

Union Heads Must Deny Communism

Denham Rules All CIO, AFL Locals To Be Barred From NLRB Services Unless Top Union Executives File Non-Communist Affidavits

Washington, Aug. 19—(AP)—CIO local unions were told today that National Labor Relations Board services will be barred to them unless every member of the 51-man CIO executive board swears he is not a communist.

Similarly, no AFL union can petition for a collective bargaining election or bring unfair labor practices charge against an employer unless each of the 15 members of the federation's executive council files a non-communist affidavit.

Robert N. Denham, NLRB General Counsel, handed down this decision as he issued the affidavit forms required under terms of the Taft-Hartley Labor law which goes into full effect Friday.

The forms, Denham told reporters, must be signed "by all AFL and CIO international and local officers." If those organizations want to use the board and its facilities.

"The chain must be complete, from the top down," the NLRB general counsel declared.

In the case of the CIO, one member of the executive board is a self-avowed communist. He is Ben Gold, of New York, President of the United Fur and Leather Workers Union.

As for the AFL, there have been reports that John L. Lewis, although vigorous anti-communist, might withhold his affidavit as a matter of principle. As President of the United Mine Workers and an AFL vice president, Lewis is a link in the AFL chain.

Although several of the larger CIO unions have indicated they plan to snub the reorganized NLRB, many of the others have reached no policy decision on this issue or on the Taft-Hartley act itself.

The fact that some unions may elect not to qualify as collective bargaining agents will, however, prevent employers from filing unfair labor practices charges against them.

Nor will it bar individual workers from asking the NLRB to review what they consider unfair labor practices on the part of employers.

Denham estimated that about 500,000 union officials—representing some 50,000 local, national and international labor organizations—will be directly affected by the requirement for a non-communist affidavit.

Ships Surrender

Asuncion, Paraguay, Aug. 19—(AP)—The government announced today that a fleet of rebel ships which brought insurgents down the Paraguay River for their assault on this capital had surrendered unconditionally.

The announcement made no mention of two gunboats, the Paraguay and the Humaita, with which the rebels have harassed government forces along the Parana River in the south. It was announced recently that the Paraguay had been interned by Argentina at the request of the rebels themselves.

The captured ships, the government said, included the *Itapúa*, the *Toro*, the *Pollux* and the *Col. Martinez*, and several barges.

Higher Prices On Border Belt

Raleigh, N.C., Aug. 19—(AP)—Things were looking up on the border belt tobacco markets today after higher prices were reported for the first time since opening day.

Increase of up to \$5.00 per hundred pounds were registered on the 17 markets yesterday, the Federal and State Departments of Agriculture reported.

Selling time was increased from four to five hours yesterday for the first time this season, but in some markets not enough tobacco was on the floors to keep sales going for five hours.

Common green leaf led the advance with an increase of \$5 per 100 at \$20.50. Fair orange primings were also up \$5 at \$34 per 100.

Steel Price Charges

No Immediate Results From FTC Complaint; Industry Can Take Case To Courts And If Defeated There, It May Be Over A Year Before Results Are Seen

Washington, Aug. 19—(AP)—The price policies of the vast steel industry were attacked by the Federal Trade Commission this week. It is perhaps the biggest case in the 32-year history of the commission.

But don't expect it to result in much price reduction—at least not this year or next.

The complaint issued by the commission—that steel companies are in an unlawful "conspiracy" to fix prices and destroy competition in the sale of steel—is only the first step in what probably will be a long, slow, expensive legal fight.

Even if it leads to an outright order by the commission to stop the alleged practices, the industry still can take the case to the courts. And even if the Supreme Court should uphold the commission, perhaps years from now, the exact effect on steel prices in various localities is impossible to predict.

This doesn't mean that the commission's action is insignificant or that it may not have eventual consequences of high importance to American business.

The Federal Trade Commission has been studying the steel price system for at least 15 years.

Back in 1924 the commission ordered the U.S. Steel to change its "delivered price" system—that is, its method of computing freight charges which are added to the price of steel. The company did

HITLER'S OWN DOCTOR FOUND GUILTY CRIMES

Convict Dr. Karl Brandt Of Responsibility For Cruel Medical Experiments

Nuremberg, Aug. 19—(AP)—An American war crimes tribunal today convicted Dr. Karl Brandt, Adolf Hitler's personal physician, of "full responsibility" in the performance of Nazi medical experiments on concentration camp victims.

The four-man court, headed by Judge Walter Boals of the Washington State Supreme Court found the 43-year-old S.S. (Elite Guard) general guilty of crimes against humanity as charged by the prosecution, which had charged him of killing hundreds of thousands of human guinea pigs in "worthless" experiments.

Brandt was one of 23 co-defendants who made up the S.S. Medical Corps. His fate and that of his fellow defendants was contained in a 300-page judgment.

Brandt was the first convict to be announced. At the rate at which the court was proceeding with the judgment it appeared likely that the detailed account of its findings would not be completed until tomorrow afternoon.

Sentences will be passed Thursday. Brig. Gen. Telford Taylor, U.S. prosecutor, had asked death for the defendants.

The court found that Brandt was directly responsible for high altitude and freezing experiments, as well as malaria, mustard gas, seawater and sterilization tests from which many victims died.

Brandt stared coldly at his four judges as he heard himself and his fellow defendants denounced in scathing terms in the judgment. The room where the proceedings were held was the one where Hermann Goering, Joachim von Ribbentrop and other top Nazis were condemned to death by the international military tribunal.

Also convicted with Brandt were Siegfried Handloser, medical officer of the German Army, and Ulfar Schroeder, chief of the Luftwaffe's medical service, both of whom were charged with war crimes and crimes against humanity.

Marshall And Argentine Minister Have Exchange Of Views

Quintanilha, Brazil, Aug. 19—(AP)—Secretary of State Marshall and Argentina's foreign minister, Juan A. Bramuglia, discussed all main points of the inter-American defense treaty at a half-hour private conference today.

"We discuss all main points of the treaty and exchanged views," Gen. Marshall said as they emerged.

Marshall will deliver a major policy address tomorrow to the inter-American conference of foreign ministers, in it he is expected to spell out U. S. views on questions facing delegates summoned to draft a hemisphere defense treaty.

The biggest question involved thus far is Suba's demand for a clause to bar economic aggression as well as military attacks.

Marshall's speech is scheduled to follow the arrival of Senora Eva Duarte Peron, wife of Argentina's president. The Argentine delegation will tender her a gala celebration.

Marshall took advantage of a conference hall today to confer with foreign minister Juan A. Bramuglia of Argentina. He held a similar conference yesterday with foreign Minister Jaime Torres Bodet of Mexico.

Marshall's speech tomorrow is expected to give the official U. S. reaction to the formal demand submitted by Cuba yesterday for a treaty clause against economic aggression.

Harriman Does About-Face On Soviet Attitude

Seattle, Aug. 19—(AP)—Soviet Russia had grim warning today from one of its former staunch friends, Commerce Secretary W. Averell Harriman, that the democracies of the world still hold the trump card of atomic retaliation against aggression.

In an important policy speech cleared in advance by the State Department in Washington, the cabinet officer declared last night that "Soviet Imperialism" is a menace to the world peace.

Then with grave and pointed emphasis he said:

"In this atomic age there is no protection against retaliation by air. Our ability to launch an immediate strong aerial retaliation is the greatest possible deterrent against the use of military force by others."

Harriman's publicly announced stand is a direct about face from his attitude at the time he was ambassador to Russia. Then he cooperated with the Soviet Union would bring a long period of peaceful readjustment after the war-torn years.

Two Navy Pilots Die In Accidents

Norfolk, Va., Aug. 19—(AP)—Two Navy pilots here lost their lives in crashes Monday, according to official reports.

Lt. (jg) E. L. Lindgren, USN, 24, whose wife and child are making their home at Virginia Beach, was killed when the Corsair plane he was piloting was in collision with another fighter near Gatesville, N.C.

Lt. David C. Steele, Jr., of Dallas, Texas, was killed when a two-engine fighter plane he was piloting from the West Coast to Norfolk crashed at Biggs Field, Tex., as he was taking off.

Bomb Hoax

London, Aug. 19—(AP)—A police guard discovered a bomb today under a Foreign Office doorway in Downing Street, directly opposite from the residence of Prime Minister Attlee.

Announcing the find, a Scotland Yard spokesman said the bomb could not have exploded, since it did not contain a detonator.

Examination by Home Office experts, he said, indicated the bomb had been placed under the arch leading from Downing Street to the Foreign Office quadrangle as a hoax.

The archway is within 25 yards of the entrance to the Colonial Office, where an unexploded bomb was found several months ago.

Congressional Inquiry Into Housing Is Started

Why Homes Are Scarce And What Can Be Done About High Costs Are Before Congressmen; Chairmanship Scrap

Washington, Aug. 19—(AP)—A group of Congress members trudged back to the capitol today to start the ball rolling on a \$100,000 housing investigation—and settle a who's-to-be boss squabble.

The choice of a chairman is a hot issue to be cleared away before the Senate-House committee gets down to its assignment of finding out why homes are scarce, why they cost so much and what can be done about it.

The tussle over the chairmanship, according to a committee member, is between veteran Senator Tobey (R-NH) and Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.), a freshman in Congress.

McCarthy and Tobey tangled frequently during the last session of Congress. One issue on which they differed sharply was the Taft-Hartley-Wagner bill to set up a long range housing program.

Tobey voted for the bill in committee and McCarthy against it. A 7 to 6 vote sent the measure to the Senate floor, but it never came up for debate—mainly because Republican leaders did not want to risk a drawn out controversy that might have stilled adjournment plans. The bill is designed to encourage construction of 15,000,000 new homes over a 10-year period.

NEW TYPE OF CRIME

Arsenal Blast Destroys Large Part Spanish City

Cadiz, Spain, Aug. 19—(AP)—Newspapers estimated today that possibly more than 100 persons were killed and several thousand were injured in the explosion last night of a naval torpedo and ocean mine factory and warehouse on the Cadiz peninsula.

First estimates of damage were placed at \$10,000,000.

The nearby residential district was wrecked.

Resulting fires destroyed the Echevarrieta and Larrinaga shipyards.

Buildings were damaged and windows shattered throughout this ancient port city of 80,000, which was left without water, electricity and railroad or highway communications.

So complete was the ruin of the naval arsenal, situated about two miles from central Cadiz, that no clue was left to the cause of the disaster.

The force of the explosion cracked buildings in the heart of Cadiz. Street cars were derailed. The huge doors of the Cadiz cathedral were torn from their hinges.

The explosion came at 10 p.m. last night.

The heaviest casualties and damage were believed in the summer colony and residential district of San Severiano, which is near the submarine naval base in the neck of the narrow peninsula.

Spanish authorities announced no estimate of the casualties. Reporters said most of the injured they saw had been cut by flying glass or were bruised by falling debris.

The Jerre de la Frontera radio station, 15 miles to the north, broadcast appeals throughout the night for doctors, nurses and medicines.

Hospital Construction In N.C. Gets 'Go Ahead'

Raleigh, N.C., Aug. 19—(AP)—The State's Medical Care Commission today had received the "go ahead" signal for a multi-million program of hospital construction in North Carolina.

The Advisory Budget Commission met today yesterday authorized release of an \$8,250,000 appropriation made by the 1947 legislature for the hospital building program provided "documentary evidence" is presented that federal funds have been authorized.

The hospitals are to be built with federal, state and local funds, and Dr. John A. Ferrell, Secretary of State's Medical Care Commission said that an act passed by Congress provides for allotments to states up to a total of \$75,000,000 for the construction of hospitals and health centers. North Carolina's share of this fund for the fiscal year is \$3,431,550, he said.

The budget commission also approved purchase by the state of the entire waterfront area at Camp Butler—\$10,916,158 worth of buildings—for \$1,500,000; and approved expenditure from the state's permanent improvement fund of \$1,749,850 for buildings and repairs at four state mental institutions.

In announcing approval of an offer from the War Assets Administration for the sale of the Camp Butler cantonment area, Governor Cherry said that WAA had turned over to the state the general hospital area at Butler without cost. The State Hospitals Board of Control recently opened a state mental institution in the general hospital.

Funds approved for the mental hospitals include: \$1,096,103 for the Goldstone Hospital; \$251,000 for Morganton; \$99,000 for Raleigh and \$303,750 for Caswell Training School at Kinston.

TIRE INDUSTRY COMES UNDER PRICE INQUIRY

Big Rubber Firms Deny Price Fixing; Point To Comparatively Low Prices

New York, Aug. 19—(AP)—Federal charges that makers of 90 per cent of the nation's tires have conspired for 12 years to fix prices will be fought "to the limit," said E. J. Thomas, president of Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co.

The criminal complaint naming 19 defendants was filed late yesterday in federal district court for the southern district of New York. It quickly brought denials from the tire makers, who said that tire prices now are at or below pre-war levels.

The action, Thomas said, "seems utterly preposterous."

William O'Neil, president of General Tire & Rubber Co., said that tires are selling 24 per cent below pre-war levels and the suit "just doesn't make sense."

"On the basis of present living costs as compared with 1941 the price of tires is down almost 54 per cent," O'Neil said.

Herbert E. Smith, president of the U.S. Rubber Co., said three of the four firms which account for 85 per cent of his firm's business sell below pre-war levels.

A statement from Firestone Tire & Rubber Co. said that although living costs were up 51.4 per cent since 1941, its first quality tires were 24 per cent cheaper.

"This," Firestone said, "is, defeating the forces of inflation and is a notable example of competitive free enterprise in action."

J. L. Cochran, vice president in charge of sales for the Seiberling Rubber Co., said that "we strongly believe there is no justification for the charge."

The criminal action against the tire makers followed by a few hours the filing of a civil anti-trust action in federal district court in Los Angeles which William C. Dickson, chief of the West Coast Antitrust Division, said was to "make possible an early and substantial increase in color motion pictures for the public."

Tropical Storm Developing In Gulf Of Mexico

Miami, Fla., Aug. 19—(AP)—The Weather Bureau reported a tropical storm was developing in the Gulf of Mexico about 150 miles west-southwest of Key West and was moving slowly westward about eight miles an hour and increasing in intensity.

The Weather Bureau said strong winds at 10:30 a.m. between 40 and 50 miles per hour within 50 miles of the center and strong squalls extend more than 200 miles to the east and north.

Caution was advised all interests in the southeastern Gulf of Mexico area and small craft were warned to remain in port south of Miami around to Sarasota.

The storm is located about 150 miles west southwest of Key West, the Weather Bureau said.

Is Impressed By Hughes Plane

Long Beach, Calif., Aug. 19—(AP)—At least one member of the Senate War Investigating Committee, Sen. J. William Fulbright (D-Miss.), was generally impressed by the Hughes flying boat.

Portsmouth earlier in the summer lodged a vigorous protest before the Virginia State Corporation Commission over the proposed train removal. That body has taken no action on the railroad's proposal.

Orders Inquiry

Honolulu, Aug. 19—(AP)—The Pacific plane crash which left five known dead and five presumed dead, including Ambassador George Acheson, Jr., was described by airmen today as a tragic accident caused by a combination of human error and mechanical failure.

When, if anyone, is to blame will be officially decided in an immediate investigation ordered by Gen. Carl Spaatz, Army Air Forces commander.

Indonesians Heard By United Nations

Lift Embargo

Washington, Aug. 19—(AP)—The office of defense transportation today lifted the partial embargo on U. S. coal shipments to Canada.

The embargo was invoked last Wednesday midnight against shipments via the Canadian National Railways, government-owned principal rail line in the dominion. It was resigned to speed the return to this country of badly needed U. S. freight cars held in Canada.

Figures released by ODT at the time indicated Canadian National had been tardy on making returns. The embargo did not affect shipments via the privately owned Canadian Pacific Railway, Canada's second largest lines.

ODT officials in announcing the immediate lifting of the embargo today expressed belief the purpose has been served, in that the bulk of U. S. cars has been greatly speeded up.

Charge Dutch With Seeking Destruction Of 'Republic'; Gromyko Attacks U. S. Mediation Effort; Herschel Johnson Replies

Lake Success, Aug. 19—(AP)—The Indonesian government charged today that the Dutch were determined to destroy the war-born East Indies Republic.

Taking the floor in the Security Council after the Soviet Union accused the United States of making a "dangerous" and disrespectful attempt to by-pass the United Nations, former Premier Sutan Sjahrir declared:

"It is clear to us that Dutch military actions are aimed at the destruction of the republic. Subsequent Dutch professions of a desire to negotiate with us are neither understandable nor convincing. Everything points to one conclusion and one conclusion only, namely, that the Dutch are fully determined to put an end to the Indonesian Republic."

Sjahrir said his country had no faith in the honesty of the Dutch government and again appealed to the United Nations for investigation and arbitration.

In Jogjakarta, a commander in chief of the Indonesian Republic forces meanwhile broadcast an order to his troops to prepare for prolonged warfare. The announcement came from Batavia after the Dutch reported there that "drastic retaliatory measures" had been taken against the Indonesian forces.

Russia said here that the only solution would be for the council to set up a commission to investigate and arbitrate the conflict.

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko stated the Russian position for the first time in an emergency council meeting summoned at his specific request.

He charged that the United States was attempting to "force its good offices" on Indonesia and was "showing disregard of the Indonesian people's lack of respect for the Security Council."

U.S. Deputy Delegate Herschel V. Johnson denied that the American government was exerting any pressure on the Indonesians. "The Indonesian government has only to say our offer is not acceptable and that will end the matter," Johnson said.

He contended that Russia has "attributed all sorts of motives to the United States which we never thought of."

The United States then supported a Chinese move that the council accept a Dutch plan for a single "impartial state" to investigate conditions in Indonesia and supervise results of cease-fire orders. The first step would be an on-the-spot report by "career consuls" stationed in Batavia.

GIVE EXTENT OF U. S. SALES

British Upped Purchases; Other Nations Falling Off

Washington, Aug. 19—(AP)—Britain, now engaged in "dollar crisis" discussions here, increased her buying from the United States by five per cent to a total of nearly \$100,000,000 in June.

This was disclosed by the census bureau today as Anglo-American conferences continued on the question of easing terms of the \$3,750,000,000 loan agreement made last year. It was reported England likely would get revisions permitting her to increase purchases from the British dominions at the expense of trade with the U. S.

American officials said privately this would not cure England's distress but, by cutting down her outlay of dollars, might give a measure of relief without going to Congress for revision of England's obligations under the loan agreement.

The census bureau report on American exports in June showed that almost every European country except England reduced its buying from the United States to levels markedly lower than in May.

This contributed a 13 per cent decline in U. S. shipments overseas, the first sizeable break in this country's rising postwar trend of exports. Exports totaled \$1,241,700,000.

England increased her purchases by \$5,300,000 in the month to a total of \$99,800,000. This still was well below the peak volume of British purchases, \$117,400,000 in March.

In Very Deep Waters

The United Nations, A Stunted Two-Year-Old, May Find Its Future Hanging In Balance In Next Few Weeks; Faith And Support Of Organization Needed

The United Nations is a stunted two-year-old struggling in very deep waters.

The Security Council is grappling with the unprecedented problems of Greece and Indonesia.

Greece remains a hard knot of Russo-American contention, and untangling that knot probably would be simple if it were not pulled so tight by the antagonism between the two most powerful nations in the world.

Indonesia is different in two ways. Here the most immediate U. N. difficulty is simply the will of The Netherlands, which thus far has refused to recognize Security Council's authority to examine what the Dutch consider an internal Dutch affair. At stake is the question of whether peace is more important.

However, behind the Indonesian question is a smouldering discontent in more than half of all human hearts. Regardless of what the U. N. can do about Indonesia, it will merely be starting to tackle a key question of this country—how to extend freedom and a better life to half a world which will find them new and strange.

Upon either or both of these cases—Greece and Indonesia—the United Nations could stand or fall. A few weeks from now it may be clear whether the organization will work or whether the world will junk it and intensify the existing power struggle with an arms race.

How this comes out will be determined in the last analysis by the faith of people of everywhere in the United Nations. People are behind the governments who are supposed to be behind the U. N.

That's an old point, but the U. N.'s legal director, Abraham H. Feller, made it again last week in an address at Palo Alto, Calif.

"Americans," he said, "know the unquestioning obedience which the decisions of the U. S. supreme court command, though it can muster no more than one marshal to enforce them."

"I doubt if they would stand one whit better if Congress voted the chief justice an armored division and a fleet of superfortresses. The idea of the United Nations must stay strong and grow stronger. In the last analysis this strength will come not from money, or armies, or government, but from the people."

"If the United Nations receives these things which it needs, it will meet the test, and the bold determination of the preamble of the charter will come to pass—'to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war, which twice in our lifetime has brought untold sorrow to mankind.'"

In other words, if men want the United Nations to work, they can get it. If not, they will have to face the consequences.

Rotarians Told of Burden Entailed In Accepting 'Marshall Plan' Theory

By WYATT BROWN

The prospect of the United States, which has seven and one-half per cent of the world's population, accepting the role of uplifter to 92 1-2 per cent of the world's population, it is time that everyone study the problem and try to get some light, declared Rev. Roscoe Hauser, rector of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, in his address to the Greenville Rotary Club on the Marshall Plan. Rev. Hauser disclaimed knowing all the implications of the Marshall Plan either as to operation or results; he indicated he would just state a few questions and cite a few facts about the problem as he knows

it from some years in the Orient and India. At the outset Rev. Hauser posed the question of whether more had been undertaken than the United States could do in proposing the feeding of the needy nations and rehabilitating them financially. He stated that undertaking the load would be a terrific load and that it would mean the lowering of the standard of living here, inevitably to raise the standard in the rest of the world.

The speaker admitted the obligation of the United States to support the British economy but had some reservations as to what type of

government in Britain would be acceptable to receive the funds.

Citing statistics to reveal the increasing population of India in the face of India's already being unable to feed its people without imported food, Rev. Hauser stated that to help India we face an insoluble problem. With a few staggering statistics he indicated an even worse situation in China where 80 per cent of the people support themselves with agricultural pursuits and yet have to import rice and with an increasing national budget and fantastic inflation to further complicate matters.

After having expended five billion dollars in world relief, Congress has appointed a committee to study how much the United States can afford to spend to help other nations. Rev. Hauser said such an act was like closing the door after the horse is out.

Mr. Hauser predicted that there would be a rebirth of isolationism and reactionism in the United States in the face of the proposed program of world assistance. "It is the obligation of everyone to find out all one can about how much the United States is able to do. Whether we can do it according to plan is more than I can determine. We are going to have to think these things through and find some light for the trying years ahead," Rev. Hauser declared in conclusion.

Stuart Carr appeared at the conclusion of the club meeting and made a moving appeal for the co-operation of the Rotarians and all other civic clubs to secure a big registration and vote in the forthcoming Hospital Bond Election on September 16. Last Saturday was the first of four Saturdays that

Person Nicholson Died Result Fall

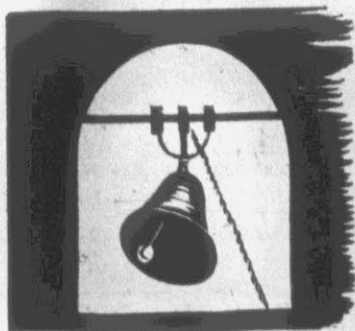

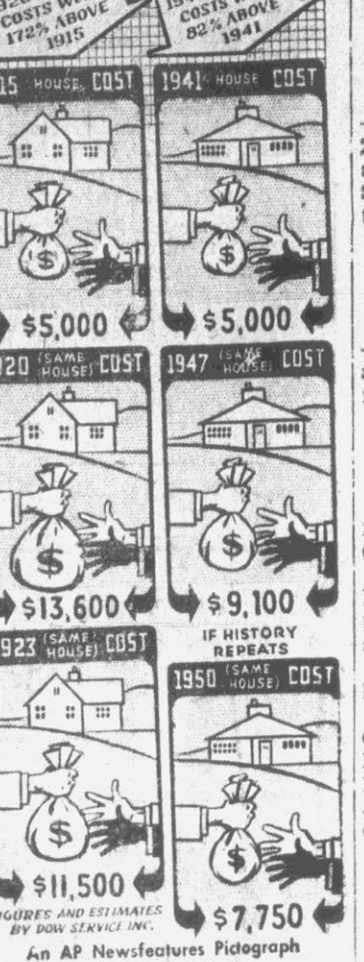

Having blasted the Cards' two top southpaws, Howie Pollet and Harry (The Cat) Brecheen in a day-night doubleheader at Ebbets Field yesterday, 7-5 and 12-3, to stretch their lead to six-and-a-half games, the jubilant Dodgers now are out of the danger zone in the important set.

Now assured of no worse than a split, Manager Burt Shotton was all set to call on Lefty Joe Hatten to oppose either the Cards' Red Munger or Al Brazle today in the Dodgers' bid to make it seven in a row over the defending world champions.

A total of 66,504 fans, 32,781 for the day encounter and 33,723 for the night affair, watched Little Vic Lombardi and Harry Taylor stop the Red Birds.

Lombardi's battery mate, Bruce Edwards, was the batting star of the opener. The stocky receiver slammed two tremendous triples to drive in three runs and scored one himself. He also chipped in with a double and single in the aftermath.

The Brooks jumped on Pollet for two runs in the first on Jackie Robinson's ninth homer, a walk and Edwards' first triple.

Whitey Kurovski and Enos Slaughter got those runs back in the second.

The Cards moved ahead, 4-2, in the third on successive singles by Schoendienst, Erv Dusak, a force play, balk and another one-bagger by Kurovski.

However, Pollet blew up in the fifth, the Dodgers pushing five runs in on two walks, two singles, Edwards' second three base poke and a fly out to sew up the game.

Another five run uprising sunk the Cards in the nightcap. Entering the third inning on the long end of a 2-1 count, the Dodgers pounced on Brecheen.

The Dodgers added another run in the sixth, three more in the seventh and their final in the eighth.

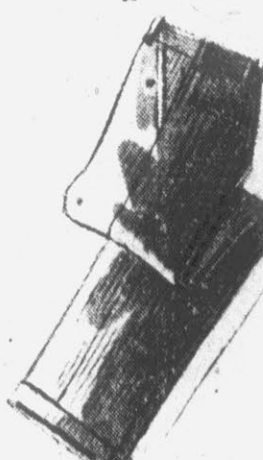

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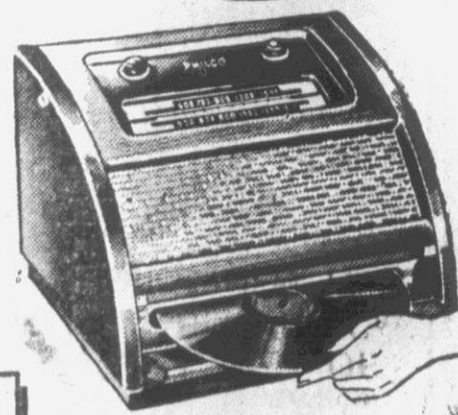
