

Bevin Elaborates Gold Distribution

Proposal Integral Part of British Views on Marshall Plan; Congressmen Skeptical; Britain Receives Bevin Plan Somewhat Placidly

London, Sept. 4.—(AP)—An authoritative American source today said that Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin's proposal for redistribution of the Fort Knox gold was in the British view, to be an integral part of the Marshall Plan for aiding European economic recovery.

The informant said Bevin had made the suggestion informally in an exchange with U. S. Ambassador Lewis W. Douglas before announcing it publicly yesterday at the trade union congress in Southport.

In the course of a 70-minute talk today with American congressmen who are investigating economic conditions in Britain and western Europe, the foreign secretary gave several more details of his proposal, this source added.

Bevin's elucidation of his proposal for redistributing U. S. gold stocks came in answer to a question from one of the congressmen and the informant said the foreign secretary made these points:

His proposal had the backing of the British government.

He believed it was unhealthy and unsound economics, out of harmony with the principles of multilateral trade which the United States herself was urging, for one country to hold most of the world's gold stocks and not use them.

There would be no lasting settlement of Europe's economic difficulties if continental recovery was to depend on never-ending U. S. loans.

Gold could become the basis of world currency systems and every nation should have access to it.

The informant said Bevin's elucidation of his proposal was received "somewhat skeptically" by the U. S. congressmen. A member of the delegation said "it just doesn't make sense."

Ambassador Douglas introduced the legislation to the foreign secretary.

Britain, for the most part, received the Bevin proposal placidly. His reference to Fort Knox gold attracted relatively little attention here.

New President Wants Ibarra To Remain Away

Quito, Ecuador, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Dr. Mariano Suarez Veintimilla, 73, has been named as the new president of Ecuador, but he is expected to remain away from the country.

He told reporters last night he thought that Velasco Ibarra's return would tend to cause disorder. He added, however, that if the former president should return, his personal security would be protected.

Meanwhile, Col. Carlos Manchene, ousted from leadership by Suarez Tuesday, was disclosed to have taken refuge in the Venezuelan embassy while he waited for a passport.

Ground For Anxiety

Report That Europe's Economic Crisis Is Developing Faster Than Expected Is Bad News For U. S.; Over-All Picture; Reasons Why We Must Intervene

Ground for anxiety—though not surprising—is American Undersecretary of State Lovett's report in Washington that Europe's economic crisis is developing much faster than expected and that the United States may have to take some kind of emergency action before the end of the year.

Representative Hays, Arkansas Democrat, just back from a European tour, pinned the thing down more closely. He told reporters that in all probability it will be necessary for Congress to meet before January, "assuming that the Marshall plan will take shape by that time and that we will have something definite and substantial to work on."

Lovett attributes the speedy worsening of the situation to two main causes: (1) The effects of the British economic crisis have been very contagious, he believes. (2) Many countries have had to divert their resources from production to such non-productive purchases as foodstuffs. In this connection their troubles have been added to by such afflictions as floods and droughts. There also has been mismanagement.

It is true that one bad apple in the bin presses on its decay to others. It is also true that nature has played sorry pranks of the stricken continent. The grain crops in virtually all countries except Russia have been reduced by drought. The Soviet Union has been favored by weather and has done well.

The over-all picture is a grim one. The three main supporters of the pre-war European structure—Britain, France and Germany—are badly

ADMIT GIVING OVERSEAS PAY ON BIG SCALE

Thousands Of Navy Men Got \$100 Bonus Without Service Outside U.S.

Washington, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Thousands of navy men have collected an extra \$100 in mustering out pay for overseas service simply for travel through Canada or Mexico and one group of football players got it for a weekend in Havana.

This was acknowledged today by navy officials who explained that under navy regulations travel outside the United States is counted the same as overseas service for the purpose of computing mustering out payments.

These payments are \$20 to those who have seen service only in the continental United States and \$300 for those who have had overseas service.

An officer, asking not to be quoted by name, related this story of the football players:

The University of Havana paid all expenses including air travel, for a 35-man football squad from the amphibious training station at Port Pierce, Fla., in December, 1945.

The squad, which won the exhibition game 55 to 23, traveled on official orders and under navy regulations. As a result several members of the team, including one officer, qualified for \$300 mustering out pay instead of \$200.

The officer said most of the American players were combat veterans and were entitled to the \$300 anyway, but that shortly after the team returned to the United States and the "being demobilized," several members who had never been out of the United States before asked for their Havana travel orders so as to establish their claims to the extra \$100 when discharged.

Cabinet Resigns

Budapest, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Hungary's four-party coalition cabinet resigned formally today and was asked by President Zoltan Tildy to carry on its work until a government is formed after the newly elected Parliament is convened Sept. 15.

The discord among the four parties in the Communist-dominated coalition apparently has eased. Reliable informants said even Social Democrat ministers attended today's cabinet meeting.

Atomic Products Shared For Combatting Disease

St. Louis, Sept. 4.—(AP)—The United States today started a new program of sharing some "tracer" atoms from atomic ovens with foreign countries—a move hailed by scientists as promising quicker conquests over cancer and other diseases.

There were also immediate suggestions that the action might serve as a trail-blazer to smooth achievement of international control over the atom bomb and atomic energy.

President Truman announced the decision in a message last night to scientists of 44 nations at the fourth international Cancer Research Congress. He asserted it would "help reduce loss of life and human suffering from diseases throughout the world."

None of the 20 radioactive elements offered for sale to foreign countries can be applied to developing atomic energy for military or industrial uses, the Atomic Energy Commission said. Sales will not include either plutonium or uranium, or give the slightest clues to any atom bomb secrets. Supplies at the outset will be limited.

Foreign users will be required to report for the benefit of everyone their findings on the tracer researches, to make progress reports semi-annually to the AEC, and to open their laboratories to qualified visiting scientists of any nationality.

President Truman expressed hope that "the open, impartial and truly international character of medical research will carry over into the realm of other problems of world concern."

At Oak Ridge, Tenn., the AEC said it would begin as soon as possible to fulfill several foreign requests for the radio-isotopes.

"Mrs. America" Contest Opens

Fort Lee, N.J., Sept. 4.—(AP)—Sixty females with husbands as well as looks started the annual competition yesterday for the title of "Mrs. America."

While 54 unmarried beauties battled for the "Miss America" crown at Atlantic City, the married variety paraded at Palisades Amusement Park in a three-day competition scheduled to end tomorrow night.

Fifteen women were selected from among the 60 in last night's competition and a second group of 15 will be chosen tonight, these 30 then competing tomorrow in the finals.

Another Complaint Filed On Railroads

New Multi-Million Dollar Action Brought By Government Overcharges On Wartime Shipments

Washington, Sept. 4.—(AP)—In a new multi-million dollar action, the government today filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission a claim against the nation's railroads for alleged overcharges on wartime shipments of explosives and ammunition.

The government's complaint, filed by the Justice Department, does not give any specific figure which the government seeks to recover from 77 railroad companies, but officials estimated that between \$30,000,000 and \$40,000,000 is involved.

The petition to ICC for investigation and reparations order (for repayment of overcharges) is the eighth in a series of complaints which the Justice Department has made concerning the wartime freight charges by railroads.

Altogether, hundreds of millions of dollars are involved.

The previous complaints alleged overcharges on interior storage of military equipment awaiting shipment overseas, on the hauling of steel and aluminum airplane landing mats, and other items.

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HOOVER VIEW ENDORSED BY ONE SENATOR

New Jersey Lawmaker Approves Opinion U.S. Provoked Entry Into War

Washington, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Senator Hawkes (R-N.J.) today endorsed Herbert Hoover's published opinion that the United States might have remained out of World War II while Democratic Congress members differed sharply with beliefs attributed to the former Republican President.

The comments came in the wake of an article in the current American Magazine quoting Hoover as saying "we never would have been attacked by the Japanese if it had not given them provocation."

Hoover also was quoted as saying: "My theory is that if we had kept out of the immediate conflict, we could have put our sword down on the table with our economic resources intact and made a decent peace when the time for peacemaking came."

Hawkes told a news conference that "I agree with what he (Hoover) said," and added "I think Japan and Germany would have been defeated without our active participation."

These Democrats took opposite viewpoints:

Senator Johnston (D-SC) to a reporter: "Mr. Hoover's hindsight appears to be as bad as his foresight. I'm not surprised at Mr. Hoover's statement because I recall that at one time he said prosperity was just around the corner. Now the question is how to keep out of another war. Mr. Hoover's tactics would probably plunge us into a third world war if we followed them."

Senator O'Manoney (Wyo.): Hoover's statement "made it quite clear why his four-year term as President was a complete failure. He is unable to see the facts of modern international relations, much less propose the solution."

Senator Hatch (N.M.): "My only comment at this time is one of regret that a distinguished former President of the United States deemed it proper to make the remarks concerning the war and our participation attributed to him."

PUT OFF VOTE OF CONFIDENCE

Greek Cabinet Survives One Crisis; Awaits Action Saturday

Athens, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Premier Constantinos Tsaldaris' populist (royalist) cabinet weathered one crisis—a threatened vote of confidence—tonight and Parliament decided tonight to postpone until Saturday action on Tsaldaris' request for a vote of confidence.

The right wing, one-party government controls only 131 of the 354 votes in Parliament—37 less than a majority—and has been reported unsatisfactory to U. S. diplomats here, said to be desirous of a more broadly representative setup.

Greek officials said that the government had granted pay raises of 25 to 50 per cent to some 72,000 civil servants and that the latter had called off a strike set for today.

The workers had demanded higher pay to meet higher living costs. The government yesterday sought to meet their threat by decreeing their "mobilization" under which they might be fired or jailed for striking.

The government was reported today to have decided to discharge 15,000 civil servants inside of six months in an economy move suggested by the American mission to aid Greece with \$300,000,000 in supplies.

Real Estate Men Plead Innocent To Indictment

Washington, Sept. 4.—(AP)—The National Association of Real Estate Boards and the Washington Real Estate Board pleaded innocent today to a federal indictment charging violation of the anti-trust laws.

The indictment announced last week charges the two boards conspired to fix commission rates for real estate dealers in the District of Columbia.

William E. Leahy, counsel for the Washington board, and Roger J. Whitford, attorney for the NAREB, were granted permission by Federal Judge Jennings Bailey to withdraw the plea and file an additional plea or other motion by Oct. 15.

The proceedings required less than five minutes.

Robinson Is Exonerated By Board Of Education

Caldwell County School Superintendent Is Cleared Of Any Connection With Payroll-Padding Charged To Fritz

Raleigh, Sept. 4.—(AP)—The State Board of Education today unanimously exonerated Caldwell County School Superintendent Robinson in connection with the irregular manner in which his subordinate, Hudson School Principal R. L. Fritz, Jr., kept his payroll.

Member A. McL. Graham of Clinton, of the State Board, who made the original motion to summon Robinson before the board, said he believed Robinson had completely cleared himself. Member H. E. Stacy of Lenoir then moved that Robinson be exonerated.

J. H. Pritchett, attorney for Caldwell County School Board, read affidavits from several employees of the superintendent's office tending to corroborate Robinson's contention that he had no knowledge of payroll padding and from 13 principals who outlined their system of keeping payrolls. One, from Principal J. H. Mellon, of Caldwell county school, said that teachers were given their checks and they in turn paid their substitutes. He said the checks were never endorsed back to the principal, as Fritz allegedly had several of his teachers to do.

Fritz told the State Board previously that his system was used by a number of other principals in the state.

Robinson earlier had told the board that he had no knowledge of the manner in which Fritz kept his payroll.

The board then received a number of requests that it rescind its action in revoking the teaching certificate of Fritz. One of Fritz's supporters was Paul Pugh of Hudson County.

Ohioan Claims President Using "Synthetic" Crises

Washington, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Rep. Bender (R-Ohio) contended today that President Truman is creating "synthetic" international crises for political purposes.

A consistent critic of Administration foreign policy, Bender said in a statement the President "is trying to create a situation in which his cohorts will argue that we should not change the Democratic rule in midstream."

"I can see only one purpose to Mr. Truman's present course in foreign affairs," Bender said. "That is the political purpose of moving from one international crisis to another to establish himself as a leader who should not be abandoned in the midst of a virtual state of war."

The Ohio lawmaker added that he has asked Chairman Taber (R-N.Y.) of the House Appropriations Committee to undertake a thorough investigation of what he called "the Truman Doctrine" and "the Truman-Marshall Doctrine."

There was no immediate Administration rebuttal to Bender.

Several congressional committees, including a special group composed of members of the appropriations and Armed Services Committees, already have begun investigations abroad into both the Marshall plan for European recovery and the Greek-Turkish program designed to block Communist expansion in those countries.

Bender contended that United States action in Greece "demonstrates the stubbornness with which the President and his Administration are pursuing their present course, to the detriment of our prestige as a nation and the cause of international peace x x x."

Continue Fight In Indonesia

Batavia, Java, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Gunfire crackled along the frontlines of Java and Sumatra tonight as the first month of the cease-fire order, sponsored by the United Nations, ended. Not a day has passed in which both the Dutch and Indonesians did not report new fighting.

The Dutch, for instance, reported 14 new clashes on the islands yesterday and accused the Indonesians of systematically disturbing law and order in an attempt to convince the outside world that the Dutch were incapable of maintaining peace and security.

Officials Expect Secretary Of State To Make Views Known Within Two Weeks; Await Arrival Of Top Policy Planner; European Crisis Draws Attention

Washington, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Secretary of State Marshall is expected to decide within the next two weeks whether to recommend a special session of Congress for emergency action on the European economic crisis.

Marshall's decision, officials said today, probably will be made shortly after George F. Kennan, the secretary's top policy planner, returns from Paris with the latest information from European officials and American authorities there.

The final decision would be up to President Truman. He has said several times that he would not hesitate to recall the lawmakers if the situation required such a step.

Marshall himself is just back from the Rio de Janeiro conference on inter-American defense and is scheduled to appear with Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) on a 30-minute radio broadcast at 9:30 p. m. (EST) tonight to report to the nation on the work of the conference. The American and Mutual networks will carry the program.

It appeared certain that once that chore is completed Marshall's attention will be largely devoted to the European crisis. Shortly before the cabinet officer's return by plane to Washington yesterday afternoon, Undersecretary of State Lovett told a news conference that the situation in Europe is getting rapidly worse.

Lovett said he feels certain that before the end of this year the United States will be compelled to face the hard facts of European necessity. He made it clear that reports from American observers at Paris have presented the crisis as much worse than the American government previously had calculated.

Gandhi Breaks Threatened Fast

Calcutta, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Mohandas K. Gandhi tonight broke the fast he threatened to keep until peace was restored between Hindus and Moslems in Calcutta.

Just 73 hours after he began his fast Monday, the beloved spiritual leader of India's Hindu millions, accepted a glass of lime juice mixed with bicarbonate of soda. He had taken nothing but water during the fast.

Catch Prisoners After Gunfight

San Onofre, Calif., Sept. 4.—(AP)—Six escaped Marine Corps prisoners, armed with two carbine rifles, were cornered in heavy brush on a beach near here today and captured after 20 minutes of gunplay, the State Highway Patrol reported.

Highway Patrolman Al Bisgard, who was at the scene, said he believed one prisoner was wounded. The prisoners escaped from Camp Pendleton yesterday in a stolen truck.

Biggest Pile Of Gold

Washington, Sept. 4.—(AP)—The world's biggest pile of gold is back in the news.

It happened yesterday when Ernest Bevin, the British foreign secretary, suddenly proposed that the United States "redistribute the Fort Knox gold."

Bevin's speech at Southport, England, started a first-class mystery—the mystery of what Bevin meant, how the plan would work, and what good it would do.

Another Associated Press reporter and spent hours talking with Treasury officials and private economists, and not a one of them professed to understand exactly what Bevin had in mind.

The speech also revived people's curiosity concerning the monstrous hoard of yellow bars, twelve thousand tons of them, in Kentucky.

Let's pay a little visit to Fort Knox, 30 miles southwest of Louisville.

First we find that only part of America's gold is there.

The governments of the world now have a grand total of about \$38,000,000,000 in monetary gold—that is, gold used to back up paper money.

About \$21,800,000,000 of this is owned by the U. S. government. And about \$12,500,000,000 of that is stacked in a heavily-guarded two-story building in a field at Fort Knox.

This gold is in bricks which, although they are only about six inches long, weigh about 27 1/2 pounds each. There are roughly 892,000 of these bricks, stacked without so much as a wrapper

around them.

The bricks are in a great vault two stories high, one level in the basement and the other on the ground floor. The gold is stacked on both levels. The vault door weighs more than 40,000 pounds. No one man knows the full combination.

The building was put up in 1936 because the government was getting so much gold that it needed a place to store it.

Today the U. S. gold that isn't at Fort Knox is in various cities, in buildings owned by the Bureau of the Mint. For example, \$5,700,000,000 is at Denver, \$2,900,000,000 is at New York, and \$417,000,000 is at San Francisco.

Presumably Bevin meant this gold, too. He said "the Fort Knox gold." And he said "doing nothing."

What is our gold doing, anyhow? Treasury officials say it is part of our money system.

It gives the people confidence, simply by being there. It backs up the currency—though this doesn't mean you can take a dollar bill to the government and get gold for it.

It also shows the rest of the world that if this country should import more goods than we ship to other countries, we have the gold to pay the difference. Gold is accepted as money everywhere.

How did the government get all this gold?

It bought it—some from American mining companies, but most of it from other countries. These countries

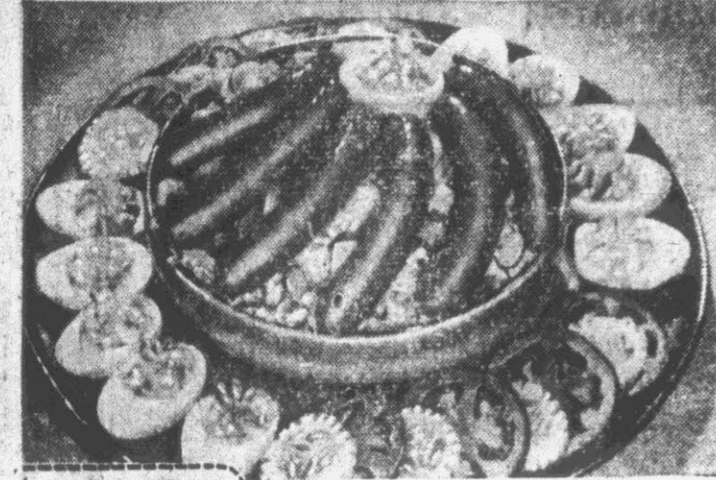

Twenty-One Week Textile Mill Walkout Ends

Rockingham, N. C., Sept. 4—(AP) R. C. Thomas, representative of the CIO Textile Workers Union of America, said today the union has called off a 21-week strike at the 78,000-spindle Safe Textile Mill here.

L. C. Finley, mill superintendent, said the strike ended last night. He said the mill now is operating two full shifts of 500 workers each and 40 per cent of a third shift. The mill, which normally employed 1,300 workers, had been closed or restricted in operation since the TWUA called a strike April 16 after it said management had discriminated against union members.

The union claims that it won a National Labor Relations Board election as exclusive bargaining agent at the mill by 49 votes. The TWUA claimed that four of its members employed at the mill were discharged unfairly.

CIO Unions Expected To By-Pass NLRB

Washington, Sept. 3—(AP)—Very strong prospects arose today that CIO unions will by-pass the National Relations Board for the time being without announcing a clear-cut decision on the issue of non-communist affidavits.

The affidavits are required by the Taft-Hartley act as a condition to using any facilities of the NLRB.

The CIO's nine vice-presidents, President Philip Murray and Secretary-Treasurer James B. Carey are to meet in Pittsburgh tomorrow to consider the question. They are the key figures in the controversy stirred by a ruling of NLRB general counsel Rober Denham that no CIO union can come before the board unless all the top CIO officers sign the affidavit.

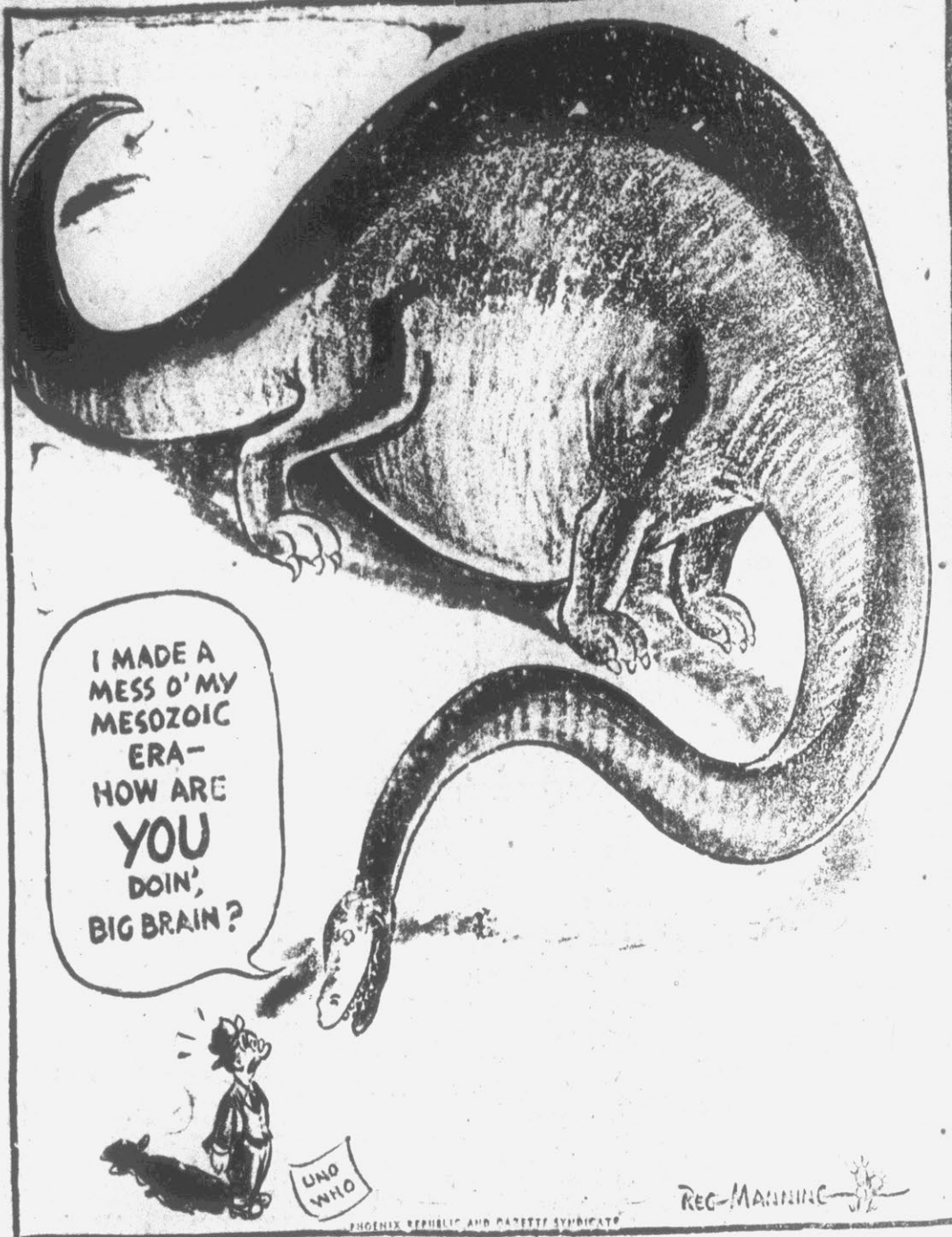

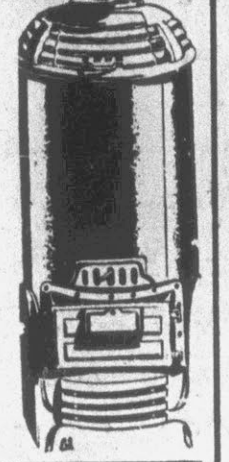

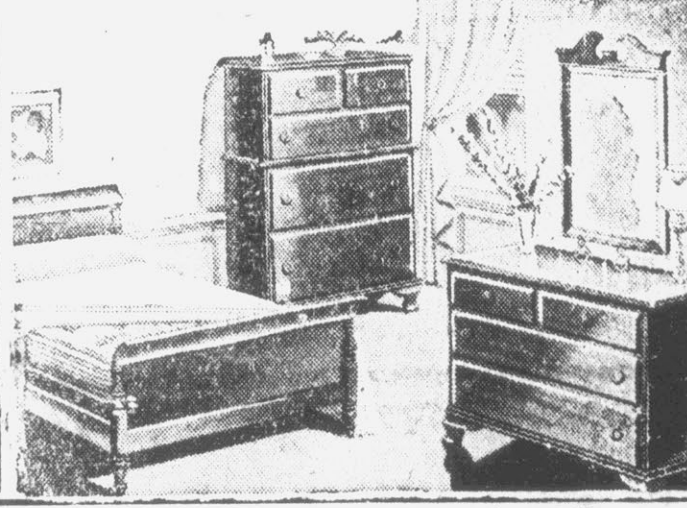

Strike Spreads

London, Sept. 4-(AP)-The wildcat strike in the nationalized British coal mines spread to two more pits today, leaving nearly 60,000 men idle and aggravating the British fuel shortage.

A total of 48 pits in Yorkshire were closed by the strike. Production elsewhere was curtailed, imperiling the government recovery program centered around factory output for export.

SERIOUSLY INJURED.

Robert Strickland, 30-year-old carpenter of Bell Arthur, who fell 50 feet from the roof of the enlarged electric power plant building to a cement floor yesterday morning, is in a serious condition at Pitt General Hospital with a broken back.

Robert Grimley, 18-year-old carpenter's helper, who fell with Strickland, was painfully injured and is expected to pull through, a hospital spokesman said today.

The men were attaching large asbestos composition sheets to the roof of the building when they fell.

Gov't To End Case In Kansas City Vote Trial

Kansas City, Sept. 4-(AP)-The government was expected to conclude its case today in a federal vote fraud trial growing out of an investigation of the 1946 Kansas City primary election.

The five defendants on trial, precinct election officials and party workers, were among 34 persons indicted by a special federal grand jury.

Yesterday Mrs. Nellie Bowles, a government witness, identified Morris Klein, one of the defendants as the person she saw distributing money outside a precinct polling place on election day. She testified she did not know what the money was for.

The government questioned a score of persons who testified they voted for Roger C. Slaughter or for Jerome Walsh in the Missouri fifth congressional district Democratic race.

He Has No Feet, But Marcus Can Play Ball

New Orleans, Sept. 4-(AP)-Eight-year-old Marcus Speed returned to school today.

In an early-morning ball game he ran almost as fast as the other kids—but they had feet and Marcus didn't. His "feet" were heavy cloth wrappings, bound tightly around his slim ankles.

Marcus lost both feet when he fell under a train in December.

FAVOR REDUCED CROP.

Greensboro, Sept. 4-(AP)-The North Carolina State Grange's executive committee today was on record recommending that the U. S. Department of Agriculture take immediate action for reducing tobacco acreage allotments to the limit permitted under law for the 1948 crop.
