NEW LIFE FOR TIED-DOWN UN ATOMIC BOARD

British Gov't To Present Key Questions To Russia On Vital Procedures

Lake Success, Aug. 9.—(AP)—A series of British questions for Moscow to answer concerning Russian views on atomic control injected new life today into the atomic negotiations which have been stymied by persistent United States-Russian disagreements.

Without fanfare, the British delegation to the United Nations Atomic Energy Commission announced that it was submitting promptly to Andrei A. Gromyko, Soviet delegate, some questions which had been drawn up in London. They will be given to other delegates also before being made public.

The British said they were ready to wait a long time for the answers. The questions presumably were drafted at top level in London and the British made it clear they expected replies from the top level in Moscow. They were said to deal with the veto, inspection, and control procedures.

The Atomic Energy Commission is working on its second report to the U.N. Security Council which must be submitted before the U.N. Assembly meets Sept. 16.

The United States, backed by nine other members of the 12-nation commission, and Russia, backed only by Poland have just finished tearing apart each other's ideas on an atomic control commission.

On Wednesday the Russian States turned down a Russian paper on the control commission as "inadequate" and "wholly unacceptable." Yesterday Russia asked "why?" and said that any plan based on the United States proposals would not be acceptable to the Soviet Union. The delegates will continue expressing their views at a meeting of the political committee on the atomic commission Monday.

Fear Massacre By Indonesians

Batavia, Java, Aug. 9.—(AP)—A Chinese spokesman declared today the withdrawal of Dutch forces from occupied territories in Java and Sumatra would result in the massacre of thousands of Chinese by Indonesian Nationalists.

Hung Yuan Yuan, Chairman of the Chunghua Tsunghui Netherlands East Indies Chinese Association broadcast a request to the United Nations to call on the Indonesian Republic government to release thousands of Chinese he said the Indonesians already had carried out as prisoners.

Hearing Today For Watchman

Hendersonville, Aug. 9.—(AP)—A night watchman who allegedly shot to death a 16-year-old Wilmington youth he said was attempting to take a plane from the Asheville-Hendersonville airport today faced a preliminary hearing on a murder charge in county records court here August 25.

The watchman J. R. Calton, was arrested at his home in Fletcher yesterday and was released in \$2,500 bond. Sheriff F. D. Dalton said he had signed a warrant charging murder after he had conferred with Solicitor C. O. Riddings.

Foreign Service Man

George F. Kennan, Veteran American Diplomat, Heads State Department's New Policy Planning Staff; Familiar With Russian Ways; Well Suited For Job

Washington, Aug. 9.—(AP)—A 43-year-old State Department official who thinks best with his feet on the desk will play a major role in guiding American policy during the next critical years.

George F. Kennan, veteran of 20 years in the foreign service and one of the few American diplomats who speaks Russian fluently, heads the department's newly-created policy planning staff.

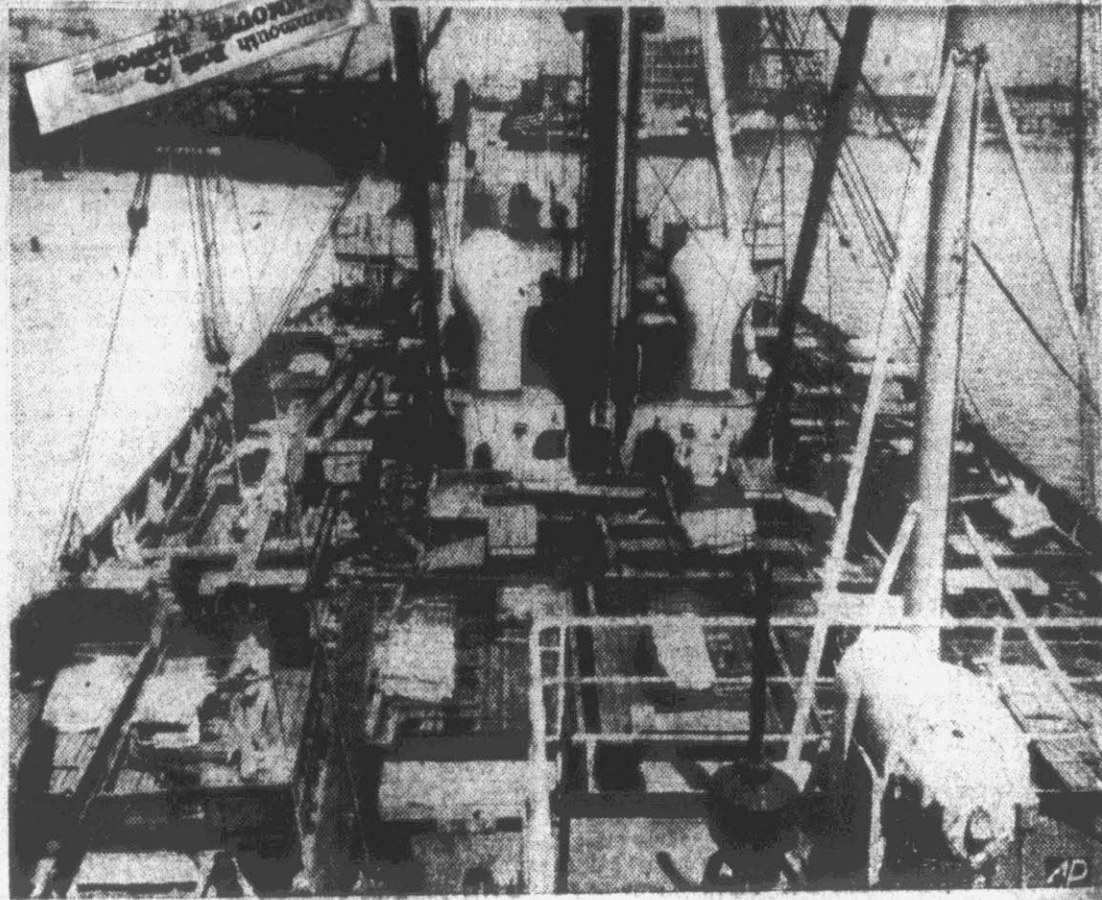
This staff was established last May by Secretary Marshall with the sole purpose of developing long-range policy.

Kennan's task is to see world problems in advance and have "answers" and specific courses of action ready for instant use. Currently he and the five men on his staff are surveying world economic conditions to suggest what can be done to speed global recovery.

Tall, balding Kennan has long enjoyed a reputation as an expert on Russia and has been an important cog in the State Department machine ever since graduation from Princeton University.

Kennan's associates feel he is peculiarly suited for the unprecedented job assigned him. They say an ability to fit current developments into long-range thinking is a trait Kennan possesses in abundance.

LEAF RETURNS ARE UNDER '46

Border Belt Prices And Quality Under Last Year's High

Tobacco border belt markets yesterday completed their first two days of sales for the 1947 season with prices below those of the 1946 record opening week. The federal-state department of agriculture marketing services reported.

Not only was the quality of the offerings considerably off the 1946 pace, but many markets did not have enough tobacco for the sale during their allotted time. The marketing services said many growers had little tobacco ready for marketing, but predicted more on the floors within the next few sales days.

Prices for the majority of leaf and better grades were steady to \$1 lower, however. Drops from \$1 to \$4 were registered for lugs. Biggest losses came with primings losing from \$3 to \$6 over opening-day quotations. Best thin nondescript dropped \$2.75.

Official opening-day gross sales totaled 4,654,941 for an average of (Continued on Page Four)

Hughes Tells Big Plane Difficulties

Acknowledges Giant Flying Boat Too Big To Have Great Efficiency; Crosses Barrier In Size; Control System Greatest Handicap

Washington, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Howard Hughes told Senate investigators today that "bad feeling" on the part of army officers prevented him from getting wartime contracts for the production of pursuit planes faster than any the army or navy had.

Hughes testified that his big flying boat under construction is too big to be "tremendously efficient," but backed his faith in the project by declaring that if it fails "I will leave the country."

Asserting that he had "put the best of my life" into building the 200-ton flying boat, Hughes said the Senate was investigating committee that "this plane crossed a barrier in size—the control system can no longer be operated by a man, even in an emergency."

Hughes testified that the Japanese one of the most effective Japanese planes in the recent war was copied from a speedy monoplane Hughes designed and flew several years ago.

The Hollywood film producer and airplane designer dropped this information into a long recital of his 27 years experience in aviation in which he said it was more than a coincidence that his company and Lockheed Aircraft Corporation submitted practically the same design for a twin-engine interceptor plane. Hughes said that despite the fact that he finished what he called a "brave and unprecedented" design first, he said he was forced by the army to wait four months until Lockheed could get its drawings (Continued on Page Four)

Exiled Russian General Dies Of Heart Attack

Ann Arbor, Mich., Aug. 9.—(AP)—Gen. Anilov Denikine, 76, former Imperial Russian Army Officer who later led White Russian forces in a futile three-year struggle against the Bolsheviks, died of a heart attack Thursday night in the University of Michigan hospital.

He was taken ill ten days ago while visiting with his wife, Xenia, at the summer home of a friend, Hilario Bibicoff, who lives at near-by Dexter.

Exiled from his native land since 1920, when he fled to Istanbul after defeat of his white forces, Gen. Denikine found refuge in France where he lived until coming to the United States slightly more than a year ago.

Son of a serf, he rose to the rank of Colonel in the Imperial Army at the start of World War I. Gen. Denikine maintained the reputation of a Russian patriot throughout his long exile.

U.S. Film Ban Gets Top Billing In British Press

London, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Britain's heavy tax on American motion pictures may have sown the seed of British-American disunity, a top-ranking American film executive told the British press today.

"The British announcement, which to all intents and purposes confiscates 75 per cent of all American film earnings, has sent a shudder through every man and woman employed in the many aspects of the industry and this may be followed by deep resentment on the part of the entire American public," Chester Cowdin of Universal Films, Inc., told his news conference.

Odom Plane Seen Over Shanghai On Way To Tokyo

Chicago, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Franklin Lamb, Flight Manager of William Odom's round-the-world hop, said he had received word from the Shanghai, China, airport that the "Bombshell" had passed over Shanghai at about 10:15 Eastern Standard Time today and apparently was headed for Tokyo, the next scheduled stop.

Lamb said he was not told the exact time that Odom reached Shanghai but that the Shanghai operator said that he was talking to Lamb the "Bombshell" was winging out of sight. Lamb said that he was "pretty sure" the time would be "around 10:15 (EST)."

Odom had left Calcutta, his last stop, at 2:44 A. M. (EST) time. At that time, he was 37 hours and 51 minutes and more than 10,000 miles out of Chicago—better than halfway along his intended 19,600-mile course.

Babson Discusses The Customers' Rights

Gloucester, Mass., Aug. 8.—For months we have been hearing of nothing but management's rights and labor's rights. The rights of the customer have often been forgotten in quarrels between management and labor—those of the general public.

It is about time that all groups begin to think in terms of national well-being. Today we are faced with a great debt from pre-war, war, and post-war spending. We are carrying a heavy tax-burden. We are trying to help most of the war-torn countries of the world back onto their feet. This cannot be done without the kind of shoulder-to-shoulder effort and capacity for work for which Americans used to be famous and of which America used to be proud.

Since the late twenties we have seen our economic structure gradually weakened. Business opportunities have been restricted; incentives to "make a million" (an American slogan of the youth) or even a tiny portion thereof has been destroyed. U.S. Agents Launch Inquiry Of Missing German Crown Jewels

Berlin, Aug. 9.—(AP)—U.S. agents launched an intensive investigation today of the mysterious disappearance of part of a fabulous collection of German crown jewels, and a stepson of the last Kaiser said he thought the Russians were involved.

Prince Ferdinand valued the 29 missing items at \$2,000,000 and the entire collection at \$5,000,000. American Criminal Investigation Department agents previously reported the missing portion was worth more than \$500,000 and the whole collection of 95 pieces about \$1,000,000.

The jewels belonged to Ferdinand's mother, Princess Hermine, widow of Kaiser Wilhelm II. They were smuggled from the Russian-occupied zone of Germany, and some quarters here speculated that the Russians might demand that the balance of the treasure, now in American custody, be returned to their zone.

American agents said a young woman friend of the 34-year-old prince spirited the jewels from Princess Hermine, at Frankfurt-on-Oder, to her son in the American zone, Princess Hermine died in the Russian-zone city Thursday.

The prince said he had submitted to a truth serum test to support a version of the mystery he unfolded to American authorities.

The prince said the jewels vanished from his trunk while he was living in the American sector of Berlin.

As he spoke, his younger sister, Princess Carolina, came bursting into the smartly furnished apartment. She said she had just returned from Frankfurt-on-Oder.

The thin, nervous prince, who lost the sight of his left eye as the result of a war wound, said he was sure someone had told the Russians that the jewels were smuggled out of the Soviet zone and that KNVD (Soviet secret police) agents had been shadowing him.

The American agents said the gems had been smuggled out by a young woman friend of the prince who "risked her neck," Ferdinand

was to convert the valuables into cash for investments in western Germany, the investigators said. But 29 of the best pieces vanished before he could dispose of them.

Investigators—attempting to unravel the mystery—have encountered a maze of intrigue involving fortune tellers, characters from the Berlin underworld and persons of half a dozen nationalities, including an unidentified American civilian in whose house Ferdinand—with his "million dollar trunk"—was a guest for a short period.

Paraguan Army In Front And Behind Rebels

Asuncion, Paraguay, Aug. 9.—(AP)—The government intimidated today that units of its army were deployed both in front of and behind insurgents advancing on this capital.

(Argentine dispatches yesterday reported the revolutionists had encircled Asuncion by land and were getting ready to shell the city from gunboats on the Paraguay river.)

A communiqué from President Higinio Morinigo's government yesterday said the army's first corps "already in action against the real guard of rebels to the north and was overcoming their resistance."

The communiqué said the second corps had taken up positions inside Asuncion to fight off any attack.

Two 100-Horsepower Planes Set Off On Round-World Trip

Teterboro, N. J., Aug. 9.—(AP)—A pair of tiny, single-engine planes piloted by former army flier took off on a 21,350-mile flight around the world—the first attempt of planes of less than 575 horsepower to make the circuit.

The 100-horsepower Cub plane followed one another down the Teterboro Airport runway, the first becoming airborne at 10:10 A. M. (EST), and the second two minutes later.

The pilot—George Truman, 39, of Los Angeles, a former Army flight instructor, and Clifford W. Evans, 26, of Washington, D. C., who flew in the China-Burma-India theater during the war—said yesterday they expected the trip to take 20 to 220 flying hours and from 30 to 45 days.

The planes, which have a cruising speed of 100 miles per hour, are equipped to carry 138 gallons of gasoline, 100 more than the Cub's normal load.

First stop on their route is Cape Bay Labrador where they hope to land tonight.

Two days ago this column in commenting on Prime Minister Attlee's drastic proposals for dealing with Britain's economic collapse, ventured the view that his country's first all-out socialist experiment already had arrived at the point of considerable regimentation of the individual. In fact had made a sharp turn toward a regime partaking of totalitarianism.

Events strengthen that thought. Yesterday Britain's Socialist-controlled House of Commons—integral part of the "Mother of Parliaments" and watch-dog for the little man's bill of rights—adopted a measure that places in the hands of the government emergency powers which democracies associate with the exigencies of wartime.

This legislation is called the "Crisis Powers" Bill. It empowers the government to tell the workers of England where they must be employed, and what hours they must work. The government can take over the management of firms considered to be operating inefficiently.

The old conservative maestro, wartime Prime Minister Churchill, declared in a blistering attack on the bill that the Socialists were asking Parliament to give a blank check for totalitarian government and were using the crisis as a pre-

text. And when Home Secretary Chute Ede said the government believed that "this is a crisis likely to move forward with such rapidity that 'this is a crisis like' to move forward with such rapidity that we should have power to deal drastically and swiftly with awkward situations that may arise" Churchill snapped: "Hitler said that!"

Well, Churchill is leader of the opposition to the Socialist government and he chastises with a heavy political hand. Personally I should want to know more of the future before charging the Socialists with totalitarian skullurgery. But they are about to apply regimentation there can be no doubt, yet they say it is merely to meet the economic crisis.

There are, of course extreme left-wingers in the Socialist party who are driving for a Muscovite dictatorship. However, there have been no signs previously that the rank and file were doing more than following Attlee in establishing the Utopia which they believe is attainable through the magic of nationalization. They can't have much idea of what nationalization will do to England, because it hasn't been tried on a big scale before, but they are gambling on discarding the economic system which made England

GOV'T NEARS FILLING TOP LABOR POSTS

Five Major Federal Appointments An- nounced In Little More Than Week

Washington, Aug. 9.—(AP)—The government today had about completed the job of lining up its top-most labor officials for the uncertain new era ahead.

Five major federal labor appointments have been announced in little more than a week:

1. David A. Morse to be under-secretary of Labor. Secretary Schwellenbach disclosed this selection yesterday, saying President Truman will make the appointment shortly. Morse will succeed Ken Johnson, resigned.

2. Cyrus S. Ching to be director of the new and independent Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service (FMCS).

3. Robert N. Denham to fill the powerful job of general counsel of the National Labor Relations Board.

4. Abe Murdock and J. C. Copeland Gray to be new members of the NLRB.

Morse's appointment is the only one not growing out of the Taft-Hartley Labor Act, which so drastically alters the government's role in the labor field.

But as the executive officer and number two man of the Labor Department he will help administer the government's limited functions under the act, including that of receiving information reports and other information from unions.

(Unions which want to use the machinery of the National Labor Relations Board must file with the Labor Department information on finances, officers' salaries, dues, initiation fees, etc.)

Schwellenbach yesterday turned down a petition from a group of newsmen asking that this information be available to the press.

Push Search For Wanted Druggist

North Wilkesboro, Aug. 9.—(AP)—A search was being pushed today for a junior druggist of North Wilkesboro indicted by Wilkes county grand jury on a charge of abortion and manslaughter in the death of a 24-year-old pretty Winston-Salem hostess worker.

Hugh West was indicted yesterday after Solicitor Avalon Hill of Yadkinville had presented evidence that Miss Pearl Jenkins died from the effects of an operation. An autopsy showed, the solicitor said, that she had been an expectant mother. Sheriff C. G. Polk said of Wilkes county said that West had left his job Wednesday and had not been seen in North Wilkesboro since.

Virginia Hill Arrives Miami

Miami, Fla., Aug. 9.—(AP)—Virginia Hill, tempestuous black-haired girl friend of slain gambler Benjamin "Big Boy" Siegel, arrived at Miami airport and was taken in a police patrol car to her home at Sunset Island.

She refused to answer questions from newsmen.

"I'm not talking to you reporters," she said. "I have absolutely nothing to say to any of you. You Americans started all this anyway."

When newsmen persisted, she spat out: "I have nothing to say. Don't you understand English?"

Britain's Socialist Party Moving Step Nearer Totalitarianism With New "Crisis Powers" Bill; Action Intended Only Temporary, But Dangerous

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FAITH GROWS BY USE
The rationalism of the 18th cen-
tury and the scientific inquiry of
the 19th have led us to put too much
emphasis on the thought side of
religion. We have a passion for try-
ing to make religion reasonable, for-
getting all the time that the most
reasonable thing about religion is
that it works, if one gives it a
chance.

We can never in any given age
square religion absolutely with the
thought modes prevailing at that
moment, and chiefly for two reasons
first, because we never know enough
about religion to say that we under-
stand it perfectly; and second be-
cause the philosophy and science of
any given time is necessary incom-
plete.

The people who get most out of
their religion are those who give
most of their time and their atten-
tion to putting its precepts into
practice, rather than trying to make
their theology intellectually respect-
able. To say this is not to counsel
a thoughtless, moribund, ignorant
attitude toward religious truth.
Rather it is to urge people to en-
joy their religion, and this they
can do if they are continually
taking it apart and examining the
pieces.

Design yourself to the things you
already believe; you will be amazed
to discover that in a short time you
will believe many more things of
a helpful and inspiring nature. Use
the faith you have, and you will get
more faith. "To him that hath shall
be given," in this as in all other
things.

Peanut Parity Based On July 15 Prices

The Agricultural Adjustment Act provides that the support price on the 1947 peanut crop shall be 90 per cent of parity price on July 15. The Bureau of Agricultural Economics has announced that the parity price of Va. Bunch peanuts on July 15 was \$242.77 per ton or \$12.13 per hundred, for peanuts having seventy per cent sound mature kernels with 25 per cent extra large, 90 per cent of parity is \$10.94 per hundred.

The Secretary of Agriculture has called for peanut quotas for 1948 but Congress did not appropriate the two million dollars needed to carry out a quota program. Therefore the Agricultural Adjustment Act still law thru 1948. Farmers can expect support prices whether they have a peanut quota or not next year.

Buttons come off dresses and shirts the first time they are worn. Seams split in two or three places almost immediately. Many bolts won't wash or dry clean. How many new cars run as well as ten year old ones? The war has been over several years, but hotel bathrooms are not shining yet. Management and labor are both to blame when between them they cannot manage to put out more products or services that are of high quality. Let us go back to giving the customer his rights.

Conclusion
Mediocre effort put forth enough times each day by enough people can turn us into a mediocre nation. It is self-delusion for any man to think that he will earn a better living by supporting any politician or labor leader. Only good quality products and services can protect jobs and the future. The hope of every reader of this column lies not in getting higher wages for his week's work, but rather in getting more food, clothing and shelter therefor. The answer lies within each of us. Each one of us is a worker, no matter how designated, who should work by high personal standards. We all must make better goods and more of them each week. Only then are there more to divide amongst us all so that we all will get more in food, clothing and shelter for our week's work.

The conservatives charge that the present crisis is due to this Socialist experiment. Perhaps some of it is, but there can be no doubt that a considerable portion of it was an inheritance from the World War. Whether the difficulties could have been overcome with better management under any form of government is a matter of debate. In any event, the Socialist regime now is caught in a net from which it probably cannot escape without the aid of "Crisis Powers." Those powers assuredly mean regimentation of the individual, but the big question is how long that regimentation will have to be employed.

The longer regimentation is practiced, the more closely will it approach totalitarian dictatorship. And should dictatorship be reached there would be no turning back through the peacefully expressed will of the electorate.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO TRAFFIC AND REGULATING THE USE OF THE STREETS AND HIGHWAYS OF THE CITY OF GREENVILLE; CREATING AND DEFINING PARKING METER ZONES; PROVIDING FOR THE DESIGNATION OF INDIVIDUAL PARKING SPACES; DEFINING AND PROVIDING FOR THE INSTALLATION, OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF PARKING METERS; PRESCRIBING PARKING TIME LIMITS; REQUIRING DEPOSITS OF COINS FOR THE USE OF PARKING METERS AND PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION AND DISPOSITION OF SUCH COINS; REPEALING CONFLICTING ORDINANCES; PROVIDING FOR THE ENFORCEMENT THEREOF; DEFINING PENALTIES; AND PROVIDING THAT INVALIDITY OF PART SHALL NOT AFFECT THE VALIDITY OF THE REMAINDER OF THIS ORDINANCE.

Whereas, the narrowness of and the volume of traffic on the streets in certain sections of the City of Greenville has the effect of congesting the streets and impeding the movement of traffic; and

WHEREAS, it is the habit of numerous operators of motor vehicles to take advantage of this situation by parking for unreasonably long periods of time in close proximity to other motor vehicles so parked on the most congested parts of the City's busiest streets; and, WHEREAS, such practice tends to further impede traffic and in addition thereto constitutes a constant danger to the life, limb and property of other motorists, pedestrians and others; and,

WHEREAS, it is the opinion of the Board of Aldermen of the City of Greenville that the best method by which the above mentioned conditions may be remedied is by the designation of individual parking spaces in the said area, by restricting parking in said area to reasonable intervals of time and by compelling operators of vehicles, who enjoy the use of the parking spaces so designated to pay a portion of the cost of establishing, maintaining and regulating the use of said parking spaces; and,

WHEREAS, previous attempts to regulate traffic and parking in the aforesaid area has not been as successful as desirable for the reason that adequate policing of the problem by the Police Department alone requires a larger number of police officers for such work than can be spared from other vital functions of the Police Department, and it is therefore desirable to employ some method of mechanical assistance in the enforcement of said parking limitations; and,

WHEREAS, parking meters are now authorized by law, and public authorities of cities in which parking meters are in use report favorable results in the operation thereof;

Now, therefore, the Board of Aldermen of the City of Greenville, in the State of North Carolina, do ordain:

Section 1. Definitions. For the purpose of this ordinance:

(a) The word "vehicle" shall mean any device in, upon or by which any person or property is or may be transported upon a highway, except a device which is operated upon rails or tracks.

(b) The word "street" shall mean any public street, avenue, road, alley, highway, lane, path, or other public place located in the City of Greenville and established for the use of vehicles.

(c) The word "person" shall mean and include any individual, firm, co-partnership, association or corporation.

(d) The word "operator" shall mean and include every individual as herein defined who shall operate a vehicle as the owner thereof, or as the agent, employee or permittee of the owner, or who is in actual physical control of a vehicle.

(e) The word "park" or "parking" shall mean the standing of a vehicle, whether occupied or not, upon a street, otherwise than temporarily for the purpose of, and while actually engaged in, receiving or discharging passengers or loading or unloading merchandise, or in obedience to traffic regulations, signs or signals, or an involuntary stopping of a vehicle by reason of causes beyond the control of the operator of such vehicle.

(f) The words "parking meter" shall mean and include any mechanical device or meter not inconsistent with this ordinance placed or erected for the regulation of parking by authority of this ordinance. Each parking meter installed shall indicate by proper legend the legal parking time established by the City, and when operated, shall be at all times indicate the balance of legal parking time, and at the expiration of such period shall indicate illegal or overtime parking.

(g) The words "parking meter zone" shall mean and include any restricted street, or section of street, upon which parking meters are installed and in operation.

(h) The words "parking meter space" shall mean any space within a parking meter zone adjacent to a parking meter and which is duly designated for the parking of a single vehicle by lines painted or otherwise durably marked on the curb or on the surface of the street adjacent to or adjoining the parking meters.

Section 2. Parking Meter Zone. The following named and described areas, streets, or portions of streets, and such other areas, streets, or portions of streets as may hereafter be included in this section, by amendment hereto, lying within the corporate limits of the City of Greenville, shall constitute a parking meter zone, namely:

(a) That section of Evans Street lying between Second Street and a point opposite the southern end of the Sheppard Memorial Library lot.

(b) That section of Dickinson Avenue lying between Five Points and the point on Dickinson Avenue opposite the western side of the building occupied by J. A. Collins and Son as a furniture store.

(c) That section of Washington Street lying between Third Street and Dickinson Avenue.

(d) That section of Cotahatch Street lying between Fourth Street and a point opposite the southern side of the store occupied by Quinn, Miller and Stroud, furniture dealers.

(e) That section of Third Street lying between Cotahatch Street and Washington Street.

(f) That section of Fourth Street lying between Cotahatch and Washington Streets.

(g) That section of Fifth Street lying between Greene Street and Reid Street.

Section 3. Designation of parking spaces. The Chief of Police is hereby directed and authorized to mark off individual parking spaces in the parking zones designated in Section 2 hereof and in such other parking zones as may hereafter be established, the said parking spaces to be designated by lines painted or durably marked on the curbing or surface of the street. At each parking meter space so marked off, it shall be unlawful for any operator to park any vehicle in such a way that said vehicle shall not be entirely within the bounds of the space so designated. It shall also be unlawful for the operator to park any vehicle in any parking meter space on the operator's left-hand side of the street, and/or to turn such vehicle around within the parking meter zone.

Section 4. Installation of Parking Meters. In said parking meter zone or zones the Chief of Police shall cause parking meters to be installed upon the curb or sidewalk immediately adjacent to the parking spaces provided in Section 3 of this ordinance, said installation to be placed not more than two (2) feet from the curb nor more than 4 feet from the front line of the parking space as indicated, and the Chief of Police shall be responsible for the regulation, control, operation, maintenance and use of such parking meters. Each parking meter shall be so set as to display a signal showing legal parking upon the deposit in such meter of the appropriate coin or coins, lawful money of the United States of America, for the period of time prescribed by this ordinance. Each parking meter shall be so arranged that upon the expiration of the lawful time indicated by the meter by a proper visible signal that the lawful parking period has expired, and in such case the right of such vehicle to occupy such space shall cease and the operator, owner, possessor or manager thereof shall be subject to the penalties herein-after provided.

Section 5. Operation of parking meters. Except in a period of emergency determined by an officer of the Fire or Police Department, or in compliance with the directions of a police officer or traffic control sign or signal, when any vehicle shall be

parked in any parking space alongside or next to which a parking meter is located, the operator of such vehicle shall, upon entering the said parking meter space, immediately deposit or cause to be deposited in such meter such proper coin of the United States as is required for such parking meter and as is designated by proper direction on the meter, and when required by the directions on the meter, the operator of such vehicle, after the deposit of the proper coin or coins, shall also set in operation the timing mechanism on such meter in accordance with directions properly appearing thereon, and failure to deposit such proper coin, and to set the timing mechanism in operation when so required, shall constitute a violation of this ordinance. Upon the deposit of such coin, and the setting of the timing mechanism in operation when so required, the parking space may lawfully be occupied by such vehicle during the period of time which has been prescribed for the part of the street in which said parking space is located, provided that any person placing a vehicle in a parking meter space adjacent to a parking meter which indicates that unused time has been left in the meter by the previous occupant of the space shall not be required to deposit a coin so long as his occupancy of said space does not exceed the indicated unused parking time. If said vehicle shall remain parked in any such parking space beyond the parking time limit set for such parking space, and if the meter shall indicate such illegal parking time, then and in that event, such vehicle shall be considered as parking overtime and beyond the period of legal parking time, and such parking shall be deemed a violation of this ordinance.

Section 6. Parking time limits. (a) Parking or standing a vehicle in a designated parking meter space shall be lawful for twelve (12) minutes upon deposit of a one-cent coin, twenty-four (24) minutes upon the deposit of two (2) one-cent coins, thirty-six (36) minutes upon the deposit of three (3) one-cent coins, forty-eight (48) minutes upon the deposit of four (4) one-cent coins, and sixty (60) minutes upon the deposit of five (5) one-cent coins or one (1) five-cent coin of the United States of America.

(b) Said parking meters shall be operated in said parking meter zones every day between the hours of nine o'clock, A. M., and six o'clock P. M. except Sundays and holidays; provided, however, that within the meaning of this ordinance the term "holiday" shall include only the first day of January, the fourth of July, the twenty-fifth day of December, Thanksgiving day as observed in the State of North Carolina, and such other days as shall be designated holidays by the Mayor of the City of Greenville.

Section 7. Violations. It shall be unlawful and a violation of the provisions of this ordinance for any person:

(a) To cause, allow, permit or suffer any vehicle registered in the name of, or operated by such person to be parked overtime, or beyond the period of legal parking time established for any parking meter zone as herein described, or to deposit in any parking meter any coin for the purpose of parking beyond the maximum legal parking time for the particular parking meter zone.

(b) To permit any vehicle to remain or be placed in any parking meter space adjacent to any parking meter while said meter is displaying a signal indicating that the vehicle occupying such parking space has already been parked beyond the period of time prescribed for such parking space.

(c) To park any vehicle across any line or marking of a parking meter space or in such a position

that the vehicle shall not be entirely within the area designated by such lines or markings.

(d) To park any vehicle in any parking meter space on the operator's left-hand side of the street, and/or to turn any vehicle around in any parking meter zone.

(e) To deface, injure, tamper with, open or wilfully break, destroy or impair the usefulness of any parking meter installed under the provisions of this ordinance.

(f) To deposit or cause to be deposited in any parking meter any slug, device, or metal substance, or other substitute for lawful coin.

(g) To fail to comply with any other requirement or provision of this ordinance.

Section 8. Enforcement. It shall be the duty of the Police Department to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 9. Collections. It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police from time to time as the need may arise to recommend to the Board of Aldermen some member or members of the police force to make regular collections of the money deposited in said parking meters, but such member or members, to be eligible to make said collections, must first be approved by the Board of Aldermen for that purpose. It shall be the duty of such person or persons so designated and appointed to remove from the parking meters the sealed containers therein containing the coins so deposited in said meters and to deliver such sealed containers, with the seals unbroken, to the City Clerk, who shall break the seals, count the funds therein contained, make a record of the same, and deposit such funds with the City Treasurer.

Section 10. Use of Funds. The coins deposited in parking meters shall be used exclusively for the purpose of making the regulations prescribed by this ordinance effective, and for the expenses incurred by the City of Greenville in the regulation and limitation of vehicular parking, and traffic relating to such parking on the streets and highways of the City.

Section 11. Penalty. Any person who shall violate or fail to comply with any of the provisions of this ordinance, or who shall counsel, aid or abet any such violation or failure to comply, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction by the court shall be punished by a fine of not to exceed \$50.00, or by imprisonment for not to exceed 30 days, either or both penalties to be imposed at the discretion of the Court.

Section 12. Reservation of Powers. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed as prohibiting the City of Greenville from providing for bus stops, for taxicab stands and other matters of similar nature, including the loading and unloading of trucks, vans and other commercial vehicles.

Section 13. Repeal of Conflicting Ordinances and Laws. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed; provided, however, that such repeal shall be only to the extent of such inconsistency and in all other respects this ordinance shall be cumulative of other ordinances regulating and governing the subject matter covered by this ordinance.

Section 14. Severability. If any section or provisions, or part thereof in this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or of any other section or provision or part hereof.

Section 15. Effective date. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after 9:00 o'clock, A. M., on the 10th day of August, 1947.

Decentralized Economy For Germans Planned

Berlin, Aug. 9.—(AP)—The U. S. military government aims to give Germany a decentralized economy—consisting mainly of small, unregulated businesses—like that which has made America the most productive country in the world. L. V. Steere, acting director of the U. S. office of political affairs, told the German people in a radio broadcast last night.

The Russians have been actively pushing socialization in their occupation zone and the British are advocating it.

Steere told the Germans that one of the most important single factors responsible for America's productivity was its 31,400,000 small businesses which flourished under a competitive system. He added:

"If we can lay the foundations for economic democracy in Germany in which small business establishments can compete and flourish, free from restraints and regimentation imposed by governments and cartels or political parties, Germany will benefit tremendously."

A new heat wave now covering Montana and the southern plains states will spread over the entire area between the Mississippi river and the Rocky Mountain region this afternoon and extend eastward tomorrow to blanket the lower Ohio river valley and the upper great lakes region.

Then, he testified, the army let the contract for what has been known as the P-38 to Lockheed.

He said that the army previously had turned down his monoplane design, which was copied in the Jap zeros despite the fact that he set a transcontinental record of seven and one-half hours "and it took the army with all of its planes eight years to break it."

Of his flying boat he said it will not break any speed or long range flight records because "it is not tremendously efficient."

He said test flights are being held up because no satisfactory control system has been worked out.

Hughes said the test flights of the flying boat which is structurally complete, depend entirely on successful completion of a powered control system which he said "we believe we have licked" in hangar tests.
