Ten State Dept. Workers Fired

Washington, Aug. 14.—(AP)—The Civil Service Commission disclosed today that it has found ten additional State Department employees ineligible for government employment "for loyalty reasons, all of them involving communism."

This brings to 20 the number of state government workers removed since July 1, 1946, for security reasons.

The commission announcement was contained in a letter to Chairman Rees (R-Kan.) of the House civil service committee, which has been studying employee loyalty.

In the race for Negro vice-president-at-large, both George Lynch of Winston-Salem and P. J. McCoy of Durham were named.



U.S. To Cancel \$1 Billion From Italian Debt

Washington, Aug. 14.—(AP)—The United States today agreed to cancel about \$1,000,000,000 in debts owed it by the Italian government.

The move was made, the State Department said, to ease the "burdensome clauses" of the Italian peace treaty.

The State Department announced the decision in making public an accord concluded with an Italian financial mission after three months of negotiation.

Under the pact, the United States waives all claim to payment for approximately \$523,000,000 in civilian supplies furnished by the Amer-

ican Army to Italian civilians and \$305,000,000 owed for occupation costs.

About \$175,000,000 in additional miscellaneous claims were wiped out simultaneously.

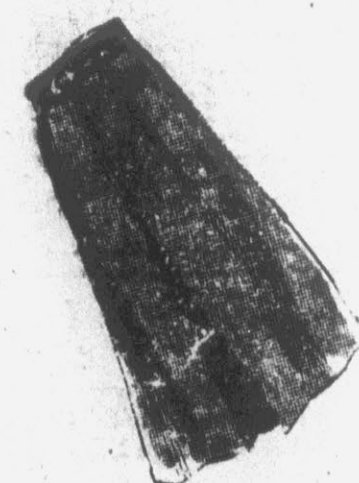

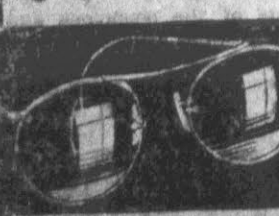

Business And Professional Women's Club Endorse New County Hospital

Approximately 50 members of the Greenville Business and Professional Women's Club were feted yesterday afternoon and evening at Mrs. F. A. Jordan's cottage at Mimosa Shores on the Pamlico River. After enjoying an afternoon of swimming and relaxation, members of the club were served a picnic supper by hostesses Mrs. Jordan, Mrs. H. S. Ragsdale and Mrs. Cora Powell.

During the business meeting, the club passed a resolution to back the proposed new Pitt County hospital "100 per cent," and to "do everything possible to get the women of the Greenville community to register and vote for the bond issue for the new hospital. Also in the resolution each club member pledged herself to see that four persons registered and voted in the bond election.

In speaking to the club about the proposed hospital for Pitt County, Hospital Chairman John Clark declared, "This is one of the biggest projects the people of Pitt County have undertaken since East Carolina Teachers College was established in our county 40 years ago.

The new hospital will be something which will be beneficial to every citizen of the county, and something the people of the county will be proud to own."

Clark pointed out in an informal talk that the proposed hospital will be provided with its own laundry plant and heating system, and will include a nurses' home and a nursing school. He made reference to the shortage of trained nurses in Pitt County, and attributed the shortage to the fact that there has been no nursing school in the county since 1931, when the nursing school at the Pitt General Hospital was closed.

"In order to make the new hospital project a success, we need the interest of every person in Pitt County," Clark asserted.

Registration will begin Saturday at the regular polling places throughout the county for the bond election which will be held on September 16.

Family Allowances Are Still In Effect

In order to clarify a misunderstanding in the minds of many people, Lt. George C. Hugh West Said No Pharmacist

Chapel Hill, Aug. 14.—H. C. McAllister, secretary-treasurer of the North Carolina Board of Pharmacy, speaking in behalf of the board, said here today that Hugh West of North Wilkesboro, who was arrested near Asheville last Saturday in connection with the death of Miss Pearl Jenkins of Winston-Salem, was not a registered pharmacist as had been reported in the newspaper accounts.

"The State Board of Pharmacy is interested in public health and wishes to make it clear that West is not and has never been a pharmacist," Dr. McAllister said. "He is a clerk in a North Wilkesboro drug store."

West was indicted last week by a Wilkes county grand jury on charges of abortion and manslaughter in the death of Miss Jenkins who died on a roadside near Winston-Salem July 31.

Yes, Franklin Delano
Roosevelt belonged in the
ranks of those young heroes.
He died in his own "front
lines."

Washington — Ambassador Gon-
zalo Carnevali, Venezuela's new
envoy to Washington, paints and
plays bridge, writes poetry and is
a baseball fan.

First thing he asked when he
settled down in the swank modern-
istic Venezuelan embassy in Mas-
sachusetts Avenue was:

"When do we see those Senators
play?"

Part of His Excellency's interest
in the Senators is due to the fact
that the Venezuelan Alex Carras-
quel used to be a pitcher.

The ambassador has written a
number of books. His latest, a vol-

ume of verse, is due to come off the
presses in a couple of months.

Its title is "Para no Morir Del
Todo." A man at the embassy
translated this as meaning "For
Not to Die Completely."

The ambassador, a genial, flash-
ing-eyed, impeccably turned-out
gentleman in his middle forties,
comes from Caracas, near which
city he owns a large farm where
the cocoa bean is raised.

He studied law at Central Uni-
versity at Caracas, served as am-
bassador to Colombia and later, dur-
ing the war, as minister to Den-
mark.

His brother, Atilano Carnevali,
was ambassador to Great Britain
during the war. Later he became
ambassador to Colombia but re-
signed in 1945 during the revolution.

Another new envoy to Washing-
ton is Faiz Bey El-Khouiri, the Sy-
rian Minister. He was his country's
former minister to Moscow and
once taught law at Syrian Universi-
ty. His brother is U.N. Representa-
tive Paris Bey El-Khouiri.

Popular Dr. Costi K. Zurayk, the
retiring minister, is returning to his
seat as professor of Arabic history
at American University in Beirut.

While her young brother, Prince
Hamid Reza Pahlavi of Iran, is
capturing the headlines with his
run-away exploits from New York
to Paris to Washington, Princess
Fatimah Pahlavi is quietly living
with embassy officials here.

The Princess, 18, and beautifully
tall and dark-eyed, has been at-
tending exclusive Mount Vernon
Seminary for girls, where her class-
mates say she is a stellar sports-
woman. Especially adept at tennis,
she walked away with the school's
doubles championship last month.

While she has many friends in
the capital, the young sister of the
present King Mohammed Reza Pahlavi
of Iran, meticulously keeps
away from diplomatic social doings.
At school she is known simply as
"Miss Pahlavi."

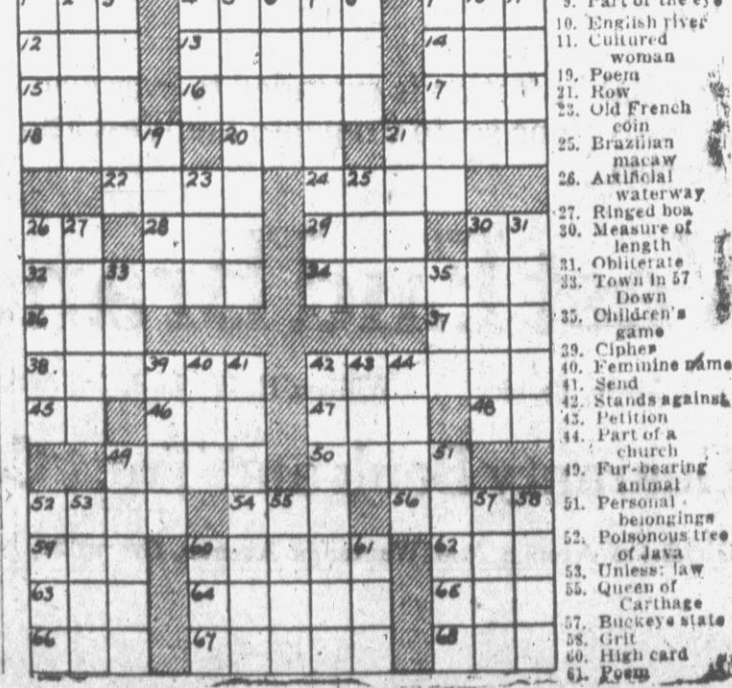

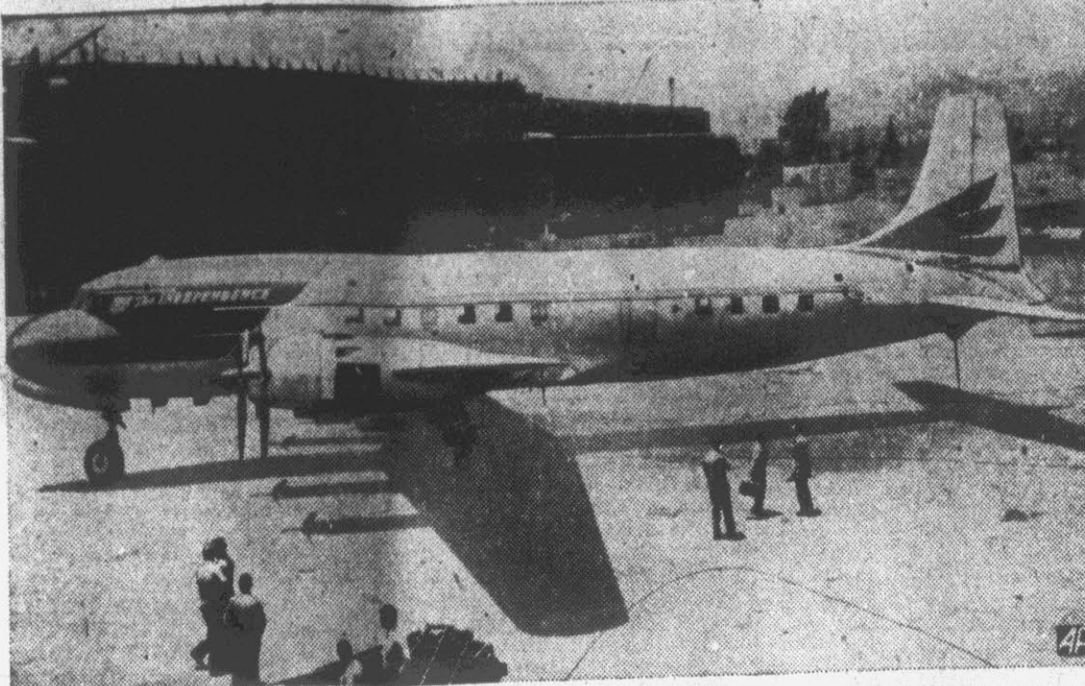
