FORD AND UAW REACH TERMS AVERT STRIKE

Union Is Given Year's Grace From Suits Under Taft-Hartley Labor Law

Detroit, Aug. 5.—(AP)—The CIO United Auto Workers, in an agreement averting their Ford Motor Co. strike scheduled for today, were given a year's grace from strike damage suits under the Taft-Hartley labor law.

This the company agreed to in an eleventh-hour pact which served to keep 107,000 production workers on the job as a nationwide walkout, set for noon, was called off.

The agreement, under which the union and company will undertake mutually to settle their dispute, growing from the act's penalty provisions, protects the union for a period of a year from the date a new contract is signed.

Ford and the UAW agreed to spend at least a year if necessary in order to secure a mutually satisfactory understanding of union and company privileges. A joint committee will seek this.

Henry Ford II, president of the company, issued the following statement on the compromise:

"The agreement to refer to a joint study group the question of the liability of the union for damages by suit for breach of contract seems to us an eminently fair solution to a particularly thorny problem."

"Any new labor legislation raises problems of human relationships. It has become apparent to us that all of the ramifications of such problems cannot be ironed out immediately around the bargaining table."

"Under today's settlement opportunity has now been provided for finding in less hectic surroundings a solution within the spirit of the Taft-Hartley law acceptable to both the union and the company."

A joint company-union statement announcing the agreement averting the strike was made public at 4:30 a.m. (Eastern Standard Time), less than eight hours ahead of the strike deadline.

Appoint Group To Select New Hospital Site

At a regular meeting of the County Commissioners yesterday at the courthouse a committee was appointed to select a site for the proposed new Pitt County Hospital, to have 140 beds and cost \$900,000. The Commissioners chose men from various sections of the county in order to distribute the representation. Those named yesterday were Alex Allen of Greenville, Dave T. House of Bethel, Wayland Hunsucker of Winterville, Mack G. Smith of Bell Arthur L. B. Garrison of Greenville and W. I. Bissette of Grifton.

The committee will meet immediately to choose a fifteen-acre site for the new hospital. The location must be certified by the federal government and state of North Carolina hospital authorities. The hospital must be built on a plot easily accessible to all parts of the county and necessarily in a place free from any insect breeding area.

Registration for the special election for the hospital bond issue will commence August 16 and extend to September 6. Those registering for this election have the privilege of voting on September 16.

Churchill's Prophecy

War-Time Leader Predicts Britain Can And Will Surmount Economic Crisis It Now Faces; Basis For Wishful Thinking; Hardships Lie Ahead For Britons

Winston Churchill, whose host of admirers regard him as the personification of John Bull at his best, declares that the British people will come through the economic crisis they now face, no matter what the difficulties may be.

"That prediction isn't likely to be taken lightly by a world which remembers another prophecy of the famous wartime prime minister, made in the dark days just after Dunkerque:

"We shall defend our island whatever the cost may be. We shall fight on the beaches, we shall fight on the landing grounds, we shall fight in the fields and in the street, we shall fight in the hills; we shall never surrender."

Churchill was right, for his forecast was based on his sure knowledge of the sturdy character of his people. But that wasn't by any means the only occasion, even in our time, that this trait had been exhibited. Those of us who were with Field Marshall Haig in France when the Germans launched their "all but successful offensive in Ap-

Jackson, N. C., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Charges against seven white men accused in a lynching attempt upon a young negro prisoner were dropped here today when the Northampton county grand jury refused to indict them.

The 18-man grand jury at the same time returned a no bill against Godwin (Buddy) Bush, 24-year-old negro sawmill worker they were accused of abducting from the Northampton county jail early last May.

Dutch Forces Will Stay In Vast Occupied Areas

Announce Future Operations Will Be Limited To Maintenance of Law and Order; Portents Debate Over Withdrawal

Batavia, Java, Aug. 5.—(AP)—The Netherlands Army and Navy announced today that Dutch forces would maintain law and order in the vast areas of Indonesia they occupied in 15 days of fighting—the first official indication that the Dutch intend to hang on to those rich sections during attempts at mediation.

An army order said future operations would be limited to the "maintenance of law and order" in Dutch-held regions of Java, Sumatra and Madura. An order of the day issued by Vice Admiral A. S. Pinke, Commander in Chief of the Netherlands Navy in the East Indies

declared "it is up to (Dutch) forces to restore and maintain law and order" in those areas.

The two orders were issued only 12 hours after cease fire orders became effective at midnight last night and after Prime Minister Amir Sjarifoedin of the Indonesian Republic declared that his government expected an International Commission which the Indonesians want appointed to supervise the United Nations Security Council's cease fire directive—to see that troops withdraw to the Demarcation lines from which they jumped off July 20.

Anti-Semitic Incidents Flare Again In England

London, Aug. 5.—(AP)—A Jew-baiting crowd of 700 persons damaged eight Jewish-owned shops in Manchester last night and early today as anti-semitic incidents flared for the fourth successive day in widely scattered British cities—including London, Birmingham and Liverpool.

Police arrested 38 demonstrators in Liverpool, where street lights were turned on during the night for the first time since power-saving blackout restrictions were ordered last winter.

Several Liverpool police were injured battling the demonstrators as firemen stood by ready to hose the rioters with hoses in case the situation got beyond police control.

Although some quarters expressed belief that the riots were incited by "fascist-like" organizations, police said they thought the vandalism was the work of irresponsible youths rather than an organized campaign of anti-semitism.

Shop windows were smashed in London's Bethnal Green section, where many Jews live, and Communist headquarters in the same district also was battered. Other window-smashing outbreaks were reported in Newcastle, Collyhurst and Chorlton-On-Medlock.

In Birmingham a wall was decorated with a sign nearly a half block long emblazoned with yard-high letters proclaiming: "Gentiles arise, resist Jewish enterprise. Remember Palce and Martin."

Mervyn Palce and Clifford Martin were the two British sergeants hanged by Jewish extremists in Palestine last week in retaliation for execution of three members of the Jewish underground.

VIOLATION.
San Francisco, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Spokesmen for the Indonesian Republic government, quoted in a broadcast by the Indonesian news agency picked up here, said today Dutch forces "still continue their movements" despite the order given to cease hostilities last midnight, Indonesian time.

The seven white men were asked were Russell Bryant, Robert Van Linder, Albert Bryant, Glenn Collier, Joe Cunningham and W. C. Carter.

They were arrested on charges of kidnapping, conspiracy to break and enter a jail with intent to injure Bush and entering a jail with intent to injure or kill Bush.

At the time the seven men were arrested, the FBI said it had obtained a confession from one of them.

FIND FAULTS IN TESTIMONY

Prosecution In Overall Trial Charges Discrepancies

Santa Ana, Calif., Aug. 4.—(AP)—With the testimony of Sheriff Jim Musick, former star fallback at the University of Southern California, the prosecution today slashed at what it argues are discrepancies in the statements of Louise Overell and George (Bud) Gollum, accused of slaying her parents.

The young Orange county sheriff dropped his brow as he related to a jury and hundreds of spectators who crammed into the sweltering courtroom and stories he said the college sweethearts told him after their arrest March 19 on charges of murdering Mr. and Mrs. Walter E. Overell.

Gollum, Musick testified yesterday, had a faulty memory when asked about his actions on March 14. That was the day when a handwriting expert had testified Gollum signed a receipt for 175 sticks of dynamite the State charges were purchased to blow up the Overell yacht. Prosecutor Eugene Williams claims the Overells were beaten to death aboard the yacht before the explosion.

Sheriff Musick said Gollum could not remember whether he attended his classes that day at Los Angeles City College. A previous witness, Lester Nelson, Jr., Bud's classmate, said Gollum wasn't in school that day.

Louise, 18-year-old heiress to her parents' fortune, told Musick he testified that Bud had a date with her March 14, but she sent him home early because he had to meet her and her parents early the next morning for an outing on the Overell yacht.

Closing arguments will occupy Wednesday and the jury is expected to get the case Thursday. The trial is now in its eighth day.

British Authorities In Palestine Arrest Jewish Political Leaders

Jerusalem, Aug. 5.—(AP)—British authorities arrested dozens of Jewish political leaders—including the mayors of Tel Aviv, Ramat Gan, Petah Tikvah and Netanya—in a series of dawn raids today climaxing two weeks of Jewish underground violence in the Holy Land.

An official statement said the raids were "part of the campaign against terrorism."

Among those arrested were most members of the Tel Aviv Municipal Council and many leaders of the Revisionist party—accused by the Palestine government last year of being the forerunner of Irgun Zvai Leumi, Jewish extremist organization.

A government spokesman, who said the arrests were made under "defense emergency regulations," declared that "approximately 60" persons had been marked down for detention, but that "some may have

Experts Fail To Agree Over "Suicide Note"

Trial of Charlie Phillips Revolves Around Conflicting Testimony of Handwriting Experts; Closing Arguments Near

Lillington, N.C., Aug. 5.—(AP)—A third handwriting expert for the prosecution in the Charlie Phillips wife-murder case testified today that a purported suicide note which Phillips a new trial "could not possibly have been written" by the "dead" woman.

The witness was A. W. Sommerford of Washington in charge of identification in the Bureau of the Chief Postal Inspector.

He said examination of the note with a letter and post card that both sides agree were written by Mrs. Etta Mae Phillips convinced him "these exhibits could not possibly have been written by the same person."

He said the person or persons who wrote the note "were so intent on copying that they over-emphasized their efforts. They made the letters larger than they ordinarily would have. The note is characterized by distortion and unnaturalness."

Prosecutor Jack Hooks said the next witness would be W. A. Schuler, another handwriting expert with the Postoffice Department and that he would finish the state's rebuttal arguments with six more witnesses today.

Closing arguments will occupy Wednesday and the jury is expected to get the case Thursday. The trial is now in its eighth day.

Mississippi's Primary Laws Given Tests Today

Jackson, Miss., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Mississippi's new primary laws, admittedly passed to assure "white" state elections, will be tested for the first time in today's Democratic primary in which about 6,000 Negroes are expected to participate.

Under the laws passed last March at a special session of the legislature prospective voters must certify agreement with party principles as set forth by the State Democratic Executive Committee.

The principles as announced by the committee include opposition to federal fair employment practices commission and federal anti-lynching legislation.

Voters also must swear accord "with the time-honored and cherished traditions of the South."

President T. B. Wilson of the Mississippi Progressive Voters League, who estimated that about half of the 12,000 registered Negroes in the state would attempt to vote said members of his organization were advised to create no disturbance at the polls should their vote be challenged.

"The members of our organization have been advised to agree to the party principles because we believe as the party believes, in states' rights," said Wilson, a Negro himself. "We believe that such things as the P-E-P-C, Poll tax and lynching laws should be left to the states."

Chairman Herbert Holmes of the State Democratic Executive Committee said at Senatobia that "some white persons are going to be challenged."

FRITZ LOSES CERTIFICATE FOR TEACHING

Board of Education Orders Records Be Given to Attorney General

Raleigh, Aug. 5.—(AP)—The State Board of Education ordered today that the teaching certificate of Principal R. L. Fritz, Jr., of the Hudson School in Caldwell county be revoked and that records of his unique bookkeeping system be turned over to the attorney general for any action he may deem appropriate.

The State Board also directed that the Caldwell County Board of Education refund the state treasury all monies "wrongly paid in connection with the payroll of the Hudson School" during the last school year.

The board also directed that Superintendent Luther B. Robinson of the Caldwell county schools be directed to appear before the board September 4 to answer any charges now in the state record. Witnesses before the board said that Fritz acted with Robinson's knowledge.

The only board member who objected to the revocation of Fritz's license was Hiden Ramsey of Asheville, who said that he did not think the board should go the full limit for one offense such as this and thus deprive a man from making a living.

The board said that \$1,641.19 was owed the state. Previous figures said \$1,300.

Fritz had left the meeting when the resolutions were passed.

A number of affidavits had been presented saying that Fritz's payroll system was known to his superiors and other teachers.

One affidavit, which bore the signatures of town officials and teachers was dated this month. It said that since he went to Hudson in 1935, Fritz had operated the school efficiently and it "would be highly injurious to the school system to deprive it of his services."

Revised Version Of 'Cinderella'

Wilmington, N.C., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Here's a modern version of the Cinderella story: The wearer of a certain pair of shoes will be welcomed at the office of Alcoholic Tax Unit Investigator Lon Howe, but there won't be a prince charming, and instead of a palace there may be a jail.

Howe said that as ATU agents and deputy sheriffs closed in on a still in Brunswick County, the operators took to their heels and that one of them ran out of his shoes.

Wine Outlets In State Reduced

Raleigh, N. C., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Wine outlets in North Carolina have been reduced nearly one-third under a strict wine act passed by the 1947 legislature.

Dr. Frank Batts of the state ABC Board's Wine and Enforcement Division said that before May 1 there were about 2,500 retailers of wine and that now there are only 1,650.

The new wine control act gives the state ABC board full power to issue and revoke wine licenses. It prohibits wine sales in pool rooms and thus reduced the number of retailers by one-third, Batts said.

Under the law, persons who have voted in the last three primary elections are exempted from the oath of record.

Jet Engine Research

Race Now On Between United States and Great Britain For Development Of Jet Planes; American Program Behind British But Expect To Soon Catch Up

Washington, Aug. 5.—(AP)—The British are matching American spending for jet engine research and development, demonstrating the importance they attach to that phase of military planning.

United States experts who have studied the work being done on both sides of the Atlantic feel, however, that the American program will overtake the British within a year or so. Just now it is generally conceded that the British are ahead because of their two or three year time advantage.

Here is a well informed view of some angles of the situation:

1. United States jets are not far behind the British and may even have caught up in some respects. Witness the fact that we have taken the world speed record from the British with 424 miles an hour and have far exceeded them in jet-fighter distance flights.

2. The difference is quite noticeable with respect to gas turbine driving propellers, however. The British appear to be well in front in these "turbo-prop."

3. Most of the British advantage in jets and turbo-props can be attributed to the fact that they began working on them in a big way six years ago, while our major effort is half as old.

That largely accounts for the fact that the British run their jet engines nearly twice as long between major overhauls—180 hours against 100 hours. Another factor is the difference in standards. The British use parts longer than United States experts recommend, but we are liberalizing our evaluation as experience piles up.

4. Each country has only one jet engine in very general use. The United States is far ahead in volume; however, having produced more than 3,000 jet engines (at least three times the British total) and more than 1,000 jet planes (also three times as many).

5. With respect to jet engine development, the United States is working on what some people think is a longer and more complex basis than the British. The American idea, (Continued on Page Six)

It seems to me that among those who will work with great zeal are the wife of the Minister of Education, Mrs. Najeeb Mahmoud, and Mrs. Fadhl Jamili. With a little encouragement from you, fifty other leading women will work with great zeal. They will be especially effective in writing the simple booklets and newspaper articles for the new literates."

The services which American Protestant and Orthodox churches are carrying on for the feeding, clothing and resettlement of displaced persons now in camps in Europe are now being directed by Miss Aroos Benmavin, as a secretary of Church World Service. North Carolina's Section Of Super Highways Will Take Years To Build

Raleigh, N.C., Aug. 5—(AP)—Many years probably will elapse before North Carolina sections of a proposed nationwide network of super-highways is completed, officials of the State Highway Commission believe.

James S. Burch, commission engineer of statistics and planning, pointed out that the highway commission now is devoting its major energies and huge sums of money on the county road program to "get the farmer out of the mud."

However, he said, that when sections of highway lying on the route of the super-roads have to be rebuilt, they are being built according to Public Roads Administration specifications for the super-highways.

The proposed routing of the super-roads calls for one to follow the general route of U.S. 301 across North Carolina from Weldon, to Rocky Mount, Wilson, Fayetteville and Lumberton. A second enters the state near Norfolk and runs to Durham, Burlington, Greensboro, High Point, Salisbury, Charlotte, Gastonia and Kings Mountain. Another leaves Greensboro and runs through Statesville, Hickory and Asheville, and a fourth enters the state at Hot Springs and runs to Asheville, Hendersonville and Tryon.

Sweltering Nation Has Hopes Of Some Relief

An induction of cold air from Canada held some promise today of breaking up the three-day searing heat wave over the northern mid-west states.

The Chicago weather bureau said the Dakotas already had received some relief from yesterday's high readings of 100 degrees or more and that western Minnesota could expect at least moderately lowering temperatures late this afternoon or tonight.

Elsewhere, however, the weather generally would be a continuation of the past two or three days with the southerly flow of hot air prevailing for at least another 24 hours. There is a probability, the weather bureau said, that the cold air from Canada would penetrate as far south as Nebraska, Iowa and Illinois by tomorrow, and bring more scattered thunder showers to the thirsting crops.

Temperatures ranging from the high 80s at many points to 111 degrees at Phillips, S. D., yesterday baked the already dry topsoil and brought reports from some sections that the corn crop was firing.

Pierre, S. D., had a high of 110 degrees, and readings of 105 were reported at such widespread points as Valentine, Neb., Fargo, N. D., and Advance, Mo.

The eastern seaboard had temperatures in the 80s although warmer readings were forecast for today and tomorrow. In the far west Seattle had 71, Los Angeles, 74, and San Francisco 84 Monday. Montana reported some cooling weather yesterday with predictions of cool along the Rockies today.

ATTLEE ASKS MORE POWERS

Introduces Surprise Legislation In House Of Commons

London, Aug. 5—(AP)—Prime Minister Attlee introduced surprise legislation in the House of Commons today to give his government broad new powers for increasing agricultural and industrial production to meet Britain's impending dollar crisis.

The precise powers sought for the labor regime were not immediately clear, but a highly placed source said it did not provide for power to direct labor.

Deputy Prime Minister Herbert Morrison said the legislation would make possible "the full mobilization of the economic resources of the nation."

Aumony Eden, a conservative spokesman and foreign secretary protested that the house could not deal with such broad legislation before its scheduled adjournment this week-end.

Morrison replied that it became necessary in the national interest, the house could postpone adjournment and "sit a bit longer."

EGYPT PLAIN HEARD BY UN

Premier Asks Council to Order Removal of British

Lake Success, Aug. 5—(AP)—Egypt appealed to the United Nations Security Council today to free her from "the orbit of British imperial power" by ordering the immediate withdrawal of all British troops from Egyptian soil.

The appeal was made personally by Egyptian premier Nokrashy Pasha, as the council began consideration of Egypt's complaint that continued presence of British forces in Egypt was a potential peril to peace in the Middle East.

"We are here," Nokrashy Pasha declared, "to challenge the basic assumption of 19th century imperialism."

In his 10,000-word speech, the Egyptian premier informed the council that his government no longer considered itself bound by the Anglo-Egyptian treaty of 1936, under which British forces are stationed in this strategic Mediterranean country.

"Today, Egypt is entitled to her rights of full sovereignty. Today, Egypt's relationship with Great Britain can no longer be charted by the provisions of the 1936 treaty."

"It must be governed by international law and by the charter of the United Nations which is now the corner stone of international relations."

The Yakima Valley in Wash-
ington is one of the garden spots on the
continent. I missed seeing it on a
trip through that section of the
country some years ago because I
took the wrong turn at a crossroads.

other and made the journey a few
miles less. What I failed to notice

that we spent the afternoon going

the West country and never got a
glimpse of the Yakima.

All of which, of course, is a par-
able to the effect that it is easy to

valley. Young people so often take
the wrong turn with reference to

with reference to investments, plans

We all need to read our road

The Philippines, which celebrated
their first year of independence
July 4, already have a full-fledged
embassy in the United States, leg-
ations in China and Canada and
consulates in San Francisco, New
York and Chicago.

Some 34 hand-picked Filipinos,
college-educated and many of them
lawyers, have gone through the
regular course given by the U. S.
State Department for young for-
eign service officers.

There have been five classes of
these trainees. The State Depart-
ment calls them "tween groups."
The main idea on the part of the
Philippine government was to send
them here so they could equip
themselves to teach the rest of the
islands' candidates for foreign ser-

The trainees were chosen for
their educational background, poise,
general appearance and adaptabil-
ity. Willingness to serve abroad,
added to a knack for dealing with
foreign people, also figured largely
in their selection.

Officials of the school conducted
for Americans by the foreign service
institute, which is under the State
Department, observe that the Fili-
pino trainees is a little older and
more sophisticated than our own
extremely well-mannered and en-
thusiastic over the training course.

Before taking the course the
prospective trainee has to pass a
stiff entrance examination—history,
geography, economics, government
and so forth.

Trainees also must evidence a
mastery of one foreign language
and a "working" knowledge of one
or two others.

The course begins with orien-
tation on various geographical areas,
with a study of their economic
resources, problems of social, political,
immigration, the various areas are also
considered at great length. Several
days are spent at the U. S. Depart-
ment of Commerce, where trainees
get a fill-in on some of these sub-

most trainees have assignments to
serve a few months in the field—
at American embassies in Paris and
London, for instance.

These Filipinos will return to
their islands to be key people, not
only in the embassies and legations,
but in the foreign office in Manila.
It is believed that the Philippine
government will expand its foreign
service slowly, as conditions require.

ent legations and consulates, the

American Flies To Vienna After Dramatic Escape

Budapest, Hungary, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Stephen Thuransky, the American citizen treated by Hungarian political police for talking against the Communists, left Budapest for Vienna by plane today after a week end of excitement that included a dramatic escape from the police near Marko jail.

(The State Department announced in Washington that the United States had demanded an apology for the arrest.)

Also boarding the American plane bound for Vienna and possibly for the United States were Thuransky's wife Teresa, 43, and his daughters Margaret and Mary.

Thuransky, 54, once a farmer near Columbus, O., said the police gave him a scientific beating with a bag of sand before a U. S. legation official helped him escape last Saturday.

Heavier Sales Monday On Georgia Belt

Valdosta, Ga., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Sales were heavier Monday on the Georgia-Florida flu-cured tobacco markets and general quality of the offerings better than Friday.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture reported that increases of \$1 to \$8 over Friday affected the orange and green colors of leaf. Bulk of sales consisted of low to good leaf, low and fair cutters, and fair to fine lugs.

Lemon leaf, cutters and better lugs held fairly steady at averages previously established. Averages for several lower quality grades were the highest of the season.

Buyers bid in 610,124 pounds of leaf on the Live Oak, Fla. market for \$283,707. The average price was \$46.50 per hundred pounds. Best quality leaf brought a high of 56 cents a pound while the day's low was 8 cents.

Statistics Show Salaries Cut Nearly In Half

Washington, Aug. 5.—(AP)—The Bureau of Labor statistics issued figures today showing that although factory workers earned an average of \$48.40 a week in May, many with no dependents earning this amount would take home only \$41.52 after tax deductions.

Further, the BLS said, this \$41.52 was only \$26.49 in terms of 1939 dollars, because of price increases since 1939.

The bureau's regular announcement of hours and earnings included for the first time a table which (1) gave the earnings after deduction of income and social security taxes, and (2) translated this figure into 1939 dollars.

According to the table, a worker earning \$48.40 with a wife and two children had \$47 left after tax deductions, and this would be \$39.99 in 1939 dollars.

Neutral observers in Batavia for saw a major political conflict over the issue of whether the Dutch will or will not—during mediation be permitted to hang on to the areas they occupied. The Security Council last week rejected a Russian proposal which would have required Dutch forces to withdraw to their original positions.

Pink's order said:

"The maintenance of law and order evidently involves checking of infiltration into occupied territories; prevention of the import of military goods and export of estate produce from Republican territory."

Dutch sources said this meant the Dutch Navy would continue its sea patrols to insure that there were no imports or exports from the Republic without Dutch consent. Goods which the Dutch classify as estate products—rubber, sugar, quinine and other raw materials—will continue to be confiscated as in the case of a U. S. Liberty Ship a few months ago.

The Republican government in the past has called these control "A naval blockade cutting off the Republic from world trade."

"You are living in an age, and you are living at the right age to live in that age that I think will be the greatest in history."

"I have said that time and again, and I believe it."

"I would give anything in the world if I could start in now where you are starting in, because the great outlook in the world is to come. We will eventually wind up by having peace in the world and by having people live as free individuals, regardless of race, creed or color."

"So just keep up the good work. I am perfectly willing to turn the country over to you when our time comes."

Throw Tomatoes At Mrs. Peron

Bern, Switzerland, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Three members of the leftwing Swiss Labor party threw tomatoes today at a motor car bearing Mrs. Juan D. Peron, the wife of Argentina's President. Bern police announced tonight.

Mrs. Peron was not hit, but one tomato struck Swiss Foreign Minister Max Petitpierre, who accompanied her, and it splashed over other occupants of the car.

Nickols with three hits and Briley and Howell with two hits each were the leaders for the Lions. George Sideris was the only Yank to get

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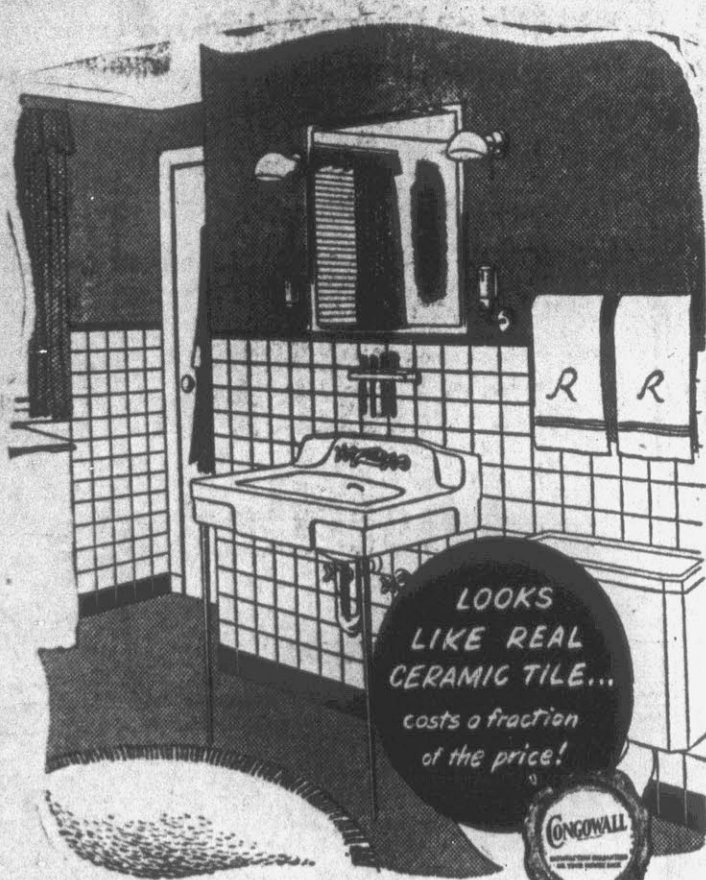

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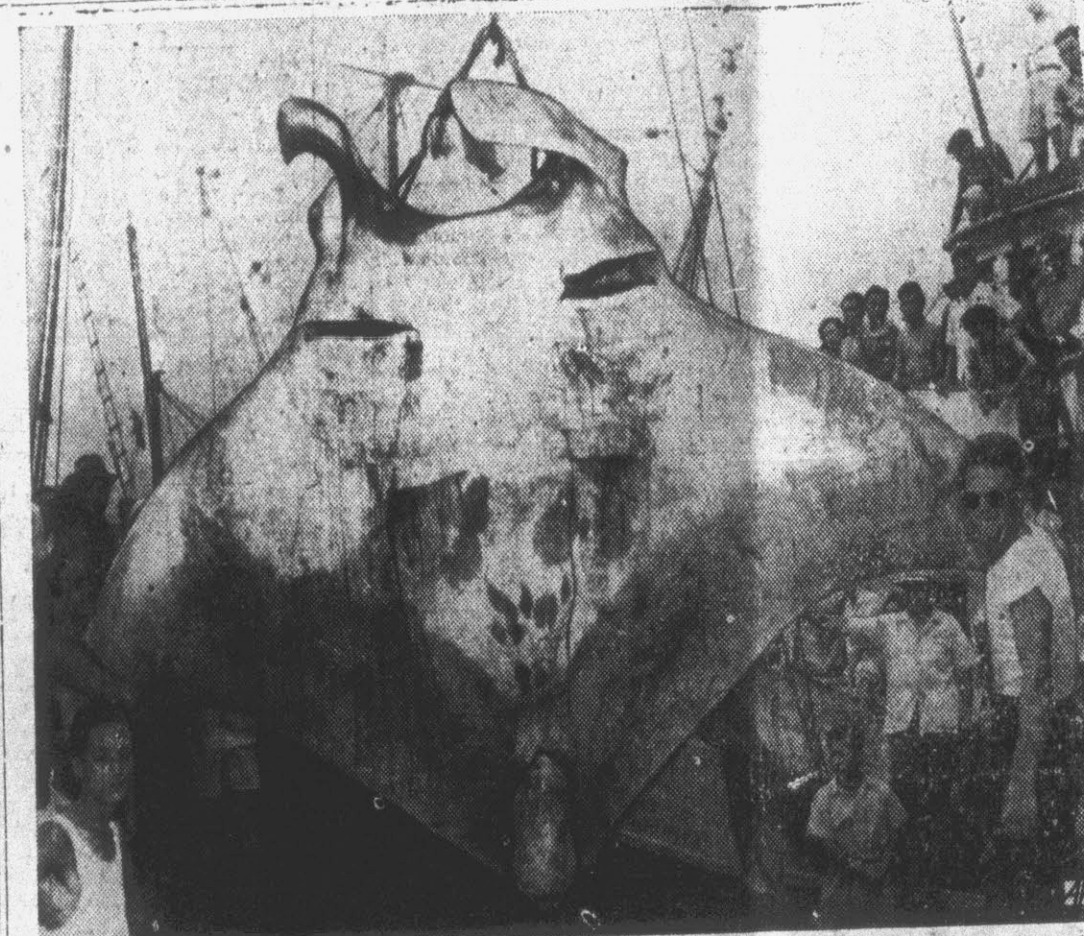

Ike Williams Undisputed King Of Lightweights

Philadelphia, Aug. 5—(AP)—For the first time in five years the lightweight boxing division has an undisputed king—Ike Williams, the Trenton, N.J. Negro with dynamite in his right fist.

gravest statement to be made to Parliament since the darkest days of the war.

The British people are prepared for even greater hardships than they have had to endure during and since the war. Thus far they have accepted that tough prospect without a whimper. However, sturdiness of character alone isn't likely to turn the trick. The British government is looking to America for further aid, and in this it has the backing of the powerful conservative party headed by Churchill. Churchill yesterday pledged that his party would support efforts of the Labor (Socialist) government to obtain easements of the swiftly disappearing American loan of \$3,750,000,000 and to secure new American credits. He said:

"There is no shame in one brave and faithful ally, deeply injured in the common struggle, asking another to help him recover and stand upon his feet. Had the positions been reversed, we would have done the same for them."

But as the signs now read, Britain's recovery may depend very largely on those easements and new credits. And if England gets these, how long will it take her to reach an advanced stage of convalescence?

Of course nobody can pin that down at this stage. At the time that Britain secured her loan from Washington a year ago, her experts figured that the crisis would be over in about three years and that in a couple of years more she could begin repayment, if she had the use of \$5,000,000,000.

Well, the British didn't get that much, and they say their calculations have been further upset by terms of the agreement. However, if they succeed in securing aid that would permit them to revert to their original calculations, and if those calculations are correct, then a couple of years might turn the trick, though that obviously is speculation.

stemming from Germany's bitter experience, is to design jet engines which can be built as much as possible from available materials and which avoid dependence on stockpiling strategic materials or obtaining them from distant points during wartime.

This means the adaptation of available metals not only by finding new alloys, but also by design features which keep temperatures within bearable limits.

6. With respect to turbo-prop, American development is aimed at far more powerful engines than the British program. The United States goal is turbo-prop for military purposes, including heavy bombers and transports. The British appear to be more interested in developing such engines for commercial flying and so do not require such high power outputs.

7. The United States has a big advantage in jet engine test facilities, which are many times more costly than similar equipment for reciprocating, or piston, engines. Even so, many more test stands are needed immediately. The British, however, are doing pretty well with available facilities.

8. Both countries are working with "thrust augmentation," but there the British again have a time advantage. The United States has applied it successfully to one engine and is nearing success with another.

Thrust augmentation is accomplished generally in two ways—injecting water to increase the volume of gases or adding a separate burner to use additional fuel.

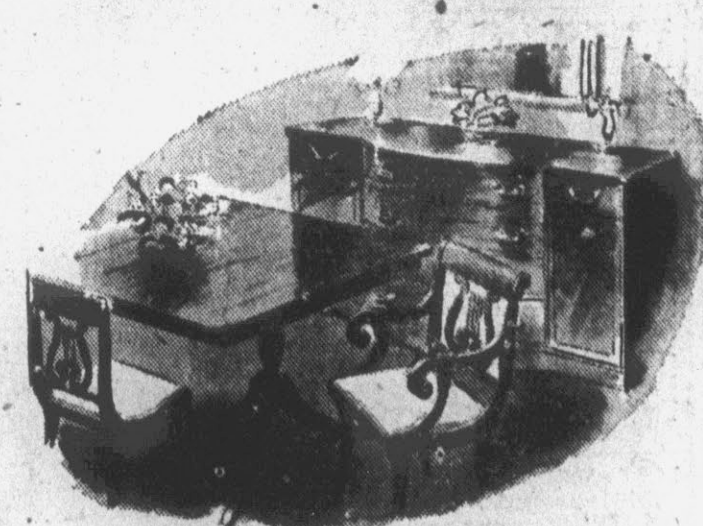
