GOV'T KEEPS SPECIAL WAR PLANTS READY

Royall Reports Preparedness Effort In Event Of Another Conflict

Washington, Aug. 4.—(AP)—The War Department plans to keep 60 complete government-owned industrial plants ready for immediate specialized production in event of another war.

Secretary of War Royall made public a report yesterday covering the Department's plans to "have in stock, or to provide by prompt production in our arsenals and standby plants, sufficient material to resist an aggressor during the first stage."

The 60 plants, worth \$2,301,348,000, would cost \$25,122,000 to maintain, but Royall pointed out this amount may be reduced substantially if the plants are leased out for civilian use.

Royall listed these other readiness plans of the War Department, some of which depend upon enactment of legislation pending in Congress:

1. Sale or lease of 17 additional government industrial plants worth \$1,000,000,000 with stipulations they can be taken over in wartime.
2. Maintenance of \$350,000,000 worth of standby machine tools and productive equipment for the army air forces and technical services.
3. Stockpiling \$210,000,000 of scarce strategic materials.

Attlee And Aides In Meetings On Crisis

Special Economic Cabinet Meets With Prime Minister To Put Finishing Touches On Battle For Economic Survival

London, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Prime Minister Attlee met with his top cabinet ministers today to put the finishing touches to the plan of battle for Britain's economic survival. "Crisis" talks—how to tackle the economic situation caused by the rapid drain on the nation's dollar credits—went on at No. 10 Downing Street throughout the day.

A special economic cabinet including Attlee, Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin, Chancellor of the Exchequer Hugh Dalton, Lord President of the Council Herbert Morrison, and Board of Trade President Sir Stafford Cripps, is doing most of the work. It will report to a full meeting of the cabinet tomorrow.

The plan will be announced by Attlee Wednesday at the start of a two-day debate in the House of Commons on the state of the nation. There will be a parallel debate in the House of Lords.

The Prime Minister's engagements today included a meeting with the defense committee to consider cutting the size of the British armed forces in Germany, Austria, Greece and Italy.

Attlee presided at the meeting of service chiefs, Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery, chief of the Imperial general staff who is hurrying home from a tour of the Far East, was represented by a deputy.

Rainbow In The Sky

Indonesian And Dutch Compliance With UN Cease-Fire, Order Brightens Whole Future Of That Organization; First Such Order, Must Be Made To Stick

We get a wee glimpse of rainbow through the storm-clouds in the compliance by Holland and the Indonesian Republics with the order by the United Nations Security Council for cessation of the bloody hostilities in the Dutch East Indies.

This is the first command ever issued by the council in the interests of peace. It may be the last if it isn't made to stick.

Whether it is made to stick will depend on whether members of the Security Council can bury self-interest and their own differences long enough to deal with this Indonesian threat to global tranquility. The League of Nations died because of the inability of its members to measure up to these identical requirements.

A world which is most damnable weary of bloodshed and hunger and privation thinks it's about time all nations got aboard the peace bandwagon—and "the devil take the hindmost."

One recognizes that Holland—as the "Mother Country"—has had to swallow a bitter pill in ordering the cease fire against those whom she regards as rebels. Just how bitter was made clear last Thursday when the Dutch ambassador to the U.S., Geico van Kieffens told the Security Council that this was a purely domestic affair and that the council had no right to intervene.

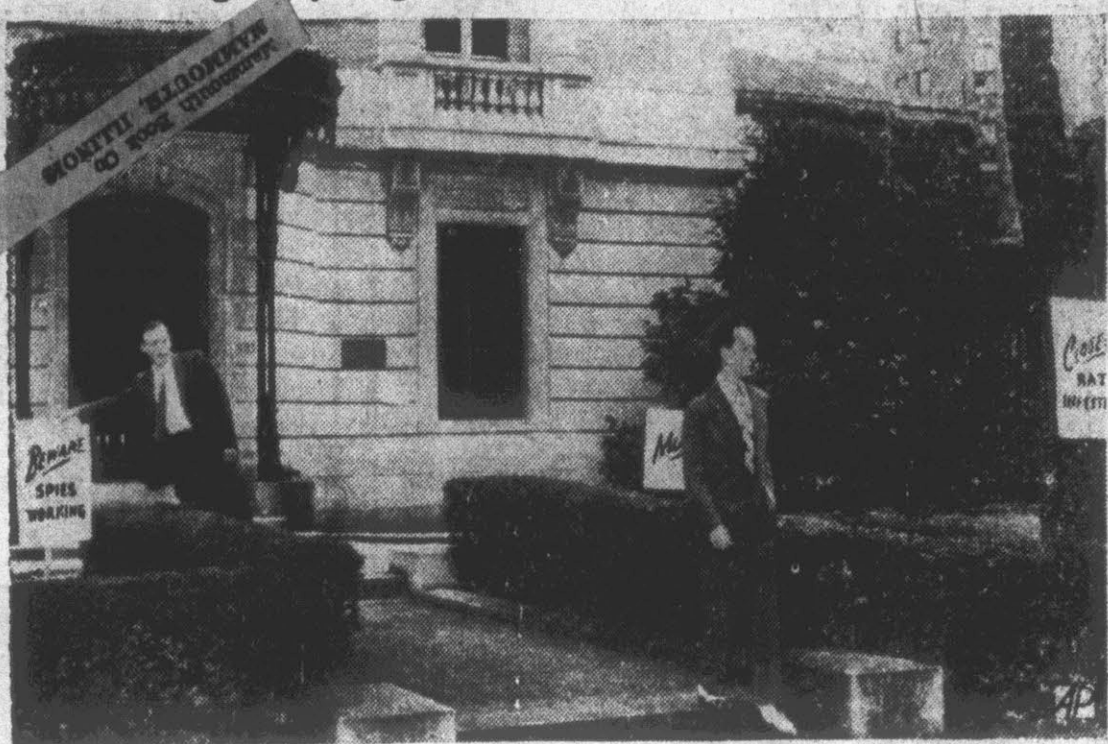
Again, one can understand why the representative of an imperial government should have that viewpoint. However, the ambassador most certainly will run up against the argument that, in the new era which the world is entering, a quarrel between a "mother country" and a dependency of another race no longer constitutes an "internal affair." Were the trouble in Holland itself, undoubtedly there would arise the question of whether the nation's sovereignty was being infringed.

Of course this opens up a big field for argument. We see that in the nature of the Security Council vote on the Australian-American resolution which ordered The Netherlands and Indonesian governments to cease fighting immediately and settle their differences by peaceful means. There are eleven members on the council, including the Big Five—America, Britain, Russia, France and China. The vote was 8-0 in favor of the resolution, with three abstentions.

Those abstaining were imperial governments—Britain, France and Belgium—and they kept quiet for obvious reasons.

Elliott Roosevelt On Witness Stand

Promises Investigating Senators "The Complete Facts"; Expresses Surprise At Being Considered Important Factor In Wartime Procurement

Washington, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Elliott Roosevelt, promised investigating senators today "the complete facts" about his connection with the letting of wartime airplane contracts to Howard Hughes.

The tall son of the late President, taking the stand after John Meyer Hughes' publicity man, had testified about entertaining Roosevelt at rounds of parties, told senators in an opening statement that "serious implications" had been raised about his record.

"If it is true that, for the price of entertainment, that I made recommendations which would have in any way endangered the lives of the men under me, defrauded the government, ... or slowed up the war effort, that fact should be known to the people," he declared. "I am here to give you the complete facts."

Roosevelt said it seemed to him that he was "not big enough or important enough in the overall procurement procedure" to be the object of a committee investigation, but added:

"It happens that I had some rather intimate relations with the man who then was commander in chief and who was in charge of the war effort."

The committee previously has heard testimony that an Air Corps decision not to buy a photo-reconnaissance plane developed by Hughes was reversed after Roosevelt recommended the plane favorably.

A contract for 100 planes was let to Hughes, but it later was pared down to two planes, none of which was available during the war.

Roosevelt's appearance brought out the biggest crowd of the hearings. Every seat was filled, 100 or more persons stood around the walls of the Senate room and scores more stood outside waiting vainly to get in.

Shortly before he was called, Senator Ferguson (R-Mich.) had declared the committee's investigation of wartime spending on entertainment will extend to many firms. He called such spending by Hughes' company a "glaring example."

Ferguson made the promise to Democratic colleagues as an inter-party snafu broke out over the course of his war investigating subcommittee inquiry into the Hughes Aircraft contracts.

Senator Pepper (D-Fla.) had objected that too much time of the hearings, starting on a second week today, has been taken up with a discussion of the free spending of John W. Meyer. Hughes' publicity man, and not enough on the aircraft Hughes contracted to build.

Germans Rove Countryside In Search For Food

Berlin, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Gen. Lucius D. Clay reports that Germans roving the countryside in quest of food for the coming winter have fought gun battles with German police assigned to guard crops in the American zone.

Clay's semi-monthly report to Washington said that seven such affairs had occurred in Hesse during the last two weeks of July and that in Wuertemberg-Baden more than 400 pillagers had overwhelmed a small German police force guarding potato harvesters.

The military governor said that considerable absenteeism in industry had been noted as Germans searched the countryside for food.

ALARMED OVER LOAN ASPECTS

Churchill "Relying" On U.S. To Ease Some Provisions

Woodstock, Eng., Aug. 4.—(AP)—Winston Churchill pledged today that his Conservative party would back any efforts of the Labor government to obtain "easements" of the swiftly disappearing \$3,750,000,000 U.S. loan and to obtain new American credits.

Churchill, in a party speech, said some of the loan conditions "alarmed" him particularly the clause obligating Great Britain to make current sterling transactions by British sterling convertible into dollars.

"However I relied, and rely now, on the wisdom of the fair-minded American people to make the necessary easements, without which a policy for which they have made heavy sacrifices will certainly fail in its effects," the wartime prime minister said.

"There is no shame in one brave and faithful ally, deeply injured in the common struggle, asking another to help him recover and stand upon his feet. Had the positions been reversed, we would have done the same for them."

Churchill said he also had objected to U.S. loan terms under which, "if we were incapable of finding dollars to pay for American imports of tobacco or other commodities, we must reduce also in equal proportion all similar imports from our Dominions and colonies or any other alternative source."

Try Japs For Beheading Two U. S. Airmen

Yokohama, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Two American fliers, "convicted" under Japan's wartime enemy act, were beheaded by Japanese who knew the act was illegal, a prosecution witness said today at the Eighth Army Commission trial of three former Japanese generals and five others on charges of complicity in the case.

The witness, Yasukazu Shiramura, said the B-29 was shot down, were convicted after a two-hour trial in Osaka and sentenced to death. The method of execution was not prescribed.

On August 15, 1945, one day after the surrender, the records of the case were ordered destroyed, Shiramura said.

Henderson, N. C., Aug. 4.—(AP)—Fred S. Royster of Henderson, President of the Bright Belt Warehouse Association, today asked five-cured tobacco growers of the border belt who desire to sign up with the Federal Stabilization program to do so before the opening of markets Thursday.

He said warehouse offices now are open to accept signatures. However growers may join at the time they sell their tobacco if they wish he pointed out.

The Five-Cured Tobacco Stabilization Corporation, which handles the government price support program again will function on all markets. Royster said the market this year should be more stable with less fluctuation in prices than in recent years because the support price, 90 per cent of the 444 cents a pound parity, is close to the anticipated average price for the crop.

ASK JURY TO INDICT SEVEN MEN AND BUSH

Judge Frizzelle Outlines Responsibilities Of Grand Jury In Unique Case

Jackson, N. C., Aug. 4.—(AP)—Solicitor Ernest Tyler today asked a Northampton grand jury to indict seven white men charged in an attempt to lynch George (Buddy) Bush, 24-year-old negro, last May 30. He also asked for an indictment against the negro, who is charged with an attempt to rape a young white schoolteacher.

Judge Paul F. Frizzelle made a forty-minute address to the grand jury in which he outlined the responsibility of its members and told them that they must have an eye, intellect and a conscience aimed toward the performance of their duties.

Judge Frizzelle cautioned the grand jury that they must keep absolute secrecy on what occurs in the grand jury room, and warned referring to any particular case said: "If the evidence does not make out probable cause, don't return a true bill but if it does do the only thing you can do—return a true bill."

"I will be holding court here maybe for thousands of years and the part that you or I play if we are worthy of our forebears will not reflect dishonor upon us," the judge said.

Bush, a sawmill worker, successfully fled from armed and masked mobsters who had removed him from jail and placed him in a waiting automobile.

Tyler said he asked indictments on three counts against the white men, Russell Bryant, Robert Vann, Linwood Bryant, Gilbert Bryant, Gern Collier, Joe Cunningham and W. G. Cooper. They are charged with kidnapping, conspiracy to break and enter a jail with intent to injure or kill Bush. Each case carries a maximum of 15 years imprisonment upon conviction.

Whether the case of the seven men or that of the negro they are accused of abducting from the county jail here early last May 23 would be tried first depended upon the grand jury's action. Solicitor Tyler indicated he would follow the court calendar in determining which case is called first.

TRY AGAIN TO ENTER RUSSIA

Three House Members Ask For State Dept. Assistance

Washington, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Undetermined by Moscow's flat "no" to a trio of house members, three Republican Senators sought today to get their own peek inside Russia.

Senator Ferguson (Mich.) said he and Senators Bridges (N.H.) and Knowland (Calif.) have asked the State Department to try to get visas for them to visit the Soviet Union and the countries within the Russian orbit during an October trip abroad.

Ferguson said the trio, members of the Appropriations committee, want to get a first hand look at what the Soviet Union is doing before they are called upon to vote for funds to carry out the Marshall Plan for European recovery.

"We want to find out something about the cost of this proposed help for Europe, what the needs are there and how our efforts to bolster Greece and Turkey against threatened Communism are progressing," Ferguson told a reporter.

He added that the trio also want to get information on the operations of the State Department's Cultural Information program, including the "Voice of America" shortwave broadcasts beamed at Russia and other countries.

Pending Moscow's response to their request, Ferguson had nothing to say about the turn down encountered by Reps. Kersten (R-Wis.), Owens (R-Ill.) and Kennedy (D-Mass.) ten days ago.

LOWER SALES FOR TOBACCO

First Seven Days Behind '46 Figures On Georgia Belt

Valdosta, Ga., Aug. 4.—(AP)—Tobacco sales on the Georgia-Florida blue-cured markets for the first seven days ran considerably behind last year's figure and the average price fell more than \$3.00 per hundred pounds the Department of Agriculture reported.

The difference in volume, 56,792,955 pounds this season compared to 63,507,429 pounds during the first seven days of 1946, was attributed to strict adherence to sales limitation of 2,000 baskets per day for each set of buyers. This regulation was not generally observed last year.

The average price of \$44.51 a hundred, compared to \$47.75 for the same period last year, was making some gains as the second week of sales ended. As a result of better demand, the average on most of the cigarette type grades exceeded the Commodity Credit Corporation support level.

The general quality of tobacco sold last week did not measure up to that of the first two days, but it compared favorably to that of early sales last season.

Floating Mass Of Dead Fish On Florida Coast

Clearwater, Fla., Aug. 4.—(AP)—A great mass of dead fish—killed by a mysterious plague—was moving slowly northward along Florida's Gulf Coast today, and a health officer advised vacationists to postpone their vacations to the beaches in this area.

The mass with its accompanying amber colored waters was centered off Clearwater yesterday, moving about five miles every 24 hours.

The health officer suggested that vacationists wait about "10 days" before visiting the beaches. He stressed "we are not forbidding anything" and the difficulties from the masses of dead fish were "temporary."

The fish mass has been estimated to be 60 miles long and 25 miles wide. So many big fish are in the mass, statisticians in Dr. Campbell's office said, it gives the appearance "that one could walk across it like logs."

First Big Victory For Peace By United Nations As Dutch Similarly Bring Assault To Close; No Reservations In Cease-Fire Order

Batavia, Java, Tuesday, Aug. 15.—(AP)—President Soekarno of the Indonesian republic, in a midnight broadcast, called upon the Indonesian republic to halt hostilities against the Dutch.

This, coupled with a Dutch-peace fire order effective at midnight, gave the United Nations its first big victory for peace.

Soekarno, in a three-minute radio broadcast over the Jogjakarta radio, countermanded his July 21 order for the population to resist the Dutch with all their force. His cease-fire order was unequivocal, with no reservations.

Four hours earlier the Republican radio broadcast an answer to the U. N. Security Council foretelling the cease-fire order.

A Dutch spokesman said most Netherlands units were already pulled up, several hours before the midnight deadline. There was almost no activity today at 8:30 a.m., which had been the Dutch troops' expected jumping-off place for an attack toward Jogjakarta.

The United Nations Security Council last Friday called upon both sides to cease fighting.

In statements yesterday the Indonesians said they were "willing" to cease hostilities, but that a truce could be carried out effectively only if the Dutch withdrew to demarcation lines established last October. There was no indication of Dutch agreement to this.

At noon the Dutch announced landing of troops on the island of Madoera, off the east coast of Java.

Details of the operations on Madoera—which was to have been included in the Indonesian republic under the Cheribon agreement—were not disclosed by the army spokesman, who said merely that "safety measures" were being taken at the request of the population.

He added, however, that large quantities of rice were being sent to Madoera for relief of the 1,000,000 or more persons living on the island, most of whom he said were starving as a result of being cut off from the Java mainland.

Orders for Dutch troops to cease military operations effective at midnight tonight were issued last night by Dutch acting governor-general J. Van Mook, despite an expressed belief that the U. N. Security Council was exceeding its authorities in intervening.

Broadcasts from the Republican capital of Jogjakarta last night said the Republican government agreed "with the (Security Council) decision that hostilities should cease and was prepared to concert all its efforts for the execution of the cessation of hostilities."

Kinston Youth Dies In Italy

Rome, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Staff Sergeant James H. Barfield of Kinston, N. C., was fatally injured in an automobile accident July 27, the same day he was to fly home for an emergency furlough.

An army announcement said today Barfield died August 1 of injuries suffered in collision between his jeep and an Italian car as he rode back from the Pisa airfield to pick up some personal belongings he had left at Livorno.

Barfield was assigned to the 503 Military Police Battalion in Livorno.

West Europe's Trade

Experts Claim Revival Is Being Brought About Without Raw Materials Once Bought From Central Europe New Trade Trend Affects Marshall Plan

Washington Aug. 4.—(AP)—Western Europe's buying and selling is reviving in such a way it may not need the raw materials which it once bought in middle Europe and which now lie in the Russian orbit.

This has an important bearing on the success of the Marshall Plan. The information comes from one of the top-flight American government trade experts, who has just returned from a European look-see but who refuses to be quoted by name.

He found that European countries are beginning to build up a healthy trade with Latin America—a section of the world which can use the manufactured products of Europe and which has raw materials to sell in exchange.

It means Europe can get grain, beef, wool and coffee in a market that will take European goods in return. It means that English pounds, French francs and German marks, can be exchanged for the Latin American peso.

And for each commodity Europe buys with the peso, that much of Europe's wants need not be bought with Europe's rapidly dwindling supply of American dollars.

Before World War II, Western Europe's factories and factory people depended greatly on Eastern

Tobey Asserts RFC And B & O Help To Suppress Report Into Loan Deal

Washington, Aug. 4—(AP)—The weeks-long controversy earlier this year over a \$30,000,000 RFC-B and O loan arrangement flared anew today with a call from Senator Tobey (R-NH) for publication of a "suppressed" Congressional Committee report.

Tobey, chairman of a Senate Banking Subcommittee which conducted hearings into the railroad's financing last spring, contended that "unusual" and "unethical" efforts by the B. and O. and RFC officials helped keep the document secret.

RFC Chairman John D. Goodloe replied that he had asked members not to sign the report until they had studied it carefully because it covered ground already passed on by a federal court.

The hearings by Tobey's group revolved around an agreement by the RFC to extend its B. and O. loan from 1944 to 1965. Testimony brought charges and denials that the RFC engineered a "Fraudulent Bankruptcy" of the B. and O.

The inquiry was recessed early in May with tentative plans for a reopening later. Meantime, a tentative report was drafted.

Tobey's demand for its immediate publication followed weekend reports that the subcommittee had met in his absence shortly before Congress recessed last month and decided against releasing the findings.

From his home at Temple, N. H., last night, Tobey wired other members of the subcommittee that his wife's illness took him from Washington at the time. He added:

"I had no notice of the meeting although I am advised that reconstruction finance officials had advance notice and were outside the committee room in advance of the meeting."

"Had I been present, I would of course have fought any move to keep the content of the report from the taxpayers who have, through the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, \$30,000,000 of their money in the hands of the Baltimore and Ohio tied up in a long term loan."

Supt. June Rose Expects Larger Enrollment This Year

The Greenville city schools will open for the 1947-48 session on Monday, September 1.

The roster of teachers is complete. The supplies are nearly all in. The buildings have been repainted and repaired so that on opening day of school everything will move off smoothly.

In the elementary school there is only one change. Miss Ellen Carroll will teach the fifth grade in the Training School, taking the place of Miss Cleo Rainwater, who resigned.

In the high school, Miss Vivian Burton of Macon, Ga., who formerly taught in Rocky Mount city schools and Greensboro College, and last year in Mercer University, will take the place of Miss Jessie Lewis.

She will teach senior high school English. Miss Lewis resigned to go to Chapel Hill. Mrs. Mary Lowder Goodman, who formerly taught in Morgantown and Lenoir city schools, will teach junior high school English. Miss Annie Sue Perry of Rich Square, who received her master's degree this summer from East Carolina Teachers College, will teach commercial subjects to replace Miss Laura Hearn, who resigned to work at the college. E. B. McDowell will teach band and orchestra in place of H. A. McDowell, who resigned to teach in Florida. Mr. McDowell has been teaching in the Nashville city schools for the past four years.

Mrs. P. W. Picklesimer, who formerly taught science in the Greenville high school, and who for the past three and one-half years has been teaching in the science department at East Carolina Teachers College, returns to teach science in the place of Mrs. June Tripp.

A course in distributive education will be offered this year for the first time. This course in distributive education is somewhat similar to courses formerly offered in diversified occupations, except that distributive education applies only to the selling or merchandising field. This course is being introduced at the request of and with the cooperation of the Greenville Merchants Association. Teaching this course will be Gailther C. Frye of Gastonia.

Mr. Frye is a graduate of Guilford College and has done graduate work at the University of North Carolina in this particular field. To take care of the increased enrollment, new desks have been ordered and a temporary band room has been built on the east side of the high school auditorium. The band room will be made into two class rooms.

EAST ESCAPES HOT WEEKEND

Heat Wave Scorches Rest Of Nation; 110 Degrees Recorded

By the ASSOCIATED PRESS

The nation trudged back to work today to face a hot Monday after all but the East coast experienced a sweltering weekend.

A wave of heat warmed Sunday outings from the Pacific coast through the Mississippi Valley with Pierre, S. D., reporting the high-

est temperature—110—as Arkansas sweated through its eighth straight day of 100 plus which resulted in two deaths.

Although the Eastern Seaboard for the most part escaped the weekend's heat, temperatures were expected to climb today and forecasts were for continued high mercury readings over almost the entire nation for the next day or two.

Portland, Maine, however, hit a record low yesterday for the date as the mercury read 48, three degrees below the previous low set in 1927.

Across the country the temperature hit 90 in Los Angeles for the ninth straight day of 90 or above which the weather bureau said was the longest sustained hot spell since 1939. The heat is expected to continue over the lower Pacific coast.

All along the Rockies heat was the subject of the day Sunday and tem-

peratures up to 100 were predicted for the next two days in the plains area, with readings in the 90s in Utah and the mountain states. Phoenix, Ariz., reported 107 yesterday. Boise, Idaho had its hottest day since 1927—103.

The weather was considered ideal for crops in some parts of the plains and Midwestern states although Nebraska and Iowa reported need for rain, especially for corn.

The U. S. federal park system includes 26 parks, four historical parks, 82 monuments, 11 military parks, eight battlefield sites, six historic sites, one recreation area, nine miscellaneous memorials, 12 cemeteries and three parkways.

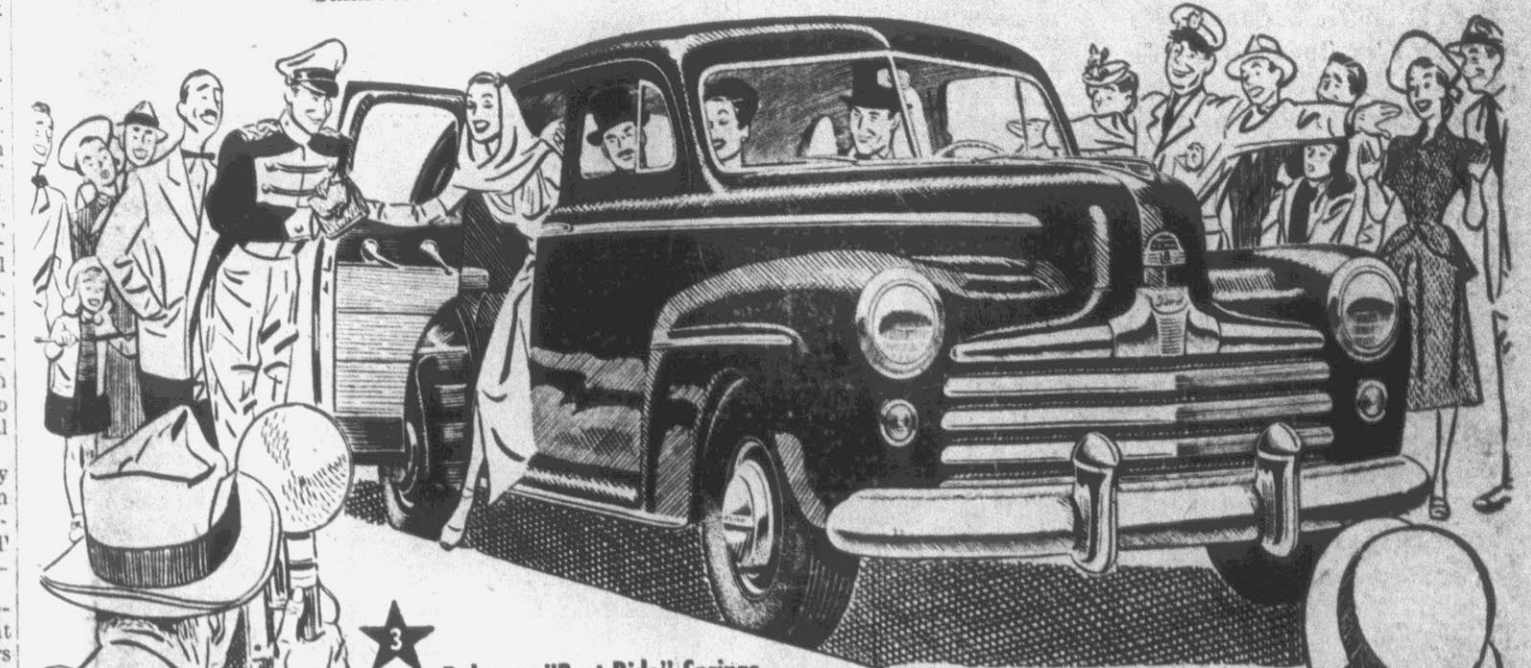

Many years ago a well-known comedian caused nationwide laughter by a clever antic which occurred in a part he played. He became very much enraged by a young clerk in his store and at last in desperation reached for a vase to hurl at the offender. Before hurling it however he bethought himself to look at the price mark. When he saw what it was, he immediately manifested complete self-control.

Audiences roared at the scene but few people thought of it as anything other than a clever and delightful piece of acting.

Counting the cost is a serious fact in the make-up of every sensible person. Too many people throw their lives away, or their happiness, or opportunities, because they lack the sense the comedian had when he looked at the price tag.

The Chinese have a proverb which says: "Life is a fair; pick what you want and pay for it." There is always a cost price on everything. Young people often fail to realize this and throw their futures away. Married couples, because of petty disagreements which grow out of all sensible proportions, throw away happiness for themselves and their children and take to divorce route. The habitual drinker had better look at the bottom of his glass after he empties and ponder the cost of a growing habit.

THE BRIGHTER SIDE

Despite some critical interpretation, (by those who habitually look for something to complain about) it is our own judgment that no greater evidence of the desire of some great powers to further fair-play in the United Nations could be found than in the final vote on whether or not that body would intervene in the Dutch-Indonesian war.

Britain, France and Belgium have been plagued by disputes with mandated areas, colonies or territories. The vote by the UN to intervene in the Netherlands' difficulties in Indonesia pre-empted a day when that same body might take up such points of unrest as Palestine, Indo-China or the admittedly dubious position of Belgium in the Belgian Congo.

It is self-evident that these powers should not desire to be put in a position wherein their own policies would be open to close scrutiny and criticism of a UN committee.

Britain, France and Belgium fought the move in Indonesia all through the debate, French delegate Alexandre Parodi even telling the Security Council after the balloting that he would have preferred to vote against the resolution but abstained because his veto would have killed it.

Abstention from the veto in this instance may have set a precedent—a precedent which Russia has repeatedly avoided in Iran and in the Balkan countries. Naturally Russia would not oppose action in Indonesia; such intervention did not step on her toes, and just might serve as an embarrassment to one of the Western Powers.

WASHINGTON LETTER

By JANE EADS

Washington—Last September top representatives of the teaching profession of 28 countries gathered at Endicott, N.Y., to consider mobilizing education for peace. Called together by the National Education Association (NEA), the conference was the largest and most representative international gathering of educators since before the war.

Highlighting the conference was the drafting of a constitution for a World Organization of the Teaching Profession (WOTP) which by June of this year had been ratified by 14 national associations.

Now announcement has been made that the WOTP is holding its first general conference in Glasgow, Scotland, Aug. 7-13. In addition to Glenn E. Snow of St. George, Utah, president of the NEA, eight other Americans will participate in the sessions with representatives from England, Scotland, Canada, Greece, Switzerland, N. Ireland, Haiti, Belgium, Luxembourg and Iceland and two United Nations observers, Louis Gros and Dr. Kuo Yu-Shou.

Purposes of the new organization are:

1. To make the highest standards of full and free education available to all without discrimination.

2. To improve the professional status of the teachers of the world and to promote their intellectual, material, social and civic interests and rights.

3. To promote world peace through the building of good will founded upon cooperation between nations in educational enterprises, based upon pertinent and accurate information.

4. To advise the appropriate organizations of the United Nations and of other international bodies

on educational and professional matters.

William G. Carr, general secretary of WOTP, says that in the making and keeping of the peace the teacher must take his place, and add his part. He insists it is a very important part.

The knowledge and attitudes which make for peace or war can be developed by education, Carr says. "No nation can most wisely educate its people for peace unless all nations cooperate to do the same."

The WOTP intends to meet "at least annually" to keep in constant touch with members by means of a journal and to employ a full-time staff to execute the policies on which they agree.

Delegates from this country to the Glasgow Conference include, in addition to Snow and Carr, Sidney Almsworth, Wisconsin Education Association; Katherine Greener, Maryland Education Association; Irving Pearson, Illinois Education Association; Mr. and Mrs. George Stapp, Georgia Education Association; Phil Cook, executive secretary, Phi Delta Kappa, and Miss Vanett Lawler, Music Educators National Conference.

He testified the note could not have been traced or simulated.

Under cross examination of Franklin T. Dupree, who is assisting in the prosecution, Baker said he had read about the case in newspapers and had volunteered his services to defense attorneys.

He said he did not get money, but he wrote material for a book on handwriting he is writing.

He told Dupree he could not say whether the note was written at the point of a gun or club.

Dupree asked Baker if his testimony was not in the nature of a speech to the jury, and the witness answered "Yes."

Baker pointed out similarities in what he said were letter formation, phrasing, signatures, rhythm, pressure, speed and spelling in the note and the postal cards. This led him to believe, he said, that "no person could have written that note except the person who signed it (Mrs. Phillips)."

The defense said it would offer four or five more witnesses today.

Terrorists Rob Haifa Bank And Kill Official

Jerusalem, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Eight young Jews, including a girl, killed a Jewish official and wounded the Jewish manager of Barclays Bank in Haifa today and escaped with \$5,000.

The fresh violence came after the Jewish underground issued a statement saying "We have not settled our hanging account with the British." They have threatened new hangings.

Last week two young British sergeants, who had been kidnapped and held hostages for two weeks were hanged in a forest preserve near Nafanya, where they strangled and bled to death from wounds cut by the thin knotted ropes.

The Barclays Bank official who was shot to death had resisted the Jewish bandits. The bank manager was beaten until he opened the money box. Witnesses said the robbers escaped in a taxi.

Fail To Mediate Paraguayan War

Rio De Janeiro, Brazil, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Diplomats at today that Brazilian and Argentine efforts to mediate the Paraguayan Civil War had been futile. They said President Higinio Morinigo of Paraguay had refused to accept cessation of hostilities as a condition for mediation discussions.

(Paraguayan government statements last week claimed the capture of Concepcion, Rebel headquarters and stronghold.)

The Brazilian news agency AssoPress reported confusion in Asuncion due to surprise among government forces at the new vigor in the insurgent ranks.

President Back From Vacation

Washington, Aug. 4.—(AP)—President Truman returned shortly after noon today to his work-pile White House desk after a weekend resting at the Presidential mountain retreat, "Shangri-La."

On the drive back, he halted at suburban Silver Springs, Md., to meet the train bringing Mrs. Truman from Missouri. The President walked about the station platform for several minutes awaiting the train. He greeted his wife with a kiss and escorted her to his car.

Rubber Hose Scares Birds From Cherries

Roxboro, N. C., Aug. 4.—(AP)—Walter Hamlett, Person County farmer, studied the ways of birds that were robbing his cherry trees and came up with a solution that assures him of plenty cherry pies and preserves.

He found that the birds were afraid of black snakes, and put three pieces of black rubber hose near the trees. He says it worked.

Notice Of Bond Order And Of Public Hearing Thereon

The foregoing order has been introduced and a sworn statement has been filed under the County Finance Act showing the assessed valuation of Pitt County to be \$14,670,233.00 and the net debt for other than school purposes, including the proposed bonds, to be \$1,623,500.00. A tax will be levied for the payment of the proposed bonds and interest, if the same shall be issued. Any citizen or taxpayer may protest against the issuance of such bonds at a meeting of the Board of County Commissioners to be held at 10 a. m. August 15, 1947, in the Courthouse, in Greenville or at an adjournment thereof.

Tommy Lee with two doubles and a single and Arthur Jacobs with three singles led the 12 hit attack off the two Tarboro hurlers.

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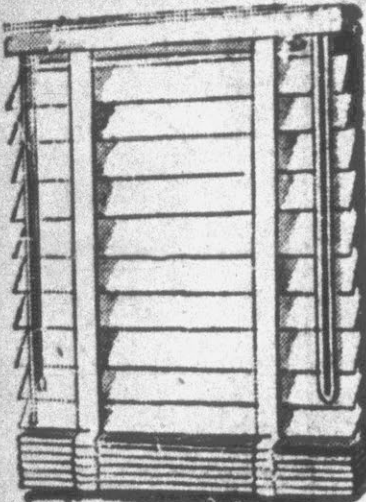
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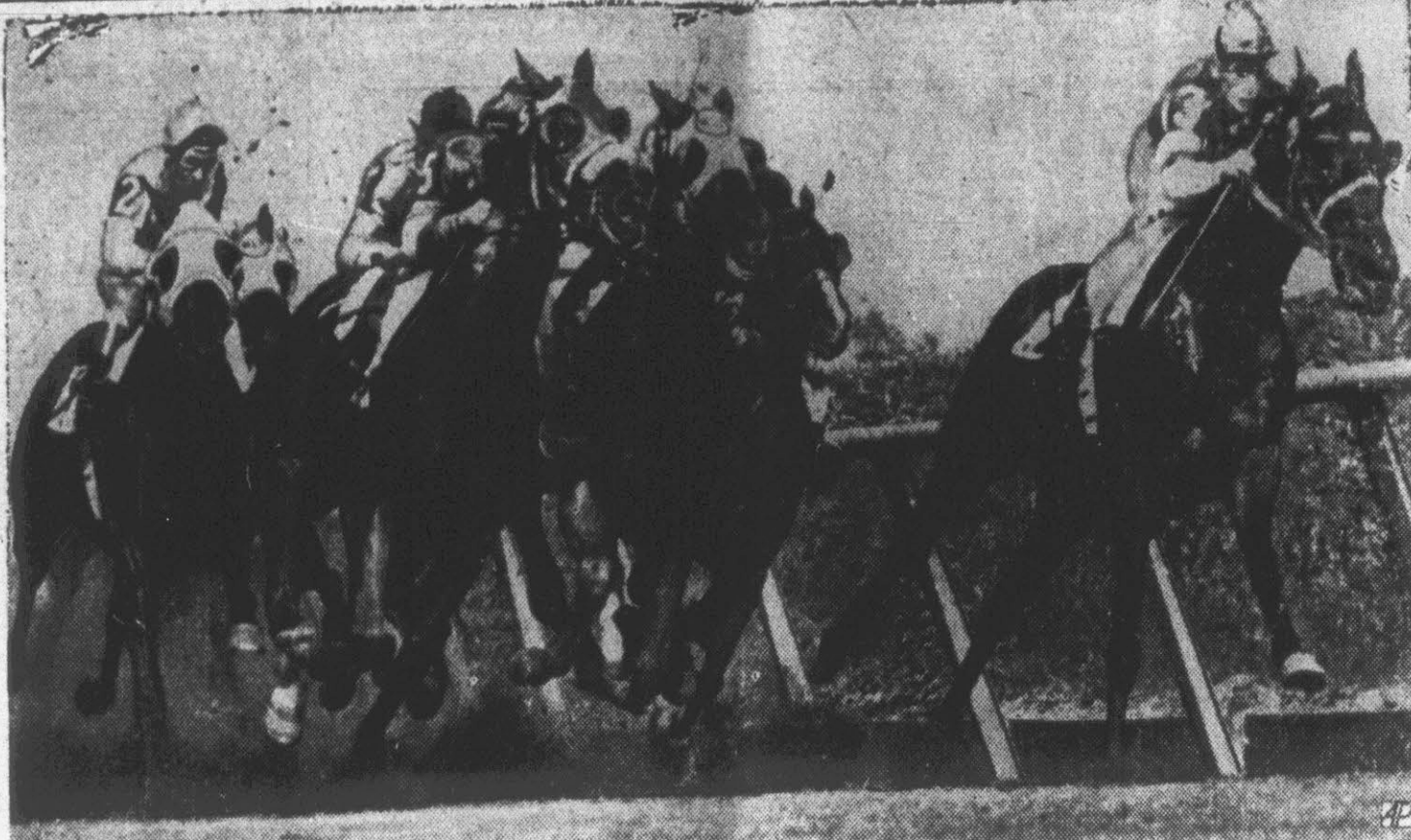

pend on Eastern Europe for food and raw materials, it might also be at the mercy of the state control of commerce which is slowly creeping over the Soviet-dominated nations of middle Europe.

How that state control might work out is untested, but it could mean that a private Belgian steel-maker would have to deal with the minister of economics of one of the Balkans.

Now some government economists think that the growing trade between Western Europe and Latin America could set up a new trade pattern which would permit Western Europe's Pittsburgh, Pa., to complement Latin America's Pittsburgh, Kas.

They admit that the seahaul could mean a higher price to the consumer because freight rates must be tacked onto the price. But they're rather happy that Western Europe doesn't have to depend on raw materials from the state-controlled nations of middle Europe.

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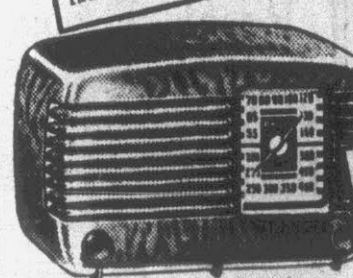
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
