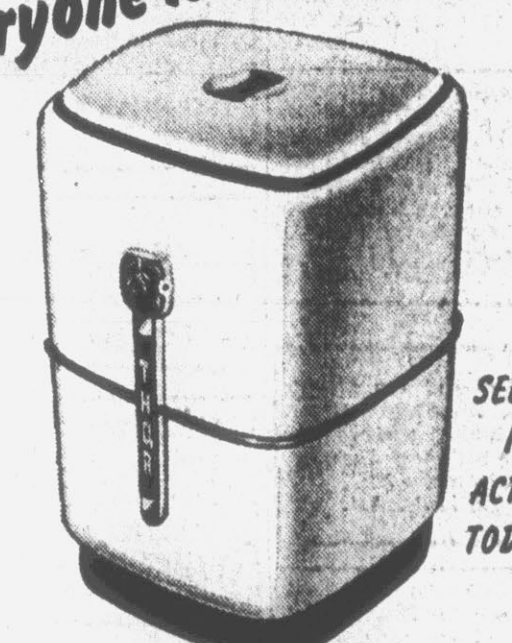
