

NEGRO KILLED HIS ATTACKER SELF-DEFENSE

Corener's Jury Recommends Exoneration Joe Frank Hopkins, Negro

By CHESTER WALSH At an inquest at the City Hall last night a coroner's jury found that James Ward, 30-year-old Negro, came to his death last Saturday by a shotgun blast from Joseph Frank Hopkins, 28-year-old Negro, in self-defense and recommended that Hopkins be exonerated.

It was testified that Hopkins and Ward had an affair at David L. Clark's house, 108 East First st., last Saturday afternoon; that Ward attacked Hopkins, who fled with a knife; that Ward went home and got his pistol and said he was going to kill Hopkins; that he went to Hopkins home and shot several shots into it, one of them slightly grazing Hopkins' body; that then Hopkins fired a blast at Ward, who was approaching the door; that Ward fell, mortally wounded, and that he fired his pistol twice after he fell. He died several hours later at a hospital.

It was testified that Hopkins reported the shooting to police and that when he learned of Ward's death he surrendered. L. C. Edwards released his nominal bond and he was released.

Demonstration Of New Tractor Next Friday

A special demonstration campaign of International Harvester Company's new, small, low-cost Farmall Cub tractor has been arranged by Greenville Equipment Co. for one day beginning Friday Sept. 12th at 1 p. m., 2 miles from Serve-U Filling Station on Ayden Highway.

An invitation to participate in the demonstration "to get the feel" of the all-purpose Farmall Cub at work is extended to all branch officials and dealers and the public so that they can determine first hand the economy and efficiency of this small farm power plant.

"The Farmall Cub represents the latest step in the evolution of farm mechanization. Its development readily meets the power requirements of the nation's 3,000,000 farmers having an annual gross income of \$400 or less.

"Designed specifically for use by small general farms, industrial workers who divide their time between industry and the farm, truck farm operators, orchardists and large general farms needing auxiliary units, the Farmall Cub is being introduced into the Farmall tractor line in response to the desire of the small acreage farmer to compete on a comparable basis with farmers of larger tracts.

"Pulling a single 12-inch moldboard plow, the Farmall Cub will plow up to 3 1/2 acres per 10 hours in most soils, and will cultivate one to four rows of crops at a rate of better than one acre per hour. And yet, the fuel consumption of its four-cylinder, four-cycle engine under maximum load is considerably less than one gallon of gasoline per hour."

The Farmall Cub weighs 1,200 pounds and has approximately 9 1/4-horsepower on the belt and 8 on the drawbar.
