CHERRY NAMES FRIZZELLE TO REOPEN CASE

Governor Acts to Rectify "Miscarriage of Justice" By Northampton Jury

Raleigh, N. C., Aug. 6.—(AP)—Governor R. Gregg Cherry today was counting on Superior Court Judge J. Paul Frizzle to rectify what he termed a "miscarriage of justice" and sit as committing magistrate when the Northampton County case of seven men charged with an attempted lynching is reconsidered.

A Northampton Grand Jury freed the seven white men by failing to indict them yesterday on an attempted lynching upon Godwin (Buddy) Bush, a 24-year-old Negro charged with an attempted assault upon a young, white married woman.

The Grand Jury also freed Bush. The Governor, himself a lawyer, expressed disappointment that no indictment was returned against the seven and declared the Grand Jury's action "does not close the case."

He said he would ask Judge Frizzle who presided over the case to sit as committing magistrate. "It might be the end of the month," however, before the Superior Court Judge could hear the witnesses in the case, the governor added.

A judge acting in such a capacity may sit in an adjoining county and recommit the case for grand jury action in that county.

Although such a move still must return to grand jury action, all evidence will be in the open session before the committing magistrate and place the jury's actions in the open before the public.

The governor's action came some four hours after the Northampton County Grand Jury at Jackson had reported "not true bills" against the men from nearby Rich Square—Russell Bryant, Robert Vann, Linwood Bryant, Gilbert Bryant, Glenn Collier, Joe Cunningham and W. G. Cozart.

The governor said: "I am very much disappointed in the action of the Northampton County Grand Jury in failing to find a true bill against the seven men."

Attlee Announces New Restrictions

Britain Will Cut Armed Forces, Impose Limited Labor Direction, Ask Longer Work Week, Seek Relaxing Terms of U.S. Loan; Promises Hardships

London, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Prime Minister Attlee today announced that Great Britain would reduce her armed forces, impose a limited direction of labor and seek relaxation of clauses in the U. S. loan agreement to help ease her growing economic crisis.

He said also that workers in the more essential industries would have to work longer and that coal miners would be asked to labor half an hour a day additional.

Attlee said Great Britain also will cut down her imports in a manner that would mean hardships for many people.

He said the United States, at Britain's entreaty, had agreed to discuss the sterling convertibility and non-discrimination in trade agreements in the \$3,750,000,000 loan, which Attlee said would be exhausted this year.

Attlee said British armed strength would be reduced by 420,000 men by next March. The forces numbered 1,297,200 men on July 1.

At another point, the labor government leader said Great Britain was increasing the rate of her troop withdrawals from overseas.

The prime minister said his socialist government would have to take some measure of control over the employment of labor in order to stimulate production. He continued:

"This will involve some sacrifice of individual liberty, though as little as possible. It may be necessary to limit employment on less essential work."

Attlee said the government also would take action against any industries operated with inefficiency or lack of will.

Cancel Cotton Credit Planned For Hungary

Washington, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Secretary of State Marshall today disclosed the Export-Import Bank has cancelled a \$7,000,000 cotton credit earmarked for the Hungarian government.

Marshall told a news conference the Bank took action because some of the Hungarian negotiators in which the Bank had confidence had been exiled as a result of what he termed the Communist coup which recently overthrew the government.

Two other factors he gave as influencing the Bank's decision were:

1. The two Hungarian Banks scheduled to get the American funds are under what Marshall called the threat of nationalization.
2. The cotton situation has changed for the better since April 30 when the Bank and a Hungarian government reached a tentative agreement regarding the credit.

New British Loan?

Some Reasons Why America May Have To Take Special Steps To Help Britain's Sagging Economy If It Takes Too Long To Work Out Details Of Marshall Plan

Washington, Aug. 6.—(AP)—It is pretty well recognized here among government financial experts that "something may have to be done for Britain" if it takes too long to figure out details of the Marshall plan.

Britain, as well as a big chunk of Western Europe, stands to get some kind of help under the Marshall plan after the countries decide first what they can do to help themselves and, second, exactly what they need from us.

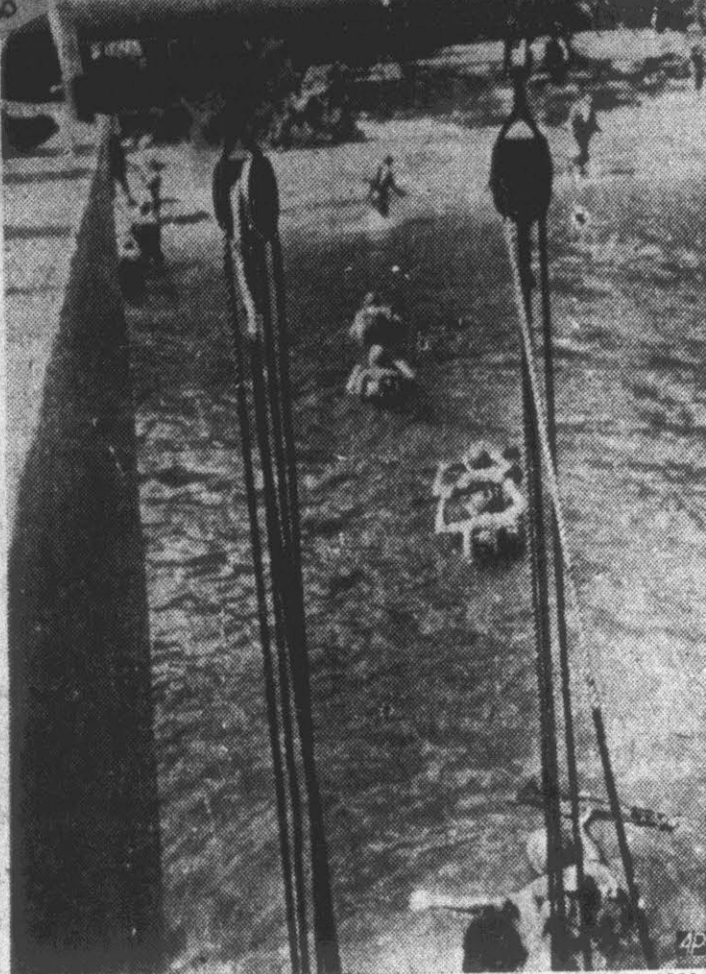
But in the meantime it looks as though Britain may reach the bottom of the barrel by next March or April.

The Marshall plan must be ironed out by congress and congress is not due back until January. There is little hope it will make up its mind before March.

If there is any further delay, financial experts are guessing that the lawmakers will be long enough to give quick and urgent attention to separate loan for Britain.

ARMIES CLAIM VIOLATIONS OF TRUCE ORDER

Dutch and Indonesian File Counter-Charges; Leahy Rumored Enroute

Batavia, Java, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The Netherlands army accused the Indonesian republic today of violating Monday night's cease fire order five times and at the same time denied Indonesian charges that the Dutch had committed such violations.

Indonesian Prime Minister Amir Sjarifuddin had charged the Dutch with violating the cease fire order at Gombong, on the central front, 60 miles west of Jogjakarta, two and a half hours after the midnight deadline.

The Dutch declared today, however, that they actually occupied Gombong 30 minutes before the cease fire order became effective.

Meanwhile rumors circulated in Batavia, without official confirmation, that Adm. William D. Leahy would come here from Washington to act as mediator in the Dutch-Indonesian dispute if the republican government accepts a U. S. offer of "good offices," as the Dutch already have.

Walter A. Foote, the U. S. consul here, officially delivered the U. S. offer to the Indonesian deputy prime minister, A. K. Gani, shortly after midnight this morning. Foote said he knew nothing about the Leahy rumors.

Gani said he would relay the American offer to his government in Jogjakarta at once, and said he hoped for a reply by tonight. Consul Foote, Gani continued, urged republican acceptance "because mediation of one state can achieve results more quickly than mediation by a commission composed of several states."

The Indonesians earlier had asked for an international commission to mediate the dispute and supervise the cease fire order.

WOMEN CALLED TO BE JURORS

Judge Henry A. Grady To Preside Superior Court August 18

Women have been summoned to serve as jurors at the civil term of Superior Court the week of August 18 and at the criminal term the week of August 25, Sheriff Russ W. Tyson said today. This is the first time the law passed by the recent General Assembly.

Judge Henry A. Grady of New Bern will preside. A heavy criminal docket will confront the Craven county jurist. Several of the cases are important, including charges of murder and arson.

The law requiring women to serve on juries became effective July 1. It was recalled recently that Miss Margaret Register, a bookkeeper at the Guaranty Bank and Trust company, was the first woman to serve on a jury in Pitt county. Several years ago, when another juror was needed to complete a panel, the late Superior Court Clerk J. Frank Harrington suggested that a woman be called. Judge J. Paul Frizzle of Snow Hill agreed, and Miss Register was selected. The defendant was convicted of a minor offense and accepted the penalty. It was pointed out afterwards that the hearing was a milestone since it was not legal in North Carolina for a woman to serve on a jury.

Annual Gold Rush Begins Tomorrow On Border Belt

The annual gold rush starts in North and South Carolina tomorrow—the rush to sell the golden king of weeds at opening of flue-cured tobacco markets on the Border Belt.

W. P. Hedrick, tobacco marketing specialist for the North Carolina Department of Agriculture, said that Border Belt opening average prices might run up to \$50 a hundred pounds. He based his estimate on reports of prices averaging \$44 on the opening of Georgia-Florida markets July 24. Tobacco on the Georgia-Florida market is sold untied and ungraded, while prices of the Border Belt tied and graded crop usually average a few dollars higher.

Hedrick said the Border Belt crop is "generally good although not quite as good as it was last year."

The Federal-State crop reporting service said that Border Belt growers probably will not produce as

Hughes Repeats Charges Under Oath, To Senators

Washington, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Howard Hughes charged under oath today that Senator Brewster (R-Mich.) had offered to call off a senatorial inquiry into war contracts if Hughes would agree to merger of TWA Airlines with Pan American Airways.

Hughes made the charge on the witness stand before the Senate war investigating subcommittee after he had been assured by Chairman Ferguson (R-Mich.) that he would be accorded the same treatment as Brewster.

Brewster has offered to testify in denial of the charge, already made in public statements of Hughes, and waive his rights as a senator and member of the committee.

Hughes told the committee that Brewster made the offer to drop the hearings "in so many words" at a luncheon in Brewster's hotel suite here the week of Feb. 10, 1947.

"During that lunch," Hughes testified, "the senator in so many words told me that the hearing need not go on if I agreed to merge the TWA Airline with Pan American and agreed to go along with the bill for a single overseas airline."

Brewster has denied any direct or indirect connection with Pan American. He had been favorable to legislation which would set up a single overseas airline as the "chosen instrument" of the government.

Brewster announced that during this phase of the inquiry he would "eliminate myself from exercising any advantages as a Senate member."

A burst of applause broke out in the crowded Senate caucus room as Hughes strode in to tell the story of his dealings with the government in two wartime plane contracts.

Chairman Ferguson of the Senate war investigating subcommittee, shouted above the din, "Quiet, please," and "the committee will come to order." It was several minutes before he could restore calm.

This morning, John W. Meyer testified that he spent \$97,821.58 of Howard Hughes' Aircraft Company's money on promotion of two government contracts.

While Hughes waited to tell the committee his own story of his dealings with the government, Meyer (Continued on Page Three)

Bleachers Collapse

Goshen, N. Y., Aug. 6.—(AP)—At least 61 persons were injured today when bleachers specially constructed for the Hamlet-Hamlet football game collapsed during the running of the first heat.

The extent of injuries was not immediately determined, but hospital and track authorities said it was believed no one was injured critically. Thirty-three persons were treated at the Goshen hospital and 28 others received first aid treatment in a Red Cross field station at the track.

RETURNS SUM TO N.C. BOARD

Fritz Gives Board of Education \$1,641.19 Said Misused

Raleigh, N. C., Aug. 6.—(AP)—R. L. Fritz, Jr. of Hudson says he has returned to the State Board of Education the \$1,641.19 that the board said had been "wrongfully paid" in connection with the Hudson school last school year. Fritz was principal of the Hudson school.

The State Board, at a meeting here yesterday, revoked Fritz' teaching certificate and ordered the Caldwell County Board of Education to refund to the state treasurer the \$1,641.19 it claims was involved in the payroll case.

The board also ordered Superintendent Duthie B. Robinson of the Caldwell County school to appear at a September 4 meeting to answer charges that he was aware of the Fritz practice of placing the Hudson school payroll the names of persons who did not teach. When those persons turned their checks over to the school, Fritz allegedly used the funds to pay regular teachers for extra duty.

In a statement last night Fritz asserted that a special audit of his affairs showed that the money was "paid out of to substitute and regular teachers in the Hudson public school in a sincere effort on my part to keep the school open, and that it also showed 'that I did not receive a single penny of this money.'"

PRESIDENT TO VISIT BRAZIL

Formally Accepts Invitation; Plans Three Days In Rio

Washington, Aug. 6.—(AP)—President Truman today accepted an invitation to visit Brazil in late August or September.

The White House announced Mr. Truman will fly to Rio de Janeiro for a three day visit and return to the United States aboard the Battleship U.S.S. Missouri.

Press Secretary Charles G. Ross would not comment when asked whether Mr. Truman will address the Inter-American Security Conference which opens in Rio August 15.

"The President sincerely appreciated the cordial invitation recently extended to him by His Excellency, President Gaspar Dutra of Brazil, to make a visit to that country and expressed the hope that it would be possible at an early date for him to accept," said a formal White House announcement released simultaneously here and in Rio de Janeiro.

"President Truman is now most happy to confirm his acceptance and the trip is being scheduled to take place during the latter part of August or the early days of September."

"The President plans to proceed to Rio de Janeiro by air for a three day visit and to return on the USS Missouri."

Socialism In England

Britain's Labor Party Sticks By Socialistic Guns But U. S. Legislators Begin To Doubt Wisdom Of Supporting That System; The Crusading Attitude

British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin isn't one to compromise with convictions, as witness his reiteration of the Socialist government's policy of nationalizing the factories and mines of Germany's great Ruhr—a policy which the U. S. strongly opposes on the grounds that this is a matter for the German people themselves to decide.

One can admire—and surely cannot quarrel with—the constancy of Mr. Bevin. Still, it is given to wonder why he should find it necessary to emphasize such a highly controversial politico-economic issue at this tense moment in Britain's own economic crisis whose solution depends upon American largesse.

After all, if even "heaven tempests the wind to the storm lamb," surely John Bull might refrain from blowing the hot breath of Socialistic nationalization down the neck of Capitalistic Uncle Sam.

Now of course it would be presumptuous to the nth degree for an American to raise the point of whether Socialism is good for Britain, and this column doesn't refer

The situation goes back to V-J Day when the United States ordered a halt to the wartime "strategic" program under which this country supplied its allies with more than \$50 billion dollars worth of fighting and home front equipment.

But while the lend-lease arrangement as such came to an abrupt halt, various nations contracted on a time payment basis for materials costing \$1,201,000,000. Under this deal Russia was to receive \$250,000,000 worth.

All were to be delivered by last December 31.

Because of strikes and other delaying factors, however, some \$34,000,000 worth remained in this country when the deadline fell.

MAY SUGGEST UN ASSEMBLY GET PROBLEM

U.S. Ready for "Plain Talk" Over Balkans In Security Council Meet

Lake Success, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The United States was reported ready today to suggest that the United Nations general assembly handle the Balkans situation if the Security Council cannot do so because of Russia's veto.

The council was called to meet at 3 p. m. to continue debate on the Balkans, with the prospect of some of the plainest speaking yet heard in that group of eleven diplomats.

An authoritative source said that Herschel V. Johnson, U. S. deputy on the Security Council, was all set to make an important statement outlining the U. S. position substantially this way:

1. The U. S. hopes that the Security Council will act to meet the situation. But, if the council cannot do that through the use of the veto, the U. S. is confident that the General Assembly will handle the situation.
2. The U. S. feels strongly "on the Soviet use of the veto. It does not like the implications in the Soviet action."
3. The U. S. has decided view toward what it feels has been the defiance of Albania, Yugoslavia and Bulgaria in refusing to cooperate with the Security Council's subsidiary group left in the troubled area.
4. Finally, the U. S. contrary to reports that it might try to achieve a solution outside the United Nations, is definitely and firmly committed to the United Nations and will exhaust all resources of the charter in trying to solve the question.

The General Assembly has authority only to recommend action but cannot make a decision, on a case as long as the Security Council has it, but the council majority could drop the Balkans case with the intent of bringing it up in the assembly.

Heat Wave Kills Thirty-Nine In Mid-West Area

A searing, prolonged heat wave which has kept the midwest gasping for four successive days was responsible today for a total of at least 39 deaths, 14 of them in Chicago and 11 in St. Louis.

Some relief was promised for the Great Lakes region tomorrow, but today's temperatures continued to hover around the 100 mark.

In Chicago, 12 persons died from effects of the extensive heat, and two persons drowned. A high of 100 was again predicted for the Chicago area, but cooler air was expected tomorrow, with an 88 forecast.

There was nothing in sight, the bureau said, to dislodge the hot air from the Mississippi Valley, South Plains and Great Lakes regions generally within the next 24 hours, although the wind shift in Nebraska and western Iowa was moving slowly eastward with relief promised for parts of other north central states tonight and Thursday.

Victory Medals Obtainable At Local Office

Army World War II veterans of Greenville who have been authorized by the War Department to wear the Victory Medal may obtain the medal at the local army recruiting station, New City Hall Building, Greenville, upon presentation of their discharge certificate or similar papers bearing the required authorization. It was announced today by M-Sgt. Virgil B. Lindsey, commanding officer of the local recruiting station.

Although several million veterans have earned this honor by their wartime service, the medals have only recently been coined by the United States Mint, and no general distribution has yet been made. In place of the honor have worn the ribbon bar, which ordinarily substitutes for the medal on all occasions except formal ceremonies.

The sergeant pointed out that the discharge papers of most veterans relieved from active duty since V-J Day bear the notation that the individual is authorized to wear this medal. All army veterans are urged to examine their discharge certificates, and, if eligible, to call at the local recruiting station to pick up the medal itself.

Million-Dollar Blaze In Miami

Miami, Fla., Aug. 6.—(AP)—Damage estimated at more than \$1,000,000 was caused by fire early today when a mysterious explosion touched off a blaze in hangar No. 3 of the Miami International Airport, and destroyed two 21-passenger DC-3s and an undetermined number of smaller planes.

Fire Chief Henry Chase of the Miami Fire Department said that two buildings—a 100x500-foot hangar and a 150x500-foot wood building used as a shop and storage building; two DC-3 passenger planes, two Beechcraft, one former Army—26 bomber, several aircraft engines and a number of smaller craft were destroyed.

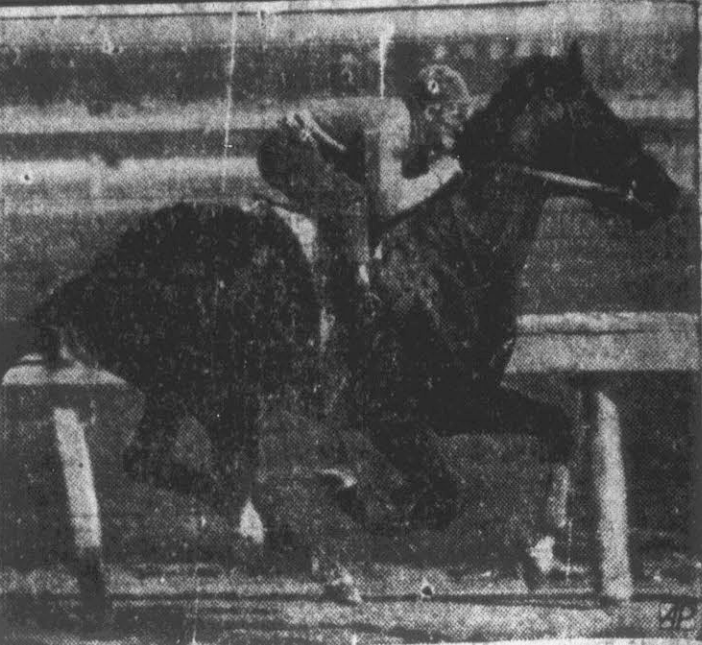

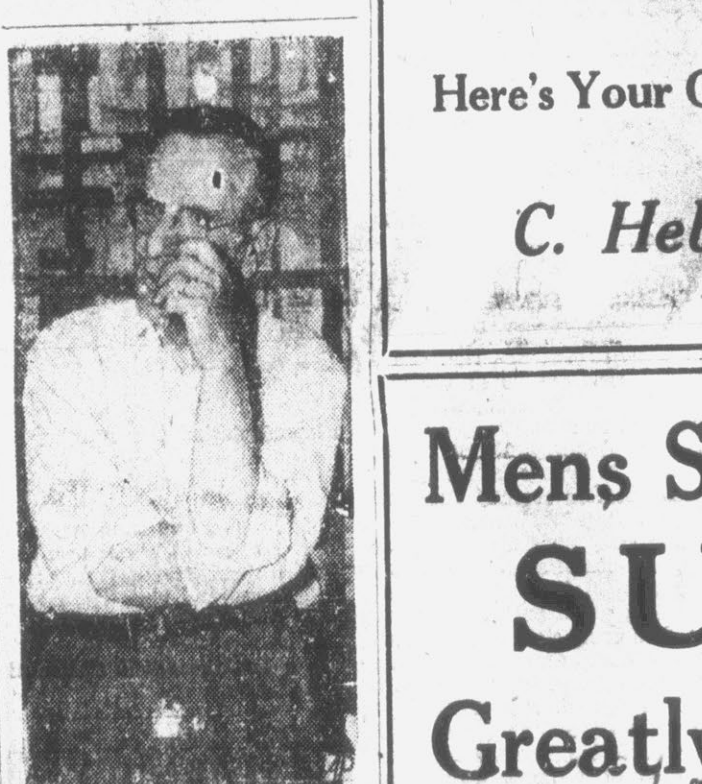
The advanced ceiling price was reflected by sugar refiners which raised the price of granulated sugar 15 cents per hundred pounds, Kittrell said.

"Mark Time" Parking Meters Being Installed In Greenville

City's Business Section Will Have 355 Parking Meters; Expected to Do Much to Solve Traffic and Parking Conditions In Shopping District

By CHESTER WALSH

Installation of 355 "Mark Time" parking meters in the business section of Greenville is expected to do much to improve traffic and parking conditions in Greenville, Police Chief Jim Tanner who investigated parking meters in num-

erous other cities, said today.

M. H. Rhodes, Inc., Hartford, Conn. has an engineer and a crew of men here installing the parking meters. All vehicles will be parked parallel with the curb. Passenger bus stops will be marked off at certain street intersections.

Mayor Jack Boyd said the board of aldermen bought the "Mark Time" parking meters because wherever it has been installed it has been entirely satisfactory, giving motorists a chance to find parking space and opening up traffic lanes.

The meter is simple to operate. Only pennies or nickels operate it. When a penny is inserted, the motorist turns a small crank until it clicks, and his car may remain there for 12 minutes. If he wants to park longer he may insert four more pennies and remain an hour. This meter is the only one manufactured which indicates how much more time the vehicle may remain there. If the motorist wants to park an hour he may insert a nickel—only one. At the end of that time he may insert another nickel.

People who come to Greenville to do their shopping or trading may always find parking space. The meters will eliminate the all-day parking of businessmen's and their employees' cars. It has been pointed out that the slow cruising around of motorists looking for places to park considerably slows up the traffic lanes.

The parking meters will be in operation daily from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.—not on Sundays or holidays. Chief Tanner has assigned four traffic officers to supervise the parking meters, instruct the public as to their use and otherwise be helpful. They will be installed at the following places:

- Evans street from Second to the library.
- Washington street from Third to Dickinson avenue.
- Dickinson avenue from Five Points to Morton's Warehouse.
- Fifth street, from Greene to Reade.
- Third street, from Washington to Cotanche.
- Fourth street, from Washington to Cotanche.
- Cotanche street, from Fourth to Fifth streets.

"We know that many of our people are not familiar with parking meters," Chief Tanner said, "and we are going to conduct an educational campaign and seek the cooperation of the public. After the meters have been in use some time their value will be appreciated. The police are going to be lenient for a time. Their job is to improve traffic and parking conditions for the benefit of all. The parking meters will provide parking space for the people who do their shopping and trading in Greenville."

Poland Appeals For Restoration Relief Program

Washington, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Poland appealed to the United States today to restore its cancelled share of the \$332,000,000 American relief program.

Ambassador Josef Winiewicz submitted the plea to Secretary of State Marshall and told reporters after the conference that "Poland really needs food."

Estimating his country's grain deficiency until next July 1 at 800,000 tons, the envoy said he also asked Marshall to support an allocation of grain by the Agriculture department. He said Poland would pay for it by "mortgaging" gold reserves in this country.

Poland's refusal to take part in the Paris conference on the Marshall Europe-help-itself plan "does not mean that we are cooling off or breaking relations with the west," the Ambassador said he told Marshall.

"On the contrary," he added, "we are trying to improve relations."

Part of their current trouble is a financial cage which the United States helped to build. It is a provision in the \$3,750,000,000 British loan which says that beginning last month Britain must pay off in either pounds sterling or American dollars to any nation from which it buys.

The British are doing it. But at the same time their dollars are disappearing at a greatly increased rate because most of the countries want dollars so they in turn can buy from America.

Should America go back to rationing, at least on wheat and steel the two things Europe needs most? It would mean fewer autos and pastries for Americans. Would Americans take it?

Britain, and any other nation getting help under the Marshall plan, will also be asked questions by American financial administrators. Such questions are these:

Are European taxes high enough? Are Europeans trying to preserve a living standard too high for their actual situation? Is Socialism really as efficient a way to get work out of people as free enterprise?

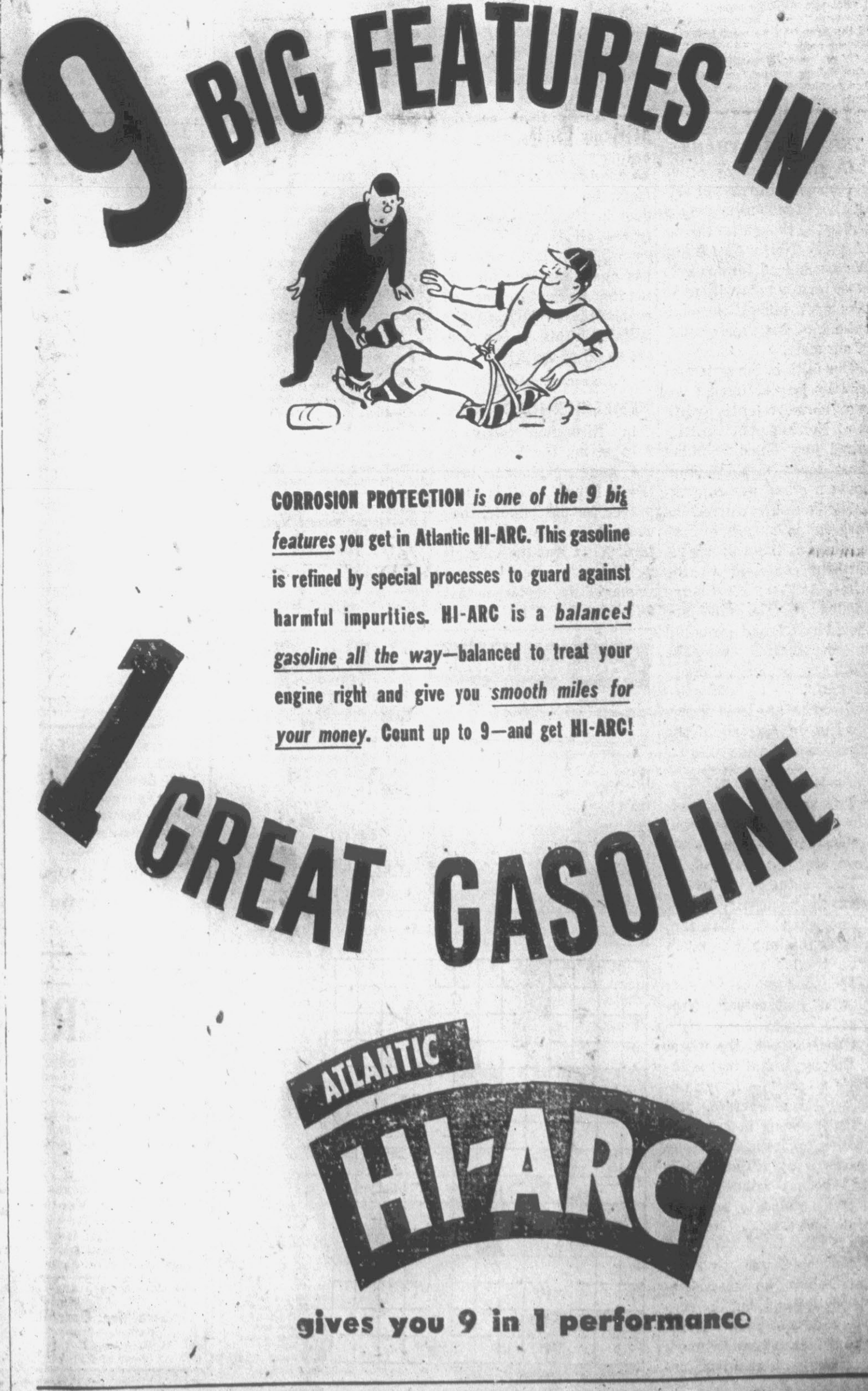

Strength FOR THE DAY

A GOOD NAME BEYOND RICHES
A man's integrity cannot be measured by the money he makes. In these days, with so many people struggling to get higher pay by any possible means, it is well to remember that the value of one's good name cannot be put into dollars and cents. While it may not be worth anything in terms of money to be known among one's family and friends as honest and trustworthy, such a reputation breeds a respect—and a self-respect for which no amount of wealth can be a substitute.

A story is told of General Robert E. Lee in the days after the war when all he had was gone, and he was making fifteen hundred dollars per year as president of Washington College (now Washington and Lee) in Virginia. The directors of a large insurance company offered him fifty thousand dollars a year to be its president. Lee declined courteously, saying that he understood nothing about the insurance business.

"But you won't be expected to do any work," said the representative of the firm. "All we want is the use of your name."

"If my name is worth fifty thousand dollars a year," said General Lee gently. "Then don't you think that I ought to be very careful of it?"

THOUGHTFUL THANKS

Governor Cherry's action in reopening the case of seven alleged mob members deserves the thoughtful thanks of every North Carolinian. We are indeed fortunate to have such a man willing to take upon himself the obligations of the "conscience" of our state.

Our faith in the system of trial by jury suffered a severe blow yesterday when the Northampton county grand jury failed to indict those seven men. Without doubt a crime was committed by those who entered the Jackson jail. One of the members of the mob has reportedly confessed to the crime. As Governor Cherry pointed out, "The grand jury should have found a true bill in order that this evidence could have been heard in open court."

All of us are looking forward to the outcome of the proceedings that lie ahead.

HIT-AND-RUN

Two instances of hit-and-run driving were reported by local law enforcement officers over the week-end.

Two automobile drivers were so panic-stricken by their mishaps that they ran, without thinking, into much more trouble than if they had stopped and taken stock of what had actually happened.

Carelessness at the wheel of the juggernaut that is today's automobile is certainly subject to censure. But when it results in injury to another, and the guilty one speeds away without waiting to count the damage, that person becomes a potential killer and a menace to society.

Fortunately, in the cases noted above, no one was seriously injured, but the run-away drivers didn't know, and it does not require much stretching of the imagination



tion to picture a hospital case lying at the side of the road becoming an occupant of the morgue, because the hit-and-run driver did not stop to help his victim.

Most of the hit-and-runners are caught. The police are relentless in their search, aided by a willing society which fears this menace to life and health. They have little or no chance to escape.

In all fairness, it must be said that the average hit-and-run driver is neither a blood-thirsty fiend nor deliberately callous. He is an ordinary person who loses his head and scrambles away from the scene of the accident in a panic which obliterates all thoughts of responsibility. It is after he has again regained his reason that he can turn back, or report the accident. When he falls in this, he is a menace to all of us.

REMEMBER HIROSHIMA

In Hiroshima today at 8:14 a. m., the hour when the bomb exploded, bells tolled. People stood in silent prayer for one minute, then went again about their affairs. That was the only official notice taken in Hiroshima of an explosion that left 92,000 of its citizens

dead or missing.

General MacArthur voiced the thoughts of all thinking men when he issued a statement in Tokyo today, saying: "War's destructiveness will progress until the means are at hand to exterminate the human race. This is the lesson of Hiroshima. God grant that it be not ignored."

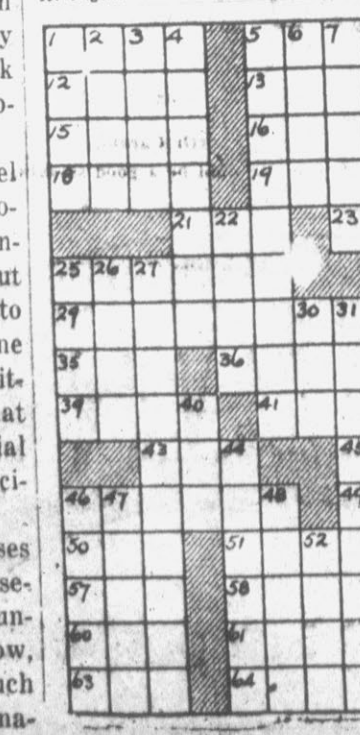

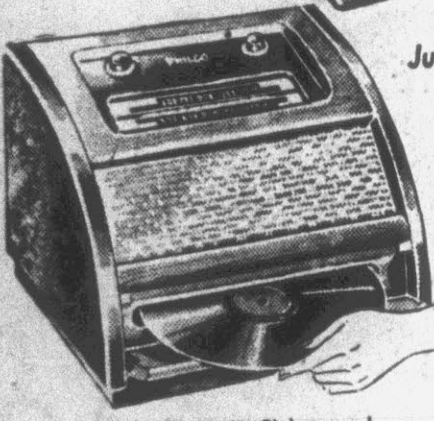

presumably will come up in congress in due course. And the signs are that the legislature will be even more searching in its inquiry than ever before.
England knows all this and for that reason one would think she would go slow on demanding nationalization in a foreign country like Germany. Such insistence on spreading Britain's politico-economic program abroad is unhappily suggestive of an international crusade. It isn't particularly good promotion for aid from America.

It is the economic aspect of Socialism, rather than the strictly political, which is worrying American big business. The United States has made it quite clear that she wants to be helpful to her good ally in this crisis, but wants to do so without cutting her own throat. Uncle Sam even smiles tolerantly when former Prime Minister Winston Churchill, that great painter of word pictures, declares in a political speech regarding the government and the crisis:
"I say without hesitation that there will be no recovery from our present misfortunes until the guilty men, whose crazy theories and personal incompetence have brought us down have been driven from power by the votes of the nation."

First Shipment Of Tobacco for Export Ready

Charleston, S. C. Aug. 6.—(AP)—The first shipment of an expected 60,000,000 pounds of tobacco destined for export is now in warehouses here.

Some 250,000 pounds yesterday were brought into the state ports authority terminals in North Charleston. About 35 carloads are expected daily from Georgia and North and South Carolina. Much of the tobacco is expected to be here for at least eight months, ports authority officials said.
Most of the tobacco will go to the United Kingdom, China, Germany and Holland. It will be the first sizeable tobacco shipment through Charleston in 20 years.

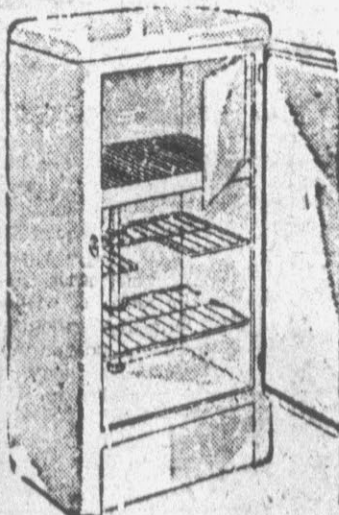
