Cuba Loses Fight
On Economic Issue

Argentina Jolts Pan-American Session With Move To Bar Joint Use Of Armed Force Against Aggression Within Hemisphere

Quilandinha, Brazil, Aug. 22—(AP)—Cuba was defeated today in her demand that provisions for protection of the "economic independence" of American nations be written into a hemisphere defense treaty.

The steering committee of the 9-nation Inter-American Defense Conference voted today the proposal for joint use of armed force in combatting aggression from within the Western Hemisphere.

Earlier, Argentina jolted the conference with a surprise move to bar joint use of armed force in combatting aggression from within the Western Hemisphere.

Breaking sharply with provisions of the Act of Chapultepec, the Argentine delegation submitted to the 20-nation conference a new proposal for the mutual defense treaty in the making here under which common military force would be employed only against attack from outside the Americas.

The United States and seven Latin American nations have presented proposals making no such distinction between aggression from without and from within the hemisphere.

Under the Act of Chapultepec, signed at Mexico City in 1945 by 21 American republics including Argentina, the invasion of territory of an American state by armed forces of any state would be branded as aggression.

The Argentine proposal was submitted to the conference secretary only an hour before last night's deadline for admission to the agenda of new treaty projects.

The unexpected move came amid an atmosphere of renewed confidence as the delegates celebrated the successful compromise of another Argentine proposal for a special inter-American economic conference before the conference of American states in Bogota, Colombia, next January.

A Mexican-introduced plan signed by 13 other delegations, including Argentina's, would provide for calling an economic conference at Bogota the latter part of next year.

A special plenary session was expected to approve the compromise.

Sikh Fighters
Slay Moslems

Julundur, India, Aug. 22—(AP)—Pierce Sikh warriors, rising by the thousands, were waging today what military authorities called a ruthless war of extermination against Moslems trapped east of the Pakis-tan border.

In 12 days of savage fighting, while the subcontinent was being divided into the dominions of India and Pakistan, military reports indicated the bearded Sikhs had overrun at least 150 rural villages populated wholly or partly by Moslems. Men, women and children were slaughtered by hundreds. Shops and homes were burned and pillaged.

What Is Aggression?

An Old International Question Rises Again At Hemisphere Conference; Litvinoff's Formula; Cubas "Economic Aggression" Example; All Kinds Of Aggression

At the Rio conference of the American Republics an old international question has risen again: When do friendly nations go to each others' help?

Time and again nations have tried to define aggression so they would be agreed at what point to gang up and stop a war-maker. That seems simple enough to a layman. But the League of Nations spent months arguing the question and got nowhere. Russia's foreign commissar of the day, Maxim Litvinoff, pressed for an agreement that would send the member states out after anyone who:

1. Declared war on another state.
2. Invaded another nation.
3. Attacked the territory, vessels or aircraft of another nation.

4. Set up a naval blockade active in another country or refused to take steps at home to deny aid to such bands.

Litvinoff failed in the League, but under him in the 30's Russia put the provisions into treaties with Romania, Estonia, Latvia, Poland, Turkey, Iran and Afghanistan.

Some now think that, if the League had approved the Litvinoff plan, point 5 would have prevented World War II. It could have been invoked against Germany in Spain, Austria and Czechoslovakia.

And, ironically, with Litvinoff ill and in the discard, today's Russia probably would be adjudged the culprit under his formula.

The idea of defining aggression got a little flesh on its bones at the 1945 Chapultepec conference. There

LEFTIST PLOT
UNCOVERED IN
SOUTH KOREA

Propaganda Activity Nipped; Some Arrests; Russians Are Indignant

Seoul, Aug. 22—(AP)—Lt. Gen. John R. Hodge said today "widespread activity of a revolutionary nature" had been uncovered in southern Korea and some ringleaders arrested—action which the Russians charged was aimed at disrupting the work of the joint commission on this occupied country.

Hodge, commander of the American occupation zone, said Korean government authorities made the arrests after learning of a plot by leftist employees of the Korean Broadcasting System to inject Communist propaganda into network programs and sabotage rightist political speeches.

He said also that more than 100 rioters had been arrested for attempting to interfere with the government's rice collection program—but that those arrests "had no political significance."

Col. Gen. Treant P. Shitkov, chief of the Soviet delegation to the Korean joint commission, charged that the "trass arrests of leftists" was apparently aimed at disrupting the commission's work.

Hodge said ringleaders in the propaganda plot had been under observation for some time "to prevent out of hand disorders."

"The repression," charged the Russian delegate, "occurred in a responsible, tense moment" in deadlocked deliberations of the commission and included "mass arrests and the actual closing down of Democratic parties and social organizations of leftist trend."

He said also arrested were "workers of the Leftist Democratic Press."

REFUGEES TO
DEFY BRITISH

Reject Ultimatum To Land In France Or Be Sent To Germany

Port de Bouc, Aug. 22—(AP)—Some of the 4,400 Jewish refugees aboard three British transports anchored off this port declared today they would defy a British ultimatum requiring them to disembark in France by tonight or be transported to a displaced persons camp in Germany.

British consular officials, who delivered the ultimatum yesterday, said a Jewish spokesman of one of the transports—the Ocean Vigor—told them the passengers on that vessel would not land. The deadline fixed by the British was noon (EST).

There was no immediate response from the Jews aboard the other two ships, but they previously had insisted that they would leave the transports voluntarily only in Palestine.

Petkov To Die

Sofia, Bulgaria, Aug. 22—(AP)—Russia's representative on the Allied Control Commission today rejected the United States demand for a review of the death sentence of Nikola Petkov, top-ranking anti-Communist leader.

Petkov was sentenced last Saturday to die as a conspirator against the Communist-dominated Fatherland Front Government. No date has been announced for the hanging.

The United States denounced his arrest and trial, and four days ago the United States and Britain sought a review of the sentence.

The rejection was announced by Lt. Gen. Alexander Cherepanov, Soviet member and acting deputy chairman of the commission.

MEET DESPITE
SOVIET VIEWS

France, Britain And U. S. To Discuss Raising German Economy

London, Aug. 22—(AP)—Despite a Soviet protest, negotiators for Britain, the United States and France assembled here today to talk over the advisability of raising the level of industrial production in western Germany.

Their conference in Lancaster House was aimed mainly at reconciling differing French and British-American views with regard to the ceiling on steel production to be permitted for the economically merged British and U. S. occupation zones of Germany.

Participants included Ambassador Lewis W. Douglas, and Gen. Lucius D. Clay, military governor for Germany, for the U. S.; Sir Gilmour Jenkins for Britain, and Herve Alphand, foreign ministry economist, for France. Sir Gilmour had been designated chairman.

The U. S. and Britain have been presented as wanting to build up German industry to help European economic recovery, but France is openly fearful that to do this might lead to the danger of future German aggression.

British and U. S. zonal authorities were reported to have agreed in Berlin July 16 to lift the ceiling on steel production in their zones from the current 5,800,000 tons a year to 10,000,000 or 12,000,000 tons a year.

Corn Forecast Cut Again
By Midwestern Drought

Washington, Aug. 22—(AP)—Unless good rains break the midwestern heat wave quickly, American housewives may well resign themselves to some meatless menus next summer—and possibly much higher prices for what meat they do get.

A special Agriculture Department report yesterday showed bad crop weather has cut corn production prospects to the lowest level since the severe drought year of 1936. And this year's corn crop will largely determine the size of the nation's meat supply in 1948.

A smaller meat supply would hit consumers hardest in the summer, since that is the season when livestock marketing normally drops to its lowest level.

The Department said the heat wave, which has gripped the midwestern corn belt since late July had cut corn prospects from 2,770,000,000 on July 15 to 2,437,000,000 bushels by August 15—a decline of

333,000,000.

The latest estimate did not take into account damage which may have been caused by the hot weather since mid-August, or the possibility that the crop may be of poor feeding and keeping quality. Much of it, due to a cool, wet planting season, the crop will be subject to frost before it has fully matured and dried.

The government's original goal was 3,000,000,000 bushels. And officials have said that around 2,850,000,000 bushels would be needed to maintain meat production near the present high level of 155 pounds per capita. The crop last year set a record of 3,287,000,000. The average for the last ten years was 2,639,000,000.

A crop of the size indicated would cut meat production possibly 15 to 20 pounds a year per person. It nevertheless would still be above the prewar average of 126 pounds.

Election Of Successor May Be Exciting Chapter In Mississippi Politics

Poplarville, Miss., Aug. 22—(AP)—Mississippians, who never deserted Theo G. Bilbo under the fire of outside criticism of his racial beliefs, planned their final respects today for the state's most spectacular political figure.

The arrangements would have been to the liking of the 69-year-old senator-elect who died of heart failure at New Orleans yesterday after a long illness which began with cancer of the mouth and became complicated by inflammation of the nerves, partial paralysis and a blood clot in the lungs.

The body was to be brought to Poplarville to be in state this afternoon and tonight at Bilbo's "Dream House."

A detachment of the Mississippi National Guard was ordered by Gov. Fielding L. Wright to stand as a guard of honor for the man who served as state senator, lieutenant governor, twice as governor, and who was elected to the United States Senate three times.

At 9 a. m. (CST) tomorrow, the casket will be taken into the nearby Juniper Grove Baptist Church and (Continued on Page Four)

UNION GIVEN
PACT CHOICE

Ford Motor Co. And UAW Agree On Two Alternative Contracts

Detroit, Aug. 22—(AP)—Officials of the Ford Motor Co. and the CIO-United Auto Workers Union were agreed on either of two alternative contracts today and left the choice up to the union's 107,000 Ford production workers.

Signing the pact seconds before the Taft-Hartley Act became effective at midnight Thursday, the parties thus ensured extension of the union shop at the company plants, subject to membership ratification.

The new labor law provides that such a shop may only be established through a majority vote of a firm's employees.

Under the agreement, union members will be presented with a choice between:

1. A contract which includes a reported \$200,000,000 pension plan, details of which were not announced, a general 7-cent-an-hour wage increase and "other economic benefits." The other "benefits" included an additional wage increase of five cents an hour for skilled maintenance and construction workers, jobbing molders and jobbing craftsmen.

2. A contract providing a 15-cent hourly wage increase following the industrial wage pattern of 11-1-2 cents an hour increase plus six paid holiday vacations.

Each contract provided extension of the UAW's union shop at Ford plants, if ratification is completed by Sept. 15.

The Dutch army announced today 14 scattered combats with the Indonesian Republic forces which both sides tensely awaited a United Nations action which might renew open warfare.

An authoritative Dutch source in the Hague said only a Security Council order to "The Indonesian Republic to cease present hostilities" could prevent resumption of large scale Dutch action in the East Indies. The open warfare stepped (theoretically at least) through "cease-fire orders at midnight Aug. 4.

The Dutch communiqué said the Republicans attacked Bezenabak near Krawang, 30 miles east of Batavia.

Two Dutch soldiers were reported killed and six wounded yesterday at scattered places on Java and Sumatra.

Sharp clashes were reported around Pematang Inan, former Republican capital for Sumatra. The Dutch said the Republicans attacked four or five times and were repulsed with large casualties each time.

In West and Central Java, where the Dutch held large areas of rich farm country between widely spaced defensive positions, the Netherlands communists told of new difficulties in combatting Republican infiltration and sabotage.

Washington, Aug. 21—(AP)—A new United States protest to Russia against the continued Soviet occupation of the Chinese port of Dairen was disclosed today by the State Department.

A note delivered to Moscow Aug. 14 said that this government will of necessity hold the Soviet government responsible for treatment accorded American interests in the port city while it is under red army rule.

Political Issue In 1948

"Smear Tactics" Charged As Investigation Gets Under Way; Seek To Ascertain If Harmful To Competitive Enterprise

Washington, Aug. 22—(AP)—A political explosion that may echo in the 1948 presidential campaign was in the making today as a Republican-dominated congressional committee assembled to begin a cross-country investigation into co-operatives.

Even before the first session got underway, chairman Ploeser (R-Mo.) and Rep. Patman (D-Tex.), ranking minority member of the house small business committee, were trading charges of "smear" tactics.

The Texan lighted the fuse for the advance fireworks when he issued a statement contending that Republican leaders had planned the inquiry as "an inquisition instead of an investigation" and that its twin objectives are to destroy co-ops and build political fences.

Ploeser filed back that "this is the Democratic National Committee's new plan of attack—to smear any activity of congressional committees with the hope of branding the Republican majority with political lies."

Termining Patman's charges "replete with falsehood," the Missourian hinted he might not designate his Texas colleague as a member of the subcommittee which will make

the actual investigation.

Patman, who was chairman of the committee when the Democrats controlled congress, whipped out a second statement, he already had been notified of a spot on the inquiry group and that is why he is on hand. He added:

In his statement, the Texan declared the inquiry is intended "to align the small business men of the nation against their former neighbors and customers."

Ploeser previously had announced that the small business subcommittee planned "a comprehensive investigation to ascertain whether, and to what extent, tax-exempt privileges of co-operatives are harmful to free competitive enterprise."

The committee turned its searchlights first upon the Greenbelt, Md., federal housing project near Washington which operates under a co-op system. The project has a population of 8,000.

Ploeser said the co-op enjoys a complete monopoly over all business at Greenbelt, as the result of a contract with the Federal Public Housing Authority. "Private business has been effectively prevented from entering into the community,"

Argentina Moves To
Seek Abolition Of
Veto Privilege; Sub-
mit Resolution For
General Assembly;
Could Be Blocked
By Russia

Lake Success, Aug. 22—(AP)—Russia was under fire from several quarters today for persistently using the veto to upset majority decisions in the United Nations Security Council.

In the wake of angry outcries provoked by seven Russian vetoes this week, Argentina moved swiftly to seek abolition of the big power veto privilege by submitting a resolution for consideration of the general assembly when it meets in New York Sept. 18.

The Argentine government asked that the assembly call a general conference of all the United Nations three days after the 50-nation body concludes its forthcoming session in order to revise the veto section of the U. N. Charter.

Argentina previously had asked the assembly to consider calling the conference but had not suggested a date.

Under article 109 of the U. N. charter a general conference of the members of the United Nations for the purpose of reviewing the present document may be held at a date and place to be fixed by a two-thirds majority of the General Assembly and by a vote of any seven members of the Security Council.

But any alteration of the charter recommended by a two-thirds vote of the conference cannot take effect until ratified by two-thirds of the member states of the United Nations.

Thus, any of the big five could use the veto to prevent abolition of the veto. In view of this fact observers agreed that the small powers, who have been fighting unsuccessfully for two years to restrict the veto, could hope for nothing more than an assembly resolution urging the big five to use the veto only in extreme cases.

Most delegates here said they believed that even if the majority agreed to abolish the veto Russia would block the move. But they said an airing of the veto clause might have some effect on Russian use of the privilege in the future.

One of the sharpest criticisms of Russia's use of the veto to block a majority opinion came yesterday from Council President Paris El Khouri. In announcing Russia's veto of Italy's application for U. N. membership he declared that the Soviet union had obstructed council action.

Police Fire On Egyptian Crowd; Ten Wounded

Cairo, Aug. 22—(AP)—Police fired today on a crowd demonstrating for the evacuation "by blood" of British troops from Egypt, and eye witnesses said more than 10 persons were wounded.

Mounted officers first stormed the crowd outside the ancient Al Azhar Mosque. Demonstrators dragged them from their horses and seized their clubs. Police reinforcements were called up and met the crowd at Malika Farida Square, barring its way to the center of the city.

The witnesses said the police opened fire with rifles and shotguns, most of them apparently shooting over the heads of the demonstrators.

Demonstrators, arming themselves with sticks from a passing truck, then began smashing the windows of street cars.

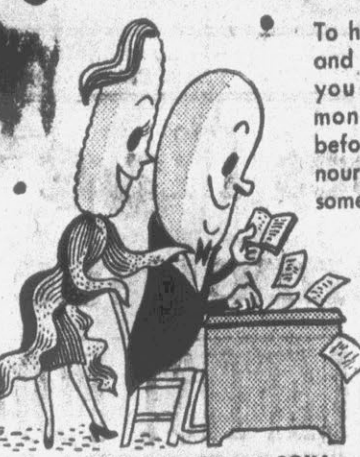
Greenville Loses Great Teacher To New York State

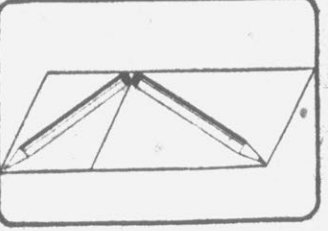

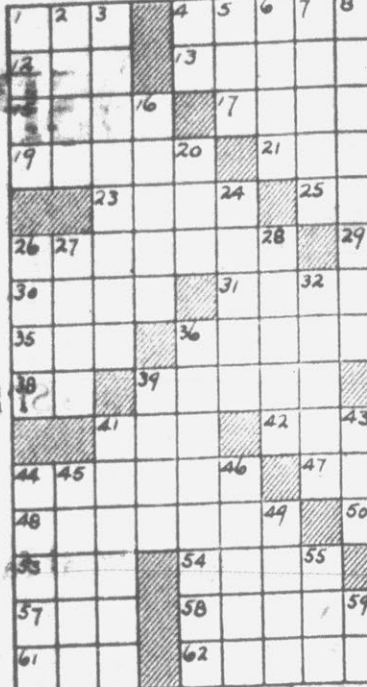

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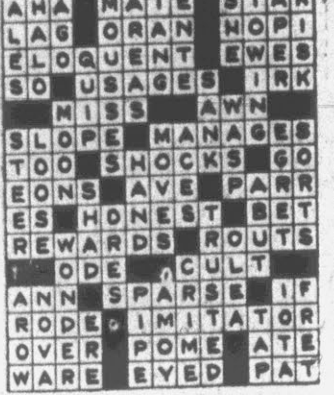

of Polish origin, were thwarted by the British last month in an effort to run the British blockade of the Holy Land aboard a ship called "Exodus 1947." All were without proper visas and thus not to be included in the immigration quota fixed by the British.

This was their 42nd consecutive voyage aboard ship. They sailed from Sète, France, on July 11, bound for Palestine aboard the Exodus. The British Navy spotted the vessel and boarded her after a battle in which three Jews were killed and 17 others badly hurt and the ship damaged. The passengers were transferred to the transports and sent back to French waters, where they have been riding at anchor ever since.

lie there until 2 p.m., when funeral services will be conducted by the Rev. D. W. Nix of Baton Rouge, La., a former pastor of the church. Bilbo will be buried in the church cemetery, near his parents.

The election of a successor to Bilbo may bring a chapter in Mississippi politics as exciting as any of those in which "The Man" was a principal.

A senator to fill Bilbo's unexpired term, which has longer than five years to go, will be named in the state's general election November 4.

Because this is a general election year in the state, Bilbo's successor will be chosen in voting which will not be preceded by any primaries for party nomination. In Mississippi, the nominee of the Democratic party always is elected.

But in the special election November 4, any Mississippian can qualify to have his name placed on the ballot by producing a petition bearing the signatures of 50 voters in each county.

And, unlike primaries, the election will be decided on a plurality rather than a majority basis. The high man on the ballot wins.

But the chairman of a special committee gets more than just name publicity. If the committee does a bang-up job the chairman gets much, if not all, of the credit.
