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MONEY SPENT ON ROOSEVELT PROBERS TOLD

Over \$5,000 Spent on Entertaining Elliott And Wife, Says Hughes Aide

Washington, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The Senate War Investigating committee placed in its records today a compilation intended to show that publicity man John Meyer listed expenditures of \$5,083.79 for entertainment of Elliott Roosevelt.

Chairman Ferguson (R-Mich.) said the listing represented entries made by Meyer on expense accounts turned in for entertaining the son of the late President in 1943 and 1944, while Meyer was working for Howard Hughes, millionaire plane builder and movie producer.

Represented in the committee's compilation were accounts for dinners and parties in New York and Hollywood night spots.

The list, headed "Col. Elliott Roosevelt," contained one entry, under date of August 27, 1943, which said:

"Entertained by John Meyer: Dinner—Statler Hotel—\$76.00. Girls at hotel (late) \$50.00.

William P. Rogers, committee counsel, told reporters the listing included wording in Meyer's handwriting, from expense vouchers now in the committee's possession.

The entertainment for young Roosevelt, who was represented in testimony yesterday to have effected a reversal of an Air Corps decision not to purchase a photo-reconnaissance plane manufactured by Hughes, also included entries for Faye Emerson, now Mrs. Elliott Roosevelt.

Meyer previously has testified in closed sessions of the committee that he introduced Miss Emerson, a movie actress, to the son of the late president.

The committee listed 35 accounts turned in by Meyer, most of them for expenditures entertaining Colonel Roosevelt and his friends during 1943 and 1944, but some of them extending into 1945.

Hughes Taking Rest Before Washington Trip

Los Angeles, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Howard Hughes plans a quiet weekend—resting, he hopes—before taking off Monday on a leisurely two-day flight to Washington for a request appearance before the Senate war investigating committee.

He said he was leaving here, destination unannounced, about the time yesterday that a deputy U. S. Marshall was looking for him high and low in between to present a subpoena with the compliments of the committee, headed by Senator Owen Brewster (R-Me.).

The elusive Hughes disclosed his plans in another statement distributed by his publicity office as the Marshall's office gave up the legal hunt-and-hare routine until today.

"I have gone away for the weekend to get a little rest," declared the heavily-lidded young plane manufacturer.

Tightening Of Belts

Grim Days Ahead For British As Government Prepares For Grappling With Greatest Problem They Have Yet Faced; More Work, Less Food, More Austerity

Britain's economic crisis has reached a point of such gravity that the harassed Socialist government is preparing to inaugurate extreme remedial action forthwith.

We get a measure of the seriousness of the situation in the forecast that there will be further large-scale slashes in the country's already scanty food rations. Such a move would represent pretty close to a last-ditch stand, since John Bull's once expansive fifth long ago gave way to leanness under wartime food shortages.

This and other drastic action is expected to be announced in the House of Commons next Wednesday when Prime Minister Attlee presents the program for grappling with one of the greatest problems any British government has had to face. The public knows also that the nation's armed strength is to be cut, that the general standard of living is to be scaled down and that labor will be asked to work longer hours.

Thus far the hard-hit populace has taken the revelations in stride. The conservative Yorkshire Post, owned by former Foreign Minister Anthony Eden's family, has this to say about its friends the political enemy:

TESTIFIES IN OWN DEFENSE

State To Renew Cross - Examination Of Charlie Phillips

Lillington, N. C., Aug. 2.—(AP)—The State today renewed its cross-examination of Charlie Phillips in his attempt to convict him for the second time of the murder of his wife, Etta Mae.

Phillips, who did not testify in his first trial last September, was examined by his own attorneys for two hours and 15 minutes yesterday and then answered prosecution questions for an hour and 45 minutes before court adjourned.

Defense Counsel Neil M. K. Salmon said he expected to call Phillips' sister, Mrs. Will Hayes, and Fred Powell, a SBI handwriting expert, as witnesses.

Mrs. Hayes found the note which Mrs. Phillips a last-minute reprieve from the State's gas chamber and a new trial. The note, which the defense contends was a suicide message from Mrs. Phillips, was previously identified by Powell at the hearing for a new trial as being in Mrs. Phillips' handwriting.

Yesterday, Phillips took the stand in his own defense and swore that his wife was killed last August 18 when he struggled to take a pistol away from her to prevent her from committing suicide.

Phillips said he grabbed the barrel with his right hand and in the scuffle that followed the gun went off.

Under cross examination, Phillips admitted he had several quarrels with his wife but denied emotionally they ever had previous trouble. He said he had never made threats, never struck her, and never mistreated her.

EXPLOSIVE THREAT

London, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Police today made a swift search of the British capital for an unidentified man had telephoned a warning that it would be blown up in half an hour. No explosives were found.

The caller told the telephone operator that he was a member of the Irgun Zvai Leumi—Jewish extremist organization in Palestine.

White House Silent On Trip To Rio Meeting

Washington, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The White House today would neither confirm nor deny that President Truman will attend the Inter-American Security Conference in Brazil but said his plans will be made known later.

Press Secretary Charles G. Ross told reporters:

"There will be an announcement later as to the President's plans." He conceded the trip has been under contemplation but would not go beyond this.

In Rio de Janeiro, diplomats said Mr. Truman and his wife and daughter, Margaret, are expected there Sept. 4 aboard the battleship Missouri. Plans called for him to close the conference which begins Aug. 15, it was added.

Indonesians And Dutch Get UN Orbers To Halt Fight

Lake Success, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The United Nations today moved swiftly to stop the conflict in Indonesia with unprecedented orders to the Netherlands and Indonesian governments to cease hostilities immediately.

Terse notes were dispatched to the two governments within a few hours after last night's far-reaching Security Council decision calling upon them to stop fighting and settle their disputes by arbitration or other peaceful means.

The council debated only two days before issuing the cease-fire order in the strongest action ever taken by an U.N. organ. The hostilities began July 20.

To enforce its decision, the council under the U.N. charter can pull out the most potent weapons in its arsenal—economic sanctions and severance of diplomatic relations by all 55 members and, as a last resort, "such action by air, land and sea forces as may be necessary to maintain or restore international peace and security."

The vote was 8 to 0 with Britain, France and Belgium abstaining.

RAPS DANGER TO U. S. PRESS

Kent Cooper Hits Report Insinuating Gov't News Control

Williamsburg, Va., Aug. 2.—(AP)—The recent report of the self-styled "commission on the freedom of the press" contained an insinuation that "the government ultimatum may have to be the judge of what information the people here at home should have through the press."

Associated Press executive director Kent Cooper told a group of newspapermen and Virginia officials:

"Addressing a banquet session last night in connection with 'Freedom of the Press Night' at the Commonwealth Club," Paul Green's symposium drama of early American life—Cooper made his first comment on the report of the commission which was headed by Chancellor Robert M. Hutchins of the University of Chicago.

"It took freedom's thunder down the whole of 200 years to evoke this strange assault on the press from any learned American group," the AP executive said. "Nowhere in their voluminous reports do they point to the fact that the boon of press freedom, as we now have it, has stimulated and served the amazing progress of this nation toward the establishment of the most comfortable physical existence and the most advanced intellectual standard of any people on earth; that it has given the greatest contribution to interstate acquaintance and understanding; that it has knit our nation into homogeneity."

In the five years since he launched the present world discussion with the ultimate aim of a world press freedom, Cooper said, some curious manifestations in other lands were observed. "Of these," he said, "none is more amazing than the lack of understanding right here in our own country."

Anti-Semetic Signs In Britain

Liverpool, Eng., Aug. 2.—(AP)—Tension mounted in Liverpool today as red painted anti-Semitic signs appeared near the docks and Jewish shopkeepers' windows in several sections of the city were smashed. Windows of a synagogue also were broken.

The incidents apparently reflected resentment over the hanging of two British army sergeants by Jewish underground members in Palestine this week.

Continue Prosecute For Evading Draft

Washington, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Justice Department officials said today the policy of prosecuting all known, willful Selective Service violators continues in "full force" although the draft law has expired.

This comment was made in response to inquiries concerning dismissal in Federal District Court at San Francisco of a number of cases involving Selective Service registrations under fictitious names.

Babson Discusses Salesclerks

Gloucester, Mass., Aug. 1. Not long ago Boston's famous cartoonist, Dahl, pictured a well-dressed gentleman standing on his head in a well-known department store trying to attract the attention of some salesgirl. I know how this man felt standing on his head because I have been stood-up myself lately by salespersons—haven't you?

Why Do We Have Such Trouble Getting Waited On?

There can be no question but what many of our retail stores have a bad war-time hang over. During the war years most workers had to do double time. There was a shortage of both goods and services. We became accustomed to waiting in line behind the counter. Most customers were tolerant because they understood well the reasons for the lack of services.

Today, however, the quotas in most sales staffs is reasonably well filled. Hence, there is little excuse for the condescending attitude of the salesperson who feels she or he is doing us a favor to wait on us. I overheard one kindly old woman, whom I watched for some minutes trying to get a salesgirl to wait on her, finally retort: "Look at her, girl, are you mad or just sultry?"

Salesclerks The Real Bottleneck

The salesclerks and traveling salesmen of the nation are a most important factor in determining future business conditions. You need not be too undecided about the trend of business, just note how salesclerks act. They'll give you the answer. If they are courteous and anxious to serve, general business will be good for another year or two at least. If they are indifferent and slow to serve, look for a falling off in sales, accompanied by gradually increasing unemployment.

One reason for present indifference is the minimum wage laws of various states. Because the law prevents penalizing sales and indifferent clerks with pay cuts, too many clerks don't care what they do or say. I believe in good wages. Every merchant should work for a high wage standard in his city; it helps business. But wages should be adjustable to the service rendered. Fixed wages and hours—either by laws or unions—encourage carelessness.

DUTCH FORCES CONSOLIDATE GAINS IN JAVA

Continue Drive In Sumatra; Indonesians Plan Defense of Capital

Batavia, Java, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The Dutch Army announced that mopping up and consolidation were under way throughout Java today, while in Sumatra they claimed new gains in a drive southward on the Medan front.

These reports were contained in a communique issued just after news reached this Dutch Colonial capital that the United Nations Security Council would ask both the Dutch and the Indonesian Republic to cease hostilities in progress since July 20.

The Republicans by their own admission were anti-Indonesian infiltration of the Dutch push toward their capital of Jogjakarta in South Central Java.

A broadcast from Jogjakarta yesterday reported that the Republican high command had declared the city and surroundings to be a military area and had ordered Lt. Gen. Cerdj Soemahardjo to direct preparations for a last-ditch defense.

The Netherlands army's communique, in the first official report of any Indonesian army surrenders to the Dutch, said 30 Republican officers and men had voluntarily given up their arms at Lawang above Malang, East Java.

The Dutch said they captured 10 Germans and three Japanese at Pematangstian, and our other Japanese in South Sumatra and West Java.

The army communique said the Dutch in North Sumatra had occupied Kabanjalaba, about 38 miles southwest of Medan, in a push from the former Republican capital of Sumatra, Pematangsiantar, about 45 miles east of Kabanjalaba.

Will Give Away Car Without Lottery Taint

Smithfield, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Smithfield is determined to give away that 1947 Chevrolet coach, but its good citizens are going to do it with no strings attached and without any taint of a lottery. H. I. Peterson, president of the Chamber of Commerce, said today:

"The automobile will be the grand prize of Smithfield's annual fair, which is planned originally to give away the car with chances being issued on merchandise purchased from Smithfield merchants."

Although no official opinion was asked, the state attorney general's office let it be known here that a drawing for the car under such conditions would constitute a lottery and a violation of law.

Foremen's Union Files Complaint

Washington, Aug. 2.—(AP)—A suit by the Foremen's Association of America, filed in Federal District Court, seeks to have the Taft-Hartley Labor Act declared unconstitutional.

The complaint, filed late yesterday, is aimed particularly at a provision of the act which eliminates the obligation of employers to bargain collectively with unions of supervisory employees.

Problems For NLRB

About 5,000 Cases Remaining To Be Solved By Board; New Ones Keep Coming; How Wagner Act Affected By Taft-Hartley Law; Foremen Cases Thrown Out

Washington, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The men form unions, they get no new National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) steps into a half-dozen problems.

It has on hand about 5,000 unsettled cases before it starts looking at new ones coming up under the new Taft-Hartley labor law.

Under the previous labor law, the Wagner act which Congress passed in 1935, the NLRB was a three-man affair.

The new law makes it a five-man board. Three of the old members remain and two new ones have been added.

The Wagner act itself is practically unchanged by the Taft-Hartley law. That new law just adds things mostly to the old law.

In the year between July 1, 1946, and June 30, 1947, the old NLRB was hit with almost 15,000 cases. It got rid of all but about 5,000. Those 5,000 have to be handled in some way although some can be tossed out without much trouble.

For example, about 150 of the 5,000 cases involve disputes about foremen who wanted to form unions.

Under the Wagner act foremen could form unions. But the new Taft-Hartley law says that if fore-

men under the old law the board did not have to consider jurisdictional disputes between two unions over a certain kind of work, benefits and strikes to force a boss to violate the law.

HIGHER LAW OF LIBERTY

Christian independence is a very important teaching of the Christian gospel. It is the antithesis of the world's attitude of dependence. According to the standards of the world, we insist, particularly when we are injured on standing up for our rights. This, maintained Jesus, really displays a lack of independence. It demonstrates the fact that one is not independent of the thing or the person hurting him. One who truly has the spirit of Christ is able to rise above the damaging things of life until when he is reviled, he reviles not again; when he is smitten, he turns the other cheek; when compelled to go one mile, he goes two.

Behind such an attitude lies, of course, the law of love. It takes real courage to put this law into operation. We are willing at any time to try it if we are confident that the other party will respond in the same spirit. Christ, however, urged his followers to act lovingly, take the risk that others will not take, and be willing to bear the consequences.

An attitude like this makes Christianity an adventure and requires even more courage than does fidelity to military duty. Christ himself took the risk, and it involved his crucifixion. It may do the same for his followers and often has, but the end has also proved in every instance to be worth the cost.

WASHINGTON LETTER

Washington.—When Mrs. Georgia Lusk, a Democrat and New Mexico's first congresswoman, came to "Capitol Hill" in January, she was welcomed by the confusion and impatient because Congress "didn't seem to get anywhere."

Now she says the confusion doesn't bother her any more and she is impressed with the amount of work that has been done.

"The members put more sincere effort and study on bills than they are given credit for, and they are a hard-working group as a whole," she says.

She is only "disappointed" that so little consideration has been given to the improvement of education and the extension of its opportunities to all groups.

"Federal aid to education," she says, "is not a subject. Action could have been taken this session without further delay. Congress had all the facts. There is nothing new to present for its consideration."

A graduate of the State Teachers Normal School at Silver City, a former school teacher and for eight years State Superintendent for Public Instruction, Mrs. Lusk was eager to serve on the Education and Labor Committee.

Instead she was appointed to serve on the Veterans Affairs committee. She worked on legislation providing extension of the veterans' life insurance plan and increased benefits for all groups on pensions.

"It is very important," she says, "for the government to assume responsibility to provide educational opportunities for all children. Many states are already doing this, but many are unable to finance an educational program."

This, she believes, is not a gift, but an investment in future citizenship.

During her years as state superintendent of schools, Mrs. Lusk helped bring about the extension of the school term to nine months, got teachers' salaries increased and their training requirements raised. Salaries were gradually increased from a one-time low of \$750 to \$2,400 for a teacher with an A.B. degree and no experience.

Mrs. Lusk, sweet-faced, motherly-looking with blue eyes and soft gray hair, was becomingly attired in a finely checked gray and white wool suit, the jacket draped over her shoulders. She wore an elegant white blouse fastened with a large pearl button and, at the neckline, a small silver bow pin. Her necklace was of cut crystal.

The New Mexico congresswoman likes parties, plays bridge but confesses she's "no shark." She spends a lot of time reading.

Mrs. Lusk has had three sons. The eldest, Virgil, 30, was killed in an airplane crash in California after returning from the African front during the war. Mrs. Lusk will visit this widow at Laguna Beach, Calif., this summer.

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Future Recruits May Soon Get Third Army Duty

Former servicemen may soon enlist in the regular army and be assured of an initial assignment of at least one year's duration within the limits of the Third Army area, which includes the states of North Carolina, South Carolina, and other southern states, according to a statement made today by M. Sgt. Virgil B. Lindsey, commanding officer of the Greenville sub-station of the army recruiting service.

The sergeant further explained that the new directive authorizes the enlistment of former members of the army, navy and marine corps and coast guard, who were honorably discharged on or after May 12, 1945, for specific assignments with specific units in the Third Army area where vacancies exist.

These vacancies will be published from time to time, and quotas will be assigned to the recruiting service. The local substation is expecting a quota momentarily.

Sgt. Lindsey said enlistees under this directive will not be eligible for overseas service for a minimum period of one year, unless his entire outfit is transferred overseas. If this should occur, he will accompany his unit.

More Clashes In Greece Reported

Athens, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Widespread guerrilla activity and clashes between the army and guerrilla bands were reported from northern and central Greece today.

Press and official dispatches said 59 guerrillas were killed or wounded at Chrysi near Kastoria and between 50 and 60 others became casualties under air attack west of Neoussa and on Mount Kroussia.

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Suspect Is Slain At Scene Of Attack On Woman

Prentiss, Miss., Aug. 2.—(AP)—Officers shot and killed a Negro suspect here yesterday at the scene of the rape of a white woman.

Sheriff G. O. Berry said he and highway patrolmen Andy Hopkins and J. Spencer Puckett fired the shots when the negro, Versie Johnson, tried to wrest a pistol from Puckett's holster.

At Poplarville, Miss., District Attorney E. B. Williams said he would make an investigation today and file charges against the persons who killed Johnson. A preliminary hearing will be held Wednesday, he said.

The sheriff said a crowd of about 75 persons assembled at the jail when the attack became known. He denied, however, the statement of his clerk that the crowd "gave the sheriff until 8 o'clock at night to get a confession." The crowd was orderly and made no threats, he said.

Probable cause on a first degree murder charge was found in city court here yesterday against Paul McLeod, 35, of Mebane, and his bond was continued at \$25,000. The charge against Robert McLeod, 31, of Graham, was reduced to accessory to murder, and his bond was lowered from \$25,000 to \$5,000.

BUNDY TELLS ABOUT SHRINE

Hospitals Have Cured Or Helped Many Crippled Children

W. J. (Dick) Bundy, potentate of Sudan Temple, Mystic Shrine, after-dinner speaker at the Greenville Kiwanis club's supper meeting last night, gave an interesting history of Shrine hospitals for crippled children and eloquently told what the Shrine is.

"The Shrine," he said, "is designated to keep a little of the boy in the man; as an escape from the serious problems of life; to teach men the importance of laughter and happiness; to plant smiles in a world of sorrow.

"Here the cares, anxieties, vexations and struggles of our daily life are laid aside and temporarily forgotten, while we enjoy the beneficial relaxation of fraternal friendship and harmless amusement," Bundy said, and added: "The underlying principles of our order are pleasure without intemperance; hospitality without rudeness; jollity without coarseness."

Telling the story of Shrine hospitals for crippled children, the speaker said over 100,000 children in North America have been cured or improved who would otherwise be hopeless cripples. Thirty thousand children who cannot afford to pay are treated each year, and top flight surgeons, orthopedic surgeons and nurses care for them. Operating costs of the Shrine hospitals is about \$1,500,000 a year. Last year, Bundy said, 2,600 crippled children entered the Shrine hospitals on stretchers or in somebody's arms and walked out cured or much improved. Crippled children who enter must be under 14, mentally sound, and who can be helped, and they must be those who cannot afford to pay.

Entrance to the hospitals is by sponsorship of a Shriner, who arranges through a family physician; no influence, or pull is needed. The dream of the Shriners is to have enough hospitals to do away with the long waiting list and provide that no child shall suffer. The hospitals are supported by Shrine dues, general donations (unsolicited), legacies, East-West football games and the "Ladder of Smiles." The Shrine takes its members from Masonic lodges.

J. Archie Rogers had charge of the program. Lt.-Governor Ed Rawl introduced Potentate Bundy. President Eli Bloom presided and thanked the speaker for his eloquent after-dinner speech.

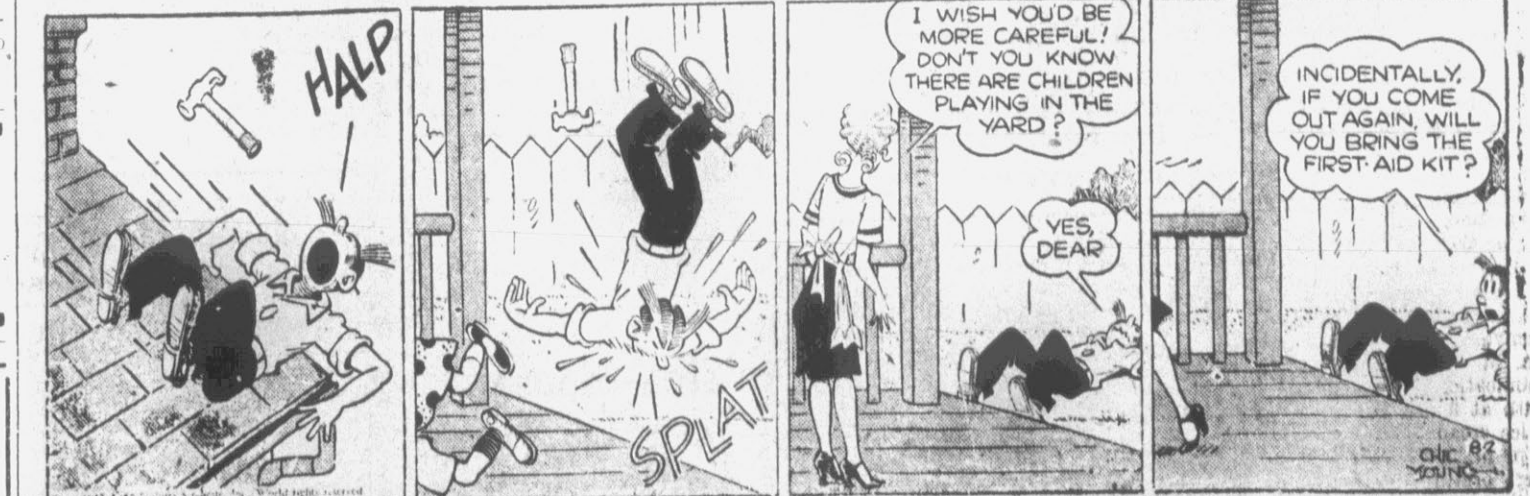

Hospital Plans Will Include Nursing School

Included in the plans for the new 140-bed hospital for Pitt County is a much-needed school of nursing, a spokesman for the Hospital committee said today. "There has been no nursing school in this county since 1932, when the school at Pitt General Hospital was discontinued. Consequently, the nurses procured for the past fifteen years have had to be imported from schools outside the county. A great many women served with distinction as army and navy nurses, hospital technicians, pharmacists mates and the like during the war. When peace came a large number of these women were married, had moved to other parts of the country or chose professions other than caring for the sick.

"At the present time the supply of nurses in Pitt county is critically short and these conditions have prevailed for a long while. The nurses aides and practical nurses have done and are doing their utmost to fill in the gaps left by the registered nurse. With no school in our county the doctors must depend on foreign hospitals to furnish this area with the indispensable 'R. N.'"

The proposed 140-bed hospital is simply large to support a School of Nursing. The plans call for the latest in equipment and instruction for the school. It will offer a wonderful opportunity to the young women of Pitt County for a respected profession. Nurses training anywhere is considered as honorable, high-class work. Training also provides a woman with the learning to make her own living should she find it necessary to financially support herself," the public-spirited citizen said.

Lillington, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Six Dunn and Sanford men faced gambling charges today as the result of testimony given in an alleged bad check case that they had played in poker games for stakes running as high as \$100 a hand.

Six were arrested on a bench warrant issued by Superior Court Judge John J. Burney yesterday after Donald Dyer, a Dunn taxi driver, had told of witnessing numerous "high-stake" games.

The arrests grew out of a suit brought by Dyer against Jackson involving a \$300 check. Dyer, while testifying, began to describe the alleged gambling operations.

Solicitor Jack Hooks stopped him until he got the court stenographer into the courtroom to take down his testimony.

Find Wreckage Missing Plane

Rome, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The U. S. army public relations office said today the wreckage of a flying fortress found in the mountains near Grenoble, France, presumably was that of a European air transport service (EATS) plane which disappeared last Nov. 1 on a flight from Naples to Bovingdon, England.

The ship was reported at the time to have crashed somewhere in France with a crew of eight. Among those aboard was T-Sgt. W. S. Cassell of Mount Airy, N. C., assistant radio operator.

Anti-British Slogan Painters Held By Police

New York, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Anti-British slogans were found last night painted on buildings housing British consulates in five major cities throughout the country.

Phrases such as "British following Nazis," "British are Nazis," and "Exodus 1947," the name of the Jewish refugee ship seized en route to Palestine, appeared on consular buildings in New York, Philadelphia and other big cities.

In Philadelphia police arrested two youths, Daniel Tapper, 17, of Camden, N. J., and Sid Troy, of New York, and charged them with malicious mischief. They were arrested when a group of painters were surprised sneaking slogans and Swastikas on the Philadelphia Savings Fund Society building that houses the British consulate.

World Warned Atomic Supplies Must Be Shared

Lake Success, Aug. 2.—(AP)—United Nations atomic delegates warned today that atomic stockpiles and production facilities must be distributed among the nations to avoid tempting an aggressor to launch an atomic war.

In one of a series of papers which make up a preview of the second report of the UN atomic energy commission, a group of delegates declared that the seizure of stockpiles and production facilities, plus facilities using nuclear fuel, would be a signal that a nation was about "to embark on atomic warfare."

Russia did not take part in drawing up the papers.

"It is of vital importance that production facilities, facilities utilizing nuclear fuel and stockpiles should be distributed among nations in such a way as to minimize the military advantage that their seizure would provide for a nation which has aggressive intentions," the delegates said.

Lack Of Buyers And Graders Closes Markets

Valdosta, Ga., Aug. 2.—(AP)—Closing of newly opened tobacco markets at Claxton, Ga., and Jasper, Fla., was blamed today on a lack of buyers and withdrawal of government graders.

Tobacco men, who declined to be quoted by name, said only one company was buying at Claxton and only two at Jasper. These were domestic companies which bought on cigarette grades. Leaf grades, expected in volume next week, were expected to go begging because of a lack of foreign buyers.

From 35 to 50 per cent of the tobacco sold on the two markets was going into government loans. This is about double the ratio for other markets in the belt. Government graders were sent to the markets, but were withdrawn when it was found that buyers are lacking.

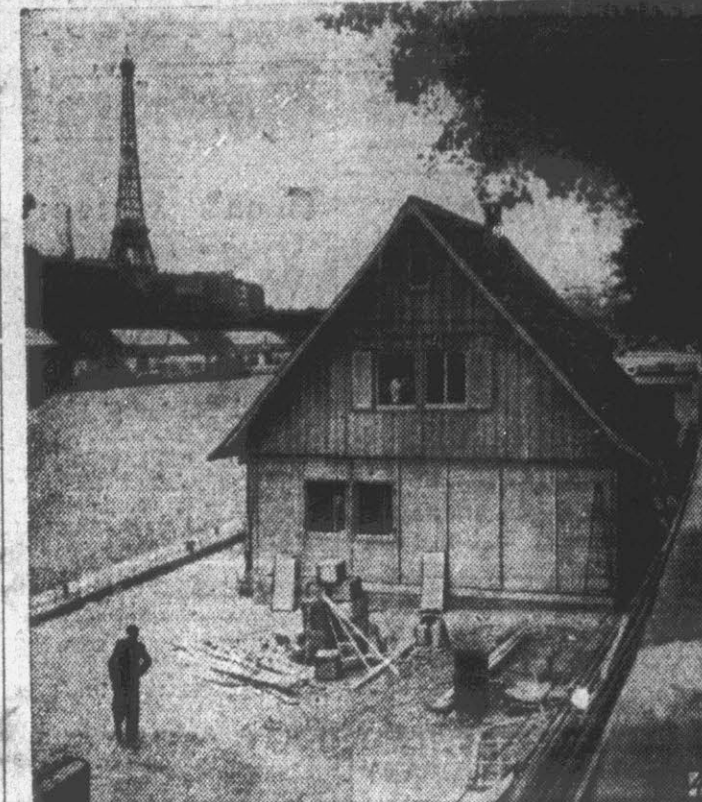

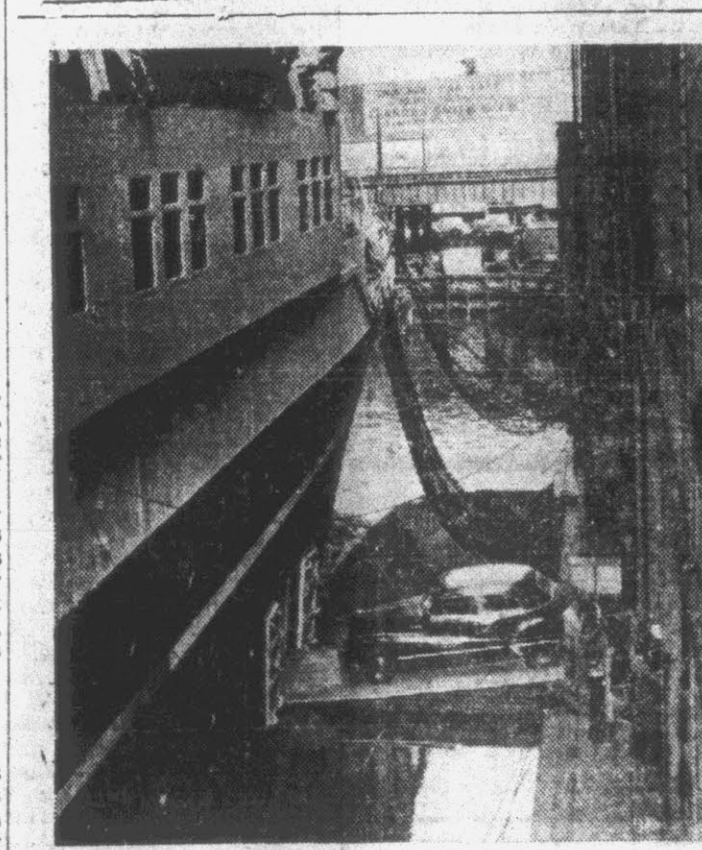

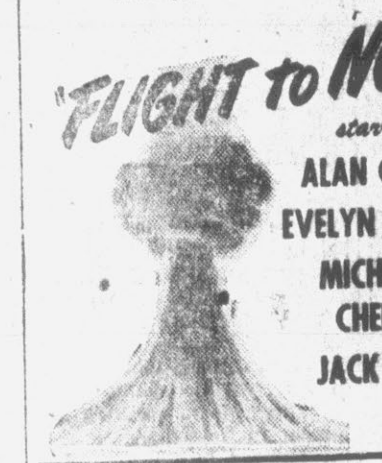
