POLICE KILL ATTACKER IN SUNDAY RAID

Fatally Wound "Neb" Vines, Negro, While Assaulting Farmville Officer Gregory

Melvin (Neb) Vines, 23-year-old Negro laborer of Farmville, was shot and instantly killed about 1 a.m. Sunday while resisting Policemen J. A. Gregory and Redding Fields, who were trying to arrest him in Farmville.

Farmville Police Chief L. T. Lucas said the two officers were cruising in the police car shortly after midnight in the Negro section. Patrolman J. A. Gregory, 50, went around the building to investigate a disturbance.

Patrolman Redding Fields heard a commotion and left the car to investigate. He found Melvin (Neb) Vines had Gregory on the floor of the porch and was beating him about the face with his fists. Gregory, who wears glasses, suffered serious injury when glass from his spectacles punctured an eye.

Chief Lucas quoted the officers as saying that when they found they were unable to arrest the Negro, and he continued his assault on both of them, they fired at the lower part of Vines' body. Several bullets penetrated Vines about the groin and he bled to death in a few minutes. The body was turned over to an undertaker. No charges were made against the policemen. Two witnesses told authorities the officers were justified.

Policeman Gregory was taken to Woodard-Herring Hospital in Wilson. He was reported today to be in a serious condition.

Pitt County Coroner Griffin H. Rouse and Sheriff Ruel W. Tyson and Deputy L. E. Manning arrived at the scene shortly after the attack and shooting. The coroner said he will hold an inquest in Farmville when Policeman Gregory is able to attend.

No Change For Sick Admiral

Washington, Aug. 18—(AP)—The Navy said today the condition of Fleet Admiral Ernest J. King did not change overnight but is "still considered serious." He was stricken ill last week.

A department announcement said: "Fleet Admiral King rested well during the night. His general condition remains unchanged. Still considered serious."

The former Chief of Naval Operations, who has hardening of the arteries and indications of a mild stroke without paralysis, entered the naval hospital Friday. A Navy official said King's condition is not critical.

Over Four Inches Of Rain In Goldsboro

Goldsboro, Aug. 18—(AP)—Rainfall totaling 4.11 inches fell in Goldsboro between 8:30 and 11:30 last night. A number of city streets were closed to traffic for several hours when storm sewers were unable to carry off the heavy rain and water rose higher than curbing. It was the heaviest rain in Goldsboro in many years.

More Vetoes By Russia In Offing

Admission Of New Members To United Nations Likely To Result In Another Veto-Barrage By Soviet Delegates

Lake Success, Aug. 18—(AP)—The Security Council today needed only a batch of Russian vetoes that are blocking the admission of new members to the United Nations.

Delegates were summoned this afternoon to consider 12 applications, but only Yemen and newly-created Pakistan appeared likely to be accepted into the 55-nation organization.

Russia has served notice that she will again blackball Ireland, Portugal and Trans-Jordan, Italy and Austria also faced a possible Soviet veto if they drew the necessary 7 votes for passage. The Russian veto to total in the U. N. is now 11.

The other five countries apparently lacked enough support to be taken in. Of these the western powers are opposing Soviet-sponsored Albania and Outer Mongolia, which were rejected in 1946, and there has been no outright backing for Hungary, Bulgaria and Romania. (Continued on Page Four)

Far East Economics

Indian Financiers Look For Greater Industrialization And Freedom From European Exploitation; Other Eastern Peoples Hoping For Same

For anyone who has talked with some of the leaders of the Far East as this reporter has done—there is little doubt that the brown and yellow peoples mean their present turmoil to end in freedom from their old white rulers.

For the British, the French and the Dutch such an outcome could mean very serious economic changes. Much of their economy was based on an exchange of raw materials of the east for the manufactured goods of the west.

Happily, many of the Far Easterners recognize this exchange of goods must not only continue but grow. This reporter has talked, for example, to one of the partners of India's House of Tata, a tremendous combine of commerce and finance.

He told me the Far Easterners are ambitious for a growing industrial life for India that could furnish jobs to millions who eke out a submarginal life on poor farm land.

They are naturally ambitious to sell consumer goods to their Far Eastern neighbors—the type of goods which has been supplied by European factories. That could mean disastrous loss of sales for the Europeans.

But this particular Indian financier pointed out that while Europe might lose some sales, the whole Far East is clamoring for the sort of heavy machinery which Europe knows how to make.

Atcheson's Death Said To Be Near Certainty

Air And Surface Search Continues For Ambassador And Missing Men Who Crashed En Route To Confer On Jap Treaty

Honolulu, Aug. 18—(AP)—Death of Ambassador George C. Atcheson, Jr., along with nine other persons in a plane crash at sea just west of Honolulu Saturday midnight was regarded as a virtual certainty today by military authorities, but air and surface search continued.

Atcheson chief U.S. political adviser in the Japanese occupation and chairman of the four-power council for Japan, was one of four still missing.

Five bodies were recovered yesterday, a sixth was seen to sink and three injured Army men were rescued.

The Hawaiian Sea Frontier, directing the search, reported there still was no trace of the missing men in the rough sea, and their chances of surviving 36 hours were so slender that almost no hope remained.

Surface vessels hunted all night, however, and planes resumed at dawn.

Three ranking officers from General MacArthur's strategic and operations staff also were among ten passengers and crewmen lost when the B-17, inbound from Tokyo, crashed into shark-infested waters after running out of gasoline only 65 miles west of Pearl Harbor.

Diplomatic sources in Washington said that despite Atcheson's vast knowledge of Japanese problems his apparent death probably would not delay arrangements for drawing up the peace treaty with Japan. Preparations for writing a preliminary draft already are well advanced, they said.

SPECULATE ON CABINET MEET

Hurried Session Of British Cabinet Remains Unexplained

London, Aug. 18—(AP)—The London press speculated widely today on the reason for an emergency cabinet meeting which was summoned yesterday by Prime Minister Attlee, but government sources declined to disclose the reason for the hurried session.

The consensus was that the meeting was concerned with urgent developments in Britain's economic crisis and probably with new proposals for revision of the terms of the U. S. loan.

A terse, uninformative announcement that the meeting had been held heightened rather than dispelled speculation as to why the government ministers had hurried back to London by plane, train and automobile only four days after the Parliament had adjourned for its summer recess.

Whatever the purpose, apparently decisions were reached, for some of the chief ministers in the cabinet resumed their interrupted vacations today.

Clark said a civil action is being filed in the U. S. district court at Los Angeles naming as defendant Technicolor Inc., Technicolor Motion Picture Corp., and Eastman Kodak Co.

Texas Women Rebel Against Longer Skirt Lengths; Earn Moral Support

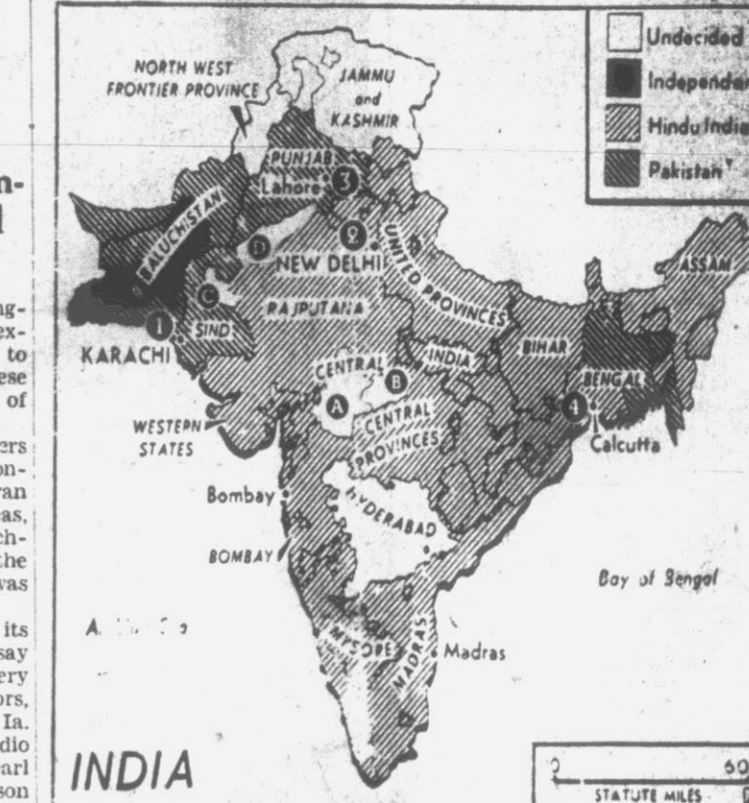
Dallas, Tex., Aug. 18—(AP)—At least 1,300 Texas women are so proud of their legs that they're ready to rebel against the long skirt fad.

LABOR LAW IN BIGGEST WEEK

Major Provisions To Become Effective Next Friday

Washington, Aug. 18—(AP)—America moved today into a memorable week in the history of labor-management relations—the week when the last and biggest chunk of the Taft-Hartley law goes into effect.

The big date is Friday, Aug. 22, sixty days after Congress enacted the law over President Truman's protests.

Unions, for the first time under federal law, will be subject to prosecution before the National Labor Relations Board for such practices as coercing employees, refusing to bargain, forcing an employer to pay for work not actually performed, and engaging in jurisdictional strikes and certain kinds of boycotts.

Some provisions of the act took effect June 23, but the full weight of the vast policy changes decreed by the Republican-controlled Congress will not be felt until Friday.

The NLRB, which has spent 12 years protecting the rights of workers who want to organize into unions, now will protect—in addition—the rights of workers who don't.

It also will protect the rights of employers.

On Friday the NLRB will split, in effect, into two separate agencies: (1) A five-man board, which becomes a labor court, and (2) the "office of the general counsel," headed by Robert N. Demham.

KING'S BROTHER DIES

Stockholm, Aug. 18—(AP)—Prince Eugen, 82, youngest of King Gustaf's three brothers, died yesterday after a lengthy illness.

A bachelor, Prince Eugen was a serious student of art and had held one-man exhibitions of his paintings in Stockholm, Paris, Brussels, Copenhagen and Helsinki.

Four-H Clubbers Arrive College

Raleigh, N. C., Aug. 18—(AP)—Four-H Club members began arriving at N. C. State College here today by the hundreds for their 15th annual 4-H Club week. A record attendance of more than 1,500 boys and girls are expected.

A whirlwind program of activities has been arranged for the farm youths, including addresses by Governor Cherry and Secretary of War Kenneth Royall.

Governor Cherry will speak tomorrow morning and Royall will speak at the closing session Friday night on "the food situation in Germany."

ISSUE OF NEW BRITISH LOAN IS DISCARDED

Subject Of New Credits Not On Agenda Of Anglo-American Conference

Washington, Aug. 18—(AP)—The issue of a new American loan went into the discard by agreement today as top rank financial experts from both sides of the Atlantic assembled to hunt a partial solution to Britain's dollar crisis.

Sir Filfrid Eady, head of the British Czegetion, said that so far as his country is concerned a new credit to supplement the almost-exhausted \$3,750,000,000 advance of 1946 is "not on the agenda."

That made it mutual. American officials have emphasized that they will talk about modifying the present loan agreement to relieve Britain's economic distress but will go no further.

And they said Secretary of the Treasury Snyder, chief United States negotiator, would enter the treasury's conference room ready to make these demands:

1. That the British account for the spending which has drained all but \$850,000,000 of the year-old drawing account, with its exhaustion foreseen this fall.

2. That England outline specific plans for balancing its budget, and speeding production and achieving a balance of trade that will contribute to world-wide economic stability.

Ultimately, the questions may probe into the soundness and security of the British program for nationalizing basic industries. Snyder is known to be primed with questions on why England's nationalized coal pits are below pre-war production standards and why coal exports are only one-eighth of pre-war.

Sir Wilfrid evidently was ready with some of the answers. At La Guardia Field, New York, last night the special assistant to chancellor of the exchequer Hugh Dalton told newsmen:

"We have been running through dollars faster than we expected when we negotiated the loan and we have come to discuss how it happened."

Doctors Report Sen. Bilbo Is Much Better

New Orleans, Aug. 18—(AP)—Hospital authorities said this morning that Senator Theo. G. Bilbo's condition was "decidedly improved" and that after a restful night he is able to sit up in bed today.

Doctors said Bilbo is now strong enough to take a plaintive view of the fact his cigar smoking is restricted to certain hours.

A patient at the hospital since August 7, the 69-year-old unseated Senator was reported to have developed pulmonary embolism, or a blood clot on the lungs. His physicians, said however, the diagnosis was not final and that tests were continuing.

Mississippi's Senior Senator has undergone three operations here during the past year for cancer of the mouth and throat.

Doctors reported Friday he had an unexplained fever, probably the result of a Virus infection. The physicians said he was suffering from "Periheral Neuritis, with acute infection and partial paralysis."

New Executive Study

Office Of The Presidency To Be Streamlined; New Commission, Headed By Herbert Hoover, To Attempt Simplifying Of Nation's Executive Branch

Washington, Aug. 18—(AP)—If each high official directly responsible to the president had a 30-minute talk with him, Harry Truman would be tied up for three months.

By contrast, General Eisenhower, commanding the German invasion, took reports only from the three men who headed the invasion armies. The orders went down through ranks.

Members of Congress, pondering the two systems, decided maybe the general had something there. Recently streamlined itself, Congress then laid \$750,000 on the line for a new commission to give President Truman's branch of government—the executive—that 1949 silhouette.

The commission will report to Congress in January, 1949. It will be headed by the one man in the nation best fitted to understand President Truman's visitor problem.

He is Herbert Hoover, the only living ex-president.

Accepting the job reluctantly, the 73-year-old Hoover announced: "I do so with the distinct understanding that this is the last public service I will render my nation."

Congressmen are not so concerned with Mr. Truman's possible callers as they are with the flock of organizations which they represent. Under "executive" in the newest issue of the congressional directory are listed, by rough count: The 10 cabinet departments plus 23 commissions, 11 boards, seven of-

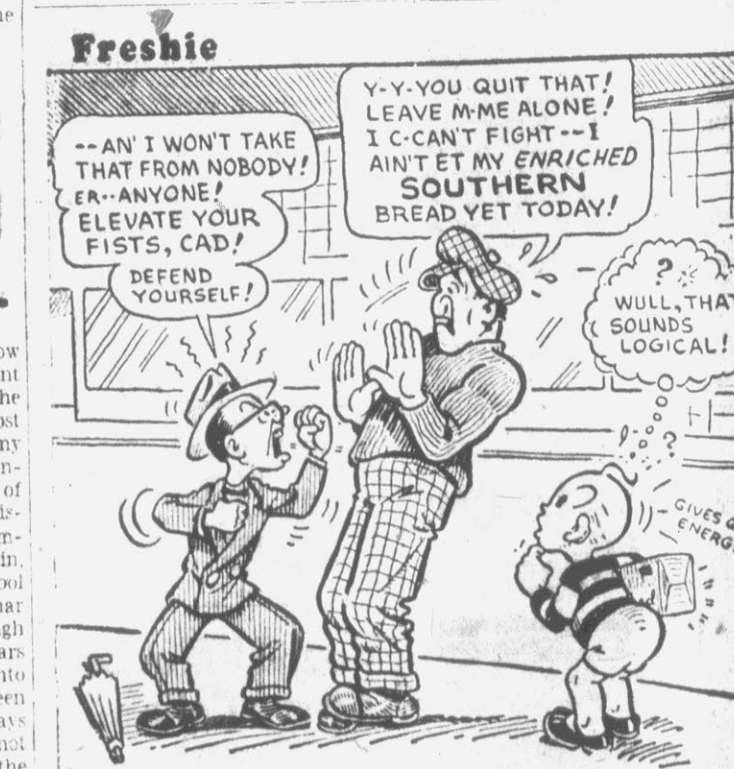

Retired Farmer Drops Dead On Willoughby Farm

Granville Madison Johnson, 81, retired farmer who lives at the home of his daughter, Mrs. A. B. Hill, on the Willoughby farm, owned by Blount-Harvey Company, about 21-2 miles from Greenville, died of a heart attack there early today. BUT THEY DON'T TICK ALIKE

Four clocks and several watches keep our household informed about the time of day. There is the electric clock on the desk, which hums day after day. There is the little clock on the book shelf, which has a saucy little tick. The cuckoo with a great deal of bluster announces the hour and the half-hour, while in the living room our clock, which has a history of more than a hundred years, and is ponderous in its movements, strikes the hour and the half-hour with solemn regularity. Sometimes the great town clock some distance away, begins to strike before the others are finished.

They are all set to an accurate radio signal once or twice a week and generally they tell the same story about the time of day to within a few seconds of one another. But they do not tick alike. Each time-piece has its own personality.

And so it is in life. No matter how much a family or a social or industrial or academic group may agree on certain basic fundamentals, the fact remains that the individual members all have different personalities. They have a common allegiance to a certain ideal but each retains his or her personality, looking at the idea from an angle slightly different from that of his fellows and giving it a slightly different expression. They all strike together but they all tick differently.

WASHINGTON LETTER

By JANE EADS

Washington—The Department of State has published a complete record of America's foreign policy each year since 1861, except one year.

It missed 1869. Wilder Spaulding, chief of the Division of Publications, says no one seems to know why. The foreign relations volumes include every stick of diplomatic correspondence that passes between this and other nations. It includes also the department's instructions to our embassies and consulates abroad, and their replies.

The department attempts to keep up to date with its accounting of our foreign policy, but naturally the books can't be written while the policy is being made. Right now there's a lag of about 15 years. The book which was published in 1946 concerns the happenings of 1931. The one for 1932 should be coming out any day now, says Spaulding.

Though the books are simply a reprinting of the correspondence as found in the files of the State Department, there is a lot of work attached to their publication, and Spaulding's staff is small.

An entire volume was published on World War I with a great number of supplements and it took 12 volumes to record the Paris peace conference of 1919. All of these are out except one.

The most serious hold-ups result from objections from other governments.

"When we are about to publish the diplomatic notes in our volumes we always ask if they care. It's sort of international courtesy—the nice thing to do, you know," explains Spaulding.

He says that when a government objects his division attempts to tell the story by printing our own embassy's report to the White House on what took place.

The books range around \$2.50 to \$3 a copy and are used principally in libraries. Spaulding says they're not popular. He feels, however, that the United States is "way ahead of other governments in telling its story accurately, comprehensively and authentically. The British only began publishing such books in 1919.

In addition to the foreign relations books, the division puts out about 2,000 pages of miscellaneous literature a month. It publishes a monthly diplomatic list which is sold to the general public for 20 cents a copy or \$2 a year.

It also gets its accounting of State weekly, a basic informational periodical; conference reports from a 10-page report of the secretary of state to a 1,400-page volume, and a large number of documentary pamphlets.

After the trial Judge W. L. Angell of the Recorder's Court ordered the owner to go to the Cleveland County Auditor's office and list the dogs for taxation. But it was discovered they were not six months old on Jan. 1 and couldn't be listed under North Carolina laws.

The defendants pleaded guilty to forcible trespass and were fined court costs.

Overpopulation In Britain Cited By Australian

Washington, Aug. 18—(AP)—Arthur A. Calwell, Australian minister of immigration, expressed belief today that Great Britain can only "sustain a future population of 30,000,000 to 35,000,000."

He made that statement at a news conference in comment on a plea Winston Churchill made over the British radio Saturday for the British people to "stay at home and fight it out."

Calwell has been in Great Britain to arrange for the transfer of Britons who wish to live in Australia. He said some 400,000 want to make the change, and Australia intends to move some 15,000 this year, jumping the annual reception of Britons thereafter as fast as they can get ships.

"Churchill seems to think Great Britain can support her 47,000,000 people," Calwell said. "Even at the peak of her naval power she only took care of 30,000,000 to 35,000,000. There is overpopulation in Great Britain, and unless population in the dominions."

Judge Grady during his tenure on the Superior Court bench has presided over some of the State's most important cases. He had a good word to say about Greenville and its progress since he last presided here, and added that he always enjoyed his visits here.

Indonesian Army Enters City And Is Driven Out

Batavia, Aug. 18—(AP)—Netherlands Army headquarters announced today that Indonesian Republican forces had broken into Pamekasan, capital of the island of Madura, yesterday and had been driven out only after sharp street fighting.

The action coincided with the second anniversary of the republic's proclamation of independence—an event which the Dutch said was marked by new flare-ups of fighting in both Java and Sumatra. Pamekasan, situated off the eastern tip of Java, is included in the area claimed by the republic. Dutch troops landed on the island and occupied Pamekasan during the hostilities which began July 20 and which the United Nations Security Council ordered halted approximately two weeks ago.

Will Consider Building Needs

Raleigh, N. C., Aug. 18—(AP)—The Advisory Budget Commission met here today to receive a request from the State Hospitals Board of Control permission to undertake immediately a building program at state mental institutions.

The board is seeking release of funds for two dormitories to cost \$200,000 each at the Goldsboro hospital, and approximately \$250,000 worth of construction at the Caswell Training School at Kinston.

No Trousseau For Princess

London, Aug. 18—(AP)—Princess Elizabeth will do without a trousseau when she marries Lt. Philip Mountbatten Nov. 29 in Westminster Abbey, Buckingham Palace announced today.

This austerity note to Britain's wedding of the century was made public along with the announcement that the princess had chosen one of Norman Hartnell's designs for her wedding dress.

Tobacco Sales Are Off By Half

Raleigh, N. C., Aug. 18—(AP)—The 17 markets of the flue-cured border tobacco belt have sold less than half as much tobacco in the first seven days of sales this year as in the same period last year, the Federal and State Departments of Agriculture report.

Sales through Friday this year totals 23,340,790 pounds. Last year's total for the first seven days was 49,522,507 pounds. This year's average of \$46.90 per 100 pounds; last year's was \$55.55.

A late harvest and strict adherence to a sales limitation of 1,600 pounds per day per set of buyers account for this year's small volume. The tobacco being marketed is also of a lower grade than last year.

Sales resumed today after a week-end holiday.

Caldwell Board Consider Order

Lenior, N. C., Aug. 18—(AP)—The Caldwell County Board of Education will consider tonight a directive ordering the teaching certificate of Hudson school principal R. L. Fritz revoked.

The directive came from the State Board of Education. The Board's action followed a hearing some time ago at which Fritz method of handling teacher salary checks was considered.

The State Board also directed that \$1,642.19 used in connection with the operation of the Hudson school, be refunded. One county board member said that, since Fritz already has paid the state this amount, the county board probably will take no action on this matter.

Report Paraguayan Insurgents Fleeing

Asuncion, Paraguay, Aug. 18—(AP)—The government said in a communique today that loyalist troops were "advancing in all sectors in tenacious pursuit of the rebels who are fleeing in complete disorder."

The bulletin said villages around the capital had been mopped up of insurgents who threatened Asuncion last week.

Housewives Rush Low-Priced Food

Windsor, Ontario, Canada, Aug. 18—Grocers in this Canadian border city predicted today that American housewives are going to rush themselves right out of a good thing.

Detroiters have been invading the city of Windsor in Canada by the thousands in recent weeks, attracted by the food bargains they can get under Canadian price controls.

Meat cuts costing from 55 cents to 70 cents a pound in Detroit have been selling from 35 to 60 cents a pound here. Eggs bought here at 45 cents a dozen cost 70 cents in Detroit.

But in the past weekend the bargain hunting crowds from the other side of the Detroit river found signs that eggs were up to 60 cents a dozen. Hamburger that has been 35 cents has disappeared and its place was ground roundstead—for 45 cents a pound.

Last Midweek Half-Solidary

The last midweek half-holiday here for the summer will be next Wednesday. The early closing on Wednesdays is sponsored by the Merchants Association. The half-holiday is observed in other cities and towns in Eastern Carolina.

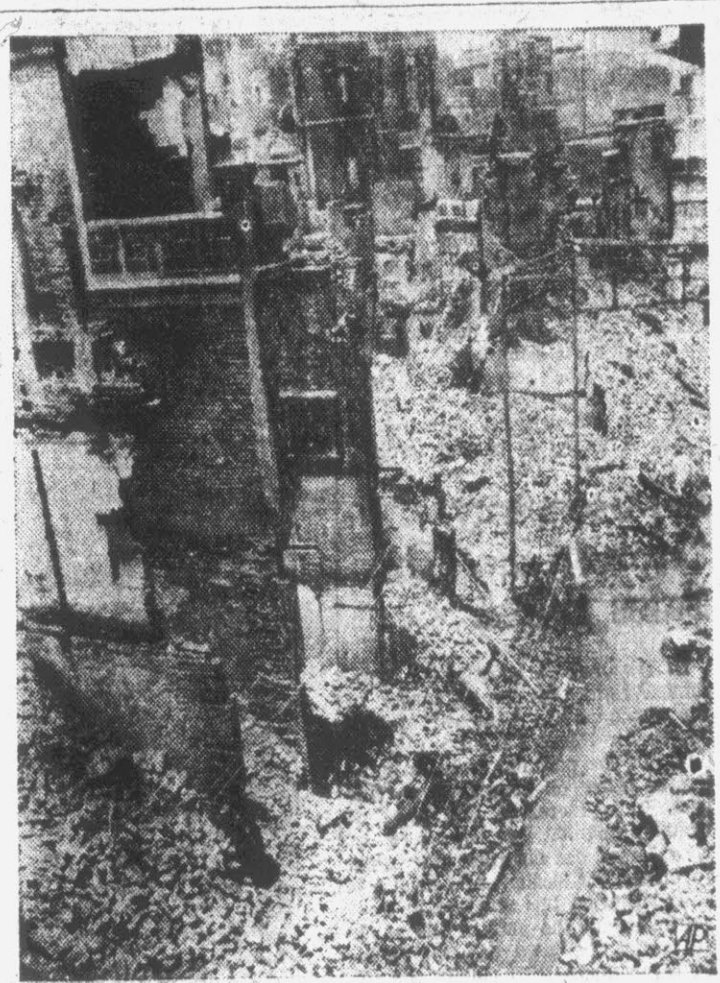

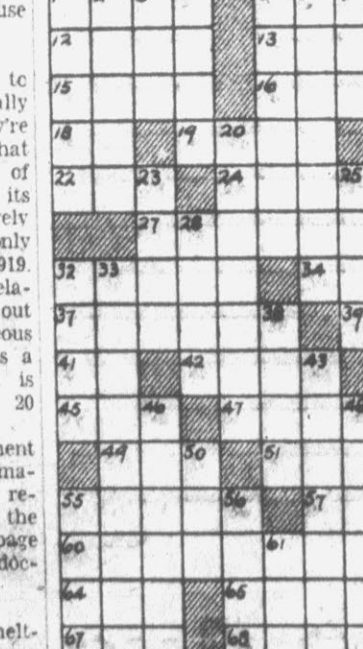

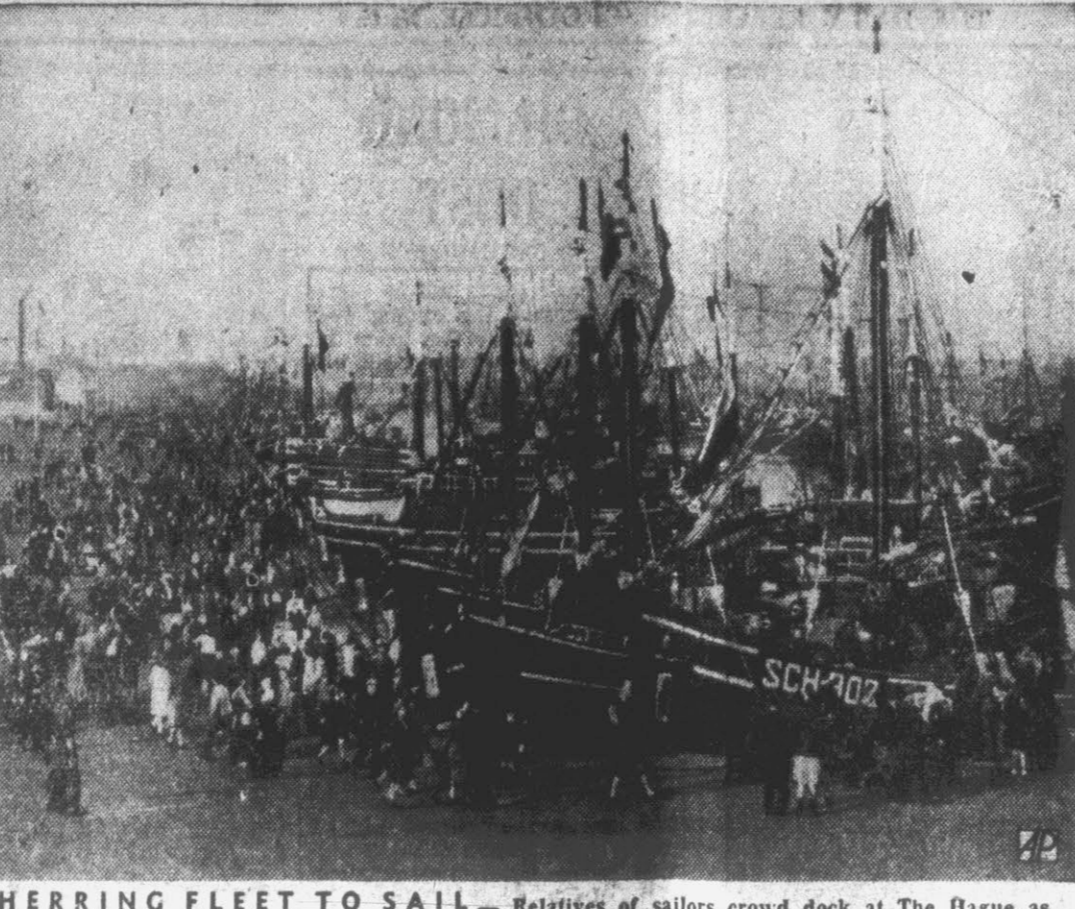
