Gov. Dewey Backs Universal Training

Endorses Up: Military Training in Address to Legionnaires; Truman Also Reminds Convention That U.S. Must Be Kept Strong

New York, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey unequivocally endorsed Universal Military Training today in an address before massed thousands of American Legionnaires who opened their 29th convention in flag-draped Madison Square Garden.

"It is our duty," the 1944 Republican presidential candidate said, "to provide a program involving participation by all able-bodied young American men under Universal Military Training."

The statement was the first indication by Dewey, a possible candidate for the 1948 GOP presidential nomination, of his stand on the controversial issue.

Earlier, in addressing the opening session of the Legion auxiliary convention, Dewey urged the membership to "take sober thought" because "in the coming year we will be living in one of our most critical periods in which the peace may be once again endangered."

Dewey's speech to the American Legion in the Garden followed shortly the call to order by Paul H. Griffith, the Legion's national commander, who rang an 18-inch high replica of the Liberty Bell in accordance with Legion custom dating back 20 years.

The GOP titular leader never has announced his candidacy for the 1948 nomination although he recently took an extensive tour, announced as "non-political."

Ervin May Bring Fritz' Suit Against County

Morganton, N.C., Aug. 28.—(AP)—Sam J. Ervin, counsel for R. L. Fritz, principal of the Hudson school whose teaching certificate was revoked by the State Education Board, says he may bring suit in Fritz' right to teach.

Ervin said last night he was not concerned with a ruling by State Attorney Gen. Harry McMillan in Raleigh that the state cannot be sued without its consent. The legality of the State Board's action "can become at in some other way," Ervin said.

The Morganton attorney said that he and Max Wilson of Lenoir plan to sue the Caldwell County School Committee, the County Board of Education and perhaps the County school superintendent.

The action will not be brought until the State Board of Education meets in Raleigh next Thursday and has an opportunity to reconsider the case, Ervin said.

Pranks By Legionnaires Bedevil Staid Citizens

New York, Aug. 28.—(AP)—The men who used to ask "Where's Elmer?" and the younger ones who followed Kilroy around have a new one on the 29th annual American Legion convention: "Hazy Queenie."

The "Queenie" who is being called and petted on Manhattan's sidewalks is a non-existent black and white hound dog. Aiming a cane at a girl passerby's knees, a Legionnaire may be heard to explain: "Queenie's the best hound dog y'ever saw—comes up to about here."

Opening day of the convention started off in good form: at 12:30 this morning the California delegation in the Hotel Taft and the Massachusetts delegation in the Victoria hotel began hurling bags of water at each other. The bags didn't carry across West 51st St. but some neat hits were scored on the ubiquitous "innocent bystander."

When the Legion held its 1937 convention here, police and firemen had to break up a water fight between the Taft and Victoria contingents. That time they used fire hoses.

Landlord Defies Federal Court, Lands In Prison

Philadelphia, Aug. 28.—(AP)—A landlord has been committed to prison for contempt of federal court after a government attorney quoted him as saying "the moon will turn green" before he would refund overcharges to nine tenants.

Federal Judge James P. McGranney told Abraham Weiner, operator of a small dry goods store, "You'll stay in prison until you comply with the order of the court."

Weiner was brought before Judge McGranney yesterday after Conrad G. Moffett, chief trial attorney for the Federal Housing Authority, accused him of refusing to follow a court order to refund overcharges to tenants and pay double damages to the government totalling \$3,837.

ANDERSON IS FOUND GUILTY BY PITT JURY

Will Be Sentenced Later; Three Other Cases Heard In Superior Court

In Superior Court yesterday afternoon the jury of eleven men and one woman returned a verdict of guilty of murder and arson against Booker T. Anderson, 29-year-old Negro, for the death by fire of Willie Belle Cratch, 27, widow of Jesse Cratch, Negro, and her two children, Bobbie Gene, 7, and Jesse Juanita, 1, in a dwelling at First and Cotanche streets last May 15.

Judge Henry A. Grady, who is presiding over the one-week criminal term, said he would pronounce sentence later.

Miss Annie L. Askew, the only woman to serve as a juror on a capital case, served as juror in numerous cases during the week and made good, court officials said.

Hearing of the Anderson case began yesterday morning. Testimony was that Anderson, in love with the woman, entered the house on the night of May 15 while she and the children were asleep, ignited a bowl of kerosene oil under the bed and hurriedly left for his home in another part of the city to establish an alibi. He was seen at home when the fire alarm sounded. Witnesses testified that they saw him at the woman's house before the fire started. Firemen discovered the three dead bodies when they entered the burning house.

Anderson went on the stand in his own behalf. He denied making a written confession to Police Chief Jim Tanner that he started the fire, and he repudiated his own testimony given at the coroner's inquest.

The forenoon session of court today was taken up with hearing of testimony in the case of Walter L. Wilson, Arden Negro, who was charged with the murder of a woman.

Needed: One Vacation

Security Council Apparently Worn Out By Difficulties, Needs Fresh Approach; Delegates Have Done Everything Possible But New Ideas Are Necessary

The Security Council needs a vacation and a new start. The key can be the 11 members of the United Nations organization, charged with the responsibility of keeping the world at peace, take a rest now? There is trouble in Greece, fighting in Indonesia and strife aplenty elsewhere.

The reason is this! The delegates have done everything they can do at this stage in the game. They must find a new approach to the situation. Several are hoping the General Assembly will provide that approach. The assembly convenes Sept. 16.

This has been the most active summer in the United Nations' short history. It is evident that the delegates are getting tired of looking at the same old faces every day and they need a change of scenery.

There are some iron men on the council but even these would like a rest. The prospect now is a brief council vacation beginning tomorrow.

The United States has turned to the assembly on a sort of last resort to deal with the Balkans case. Every move by the United States to set up a semi-permanent U.N. committee in the Balkans to help settle the troubles there has been resisted by the Soviet Union, with a Russian veto capping the final moves in that respect.

The U.S. is determined to air the whole thing in the assembly and try to bring to bear the weight of world opinion.

The veto, too, is another matter on which the U.N. needs a new approach. That device, brought up originally by the United States and eagerly grasped by Soviet Russia, has come into some disrepute by frequent usage—18 times by Russia and two by France.

But with all the furore from the small countries, the big powers are reluctant to yield that prerogative. The most that the opponents of the veto can expect now is to get the whole thing out of their systems on the assembly rostrum. For it is just about the one sure thing in the U.N. that the veto system as now constituted will not be changed this year.

The lack of the police force is another detriment to the council which must be overcome eventually. So far the council can do nothing but issue verbal edicts, even when all powers agree, which is not often. The delegates and the planners of the U.N. look forward to the day when the council will have an international force which can be used to back up its words. That day appears far off.

So they all agree at Lake Success now that they need a vacation and some new ideas about how to preserve world peace.

Greek Premier

Athens, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Demetrios Maximos has been chosen premier. He was announced tonight. He thus will return to the post he vacated last Saturday.

Sources close to the political situation said Constantinos Tsaldaris, who had been unable to form a cabinet, would return as foreign minister, and that Generalissimo Alexander Papagos likely would be minister of war.

Papagos was a hero of the Greek-Italian fighting in 1941, and is now a court chamberlain.

Earlier there had been talk that Papagos would become the "neutral" premier of a broad coalition government.

REBEL AGAINST LONGER SKIRTS

Louisville's LBK Club Stages Downtown Rally In Protest

Louisville, Ky., Aug. 28.—(AP)—Shouting "keep prices down and helmets up," Louisville's "Little Below the Knee Club" staged a downtown rally last night and, with a men's auxiliary, declared war on new fashions which call for longer skirts.

A cheering, whistling crowd listened to spokesmen who advanced several arguments for maintaining present hemline lengths.

It was the consensus that: 1. Women should not allow Paris to dictate styles.

2. Clothing manufacturers are trying to "hoodwink" women into buying new styles.

3. Long skirts are neither attractive nor comfortable.

Mrs. Belle Evans, club chairman, had this to say about long skirts: "You can't walk in them. Also, they take too darn long to iron."

And W. H. Anderson, spokesman for the men's auxiliary, wanted to know why American women should have styles "forced upon them that they do not personally want."

Mrs. Neale Cox, who led the rally, said 1,265 Louisville women already had promised to keep the "status quo" of the hemline, and urged that neighborhood clubs be formed.

Meanwhile, the director of the state's penal system, Clyde O. Robinson, was here investigating the second reported manhandling of a convict within the past week.

Looted Diamonds Are Given Dutch

Frankfurt, Aug. 28.—(AP)—A heavily armed convoy of American troops today returned to Holland \$2,500,000 worth of glittering cut diamonds looted by the Nazis from Dutch diamond merchants.

The diamonds, totalling 17,000 carats and including the blazing Red Diamond valued at \$45,000, were recovered in 1945 by the U.S. Ninth Army from their Nazi hiding place in a German salt mine.

Difficulties Ahead Of Lawmakers Told

Congressional Investigators Cautioned Black Markets In Europe Becloud True Picture Of Food Resources

Washington, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Black market operations make it "difficult, if not impossible," for European nations to survey their food resources accurately, an Agriculture Department report contends.

The document, bearing a "confidential" label, was prepared for a congressional investigating committee which sailed for Europe yesterday to make a first-hand study of foreign needs.

A copy of the 97-page report was made available to a reporter. It provides a country-by-country summary of food and agriculture conditions throughout Western Europe based on "the latest information available."

The foreword, however, says the report has been classified as confidential because "the production figures x x x for some countries will not agree with the official estimates supplied by the minister of agriculture."

No countries in this category were listed by name. But the report itself says that throughout Europe "government intervention is general, in the production, collection and distribution of most agricultural products."

"This intervention has been linked with a system of compulsory farm collections and fixed prices to farmers x x x."

"Because of the shortages of food, this system of distribution has made it profitable for farmers in most countries to market any surplus products through black markets."

"It has encouraged farmers to understate their production in order to reduce the quantities which they must deliver to the government and leave them additional quantities which they can dispose of more profitably."

"This bias in production estimates makes it difficult, if not impossible, for governments to estimate accurately their domestic food output."

Washington, Aug. 28.—(AP)—The Maritime Commission has agreed tentatively for the North Carolina Ports Authority to lease a portion of the North Carolina shipbuilding yards at Wilmington.

J. McVie, Wilmington, Authority counsel, said a memorandum of the agreement will be sent from maritime officials to the Authority within two or three days. Broughton and R. B. Page, Authority chairman and Wilmington newspaper publisher, conferred with Maritime Commission officials here yesterday.

Broughton said "the plan is to lease a northern extension of the yard. This includes 100 acres of land, 3,000 feet of waterfront, one large building and several smaller structures."

Maritime officials offered a 25-year lease with two successive options of 25 years, which would total 75 years.

Broughton explained that maritime officials probably will approve state authority use of the property without cost, as long as the Authority puts net proceeds into improvements. "After that, and it would be a long time hence, there would be a small rental fee," he added.

The Authority plans extensive improvements at Wilmington, Fayetteville, Morehead City and Southport, Broughton declared.

Seers Come To Conclusion Present Boom Will Be With Us Until Next Year And Maybe Longer; What Happens In A Price Adjustment; How Predictors Erred

Washington, Aug. 28.—(AP)—What happened to the predictions that a business "recession," or at least a price "adjustment," would occur in the summer or fall of 1947? Well, the predictions eased off because many of the predictors have changed their minds. They now think the boom will stay with us until next year, and maybe longer.

This is either good or bad, depending on how you look at it. The price "adjustment" that was so widely forecast—and which is very likely to come sooner or later—would be a general drop in prices. It could come when people's wages, or savings, or credit, or patience were no longer equal to the rising prices. The result would be a cut in their buying. Then the supply of goods would get a lot bigger than the demand.

Naturally, people would like a general drop in prices. And economists think a gradual decrease would be healthy all around. But if prices fell too suddenly and too far, a lot of businesses would get hurt. They would have to lay off employees. People wouldn't like that.

For example, suppose Mr. Smith, a merchant, has bought a stock of overcoats. He had to pay high prices for them. Of course he expects to sell them at high prices.

N. C. HOSPITAL GROUP MEETS

Study Proposed Benefits Urged By Nurse Association

High Point, N. C., Aug. 28—(AP)—The North Carolina Hospital Association met today to consider wage demands and other benefits proposed by the State Nurses Association, which claims a membership of 3,000.

Among the nurse associations claims are that staff nurses receive \$150 a month minimum with full maintenance plus \$10 a month more for each year's service up to three.

Included also are requests for a 44-hour week, increased vacation time, and social security or retirement programs.

Sample Forbus of Watts Hospital in Durham, president of the Hospital Association, said smaller hospitals would be hit hard by the proposed schedules and might be forced to close.

Mrs. Marie B. Neill of Raleigh, president of the nurses group, said the requests have been kept on a very high professional plane. And there is no question of work stoppage or picketing.

She added: "We are advancing this new program in an attempt to prevent union infiltration into our profession—simply because it is a profession."

the war has been enormous. And they now say there is "still plenty of purchasing power in the hands of the people."

This is in the form of current income, savings and credit. There is still a lot of money flowing around.

For another thing, there is a pretty close parallel between 1920 and 1947, and some experts—it now appears—made the mistake of taking this parallel too literally.

In 1920 the postwar boom in prices ended with a plunge. These experts saw the same forces at work, and concluded that the same thing would happen.

And it may yet.

But the situation is not just the same as in 1920. The country's economy is sturdier in a number of ways than it was then. Most economists have concluded that we are in a new situation—without exact parallel in any other year—and therefore today they don't pretend to know what will happen tomorrow.

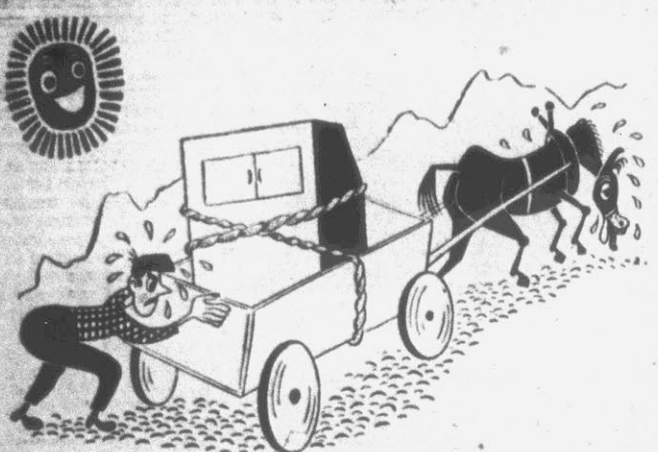

Truman Plane
For Flight To Brazil

Washington, Aug. 28—(AP)—Bolo knives and carbines were added to the equipment of the new White House plane "Independence" today as the Secret Service completed preparations for President Truman's flight to Brazil.

Last night's announcement that the Chief Executive will leave Sunday for Rio de Janeiro to address the Inter-American Defense Conference set for elaborate protective pattern in force.

Part of the flight will be over Brazil's formidable jungle.

Hence, with an eye to any eventualities, the Secret Service ordered the bolo knives which are designed for whacking a path through jungle growth and the rifles for protection against animal life as well as hostile tribesmen. The plane also will carry parachutes.

Mr. Truman's black, bullet-proof limousine and a heavy armored Secret Service car long since have been on their way by boat to the Brazilian capital for use during the President's six-day stay there.

Secret Service agents already are at work in Rio surveying the build-

ings in which the President will appear and checking up on the many other details which are a standard formula for every presidential appearance.

Hiding the new, blue-eagled DC-6 for the first time, the President will leave Washington at 8 a. m. (EST) Sunday, planning to arrive in Rio the following afternoon after an overnight stop at Trinidad.

NO BOYCOTT INTENDED

Washington, Aug. 28—(AP)—One branch of John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers denied today that it has decided to boycott the National Labor Relations Board because of the new Taft-Hartley Labor Act.

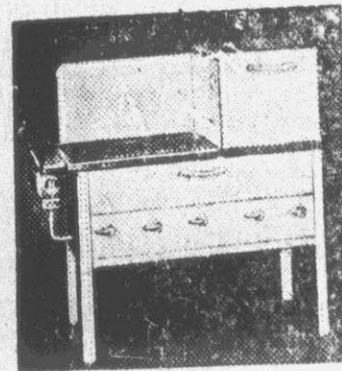
