TREND MAY BE LONG SOUGHT TURNING POINT

Grain, Butter And Egg Futures Continue Price Declines In Chicago

By the Associated Press The prolonged price slump in grains was reversed at the opening of the Chicago Board of Trade today, but prices moved down somewhat again in the first few minutes of trading.

The exchanges and wholesale commodities price levels, which moved generally lower last week, were watched for an indication of whether a turning point in the record high cost of living might be near.

A forecast for scattered light frosts in parts of the midwest and indications of a good flour business over the weekend gave the Chicago grain market a strong opening, with wheat as much as 1-2 cents higher and corn up as much as eight cents, the daily limit.

Elsewhere, meanwhile, there was a rising chorus of pleas for voluntary rationing or government control of prices and distribution of scarce commodities.

Wheat closed out the week with losses of as much as 38 cents a bushel, corn as much as 32 cents, and oats 20 cents. Setbacks in cattle prices ranged from a few cents to several dollars a hundredweight.

Steps To Beat Food Shortages Outlined

Hoover Calls For Voluntary Food Rationing And Conservation To Save Rest Of World From Starvation

New York, Sept. 22—(AP)—Herbert Hoover said last night that the 1947 world harvest may yield as little as that of 1945 and he outlined steps needed "if large areas of the world are to be saved from mass starvation."

"Due to the failure of agricultural recovery in Europe and Asia, together with devastating droughts in other parts of the world—including the American corn crop—the next 12 months will be a grim food year," Hoover said.

The situation, Hoover said, calls for these steps: 1. American farmers "must resist the natural tendency" to feed bread grains to animals at a time when coarse grains are scarce.

2. "Unnecessary human consumption and waste of food" must be stopped. Hoover added that "such measures, in order to secure the best results, must be largely voluntary."

3. The world deficit can be met "only if we have full cooperation from the other surplus-producing countries and drastic control of distribution and elimination of black markets in the deficit countries."

4. Price increases which he said could "be very largely ascribed to over-exports of food" have complicated the situation. "The remedies for price increases lie in handling of exports with an eye to keeping prices down, in the stoppage of speculation and waste," Hoover said.

General Asserts Japs Displaying No Animosity

Asheville, N.C., Sept. 22—(AP)—Lt. Gen. Robert Eichelberger, commander of the United States occupation troops in Japan, says after arriving at his Asheville home for a visit there is virtually no bitterness by the Japanese against his soldiers.

The 61-year-old infantryman, who married the former Emma Guder of Asheville, says the Japanese get along with occupation soldiers because "we have worked tremendously hard on discipline and the United States feeding not only its occupation forces but also sending in food for use by Japanese in bombed out cities."

The general arrived here by plane Saturday afternoon after a flight from Tokyo. He will be here several days before going to Washington, where he expects to be on duty about a month before returning to aid Gen. MacArthur.

Robot Flight

Washington, Sept. 22—(AP)—The United States air force announced that a four-engine C-54 Skymaster plane today completed the first trans-Atlantic flight in history without a pilot at the controls.

The transport took off from Stephensville, Newfoundland, at 5 p. m. yesterday and ten hours and 15 minutes later landed at Brise Norton, 40 miles west of London.

The completely automatic flight was completed at 2490 miles. It was an experiment by the air force.

The flight was accomplished by self-controlled pre-set mechanisms. No "mother ship" accompanied the plane.

Cabinet Committee On Food To See President

Washington, Sept. 22—(AP)—A cabinet food committee agreed today on future food exports they will recommend to President Truman. Secretary of Agriculture Anderson announced the agreement to reporters, but declined to give any details. The committee meets with the President at 2 p. m.

The food committee meeting, held the first of a series of top administration conferences, including a cabinet luncheon, on the general problem of how the U. S. can help Europe meet emergency needs this winter.

A part of this question is the second one: Should Congress be called into special session to speed aid? The food committee meeting, held in Anderson's office, was attended by Secretary of State Marshall, Secretary of Commerce Harriman, Undersecretary of State Lovett, Secretary of War Royal, Undersecretary of Agriculture Dodd, and food experts of the state, commerce and agriculture departments.

The cabinet committee is composed of Marshall, Anderson and Harriman. Marshall declined to discuss the meeting except to say that he was satisfied with the results. Because of this year's short crop, Anderson indicated Saturday that he would recommend that the grain exports this crop year be cut substantially below last year's 575,000,000 bushels.

New selling hours for the markets, effective today, were announced by the flour-cured marketing committee yesterday.

The border belt markets will continue on a five-hour day through this week and then the ones still open will be cut to 90 per cent of a normal four-hour sales day. Selling time on the Eastern North Carolina belt was reduced from five hours to four hours a day. The middle belt will continue on a four-hour sales day until Oct. 6, when it will increase to a five-hour day, and the old belt will open with a three and a half hour day for the rest of the week. This will be increased to four hours starting Sept. 29, and to five hours starting Oct. 13.

Old Belt Begins Sales Tomorrow; New Selling Hours

Raleigh, N.C., Sept. 22—(AP)—The old belt of North Carolina and Virginia, last of the five flour-cured tobacco belts to open its 1947 season, will begin sales tomorrow.

The Georgia-Florida belt was the first of the five to open. All of its markets are now closed, but most markets of the South Carolina and North Carolina border belt are still open, and all markets of the Eastern North Carolina belt, and the middle belt of North Carolina are in operation.

Drag Pamlico For Missing Man Washington, N.C., Sept. 22—(AP)—Coast Guardsmen from Washington and New Bern today dragged the Pamlico River in this vicinity for Jack Wollard, 40, a farmer of near Bath, reported missing last night after a fishing boat containing a party of seven overturned in a storm.

Sheriff Wiley Rumley of Beaufort County said Wollard took a party of six friends from Rocky Mount on a fishing trip near Hawkins Landing. Guy Adams swam a half mile to shore for help.

What Bidault Skipped

French Minister Warned Little Hope Of Reconciliation Between Russia & U. S.; Russia Embarking On World Revolution; Can Rehabilitation Come In Time?

We shall be wise not to overlook French Foreign Minister Bidault's declaration before the U.N. Assembly that his delegation "deems it futile and dangerous to conceal the magnitude and seriousness of the crisis" growing out of the Russo-American clash, which is threatening the "very life" of the peace organization, and that it's only honest to say one doesn't see how the opposing views can be reconciled.

And why can't they be reconciled? Having given us something to ponder, M. Bidault side-stepped that issue—matter for discussion by the foreign minister of a country which is precariously situated in the no-man's land between the two dominant powers. However, we can fill in the gaps which he skipped. The real key to the situation is a fact upon which this columnist has been insisting because of its supreme importance, and it is this: Russia's generation-old program of world revolution for the establishment of totalitarian communism finally is in full swing. Not for one moment should we forget that, for the insidious ramifications of the

great offensive have penetrated every country on the globe. Its greatest success has been in Eastern Europe where a big new Red Empire has been built out of weak countries by strong arm methods in a short time, but already it has a grip on other war-torn nations like Italy.

This world revolution can't be reconciled with any other views. It can be stopped only if and when it comes up against an immovable barrier. Sweet words of wisdom won't turn the trick. Neither will harsh language.

What sort of barrier is needed? Does it mean war? Well, it could mean that, but it strikes me there are other possible ways of halting the Red tide. One encouraging point is that Russia doesn't want war— isn't prepared for war and can't be for many years to come. Naturally she could fight a strong defensive war, but not one of major aggression.

That being the case, the most effective barrier would be rehabilitation of European democracies so that they could defend themselves. (Continued on Page Four)

European Nations Pledge Self-Help

Sixteen Powers Of Western Europe Sign Program Laying Groundwork For Marshall Plan; Looking For \$19 Billions

Paris, Sept. 22—(AP)—Western Europe pledged itself to a program of self-help today and asked the United States to send it \$19,330,000,000 under a four-year Marshall plan as a means of averting economic catastrophe.

This program, the participating 16 nations declared, could enable Europe "to make her full contribution to the welfare of the world."

The request was made in a 20,000-word document which will be dispatched to Washington after its signing here today by representatives of the 16 nations which map-

ped their economic wants in Russian boycotted conferences held here for 70 days.

Only a 1,500-word summary was made public today; the text is now scheduled for publication next weekend.

"The American people, through their government and their Congress, will consider this program and determine whether the means can be found of supplying Europe's needs," the summary said. "If nothing is done, a catastrophe will develop as stocks become exhausted."

The report outlined a four-point self-help program "aimed at putting Europe on its feet by the end of 1951":

- 1. A strong production effort by each country. 2. The creation of internal financial stability. 3. Maximum cooperation among the 16 countries.

A solution of their trading deficit with the American continent, particularly by exports.

As part of the production effort, the conference envisaged: 1. Train production on a pre-war basis, with increases above the pre-war standard in potatoes, sugar, oils and fats.

2. Coal production above the 1938 level and one-third higher than in 1947 tonnage. 3. Electrical generating at 166 per cent, oil refining at 250 per cent and steel at 140 per cent in terms of 1938 production.

4. Inland transport facilities to carry one-fourth more than in 1938. 5. Restoration of pre-war merchant fleets by 1951.

New York, Sept. 22—(AP)—Preliminary investigation by Civil Aeronautics Board investigators indicates a fire in the inboard starboard engine nacelle caused a Pan American Clipper to fly the last 50 miles from Bermuda Saturday night on two of its four engines before crash landing here.

Washington, Sept. 22—(AP)—The Agriculture Department estimated today that last week's hurricane caused the loss of between five and seven million boxes of citrus fruit in Florida.

London, Sept. 22—(AP)—The British government called out troops again today to transport meat from Smithfield Market, London's largest meat distribution center, crippled by a spreading wildcat strike of truck drivers.

Portland, Ore., Sept. 22—(AP)—William Z. Foster, national chairman of the Communist party in the United States, told a small party assembly here last night that Henry Wallace was the party's choice among prospective candidates for President in 1948.

Foster described Wallace as "the man upon whom the mantle of Roosevelt has fallen."

Portland, Ore., Sept. 22—(AP)—The hearings, to be held in the large caucus room of the old House office building, are expected to last several weeks.

They will be preceded by three days of hearings starting Wednesday in the committee's investigation of Hans Eisler, Hollywood song writer and brother of Gerhard Eisler. Gerhard Eisler has been identified in previous hearings as a key Communist.

Consumer Groups Asking Controls

New York, Sept. 22—(AP)—Representatives of four consumer groups today urged congress to restore price controls and rationing as the only means of averting a serious depression and impairment of health.

The groups particularly stressed high food prices in the opening session of the New York hearings of the eastern subcommittee of the joint congressional committee on the economic report.

Planes Enroute To Storm Area Elizabeth City, N.C., Sept. 22—(AP)—Three Coast Guard planes took off from the local air station Saturday afternoon enroute to New Orleans and the hurricane stricken areas, Commander E. E. Fahey, commanding officer of the station reported today.

Fahey said that all three planes were equipped with droppable lifeboats and would operate under the direction of the commandant of the Eighth Coast Guard District.

In addition to the three planes, two helicopter pilots from here were taken to New Orleans to operate two helicopters flown by the Army to the area from New York.

MAKE REPAIRS TO GENERATOR AT GE PLANT

Burned Out Coils And Others To Be Rewound In Schenectady Plant

By CHESTER WALSH The seven burned-out coils which put the Greenville Utilities big 5,000-kilowatt turbine generator out of commission last week and the 29 other coils have been sent to the General Electric Company's factory at Schenectady, N.Y., to be rewound, where the work can be done quicker and better. GE engineers recommended this. It is expected that the coils can be returned here and installed in about three weeks.

Complete re-winding of the generator coils will make the turbine as good as new. Supt. Marlin Swartz said today.

In the meantime the power plant is using two small generators, one 1,000-kilowatt and one 3,000-kilowatt. They do not make enough electric current to supply normal demands. To avoid overloading them and causing more trouble utilities authorities request consumers to turn off all lights, signs or appliances not urgently needed. If the plant will cooperate in this, the public will get by successfully. If the generators are overloaded, it will cause trouble and that will be serious.

Special request was made today that business places turn off electric signs during this emergency.

Street lights are only turned on when the indicator at the plant shows that the load on the generators is very light. The street lights burned a while Saturday morning as a result of the current being cut off of a particular circuit and the electric clock that turns on these lights had stopped. Street lights are now turned off by hand.

The plant is doing all possible to safeguard refrigeration and the preservation of foodstuff.

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Cooperatives Today

More Interest In Co-ops Since Prices Going Up; Unions Drive To Create More Of Them; How They Are Operated; Temporary Programs; "True Cooperatives"

Washington, Sept. 22—(AP)—High prices are causing more interest in cooperatives.

Labor unions, especially, have begun a drive to create more of them. To understand this, let's start with the question: What is a cooperative?

It is a business organization, run by the members for the benefit of the members without profits.

Some cooperatives are groups of "producers." For example, a group of farmers may band together to sell their products. Or they may band together to buy things they need, like fertilizer and gasoline.

Other cooperatives are "consumer cooperatives." For example, a group of citizens may band together and open a grocery store.

That's the kind of co-ops labor unions are interested in.

Last week, the CIO United Auto Workers announced that 40 of its local unions in Michigan have joined to buy carloads of food and other goods and sell them to their members at cost—that is, without profit.

Now this is not a full-fledged

consumer co-op. Instead, it is called "club buying" or "pooler purchasing." It is only an emergency program to fight the high cost of living.

A "true cooperative" is a long-range enterprise. The goods aren't sold at cost. They are sold at about the same prices as in other stores.

The customers benefit, not from lower prices across the counter, but from refunds at the end of the year.

"True cooperatives" are often called "Rochdale cooperatives" (the first village of Rochdale rhymes with Scotch).

The name comes from Rochdale, England, where a group of weavers got together in 1844, opened a store, and for the first time laid down the principles governing this type of enterprise.

Both the AFL and CIO have come out flatly in favor of Rochdale co-ops.

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, a typical Rochdale consumer co-op has the following rules:

1. Membership is open to anybody who wants to buy stock. For example, it isn't confined to union members.

New Gales Threaten Florida Gulf Coast

Two Demands Higher Wages Increase Of 15 Cents Per Hour Asked By Textile Union

Atlanta, Sept. 22—(AP)—Southern mill operators today had notice that the Textile Workers Union of America, CIO, wants a 15-cent per hour general wage boost.

The demand was served yesterday at a meeting of delegates from 190 mills who claim to represent some 125,000 CIO textile workers in the South.

These delegates adopted a resolution embodying the wage demand and authorized the union to reopen all southern contracts and begin negotiations for new wage scales.

Gales And Rain Not Expected To Be Dangerous; Number Of Casualties Rising From Mississippi's Hurricane

New Orleans, La., Sept. 22—(AP)—Winds up to 60 miles per hour—only 15 miles below hurricane strength—were predicted today for storm-ravaged southern Florida as a new tropical disturbance moved swiftly across the Gulf of Mexico.

The storm center, already lashing the coast with rain-laced whistling squalls, headed toward the Port Myers-Tampa Bay area where it was expected to move inland tonight. It was only half the intensity of the great Atlantic hurricane, which tracked destruction across Florida and then roared across the Gulf to devastate the rich Gulf Coast and New Orleans.

The Miami Weather Bureau said the newest blow was not expected to be dangerous.

However, the dismal job of tabulating casualties and property damage continued along the coast of Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and extreme northern Florida. Forty-three were known dead, and there was apprehension of extensive flood damage to compound the desolation strewn by the hurricane itself.

Delayed reports from Gulfport, Miss. said beach areas still were blocked off, and residents were warned away because of venomous snakes, apparently washed ashore from outlying islands. Several reptiles were killed measuring from four to six feet in length.

Power trucks were brought from upstate Mississippi to spray beach debris with DDT and lime to control odor and insects. State and municipal authorities conferred Sunday on requirements, and prepared to ask the War Assets Administration for relief stocks and heavy equipment to clean beaches and highways. Heavy timbers also were sought for bridge repairs.

Harry Carey, Movie Pioneer, Dies At 69

Hollywood, Sept. 22—(AP)—Harry Carey, the hard riding hero of many a silent western thriller, died yesterday at his suburban, Brentwood home at the age of 69.

The veteran of more than 300 film roles since 1908 died of coronary thrombosis.

In my opinion, the success of this campaign would be the means of raising more than a million dollars for the cause of Home Missions for our church."



(Continued from Page One) Communist aggression, instead of being shot like sitting birds. And that, of course, is the significance of the Marshall Plan, although Moscow charges that the program is imperialistic and calculated to give America control of Europe.

The big question is whether the rehabilitation plan can work fast enough to save an all but desperate situation. Most of Europe is struggling in the economic morass. Key countries like Britain and France are so hard hit that they are unable to bolster their smaller neighbors. That's why so much dependence is placed on America.

If rehabilitation can't be achieved in time to form an effective barrier against aggressive communism, then the Redism will overrun the rest of Europe. That would create a new and terrible menace to the Orient and the Western Hemisphere.

(Continued from Page 1) people. Most cooperatives require the purchase of only one or two shares of stock. The shares usually cost about \$5 apiece.

2. Every member has one vote, regardless of how many shares he owns. 3. The value of the stock always stays the same. You can't buy a share at \$5 and sell it for \$6.

Whether or not dividends are paid, every co-op pays "patronage rebates" that means the co-op each year takes the money that is left over and divides it among the customers of the store, in proportion to the money they spent.

6. Members of the co-op—that is, stockholders—get these rebates in cash. Non-members who patronize the store can save their cash register slips and get—not cash refunds—but credit toward a share of stock. In this way a customer of the store can "eat his way" into the business and become a stockholder.

There was never a time when the general public was more fully informed on public issues than now. We can pick up the newspaper or turn on the radio, read the magazines or peruse the multitude of books now being published and get dozens of scores of opinions on every subject. Strange, is it not, that in the 19th century when books were scarce, there arose the greatest political thinkers of recent centuries. Also momentous changes of government took place at that time. The most penetrating religious thought throughout the centuries was achieved in periods when men had almost nothing to read but the Bible.

More and more the conviction is forced upon us that we read too much and think too little; that we often spend more time talking about our problems than we do trying to solve them. Pythagoras, the Greek philosopher, bade his disciples keep silence three years, after which time all would come right. Maybe if we stopped talking so much about international situations and lived more in a spirit of friendship, the problems would solve themselves. Maybe if there was less discussion about marriage and more quiet attention to simple duties there would be fewer divorces. Maybe if we stayed at home more with our children and discussed their problems less, both we and they would be happier.

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WASHINGTON LETTER

Washington-Senator Wiley (R-Wis) wants to set up a series of subcapitals around the country—just in case of an atom bomb attack. He is introducing legislation to make it a law. It's his idea to move 100,000 of the quarter-million federal employees in Washington to bureaus which would be set up outside the District of Columbia.

He says the government, so distributed, could be run more efficiently and economically. He adds that the move would better insure our national security, and he talks of the economic value of getting the government payroll out to the grassroots.

The Senator's measure proposes a partial decentralization of the government. In it he asks that the Senate sub-committee on Agriculture and Forestry study a decentralization of the Department of Agriculture and report back to Congress within six months.

He would make this a test case, a model, so that every other department of the government might later try the same thing.

Fred Lawton, acting director of the Budget Bureau, says the administration is firmly opposed to Senator Wiley's suggestions. In a letter to the Senator, Lawton said the government would lose, rather than gain, from any large-scale decentralization of the remaining federal offices.

He added that 90 per cent of all federal employees are already located outside Washington. (Senator Wiley wants to up this percentage to 95.)

As for security, Lawton says that a major decentralization would provide only a limited degree of it. An enemy, he points out, could also drop bombs on other parts of the country where any subcapitals might be set up.

Instead of further decentralization, Lawton favors recentralization. "Administrative efficiency and economy both dictated the decision to return them to Washington," Lawton says.

Senator Wiley contends "one atomic bomb could wipe out the nerve center of American defense," and he adds:

"It is ridiculous to assume that the Nation's Capital must necessarily be a swarming, jammed metropolis as it is now."

"There would be better living here, better government here, and better relations with the public if many of the Federal functions were moved out of Washington to areas most closely related with these functions."

Philadelphia, Sept. 22—(AP)—Philadelphia's municipal court has been asked to decide whether an engagement ring is an outright gift or one which is contingent on a marriage ceremony being performed.

Franklin P. Berkelbach, 27-year-old veteran of World War II, has filed suit for the return of the ring he says he gave Margaret Wilson, Philadelphia, last December to bind their engagement.

Berkelbach's attorney, Isaac Grossman, said the engagement was broken and Berkelbach feels he has a case because "the courts have held the gift should be returned, if the marriage doesn't go through."

KAISER-FRAZER RANKS FOURTH IN PRODUCTION

Detroit, Aug. 14 (UP)—The Kaiser-Frazer Corp., banking on a war-born boom in new cars, has amazed automotive experts by turning up as the industry's fourth largest producer.

A little more than a year ago Kaiser and Frazer cars did not exist except on paper. A little more than six months ago the company borrowed \$12,000,000 to keep its head above financial waters.

Today production figures show K-F is grinding out some 2,300 passenger cars a week, better than any of the independents and runner-up to the "Big Three"—General Motors, Ford and Chrysler.

And the company is making money.

Viewed as Miracle

Some observers call it a "miracle" that Kaiser-Frazer has been able to do what few shipping manufacturers could accomplish—crash into the highly-competitive automobile business and stay there.

Admittedly the company cashed in on an opportune moment—a time when public clamor for new cars was at its highest. In part it was due to the fact that the company passed other independents with an output of 12,000 units and is shooting for a goal of 14,000 in August.

Its labor force, containing a high percentage of young war veterans, has grown from a few thousand to 9,000 at the Willow Run plant.





New President And Deans Open Session

East Carolina Teachers College Begins Term With New President And Two Deans On Administrative Staff

East Carolina Teachers College began the 1947-48 session today with an administrative staff which includes three new college officers: Dr. John Decatur Messick, president; Dr. Leo W. Jenkins, dean of instruction, and Dr. J. K. Long, registrar and director of admissions. Dr. Messick and Dr. Long are native North Carolinians.
Dr. Messick assumed his duties as president of ECTC on September 1. He was elected to the presidency of the college by the Board of Trustees on July 1 to succeed Dr. Dennis H. Cooke, who resigned to become head of the department of education at the University of North Carolina in Greensboro. A native of Beaufort county, Dr. Messick served for nine years as dean at Elon College, and since 1944 had been dean of instruction and assistant to the president in administration at the New Jersey State Teachers College at Montclair.
Dr. Messick is a graduate of Elon College. He has done graduate work at the University of North Carolina and at Columbia University; he holds the doctor's degree from the New York University. He is widely known as an educator, lecturer and author.
Dr. Leo W. Jenkins replaces Dr. Ronald J. Slay as dean of instruction. Dr. Slay resigned from the ECTC staff during the summer and is now head of the department of science at Wagner College, Staten Island, New York.
Dr. Jenkins has had a wide experience as an educator. He has served as dean of boys' schools in New Jersey and as professor of social studies at New Jersey State Teachers College, at Montclair. He comes to Greenville from the State Department of Education, Trenton, N. J., where he was assistant in higher education. He was educated at Rutgers, Columbia University, and New York University.
East Carolina's new registrar and director of admissions, Dr. J. K. Long, was reared in Seaboard, N. C., and, as teacher, principal and superintendent, has been connected with several public school systems of the state. From 1922 to 1931 he was connected with the Ayden schools, first as a principal and later as superintendent. For the past several years he had been assistant superintendent in charge of junior and senior high schools in Louisville, Ky.
He attended the University of North Carolina, and holds degrees from Columbia University and from Peabody College, Nashville, Tenn.
Dr. Long replaces Dr. H. H. McGinnis, former registrar and for several years acting president of the college, who now heads the new bureau of field services recently established at the college.
