

REDS ACCUSED OF FALSIFYING BALLOT COUNT

Hungary's Communist Controlled Gov't To Conceal Actual Vote Totals

Budapest, Sept. 1.—(AP)—The information ministry said today the Communist-controlled four party government coalition had polled 63 per cent of the votes in Sunday's parliamentary election and that no more ballot totals would be announced.

"The people are interested only in percentages," a ministry spokesman said soon after noon.

He declared the government count showed the communists polled 306,854 of the 1,339,957 votes tabulated and led all ten parties with 24 per cent of the total. The spokesman said the social democrats polled 16 per cent, the small holders 15 and the national peasants eight per cent for a coalition total of almost two-thirds.

Even the communists' allies, the social democrats, accused the communists of obtaining their vote by fraud. Other opposition parties said the communists, who controlled virtually all trucks and other means of travel, had cast between 500,000 and 1,000,000 false votes. The communists replied in kind, accusing opposition parties of plural voting.

The democratic peoples party, an anti-communist group led by the Catholic Istvan Barankovics, had moved up to second place in the last announced vote totals with 285,321 votes or 20 per cent.

It was the second Hungarian election since the war. The small holders polled 57 per cent of the last vote, but their regime was overthrown in a communist coup during the summer. Even the most conservative politicians had anticipated a communist victory yesterday and many predicted a more rigid police liquidation of opposition after the election formality was over.

In some villages, there was talk of civil war (even though the Russian army still occupied much of Hungary.)

U.S. Diplomats Move To Help In Marshall Draft

Paris, Aug. 30.—(AP)—The U. S. State Department made its first open move to help European nations draft proposals to be submitted to the United States for Marshall Plan aid.

A meeting was arranged between the executive committee of the 16-nation economic conference and a group of American diplomats headed by Under-Secretary of State William Clayton.

American sources said Clayton's purpose was to learn at first hand the development of the Paris economic talks, which began in July, and offer friendly aid in drafting proposals while still leaving the initiative in European hands.

New Greensboro City Manager

Greensboro, N.C., Aug. 30.—(AP)—James R. Townsend, 54-year-old retired Army colonel and a native of Burlington, is the new city manager of Greensboro at \$9,000 annual salary.

The graduate of North Carolina State College was chosen from more than 60 applicants at a special meeting of the City Council yesterday and accepted an hour later. James L. Frink resigned as city manager last month to go with the Burlington Mills Corporation.

Mutual Defense Pact

We Will All Sleep Easier When Western Hemispheric Nations Sign Treaty Tomorrow; Solidarity of Purpose; Aimed At Aggressors; Contribution To Peace

We of the Western Hemisphere can sleep a mighty lot easier these dangerous nights because of adoption of the mutual defense treaty by the conference of American republics at Quito, Ecuador, today.

So can the rest of the world, for that matter, because this historic agreement is a great contribution to world peace. Far from taking unto itself any of the prerogatives of the United Nations, the treaty will strengthen the hand of the peace organization.

This pact means (or will mean, when it has been signed formally tomorrow and has been ratified by the various governments) that the signatories will stand together in the event of any one of them being attacked from without the hemisphere. It's one for all and all for one.

It is the old Monroe Doctrine of 1823 served up in new and decidedly formidable form. This time, instead of representing merely the position of the United States, it is backed by Pan-America. Only two of the 21 republics were missing—Nicaragua and Ecuador, both of which have new governments that were the result of coups and haven't yet been recognized abroad. They may be expected to join later. And naturally it is the great hope of all that Canada, which isn't a member of the Pan American Union, will subscribe to the program of mutual defense.

The strength of this vast combination of states lies not so much in the material aid which can be given by small members in event of war but in solidarity of purpose. There will be no weak link in the chain of hemispheric nations to provide a possible base from which an enemy might operate.

The treaty is aimed only at possible aggressors. That is to say, it isn't directed against any specific nation or group of nations. There is no capital of Europe or Asia which can claim rightfully that this combination is aimed at it—unless that capital is up to aggressive skulduggery.

Of course the greatest threat to the Western Hemisphere today is aggressive communism. The danger of the Red ism was recognized strikingly yesterday when the American Legion convention in New York adopted a resolution recommending

Labor Day Observance Touches Off Price Row

Industry And Administration Disagree Over Wage-Price Relations; Union Heads Ask Repeal Of Taft-Hartley Law

Washington, Sept. 1.—(AP)—The nation's annual observance of Labor Day touched off a fresh Administration-industry disagreement over prices today and what they mean to the working man.

Industry, through NAM President Earl Bunting, said American workers have "a substantially higher actual buying power than they had eight years ago."

But the Administration, through Secretary of Labor Schwellenbach, declared the wage earner "has not been able to keep abreast of the cost of living."

The cabinet officer, speaking by radio, also took issue with what he described as a widespread effort to blame price advances on wage boosts alone.

But the head of the National Association of Manufacturers contended in a statement that labor costs represent between 75 and 85 per cent of the total expenses which determine final prices.

President Truman himself generally steered clear of issues in immediate controversy in a message made public on the eve of his departure for Rio de Janeiro.

Yet he set the stage for many an explosive battle on Capitol Hill next year by calling upon Congress to (a) boost the minimum wage in interstate industry, (b) broaden the social security system to bring in many persons not now covered and (c) establish an "adequate system of health insurance."

Mr. Truman declared that "good labor relations x x x cannot be brought about by legislation," but he made no direct reference to the Taft-Hartley Act which union leaders picked as the target of their Labor Day messages.

AFL President William Green and CIO Chief Philip Murray issued separate calls for an all-out effort to bring about repeal of the measure which went into full effect only ten days ago.

BRITISH HALT FOOD BUYING

Stop Purchases From U.S.; Other Imports To Be Continued

London, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Because of the British dollar shortage, Great Britain has stopped buying food from the United States "for the time being," Food Minister John Strachey disclosed last night.

Speaking in Dundee, Scotland, a few hours after 12,000 Yorkshire coal miners headed a plea by Fuel Minister Emanuel Shinwell and voted to end a walkout which began three weeks ago, Strachey declared:

"We can manage, if necessary, for some time without buying food from that source."

Britain has depended on the U.S. ever since wartime days for a considerable variety of food, such as wheat, canned foods, dried eggs and fruit. Purchases have been dwindling along with the \$3,750,000,000 American loan.

Strachey said imports of cotton, tobacco, machinery and some other items from the United States would continue.

Shinwell, in his plea to the striking Yorkshire miners, said Britain was "hanging on a thread."

Despite Shinwell's pleas, however, 4,000 other miners voted to continue their walkout, which the National Union of Mineworkers has termed a wildcat affair. Those who voted to stay out included miners at the Grimethorpe pit where the walkout began when the men refused to work 23 feet of coal face a day instead of 21.

NEGRO KILLED WITH SHOTGUN

Joe Hopkins Shoots James Ward In Self-Defense Saturday

In a duel in which a knife, pistol and shotgun figured at first and Cotanche streets Saturday afternoon, Joseph Frank Hopkins, 28-year-old Negro truck driver, shot and killed James Ward, 30-year-old Negro farm laborer, Police Chief Wm. Tanner said today.

Chief Tanner quoted Hopkins as saying that "I shot Ward in defense of my life."

Hopkins was released under \$200 bond and Coroner Griffin H. Rouse said he would hold an inquest Friday night at 7:30.

Police quoted witnesses as saying that Ward, under the influence of liquor, evidently was looking for trouble; that Hopkins, his friend, urged him to go home and not get into trouble; that Ward resisted.

Seek "Carrier" Of Polio Virus

Wilmington, Del. Sept. 1.—(AP)—Wilmington city authorities—with 89 cases of Poliomyelitis reported in Delaware this year—have turned temporarily from their aerial onslaught on the housefly to bird collecting in an effort to find the carrier of the infantile paralysis virus.

Thirty specimens of insect-eating birds have been shot and shipped in a frozen state to the Yale medical school at New Haven, Conn., for study.

Windsor, Ont., Sept. 1.—(AP)—A brisk east wind saved from possible disaster the central section of Sandwich East township late yesterday by blowing 50-foot flames from an exploded gas pipe away from five storage tanks containing an estimated 1,300,000 cubic feet of natural gas.

Cincinnati, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Police combed the Negro sections of Cincinnati today for a 34-year-old paroled slayer sought in connection with a one-man crime wave across southwestern Ohio that included assault of a Franklin, O., housewife, shooting of a Cleveland woman, stabbing of a motorist and theft of two automobiles.

Lincoln, Neb., Sept. 1.—(AP)—A bronze statue of William Jennings Bryan was unveiled and dedicated today at the main entrance to the Nebraska statehouse with no mention of the recent controversy over its location.

Nanking, Sept. 1.—(AP)—The Ministry of Economic Affairs said today the last year of China's 3-year plan to expand cotton production was expected to result in a 50 per cent increase over last year. The ministry estimated the 1947 yield at 10,000,000 to 12 million bales—24 per cent short of annual requirements.

Rich Square Men Come Before Judge Tuesday

Jackson, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Seven white men will be called before a special committing magistrate here tomorrow as the state of North Carolina makes its second attempt to prosecute them on charges growing out of an attempt to lynch a young Negro last May 23.

The magistrate, Judge J. Paul Fritzel of Snow Hill, will hear the state's evidence and then rule whether it is sufficient to hold the men for a grand jury in any one of four adjoining counties.

A Northampton county (Jackson) grand jury refused to indict them last August 5.

Governor Cherry called the grand jury's action a "miscarriage of justice" and invoked the state's 54-year-old anti-lynching law which permits such cases to be brought before grand juries in each of the counties adjoining the one in which the alleged crime was committed.

The men are charged with conspiracy to break and enter a jail and with breaking and entering a jail with intent to kill or injure a prisoner. Each charge carries a maximum penalty of 15 years imprisonment.

The state charges they removed 22-year-old Godwin "Buddy" Bush, a Negro, from the Northampton county jail here with intent to lynch him. Bush foiled his captives by making a successful break in the pre-dawn darkness.

Ecuador In Grip Of Second Revolt In Week; Army Turns Against Mancheno

Quito, Ecuador, Sept. 1.—(AP)—The week-old government of Col. Carlos Mancheno clamped a state of siege on all of Ecuador last night as troops and tanks acquired through U.S. lend-lease sped to two cities of the republic to put down a revolt of army and constabulary officers.

The state of siege prohibits publication or radio broadcast of news concerning the revolt.

The army rebelled Saturday night against Col. Mancheno—who came to power in the bloodless one-shot revolt Aug. 24 in which President Jose Maria Velasco Ibarra was ousted—in Riobamba, 100 miles south of Quito, and in Guaranda, 20 miles west of Riobamba.

(A dispatch from Guayaquil said the rebellion had spread to that city, where intermittent gunfire was said to have been heard Sunday. Army tanks occupied the city's Central Plaza, the dispatch said, and troops were shouting "Down with Mancheno.")

A commune issued after a long emergency cabinet session called the Riobamba revolt "a small seditious outbreak whose brain trusters are leaders of the conservative party." The commune said the government was in complete control "in the rest of the republic."

Mancheno himself apparently was caught by surprise by the counter-revolt. He was in Tulcan, near the Colombian border, to dedicate an airport when the rebellion began. He hurried back to Quito but missed the cabinet session.

Throngs Of Brazilians Greet President Truman's Arrival In Rio

Rio De Janeiro, Brazil, Sept. 1.—President Truman landed at Ponta Do Galeao airport here at 2:47 p. m. (12:57 p. m. EST) today and thousands of Brazilians lined the streets to welcome him.

Mr. Truman will spend a week in Brazil and address the closing session of the inter-American defense conference at Quito, Ecuador.

Brazilians and U. S. flags fluttered from almost every lamp post along main street of Rio De Janeiro, the Avenida Rio Branco.

President Eurico Gaspar Dutra reached the docks half an hour before Mr. Truman's big plane came down from a clear sky to the airport, across the bay from the city. Bands played martial music and troops smartly stood at attention on the Route of the Presidents.

The reception was expected to be as great as that accorded President Roosevelt in 1938. Rio De Janeiro had a holiday atmosphere.

Rain had been forecast, but the sun broke through the overcast during the late morning.

Mrs. Truman and Miss Margaret Truman, daughter of the president, accompanied the executive in the new U.S.S. The Independence. Lt. Col. Henry T. Meyers was the pilot. Mr. Truman left Washington Sunday, spent the night in Trinidad and proceeded on to Rio De Janeiro today, stopping during the morning at Belem for fuel.

The plane was too large for the municipal Santos Dumont Airport and landed at the military airfield of Ponta Do Galeao across Guanabara Bay.

The president will cross the bay by yacht and be greeted at the dock by Brazil's president, Eurico Gaspar Dutra and an official reception party. From the dock, the two presidents, with their wives, will travel through streets lined by 20,000 Brazilian soldiers to the U. S. Embassy, where President Truman will take up residence until Friday, after which he will move to La Raijeirs palace, the residence for dignitaries visiting Brazil.

Tonight President Truman will Rutra at Catete Palace. That was the only official item on today's calendar.

Tomorrow, President Dutra will call for President Truman at the embassy at 5:30 a. m. (EST) and together they will motor to the mountain resort at Quitandinha, where the U. S. president will speak to the inter-American hemisphere defense conference's final session at about 8:30 a. m.

FIGHT IN U.N. ON PARTITION

Proposal To Divide Palestine Will Be Bitterly Fought

Lake Success, Sept. 1.—(AP)—A fight in the United Nations general assembly loomed today over a committee plan to divide Palestine into Arab and Jewish states, and admit 150,000 Jewish immigrants in the next two years.

The 11-nation U. N. special committee on Palestine last night unanimously recommended Holy Land independence from Britain's 25-year-old mandate at the earliest practicable date.

A seven-member majority urged partition of Palestine into Arab and Jewish nations and an international city of Jerusalem and admission of 150,000 Jews into the Jewish territory during the two-year transition period.

A three-member minority called for a federal Arab-Jewish state and entry of Jews up to the absorptive capacity of the Jewish portion during a transition period of up to three years.

The majority would give the Jews eastern Galilee, the central coastal plain, taking in Haifa, Jaffa and Tel Aviv, and the Beersheba district, including most of the Negev—the southern desert.

It would allot the Arabs western Galilee, the Samaritan and Judean hill country and the southern coast from Isdud to the Egyptian frontier. Haifa and Jaffa, ports, would be operated in the common interest under an economic union of the two states.

INDIAN STATES IN NEW CRISIS

Murderous Riotings Could Plunge India Into Real War

Lahore, Pakistan, Sept. 1.—(AP)—The governments of the new dominions of Pakistan and India find themselves today in a crisis brought about by murderous religious and political rioting among their people which conceivably could plunge them into real war.

Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru mentioned that very danger in a news conference last Thursday in New Delhi. Nehru, prime minister of India, and prime minister Liaquat Ali Khan of Pakistan now are making a joint tour of the Punjab in an effort to restore peace.

Most observers feel that something will be worked out which will bring about a restoration of peaceful conditions and a look at the score sheet demonstrates why.

At midnight Sunday the experiment of a joint military boundary force of the two governments designed to restore peace to this rich but paralyzed Punjab was terminated.

While it was announced officially that the boundary force simply had found the job too big and that rioting had spread despite its best efforts, there was plenty of behind-the-scenes evidence that it never had a chance, never was popular, and that the people are now getting what they wanted—an army of each dominion specifically responsible for keeping the peace.

Grim Holiday

Accidental deaths during the labor day week end passed the 250 mark today as tourists turned homeward from summer's last big holiday.

Traffic mishaps accounted for 178 of the total of 256, while 35 lost their lives by drowning, and 43 from miscellaneous causes—11 of them in light plane crashes.

The National Safety Council had predicted a total motor accident toll of 250 for the long week end.

Paris, Sept. 1.—(AP)—American heiress Doris Duke and Porfirio Rubirosa, honorary Charge D'Affaires of the Dominican Republic in Paris, will be married at the Dominican Consulate between 2 and 5 P.M. (9 A. M. and noon EST) today, a Dominican consulate spokesman announced.

The tobacco heiress, now a fashion correspondent here for Harper's Bazaar, formerly was married to James H. R. Cromwell, one time U. S. minister to Canada.

Customs Union Cure

What Is Customs Union? A Possible Blessing For Weakened Europe; Sample Case Already In Effect; Possible Difficulties; Some U. S. Exporters Uncertain

Washington—Some of the doctors at the bedside of convalescent Europe are talking of a "customs union" for the continent.

The subject has come up both at Geneva, where world trade rules are being worked out, and at Paris, where the Europeans are trying to find out what they can do for themselves.

So what is a customs union? It is an agreement among two or more nations to charge no tariffs on the goods they buy from each other. The result is that consumers in those nations pay a little less for each other's goods. And the hope is that trade between the countries will pick up because of the lower prices.

There is such a union now in Europe among Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg. In diplomatic slang it's "Benelux" for the names of the three nations.

The nations balance each other happily. Belgium and tiny Luxembourg are two of the most highly industrialized areas in the world. The Netherlands turns out a good deal of food. They are in a good position to swap.

For years economists have thought Europeans were pretty blind to cut up their continent with all sorts of tariffs against each other's goods. It was as though California slapped a tariff on oranges from New York, and New York let in Florida oranges free but charged a fee on California oranges.

Part of the fabulous production of the United States stems from the fact that goods made here can be sold over so large an area—right in the country—without duties and tariffs tacked onto the prices.

There are possible big leaks in a customs union row-boat.

Take the Benelux union. Suppose Belgian prices began to rise because Belgium exported too much goods to France and England and goods got short at home. The Dutch would have to pay more for Belgian goods. But the Belgians, still paying the lower Dutch prices, would begin to buy more in the Netherlands. Belgian reserves of Dutch guilders (the money of the Netherlands) would begin to evaporate. The Belgian government would have to limit the goods its people bought from the Dutch.

NEILL HEADS LEGION UNTIL NEXT SESSION

Convention Closes After Adopting Militant Program Against Communism

New York, Sept. 1.—(AP)—The American Legion ended its 29th annual convention last night after adopting a militant program against communism, electing James F. O'Neill as national commander, and hearing a talk by former Gov. Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota in support of the Marshall Plan for aiding Europe.

O'Neill, now chief of police of his home city, Manchester, N.H., is a veteran of both World Wars and a former newspaperman. He succeeded Paul H. Griffith of Uniontown, Pa.

Except for debate on the Marshall Plan and on housing, the final all-day business session of the convention consisted largely of convention approval of hundreds of resolutions and committee reports in which opposition to communism, both at home and in the international sphere, was the dominant note.

The same note figured in Stassen's remarks. The announced candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, rising on the convention floor to speak against a minority report of the Legion's foreign relations committee, said:

"There are two plans for Europe. One is the Marshall Plan. The other is the Communist Plan. If you oppose the Marshall Plan for European recovery, then you will give comfort and aid to the Communist Plan."

The majority report supporting the Marshall Plan was adopted.

Sen. George Malone (R-Nev.), who led the argument for the minority report, had said the committee majority was "rubber-stamping the State Department" and its report was based on "the theory that money alone will stop communism." The minority report, however, approved of advancing some funds to foreign nations provided "the credit and economic integrity of the United States were not jeopardized."

The delegates adopted the national defense committee report urging that atomic secrets be withheld from "any nation, friendly or otherwise," and urging adoption of Universal Military Training by a special session of Congress. Appointment of a presidential advisory committee to organize civilian defense against atomic attack was recommended.

Reaffirm Intent To Continue School Boycott

Kinston, N.C., Sept. 1.—(AP)—The Wheat Swamp Consolidated School in Lenoir County opened for its third day of classes today with almost 300 students still out in a boycott their parents said would continue until the four remaining members of the district school committee resign.

Patrons in a meeting over the weekend reaffirmed their intention to continue the boycott. They have named a committee to present their case to the State Board of Education which meets in Raleigh Thursday.

Seven buses this morning brought 124 students to the school of a normal daily attendance of 419. Neither Principal D. W. Mottor nor County School Superintendent E. E. Sams indicated he would take action under the state's compulsory attendance law before the Thursday meeting.

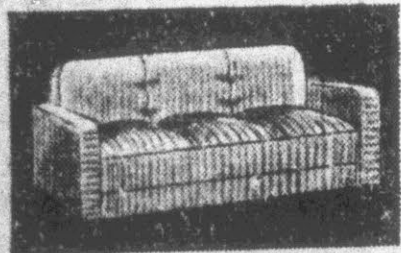

When Moreau de St. Mary arrived in Norfolk, Va., in 1794 after a voyage across the Atlantic involving unbelievable hardships, he wrote in his diary: "At last I am on this hospitable soil, on this land of freedom, this land which, if the inhabitants are wise, should one day surround the rest of the universe by its power and perhaps impose upon the universe the law of being happy like itself."

That, as of matter of fact, is the enterprise to which America seems to be committed. We are not trying to make other nations take our form of government or our economic system, but we are insisting that people the world over have the right to choose and administer governments which meet their needs and temperaments.

What has made America a land widely envied, although widely criticized? The criticism probably arises from American self-assurance and an inveterate disposition to boast about biggest and best. The envy arises from the fact that America is a place of opportunity. It was settled almost exclusively by people of the middle class who knew they would have to work to be successful and happy and who forthwith set to work.

America is a nation of workers. Therein lies her glory. We English-speaking folk on this North American continent, Canadians and Americans alike, are bound together by a heritage of freedom and by a sense of the dignity of work.

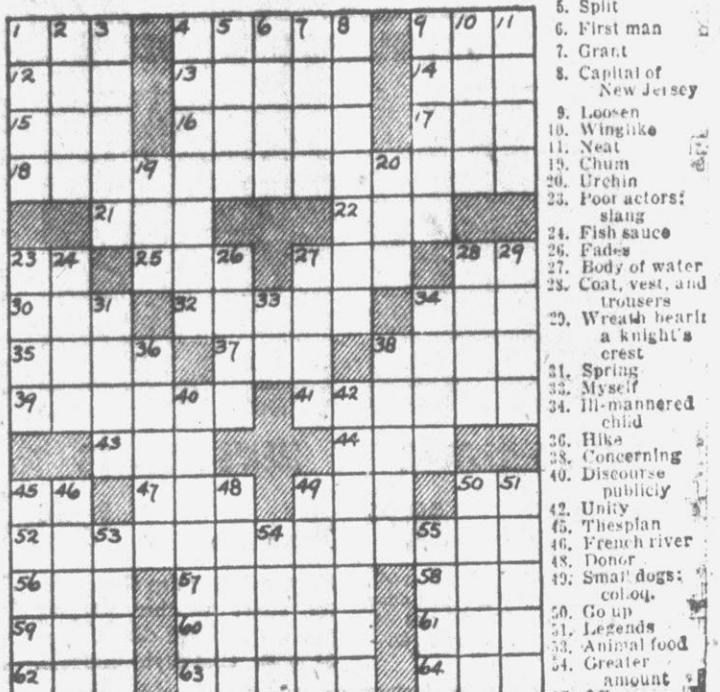

that the Communist Party be outlawed as a political party in the United States. However, "aggressive communism" is at the moment a general rather than a specific designation, and covers a very broad field.

If and when any nation of the Eastern Hemisphere "raises a finger to force communism onto any country of the Western Hemisphere, "aggressive communism" will cease to be a generic phrase and will apply specifically to the nation sponsoring it. Then the reinforced Monroe Doctrine will come into action.

Because of this communistic threat the defense of the Western Hemisphere really is divided into two parts: (1) Action against direct military attack, and (2) prevention of the spread of aggressive communism in Europe and Asia. The point is that the further the Red tide sweeps across the Eastern Hemisphere, the greater the danger to North and South America.

Inquest Tonight Farmville Into Negro's Death

Pitt County Coroner Griffin H. Rouse will hold an inquest at the City Hall in Farmville tonight into the death of Melvin (Neb) Vines, 23-year-old Farmville Negro, in Farmville Saturday night, August 16.

Farmville Police Chief L. T. Lucas said Policemen Redding, Fields and J. A. Gregory shot and killed the Negro while he was attacking Gregory and resisting arrest. The policeman, coming in the police car, heard a disturbance at a store in a Negro section of Farmville, Gregory, who wears glasses, went behind the store to arrest Vines for being drunk and disorderly. The chief said the Negro struck Gregory with his fist in the eye, seriously cutting it, and then was beating the officer while on the ground.

Policemen Fields went to Gregory's rescue, and Vines continued to fight. Both officers said they shot the man in self-defense. No charge was placed against them.

Policemen Gregory spent some time in a Wilson hospital for treatment. The sight of his eye was considerably impaired.

jam. They say the next step, ideally, would be to create a common money.

Also they say there would have to be some production planning so that factory and farm prices would stay in a constant relation to each other.

Some American exporters are worried under a European customs union. Swiss typewriters (for example) might enter France tariff free while, presumably, American typewriters would still have a tariff attached. And so on down the line of U.S. goods sold in Europe.

The opposite argument runs: "But we've got to help Europe back to its feet for our own political security and to get back our old markets. Remember the money we lent Europe. Remember that world politics will probably force us to lend more. We won't get that money back unless Europe recovers."

the interference, attacked Hopkins with a knife, and Hopkins ran onto David Lee Clark's porch, 108 East First street, dodged the blade and it stuck into a board on the house and broke off, and that Hopkins used his fist to knock Ward off the porch.

Ward said, "You stay here and I am coming back and kill you." Hop-

kings then went to his own home, 15 Cotanche street and went inside. In a few minutes he heard warnings from persons on the street that Ward was "coming with a pistol." Police said Ward fired three shots into Hopkins' house, one of the bullets slightly grazing his stomach. Police quoted Hopkins as saying that he then got his shotgun and when Ward approached the door he fired. The blast struck his assailant in the abdomen. Hopkins said that Ward fired his pistol twice after the shotgun blast struck him.

Ward died several hours later in Pitt General Hospital here.

Detective M. E. Corbett and Policemen Hill and Peterson investigated the shooting.

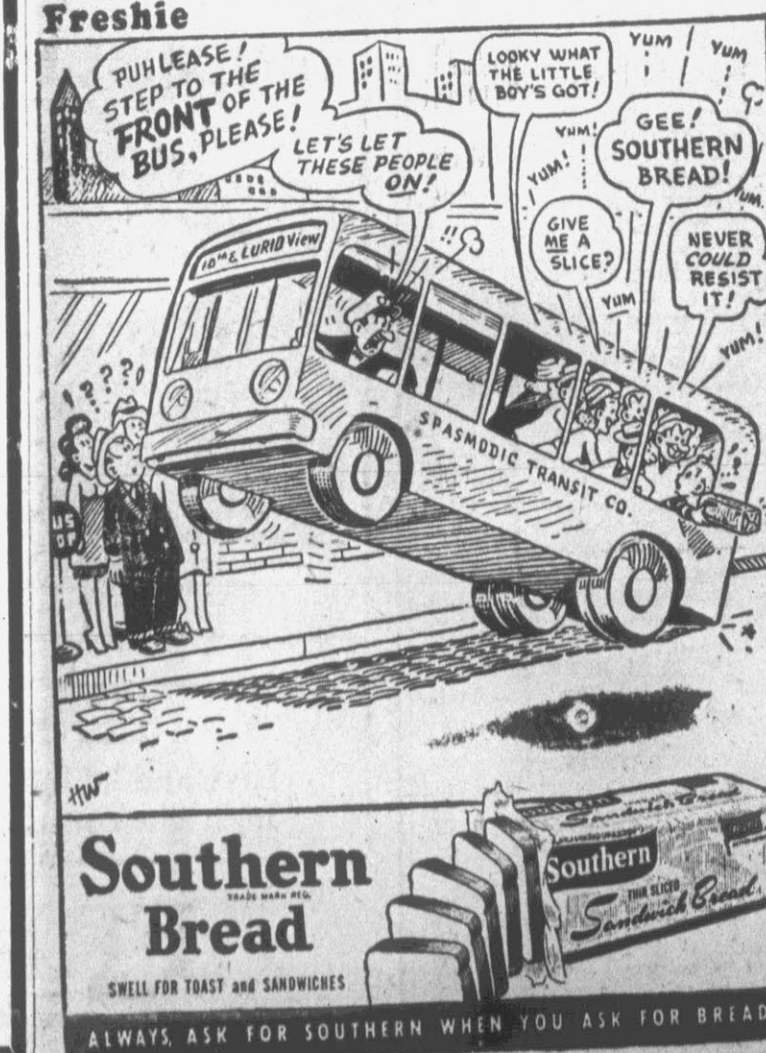
